## REPORT OF DISPOSITION OF HOPE MISSION PROPERTY AND RECOMMENDATION CONCERNING USE OF FUNDS AND FURTHER SLUMS MISSION WORK

We herewith present a combined report and recommendation from the Local Board of Managers of Wesleyan Hope Mission, The Conference Board of Trustees, and The Missionary Board pertaining to the closing of Hope Mission and further slums mission activity sponsored by the Conference.

The extensive redevelopment program and construction of the new Sixth Street Trafficway in Kansas City, Missouri necessitated the condemnation and subsequent purchase of all buildings and property in the vicinity of Hope Mission. The Wesleyan Hope Mission property at 705-707 Main Street was condemned by the Redevelopment Authority Corporation and the final appraised value of the property was given as \$28,500.00. This figure and offer was approved by all the Boards concerned and after the deduction of transaction coats of \$42.60 the net sale price of \$28,457.40 was paid to the Conference Trustees.

The principal due on the original purchase of the Mission building amounted to \$2,213.68 and accrued interest on the principal totaled \$1,124.40, leaving a net return of \$25,119.32 from the property. Upon action of the Conference Trustees this amount (\$25,119.32) was turned over to the Treasurer of the Missionary Board to be kept as a separate fund and used under the direction of the Conference Building Committee in the church extension program.

All of the equipment of Hope Mission, with the exception of the cross sign "Jesus Saves," was offered without charge to Rev. A. Hulet if he desired to use it to operate his own mission, or to Leonard Long if Brother Hulet did not wish to use it, or to both of them if they desired to work together. The Boards further offered to pay \$150.00 moving expense and \$50.00 toward one month's rent operation of a mission. The cross sign was offered for sale to Brother Hulet for \$75.00.

On March 12, 1954 the final settlement was made with Brother Hulet from the Mission funds after he had chosen to accept the proposition of the Boards. At the suggestion and request of Brother Hulet the settlement was made by using the balance as of March 1 as a basis. All outstanding

bills and statements paid or coming due after March 1, 1954, were assumed and paid by Brother Hulet in return for all receipts and collections received after March 1.

It was agreed that Brother C. L. Long pay by check the amount of \$251.38 to the Conference Trustees, which figure represented the balance in the account of the Mission as of March 1, after deduction of the February gas bill amounting to \$34.85, salaries to workers in the amount of \$60.00, and the check to Brother Hulet of \$200.00 for moving and rent. The balance of \$55.84 (more or less) in the Mission account as of March 12 was turned to Brother Hulet to pay outstanding bills according to the above agreement. Brother Hulet accepted the cross sign for \$75.00 which was paid to the Conference Trustees.

#### RECOMMENDATION

In the light of the present obligations of the Conference, the many opportunities for church extension, the limited funds which we have to invest in the salvation of souls, and thoughtfully considering where the investment would bring the greatest returns for the Kingdom; we recommend that the Conference discontinue the work in slums missions until further action is taken.

Inasmuch as, the interest payments are a real burden to the churches, and

Whereas, our church extension loan fund is a very small percent of monies borrowed by the churches;

We therefore recommend, in keeping with the action of the Conference Trustees, that the net return from the sale of the Mission property be considered a separate fund to be used by the Conference Building Committee for church extension.

We further recommend that this money be loaned to the churches at the rate of  $2\frac{1}{2}\%$  interest, and that \$24,880.68 of borrowed money be loaned at the same rate, thus making it possible to help twice as many churches reduce their interest payments. (This would make a total of 50,000.00 to be loaned at  $2\frac{1}{2}\%$  interest). The allocation of the reduced rate will be left in the hands of the Conference Building Committee.

## Resolutions

The following resolutions which pertain to the local churches shall be READ by the pastors to their people within six weeks after the receipt of the Conference Minutes and at least four weeks before the Annual Conference.

