

The President's Salary shall be \$2,250.00 per year, plus all expenses incurred on official business of the conference. The Conference President shall be allowed to hold revivals and other meetings to supplement his salary. Each pastor, is urged and expected to receive a love offering at the first and fourth quarterly conference and, also, at Christmas for the President. The Conference Treasurer is hereby authorized to remit the President's salary semi-monthly. We further recommend that if the Budget does not take care of the President's salary, the deficit be taken out of the Conference Fund. We further recommend that the Conference President's utility bills be paid out of the Conference Fund. We further recommend that \$1.00 per member of the Conference Fund be set aside for the official travel expense of the Conference President.

OPENING - The Tennessee Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church convened for its Thirty-fifth Annual Session on the Campground at 9 A. M., Tuesday, July 14, 1964.

Rev. S. D. Herron conducted devotions.

Conference was called to order by the President, D. P. Denton. Roll was called with 16 Elders, 3 Superannuated Elders, 15 Conference Preachers and 22 Delegates responding. The following were seated as Alternate Delegates: Mrs. Carol Vandergriff for Chattanooga First, Mrs. Pearl Harwell for Savannah. It was voted that seating of delegates from Nashville and Knoxville First be withheld until the charges preferred against these churches be cleared.

BOARD OF MANAGERS - Carl Johnson read the report of the Confer-

ence Board of Managers. (See Report #2)

S. D. Herron was called to the Chair.

Conference President, D. P. Denton, read charges filed by the Conference Board of Managers against the First Wesleyan Methodist Church, Knoxville, Tennesse, First Wesleyan Methodist Church, Nashville, Tennessee, Elder N. C. Hoggle, and Elder Edward Schade.

Voted that charges filed against Elder N. C. Hoggle and Elder

Voted that charges filed against Elder N. C. Hoggle and Elder Edward Schade be referred to Committee on Ministerial Character, as

provided by the discipline. (Section VIII Paragraph 140)

Elder N. C. Hoggle objected to D. P. Denton serving on the Character Committee since he was chairman of the Board filing the charges. Conference Body elected S. D. Herron to serve on this committee in this matter.

JUDICIARY SESSION - Voted that Conference Body go into a Judiciary session and hear the trial of the First Wesleyan Methodist Church, Nashville and that the hearing for First Wesleyan Methodist Church, Knoxville be postponed until 10:30 Wednesday morning.

Voted that the Nashville Church be allowed one counsellor only with the privilege of speaking. Pastor Edward Schade selected C. Wesley Lovin, Church Extension Secretary, to serve as the church

counsellor.

Voted that in view of the charges placed against, it, that the First Wesleyan Methodist Church, Shelby Avenue, Nashville, Tennessee be suspended for one year, with the understanding that the church shall take an official vote within 30 days from this date, as to whether or not it shall remain a part of the Tennessee Conference, Wesleyan Methodist Connection (or church).

In case the church votes not to remain a part of the Conference, the Board of Managers are hereby authorized to accept this as final.

Should the church vote to be a part of the conference, it shall be expected to abide by the actions and rules of the Conference.

(Voted 39 in favor and 3 opposed) Adjourned from Judiciary Session.

Decision of the chairman, S. D. Herron, was that above decision would go into immediate affect and delegate from the Nashville Church not be seated. Pastor, Edward Schade, appealed decision, to go into affect at the end of this conference session. Conference Body voted unanimously to sustain the decision of the Chair.

TITNERACY AND ELDERS ORDERS - Partial report of Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders was adopted as follows: Recommended election to Elders Orders - W. G. Harwell, Homer Sawyer, Paul Cox. Recommended that Elder Carl Poe be received by transfer from the Free Methodist Church.

Voted to seat Carl Johnson, duly elected by Knoxville Second

Church, as delegate for Elder Carl Poe.

Voted not to recind vote to withhold seating of Nashville and Knoxville First delegates until charges preferred against these churches be cleared.

MINUTES OF CAMP MEETING ASSOCIATION were read and adopted.

REPORT - Vice-President, Charles Haire, took the Chair. D. P. Denton, Conference President, gave his report which was adopted with rising vote of thanks. (See Report #1)

Adjourned.

YOUTH SERVICE

Rev. Robert Lands, Conference W. T. A. President, presided at the Youth Service. Pledges amounting to \$500 were taken for the Youth Project of remodeling the bath houses. Rev. Randall McElwain brought a heart searching message using I Corinthians 2:2 "For I determined not to know anything among you, save Jesus Christ, and Him crucified."

Alvin McCammon, representative of Knoxville First Church read the reply of the church to the charges filed against the church by

the Conference Board of Managers.

Voted unanimously that in view of the charges placed against it, that the First Wesleyan Methodist Church, Woodbine Avenue, Knoxville Tennessee be suspended for one year, with the understanding that the church shall take an official vote within 30 days from this date, as to whether or not it shall remain a part of the Tennessee Conference, Wesleyan Methodist Connection (or Church).

In case the church votes not to remain a part of the Conference, the Board of Managers are herby authorized to accept this as final. Should the church vote to be a part of the conference, it shall be expected to abide by the actions and rules of the conference.

Adjourned from Judiciary Session.

EDUCATIONAL INTERESTS - Dr. Mullinax gave personal testimony and presented interests of Central College.

W.M.S. REPORT - Mrs. Katherine Blackburn read the WMS treasurer's

report, which was received.

CHARACTER COMMITTEE gave a partial report stating that the committee had met with Elder Edward Schade and the chairman of Board of Managers and reported an amicable adjustment and agreement. We passed the character of Brother Schade with the understanding that if the Mashville Church votes to remain in the Tennessee Conference, Brother Schade promises to cooperate with the Tennessee Conference and accept its supervision, and correct other matters mentioned in the complaint in which he has acknowledged his error.

WESLEYAN TRAINING ASSOCIATION REPORT - Mrs. Betty Jane Earley, Secretary, read the report of the W. T. A. Convention, the President's report, and Treasurer's report, which were received.

SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD - The report of the Sunday School Board was

read by Secretary C. D. Reynolds. The Sunday School Banner was awarded the Savannah Church. (See Report #13)

DIRECTOR OF CHILD EVANGELISM - Sunday School Board nominated and Conference elected Grace Wilson, Director of Child Evangelism.

