JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

The Lockport Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection (or Church) of America convened for its Sixty-first Annual Session in the Wesleyan Methodist Church at Levant, N. Y., April 5, 1922, at 9 A. M.

On the evening previous the opening sermon was preached by Rev. James A. Bain.

The meeting was called to order by the President, and the devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. J. R. Babcock.

The Roll was called.

The Committee on Temporary Organization submitted its report, which was considered item by item and adopted as a whole. See Report No. 1.

The Bar of Conference was made to include the first five rows of seats across the body of the Church.

The time fixed for the meetings to begin and close is as follows: Morning meetings to begin at 8:30 and to close at 11:30. The afternoon meetings to begin at 1:30 and to close by vote of Conference.

A reconsideration of the time to begin the afternoon service was moved, but after some discussion of the subject the time was left as formerly stated, 1:30.

Rev. Walter Readette resigned from his position on the Committee on Statistics. His resignation was accepted and the matter of filling the vacancy was referred to the Committee on Temporary Organization.

The following persons were introduced to Conference and made appropriate remarks: Rev. F. A. Butterfield, Connectional Editor and Representative; President J. S. Luckey, of Houghton Seminary; Mrs. Mary Lane Clarke, General Superintendent of the Y. M. W. B.; Kev. I. A. Grise, of the Bradford Mission; Rev. J. R. Pitt, Pastor at Houghton, N. Y.

Mr. Henry R. Barnett, Treasurer of the Board of Directors of Bradford Rescue Home, submitted his report which was referred to the Auditing Committee. See Report No. 2.

All special orders were referred to the Committee on Religious Services.

The election of Conference officers was made the Order of

the Day for Thursday morning immediately following devotional exercises.

After moving a reconsideration of Item 1 of the Report of the Committee on Temporary Organization the name of Rev. L. C. Mattoon was substituted for that of Rev. J. H. Woodhouse.

A communication was read from each of the following persons: Rev. W. A. Hazelett and Rev. James and Laura Elliott, and the Secretary was instructed to convey to them the greetings of the Conference.

Adjourned subject to the call of the Chair.

First Day, Afternoon Session, April 5th.

The meeting was called to order by the President and the devotional exercises were conducted by President J. S. Luckey.

The Roll was called and the minutes were read and approved.

On motion John H. Reed was seated in Conference as a delegate from the Elliott Charge.

The Conference President submitted his report, which was received and the parts that needed Conference action considered item by item.

By Conference action the item referring to the Short Tract Church was passed over until the Conference is more fully informed relative to the titles and the disposition of the property.

The item relating to the Church at Napoli was referred to the Conference Board of Trustees, who were empowered to act.

The item relating to the creation of a Budget for aggressive evangelism was referred to the Committee on Evangelism.

The report was finally adopted as amended. See Report No. 3. Rev. J. R. Babcock and Rev. H. J. Bullock were elected a Committee on Memorials.

The following names were called and their characters passed: A. O. Northrup, W. A. Backus, J. R. Babcock, A. C. Dow, H. J. Bullock, Charles Sicard, G. H. Clarke, H. H. Schoonover.

The Conference tendered a vote of appreciation to the corps of workers who rendered such satisfactory service at North Main Street Extension, Jamestown, in the organization of a class of twenty-three members.

The request of Rev. A. C. Dow to retain his membership in the Lockport Conference, yet to continue in active service in the M. E. Church until October 8, 1922, was referred to the Committee on Pastoral Relations.

A request from H. J. Bullock to continue in active service in the Champlain Conference and yet retain his membership in the Lockport Conference, was also referred to the Committee on Pastoral Relations.

A communication from Rev. C. I. Armstrong was read and referred to the Committee on Pastoral Relations.

The Secretary submitted a report on receipts and disbursements of money received on the purchase of a Conference Tent. The report was referred to the Auditing Committee. See Report No. 4.

A Resolution from the Ministerial Institute held at Houghton, N. Y., September 27th to October 2nd, was referred for consideration to a Committee composed of the following persons: H. J. Bullock, J. R. Pitt, L. C. Mattoon. See Report No. 5.

Voted that the Committee on Religious Services be authorized to fix a time for an order of the day to consider important Conference problems.

On motion Mrs. P. S. Bowen was elected Chairman of the Committee on Statistics. She was also permitted to choose her own assistant.