- 1. Fiscal Year. Resolved, that the closing date of the fiscal year be two weeks before the opening of the Annual Conference-Camp Period, and we request that all statistical reports be in the hands of the Conference Treasurer at least one week before the Conference-Camp Period. He shall forward the blanks to the Statistical Chairman who shall be able to report at an early session of Conference. (The fiscal year for 1954-55 shall close July 20, 1955)
- 2. Conference and Camp date. Resolved, that the Conference begin annually at 1:30 p.m. on the first Tuesday in August for the organizing of Conference business and committee work, and continue daily until completed, and that Camp begin on Friday night of the same week and continue though two following Sundays.
- 3. Order of Business. Inasmuch as it is the desire of the Conference to complete its business as soon as possible it is recommended that the following procedure of business be followed:

First, the first ten rows of the middle sections and the platform of the tabernacle constitute the Conference bar.

Second, all recommendation to travel or study be turned directly to the assistant secretary, who shall turn them to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

Third, Ministers reports shall be given immediately after Officer's reports are given and continue whenever other business will permit.

Fourth, the following order of business shall be followed in each session:

- a. Roll call
- b. Minutes
- c. Communications
- d. Special Committees
- e. Standing Committees
- f. Sessional Committees
- g. Unfinished business
- h. New business
- i. Minister's reports

Fifth, business shall continue from 8:30 a. m. to 12:00 noon and from 1:30 p. m. to the hour for the orders of the day.

4. Nominating Committee. Resolved, that we elect a committee of five elders, including the President ex-officio, and five delegates elect, from five churches designated by the Conference to:

First, examine the credentials that are in the hands of the committee at the time of its first meeting.

Second, nominate all sessional committees and be prepared to report

at the first session of the Conference.

Third, examine all delegates' credentials, whether regular or alternate, which are turned in to the committee after the first seating of delegates, and to report such to the Secretary who shall read the names added to the roll at the next session at which they are automatically seated, if no objections are raised.

Fourth, nominate the personnel of all the Conference Boards and re-

port at an early session of the Conference.

Fifth, nominate the Committee Chairman for next year, including the chairman of the Ministerial Association.

Sixth, nominate the District chairman.

5. President to appoint tellers. Resolved, that following the convening of Conference and previous to the orders of the day for election of Conference Officers, the President shall appoint tellers for the occasion.

6. Election of Conference Officers. Resolved, that the election of Conference officers be held the second day of Conference immediately fol-

lowing the morning devotional period.

- 7. President's Duties. Resolved, that the Conference shall first travel the conference, visiting each church at least twice during the year; the first series of visits to be two services per church, and the last series, one service per church. The time of the president's visits shall be established by a committee on "President's Schedule", who shall plan one month of visitation to be followed by two weeks at home for office work, administrative duties, etc. This plan of rotating field and office work is to be followed throughout the year, with cognizance taken of conventions, holidays etc.; second, be it further resolved that the president shall secure quarterly reports of the pastors, using the findings of the same for the purpose of promoting the spiritual and material welfare of the churches; third, urge the proper repair and insurance of church property; forth, the president may upon his own initiative or upon the request of the Board of Stewards of the Pastor of a local church call a meeting to help arrange a workable financial plan for the church; fifth, raise funds for the Church Extension Program.
- 8. Auditing of Financial Reports. Resolved, that all financial reports, together with the books that are to be audited by the Conference Auditing Committee be submitted to said Committee before being read on the Conference floor.
- 9. Introduction of New Business. Resolved, that all introduction of new business of such a nature as to require an election must be presented not later than noon of the third day of Conference.
- 10. Orders of the Day. Resolved, that the Camp Meeting and Campground Committees be permanently the Committee on Orders of the day,

to prepare ahead of time the Conference Program for publication in the "Visitor."

Be it further resolved, that the following services be fixed as permanent orders of the day:

Tuesday Evening, Conference sermon at 7:30 by the Conference President.

Wednesday evening, Education Service 7: 30.

Thursday evening, Public service of the W.M.S. at 7: 30.

