CONFERENCE SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY

To the members of the Allegheny Conference, Greetings!

In all the fields of Christian labor there is none that offers greater possibilities than the Sunday school. This is a field "white unto harvest." We should pray the Lord of harvest to open our eyes to behold the need. Someone has said, "It is a rare thing for an adult to give his heart to God who has not had religious instruction in his youth." Also the Sunday school is one of the Church's best agencies for reaching the unsaved, especially the children of non-Christian homes. Did you know there are approximately 18,726,184 boys and girls between the ages of 5 and 17 in the United States who do not attend Sunday school? Report No. 12

CONFERENCE PIONEER SECRETARY

To the one hundred fourth session of Allegheny Annual Conference, Greetings:

After spending fourteen happy years on the pastorate we found ourselves at the beginning of this conference year in a new field of service. The former Pioneer Secretary did everything humanly possible to help us as we began our work. But we frankly confess that for quite some time we were in a state of bewilderment. Two things helped us during this period of adjustment. One was the fact that the Lord had always come to our rescue during a time of need, and the other was the feeling that our brethren and the churches of the Conference were standing back of us in this work. After once getting started it was indeed a busy year. Following is a summary of our labors.

We have traveled approximately 19,500 miles this conference year in the interest of the work. During this period we have held 10 revival meetings, one Camp, two five-day meetings, made five other visitations to the Pioneer churches, held a pioneer service at Wilgus during a Holiness Convention of the Indiana District, preached at the Young People's Convention at Nu Mine on Labor Day. We have preached 213 times during the year and for the last 6 weeks have been laboring on the parsonage at our latest project, the new work at Talmadge, Ohio.

Five of our revivals during the year were with our Pioneer works. It was our hope that we would be able by thus spending time with those already existing to organize some during the year. While this has not been possible we are glad to report progress is being made on these needy fields. The new work at Cottage Hill is making slow but sure and solid progress and a good foundation is being laid for a future church. Roberts-ville is building a basement church this summer. This will help the work in that place. Hadley is on the upward trend. Blue Eye Chapel is gaining both in spirituality and numbers, while good work is being done both at Loyal Oak and Soldier.

The work at Grove City was disbanded during the year. Brother and Sister Hampe labored faithfully during their stay in this place. This spring they were forced to vacate the house in which they were living, no place could be found. It also became increasingly clear that building at this time at Grove City under the conditions that existed was out of the question. The lot and basement were sold at a slight profit. Likewise the building at Laurel Hill near Canton was disposed of, this money ac-

cording to the stipulation of the deed is to go to our work in South America.

Previous to leaving Tarentum, Rev. E. R. Barris held some services in the mining town of Renton in a beautiful little brick church over which the Presbyterian Church had the authority. It soon became evident that if we were to invest in this place we would have to have some assurance as to what we could expect concerning the building in the future. After months of correspondence and using the telephone by the Mine Superintendent, Brother Huntsman and myself, the right party was located and we have been notified by the Presbyterian Moderator at Blairsville, Pa., that the church organization at Renton is to be dissolved during the June meeting of the Presbytery, thus clearing our way for the future.

We are happy to give a short account of our latest pioneer venture at Talmadge, Ohio. In a growing community a number of families from McLeister Memorial church have located and have either built or purchased homes. Seeing the need for a work in this place they have prayed and ventured. A lot has been purchased near the center of the community and work is now in progress. On May 22, by authority of the Conference President, a church organization was effected. There were thirteen members and Rev. D. B. Hampe was appointed pastor. This new church is to be known as the Hampe Memorial Church. We have spent as much time as possible for the past six weeks helping with the building. At present we have a 24 x 40 parsonage under construction. It has a full basement and at this time is ready for the siding and roof. This means that the frame is all up and all sheeting is on. Labor thus far has been around \$120.00. To make this possible it has meant that we must do many things. We have laid drain tile, shoveled dirt, laid cement blocks for the basement, sawed boards, drove nails, and many other little things that had to be done. The lumber from the dismantled buildings at Grove City was transferred to this place, making possible this home for the Hampes, and future pastors. This work promises to be almost, if not entirely, self-supporting. A 30 x 50 cement block basement church is to be built as soon as the parsonage is completed.

Last summer we were contacted relative to a group of people at Riverside Park, West Virginia, who expressed a desire to unite with our Conference. In the fall we held a revival for them and had some victory and a Pioneer organization was effected, but due to questions that arose later they withdrew.

