STANDING RULES OF THE ILLINOIS CONFERENCE OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH OF AMERICA

- I. Conference President. Resolved, 1) that the Conference President be required, authorized and appointed to travel the Conference as President, having general supervision of the spiritual interests and benevolences thereof, helding at least one service at each church during the year under such date as he may announce in advance;
- 2) That he shall raise funds to meet the demands of the Conference work, assisted by the pastors, and he shall receive contributions for church extension, education and Superannuated Ministers, where there are no pastors;
- 3) That he shall have general supervision of the church property, and shall inquire into the titles of the same to see that no property is loosely held, and shall look after the rental of Conference property, and see that the rent is turned into the treasury, and he shall investigate the possibility and feasibility of the sale of property not in use, and report his findings to the Board of Trustees and to the next annual conference:
 - 4) That he shall be authorized to grant letters to disbanded classes;
- 5) That he shall be required to write non-resident members of Conference asking them, in case they cannot attend, to write the conference a letter of greating and state the condition of their religious experience;
- 6) That he shall devote as much time as possible and as occasion may afford in evangelistic and other meetings in the Conference;
- 7) That he may engage such help from time to time as may be available, and as he may consider properly qualified to assist in holding evangelistic and quarterly meetings, such help to be remunerated from the Conference Church Extension Fund;
 - 8) That he shall represent the Conference at the annual conventions of the National
- Holiness Association and the National Association of Evangelicals, or appoint an alternate;

 9) That his name shall be placed in nomination for the office of first ministorial delegate to General Conference and for Illinois nominee to the Local Board of Trustess of Marion College:
- II. <u>Trustees</u>. 1) <u>Authorization</u>. Resolved, that the duly-elected and qualified Trustees of the Illinois Conference are hereby authorized and directed to sign for the purchase, sale, mortgaging and conveyance of real estate recommended by the Annual Conference, or, during the interim between the sessions of Annual Conference, by the Conference Board of Church Extension, which is the Board of Managers of the Illinois Conference. All such action or actions of the Trustees in compliance with the recommendations of the Conference Board of Church Extension shall be deemed to be legal and binding upon the Illinois Conference, and of as full force and effect as they would have been if such actions on the part of the Trustees had been specially authorized by the Annual Conference.
 - 2) Organization. The Conference President, by virtue of his office and supervisory uties, shall be a member of this Board and its president.
- duties, shall be a member of this Board and its president.

 3) <u>Annual Report</u>. Resolved, that the Trustees present to Conference an <u>annual report of official acts</u> and of assets and liabilities of the Illinois Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, an Illinois corporation.
- III. Board of Managers (Conference Board of Church Extension) 1) Membership. Ecselved, (a) that the Illinois Conference Board of Church Extension be composed of nine members, five of which shall be ministers and four laymen; that in said number the Conference Trustees shall be included as members ex-officia; (b) that the Conference President shall be the chairman of this board.
- 2) <u>Duties</u>, Resolved, (a) That the Conference Board of Church Extension shall be the Board of Managers of the Illinois Conference;
- (b) That the Conference Board of Church Extension is hereby authorised to pay out all monies from the Conference Church Extension Fund, and during the interim between Conference sessions to act as a Committee on Finance:
- (c) That the Conference Board of Church Extension act as the Conference Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location.
- IV. Annual Conference. 1) Date. Resolved that the annual conference session begin on the first Thursday after July 27, at 1:30 p.m., and close the following Saturday night; that Camp Meeting begin on the following Sunday and continue for eight days, including two Sundays
- 2) Fiscal Year, Resolved that the Conference Fiscal Year close July 15th; that each local church fiscal year close June 30th.
- 3) Budget Items. Resolved that all Treasurers shall mark receipts "Budget" or "Not Budget."
 4) Committee on Statistics. Resolved, that a Standing Committee on Statistics be elected, consisting of the Conference Statistical Secretary, the Conference Treasurer, two other ministerial and one lay member; that two lay members be elected at the opening of annual conference.
- 5) Statistical Report. Resolved, that no remittances postmarked later than July 5th shall apply on the church statistical report; that by July 15th each pastor shall submit to the chairman of the Statistical Committee his budget check sheet with receipts covering same, and his statistical blank completed except for the budget section; and that by July 15th the Pengion Fund Treasurer shall submit an assessment and receipt check list to the Statistical Committee; that the Committee full in on the statistical blanks the budget

items, both assigned and raised; that other items which are obviously incorrect be checked with the pastor.