- 11. Camp Meeting Committee. Resolved, that the President of the W.Y.P.S. be a member ex-officio of the Camp Meeting Committee.
- 12. Evangelistic Help. Resolved, that the Campground and Camp Meeting Committee be authorized to engage evangelistic help for the Camp Meeting as far in advance as deemed advisable.
- 13. Additional Delegate. Resolved, that when more than one delegate from any one church presents credentials to this body, there shall appear in the credentials the name of the elder that entitles the church to the additional delegates.
- 14. Superannuate Service. Resolved, that one public service in each Annual Camp Meeting or Conference period be set aside in honor of the Superannuate Fund and that it be the duty of the Superannuate Board to arrange for such service.
- 15. 1% assessment to be paid. Resolved, that effective at the beginning of Conference year 1955, every active minister of the Kansas Conference, receiving an appointment by the Conference shall be required to pay 1% assessment on the total receipts for the current conference year as determined by the rules and regulations of the Superannuate Pension Plan of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America; membership in the plan being optional with the minister.
- 16. Tenure of Office. Resolved, that all Conference Officers continue in office until the close of the annual session of Conference.
- 17. Pastors Paid Through Conference. Resolved, that the Church's financial obligation to the pastor whether he be leaving the field or not, be extended through the Conference and Camp Meeting Period.
- 18. Pastor's Moving Expense. Resolved, that the church hiring a minister shall within ten days after his arrival pay to him his moving expenses, this not to be applied on his salary.
- 19. Pastor's Expense at Annual Conference. Resolved, that inasmuch as the pastor is actualy a representative of the local Church at the Annual Camp and Conference, that the local churches pay the expense of the Pastor and his Wife, including room, board and transportation, the same to be paid in advance.
- 20. Sunday School Attendance. Resolved, that the two Sundays of Conference and Camp not be counted School average attendance reports, made to conference.
  - 21. Quarterly Meeting Dates. Resolved, That the first quarterly

meeting of the conference year be held three months from the closing date of the previous conference year and that they continue throughout the year

at regular three month intervals.

22. Pastors Released for Meeting. (A.) Resolved, that at the request of the Missionary Board a church so approached shall release its pastor for one meeting, the same to be held on a new field or one of the weaker charges under the direction of said Board, and that the local church pay its pastor's salary during such engagement. (B). That the pastor so engaged shall receive money for the special meeting expenses incurred during such employment, the same to be paid by the church, or charge being served, or by the Missionary Board.

23. Pastor Nominates Steward. Resolved, that the pastor be granted the privilege of nominating one member of the Board of Stewards from

each church on his charge.

24. Reporting of all Contributions. Resolved, that the Conference President and each pastor urge the people to make all contributions through their local church and society treasuries, in view of more equitable distribution of funds.

25. Vacations. Resolved, that the Conference President be granted a vacation over two Sundays, that the greater part of three weeks might be taken if desired, and that he be given two weeks' pay in addition to

his regular salary at the time he chooses for his vacation.

Resolved, that each charge grant their pastor a one Sunday leave of absence from his work, that the greater part of two weeks might be spent for vacation and that the church give him one weeks' pay in addition to his regular salary at the time agreed upon by pastor and church for vacation.

26. Money to Treasurer. Resolved, that the treasurers be urged to send all remittances to the Conference Treasurer in whole dollars when possible. That the local treasurers send budget money each quarter to the

Conference Treasurer.

27. Calling List. Whereas, most of the friends and members of our local churches are won through personal contact by the pastors; and whereas, many of these friends and prospective members are lost in the changing from one pastor to another because the incoming pastor does not know of these people nor their interests in the church;

Be it resolved, that the Conference shall ask each pastor to prepare a calling list of all the homes connected with the church and Sunday school, listing the relationship they hold to the church, listing their names and addresses by city, street and number; the same to be kept for his work while on the pastorate and to be given to his successor on the field.

28, Church Delegate Expense, Resolved, that the local church pay the Annual Conference church Delegate's room, board and transportation

expenses, the same to be paid in advance.

