# JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

Fairmount, Indiana, August 13, 1934.

The Eighty-sixth session of the Indiana Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church convened on the Camp Ground at 7:30 P. M., August 13. Rev. C. S. The Committee on Resolutions presented the following memorial to the General Conference. The memorial was adopted by the Conference, to be presented to the proper Committee.

### Memorial to Our Next General Conference

We recommend Amendment to our Church Dicipline to take the place of Section 25, paragraph 396.

"We believe the Gospel of Jesus Christ to be intended to extirpate the practice of war, and we avow our persuasion that war is utterly incompatible with the plain precepts of Christ and the spirit of the Gospel. We believe that no pleas, however peculiar or urgent can justify men in destroying their fellowmen in war, or release individuals or nations from obeying Him who said, "Love your enemies" Matt. 5:44, Luke 6:27.

We declare our belief that all the exigencies of individuals or civil governments and social order may be met under the banner of the Prince of Peace in conformity with this command and example. Isa. 2:2-4; Psalms 62:7; Micah 4:3-4; Zech. 9:10; Matt. 5:44; Luke 2:14; 6:27."

We, therefore forbid our people engaging in war, except it be a voluntary service on the part of the individual rendering that service.

A motion prevailed to reconsider and to refer back to the committee the Report of the Committee on Pastoral Relations.

A motion prevailed to defer the Memorial service until 11:00 A. M.

Upon motion the pastors of the charges were instructed to raise the fifty cents per member, College Building Fund during the first quarter and that this be incorporated in the report of the Committee on Finance and Appropriation.

A motion prevailed that a bond of \$2000.00 be taken out for the Conference Treasurer, which was at his request.

# RESOLUTIONS AND LAWS OF THE INDIANA CONFERENCE

- 1. That it is the sense of this Conference that our houses of worship should not be open to any evangelist or minister of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain a regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in occassional appointments. Any waiving of the above resolution by a contract or lease of building must be obtained through the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference.
- 2. Be it resolved, That the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders shall require all those desiring to unite with us from any other denomination of Annual Conference to present credits equivalent to our Conference Course of Study, regardless of their standing in the body of which they have been a member, and if they cannot do this they shall be required to meet the same conditions as our local preachers before ordination.
- 3. That any candidate for Elder's Orders or traveling under the direction of the Conference, who fails to attend the Institutes and the examinations of the Committee, without sufficient cause, shall be deemed unworthy of the trust and care of souls, and refused a place among us as a minister of the Gospel, and when they shall fail to attend the Institute for two successive years they shall be dropped from the roll.
- 4. The Committee on Elder's Orders is hereby to transfer all persons to the study list who may have been recommended to travel and may not have been given work.
- 5. All charges with a membership of twenty-five or more shall in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the Pastor may live.
- 6. Be it resolved, That it shall be the duty of the Pastors to look after the insurance of our church and parsonage properties. All insurance shall provide for losses caused by fire and lightning, hail and tornado. A failure on the part of the Pastor shall be a censurable offense. If the church fails to insure their property upon reasonable effort of the pastor to secure the same, then said failure shall be reported to the President of the Conference who shall then have the

property insured. In such case all insurance monies received from losses by fire, lightning, hail, and tornado shall be used in Church Extension work as the Conference Board of Trustees deems best.

- 7. We recommend that all charges and stations to which the Pastor moves pay the moving and transportation expenses of said Pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary; provided this shall not interfere with the previous arrangements between Pastors and charges. That where the Conference demands the services of any one, that it shall bear the moving expenses, if any expense shall thus be incurred.
- 8. Each Pastor shall file a duplicate statistical report with the Committee before the close of the fifth day of August with the exception of Pastor's salary and Membership. These items to be reported the first day of Conference, said report to be kept on file one year, and hereafter the full reports shall not be read in open Conference. The official character of any Pastor shall not be passed until he shall have submitted a satisfactory report, including statistics.
- 9. All unaccounted for members appearing in the statistics in the membership list shall be referred to the discontinued list. All members in excess of the number reported shall be reported received. The roll of all the classes upon the charges shall be put in the hands of the Pastors and they shall have charge of the same and make all entries therein.
- 10. It shall be a standing rule of this Conference until revoked by vote that the President shall receive \$35.00, the Secretary \$50.00, the Treasurer \$100.00, the Assistant Secretary \$25.00, each member of the Auditing Committee \$10.00, Assistant to the Treasurer \$10.00, the same to be apportioned pro-rata among the various funds of the Conference. The Conference Sunday School Secretary shall receive \$50.00 and each of the other members of the Conference Sunday School Board shall receive \$25.00, the same to be paid out of the Sunday School Treasury.
- 11. It shall be a standing rule until revoked by this body that the President shall nominate his Advisory Board and the Conference shall elect his nominations.
- 12. It shall be a standing rule of this Conference that in the examination of character the Conference officials shall be called first.
- 13. The Conference shall elect three members of the Camp Meeting Committee, one to be elected each year for a term of three years.