6) Audit. Resolved, that a competent auditor shall be appointed each year by the Com-

mittee on Finance to audit the books of the Conference.

- 7) Sunday Schools. Resolved, that each additional Sunday School under the pastoral oversight of a Wesleyan Mathodist pastor shall be reported on a separate annual statistical report blank, provided each Sunday School has been recognized by the Conference Board of Church Extenstion.
- 8) Board of Superannuate Ministers' Aid. Resolved, that the Board of Superannuate Ministers! Aid be composed of three members, each elected by the Conference for a three year term of office, the terms to expire in successive years.

9) Orders of the Day Committee. Resolved, that the President, Vice President and Secre-

tary of Conference shall constitute the Orders of the Day Committee.

10) Leave. Resolved, that no member shall leave Conference session without permission of the President; that no ministerial member shall without special permission leave Camp after the annual meetings until all responsibilities of the Conference are discharged, including camp clean-up.

11) Place of Meeting. Resolved, that the Camp Meeting Committee shall determine the place of meeting of each Conference session.

12) Conference Officers. Resolved, that the officers be installed during annual conference at a public service announced in advance; office to take effect at the rise of conference.

- 13) Minutes. Resolved, (a) That the Conference President and Secretary constitute a committee to edit and publish the Annual Conference minutes; (b) That the cost of printing the Annual Conference minutes be paid out of the Conference Fund; (c) That the total number of minutes to be printed be ascertained on the basis of family units among the menbership and active constituency, who shall each be mailed a copy.
- 14) N. H. A. and H. A. E. Resolved, that the Illinois Conference maintain a membership in the National Holiness Association and the National Association of Evangelicals.
- V. Camp Meeting. 1) Authorization. Resolved, that there be held an annual Camp Meeting and that it be under the direction of a Camp Meeting Committee elected by the Illinois Conference, and that the Conference President, as chairman, the Conference W. T. President, and the Conference W. H. S. President be members ex-officio of said Camp Meeting Committee.
- 2) Committee Duties. Resolved, (a) That camp grounds and buildings be under the care of the Camp Meeting Committee; (b) That the Camp Meeting Committee have charge of the Camp Meeting Fund and appoint a treasurer to receive all monies and make all authorized disbursements from the same; (c) That the Camp Meeting Committee shall have power to engage workers beyond the present year.

3) Camp Meeting Fund. Resolved, (a) That all pledges and cash received during the sessions of Conference and Camp Meeting be placed in the Camp Meeting Fund unless otherwise designated; (b) That the incidental expenses of the Annual Conference while in session be paid from the Comp Meeting Fund.

VI. Ministers. 1) Pastoral Service Report. Resolved, that each pastor of the Illinois Conference shall report to his quarterly conference each quarter the total of his home calls, hospital calls, pastoral conferences and church business calls, and that the total of these items be reported to Annual Conforence and be included in the annual statistics.

2) Pastors' Support During Conference. Resolved, that it be our plan that all pastors remain on their charges for one Sunday after Annual Conference and Camp Meeting and that the church's financial obligation to the pastor, whether he be leaving the field or not, be extended through that Sunday.

3) Moving Pastors. Resolved, that each charge make provisions for the moving expenses of the incoming paster immediately after the Annual Conference adjourns.

4) Illness or Death, Resolved, that the Conference President be notified by the local church clerk in case of critical illness or death in a minister's home, and that the Presdent shall send cards at once to the other ministers.

5) Minister's Vacation. Resolved that the Conference President and all pasters be given

a two-weeks vacation with pay, including two Sundays,

6) Ministerial Convention. Resolved, that there be held a Ministerial Convention from the third Tuesday evening to the following Thursday afternoon of February each year, Resolved further that the place of meeting and the program presented be left in the hands of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

7) Mandatory Membership in Pension Plan. Resolved, that it shall be the duty of each paster to maintain membership in the Denominational Pension Plan or the Federal Social Security plan. It is urged that all members presently on the rell join the Denominational Pension Plan; membership shall be mandatory upon new members accepting employment in the Illinois Conference after the rise of the 1959 session; it is urged that assistant pastors Join the plan, paying their own assessments, or arranging with their churches to do so. pastor's annual pension report shall be sent to the Conference Pension Treasurer no later than July 15th of each year.

