JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

Fairmount, Indiana, August 12, 1929.

The eighty-first session of the Indiana Annual Conference convened on the Camp Ground, August 12, at 7:30 P. M. The opening sermon was preached by J. J. Coleman. It was freighted with instruction, encouragement and timely warning. The text used is 1 Timothy 1:12-20.

Tuesday, 8:30 A. M.

The first business meeting was held at 8:30 A. M. The devotional service was conducted by J. Hester and Robert Kendall. The roll was called and 47 elders and 11 Conference preachers answered to the call of their names.

The President then read his annual address, which upon motion was received.

The following recommendations of the President were received and a motion prevailed that they be referred to the proper committees:

President's Recommendations

1. I recommend that a Committee of not less than nine persons be appointed to consider the question of an Old Folks Home and to report to this body not later than Thursday.

2. I recommend that each Pastor be made responsible for the raising of the Budget and that he shall report to the President each quarter as to how he is succeeding. If he is found to be failing in his effort, he shall so report the fact to the President not later than the second quarter. In that case the President shall counsel with him as to what means and methods shall be pursued to accomplish this work.

To assist him in making reports, quarterly report blanks covering all items of his work shall be provided.

3. I recommend that all Local Preachers be required to attend the Ministerial Institute if continued in the employ of the Annual Conference. And that all Licentiates who have not attended the Institute for two years be sent back to their respective Quarterly Meetings. If necessary to employ any of the Licentiates that have been sent back to their Quarterly Meetings, that it be done as a supply under Executive appointment. In such case of employment the usual privileges of administering the sacraments and performing marriage ceremony shall not be included in the appointment.

4. I recommend that where churches pay their Pastors less than \$1,000 salary per year, and are in proximity to other Wesleyan churches that they be joined in circuits and that the Pastors be required, as far as possible, to give their whole time to the building up of the said circuit churches.

5. I recommend that Fifth Sunday Group Meetings of churches for the encouragement and increase of interest in the work of God be authorized.

6. I recommend that this Conference instruct the Committee on Finance and Appropriations to bring in plans for the raising of the College Building Fund for the liquidation of the Conference debt incurred in the purchase of the College property.

The President then made report of his official acts. Upon motion the official acts of the President were endorsed. See Report No. 1. The Calendar of Business was read and adopted. A motion prevailed that the Special Order program be adopted. Upon motion the Conference endorsed the appointment of the Chairmen of the Committees by the President.

A motion prevailed that the Conference convene at 8:30 A. M. and 2:00 P. M. and adjourn at 11:30 A. M. and upon motion in the evening.

Resolved, That the Board of Trustees be and are hereby empowered to make and execute all such deeds, and that when ordered the President and Secretary of the Conference are empowered to sign and transfer such deeds, and the Secretary shall record the sale of such properties in the journal after the words: "The Indiana Yearly Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church (or Connection) of America has ordered the sale of the following."

Upon motion E. E. Hunter was elected to preach the opening sermon at the next Conference and C. N. Porter as alternate.

C. D. Crabill and S. C. Kinnison were elected a Committee to draft resolutions relative to the President of the United States being zealous in protecting the Eighteenth Amendment, and the same sent to him. That the Committee also draft resolutions respecting Sabbath observance and nominate a person for membership on the Board of Directors of the Lord's Day Alliance.

A motion prevailed that a sinking fund to the amount of 50 cents per member of the Conference Ministerial Group Insurance, from the Superannuated Ministers' Fund, to be used as necessary by the Treasurer.

A motion prevailed that when the Conference adjourns it shall adjourn to meet at the call of the chair.

Upon motion the Assistant to the Treasurer is to receive \$10.00 for her labor.

A motion prevailed that the next Conference convene Tuesday nearest the middle of August, next.

The Committee on Pastoral Relations made final report. Upon motion the report was adopted. See Report No. 7.

A motion prevailed that the names of those appearing on the General Evangelist List be reported to the Book Committee.