CHARACTER COMMITTEE gave partial report stating that the committee had met with Elder N. C. Hoggle and discussed with him the charges placed against him, and granted him time to answer. He has stated to the chairman of the committee that he new realizes that he should not have done some of the things listed against him, particularly that of displacing the conference official in a business meeting, and of accepting supervision that was not approved by the conference. He promised that if his church votes to stay in the Tennessee Conference that he will either accept full supervision of the Conference or else withdraw from the conference. And, that on the basis of this acknowledgement and his promise, his character is passed.

Adjourned for Committee work.

Thursday, 3:45 P. M.

Conference called to order.

Voted to accept final report of Committee on Character. Reported that ministerial characters were passed and blanks ready to be returned to the ministers.

COMMITTEE ON ITINERACY AND ELDERS ORDERS - The Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders gave its report, which was adopted.

(See Report #14)

Voted that Conference Board of Managers appoint a Nominating Committee that will present the nominees for the sessional committees at the next session of Annual Conference.

Voted to limit members on Committee on Credentials to three

members.

CONVITTEE ON CREDENTIALS elected as follows: Earl Snider, A. L.

Kight, Homer Sawyer.

Vice-President was called to the Chair. Conference President presented three items having to do with Constitutional changes in the Discipline.

<u>VOTE ON PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL CHANGES IN DISCIPLINE</u> -- Separate votes were taken as follows:

Proposal A -- In favor of -- 0; Opposed to -- 41 Proposal B -- In favor of -- 0; Opposed to -- 41 Proposal C -- In favor of -- 1; Opposed to -- 40

Voted to hold vote on these proposals in the local churches at the first quarterly meeting of the new conference year.

TENNESSEE TIDINGS - Voted to continue Tennessee Tidings under

the direction of the Conference Board of Managers.

Conference body unanimously voted that "Resolved that the Tennessee Conference shall not accept any supervision that is not recognized in the 1959 Discipline".

Voted to leave the printing of the Conference Minutes in the hands of the Board of Managers and that the Conference President and

Conference Secretary be authorized to edit the Minutes.

PASTORS' MONTHLY REPORTS - Voted to continue monthly reporting system for pastors to Conference President. Preparation of monthly reports to be left in hands of Conference President.

Recommendation passed that churches allow pastors to appoint

their own Advisory Board.

PASTORAL RELATIONS - Committee on Pastoral Relations gave its

report, which was adopted. (See Report #15)

ANNUAL CHURCH MEETING - Voted that annual church meeting for revision of church roll and election of officers be held on June 15, or as near that date as possible, with new officers taking office on July 1.

<u>DATE OF NEXT ANNUAL CONFERENCE</u> - Voted date and place of next annual conference be placed in the hands of President and his Advisory

Board.

RESOLUTION OF WILLINGNES: (Adopted unanamously.)
Resolved, that the Tennessee Conference, Wesleyan Methodist
Connection (or Church) express its willingness to meet with
the General Board or Boards of the Wesleyan Methodist Church
of America for purposes of discussion of matters of mutual
concern with the understanding that such meetings must be
held within the bounds of the Tennessee Conference, and must
be held as meetings of Brethren seeking amicable adjustment
of problems, and not as judicial or executive sessions of
any Board or authority.

Upon motion, the Conference adjourned, sine die.

RESOLUTIONS AND LAWS OF THE TENNESSEE CONFERENCE

We, the Committee on Resolutions, submit the following report: Be it resolved, that these articles shall become the standing rules and laws of this Conference:

1. Before a local building committee proceeds with a building plan or program that they be required to have all plans approved by the President and his Advisory Board and the Missionary Board; and further, that no financial obligations be assumed without the consent of the Conference Trustees.

2. That the Board of Conference Trustees be, and they are hereby empowered, to sign all papers necessary for the sale or transfer of Conference, Church or Parsonage property, proving the said sale or transfer is authorized by the President and his Advisory Board and shall not violate the spirit of paragraphs 386, 387 of our Book of

Discipline.

3. The Board of Conference Trustees are hereby authorized to execute papers to secure funds for the liquidation of Conference, Church or Parsonage indebtedness, providing that the churches set forth in writing the amount and the purposes for which the loan is to be used; and that no funds so secured shall be used for any other purpose than that set forth in the notice to the trustees of the Conference.

4. When a deed for Conference, Church or Parsonage property is received and before it is recorded it shall be referred to the President and his Advisory Board who are hereby designated as a Deed Examining Committee whose duty shall be to examine the deed and see that there are such disciplinary clauses included as may be necessary to make the property secure to our Church. Said Committee shall have power to engage such legal advice as may be needed to insure the proper steps regarding the reception or transfer of the property. See paragraphs 388, 389 of present Book of Discipline.

5. We shall proclaim with voice and pen and holy living the gospel of full salvation, recognizing our dependence upon, and need

of the indwelling power and presence of the Holy Spirit.

We shall continue to interpret the teachings of the Scriptures and the Special Rules of the Discipline in accord with the standards held by the early Methodists and the Wesleyans of the past generations. To this end we reaffirm our stand against the reception of any member as a full member who wears jewelry, including the wedding band or other unnecessary ornaments and other worldly manifestations on theperson and declare ourselves in favor of higher standards of dress. Our ministers are asked to refrain from performing wedding ceremonies using the ring, and to be positive in their declarations regarding this entering wedge of worldliness. We furthen declare our opposition to such things as commercialized ball games, Sabbath desecration, theatres, television, and such like, and shall support our ministers in their endeavors to counteract these menaces. We further urge our ministers to take an active stand in exposing the three "C's" of the world, Communism, Catholicsm, and Compromise.

7. We urge all Conference Preachers and Elders to become members of the Women's Missionary Society, and that the pastors attend each meeting and encourage the women, this being one of the strong

arms of the Church.

8. Each Church shall make a special effort in behalf, and

loyally support the Church Extension Card Plan.

9. EACH PASTOR, OR CHARGE, SHALL HAVE IN THE HANDS OF THE STATISTICAL SECRETARY NOT LESS THAN FIVE DAYS BEFORE THE ANNUAL

CONFERENCE, ONE COPY OF HIS STATISTICAL REPORT IN FULL. This report shall be accompanied by a statement from the Conference Treasurer giving the amounts paid on budget under Item VIII in the pastor's statistical report and the pastor's report must check with that of the Conference Treasurer.