- 8) Payment of Pension Assessments. Resolved, that Pension Fund payments shall be remitted by the churches on an undivided basis. The Conference Pension Fund Treasurer shall prorate such payments to general pension fund budget and to pastoral assessment proportionately so that they will become paid up at the same time. In the case of failure of the church to completely pay the assessment, the pastor will be responsible to make up the arrearch in pastor's assessment so as to retain status in the Plan. In case the church and pastor are unable to fulfil this requirement membership in the Federal Social Security Plan or other adequate retirement plan, may, upon appeal to the Conference Board of Superannuate Ministers' Aid on a year to year basis, be considered as a fulfilment of the requirements of this standing rule.
- VII. <u>Miscellaneous</u>. 1) Conference Paper. Resolved, that the Conference publish a monthly paper called "The Illinois Tidinge"; that the Conference President shall be designated Editor-in-Chief, and that the heads of the Conference auxiliary organisations be designated contributing editors.
- 2) <u>Conference Prayer Interests</u>. Resolved, that the information concerning coming revival meetings and other special prayer needs be published in the conference paper.
- 3) Expenses of Conference Officers, Resolved, that all incidental expenses of all Conference Officers, Committees, Official Boards and helpers shall be paid by the Conference Treasurer when approved by the President.

SPECIAL SERVICES

Conference Educational Service 1:30 p. m., Saturday, August 5, 1962

The Saturday afternoon service was designated by Conference action as Conference Educational Service. Marion College, our area school, was represented by Dr. Woodrow I. Goodman, President of Marion College. He presented the urgent need for greater support of the college financially during these days of seeking regional accreditation. He also spoke about the new Girls Dormitory on which construction is to begin this fall. The Marion College Male Quartet accompanied him and stayed to minister in music over the week-end.

Conference Sunday School Service 9:00 a. m., Sunday, August 12, 1962

The Sunday School hour of the Conference was designated to be the Sunday School service during Camp Heeting. Conference Sunday School Secretary Wendel D. Graker presented the Sunday School interests including awards for achievement. The College Quartet enlivened the hour with their singing and Sunday School enthusiasm ross to a new high.

Conference Ordination Service 10:30 a. m., Sunday, August 12, 1962

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

First Meeting, 1:30 P.M., Thursday, August 2, 1962.

- 1. Opening. The thirteenth annual session of the Illinois Conference of The Wesleyan Methodist Church of America was convened in the main tabernacle at Bowerth Park Camp Ground (Free Methodist), near Belvidere, Illinois, at 1:30 P.M., CDT. August 2, 1962, by Rev. Arthur L. Bray, President of the Conference. Members of the Conference sain the old traditional Methodist Conference by Mr. And Are We Tet Alive, And See Each Other's Face?". Prayer was offered by Dr. Harold K. Sheets, General Superintendant of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America.
- 2. Communion Service. President Bray was assisted in the communion ritual by Dr. H. K. Sheets and Elders Forrest Gearhart, Eay Crawford and Robert Zuhl. The Holy Sacrament was administered to the congration as they came to the alter with first the ministers of the Conference partaking, followed by their wives, and finally the laymen of the Conference. The tone of the service was not by Dr. Sheets as he aptly pointed out that in partaking of the Hely Sacrament we are receiving a tangeble evidence of the means of grace which reenforces our faith in the spiritual Plan of Salwation in Jesus Christ.

Conference President

Beloved Brothren, this is our thirteenth Conference session and in spite of the superstitions that surround the number 13, we rejoice that the past year has been one of progress and soul winning, the present hour finds us gathered in an atmosphere of fellowship and victory, while the future is bright as the promises of God!

