JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

Wesleyan Methodist Campground, Buechel, Kentucky, August, 1948

The Kentucky Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America convened for the twenty-sixth annual session on the campground at 7:30 p. m., August 2, 1948. The services were opened with John Basham leading the congregational singing. The Rev. Homer Barger led in prayer. An offering was taken for incidental expenses.

The Rev. C. L. Blanchard delivered the Conference Sermon, using Ezekiel 22:23-31 as a Scripture lesson, out of which he lifted verse 30 as a text. "A Man for the Gap" was the subject of the hour. A stirring address dealing with the gap in the home and the church challenging us

to be one of God's gap fillers was delivered.

The Rev. C. L. Blanchard called the Conference to order for its twenty-sixth annual session. The Rev. H. K. Sheets, Connectional W. Y. P. S. General Superintendent, was invited to preside over the Conference, who requested our President to continue the session.

In accord with the Standing Resolutions, the Nominating Committee

gave a report (see Report No. 1). The report was adopted.

The Secretary called the Conference Roll of Elders and Conference Preachers.

The Bar of the Conference was fixed as the first five seats and the

platform.

By motion the time of the Conference session was set for 8:30 a.m.. This motion was amended to meet at 8:30 a.m. and adjourn at 12:00 m. or by motion. Also on motion the afternoon session was set at 1:30 to adjourn at 2:30 for committee work. Adjourned by motions. The Rev. H. K. Sheets dismissed with prayer.

Second Meeting, Tuesday, 8:30 a.m.

Oscar Snyder conducted the devotions.

The roll was called with a quorum present.

Roll Call: 21 Elders; 12 Conference Preachers; 27 Delegates.

Partial report of the Committee on Credentials was given with the

following names being enrolled as delegates: Opal Caplinger, Maude Helm, Emma Howard, and Elnora Renfro.

The President made the following appointments to the Committee of Itineracy and Elder's Orders: Chester Polston, Ethel New, Alta Traynor, which was duly approved by Conference body.

The minutes of the last session was read and adopted.

The President, C. L. Blanchard read his report which was accepted by vote. (See Report No. 2.)

The Committee on Courtesy introduced the following: The Rev. Daniel A. Heinz, transferring from Lockport Conference, the Rev. O. C. Boston and wife, transferring from the Church of the Nazarene, and Bruce McWhorter.

Recessed at call of Chair.

Conference assembled at 11:45 a.m. A partial report of Committee on Religious Services was given and accepted by motion. (See Report No. 9.)

The Rev. H. K. Sheets presented the Church periodicals.

The session was adjourned by motion and dismissed by the Rev. C. L. Blanchard.

The meeting was adjourned by motion and dismissed by J. E. Hunter.

Fourth Meeting, Wednesday, 8:30 a. m.

Devotions were in charge of Henry Taylor.

The roll was called with 27 Elders, 19 Conference Preachers, and 38 Delegates present.

The minutes of the last session were read and adopted.

A partial report of the Committee on Credentials was given with the following names being enrolled as delegates: John Bruce, Fred Dearborn, Edna Zeigler.

A motion prevailed that the President appoint the tellers, who made the following appointments: Carmen Toler, John Basham, Stanley Kendall, and John Van Cise.

CONFERENCE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Members of the Kentucky Conference and Friends:

With a deep sense of appreciation to our Heavenly Father we gather for another session of the Kentucky Conference. We shall hear of battles fought, victories won, and shall make plans, by the help of the gracious Holy Spirit, for another year of aggressive action for Jesus.

This year has been a good one in many ways. In scores of revivals, hundreds have bowed at our altars. One building program has been in operation, and debts on other church property have been reduced or liquidated. One church property has been purchased with plans to enter the city of Washington, Indiana in pioneer work. Our finances have increased, and we trust that membership and other items have also done the same.

In the face of the efforts of our small Conference, millions within our borders revel in sin, juvenile delinquency and crime are on the increase, the teeth have been extracted from the local option law in the commonwealth of Kentucky, and more souls are being born within our boundaries than are being led to the Lord. Nations of the world are restless and are preparing for another war. As American people we have forgotten God's goodness through two major world conflicts. We are mad for pleasure and money which with other factors have produced inflation which now concerns our national government. Many religious cults of spurious nature are growing faster than evangelical churches. Pagan temples of worship have been and are being built on American shores. The teaching of the Bible, whether for better or worse, has been barred from our public schools. Communism would overthrow our constitution and present form of democracy. Labor unions now dictate to our government. Racketeering and gambling are too common.