The other revivals held during the year were for some of our smaller churches and those recently organized. This was done with the authority of the Conference President.

Other official acts for the year were as follows:

- 1. Formation of a pioneer organization at Hadley, Penna., August 28, 1946.
 - 2. By President's authorization appointed Rev. Rex Brickell as pas-

tor at Soldier, Pa., September 3, 1946, and Rev. Cecil Huntsman to oversee the Renton work until Conference time. This appointment was made February 6, 1947.

3. Financial: Salary, \$2070.00; Rent, \$275.00; Traveling Expenses, \$458.31; West Virginia Camp, \$50.00; Telephone, \$3.55; Gifts and other remunerations, \$160.26; Total, \$3013.12.

During the year we have returned to the Conference the sum of \$578.02. Of this amount \$423.99 was sent to the Conference Treasurer, and \$154.03 was used to apply on various items as trailer licenses, title transfer, moving of trailer, etc.

Voted to grant the Nu Mine church a loan of \$1,800.00 from Conference Funds as soon as these funds are available.

- 4. August 23, 1946, on the Campgrounds at Stoneboro, Pennsylvania, the following business was transacted:

Voted to release the Wolf Summit church from two monthly payments on their note because of their present heavy financial strain.

Voted to authorize the Trustees of the White Memorial Church to purchase the property located at 457 Fifth Street, Struthers, Ohio for a parsonage for the sum of six thousand dollars.

Voted to authorize the White Memorial Church to secure a loan of \$3,000.00 from the bank to apply on the purchase of their parsonage.

Voted to set the rent on the Conference President's parsonage at

\$40.00 per month.

Voted to approve the plans presented by the Kenmore church for the erection of a basement church provided they can raise the necessary funds for building.

STONEBORO CAMP MEETING ASSOCIATION PRESIDENT

To the members of Allegheny Conference; Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

Greetings in the Name of Him whose blood cleanseth from all sin! It is with grateful heart that we bring to you at this time a report of Stoneboro Camp Meeting Association.

We believe that the 1946 camp was marked by a greater spirit of prayer than we have seen for a number of years. The morning prayer meetings were well attended and were times of mighty prevailing in prayer. As a leader of the morning prayer meetings, Rev. H. E. Robertson had a real concern that we reach through to real victory. So much of our praying today is just until we are blessed. Real prayer goes beyond that. "This seemed more like the days of old," said Rev. Cross in his report. Then, there was a voluntary fasting and prayer over each noon hour for the entire camp except the first day. As the camp progressed the spirit of prayer increased until one could hear the voice of prayer almost any time of the day or night.

Sunday morning was a time of mighty visitation of the glory of God on the camp, nearly the entire Tabernacle was turned into an altar service. Sunday evening the glory fell again. The Tabernacle was full, the Young People's Tabernacle was having an overflow service, and many were out on the grounds walking around unable to get in; but when the glory fell on God's people, we watched them come running for the Tabernacle. Everyone stopped walking around and crowded in the doors and looked in the windows. The glory is still attractive in these days of coldness, lethargy and hardness. Let's go in for the glory. Tuesday evening God came again in a mighty moving. Many, including the evangelists, remarked that they had never been in such a meeting before. God still honors His people when they honor Him.

A change was inaugurated at this camp in the separation of the Young People's and Children's services. Rev. O. G. Wilson was the Young People's evangelist. He also filled in, when our evangelists were sick, in the large Tabernacle, Rev. Oneida J. Gleason had charge of the Young People's services and Rev. and Mrs. Henry Ortlip had charge of

the Children's Meetings. The Children's Meetings were handicapped by not having a regular place to meet. This year the children will have their own Tabernacle.