Our twelfth year was one of great testings and some falling away. This thirteenth year God has honored the faith and labors of our pioneer pastors and laymen with advances on almost every line. Even though your servant had to relinquish the kockford First Church pastorate because of insufficient energy to carry the double load of pastor-Conference President to year's end, and although pastors Olander and Kramer are relinquishing their pastorates as of this Session to take further seminary training, our Lord has led excellent men to come with us to fill the vacancies. In fact, five additional men outside our Conference asked for churches after our pulpits were filled. We welcome pastors Thomas Bailie of the Misconsin Conference, key Gibbs of Lockport Conference and seminary graduate Leigh Mygard of the Dakota Conference, to our Conference

This year has seen significant advances in the spiritual life of our coople. The Graham Crusade in Cicago in June enlisted a host of Wesleyan Methodists, led by our cight faithful pasters in Chicagoland, in the ministry of counselling and soul-winning. A goodly number of converts were referred to our churches, including some outstanding conversions. The growth in full membership from 470 to 504 and in total membership from 651 to 712 reflects the number redeemed is much larger than statistics reveal because our churches stand true to the Word of God and to the spiritual standards of original Methodism and thus we find many who go back and walk no more with us when they find the price is too high. But we are not tempted to lower the standard of the Word because to lower it would mean that we would have to settle for humanism without the transforming grace of God. The large numbers in the worldly churches are not temptation to our men who have counted the cost of preaching holiness in a decadent age. Holiness is the only answer to the defilement that pervades much of modern life. Thank God for the reality of full salvation:

We rejoice in other gains: Our Wesleyan Methodist subscriptions rose to 425, exceeding the number of family units in the Conference. Total Sunday School enrollment rose from 1571 to 1217.

We rejoice in other gains: Our Wesleyan Methodist subscriptions rose to 425, exceeding the number of family units in the Conference. Total Sunday School enrollment rose from 1651 to 1741 and average attendance from 1177 to 1217. In a time of shifting population, especially in our cities where 20% to 40% move annually, it is a victory to be celebrated that the ceaseless going into the hirhways and hedges has resulted in better than 9% gains in most statistics. While these are modest, we praise God for every advance!

Another proof of devotion to God is the giving of our people. Giving for all purposes this past year was \$177,285, a gain of \$4,800 and a percapita giving per full member of \$351,00. This stands high in Wesleyan Methodism. Another

Another proof of devotion to God is the giving of our people. Giving for all purposes this past year was \$177,285, a gain of \$4,800 and a percapita giving per full member of \$551,00. This stands high in Wesleyan Methodism. Another evidence of devotion is the heroic effort many of our churches with limited financial resources have made to pay their denominational and conference obligations in full. In several instances pastors gave of their personal income to pay substantial amounts of budgets due in order to fulfall the missionary outreach of their church in full! He who keeps careful records above will not forget such love and loyalty! At the direction of last Conference session, denominational budgets in arrears were paid in full out of Conference funds in the interim of Conference. We owe to our General Church, the same loyalty that our churches owe to the Conference.

Our property values increased from \$846,200 to\$870,200, a \$24,000 gain with an increase in indebtedness of only \$11,211. Our total indebtedness is \$240,215--28% of our evaluation. Payments on principal indebtedness came to \$21,516, plus interest payments of \$8,708, or a total of \$30,224 in payments made. Debt reduction is greater than the \$21,516 shown because of Denominational sid to pioneer projects and sid from the Conference Church Extension Fund.

Pastoral support increased from \$64,83 to \$66,338 indicating the loyal support of our laymon for the men of God whose lives are poured out in service to Christ.

Report of Personal Service: Eight of the eleven years I have served as your Conference President, I have also pastored churches to reduce the financial load on our Mission Conference and release funds for further outreach. This year I served Rockford First Church until July 4 when we moved back to our home in Chicago and just the Conference responsibilities. Already I can sense the physical improvement due to the lessened tensions of just one job. The relinquing of the pastorate came at the request of the Conference pastors in caucus at The relinquish-Ministerial Convention following my hospitalization in February. Their consideration and love has been a great source of encouragement.

I have travelled 20,465 miles in Conference interest this past year, plus other travel of 5,550 miles, totaling 25,915 miles. The launching of the Creve Coeur building program, continuing Conference oversight and serving the Rockford church has meant commuting between these several responsibilities. Our Chicago address makes possible travel by train to all our churches and eases the physical load considerably.

Letters written total 483, a considerable chore but a vital link in the ministry of counsel. Our Conference paper, The Illimois Tidings, was written, mimoographed addressed and mailed in October, December, February, June and July, for a total of 2500 separate pieces mailed. I also served as pastor of Record-First church. Thirty-two quarterly meetings were held, five meetings of the Conference

Board of Managers, four meetings of the Local Board of Trustees of Marion College were attended. In May I attended the Hephizibah Orphanage Board of Managers meeting in Macon, Georgia, where plans were completed for the new main building. The interests of the orphans lies close to my heart, since I too lived in an orphanage as a small child.