Well might we ask, "Does Elijah's God still live?" Or perhaps it were better said, "When will a man of Elijah's calibre appear?" Our hope lies not in horses and chariots, or in raising budgets alone, nor even on the fact that we have some finding God in our meetings. We must go beyond our good plans, our preaching, our education, and our personality and successes. Only as we so align our souls and lives and programs with deity will we find the divine approval and Holy Ghost saturation that comes by complete abandonment to God, by prevailing prayer, and by utter reliance upon God's leadership. We need Pentecost repeated. Then will we be servants and ministers, not masters and dictators. We should allow the Lamb of God to clothe us with humility so that in honor we shall prefer one another; and then let the Lion of the Tribe of Judah give us Daniel's courage to fight sin and the devil to the end.

Report of President's Work and Official Acts

The Conference President has been kept busy. He has driven his car over 15,000 miles in the last eleven months, over 9,000 of which was made directly in Conference business, besides other driving partially for the Conference, or for part of which other reimbursement was made. He has held two rounds of quarterly meetings; preached over 200 times; presided at two church business meetings; attended the Wesleyan Leaders' Con-

ference at Marion, Mach 30-April 1, and three Local Board of Manager's Meetings at Marion College, besides attendance at other meetings and having made a few special trips. During the winter and spring months he held five revival meetings.

Report No. 8

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON ITINERACY AND ELDER'S

ORDERS

We, the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders, submit the fol-

lowing report:

1. We insist that each Annual Conference Preacher taking the first and second year in the Course of Study, be examined on and pass three books, as well as read three required books, in the Course of Study as designated by the Discipline, Paragraph 170. Failure to meet these requirement and to complete the first and second year's Course of Study in two years each shall make one ineligible for work in the Conference until these requirements are met.

- 2. We insist that any Annual Conference Preacher taking the third or fourth year in the Course of Study who fails to pass at least two books in the Course of Study and to read at least two books in the reading course shall be considered delinquent and subject to disciplinary proceedings as given in paragraph 170, sub-paragraph 3.
- 3. All Conference Preachers employed as pastors may vote in the Annual Conference, not including Conference Evangelists or Assistant Pastors.
- 4. We recommend that those persons taking examinations in the Course of Study, take said examination in the presence of an Elder.

The examiners for the course this year shall be as follows:

Fourth Year Harrison Davidson, Sr.

Validation of grades of examiner by one other member of committee approved by chairman. Work taken in various schools shall be accepted.

- 5. We recommend the following persons for Annual Conference license and to pursue the Course of Study, provided they have not passed it. Mildred Barr, John Basham, Graham Bright, Harry E. - 6. We recommend that E. L. Jackson, Stanley Kendall, and Bernice Woodward be elected to Elder's Orders.
- 7. The committee approved the time for the next Preacher's Institute as April 4 through 7, 1949, with H. C. Van Wormer as speaker.

The committee accepts the invitation of the Atwood Church to entertain the Preacher's Institute.

8. We recommend that the names of Lurene and Milton Coy be removed by letter of request.

9. The committee sets Sunday, August 8, at 11:00 a.m. for the service of ordination with the Rev. H. H. Turner preaching the ordination address.