Adjourned on motion, the benediction being pronounced by Rev. J. R. Pitt.

Morning Meeting-Thursday, April 6, 1922.

The meeting was called to order by the President, and the devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. A. C. Dow.

The roll was called and the minutes were read and approved.

The time for the orders of the day having arrived, the Conference proceeded with the election of Conference Officers. The balloting resulted as follows:

On the first ballot for Conference President, Rev. W. W. Rolf received 21 of 33 votes cast and was declared elected.

On the first ballot for Vice-President Rev. James A. Bain rereceived 24 of 33 votes cast and was declared elected.

On the first ballot for Secretary, Rev. Francis B. Markell, received 32 of 33 votes cast and was declared elected.

The Secretary was then permitted to nominate his own Assistant. The Conference endorsed the nomination and Rev. J. R. Pitt was declared elected Assistant Secretary.

On the first ballot for Treasurer, Rev. G. H. Clarke received 32 of 33 votes cast and was declared elected.

On first ballot for Sunday School Secretary, Rev. N. R. Shaffer received 20 of 33 votes cast and was declared elected.

Rev. A. O. Northrup was elected Tithing Secretary by acclamation.

On first ballot for Ministerial Trustee, Charles Sicard received

20 out of 32 votes cast and was declared elected. Balloting was as follows: Charles Sicard, 20; James A. Bain, 6; Wallace W. Rolf, 2; Orval H. Howard, 1; George H. Clarke, 3.

On first ballot for second Ministerial Trustee, James A. Bain received 26 or 32 votes cast and was declared elected. The following is the record of the balloting: James A. Bain, 26; Joseph R. Pitt, 1; John R. Babcock, 1; George H. Clarke, 1; Wallace W. Rolf, 3.

On the ballot for Lay Trustee, Orval H. Howard received 19 of 33 votes cast and was declared elected. Orval Howard, 19; (7. W. Hall, 14.

Rev. Crill, of the Free Methodist Church, Jamestown, was introduced to Conference.

The Committee on Temporary Organization, to whom was referred the nomination of Standing Committees, submitted its report, which was considered item by item, and after a few changes, was adopted. See Report No. 6.

Item 1 of the report relating to the Advisory Board was passed over and the President was given the privilege of making his own nominations.

The Conference President was authorized to appoint a suitable person to preach the Conference sermon.

The Committee on Special Services presented the following orders:

That the Conference hear Rev. F. A. Butterfield on Connectional Interests at 2:30 P. M. Thursday, and President J. S. Luckey on the Educational Interests at 10 A. M. Friday. Report was adopted.

The matter of presenting the Sunday School Interests was referred to the Committee on Special Services with the request that Rev. J. A. Bain be made the chief speaker.

The following names were called and their characters passed: L. C. Mattoon, J. R. Pitt, A. J. Taylor.

It was made the Orders of the Day to hear Rev. James A. Bain, Cattaraugus County Sunday School Superintendent, on Sunday School Interests immediately following the presentation of Connectional Interests, Thursday afternoon.

The annual report of the Bethesda Rescue Home as submitted by Miss Anna Freeman, Matron, was referred to the Auditing Committee. See Report No. 7.

Adjourned by limitation of time, the benediction being received from Rev. W. A. Backus.

Afternoon Session-April 6, 1922.

The meeting was called to order by the President, and the devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. H. H. Schoonover.

The roll was called and the minutes read and approved as corrected.

Rev. W. A. Backus was excused from Conference.

A partial report submitted by the Committee on Itineracy and Orders was adopted. See Report No. 8.

On motion Mrs. P. S. Bowen was relieved from her position on the Auditing Committee and the name of Walter Readette was substituted.

The following names were called and their characters passed: G. E. Bathurst, Francis B. Markell, Walter Readette, J. A. Bain.

The time for the Orders of the Day having arrived, Rev. F. A. Butterfield presented the Connectional Interests.

A recess was taken for ten minutes, after which the President called the Conference to order, and the Sunday School Interests were presented by Rev. J. A. Bain, Rev. A. O. Northrup, and Mrs. Rachel Angove.

A letter of greetings was read from the Houghton Sunday School. Adjourned, the benediction being pronounced by Rev. J. R. Pitt.

Morning Session-April 7, 1922.

The meeting was called to order by the President and the devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. George Shultz.

The roll was called and the minutes were read and approved.