The trip to Louisville in Lecember with a carload of youth was a rewarding experience. This gathering of over 1000 Wesleyan youth and their leaders gave

great encouragement to our hearts as to the future of our church.
This year also marked the half-contury of my life, giving warning that the days come cuickly when the final accounting will needs be given to the Chief Shepherd. Exhorting first in my father's city mission in Boston, Mass., at the age of ten, beginning formal preaching at sixteen, entering the service of our denomination at the age of thirty, have been landmarks in the call of God. How good He has been, counting me faithful, outting me into the ministry. By His grace I plan to give a good account of my stewardship when I am called to account. I covet your fervent prayer support and understanding and love. I pledge you my love, loyalty and service in Christ's name.

Report No. 7.

Board of Superannuate Minister's Aid (Pension Plan)

Your Board reports that all Wesleyan Methodist pastors stationed at the Conference four Board reports that all Wosleyam Methodist pastors stationed at the Conference of 1960 are in compliance with the Standing Rule on Pension Plan Membership. All annual reports through fiscal 1961 have been received and forwarded to headquarters, and all memberships are active and paid up through fiscal 1961, with the exception of outstanding notes. Reports for fiscal 1962 are slow in coming in, but it is expected that this report may be altered by rise of Conference. The undivided method of assessment payment again worked very well, and all but two churches are listed as having paid the assessment in full, including general budget and pastoral assessment. It is therefore recommended that the finance committee again (ave consideration to the method of assessment).

budget and pastoral assessment. It is therefore recommended that the finance committee again give consideration to the matter of general budget arrears so that the entire amount asked by the general conference may be remitted.

The Board notes that most of the churches showing arrears either in general budget or pastoral assessments last year reacted favorably to the idea that these are by the very nature of the pension plan a continuing obligation. Full acceptance of this principal should result in further simplification of the assessment procedure, for overpayments will always be regarded as credits against future assessments. We suggest, therfore, that our estimates of the pastoral assessments be in the coming year increased somewhat (approx. 10%) so that smaller balances will be due at the close of fiscal 1963 than the usual full quarter.

Report No. 9.

Conference Board of Managers (Board of Church Extension)

We, the members of the Board of Managers which is also the Board of Church Extension report as follows:

As the Board of Managers of the Illinois Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, we met officially on August 9, 1961 here at Epworth Park, Belvidere, Illinois, on November 4, 1961 at the Elk Grove Village church parsonage, on February 2, 1962 at the Haywood church and at the Oak Lawn church and on May 5, 1962 at the Rockford First Church, to consider the state of all the churches and to plan for the extension of the Conference.

Out of the full record of decision made—the minutes of which are open for your inspecttion—we report the following summary of actions taken to promote our pioneer projects: WHEATON. We have continued to make the mortgage payments on the building and land with

WHEATON. We have continued to make the mortgage payments on the building and land with denominational aid this past year. In spite of the loss of three substantial givers just prior to last Conference because of their transfer to other locations, the giving of the church was \$1500.00 more than the year previous. As a result Wheaton was able to take on a larger portion of their property payment obligations and hope to take on an increasing share this coming year. Pastor Forrest Gearhart reports that community interest is rising and that new families are coming in. Because of the approximately \$450 a month property payment load we will need to seek continuing denominational aid and grant continuing Conference support. The day is coming sooner than we think when we will need to move out of the parsonage-chapel into a church building that will adequately represent Wesleyan Hethodism in Wheaton, the capital city of the nation's evangelical organizations.

ROCKFORD-RARRISON AVENUE. At last Conference session we reported services had just begun and that the pastor's family had moved into the apartment portion of the parsonage-chapel building on our three acre tract in south-east Rockford. This year the basement has been completed, and portable partitions provided by the Board to divide the Sunday School classes held there. A good lawn was put in as well as attractive shrubs. Our annual Ministerial Convention was held there in February. Our deep appreciation is extended to Pastor and Mrs. Long for their investment of their personal funds and labor on this project. Our brother is taking graduate work next year combined with week-end evangelistic labors. A choice young couple, Leigh and Judy Hygard, who are being married in Marion, Indiana, today, August 3, and expect to stop here on their honeymoon, have accepted the assignment for next year. Mrs. Hygard will teach school across the street in order to help finance their personal support and free him for the promotion of the work.