This year terminated between thirty-five and forty years of sacrificial service for Brother and Sister Fred Dreyor as Superintendents of the Dining Hall. This has been no small task, especially with the recent period of food rationing and with the lack of equipment in the kitchen to handle such crowds. Their preaching was earnest, Spiritanointed, heart-searching, and heart-warming, which resulted in many "digging through" in the old-fashioned way. Ted Bartlett, the song evangelist, did not try to whoop up a lot of emotion, but moved along in the Holy Spirit and sang songs which had a real message in them. Brother Bartlett is a great man of prayer and an excellent altar worker. Rev. nd Mrs. J. L. Landrey, missionaries to India, brought the message on the Annual Missionary Day. They showed a devotion and fervency which is unusual for these days. Miss Virginia Swauger and Brother Orlando Yount, the camp pianists; the Rev. J. B. Markey, Superintendent of Grounds; the Rev. Herbert Robertson, leader of the morning prayer meetings; the Rev. C. A. Yarnell, leader of the morning love feasts, the Rev. James F. Merrifield, leader of the Ring Meetings; the Rev. Oneida Gleason, Superintendent of the Young People's work; the Rev. and Mrs. Henry Ortlip, Superintendent of the Children's work, all did excellent work.

Rev. O. G. Wilson, Connectional Sunday School Editor, in speaking of Stoneboro Camp said, "Two impressions persist each time I come to Stoneboro Camp. They are: 'Holiness with Dignity and plainness with humility.' There is a studied effort on the part of the leaders to keep the camp free from wild fire and false holiness. the old-fashioned standards of genuine holiness of heart and life and to the outward conformity of the same rugged, old-fashioned standards which has made Stoneboro an outstanding camp for years. This is no time to compromise with this light, frivolous, shallow, standard-lowering type of modern holiness. It does not bring the Glory!

I. Life Insurance:

Number of members reported last year: 93. Members lost during year: 5. Four of these left the employ of the Conference and one requested cancellation. New members enrolled: 8. Present number enrolled: 96. The following persons were enrolled during the past year: C. L. Deeter, H. R. Garvin, D. B. Hampe, O. M. Pfautz, B. C. Pollock, J. B. Sheffer, H. L. Strait and R. J. Wade.

Two applications were rejected by the Prudential.

F. P. Kerst is now receiving "Extension of Death Benefits" which means that his insurance is continued in force without payment of premiums so long as he shall live and be totally disabled.

The cost of this insurance this year was \$3.81 per member for each three months period. This is exactly the same as it was the preceding year and shows no increase, due to 15 members received a year ago whose age average was low enough to hold down the average age of the entire group. The average age of our present group of 96 members is 44½ years. The average age of the eight new members received this year is 42 years regardless of the fact that we took in the oldest member ever to be in the group, namely D. B. Hampe who is in his 85th year.

Our insurance this year cost a total of \$1,417.10. Of this amount the insured paid \$781.20 and the Conference paid \$636.90

Report No. 24

THE NEW AID FUND PLAN (Reprint)

- I. An Aid fund shall be established in Allegheny Conference for the purpose of giving material aid to churches and ministers who may have a pressing need.
 - II. The Aid Find shall be established and maintained by:
 - 1. Such gifts as interested persons shall see fit to give.
 - 2. An annual assessment on every church of the Conference of a sum equal to one dollar per member, payable, if possible, before the end of the first quarter of each Conference year.
 - III. The Aid Fund shall be divided into two divisions, namely:
 - 1. For churches, 60 per cent.
 - 2. For ministers, 40 per cent.
- IV. Disbursements from the Aid Fund shall be under the direction of the Conference Board of Trnstees, who shall be governed by the following rules:
 - 1. Aid to churches:
 - A. Loans may be made to any church of the Conference to assist in buying a property, building a church, paying a pressing debt, buying or building a parsonage, meeting an emergency obligation, or paying a needy pastor in time of emergency.
 - B. All loans shall become due and payable at the end of each Conference year, provided that the privilege of renewal for one year may be granted, at the discretion of the Board of Trustees,

to churches making written application for such renewal. Any church not paying their indebtedness when due, and failing to make application for lawful renewal for the loan shall immediately forefeit a sum equal to 5 per cent of its indebtedness to the Conference, which amount shall be remitted to the Conference Aid Treasurer within 30 days. This payment shall not be deducted from the original amount of the loan.

- C. In considering a request from any church for a loan, the Board of Trustees shall note the record of that church as to its loyalty to the Conference by the payment of its Conference obligations and its cooperation with Conference efforts.
- D. No gift outright shall be made to any church. Only the the vote of the Annual Conference can cancel any loan made from the Aid Fund. Such a vote can be taken only upon recommendation of the Board of Trustees.