THE INDIANA CONFERENCE

Upon motion the President was granted the privilege to attend the Alabama Camp Meeting next year.

The Special Order, report of the Sunday School Board was called. The Conference Sunday School Secretary made report. The report was adopted. See Report No. 14. The Sunday School Secretary then presented diplomas to a class of seven who have finished the course in Teacher Training under the leadership of W. H. Drake.

Upon motion F. O. Spitler was elected Conference Sunday School Treasurer. E. J. Pitts and H. T. Hawkins were elected members of the Sunday School Board.

The special Committee on Resolutions gave report. Upon motion the report was adopted. See Report No. 15.

A representative of the W. H. & F. M. Society tendered the co-operation of the Society to the Conference Committee on Old Folks' Home in the establishing of the same. A motion prevailed that the Conference express by standing vote its appreciation of the cooperation of the Society.

Prof. Levay Fancher, of Houghton College; Rev. Arthur Calhoun, of the Ohio Conference; Rev. E. W. Black, of the North Carolina Conference, and Rev. Jesse Whitecotton were introduced to the Conference.

A motion prevailed that the local organizations of the Burial Association shall be effected at the first Quarterly Meeting of the Conference year and members be earnestly solicited to join the Association and report all members and monies secured to Rev. Paul Billheimer, Wabash, Ind.

The Committee on division of Conference reported as follows: All churches south of the south edge of Marion constitute the Southern District and all churches north of the south edge of Marion, including the Marion churches, constitute the Northern District.

The minutes were read and approved as corrected.

The Conference adjourned upon motion. Benediction, C. G. Payne.

RESOLUTIONS AND LAWS OF INDIANA CONFERENCE

1. It is contrary to the spirit of the Discipline and our principles for our preachers to assist in any service with oath-bound societies.

2. That any candidate for Elder's Orders or traveling under the direction of the Conference, who fails to attend the Institutes and the examinations of the Committee, without sufficient cause, shall be deemed unworthy of the trust and care of souls, and refused a place among us as a minister of the Gospel, and when they shall fail to attend the Institute for two successive years they shall be dropped from the roll.

3. That it is the sense of this Conference that our houses of worship should not be open to any evangelist or minister of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain a regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments.

4. Any waiving of the above resolution by a contract or lease of building must be obtained through the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference.

5. Whereas, The Discipline requires that the Stewards must meet the Pastors and agree with them as to the amount necessary for their support, be it resolved: That the circuits may at the same time enter into an agreement in writing with the Pastor as to the service he is to render to the church. In case the Pastor shall fail to render such services, unless providentially hindered or released by the circuit, said failure shall be considered a sufficient cause to make an adjustment of the amount originally agreed upon. Otherwise the contract shall be binding upon both parties the same as any other financial obligation entered into by contracting parties.

6. Each pastor shall file a duplicate statistical report with the Committee before the close of the second day of Conference, said report to be kept on file one year, and hereafter these reports shall not be read in open Conference.

7. The membership, so far as possible, shall pay all their contributions for the Conference and Connectional interests to the pastors, who shall receipt them for the same and see that it is paid to the proper authorities. Where money is paid direct to the Conference

Treasurer by the membership, he shall send a duplicate receipt to the pastor of the charge where such persons are members.

8. All charges with a membership of twenty-five or more shall in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the pastor may live.

9. We recommend that all charges and stations to which the pastor moves pay the moving and transportation expenses of said pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary; provided this shall not interfere with the previous arrangements between pastors and charges.

10. All unaccounted for members appearing in the statistics in the membership list shall be transferred to the discontinued list. The roll of all the classes upon the charges shall be put in the hands of the Pastors and they shall have charge of the same and make all entries therein.

11. The Committee on Elder's Orders is hereby empowered to transfer all persons to the study list who may have been recommended to travel and may not have been given work.