Because of our provious commitments our financial assistance has been limited as the financial report will indicate, but we were able to refinance the short-term loan due at last Conference time, thanks to the cooperation of the Wesleyan Investment Foundation.

ELK GROVE VILLAGE. The construction of the new sanctuary at Elk Grove Village, one of Chicago's fasted growing suburbs on the northwest side, is nearing completion. The basement was finished first and is used for services on Sunday and as a mirsery school during the week—the latter a community service as well as a financial aid toward secting the heavy indebtedness.payments of about \$400 emonth.on church and parsonage. The 24'x 48' flat-deck future Sunday School addition to the sanctuary has been completed as a lovely apartment for the pastor's parents who sold their suburban home in Haywood in order to loan the proceeds to the church to help finance the building program. Hr. Crail, a railroad ticket agent, devotes his spare time to the construction work and Mrs. Crail, to operating the nursery school as monitioned above. Pastor David Crail continues to teach school to relieve the church of salary support in order to meet property payments. His wife, Barbara, who taught school for several years to help finance the carly stages of the project, is busy taking care of their new baby and the other members of their growing family. God has reased up dedicated laymen to share the load, among them Dwight Haisley who came from Fairmount, Indiana, and Samuel Paine, who has purchased a home in the neighborhood and is sharing as his father, Rugh Paine, did in the pioneer outreach of Illinois.

\$100.00 a month aid was provided by the denomination this past year and will need to be continued to a degree this coming year until the interior of the santuary is completed and the congregation and support increases. We pay high tribute to these dedicated ploneers whose vision, faith and long toil have brought a church into existence for which we had no financial resources as a Conference.

GALESCHEG. No longer a pioneer project, but an established church, We wish to give final tribute to Pastor Carl E. Olander for the toil of the years, not only at Galesburg, but in the building programs at Cak Park and Cak Lawn. As Pastor Olander takes a leave of absence from the pioneer pastoral program of our Conference to serve as chaplein at the Tinley Park State Hospital on Chicago's southwest side, and to pursue graduate studies, we thank his for his part in the monuments to the faithfulness of God—to the church buildingswhich he has erected in Illinois and the parsonages he has labored long upon. His mantle has fallen on the shoulders of Meredith Baille for whom we pray a good and fruitful year in the continuing development of the work at Galesburg.

CREVE COEUR is an old church as years are recorded but new in its development. After years in a small one room cement-block chapel, a fine 32 x 64 feet colonial-design sanctuary, with 24' x 32' flat deck foyer and pastor's study-all over a full walk-in basement-is under construction on our one-acre site not far from the present chapel. A competent young contractor, the husband of one of our members, is constructing the building with the volunteer help of our dedicated Pastor Arlyn Jones and his devoted laymen. The foundation walls are up and the work moves on apace. We are trusting God to provide the \$252 00 dellars a month payments this coming year and know He will not fail.

THANK GOD also for the privilege of working in such a dynamic, growing Conference. We have a crop of fine young ministers in training in Asbury Seminary and Marion College who will be looking for pioneer challenges in a yeer or two, if Jesus tarries. Let us pray fervently and work diligently that our present projects may become self-supporting in order that we may be able to enter new fields which are ripe and beckonning. New housing projects everywhere wait our coming. Rockford needs a new church on the northeast side in the Loves Park area. Aurora with its 60,000 souls awaits our coming. We have no church home for our students at Champaign-Urbana where the University of Illinois anticipates 20,000 students. Waukegan, on the edge of Great Lakes Haval Base and Fort Sheridan Army base should have a strong outreach. The Tri-Cities of Rock Island, Moline and Davenport call for our ministry. Let us make no little plans for God, and in spite of our staggering obligations trust Him for the advances this midnight hour demands!

Report No. 10.

Camp Reeting Committee

Camp Arrangements. We, your Camp Meeting Committee, managed the 1961 Camp Meeting following the close of last Annual Conference asssion. Under the ministry of Dr. George E. Failing, Editor of The Wesleven Nothodist, God gave revival blessings.