2. Aid to Pastors:

- A. Loans may be made to any pastor of the Conference serving under Conference appointment and holding Authorization papers, or to any evangelist who is an Elder of the Conference, for the purpose of helping him in times of emergency or extreme need to meet pressing obligations or procure necessities, deprivation of which would expose him or his household to unwarranted hardship and suffering or handicap him in his service as a pastor.
 - B. (Same as 1-B).
- C. In considering the application of a pastor for a loan, the Board of Trustees shall take note of the pastor's record as it relates to his promptness and carefulness in meeting his financial obligation, his habits of thrift, his cooperation in seeing that his church meets its Conference obligation, his loyalty to the Conference and its standards, and his period of service in the Conference.
 - D. (Same as 1-D).

Sunday, 10:00 a. m., Ordination—Singing led by William Leyshon. Prayer by H. N. Robinson. Solo by Mrs. Ella Moody. J. R. Swauger, Connectional Home Missionary Secretary and Connectional Representative preached the Ordination Message using as a subject, "The Preacher's Priestly Pathway." His Scripture was Hebrews 4:12 to 5:8, the text being Hebrews 5:1. The Secretary called the roll of Ordination Candidates: Ada Dishong, Herbert H. Dongell, Mildred Barris, Delmar R. Kaufman and L. B. Owens. President H. C. Van Wormer officiated in ordination assisted by Elders H. A. Markell, T. A. Robertson, H. N. Robinson, C. D. Patterson, Charles C. Cross and D. B. Hampe. The

president gave the Charge and D. B. Hampe extended the Right Hand of Fellowship. The Secretary presented parchments, and Candidates were welcomed to the fellowship of Conference membership.

Sunday, 2:00 p. m.—Pioneer Service in charge of Pioneer Secretary, T. W. Comadoll. Singing led by Kenneth Hartley. Prayer by D. B. Hampe. Duets by the Dalrymple Sisters and Kenneth and Ann Hartley. T. W. Comadoll gave report of the Pioneer work and took pledges of \$2600.00 and cash offering of \$357.00 for Hampe Memorial, the new church.

Sunday, 2:30 p. m.—Singing led by William Leyshon. Prayer by T. O. McCracken. Offering taken for Haynie family whose house was destroyed by tornado, at Niles, Ohio, amounting to \$163.00. Trio (Fero, Gleason, Ortlip) sang "Listen to the Lord." Solo by Mrs. Myra Lupton. C. C. Cross preached the closing sermon.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS

- 1. A Committee on Auditing and Finance, consisting of three ministerial members, the Chairman being an Elder, shall be elected each year the duties of which shall be to examine and report on the Treasurer's books and all financial reports, except the W. H. & F. M. S. and Y. M. W. B., and to be a standing Committee to advise on financial plans.
- 2. All persons received into membership in the churches of our Conference, excepting those whose life of Christian fidelity has been of sufficient long standing, shall be received at first as associate members only.
- 3. When it becomes necessary for a church to call a pastor, it shall be the duty of the calling church to make provision for the expense incurred by the pastor in removing to the new field of labor. Money raised for this purpose shall NOT be applied on the pastor's salary. When an elder is elected to the Conference Presidency, expense incurred in moving to the Conference Parsonage shall be paid from the Conference Treasury.
- 4. The Conference Sunday shall be the closing Sunday of the Conference year, and the out-going pastor shall be paid his salary for that Sunday by the charge he is leaving.
- 5. At the beginning of the Conference session the president shall appoint a Nominating Committee of not less than three members, two Elders and one Layman, to bring to the Conference a slate of Nominations for Committees, etc., for the Conference Temporary Organization. Delegates' Credentials shall be mailed to the Secretary not later than ten days before convening of Conference.
- 6. No person shall be received into membership in Allegheny Annual Conference until he shall have properly filled out an application blank, which application together with recommendations of his references must pass the approval of the President and his Advisory Board. Exceptions to this rule may be made by the President and his Advisory Board when they deem it best.
- 7. The pastor of any church in the Conference shall be free to hold at least one revival during the year, wherever he sees fit, and it is recommended that his salary be paid him while he is absent.
- 8. Each pastor shall send a monthly report on the blank provided, to the Conference President showing the progress and state of the work under his care.
- 9. Each church may elect a Nominating Committee whose duty it shall be to nominate candidates for church officers for presentation to the church at the time of the annual election of officers. Such nominations shall not exclude other nominations at the time of the business meeting.