12. It shall be a standing rule of this Conference until revoked by vote that the President shall receive \$35.00, the Secretary \$50.00, the Assistant Secretary, \$25.00, and each member of the Statistical Committee, \$25.00, and each member of the Auditing Committee, \$10.00, the same to be apportioned pro rata among the various funds of the Conference.

13. The official character of no Pastor shall be passed until he shall have submitted a satisfactory report, including statistics.

14. It shall be a standing rule until revoked by this body that the President shall nominate his Advisory Board and the Conference shall elect his nominations.

15. It shall be a standing rule of this Conference that in the examination of character the Conference officials shall be called first.

16. In the membership report all members who are found on the circuits in excess of the number reported shall be reported received.

17. Be it resolved, That where the Conference demands the services of anyone, that it shall bear the moving expenses, if any expense shall thus be incurred.

18. The Camp Meeting Committee shall be elected as follows: One for three years, one for two years and one for one year, and that the person elected for three years be chairman of the Committee, and that thereafter each member be elected for a term of three years.

19. Be it resolved, That it shall be the duty of the pastors to look after the insurance of our church and parsonage properties. All insurance shall provide for losses caused by fire and lightning, hail and tornado. A failure on the part of the pastor shall be a censurable offense. If the church fails to insure their property upon reasonable effort of the pastor to secure the same, then said failure shall be reported to the President of the Conference, who shall then have the property insured. In such case, all insurance monies received from losses by fire, lightning, hail and tornado shall be used in Church Extension work as the Conference Board of Trustees deems best.

20. Whereas, We have a scholastic standard for our preachers, and whereas those saved, sanctified and called among our own numbers are compelled to meet these requirements before ordination: Be it resolved, That the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders shall require all those desiring to unite with us from any other denomination or Annual Conference to present credits equivalent to our Conference Course of Study, regardless of their standing in the body of which they have been a member, and if they cannot do this they shall be required to meet the same conditions as our local preachers before ordination.

REPORT OF BURIAL ASSOCIATION COMMITTEE

No. 5

We, your committee which was elected at the Union Quarterly Ministerial Meeting at Marion College to consider the formation of a Burial Association, recommend that such Association be organized upon the following plans and by-laws:

Article I.—Name of Association

This Association shall be known as the Burial Association of the Wesleyan Methodist Church.

THE INDIANA CONFERENCE

Article II.—Object

The object and purpose of this Association shall be to provide a burial for the members of this Association according to the by-laws of the Association.

Article III.—Duties of General Officers

1. This Association shall consist of an executive board of five members, to be elected or appointed by the Annual Conference from among the ordained elders, who are members of the Burial Association, each member of said board so elected or appointed to serve until their successors are elected or appointed.

2. As soon as said board is elected or appointed by the Annual Conference they shall meet and elect a President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer from among their number. The President so elected shall be chairman of the board and shall have the power at any time to call a meeting of the board to transact business for the Association.

3. It shall be the duty of the Secretary of said board to keep a record of the membership of the Association, of its meetings, etc., and upon the death of any of its members the Secretary shall notify all of the members of the Association by mail, giving the amount of assessment each member shall pay for burial of said member, postage, receiving cards, traveling expenses for special services, to be paid out of the Association treasury.

4. The Treasurer of said board shall give bond in the penal sum of Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000.00), said bond to be conditioned for the well and faithful handling of all money by said Treasurer, and for his prompt and faithful accounting therefor, and paying of all money truly and promptly to his successor in office. The Secretary and Treasurer shall each make a full and detailed report to the Annual Conference.

5. All officers of said Association are to serve without compensation, except the General Secretary and General Treasurer. The amount to be paid the General Secretary shall be determined and fixed by the Indiana Annual Conference. The General Treasurer and the eligible members of his family shall be exempt from assessment in said Association during the term of office.

Article IV.—Local Secretary

1. It shall be the duty of the President of the Conference to see that local secretaries be elected or appointed in each local church.