29. Church Extension. Resolved, that one Sunday per month be designated by each church for the receiving of a special Sunday School offer-

ing, the same to be given to the Missionary Board for church extension and to help weaker churches not yet self-supporting, and that the pastor and superintendent help stimulate the giving in these offerings. That these monies are to be loaned without interest under the supervision of the Missionary Board.

- 30. Conference Visitor. (A.) Resolved, that the Conference shall publish the publication known as the Conference Visitor. (B.) That each Sunday school of the Conference pay a minimum of \$2.00 to supplement the subscription income of the Visitor, the same to be sent to the editor. That each church so responding shall receive one subscription per 50 cents sent in. (C.) That each church elect a subscription solicitor to the Conference Visitor.
- 31. Conveying Property. Resolved, that all instruments conveying property for clurch or parsonage use, carry the official name of the church viz., "The Kansas Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, Inc."
- 32. Trustees Auth rized. Resolved, that all action taken heretofore by the Trustees of the Annual Conference in the interim between the meeting of such Annual Conferences concerning the purchase or conveyance of real estate are hereby approved and confirmed and held to be as binding upon the Annual Conference as they would have been if such action had been specifically authorized by the Annual Conference.

Resolved, that the duly elected and qualified Trustees of the Annual Conference are hereby authorized and directed to take such necessary action as to them seem proper and expedient and to the interest of the Annual Conference and the local churches concerning the purchase, sale, mortgaging and conveying of real estate during the interim between the meeting of the Annual Conference and all such actions so taken by the Trustees shall be deemed to be legal and binding upon the Annual Conference and as full force as they would have been if such actions on the part of the Trustees had been specifically authorized by the Annual Conference.

- 33. Board of Building and Location. Resolved, that the Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location consist of the Missionary Board and the Conference Trustees.
- 34. Conference Loans. Resolved, that the Conference Treasurer shall issue no loans from any Conference monies except by sanction of the Conference Trustees.
- 35. Subscription Lists. Resolved, that all subscription lists and monies raised at Conference for all purposes be put through the hands of the Treasurers of the Conference, the W.M.S. or the Camp Meeting Committee, and that said Treasurers furnish the Conference President with the copy of the subscription lists which they hold that he may furnish each pastor with a list of subscriptions from his charge.
- 36. Unleavened Bread. Resolved, that all our churches use unleavened bread in the administration of the Lord's Supper. We suggest the follow-

ing recipe: One-half cup of flour, one rounded tablespoon butter, moisten with water enough to roll. Mark in ½ inch squares and bake as pie dough.

This recipe will serve 65-70 people.

37. New Resclutions. Resolved, that all proposed resolutions and changes in existing resolutions, to be considered at the next Conference, be printed in the Conference Visitor at least sixty days before the next session of Conference.

All proposed resolutions and changes in existing resolutions not so

printed shall require a two-thirds vote to pass.

38. Ministerial Association. Resolved, that the Annual Convention

of the Ministerial Association be held April 5, 6, 7, 1955.

Provided also, that an offering equivalent to  $25 \, \ell$  per member be taken in each local church, to be sent to the Chairman of the Ministerial Association. Such monies shall be used to defray the traveling expense of the pastors whose salary is \$1,500 or less, at the rate of  $2\frac{1}{2} \, \ell$  per mile, round trip; also that the pastor and his wife from said churches be given \$1.00 each per day for meals.

Be it further resolved, that pastors from the more distant churches that are over 200 miles from the Convention be paid 2½¢ per mile in excess

of 400 miles round trip, irrespective of salary.

39. Prayer Convention. Resolved, that each district hold a District Prayer Convention, and that the District Chairmen shall be responsible for planning such Conventions, the time and place to be annouced in an issue of the Visitor.

40. Candidates to Elders Orders. Resolved, that all candidates to Elders Orders present the Committee on Itineracy and Orders a transcript of credits which may be accepted in lieu of the Conference Course and a list of books and reading other than textbooks.