- 10. The Conference Treasurer's books and the General Eudget Treasurer's books shall close on July 5 of each year and no credit shall be given on the budget for that fiscal year for money received after that date. This shall not effect the closing of our fiscal year on June 30.
- 11. The President's, Secretary's, and Treasurer's correspondence expenses shall be paid from the Conference Fund by the Conference Treasurer.
- 12. Minutes of this Conference shall be published through arrangements made by the Missionary Board and delivered to the pastors in numbers equal to 50% of their Church membership.
- 13. Preachers and delegates shall remain throughout the entire Conference session unless providentially hindered or excused by the Conference.
- 14. All Elders received from other denominations shall be required to pass examination on our Book of Discipline, and must have passed a course of study which is equivalent to our course for ordination, and harmonize with our theological views. They shall give special attention to the requirements found in paragraph 171 of our Book of Discipline.
- 15. Copies of these resolutions, together with the apportionments and the addresses of the President, Secretary, and Treasurer, shall be in the hands of each pastor within two weeks of the close of the Annual Conference. The Conference Secretary be authorized to carry out this resolution.
- 16. The Conference Budget shall be raised and remitted monthly to the Conference Treasurer.
- 17. All monies which are reported through the Conference Treasurer shall be sent to him either as cash or receitps and he shall give Conference Treasurer's receipt for each item, and no money shall be listed paid out by the Treasurer except by check, on order of the President, and he shall be required to present cancelled checks and vouchers for each bill paid.
- 18. Those wishing to take examinations in the Course of Study for credit during any year, shall write for questions before May 31 of that year and shall have the answers in the hands of the proper instructor before June 30 for credit for that year. The Committee on Itineracy and Orders shall not be expected to send out questions or accept papers after these dates.
- 19. It shall be a standing rule that the Secretary shall be remunerated the sum of \$50 for each session of Conference.
- 20. We recommend that when the Conference President labors as an evangelist in any of our churches, he be paid as other evangelists are paid.
- 21. Each unorganized work which is being run under the direction of the Conference and served by a member of this body, shall be allowed to elect an honorary delegate who shall be permitted to sit with the Conference and speak on matters of business, but not allowed to vote.
- 22. The Conference President shall be required to hold Quarterly Business Meetings at all unorganized works that are under the Conference Missionary Board or with the Conference, and the pastors of these works shall receive an offering quarterly to be sent to the Conference Treasurer and used toward the President's salary.

Treasurers of these unorganized works shall be members of some Wesleyan Methodist Church unless otherwise approved by the Conference

Missionary Board.

23. In order to help maintain the spirit of brotherhood among our members and ministers, we ask that designations of titles, degrees and authority be omitted both in our public meetings and in the printed minutes, except in the first public introduction of each individual.

24. The Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders will be responsible for the time, place, financing, and program of the Minis-

terial Convention each year.

25. The Conference President and his Advisory Board is a con-

stituted committee on Special Orders.

26. In the judgment of the Tennessee Conference, viewing television programs is an impediment to the development of holy character. We deplore the television program's evil effect upon the moral and spiritual life of the nation. The principles of Wesleyan Methodism, being an epitome of the christian religion, obligate Wesleyan Methodists to an unblameable life which constantly rebukes every form of evil and zealously advocates holiness of heart and life. Therefore, we most earnestly request our ministers and members, as those who must give account unto God in the Day of Judgment for anything which tends to influence toward evil, to refrain from the purchase of television sets and from viewing television programs for Jesus' sake. Inasmuch as ministers are examples and patterns to the flock of Christ, the Tennessee Conference expects each of its ministers to set a wholesome example and to be a godly pattern in this respect, so that those to whom he ministers will follow his example and avoid exposure to this which menaces vital godliness.

27. That outgoing pastor's responsibility continue through the Sunday following Annual Conference. Also, that a church allow its pastor at least two meetings away from the church and that he be given at least one week's vacation with pay; that last provision to

include the Conference President.

28. That no budget credit be given until payment is itemized,

or otherwise specified.

- 29. That all officers and standing committees assume their duties at the close of the sitting of conference at which they are elected.
- 30. Before any of these resolutions and laws of the Tennessee Conference can be changed or repealed, it shall require a two-thirds standing vote of the Conference body.

31. The Missionary Board shall be the Board of Managers of the

Tennessee Conference.

32. It shall be the polity of the Conference that our own Conference Officials preside over the Conference Sessions.

33. That the Conference establish a standing committee on

credentials.

34. The Conference President shall hold the first and fourth Quarterly Conference with the provision that the President may be authorized to select Elders to assist him with Quarterly Conference, with the understanding that the President shall visit each church at least once a year.

REPORT I

CONFERENCE PRESIDENT

TO THE THIRTY-FIFTH ANNUAL SESSION OF THE TENNESSEE CONFERENCE. July 14, 1964.

GREETINGS:

God in His mercy has seen fit to allow us to gather for another Conference Session, amidst the warnings of nature and of Scripture that this may well be our last such gathering. Death has come to our midst this year, visiting ministers' homes and also laymen's, warning us again and again that we are all human creatures that are destined for eternity and may be called at any time. World conditions cry out their persistent warning that we are fast approaching the end of this age and the reign of the anti-christ, and tell us that what we do must be done quickly. The condition of the Church adds its voice to these other warnings, shaking us awake to the fact that our own part of God's moral vineyard is in danger to a far greater extent than was that of our Church Fathers when they were led of God to withdraw from the old churches and establish a holiness connection. Truly there are voices on every hand that blast us with their warnings. Our prayer to God is that we shall have enough spiritual discernment to see and to heed these unmistakable signs of the end.

In the Conference, this has been a year of both problems and progress, of battles and blessings, of disappointments and delight. A number of the churches have made material progress this year. Some have seen good numerical gains. Others have had real revival in their midst. At the same time there has been much sickness among our people, with several deaths that touch close to our Conference. Several pastors' homes and work have been hindered by sickness and death. But in the midst of all that burdens and problems, God has been very real

and blessed to each of us.

May I repeat one paragraph of my report of last year: " The insiduous move that is on, inspired by powerful forces outside of the Conference, to transfer the seat of our loyalty from the local church and the local Conference to elsewhere is not true Wesleyan Methodism, is a violation of the Wesleyan Methodist Discipline and Constitution, and should be and will be resisted to the limit by all true Wesleyans and true Christians. Such a transfer of loyalty has always (and this is apparent from a study of church history) wrecked the fellowship of the members, stifled the leadings of the Holy Ghost, destroyed the local church, and changed the denomination into a machine rather than a movement. May God in His mercy give us the sense to see, the will to work, and the strength to stand." "The greatest enemy that true Wesleyan Mehhodism has is that group in the denomination which is working for more control and more centralization and more dictatorship outside of the local Conference. Such a thing is a violation of the basic principles of the Discipline, and as a loyal member of my Conference I am obligated to either resist it or to withdraw from the Conference and Church. I cannot be an honest man or a truthful man and seek to destroy the very foundations upon which the church is built."