- 10. Churches having business with the Conference Board of Trustees requiring a visit of that body to their church, shall be responsible for the expense attached to such calls, unless released by the Board.
- 11. Inasmuch as trial sermons are hardly fair to church or candidate, and since the practice of having a trial sermon is contrary to the usual manner of locating preachers, we recommend that no preacher shall accept any such invitation, if given. Exceptions to this rule may be granted by the Conference President upon request of any church.
- 12. Since considerable expense of transferring automobile title and license attend the moving of a pastor from one state to another, we recommend that where possible the calling church bear this expense.
- 13. We recommend that all Districts emphasize Sunday School activity, and that Conventions be arranged for in conjunction with the visitation of the Conference Sunday School Secretary, who shall visit one Convention of each District during the year, at Convention expense.
- 14. We recommend that no one be elected to Elder's Orders who does not have an abiding sense of divine call to give himself wholly to the function and ministry of an Elder in the WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH. And that no one shall be ordained to this office and work who is not applying himself wholly to this one thing in cares and studies, and clearly determining by God's grace to give himself wholly to this holy ministry, if possible, long before the appointed day of ordination, and manifesting such a determination of faithful Christian service to the church or congregation whom he was called to serve during his years of preparation, so that as much as lieth in himself, he has and will apply himself wholly to the work of the ministry, except in all cases of absolute necessity of such diversions to a legitimate avocation for livelihood which neither jeopardizes the Lord's work nor blames the ministry.
- 15. We recommend that each church equip its parsonage with the necessary heating and cooking equipment, because of the variation of requirements in this equipment for the individual parsonage.
- 16. We recommend that in election of local Church Advisory Committee each church permit the pastor to nominate the members of this Committee.
- 17. The Conference Secretary, as Chairman, with the Auditing and Finance Committee shall be a Standing Committee on Publications, whose duty it shall be to examine all matters pertaining to Conference printing and publication, and let contracts for same.
- 18. All churches shall have a systematic means of keeping records, as required by Discipline, Paragraph No. 74. The "Ideal Church Record,"

published by the Bethel Publishing Company, Elkhart, Indiana, is a suggested form.

19. Local church treasurer's books shall close April 30, thus making the Conference fiscal year from May 1 to April 30. All funds received after that date shall be counted in the following year. Funds will be credited on Sub-Treasurer's book if received by May 10.

To meet the requirements of Paragraph 165-4 of the Discipline regarding revision of the roll of membership, April 30 may be considered the close of the Conference year for Statistical purposes.

- 20. Minister's Pocket Credentials shall be issued annually to Elders and Conference Preachers who are eligible.
- 21. Since the use of the Wedding Ring is not in accord with the standards of our Church, we therefore, as a Conference, disapprove of our ministers performing or taking part in the ring ceremony.
- 22. We recommend that the mid-week prayer service be in the hands of the pastor to conduct or provide for according to his discretion.

Report No. 1

THE CONFERENCE PRESIDENT

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

Greetings to the members of the 104th Annual Session of the Allegheny Conference in the name of Him whose work engages our attention! Today we call the Conference to join in gratitude and praise to God for His many blessings, which have marked our way throughout the past months since we last met in Annual Session.

All thoughtful men are aware that we live in one of human history's crisis hours. This is a dangerous world. It was never more so. The forces of communism, modernism, Catholicism and paganism are challenging evangelical Protestantism as it has never been challenged in our day. The days ahead will bring historic world-shaking events politically and religiously. Statesmen seem frantic in their efforts to avert the very possibility that our world will be blown to bits. We would not minimize the dangers that threaten us for these are days of heavy, peculiar pressure, perplexity, restlessness, despair in many instances, loss of faith, dissatisfaction with everything and everybody, delusion, deception, division, a deadly apostasy, unrestrained lawlessness, lewdness and genuine ungodliness. Many of us fervently hope and pray that the very clouds we see piling up on the horizon may soon reflect the glory of the second coming of Jesus Christ. This is our blessed hope. However, we are not responsible for that. God's Plan is eternally sealed in heaven and will be worked out on earth in spite of the devil and men. God will bring back the King in His own good time. Our responsibility is to be serving God whilst we are waiting for His Son from Heaven. Dan. 11:32 says, "The people who know their God shall be steadfast and take action." (Moffatt.) Here Daniel sets the people who know God in contrast with those who are deceived and corrupted by the flatteries of that "vile Person" who is opposed to God. It is their conviction of the reality of spiritual and eternal things that makes the people who know their God invulnerable to the uatteries and corruptions of the Anti-Christ forces. The Bible bids us to look away from the things which are seen, to the things which are not seen. Those who know their God have a passion that others should thus know Him. God has a remedy for our day.