On motion all visiting friends who were introduced to Conference were given an honorary seat within the Bar of Conference.

Rev. George Shultz, a pastor in the Allegheny Conference, was introduced to Conference and made a few remarks.

Voted that the membership of the Machias, Napoli, East Aurora and Short Tract Appointments be retained and their financial reports be secured from the Conference Treasurer.

The Auditing Committee having O. K.'d the following reports submitted them to Conference:

The Secretary's report on receipts and disbursements of moneys received on Conference Tent.

The report of the Treasurer of the Board of Directors of Bethesda Rescue Home as submitted by H. R. Barnett.

The Annual Report of Bethesda Home as presented by Miss Anna Freeman.

The President's financial report.

The reports were adopted.

The name of J. H. Woodhouse was called and his character passed.

By Conference action Rev. J. H. Woodhouse was permitted to add \$19.00 to his Missionary Budget Report upon the strength of his promise to provide for the deficit.

The question relating to the credentials of Mina Mann was referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

The time for the Orders of the Day having arrived, the Educational Interests were presented by President Luckey.

The meeting was then called to order by the President and the following motion made:

That the Lockport Conference approve the effort that is being put forward in securing a Charter for Houghton Seminary, and that President Luckey be invited to continue his campaign in securing said charter.

Adjourned by limitation of time, Rev. Charles Sicard pronouncing the benediction.

Afternoon Meeting-Friday, April 7, 1922.

The meeting was called to order by the President, and the devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. I. A. Grise.

The roll was called and the minutes read, corrected and approved.

After some discussion on the last motion of the morning meeting, it was moved that when we vote on the question we vote by ballot. The motion was carried.

By vote of 29 to 4 the Conference approved the effort being put forward to secure a charter for Houghton Seminary, and President Luckey was invited to continue his campaign in securing said charter.

It was made the Orders of the Day for Saturday at 2:30 to discuss important Conference problems.

Rev. Harry Bullock resigned from his position on the Committee on Traveling Presidency and Rev. J. A. Bain was elected to fill the vacancy.

The Tithing Secretary submitted his report, which was adopted. See Report No. 9.

On motion, the recommendation of A. O. Northrup relative to the Cameron property was referred to the Committee on Pastoral Relations.

Communications were read from the following persons and their characters were passed: C. E. Woodhead, B. S. Laughlin, C. W. Smith, N. R. Shaffer.

The Secretary read the Statistical Reports from the following charges: Ashwood, Allegany.

Adjourned for Committee work.

Morning Meeting-Saturday, April 8, 1922.

The meeting was called to order by the President, and the devotional exercises were conducted by Francis B. Markell.

The roll was called and the minutes were read and approved.

A Resolution relative to the Lynndon Park Church was read and adopted. See Report No. 10.

By Conference action the name of E. C. Isbell was added to the Committee on Pastoral Relations.

A Resolution from the Houghton Church was read by J. R. Fitt, in which the Houghton Church extended an invitation to the General Conference to hold its next quadrennial session at Houghton, and a request was made that the Lockport Conference be memorialized to that effect. Report adopted.

It was moved that the Lockport Conference co-operate with Houghton Church in extending an invitation to the General Conference to hold its next quadrennial session at Houghton, and if the invitation be accepted the Lockport Conference agrees to pay toward the entertainment of the Conference a sum equal to the difference between the expenses of sending their delegates to Fairmount or to Houghton. Motion was carried.

The Conference President nominated Ernest R. Houghton and Francis B. Markell as his Advisory Board. The nominations were approved by Conference.

The Committee on Traveling Presidency submitted its report, which was considered item by item, and after substituting another item for item 1, the report was adopted. See Report No. 12.

The Committee on Evangelism, to whom was referred the President's recommendation relative to the creation of a Budget for aggressive evangelism, to be known as the Conference Mission Fund, submitted its report, and after some discussion the following motion was substituted:

That the Conference Budget be raised to \$3.00 per member and that the Sunday Schools be requested to set aside the collection of the first Sunday of each month to count toward this fund. Carried by a vote of 12 to 7.

Adjourned, the benediction being received from Harry J. Bullock.

Afternoon Session, Saturday, April 8, 1922.

The meeting was called to order by the president and the devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. A. C. Northrup.

The roll was called and the minutes read and approved.