May we again record our gratitude to those leaders in the Conference who have helped us to carry the load this year. Our Conference Vice-President, Charles Haire, has stood with us and assisted us in every way that he could. The Conference Treasurer, the President's Advisory Board, the Board of Managers, the Wesleyan Training Association Officers, the Women's Missionary Society Officers, the Camp Meeting Board, and the other boards of the Conference, plus the faithful pastors and laymen who have helped to push the work and

carry the load. While the events of the past twelve months have often made us wonder. I have never felt one single regret that I cast my lot with the people of the Tennessee Conference and that I have given my all to it for these many years. I stand today exactly where I stood when I united with the Conference. My christian experience is better. My faith and determination is stronger. My knowledge is broader. My spiritual perception is keener. My standards are just as high if not higher, and my insight into what the devil is trying to do to the saints of God is clearer than it was on the day when we united with the Tennessee Conference. I have been faithful to my Conference, and if I had not, I would either pray through and get saved or else get out and go somewhere else. I have kept the vows that I made when I joined the church and the Conference, and I am more determined than ever to resist the devil in any form or any force in which he may come against us than I have ever been. I have no intentinn of compromising, of letting down, of cooling off, of cutting corners, ofbacking down on my standards, of quieting down in my opposition to sin, worldliness or dictatorship, or of running from the enemies of the Conference who seek to wreck us because we will not backslide with them. This is a holy cause for which we stand. The battle is the Lord's, and we cannot retreat. May God bless these who have stood with us, and give them abundant rewards for their faithfulness.

OFFICIAL ACTS:

On September 1, 1963, L. C. Elbell resigned as pastor of the

Erwin Church in order to take another position.

On September 1, 1963, Andrew Arnold resigned as pastor of the Mountain View Mission and was appointed as pastor of the Erwin Church with the consent of the church.

The Mountain View Mission has remained without a pastor during the remainder of the year with laymen Joe Watson and Randall Kosier carrying on the services and various ministers preaching for them. Our appreciation is hereby expressed to these faithful laymen for their good work.

Following Conference, we were left with one church without a pastor. Consequently, Earl Snider was moved from Crossville to fill this vacancy at Stair Avenue and Jerry Hanson was moved from Harriman to Crossville.

The Harriman Church was left without a pastor, and Dennis Durham was named to supply this church. W. L. Scarborough has rendered gracious assistance to this new pastor.

The boards responsible for Hinton Street Mission named C. D.

Reynolds as pastor and he has served throughout the year.

Earl Baker, Conference Preacher, accepted work in the Florida

Conference, and we issued his transfer in October 1963....

In August 1963, Douglas Heffner, pastor at Rockwood, suffered a stroke which has incapacitated him during most of the year; consequently, with the consent of the pastor and his Advisory Board, we asked C. K. Crawley to assist him with the preaching. This was done, and Brother Crawley did an acceptable job of assisting.

On November 7, 1963, in a Quarterly Conference at Rockwood, I ruled that a man in the church was not eligible to hold office in the church, and refused to recognize his election or declare him elected to a committee. At the same time, I requested him to resign as Trustee, which he refused to do. This ruling was made on the basis of Paragraph 77 of the 1959 Discipline which provides that "Members living in acknowledged violation of the Discipline are not entitled

to vote in any business connected with the church...." It is assumed that one who could not vote would not be eligible to hold office either. This particular ruling was made because of the explosive manner in which the brother in question spoke to his pastor. When the pastor raised a question about some point in the brother's qualifications, the brother in question sprang to his feet, refusing to recognize the Chairman or to follow anything rsembling Christian ethics, and speke in the most abusive terms to his pastor (although the pastor was just out of the hospital and hardly able to get to church), threatening both the pastor and the Conference President with physical and legal harm, and gave one of the worst displays of canality that I have ever seen in a church business meeting. It was my opinion that such a member is clearly and definitely living in violation of the Discipline, and that their very action is an acknowledgement of that fact. It is my opinion that it would be a very sick church that would place a person in an office inthe church at the same time that the individual was having a mad fit.

Following this ruling, we waited for a reasonable time for a challenge to it, and none came, so we proceeded with the business at

Following this action, we received an appeal from the Pastor, his Advisory Board, and several of the faithful members of the church that an investigation of the situation at Rockwood be made and some attempt be made to bring the church into line with true holiness standards. Consequently, I asked my Advisory Board and the Conference Judiciary Committee to meet with the church on November 26, 1963. This meeting was called as an investigation, and was never referred to as anything However, it was made clear that unless certain abuses were stopped, and certain ungodly actions ceased, that we would ask for definite judiciary action. At this meeting the situation was reviewed, and recommendations made, along with various charges made by certain rebellious members, and with a definite attempt at interference by two of the General Leaders from Marion, Indiana, who had neither been invited nor even notified the Conference or Church Officials that they were coming. Following this meeting, certain advice was given to the church, and some corrections made, and thus far no official opposition has been raised to the advice of the Board, and other than the continued attempts of certain General Leaders to aggitate the situation, nothing else has been done. I feel that in all fairness I should say that there are some godly people in the Rockwood Church that love God and want to be true to the Bible way of Holiness. They love their Conference, and Church, and are standing by it. However, there is a small element thatdoes not take true Bible Holiness Standards as their practice, and who do not wish to stand by the Conference, and these have received considerable encouragement from the outside in an attempt to cause the Conference more trouble. I do not hesitate to say that if the agitation continues, the Conference should take some steps to correct thesituation so that Holiness and Godliness my continue to be an .element in this church.