Two meetings of your committee were held during camp last year on August 10 and 11 to give consideration to financial arrangements and to plan for the present camp meeting. Final arrangements were made at a joint meeting of the Conference Board of Managers and the Camp Meeting Committee at Rockford on May 5. We report that Dr. George L. Ford, Executive Director of the Hational Association of Evangelicals is our ovangelist this year, Rev. Carrol Nichols of Allegan, Michigan is Youth Evangelist, Rev. John Cole, Wesleyan pastor from Cincinnati, Ohio, is our song evangelist. The children's work is being directed by the ladies of the Conference in a full program of classes. The Wesleyan Youth camp is under the direction of W. Y. President Bob Zuhl.

It was the action of your committee last year that the burden of managing the camp should be taken off the shoulders of the Conference President and put on the shoulders of Vice President Forrest J. Gearhart. He has done a good job of organizing the room assignments and the division of the work, for which we extend deep appreciation. The Conference President continues as Camp Committee chairman and director of the spiritual ministry of the Camp.

A subcommittee of the Camp Committee, composed of the chairman, the Camp Manager, the W. Y. President and the Camp treasurer, met on Feb. 21 with a committee of Free Methodists to consider ways of cooperative development of the Spworth Fark Camp grounds. Nethodists in their recent annual conference session have authorizedus to build two youth dorms on this grounds. Your committee envisioned this proposal in the May 5th meeting and were pleased with the favorable response of the Free Kethodists. A request for permission to erect cottages on the grounds is still pending. It is envisioned that a revision of our present contract which has three years to run, to a long-term contract would be essential if we are to invest in the erection of dormitories or cottages. Your authorization to grant the Committee power to procede with such a long term contract and to build dormitories and cottages is needed before definite action can be taken.

It appears that the offer of the Chicago man to finance the building and actively develop our own Camp Ground still stands. It may be that we should look into this more seriously before making final commitment here.

We report that Superintendent Kirkpatrick of the Free Methodists has been most cordial and anxious to be helpful in every way possible. The Free Methodists have forwardlooking plans for the development of these grounds.

Report No. 11.

Member Local Board of Trustees of Marion College.

As your representative on the Local Board of Trustees of Marion College I attended the Board meetings on October 13, 1961, January 15, April 7, and June 4, 1962. In addition I attended the Development Council meetings on September 23, 1961 and March 24, 1962.

The Development Council meetings were times of sharing with church and community leaders ideas for the advancement of the college. These meetings have proved to be valuable public relations outreach to the City of Marion.

The Board meetings have been times of wrestling with the problems of a rapidly developing college program. The onward march toward regional accreditation is demanding higher salaries for our administration and faculty, better and new facilities and buildings and a more adequate promotional program. These items call for much more money and the year has seen a financial shortage at a time of all-time high income. A Day of Prayer was called for by the Board, asking that God might give wisdon to the Board in administrating the financial resources of the college and might provide additional finances for the necessary advances in the program.

There have been outstanding advances this year to report: The College under the able leadership of President Woodrow I. Goodman has been granted Candidate for Accreditation status with North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools -- our regional accrediting agency. The self-studies prepared by the faculties and administration are com-pleted and were the basis for our new relationship.

The long road of approval of our building plans, bond issue, bank loans, contractors for ir new \$300,000 Girls' Dormitory has been travelled and the building will be under our new \$300,000 contruction soon and ready for occupancy in the fall of 163. It will be placed just south of the new College church and east of Williams Hall for Men.

A complete reorganization of the administrative and faculty echelons has been completed

this year with the new Dean of the College, Dr. Maurice Burns, and a new full-time Dean of Students, Dr. Harold Shigley, in the lead under the direction of President Goodnan, Our enrollment was 465, about the same as last year. We need to give renewed emphasis toward getting our young people to Marion. The worldly colleges of today present a danger to the faith and morals of our youth, We have sacrificed much and must sacrifice more to maintain Marion that we might have a center of Christian training for our youth. We are counting on each pastor and layman to stand loyally and enthusiastically with us.

As your Conference Sunday School Secretary we have served in the following capacity:

1) Arranged for and presided over the Camp Meeting Sunday School service.
2) Represented the Conference at the Weslevan Sunday School Convention Represented the Conference at the Wesleyan Sunday School Convention

at Detroit in October.

5) Promoted a Northern District Sunday School Rally. Maywood was the host church. The speakers, pastor and superintendent of the Messiah Baptist Church, were first suggested by Rev. Robert Klatt. It proved to be a stimulating rally.