The report of the Conference treasurer was read and adopted. See report No. 13.

The money paid into the treasury as Undivided Budget was

transferred to the Conference Budget.

A motion to rescind the conference action in the adoption of the report of the Committee on Traveling Presidency was lost.

The report of the Committee on Budget was read and adopted.

See Report No. 14.

Recommended by the treasurer that the money paid into the treasury as undivided missions, be divided equally between Home and Foreign Missions. Recommendation adopted.

The report of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders was read

and adopted. See Report No. 15.

Adjourned for committee work subject to the call of the chair.

The Conference was called to order by the president after which the report of the Committee on Statistics was read and adopted. See Report No. 16.

The recommendations of the Board of Trustees as submitted

by H. J. Bullock were adopted. See Report No. 17.

Rev. A. C. Dow was excused from Conference.

Rev. Charles Sicard was elected first member on the committee to investigate the purchasing of the Arcade building in Bradford for Church purposes. E. B. Houghton elected second member and Manley Crowell third and last member.

Voted that when we adjourn we adjourn subject to the call

of the chair.

The secretary of the Board of Trustees submitted his report which was considered item by item and adopted as a whole. See Report No. 18.

Adjourned, Rev. G. H. Clarke pronouncing the benediction.

The Conference was called to order by the president at 9:35.

The committee to whom was referred the memorial from the Ministerial Institute held at Houghton, referred the report back to the Conference and upon motion the Conference decided not to hold a Ministerial Institute this year, and the secretary was instructed to write a letter to the secretaries of the other Conferences informing them of this decision.

The report of the Committee on Thanks was read and adopted.

See Report No. 19.

The report of the Board of Trustees was read and adopted. See Report No. 20.

The Committee on Special Services made a partial report announcing the time for a memorial service one half hour before the regular Sunday evening services.

The Committee on Pastoral Relations submitted its report. See Report No. 21. It was moved as an amendment to the item relating to the supply for Olean church that the name of Walter Readette be substituted for that of Francis B. Markell. After some discussion of the topic the Conference resolved itself into a Committee of the Whole to secure some facts relative to the situation. After the presentation of much information, a vote was taken and the amendment was lost by a vote of 12 to 5. The report was then referred to the church at Olean for their approval.

The name of Walter Readette was placed on the list of General Evangelists.

The report of the Committee on Post Office Addresses was presented and adopted. See Report No. 22.

Adjourned, subject to the call of the chair.

Monday Morning, April 10, 1922.

The meeting was called to order by the president, and the devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. G. H. Clarke.

The roll was called and the minutes were read and approved.

The secretary was authorized to order 200 copies of the minutes and after reserving 25 copies for Conference work to distribute the balance pro rata among the charges.

The question of a location for holding the next Annual Conference was left in the hands of the Conference President and his Advisory Board.

By Conference action the work on Main St., Jamestown, is to be recognized as a Wesleyan Mission with Rev. C. P. Munson in charge, working under the direction of the Missionary Board.

The matter relating to the Napoli church and the Short Tract property was placed in the hands of the Board of Trustees who are empowered to act and to dispose of the property as they shall deem advisable.

Rev. J. R. Pitt was elected a member of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

The decision of the Conference relative to the examination papers for the licentiates is that they are to be sent to some accredited person on the licentiate's charge or to the nearest elder.

The minutes were read and approved.

Adjourned on motion, Rev. W. A. Backus pronouncing the benediction.

Report No. 3.-President's Report.

With gratitude to God for His manifest presence and blessing in the work of the past year, and the loyal support of the brethren throughout the Conference, we are permitted to report as follows:

It has pleased the Lord to call from labor on earth to his final reward since we last met in Annual Conference, Elder N. F. Robb.

- 1. We have received during the year, Elder I. A. Grise by letter of transfer from the Allegheny Conference; and Elder J. R. Pitt by letter of transfer from the Canada Conference.
- 2. Granted Authorization Papers to the following persons: A. O. Northrup, J. A. Mann, H. H. Schoonover.
 - 3. Granted letter of standing to Elder H. R. LaVere.
- 4. Organized a class of twenty-two members at North Main Street Extension, Jamestown, and appointed Elder W. A. Backus pastor in charge.
- 5. On November 19th, we opened up a Mission on Fairmount Avenue, Jamestown, with the help of Brother Backus and Brother Babcock. The Lord blessed our labors by giving us a few souls.