On April 22, 1964, I received a letter from Mr. A.L. Copeland, writing as the spokesman for the Archwood Church, 107 Archwood Ave., Madison, Temnessee, informing me that they had voted to withdraw from the Tennessee Conference. Accordingly I investigated and found that they had also notified the pastor that he was no longer to preach for them, and that they would no longer support him. (I feel that I should state that the letter of notification stated that they thought Brother Hurley was a wonderful man, and that he had been a great help to them.) I found that there was an element in the church which did not wish to

support the Conference, or have anyone to whom they should look for leadership. This seems to have been the basis for the action taken. On May 23, 1964, I reported this matter to the Conference Board of Managers at its meeting, and asked for some directions as to what to do. At the direction of the Board, I wrote to Mr. Copeland and to the church through him, calling their attention to several matters that needed to be cleared up, and to several questions that needed to be answered. I also asked that the church agree to meet with a committee from the Board on June 17, 1964, which was the date that we had already announced for the fourth quarterly conference at the church there. I stated that we should like to meet in a friendly manner to discuss the situation with them. This letter and request was directed to them on May 25, 1964 and a reply was requested before June 17, 1964, in order that the committee could be present for the expected meeting. However, the date came and no reply whatsoever had been received at the conference office(and I might state none was received before the end of the Conference year), so the Board instructed me to notify the Archwood Church that we had accepted their notice of withdrawal.

On March 14, 1964, I received a complaint and request from Rev. Charles Haire, writing as pastor and in behalf of the Second Wesleyan Methodist Church, Incorporated, of Knoxville, and stating that Mr. Michael Houser, Conference Trustee, had refused to fulfill his duties as Trustee, in that he had refused to sign a deed by which the property of the local church was being returned to the local church corpora-This refusal came in spite of the fact that the Discipline allows churches to incorporate, and the Conference to return property to the local church, plus the fact that the local Conference had voted to authorize local churches to incorporate and thus be enabled to hold their property, and the Conference Board of Managers had approved these requests. On March 16, 1964, I received a similar complaint signed by Rev. Paul Cox and the Advisory Board of the Mascot Church asking that some action be taken because of the fact that Trustee Houser had refused to sign similar papers for the Mascot Church. In both of these complaints, it was also stated that in his refusal to cooperate with the properly voted action of the Conference, Trustee Houser also made numerous derogatory remarks about the Conference and the Conference President, accusing him of being a dictator, and other such allegations. He also stated to both of these men that he would sign no further papers, and that he would not cooperate with the Conference in whatit was doing. When approached by another of the Conference Trustees and asked why he refused to carry out his duties as Trustee, he stated to that Trustee that he was not going to sign any more papers, and again repeated some of the remarks which he had made about the Conference and certain men in it. This action on the part of one of the Conference Trustees has made it difficult to handle some matters of Conference business, and has been embarrassing to the Conference leadership (and of course, that is the reason why it was done), and has been a definite hindrance in some important matters. We have counselled with our legal advisor concerning this matter, and are advised that when a Trustee refuses to carry out the assigned duties, and do what the body votes for him to do, that he has by that action vacated his position, and the body has a right to replace him by electing another Trustee. I am recommending that this Conference elect a Trustee to serve so that the business of the Conference shall not be hindered.

On February 15, 1964, we received (under date of February 10, 1964) a citation from the Board of General Superintendents, ordering

us to Marion, Indiana, to show cause why "The Board of Administration should not transfer the supervision of the ministers and churches of the Tennessee Conference" to someone else. The Board of Managers of the Conference, acting under the directive of the Tennessee Conference as voted by the session in July 1963, considered the matter at length and then decided byunanimous action not to appear at the hearing in Marion, Indiana. This action was taken due to a number of things, any one of which our legal councel considered enough to justify us in refusing to recognize the authority of the Board of General Superint-The main reason was that the Board of Superendents in the matter. intendents, without any authority at all for doing so had taken it upon themselves to try us and find us guilty, and the citation itself was simply a list of statements of things that they had already found us guilty of doing. In these supposed criminal acts for which we had been tried, were several that were plain falsehoods, and deliberate untruths -- accusations made when the parties making them knew better -- and to have even appeared would have been an admission of guilt when we not only were not guilty, but when some of the events had not even taken place. In fact, of the six statements of guilt which were leved against us, five of them were complete fabrications. The one statement of which we were guilty that was not a falsehood, was the statement that the Tennessee Conference had not agreed to be amenable to every action that might be taken against it. We were and are guilty of this one, and as far as I amconcerned, we will continue to be guilty of it, for nohonest man, no man of principle, and certainly no Christian, would ever agree to accept whatever dictates might be hurled at them without even knowing what orders might be given.

At the meeting of the Board of Administration on March 5, 1964, we were declared guilty of all that the General Superintendents had filed against us, even though the Board had never ordered us to appear, and no effort at all was made to learn the truth. The Board once more, as it has done in the past in the effort to force the Conference into submission, took action against us without consideration of truth or right, and we were notified that on April 1, 1964, C. Wesley Lovin was to take over the supervision of the ministers and churches within the Conference. I was ordered to turn over certain records, and to work under him as the leader of the Conference. We invited Lovin to meet with us prior to that date, and gave him to understand that neither he nor anyone else was going to take over the supervision of the ministers and churches of this Conference without proper disciplinary action, and that I expected to remain as the elected President of the Conference, and to work under the superivision of the Conference just as I had done in the past, and as the Discipline states that I shall do. Our talks have been on a friendly basis. but this is a matter of principle regardless of realtionship or friend-If he wished to join the Conference and the Conference wished to elect him as its president, that would be a different matter, but even then I would have to refuse to work under him since he does not maintain what this conference has declared to be its standards.

Since that time we have again and again warned both the churches and the ministers that they were not to accept any supervision outside of the Conference, and that to do so would be tantamount to declaring themselves no longer a part of the Conference. I am sorry to say that two pastors, two retired ministers, and two churches, along with several local preachers in those churches, have gone along with this illegal and unethical effort to steal a Conference. Again and again the ministers have been told that no effort would be made to bother the work of the Conference or the churches, but a constant

stream of meddling acts both against the Conference and the churches have been committed. Again and again, the ministers have been told that Lovin would not make visits into the Conference or churches without first consulting the Conference President. But again and again he has entered the Conference, pushed himself into some churches without the consent (and in one case without even the knowledge) of hte pastors, and has meddled in every conceivable manner with the business of the churches and Conference. At no time --- not even in any one instance, has he consulted with the Conference President before making this forays into the Conference. In fact, in one case, in the presence of my Advisory Board and some other brethren, me and General Supterintendent Mitchell told us personally that they would not go into any church without first consulting the Conference President. In less than five hours, they were in one of our churches, trying to hold a business meeting, without either the consent or knowledge of thepastor --- and according to reports, discussed with those who came the matter of getting them another pastor, even though the church had a pastor and had never taken a vote on the change.