Beloved, let's be men and women of God in these days, not swerving to the right or to the left but going straight ahead on the old-fashioned lines. Let's go in for a campaign of personal soul-winning. Our success as a ministry or a Church is not in our building large and beautiful buildings, drawing large worldly crowds, or in raising thousands of dollars for benevolences but in our getting men and women saved, sanctified and made ready for heaven. The Apostle stated our business thus: "And he

gave some, apostles; and some, prophets; and some evangelists; and some, pastors and teachers; for the perfecting of the saints, for the work of the ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ: Till we all come in the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God, unto a perfect man, unto the measure of the stature of the fulness of Christ: That we henceforth be no more children, tossed to and fro, and carried about with every wind of doctrine, by the slight of men, and cunning craftiness, whereby they lie in wait to deceive . . ."

As to the state of the Conference we are sorry that we can not report a larger gain in Church membership. A goodly number have been taken in but so many have been dropped from the rolls that we do not have any great gain. This is due to the fact that some Church Rolls have not been revised for years. In some instances we were informed that people who had died years before were still carried on the Roll. Then, there are those who were dislocated on account of the War, who have joined our churches and who now have gone back to their home localities. This has caused a loss.

However, we are glad to report that there have been some unusual visitations of God in the Conference this year. Some churches have experienced real revivals, while some others have taken backward steps. There has been a real advancement in some of the Sunday schools. Some churches have reached an all time high in Sunday-school attendance. There has been some progress in the removal of indebtedness on some of the churches. Others have made progress in securing a better location and in remodeling their buildings. Others are planning to build as soon as the way opens.

This is the year for the Quadrennial report to General Conference. It might be well to take a look at what we have done. In 1943 there were 64 church and 4 Pioneer appointments. In 1947 with the new church organized, we have 71 church and 8 pioneer appointments. In 1943, the membership was 2790, and now it is 2946. We certainly have fallen down here to have such a small gain in membership.

We appreciate those who joined the Gap-Filler Band to pray for the Quarterly Meetings and the problems as they arose in the Conference. The Lord laid this upon our heart one day in prayer to get 1000 in the band. We have 450 to date. We have the effects of their praying. Many times, we have had different ones in the various churches tell how they were led to pray for us and for the work. This is very encouraging. We would like to see more join the Gap-Filler Band. Let's be much in prayer for the safety of our homes, our institutions, and our Government depends upon how we pray.

- 3. That we as a Conference observe a uniform time as far as possible in the matter of the annual vote on the pastor. This will tend to equalize matters when a church wishes to call a pastor, for all pastors will be able to know at the same time whether they will stay or move. Likewise the pastors will be able to know at the same time whether they will stay or move. Likewise the pastors will profit by knowing whether he is to leave or stay in advance of the time that any churches will be extending calls.

The time when the annual vote shall be taken to be set by the Conference President and his Advisory Board and shall be announced in the CONFERENCE MESSENGER well in advance of the date set.

CONCLUSION: As we bring this report to a close we wish to thank each one for his splendid co-operation, and for the many who prayed for us. This has been a great encouragement in the times of heavy pressure, burden, and press of problems. We know not what the future holds, but we know our God lives and He will not fail us.

Report No. 4

COMMITTEE ON AUDITING AND FINANCE

Your Committee on Auditing and Finance submits report and recommendations as follows.

ITEM I. WHAT SHALL CHURCHES PAY?