2. It shall be the duty of the local Secretary to keep a correct list of all members of his or her local church Burial Association, and to collect the assessment and send same to General Secretary of Association with names of those who paid and those who failed to pay.

WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH

3. He shall also send certificate of deceased member with his notification of death and name of person to whom money shall be paid, to the General Secretary, whose address will be given when there is an assessment made. The General Secretary on being notified of a death shall issue an order on the Treasurer of the Burial Association for said claim. The Treasurer will issue a check for said claim to the beneficiary and undertaker in charge.

4. The local Secretary of the Burial Association shall send the names of all members of the Association to the General Secretary.

5. The local Secretaries may take postage and cost of money order from assessment money. Said expense must be specified in report to General Secretary.

6. All local Burial Association Secretaries shall report in full at each quarterly meeting of their local church.

Article V.—Membership

1. No one shall be eligible to membership of this Association except:

a. Members of the Wesleyan Methodist church under sixty (60) years of age, provided however that any member of the Wesleyan Methodist church, sixty (60) years of age, or older; and having been a member in good standing for at least two years may be eligible to membership in this Association.

b. Unmarried children of members of the Wesleyan Methodist church, over the age of six months and under 21 years of age.

c. The husband or wife of a member of the Wesleyan Methodist church.

2. No member of the Wesleyan Methodist church shall be compelled to become a member of this Association, but it shall be left entirely to the discretion of the individual. No one may be accepted as a member of this Association who is afflicted with a serious disease at the time of his application.

3. If a member of this Association be such member by virtue of being a child of a member of the Wesleyan Methodist church, his membership in this Association shall cease upon his or her marriage to one who is not a member of said church, or upon his or her attaining the age of 28 years, unless he or she is at that time a member of said church.

4. If a member of this Association is such member by virtue of the membership in said church of his wife, or her husband, such membership in this Association shall cease upon the death of such husband or wife who is a member of said church.

THE INDIANA CONFERENCE

5. If a member of this Association is such member by virtue of his membership in the Wesleyan Methodist Church, and thereafter his relationship with said church is severed for any cause, his membership in this Association shall thereupon cease at the time his relationship with said church is severed. It shall be the duty of the Advisory Board of each local church to furnish a list of the names of all members dropped from the local church for any cause, which list shall be certified by the Pastor and the Church Clerk and shall be sent to the General Secretary of the Burial Association immediately following the action of the church body.

6. Upon becoming a member of this Association, each member shall pay a fee of fifty cents, which fee shall be placed in the treasury of this Association for a sinking fund to be used in case of an epidemic, or in case of the death of several members at any one time.

Article VI.—Death Benefits

1. Upon the death of a member of this Association in good standing there shall be paid to the surviving husband or wife, or if none, to the estate of said member, and to the officiating undertaker, jointly, a funeral benefit of an amount equal to \$20.00 for each one hundred members of this Association, provided that the maximum funeral benefit shall not exceed \$300.00.

Article VII.—Assessment of Members

1. Upon the death of a member of this Association an assessment of twenty cents shall be placed upon each member of this Association for the funeral benefit of such deceased member. All assessments shall be sent to the General Secretary of this Association who will give proper credits, and shall turn said money so collected over to the Treasurer of this Association.

2. All assessments, where there is a local Secretary, shall be paid to such local Secretary.

3. If a member of this Association fails to pay any assessment within thirty days after receiving notice of such assessment, his membership in this Association shall thereupon cease, and he shall not be entitled to receive any funeral benefit from this Association.

4. Postage stamps shall not be accepted for membership fees, or any assessment of this Association.

Article VIII.—Change of Address

1. It shall be the duty of each member of this Association to notify the General Secretary of any change in his post office address, and if such member changes his post office address and fails to so notify such Secretary, his membership in this Association shall thereupon cease.

Article IX.—Change in By-Laws

1. These by-laws shall be subject to change and amendment by a majority vote of the Indiana Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, at its regular annual meeting, and all members of this Association accept these By-Laws, subject to any changes that may be made by said Conference.