- 14. The Pastor shall bring a report to each Quarterly Meeting and send a duplicate to the Conference President quarterly on blanks furnished by the Conference.
- 15. Whereas, our people are being deceived by the erroneous teaching that Divine healing of the body through faith in the Atonement is the same as for sin, therefore:

Be it resolved, That we record our belief that the healing of the body is among the gifts of the Spirit according to 1 Cor. 12:7-11, hence - not for all Christians at all times as it is not always the will of God to heal the body.

- 16. Let it be a standing rule of this Conference until revoked, that no charge shall call any one as Pastor, or to supply the work, from without the bounds of the Conference as long as there are ministers in the Conference qualified and available to take the work.
- 17. Resolved, That the Treasurers shall submit their reports to the Auditing Committee who shall audit the same and in their report to this body they shall show they have audited the same.
- 18. Inasmuch as the Pastor's statistics reveal the true condition of the work as much as anything that might be said, therefore be it resolved, That the Pastors beginning next year report in open Conference the amount of Pastor's salary received, the amount of budget raised and the loss or gain in membership, also the number of Wesleyan Methodist papers and Wesleyan Missionary magazines taken.

### Report No. 2

# SPECIAL REPORT OF THE CANVASS AS TO THE ADVISABILITY OF INVITING THE NEXT GENERAL CONFERENCE TO INDIANA

In harmony with the action of the Conference at its last session, a canvass of the membership of the different charges was undertaken by the President, through a questionnaire addressed to the pastors and charges, as follows:

- 1. Shall our conference invite the next General Conference to be held at Fairmount, June 1935?
- 2. Will your charge raise 25 cents per member to help entertain it?
  - 3. Money should be in the Conference treasury by January 1, 1935.
- 4. Any balance not needed, will be credited to the Conference Mission budget of each charge in proportion to the amount raised by the charge.

Forty-seven charges responded to the questionnaire: Those favoring, 46; neutral, 1; opposed, 0.

In order to be able to entertain the General Conference because of its increased delegation, it was necessary for the Camp Meeting Association to build a new dining hall. This was made possible through the generosity of Sister C. M. Crilley, who exchanged the note that she held against the Camp Meeting Association, which had been given to secure a loan of \$600, to an annuity. By this annuity she draws 6% interest while she lives, but upon her decease, the obligation ceases.

In view of this gift, the new building will be known as the C. M. Crilley Memorial Dining Hall.

Through the favorable result of the canvass made, I am able to officially report that the invitation has been extended to the Connectional Board, and has been accepted.

It will be the duty of this Conference to adopt ways and means to care for the entertainment of the coming General Conference. I would

suggest that a joint committee be elected, three members of that committee to be elected by this conference, three to be elected by the Woman's Home & Foreign Missionary Society, and three from the Young People's Society, whose duty will be to confer and bring before this body for adoption, ways and means for the entertainment, and other matters that will be necessary in assuming the responsibility of caring for the General Conference.

### Report No. 5

# COMMITTEE ON FINANCE AND APPROPRIATION

We, your Committee on Finance and Appropriation, make the following recommendations:

1. That the President shall have oversight of all the work of the Conference, and that he shall hold at least one quarterly meeting on each charge and the pastors shall arrange for the other three.

He shall cooperate with the Pastors in raising the various budgets and the pastors shall report to him quarterly the amount of budget raised and where a pastor fails to so report it shall require a vote of the Conference to pass his character.