### W.Y.P.S. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Greetings to the Delegates and Representative to the 30th Annual Session of the Kansas Conference Wesleyan Young People's Society.

We humbly submit the following report of activities as your WYPS President. We will deal with three areas of activity and a brief summary. Since our labors were not extensive, allow me to give this report somewhat in detail.

For lack of a better expression, we shall call the first area,

### "Local Society Briefing"

- 1. "Tips to Presidents" was sent out near the beginning of the year, although delayed some by the office equipment being in storage until our living quarters were completed in Kansas City. When the equipment was finally gotten out of moth balls and we started the task of revamping the mailing list on the Elliott Addresserette, we were surprised at the large turnover in local leadership, making his type of promotion more vital. The most part of this letter dealt with charting the course of the last WYPS Session.
- 2. We felt as well a need for final briefing at the close of the year. Therefore, "The Final Push," was sent out to the leaders. Reports, deadlines, delegations to Conference and challenges were suggested.

### "District Visitation"

In praying about the District contacts, it was decided to vary the approach this year. Proceeding the visitation, a questionaire was sent to the pastors and local presidents. These dealt with the Local society, Local Conference relationship and Local-General cooperation. These were to be returned to me and become the basis for short consultations with each local executive committee and the Conference president at the District WYPS Clinic-Rally. We felt that this approach made it possible to get down to the very grass-roots of the WYPS of the Conference and felt they were ordained of the Lord.

There were WYPS Clinic-Rallies held on 8 of the 9 Districts. The Mankato District's Churches were contacted locally in 30 to 45 minutes consultations. It is our opinion that the latter procedure, though adopted through inability to arrange a night Rally, proved to hold the greatest potential for achieving the goal of an efficient society and proper Local, Conference and General Coordination.

We were gratified at the response over the Conference. Thirty-seven questionaries were returned to us, or 92½% of the Societies. Thirty-two of the societies were personally contacted in this itinery. The basic obsevations of the survey and visitation have been edited by Rev. Wayne Caldwell,

Public Relations Director for the Conference WYPS, in both the "Visitor" and "The Wesleyan Youth."

Rev. Martin Cox, Area WYPS President, travelled with me and spoke at six of the District Rallies. We and the Youth of the Conference enjoyed his ministry and we were appreciative of his counsel during the days together.

"Kansas Youth Camp"

We feel to praise God for a gracious Youth Camp. This opportunity is taken to thank the members of the Council who helped so well in laying the plans and executing them so effectually during the Youth Camp on the Miltonvale Wesleyan College Campus. Rev. Bob McIntyre and Rev. and Mrs. Kenneth Knapp were mightily used of the Lord, as were the instructors who labored so willingly and ably.

Space will not let me go into detail about the Camp, but again let me refer you to the fine work of the Public Relations Director in the July

issue of the WESLEYAN YOUTH.

### Summary

We have travelled 3,206 miles in the Conference Youth Work. Some 240 pieces of mail have been sent. It has been a privilege and honor to be your President, if there have been gains, let the Lord be praised; wherein we have failed to achieve, we humbly bow our head in shame before the Lord of Harvest.

In closing, let me share a telegram received from our General Secretary, Rev. H. K. Sheets, which we have been able only to partially promote, but which deserves Conference-wide promotion this last year of the quadrennium.

#### SUGGESTIONS FOR W.Y.P.S.

The local president shall read these suggestions to the society within 30 days after conference and 30 days before conference.