4) Promoted the Easter to Pentecost Sunday School Contest. This year it was designated a "Gold Star" contest. There was good interest and response. Maywood was the "Gold Star" School; Poyne Ave. was second as a "Silver Star" school; Wheaton, Wyanot, Oak Park, Roseland, and Elk Grove each carned Blue Star awards.

5) New materials secured include two filmstrip series on Youth and Dating for use with our High School departments, and the Teach records prepared by Gospel Light for use in teacher training. These latter in particular are highly recommended to our Sunday Schools for use in their staff meetings.

A look at the Sunday School statistics shows encouraging gains in number of acholars and average attendance. Ninety-six of the Minety-seven members received into our churches came through the Sunday School. One-hundred and fifteen scholars are reported converted. No other agency offers the evangelistic potential that our Sunday Schools continue to offer.

We need added emphasis in the area of Teacher Training. To most effectively use the opportunities presented by the Sunday School we need to give adequate

ase the opportunities presented by the Salmay Sonota we need to the adequate attention to the careful training of our teachers.

Nearly all of our schools use the Wesleyan Sunday School materials on the adult level. Approximately 56% of our schools are using it on the other levels. Recognizing our responsibility to the denomination that serves us, we express gratitude to the Department of Sunday Schools for every effort that is being expended to improve the quality and attractiveness of our materials. We are confident that a growing awareness of the improvements being made will be reflected in increased percentages in the use of our Sunday School materials.

Moral Reform Committee.

The committee on Woral Reform wish to submit the following recommendations which need to be re-emphasized because of the subtleness of Satan to deceive and dilute a vital Christian experience and witness. Therefore we resolve:

- That there be an increased effort to know personally the Biblical teaching of our Wesleyan distinctive of santification as an imperative for the great issues facing the church.
- 2. That Paul's injunction in Ehpesians 5:15 regarding our walking circumspectly includes Christian discipline in the area of television and the current trend of materialism.

B. On a per Church basis: Conference Administrative Fund: One tenth of paster's cash church salary. (See Item IV below for details)
Paster's Group Insurance Plan: \$ 160.00 per paster.
Paster's Pension & saessment: 12% of paster's total income. (See Item V below for details.)

III. Miscellaneous Assessments shall be:

General Sunday School Dues: Conference Sunday School Dues: \$.20 per member in main school .15 per member in main school

IV. President's Support and Expense.

The tithe from the each church salary of each pastor (excluding assistant pastors) shall be mid through the local church treasurer monthly into the Conference Administrative Fund. It is requested that pastors working as secular labors prayerfully consider giving one-half of their tithe from this source in addition to tithe of the church salary.

B. The Conference President's shall be \$100.00 per week, to be paid out of

the Conference Administrative Fund.

C. The Conference President's incidental expenses, and auto travel allowance at the rate of 7¢ per mile shall be paid from the Conference Fund.

D. The 12% Pension assessment and the hospitalization assessment for the

Conference President, as well as \$30.00 per month for parsonage fuel and utilities,

shall be paid from the Conference Fund.

B. The Conference President has undertaken to provide his own housing by taking over the contract and payments on the Ferdinand Street property in Chicago, under an agreement which preserves to the Conference its present equities, and provides that in the case the President should require help in equities, and provides that in the case the Prosident shall require help in meeting payments, the monies advanced by the Conference for this purpose shall increase the Conference equity by the amount of principal reduction which results. Insamuch as there is presently a deficit in the Conference Parsonage Pund, we recomment that the amount needed to belance this account be paid from the Conference Church Extension Fund.

Miscellaneous Recommendations.
We nominate Mr. Richard T. Mould as Assistant Conference Treasurer and Mr. S. Hugh Paine as Conference Pension Fund Treasurer.

B. According to standing rule, the churches shall remit pension fund payments on an undivided basis and the Conference Pension Fund Treasurer shall pro-rate such payments to the general pension budget and to pastoral shall pro-rate such payments to the gameral pension suaget and to pastoral assessment proportionally so that current year assessments will become gaid up at the same time. In case of failure of the church to completely pay the pastor's hospitalization or pension assessment, the pastor will be respond ble to make up the arrears in pastor's assessment so as to rotain status in these Plans.

C. Payment of pastor's insurance and pastor's pension assessment budget by the

local shall be required only for that time during which the church is

served by a pastor.

D. We recommend that all budgets be assessed on a ten-months basis, with payments due only in the months of September through June.