- 1. Undivided Conference Budget which shall be equal to ten per cent of the sum obtained by adding the three following items: Pastor's salary, parsonage rent and church incidental expenses. (To be remitted monthly.)
- 2. The following Connectional Budget items: Foreign Missions, \$2.00; Home Missions, \$1.00; Education, \$1.50; Hephzibah Orphanage, \$.25. (These sums mean per church member, per year.)
 - 3. New Aid Fund, \$1.00 per member.
 - 4. Conference Group Life Insurance, \$.30 per member.
- 5. Conference Entertainment, \$.40 per member. Of this amount 12½ per cent (or \$.05) shall be placed in the General Conference Entertainment Fund, for expenses of our delegates to General Conference every four years.
- 6. The Pioneer Self-Denial envelopes for remittances of \$.25 or more per month (above the tithe) shall be given our continued support.
- 7. The support of the "Wesleyan Hour" shall be continued through the encouraging of voluntary offering and pledges from churches, organizations within the church and individuals.
- 8. Promotion of the Home Missionary program shall be encouraged by subscriptions to the Card Call Plan among pastors and laymen generally wherever possible.
- 9. The pastor as the responsible person for sale of the Conference Minutes in the local church shall remit \$.35 per copy to the Chairman of the Committee on Sale of Conference Minutes, within 30 DAYS after Minutes are received. Unsold copies are to be returned or paid for within the same time limit.
- 10. All the above items with the exception of Item 8 and 9 shall be sent to the District Sub-Treasurers. Church treasurers are to make MONTHLY remittances to the credit of Undivided Budget, Conference Missions and Pioneer Fund. All other items may be remitted at the discretion of the church unless otherwise specified.
- 11. Church Treasurer's reports to Quarterly Conference shall be made as of the close of the month preceding the Quarterly Conference. All church treasurer's records for the Annual Conference year shall close April 30. The Conference fiscal year is thus from May 1 to April 30.

ITEM II. WHAT SHALL THE SUNDAY SCHOOL PAY?

1. The first Sunday School offering of each month to Conference Missions for the use of churches not yet self-sustaining, etc., according to the recommandations of the Conference Mission Board.

- 2. Sunday School birthday offerings to Conference Missions. (Same as above.)
- 3. The Connectional Sunday School-assessment of 5 cents per member.
- 4. The above items to be paid to the church treasurer for payment to the District Sub-treasurer.

ITEM III. WHAT SHALL THE CONFERENCE TREASURER PAY?

- 1. To the Conference President:
- A. Salary per week, \$60.00.
- B. Annually, \$750.00 for traveling expenses incurred in the pursuit of the duties of his office. From this sum the president shall provide adequate liability insurance for his car.
- C. An amount equal to his telephone bill, including all toll calls made in the interest of the Conference.
 - D. The sum of \$100.00 annually for vacation purposes.
- E. An amount equal to the cost of all miscellaneous items which relate to the duties of the President's office, such as telegrams, flowers for deceased, etc.
- 2. To Mrs. H. C. Van Wormer the sum of \$5.00 per week for secretarial services for the Conference.
- 3. The following sums from the Conference Expense Fund, in appreciation for services rendered: The necessary amount to bring the offering for the Conference Secretary up to \$100.00; Conference Treasurer, \$100.00; Each District Sub-Treasurer, except West Virginia, \$50.00; West Virginia Sub-Treasurer, \$25.00; Group Insurance Secretary-Treasurer, \$25.00; Camp Meeting Fire Marshall for services at Conference, \$10.00; He shall also pay the above and all other members of Conference Boards or Committees, an amount equal to all expenses incurred in the pursuit of their duties in connection with their respective offices, upon presentation of such expense accounts.
- 4. The sum of \$50.00 per month to Fred P. Kerst from the Superannuate Fund.

- 2. That the expense of General Conference Delegates be paid on the following basis:
- A. Each Delegate shall present to the Conference Treasurer for payment, a statement of all expenses for travel, meals, and lodging involved in going to and from the seat of the General Conference. Said statement may be presented either before or after General Conference, and shall be paid upon presentation. (Presentation shall not be more than 30 days before or after General Conference.)
- B. All or any Delegates whose aattendance at General Conference involves a loss of wages from their regular employment (whether lay or ministerial) shall receive remuneration for said wages or salary, not to exceed \$50.00 by entering amount of same on above-mentioned statement for presentation to the Conference Treasurer.
- 3. That the Conference President shall by previous arrangement, meet the Board of Stewards or Fiance Committee of each local church in the course of his Quarterly Meeting schedule, for the purpose of discussing the church's financial needs or abilities and making such suggestions as would tend to expedite the financial program of the church.
- 4. That the New Aid Plan be published in the Conference Minutes annually.
- 5. That Item I and II of this report be mimeographed in a quantity which will permit distribution to each pastor and local church treasurer, and mailed, if possible, the first week after Conference. These mimeographed sheets shall also bear the information that the complete report of the Auditing and Finance Committee will appear in the Conference Minutes as soon as they are published.