#### Local:

- 1. That each society sponsor a Youth Revival, the Executive Council being responsible for securing the evangelist, advertising and financing the meeting.
- 2. That the leaders for Young People's services be carefully chosen and the leaders' names with lesson topics posted quarterly. It is recommended that the President lead at least once a quarter.
- 3. That emphasis be given to the monthly Missionary Meeting of the W.Y.P.S., noting that the offering received applies on Church Budget and is divided 50% to Foreign Missions, 25% to Home Missions, and 25% to Education.
- 4. That emphasis be placed on the offering of W.Y.P.S. Educational Sunday, which is the third Sunday in July. All educational budget money received during the summer quarter may be credited to the W.Y.P.S. (See paragraph 254, Section 13 of the Book of Discipline.)
- 5. That all societies sending money to the Conference Treasurer remit the same quarterly by check or money order rather than small change, and that remittance slips be used and filled out properly.
- 6. That attention be given to local representation at the Annual W.Y.P.S. Conference:
  - A. The newly elected President or Vice President.
  - B. Two delegates. (One additional delegate for societies whose membership exceeds 25.)
  - C. The Pastor.
  - D. In case there is no local W.Y.P.S. organization, the Pastor may appoint a representative (age 13-40).
- 7. That the deadline for reports being sent to Mrs. Richard Tasker, Delphos, Kansas, is July 26, 1955. These include:
  - A. The Annual Report
  - B. Delegate Credentials
  - C. Efficiency Standard Report
- 8. That each society endeavor to bring a poster related to youth work to Conference. The poster to be judged by the Executive Council and suitable awards presented to 1st, 2nd. and 3rd place winners.
- That the local president and adult counselor receive the Conference Visitor, the subscription to be paid from the society treasury.
- 10. That the Moral Reform report of the Annual Conference be read within 30 days after receiving the Minutes.

#### District:

11. That each district plan at least three Conventions a year, one of which shall be under the direction of the Conference President, and that

the District Chairmen be responsible for making a report of these conventions to the Conference Visitor.

12. That the Conference W.Y.P.S. President work out the District visitation itinerary with the District Chairman to the end that mileage expense may be reduced.

### Conference:

- 13. That there be a Nomination Committee composed of the W.Y.P.S. Conference Executive Committee and first delegates elect from Colorado Springs and Concordia Societies (Societies rotating alphabetically). The duties of the Committee shall be:
  - A. To examine all credentials and certificates
  - B. To nominate all sessional committees
  - C. To nominate District Chairman
  - D. To nominate members of the standing committees
  - E. To select tellers to serve in the election of officers
- 14. That the Annual W.Y.P.S. Conference convene on Tuesday morning of the Annual Camp meeting and that sessions be held from 8:30 a.m. to 10:30 a.m. and 1:00 p.m. to 2:30 p.m. each day until business is completed.
  - 15. That the Orders of the Day for the Annual Conference be:

Tuesday, 8:30 a. m.

- A. Report of the Nominating Committee
- B. Report of the President
- C. Report of District Chairmen
- D. Report of Youth Hike Committee

Tuesday, 1:00 p.m. Election of Officer

Saturday, 5:30 a.m. Youth Hike

- 16. That the W.Y.P.S. President be paid 5¢ per mile while traveling in the interests of the Conference W.Y.P.S.
- 17. (A.) That there be an Evangelism Crusade called "God's Volunteers," and that the slogan for the final year of the quadrennium be, "Volunteers for the Lord's Harvest," in keeping with the crusading spirit of Revival and Evangelism in the General W.Y.P.S. program.
- (B.) That there be a standing committee of 5 members, including the Conference W.Y.P.S. President as chairman ex-officio, whose duties shall be to coordinate Evangelism through Volunteer Evangelistic teams in needy fields of our Central States Area. All recommendations of this Committee shall be subject to approval of the Conference Missionary Board.
- 18. That there be a sixth member of the Executive Council whose duty shall be to act as W.Y.P.S. Conference Devotional Chairman, and to serve as Public Relations Director.
- 19. That the Executive Council be the Committee for Youth Camp and that they nominate two additional members to make a full committee.

20. That we continue the support of Harold Johnson, missionary to Japan. Wayne Caldwell, Chairman;

Don Edwards, Richard Palmer, Olive Hoffmeier, Letha Parsons.

    Yearly reports postmarked not later than July 15.
  - (3) Annual report sent in on time.
  - (4) Having the greatest per cent increase in membership.

  - (7) For having some plan of Scripture memorization.
  - (8) For having reached a goal of 100% on the Efficiency Standard.