The President's salary shall be \$1,400.00 and expenses incident to his work.

2. That the work of Conference Missions be under the supervision and direction of the Conference Board of Trustees as constituting the Conference Missionary Board.

- 3. That Conference Claims Budget be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer, monthly except that the Quarterly Meeting Apportionment shall be paid to the President when he holds the Quarterly Meeting. The President's salary and other expenses incident to Conference work shall be paid from this fund.
- 4. That only free will offerings be required from newly organized churches two years old or less.
- 5. That the expense of Tithing Literature and postage be paid from the Conference Claim Fund and that churches securing the service of the Tithing Secretary shall meet his traveling expenses.
- 6. That the Sunday School Offerings on the first Sunday of each month shall be promptly forwarded to the Conference Treasurer and that he divide it equally between Conference Missions and Home Missions.
- 7. That any deficit in the Minute Fund be opportioned to the various Conference funds.
- 8. That each church shall elect a Budget Steward whose duty shall be to cooperate with the pastor in raising the budget and the pastor shall forward same to the proper Treasurer either monthly or quarterly, and a statement be sent by the steward to each member of the church quarterly, stating the amount of the budget assessment and the amount paid on same, provided they have not united with the store house plan.
- 9. We recommend the Store House Plan for financing the church work and the following percentage basis for distribution for all churches: Local church work, 70%; Budget. 30%.
- 10. We recommend that the budgets be apportioned as follows: Foreign Missions \$2.00; Connectional Education \$1.50; Conference Claims \$.75; Conference Missions \$.75; Home Missions \$.50; College Building Fund \$.50; Orphanage \$.25; and one copy of the Minutes for each eight assessable members.
- 11. That \$.25 per member be collected and sent to Conference Treasurer before Jan. 1st, 1935 for General expenses.
- 12. We recommend that the Conference elect a Conference Educational Secretary and that each church elect a Church Educational Secretary.
- 13. That the Board of Trustees shall issue an order to the Conference Treasurer for the payment of all liabilities of the various arms of the work as funds are available.
- 14. That the pastors of the charges, raise during the first quarter \$.50 per member for the College Building Fund.

15. That copies of the report of this committee be prepared for distribution to the pastors at a cost of one cent each to the pastor.

In a brief time we have witnessed great moral degeneracy.

The return of the liquor traffic with all of its attendant evils, is now rotting every pillar of our civil and social life.

We are made to wonder if there is still enough of the old time element, and idealism that can be aroused in revolt against the awful inroads that graft, greed drunkenness and harlotry have made on society.

The promise that the saloon should not come back has been kept by making of our restaurants, hotels, road-houses, filling stations, even reaching to the grocery store, making of them dispensers of all kinds of drinks, not only for the habitual drinkers, but to boys and girls of tender years.

Our land is under the curse of the liquor traffic to a measure we never knew before, and very little effort is made to stop or punish the bootleggers and unlawful dealers in liquor.

Deaths caused by drunken drivers of the auto along with the murders committed by intoxicated gunmen have reached a high mark in our land never reached in any of the civilized lands of the world. We deplore this condition and pledge our support to those seeking their removal from our midst.

One of the greatest causes contributing to the moral decay in our nation, Church and home of today is found in sex matters. This decay is greatly nourished by our public bathing beaches.

We abhor the near nudeness of dress even found among professed Holiness people.

Whereas, our Church is opposed to all such practice, shall we not recommend that our workers, such as the choir, special singers, ministers, evangelists, personal workers and our beloved laity dress as is becoming to saints, putting away once and for all the fashions of Paris, along with the wearing of jewelry.

2. The Publishing Interests of the Wesleyan Methodist Church belong to the entire Church.

It, therefore, should have the support of all of our people. There should be a protracted effort on the part of our pastors until we have placed the Wesleyan Methodist and Wesleyan Missionary in every home in the Conference. The Wesleyan Methodist literature is the literature for Wesleyan Methodists, and we believe that every true Wesleyan will take and read the Wesleyan Methodist, if he is a subscriber for any paper at all.