FINANCE AND APPROPRIATION

No. 6

Your Committee on Finance and Appropriation respectfully submit the following recommendations:

1. That in harmony with the recommendations of the Conference President, that the Pastors be required to report quarterly to him, concerning their success in raising the Conference and Connectional budget. If at the close of the second quarter they are not meeting with success, they shall call upon the President to assist them in raising these funds.

2. The President shall be continued in the work, having general charge of Conference work and Church Extension, and have a quarterly meeting on each charge. His remuneration shall be \$1,600.00, and the expenses above traveling to and from quarterly meetings incident to the work he is called upon to do.

3. We recommend that the Conference Treasurer be nominated by the Board of Trustees, and that in his annual report he shall hereafter set forth the assets and liabilities of each arm of the Conference work, and that this shall be published in the Minutes.

4. It is recommended that the salary of the District Superintendents be \$1,400 each, and that each district shall determine the matter of the Superintendent's expenses, and the manner in which his salary is to be paid.

5. That the Districts shall each name two ministers and two laymen who shall act in an advisory relation with their respective Superintendents. The apportionment for salary and expenses of Superintendent shall be made by this Committee.

6. That the Apportionment for Conference Claims shall be one dollar per member from all of our churches. The Conference Claims

shall include the President's salary, Church Extension work, College Building debt, and the other items necessary to Conference work.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

No. 14

1. At the close of last Conference the Board met and organized for work, placing Rev. H. T. Hawkins as Superintendent of the work among those ranging in ages from birth to thirteen years.

2. Those from thirteen years of age to twenty-five were placed under the supervision of the Conference Sunday School Secretary, Rev. F. O. Spittler.

3. And those above twenty-five years, under the supervision of Rev. E. J. Pitts.

4. The three conference districts were subdivided into six Sunday School sections, each section under a superintendent, and a splendid convention was held in each of these sections, which were evidently blessed of the Lord.

5. Offerings were taken at each convention to defray the expense of the Sunday School Board.

6. Through the efforts of W. H. Drake a class of seven has finished the teacher training course and will be given their diplomas today.

Recommendations

We recommend the following plans for the following year:

1. That the Sunday School districts harmonize with the new districting of the Conference and that each of these districts be subdivided into eastern and western sections, and that the Conference District Superintendent be superintendent of each section in his district, and that he with the Conference Sunday School Board continue the method of holding one convention in each section of his district.

2. We also recommend that the sections be divided as follows:

Northern District

Western Section—Wabash, Hamlet, North Liberty, South Bend, Peru, Plymouth, Miami, Elkhart, Marion churches, Mt. Zion (Howard Co.), Santa Fe, Logansport.

Eastern Section—Laketon circuit, Larwill, Huntington circuit, Albion circuit, Edgerton, South Salem, Warren circuit, Lancaster, Bluffton, Mt. Etna, Hartford City, Bryant, Fort Wayne.

Southern District

Western Section—Thorntown, Sheridan, Mt. Olive, Kirklin, Westfield circuit, Greentown, Fishersburg circuit, Cicero circuit, Tipton, Boxley circuit, Indianapolis, Waveland, Lafayette churches, Otterbein, Fowler, Elwood, Kokomo, Roseburg, Fairmount circuit.

Eastern Section—Blue River circuit, Hedrick, Lewis Creek circuit, Mt. Zion (Henry Co.), Fountain City, Fowlerton, Jonesboro, Gas City, Grant City, Anderson, Shelbyville, New Castle, Muncie, Portland, Summitville.

3. We further recommend that each school continue to raise ten cents per member, to be divided as before, for Conference and Connectional work.

4. We also recommend that each school seek to establish teacher training classes and that the home, cradle roll, temperance and missionary departments be encouraged, and that special effort be put forth for the salvation of our Sunday School scholars and to get them into the church.