These are just a few of the many instances of meddling that has and is being carried on. No Christian could defend or support such action. In the face of this, we have carried out the orders of the Conference and of the Board of Managers, and all of our official actions have been on the advice of the Board. I might say that the Board offered to meet with the Board of Administration or a Committee from it within the bounds of the Tennessee Conference, and that we still stand ready to do so. But no consideration was given to the fact that this is a clear disciplinary provision, or to our invitation.

I am recommending that the Conference hold its position on this matter. This is just the first battle in the war to take from all of the Conferences and all of the churches and allof the ministers of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, their God-given, disciplinary rights. That this is the desire of some on the Board of General Superintendents cannot be denied, since two of the Superintendents sought to get the last Session of the General Conference to do that very thing. We are fighting the battles of every old fashioned Wesleyan that is left in any Conference or any church across the land. If this effort to break down a Conference simply because it will not accept dictation that would force it into backsliding, is successful, then the entire church willbe gone. Our hearts are grieved to know that there are those who profess holiness and harbor such ambitions, but the truth is before us, and we cannot fail to act.

As your Conference President, I have always been subject to the actions of the Conference body, and I would be greatly disappointed if this Session should retrench from its position in any way.

On may 30, 1964, at the insistance of the Board of Managers, Rev. Edward Schade, Treasurer of the Conference Pension Fund, came to the Conference Office, turned in what he called his final report on The Pension Fund, and delivered to me a check for the balance, according to his report, of the funds held by him for the Pension Plan. I accepted his resignation in good faith for the Conference, and delivered the check to the Conference Treasurer to hold until this session. His report as given to me, is in hand to be placed with the Conference.

L. C. Elbell, Elder, has turned in his credentials and asked that his name be removed from the roll.

My Personal Activities:

During theyear we have been exceedingly busy, and trust that the activities recorded will not seem to indicate any sense of pride in what we may have done. We have preached 300 times during theyear, and have been in 266 other services, making a total of 566 services for the year. We have made 292 visits with prayer. We have conducted 54 Quarterly Conferences, held 41 Committee and Board Meetings, been in 16 revivals and conventions, and have worked 630 hours on the camp ground and on church buildings. In addition, we have served as Editor of the "Tennessee Tidings", edited and helped to publish the Conference Minutes, helped in the planning and conduct of the Annual Ministerial Convention, assisted in the Youth Camp and the Camp Meeting, and taught part time in our Wesleyan Day School. We have passed another year in which there was no time for evena day off from work, and no vacation, but we did take a week of time and made a trip to the mission fields of Central America, where it was our priviledge to minister to several native congregations as well as meeting with and counselling with the missionaries.

We have travelled 51,472 miles this year, using about every means of transportation available. Of this amount, 40,000 or more was within the Conference and in the interest of the Conference Work. In addition to these activities, we have spent some time with our Publishing work which God is wonderfully blessing and using, and all of the income from this work has gone directly back into the work of God, much

of it within the Conference.

The above amount listed covers simply the operational expense of our car, while purchase, maintenance, licenses, insurance, etc., is paid by the publishing work.

Our sincere thanks to the Conference for all that it does for us, and has done for us during the twelve years that we have served as your Conference President. More churches have responded this year than is usual, and the President's support has comein more regularly than it has done for some years. Thank you and may God bless you for it. May the richest blessings of God rest upon the Conference as a group, and upon each individual. —— David P. Denton

REPORT II

CONFERENCE BOARD OF MANAGERS REPORT

The Conference Board of Managers met July 18, 1963 at the close of Conference.

Elected Carl Johnson as Secretary. Voted to retain Attorney Paul Johnson of Bristol of Caldwell, Brown, Caldwell and Johnson Law Offices as the Conference lawyer. Brothers Denton, Haire, and Carl Johnson were elected as Executive Committee. Authorized the Executive Committee to make arrangements for paymentof the Conference bills. Authorized the Treasurer to pay moving bills of the pastors of the churches unable to meet the obligation. Voted to set up a fund for legal counsel of the Conference. Elected Mrs. Ruth Haire as Tidings Manager. Voted to pay Denton Publications twenty-five (\$25)out of the Conference Tidings Fund for use of machinery in printing the Tidings. Elected Charles Haire as Pioneer Pardner Treasurer. Voted to change the name of the Tennessee Conference Tidings to the Tennessee Tidings.

October 29, 1963: The Conference Board of Managers met along with the Judiciary Committee. Approved having a Ministerial Convention in the Eastern and Western District this Conference year. Voted to set a Sunday close to Christmas as a date to take up an offering to supplement the Insurance Plan of the Conference. Approved the asking of a special offering for Haiti by the Missionary Society. Voted to ask the Nashville First Church for a certified copy of the action taken (from the church clerk), stating why they refused to let the Conference President preside at quarterly meetings and why they have refused to cooperate with the Conference Program, also, stating the date and particulars of the meeting. The Conference President, Board of Managers Secretary and C. D. Reynolds were appointed to formulate a letter and requesting a reply within thirty (30) days.

January 28, 1964 business by mail: Voted to approve the incorporation of the Hinton Street Mission, with the following named incorporators: Rev. D.P. Denton, Rev. Charles Haire, Rev. C. D. Reynolds, Glen Johnson, and Ben Emory. Set the Board of Managers meeting for

February 22, 1964 at the Conference Office.

February 22, 1964: Discussed the opening of a new work in Loudon Tennessee if plans should materialize. Voted to get gravel for the driveway of the Conference Parsonage. Voted to approve deeding of a piece of property to the Wesleyan Day School Association as approved by the Camp Meeting Association in July 1962. Voted to pay for hhe Conference Minutes one hundred fifty dollars (\$150). Voted to pay twenty-five (\$25) out of the Pioneer Pardner for revival effort at Johnson City. Discussed the action of the General Superintendents against the Conference and their attempts to take over the supervision of the ministers and churches of the Tennessee Conference and adopted the following:

That our Conference Officials do not appear at the meeting

of the Board of Administration on March 5, 1964.

Charles Haire, D. P. Denton, and Thomas Hampton to confer with our Conference lawyer and draft our reply to the General Superintendents.

In case of further moves against the Conference, this Committee (Charles Haire, D. P. Denton, and Thomas Hampton) be instructed to invoke the action of the Conference as adopted on July 18, 1963.