The difficult financial problems of the Church will never be solved properly until every member of the Church becomes a tither. The tithe is a tenth. It is like interest in that the rate is fixed. It is a debt we owe to God, and if we do not pay it we rob Him of His own. The Church does not go begging when the tithes are brought in; but in many places it has become a begging institution, because the tithe has been witheld. When we tithe, we gain spiritually, and the Church gains financially.

- 3. Since the Church has founded and organized Marion College with the express purpose of producing trained leaders and workers for her ranks, and believing that our College is carrying forward the program of the Church, we therefore, earnestly recommend that both the ministry and laity of the Indiana Conference consider it an obligation and responsibility to encourage the youth of the Church to attend our own institution of learning.
- 4. Due to the fact that the human family even Christian, must guard against one sidedness, also that one sin in the sight of God is as bad as another, whereas the present depression has created a tendency to lower morals and cause men to ignore their obligations to one another, therefore be it resolved. That attention be called to our General Rules, Page 31, Article 46 in the discipline. Inasmuch as borrowing without a probability of paying or taking up goods without a probability of paying for them are placed in the same class as swearing, Sabbath desecration, drunkenness, fighting and quarreling, selling of men and women, wearing of gold, the use of tobacco, etc. Since these statements are made to those desiring to enter our churches as probationers surely it is not beside the question to apply the same rules to the ministry. It is hard to make the world and especially the business world believe in holiness of heart so long as debts, contracted in good faith are not only unpaid but completely ignored. The unsaved will begin to seek God in great numbers when the professed followers of Christ give a demonstration of practical holiness as well as the theory of holiness. We had better be out of style in dress, or in ways of conveyance, eating the plainest of food and going through life with the bare necessities rather than bring disgrace upon the fair name of our blessed Christ. Also those members who withold their tithes from said ministers are equally guilty. Conclusion: Do not mend our rules but keep them. Discipline.
- 5. We recommend that Article No. 5 as follows become a standing rule of this Conference:

Inasmuch as the pastor's statistics reveal the true condition of the work as much as anything that might be said, therefore be it resolved, That the pastors beginning next year report in open conference the amount of pastor's salary received, amount of budget raised and the loss and gain in membership, also number of Wesleyan Methodist papers and Wesleyan Missionary magazines taken on charge.

6. Communism. The following are some of the declarations of the Communist:

The abolishing of all governments, no private property, no patriotism, no family life, abolition of marriage, no religion. Religion is called an opiate. The following is a quotation. "Christianity is the bitterest enemy of social democracy. When God is driven out of the brains of men the whole system of privilege by the grace of God comes to ground and when heaven hereafter is recognized as a big lie, men will attempt to establish heaven here. There will be no God of the future, no Jehovah, no Lord. There will be no churches. An hour each day will be given to Communal consecration and will replace Sunday. Bibles will be replaced by assembled literature of all ages. There will be a new calendar of Saints including Jesus, Isaiah, Darwin, Pasteur, Tolstoy and Ganda."

Six leading words are characteristic of their program, "Bible Criticism", "Modernistic Apostasy", "Atheism", "Socialism", "Communism", "Ruin."

From the above it is clearly seen that God is blasphemed, the Bible ridiculed and Christ dishonored, the whole thing contrary to the spirit of our Church, therefore, be it resolved, That our Church take a decided stand against Communism.

#### PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL ADDRESS

Dear Sisters:

It is a blessed privilege, as co-workers from different parts of our Conference, to meet again in this annual gathering; with heads uplifted, with hands outstretched, and with hearts moved by love.

We, members of the Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Societies, stand on the threshold of service today as always, seeking to send the gospel of our Lord to those who never hear the message of peace. The population of the earth is approximately 1,800,000,000, and we are made to wonder how many really know the Lord. These few facts prove the wide field that there is for Christian service. Service means labor done for another. Any kind act performed helps three persons; the one who is aided, the one who aids, and God. Two voices speak to induce the spread of the gospel to all lands. One is the voice of our Lord, commissioning us to go; the other is the voice of the needy mankind, calling us to come. With this great populated world, it should not be hard for us to receive at least one of these calls. Let us live so close to the Lord that we may hear the call.