February 1st the hall was rented for other purposes, after which we secured a location on Main Street and appointed C. P. Munson, who is a member of the North Main Street Class, as pastor in charge.

Believing there is a great opportunity for us in Jamestown, we trust this session of Conference will take some definite steps at this time to help and to encourage the same.

- 6. Charges in care of the President:
- (a) Bradford.—We appointed Elder I. A. Grise to this charge.
- (b) Short Tract.—Having become extinct as an organized Church, we recommend that it be stricken from the list of charges.
- (c) Napoli.—We have visited this work considerably through the year, preached there several times, with but few in attendance. With only three or four resident members and practically no interest shown by the people of the community, and the Conference already at an expense of thirty-three dollars for repairs on the church during the past year, we recommend that this church be sold and the proceeds used to help in building a Church in Jamestown.
- (d) Machias.—There have been no services held at this place during the past year, except for a few weeks when the Methodists, with the consent of the Wesleyans, used the Church while the Methodist Church was being repaired. Recently I have had handed me one hundred and fifty dollars which we still hold, to help in the expenses of a campaign in that place as soon as it can be arranged for.
- (e) Delevan.—The property there having been sold, we recommend that it be stricken from the list of charges.
- 7. Apponted L. C. Mattoon, G. H. Clarke, and E. B. Houghton as a Committee on Temporary Organization.
- 8. Appointed Clayton F. Ball and Harry Morley members of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

- 2. We find, further, that within five (5) days after signing the confession a letter was sent by her retracting the confession. (See letter on file.)

We recommend:

- 1. That the action of our President and Vice-President, in the settlement of this case at the General Conference, be ratified.
- 2. In view of the above said letter of retraction, making null and void the terms of the agreement, that the confession be not accepted and the President of the Allegheny Conference be notified that these Churches, as per decision of the General Conference, are within the jurisdiction of the Lockport Conference until the terms of the contract are fully met.

Report No. 14.-Budget Report.

- 1. The part of the Budget for Education is \$1046.00, and all money paid for current expenses of Houghton Seminary, all money paid on Educational Pledges for Houghton Seminary, and all interest (but not principal) paid on Educational Notes for Houghton Seminary, and all money raised on Educational Day by the Y. M. W. B. may count toward this Budget.
- 2. The part of the Budget for Home and Foreign Missions is \$2,493.00, and all money paid for current expenses for Home and Foreign Missions, all money appropriated for this purpose by the W. H. & F. M. Society, and all money paid by the Y. M. W. B. may count toward this Budget.
- 3. We recommend that the part of the Budget for Conference be \$2,493.00, that nothing but cash may count toward this Budget, and that the Sunday Schools shall be requested to set aside the collection on the first Sunday of each month toward this Budget.
- 4. We recommend that the charges raise all three parts of the Budget as a whole; that for all money not paid to the Conference Treasurer, a duplicate receipt shall be given, which receipt shall be given to the Conference Treasurer. That it shall be optional with each Charge to divide this total Budget or to pay it over undivided, and that the undivided parts must be paid to the Conference Treasurer.
- 5. If a charge divide its total Budget, we recommend that this rule be followed: All money designated by the doner shall be so distributed that, as far as possible, each fund, including the sums designated for that fund, shall have the same per cent. of its apportionment. This rule shall apply until each fund is complete. After that the charges shall divide as it sees fit.
- 6. We recommend that the Conference Treasurer be instructed to remit to the Connectional Treasurer at least quarterly all money received definitely for education, or definitely for Missionary work. but that the Undivided Budget may be retained until it is evident where it will be needed to maintain a balance between the benevolences and should be distributed so as to maintain this balance.
- 7. We recommend that no charge shall receive credit on its Budget except for cash, or receipts sent to the Conference Treasurer.
- 8. We recommend that each pastor shall include in his statistical report these items: Total Budget Assigned, Total Budget Raised; that the second item shall not be filled in until the Pastor has settled with the Conference Treasurer, and that the account placed in this second item shall be the amount reported to the Pastor by the Conference Treasurer.

9. We recommend that the Conference authorize each Pastor to hand the Budget Committee at the next Annual Conference a list of the members of his charge under sixteen years of age, provided he declares that he knows personally each one on the list is under sixteen. This list shall be deducted from the number determining Eudget apportionment on that Charge.