Elected Rev. Thomas Hampton as treasurer of the fund for legal assist-It was voted to call this fund the Tennessee Conference Legal ance. Fund.

May 23, 1964: Approved the buying of the church in Mount Pleasant by the Rockdale Church. Agreed that the Conference continue to carry the note on the Rockdale church and tha the church be reminded of this note. Voted to pay insurance on the Johnson City property. Appointed the executive committee to get help for conference session. Ask the churches to give the same as last year for conference entertainment. Elected a committee on Nominations as follows: Thomas Hampton, Chairman; Earl Hurley, Charles Haire, A. L. Kight, Robert Lands. Discussed the notice of the Archwood Wesleyan Methodist Church that they had decided to withdraw from the Conference and instructed the Conference President of what to do. Authorized calling of the Annual Meeting of the Conference Corporation. The Board recommends that in view of the fact that Michael Houser, Conference Trustee has refused to carry out his assigned duties as Trustee that his office be declared vacant and another trustee be elected to fill out the unexpired term. Board voted to ask Rev. Edward Schade to resign from the Conference Superannuate Pensinn Treasurers office for what the Board feels was good and just reasons.

June 9, 1964: Voted to buy property on Island Home Pike for \$7,500 and to start a new work. Authorized Incorporation of the South Knoxville Wesleyan Tabernacle with A. L. Kight, Thomas Hampton, Carl Johnson, Charles Hiare and D. P. Denton as Incorporators. Authorized the Pioneer Pardner Treasurer to pay a years payment on the South Knoxville Wesleyan Tabernacle. Board voted to go on record as opposing the action of the Board of Stewards of Stair Avenue Wesleyan Mehhodist Church of voting to notpay the pastors salary. Conference Board of Managers voted if the Archwood Church did not reply by June 17, 1964 agreeing to meet with a Committee appointed by the Board, that we accept their withdrawal fom the Conference.

June 22, 1964: Voted to file charges against the following churches and ministers: Knoxville First Wesleyan Methodist Church, Nashville First Wesleyan Methodist Church, Rev. N. C. Hoggle, and Rev. Edward Schade. Charles Haire, D. P. Denton, C. D. Reynolds, and Carl Johnson were appointed as a Committee to file charges in behalf of the Conference Board of Managers.

July 13, 1964: Conference Board of Managers appointed Rev. S.D. Herron and/or Rev. Earl Snider to convene Conference Session if the President or Vice-President cannot do so.

REPORT III

CAMP MEETING ASSOCIATION

The Annual business meeting of the Tennessee Wesleyan Methodist Camp Meeting Association convened at the Camp Ground July 11, 1964. Meeting was called to order by the President, D. P. Denton. Rev.Earl Hurley led in prayer. Roll was called with 65 members present. Set the bar as the two sections on left side of tabernacle. President's report was read and adopted with a rising vote of thanks for the good work he has done. (Report No.1) Camp Meeting Boards report was read and approved. (Report No.2) Camp Treasurer's report was read and approved. (Report No.3)

The following motion was made and unanimously adopted: "Since the Camp Association authorized the Camp Board to study the possibility and advisability of incorporating the Camp Association as an entity and since the Camp Board after some two years of study and discussion felt that the Association should be incorporated and since the Association by its vote had given the Camp Board the authority to incorporate if it felt it was advisable, and since such incorporating was accomplished during the past year, and since this calls for some minor changes in our consititution and by-laws, and since the Camp Board, by the present constitution, is given original jurisdiction over all matters of Camp business with the specific provision that it takes a two thirds vote of the Association to overrule any action of the Board; therefore, be it resolved that the Camp Meeting Board be authorized to study the constitution and to make whatever changes are hade necessary and topresent the new constitution in printed form to the next meeting of the Association." The following motion was presented and unanimously adopted: "Since the Camp Association is now incorporated, and since the laws governing incorporations require that the officers be elected by the incorporation and since heretofore the president of this Camp Association has held his office by virtue of his office in the Tennessee Conference and was not elected by the Camp Association, therefore, be it resolved that the Camp Association president shall be elected by this Association in the same manner as the other officers. " The following motion was presented and unanimously adopted: "Inasmuch as the rules of the Camp Association as adopted by the Camp Board several years ago and approved by the Association state that, 'Those who sanction or watch television shall not participate in the services and since there is a growing pressure on the part of some, and a definite threat from some quarters to force television lovers onto the platform in spite of the opposition of the Camp and Conference leadership; therefore, be it resolved that this Session of the Tennessee Wesleyan Camp Association renew its stand on this matter, and restate its intention to maintain its rule against anyone appearing on the platform who endorses, owns or watches television and the chairman shall be authorized to question any whom he thinks should be questioned. Be it further resolved that it is the opinion of this Association that anyone who is guilty of owning, watching or endorsing television who seeks to force themselves onto the platform over the protest of the Camp and Conference leaders will be guilty of criminal trespass, and should be dealt with as such." Rev. Earl Snider and Rev. George Bross were appointed tellers. following were elected officers of the Camp Meeting Association: President - D. P. Denton; First Vice-President - Charles Haire; Second Vice-President - Douglas Heffner; Third Vice-President -Charles Bradley; Fourth Vice-President - Glen Johnson; Secretary, -Carl Johnson; Treasurer - Paul Cox; Membership Chairman - Thomas Hampton. Appointed the district chairmen of the Youth and the church as the membership committee. Adjourned. Elected Thomas Hampton Trustee, term to expire in 1967.

REPORT NO.1 - President of the Tennessee Wesleyan Camp Association July 11, 1964

We are happy to report to you that this has been an exceptionally good year for the Tennessee Wesleyan Camp Association. There have been no outstanding building projects under taken, and no tremendous accomp-

lishments in the way of enlargement, but many things have been done that has improved the physical properties of the Camp, and helped to make it possible for God to work in our midst.

The improvements on the kitchen and dining hall have continued until we now have one of the prettiest, cleanest and best arranged dining halls that we have ever seen on a camp ground. Thanks to the W.M.S. for their financial help on this and to the men who have worked so faithfully. Also, our thanks to those who have helped to secure equipment, including one city school system which gave us sinks and steam table. When all of this is put into operation (we hope by next

year) we will have an unusual camp kitchen.

Some more sleeping rooms have been prepared in the shelter house giving us now 14 sleeping rooms in that building, plus the concession stand and a storage room. When the proposed registrars building is completed, wewill have space for 3 more sleeping rroms in that building, making a total of 16 rooms there. We now have a total of 33 private rooms on the grounds besides the two open dormitories. additional space in the shelter house was made available by the fact that the book room is now located in a trailor house belonging to the Evangelist of Truth.