The Bible tells us we must serve but never with the attitude of winning favor from man. Going to church and serving the church are

an inspiration and a wonderful help in our Christian life, but they are only a small part of what real service should be. Jesus went to church and taught and preached, but every day He worked, healing, feeding the hungry, teaching on the road. So our service should be every day.

More than ever we need the consecration and the courage and devotion of our dear Sisters who have been our leaders in the past. We hear so many times, "How I wish I had money that I might give to this and to that place of need," and pondering over the desire for much money to give, they leave out the most important gift to Christ, the gift of themselves.

We do not have to take a journey and go actually to the place of Bethlehem, for Bethlehem is near by. Let us then, like the wise men, go unto Bethlehem and present our treasures, the Gold of Service, the Frankincense of Adoration, and the Myrrh of a Heart made whole. Then are we ready to hold up the hands of our pastors and perform any duty of the church that is needed. We are Christians because of our faith in Jesus Christ, while those in foreign fields are Heathen because of their faith in devils and many other things that have no power to save.

Does the Church need the Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Society? If we should disband today, the Church would demand its reorganization tomorrow. We are facing a large task and our part in the task is to quickly spread the Gospel to every land and to try to better social and religious conditions in our own fair land; to save our boys and girls from the snares laid by the liquor traffic. Let us save our youth of our land.

We cannot escape the fact that Jesus knocks at all the hearts of our young people and they want religion to challenge them to hard tasks; the kind that will stiffen their backbone. They are encouraged, too, by the fact that Jesus was young and that most of the Missionaries who have "starred" the religious firmament went to battle in the flush of youth. Youth wants his religion to carry him over the bumps in his daily path. It is heartening to hear high school pupils asking, "Does it matter what my friends believe?" "Does it make any difference what method I choose to get ahead?" What profit to a man if he gains the whole world and lose his own soul?

A livable religion can be achieved by real effort. May I suggest four avenues of action that will greatly aid in reaching the goal.

The first is to know and love your Bible: if you know it, love it and obey it, you will be blessed a thousand fold.

The second avenue is to pay the price. You cannot have a lovely home life and loose morals; you will have to sacrifice one for the other.

The third avenue of action is to be controlled by the best. You

have to be mastered by something or some one. It can be lust and the low things of life; or it can be Christ and the high things of life.

The fourth avenue of action toward a livable religion is to have a first hand knowledge of Christ. Like the Samaritan villagers we will then be able to say, "Now we believe not because of thy speaking for we have heard for ourselves; and know that this is indeed the Saviour of the world."

We, the Committee on Resolutions, submit the following report: We wish to render unto God our praise and thanksgiving for His wonderful blessings which have been ours during the year.

### WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH

As Christian women we pledge ourselves to give first place to prayer and the study of God's Word.

We deplore the immoral conditions which are existing among the people, such as the wearing of immodest clothes, attending the movies, frequenting the public bathing places, and the smoking of cigarets. We pledge ourselves to hold up the standard of righteousness by abstaining from these evils and living lives holy and separate from the world.

We ask our women that they refuse to patronize the places that sell beer and intoxicating liquors.

Whereas, the missionary interests of the church merit our first consideration, we recommend an established order of services be adopted for the Annual Conference Session of the W. H. & F. M. Society with schedule as follows:

7: 30 A. M. Tuesday, devotion and praise; 7: 30 A. M. Wednesday, Educational; 7: 30 A. M. Thursday, Foreign Missions; 7: 30 A. M. Friday, Home Missions; 7:30 A. M. Saturday, Memorial; with general order of business conducted daily at 1:00 P. M. and 4:00 P. M., or any other time at the discretion of the President.

Whereas, there is a tendency to drift aimlessly without a set goal in view, we recommend that each Society let the Program Committee whose duty it shall be to formulate a definite program of study; including all arms of missionary work and a systematic plan of raising funds for their support.

Whereas, every Society needs the information and inspiration contained in the Wesleyan Missionary, we recommend that a solicitor in each Society seek either single subscriptions, club subscriptions, or the circulation of existing subscriptions of the Wesleyan Missionary.

We further recommend that in order to reach out in our missionary and evangelistic efforts we observe one monthly meeting as guest day at which time each member invite as a guest some woman who might become interested in the society.