Some work has been done on the bath house, but these facilities continue to be a problem, and before another Camp, we feel that this

entire set up should be reworked or completely overhauled.

The approval of the Association has already been placed upon the building of the registrars building, and also of more building for sleeping rooms. While no work has been done on these projects, due to the pressure of other work that was more necessary, they have not been forgotten, and unless the Association wishes to change the plans, I feel sure that one or more buildings will be erected

this year.

I would like to pay especial tribute to the men and women who have taken on much of the load of the Camp work. I do not know what we would have done this year if some of the brethern had not volunteered to take over some of the responsibility. I am very conscious of the fact that I am not physically able to carry the load that I once carried and that with our Camp growing, and with God blessing it in such a marvelous way, there must be more and more of the work that will be taken over by those who can be depended upon to do their jobs without having to rely on the President to do it for them. Our biggest need through the years has been for men who would take a responsibility and carry it out by themselves. The lack of such men has been our biggest hindrance. So it is with sincerest thanks to God that I watch some of the brethren move into places of responsibility and take on the work of the Camp and Conference. May God. richly bless each of you who are helping to carry the load. The Board has been excellent to work with during the year, and we thank them for every bit of cooperation they have given in the work. Finally, our thanks to you who compose this Association. If it was not for those who stand by the camp could not operate. God bless you for your faithfulness and increase your number.

REPORT OF WESLEYAN TRAINING ASSOCIATION

The first Annual Wesleyan Training Association Convention was held at the Tennessee Conference Campground on July 13, 1964.

The Convention convened at 9 A.M. with Robert Lands, President,

presiding.

Rev. Jackie Williams led in the singing of two verses of "I've Anchored in Jesus." Rev. Earl Hurley spoke briefly from Ecclesiastes 12:1. A season of prayer followed, led by Rev. J. R. Hanson.

The roll was called with six officers, twelve delegates, seven local presidents, and eight pastors responding. Motion carried to pay \$50 toward the expense of printing the
Annual Conference Minutes.

Motion carried to leave all unfinished business in the hands of the Administrative Committee.

Rev. J. R. McElwain was seated s honorary delegate for Johnson City.

Motion carried that local treasurer's books should close June 30 and money be sent to the conference treasurer by July 5.

Adjourned to the Call of the Chair. Reconvened at 1:30 P.M.
Jackie Williams led in singing two verses of "Redeemed". Charles
Bradley led in prayer. Roll was called with 31 members present.

The following change in the Constitution was adopted: Local Constitution, Article III, Item 6 - deleting the words "following the annual convention" and adding "preceding the election of officers".

Convention paused for special prayer in behalf of C. J. Goodspeed.

The following changes in the Constitution were adopted: Locan Constitution, Article IV, Item 2 - deleting the word "following" and inserting word of deleting the word "immediately" and inserting "July 1". Item 4 changed to read as follows with present Item 4 changed to Item 5: "In the case of mission churches, the requirements of local church membership shall be waived, and officers may be elected, provided that they meet all other requirements for active membership in the Wesleyan Training Association, have signed the pledge cards for active membership, and are approved by the pastor and the President of the Tennessee Annual Conference. This does not affect conference officers who must be members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church."

Orders of the Day -- Randall McElwain and William Snider were appointed distributing tellers. Robbie Harwell and Rev. Earl Hurley were appointed counting tellers. Conference WTA officers were

The following changes in the Constitution were adopted: Annual Convention Constitution, Article II, Item 2 - the word "outgoing" inserted before "presidents of local associations." Item 4 added to Article II - "Churches or missions having no local organization shall be privileged to send one honorary delegate to the Annual Wesleyan Training Association Convention. Item 5 added to Article II - "In all voting, votes shallbe counted on the basis of those Convention members who are present and voting." Artice IV - Budget- inserted and present Articles IV, V, VI, VII, and VIII renumbered to correspond "The Conference Budget shall be assessed on the basis of \$1 per active member. Of this assessment 25¢ shall be set aside for mission work. The disbursement of this Mission Fund shall be under the direction of the Administrative Committee. Annual Convention By-Laws - Artice IV-the words "present and voting" added at the end of the first sentence. Artice II, Item 1 - the word "He" changed to "The President"; Item 3-the word "he" changed to "the Secretary".

Motion carried that the treasurer should preparequarterly

remittance blanks for locals to use in remitting funds.

The following change in the Constitution was adopted: Local By-Laws - Add Item 3 to read, "It is recommended that where a local president is not re-elected, the incoming president may be elected as delegates".

Motion carried that the amount of the youth project be \$500.

Motion carried that the secretary be authorized to approve the

A devotional time together opened the session. Sister Ruth Rice led us in singing "Throw Out the Lifeline" and prayer was led by Sister Pearl Crapo, missionary on furlough from Haiti. The devotional message was given by our General WMS President, Mrs. Helen Stark. She used as a basis for her message Acts 9:36-42, giving us inspiring thoughts of one woman, Dorcas, who gave not only of her means but of herself to help those who needed help. She, a good example for us, let her light shine so God got glory from her life, then also out of the miracle of raising her from the dead. We were challenged to do our best -- to "live and witness", to help "Prepare the King's Highway".

Business meeting was called to order by the President, Pearl Grow, who presided throughout the day. 22 delegates and presidents were seated at the first roll call. A total of 37 ladies were present. Orders of the Day were set for 11 A. M.

Miss Pearl Crapo brought greetings from Haiti, with some special prayer requests. Mrs. Stark spoke to us on the General work. Reported that the appeal for linens for Sierre Leone received excellent response. Also, the response to the appeal for "Haiti Relief" and the "White Christmas" offering were gratifying. She presented the need for extra funds for transportation to and from the fields, for those on furlough and new ones going out. She emphasized the importance of keeping our Wesleyan Missionary subscriptions up-to-date and sending reports regularly to the Conference Solicitor. She explained thoroughly the Plan of Work for each society, emphasizing the importance of a monthly public prayer meeting with missionary emphasis to interst the whole church in missions, challenging us again and again to do our best for Him, and to win lost souls at home.

Vice-President, Mrs. Orbie Denton, took the Chair. Mrs. Pearl Grow, President, read her report, which was adopted with rising vote of thanks.