Report No. 10

REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE

1. We recommend that all churches paying less than \$1,000 salary, endeavor to raise the salary to that amount.

- 2. We recommend that this Conference pay Connectional Budget Assessments. (See Budget Apportionment.)
- 3. We recommend that each member pay \$1.00 to the Conference Work Fund. This money shall be disbursed by the Conference Treasurer with the approval of the Conference President and his Advisory Board.
- 4. We strongly recommend the Storehouse Plan of Tithing as the general financial plan of the Church. Each pastor shall encourage the adoption of this plan by his church. (See Malachi 3: 8-10.)
- 5. We recommend that the Conference Treasurer and the Conference Secretary each be paid \$75.00 a year.
- 6. We recommend and endorse the Church Extension Card Plan. Let all pastors present the same to their churches as soon as possible after returning from Conference.
- 7. All churches shall pay the current or outgoing pastor his salary in advance, or send it when due, for the Conference and Camp Meeting weeks.
- 8. We recommend that the Conference President be paid a salary of \$2,400.00 per year, plus traveling expenses to be figured at 5c per mile in connection with Conference work. This shall be raised by the \$1.00 a year per member, and by the tithe of the preacher's cash salary. These funds are to be sent by the Church Treasurer to the Conference monthly. All accruing funds—above the foregoing designation shall revert to Pioneer Evangelism Fund. We recommend that any church in its first year be allowed to appeal to this fund for aid.
- 9. We recommend that any church not having a parsonage for the use of the pastor, either pay the rent for, or buy, or build a parsonage.
- 10. We recommend that each active member of the local W. Y. P. Society pay 50c annually on the Connectional W. Y. P. S. Budget. (It is understood that this amount be raised by the local society.) We further recommend that no church budget be considered paid in full until this item is paid.
 - 11. Each pastor's moving bill shall be paid by the contracting church.
- 12. Let all churches feel their obligation to give monthly donations to their pastor.
- 13. We recommend, in accordance with the action of the Book Committee that all newly-organized churches and organized missions be exempt from the Connectional Budget the first two years; furthermore that they be exempt from the Conference Budget the first year and take free will offerings for Conference Budget the second year.
- 14. We recommend that all General Evangelists, Conference Evangelists, and local preachers pay tithe from cash salary into the church where they hold membership, and that they report the amount of tithe, paid to the local church in their annual report.
 - 15. We recommend that 60c per member be raised throughout the

Conference for Conference Entertainment for the preachers, their families, and delegates.

16. We recommend that \$1.00 per member be raised for Pioneer Evangelism. Then additionally, we recommend that the Sunday School offering of the first Sunday of each month shall accrue to Pioneer Evangelism, and that each pastor and Sunday School Superintendent present this offering to their people, as a sacrifice offering, each church setting a goal to reach each month endeavoring to make the Conference average \$5.00 each month per church. This offering is to be sent to the Conference Treasurer monthly. We recommend that this Conference body elect a Superintendent of Pioneer Evangelism and a committee of two with the Conference President a member of said committee. All reimbursements from Pioneer Evangelism fund be approved by a majority of said committee. We recommend that all commitments be left to the judgment of the Superintendent and his elected committee.

If this Conference body decides that it cannot employ a full time man in the field of Pioneer Evangelism, we further recommend that a pastor of this Conference body be elected Superintendent of Pioneer Evangelism

for part time service with a committee as stated above.

17. We recommend that each member be assessed \$1.00 a year, this money to be placed in a fund which shall be known as the Camp Meeting Fund, the money to be used to help pay the expense of the Camp Meeting.

18. We recommend that the Pension Fund with an additional \$125 given by a lay member of the Conference be applied to the registration fee of all elders and Conference Preachers that desire to join the Pension Plan.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

Be it resolved, that:

1. Pastors read with instructions the General and Specific Rules of the Discipline to their congregations.

2. Each pastor shall send \$1.00 or one designated book of the Course

of Study, to the Conference Librarian.

3. A pastor (or church) shall use only Wesleyan ministers for Evangelistic meetings, unless special consent be granted by the Conference President.

4. We recommend if possible that every pastor and evangelist attend Annual Conference and Camp Meeting if they expect to retain their relationship with us, unless providentially hindered.

5. Every preacher borrowing a book from the Conference Library

may hold it for only one month. There will be a flat rate of twenty-five cents for the month and five cents for every day over the month.

- 6. Let us vigorously protest against liquor by every means possible to the Christian, including a refusal to patronize merchants who handle the same. We shall likewise oppose the wholesale prostitution existing in Army and National life by exalting a virtuous life and instructing young people and parents.
- 7. In this age where immodesty and worldliness are so subtily creeping into the Holiness Movement, let every minister of ours earnestly contend for, and faithfully preach the entire Word of God without fear or favor of man, let us refuse to compromise with the ungodly element which is robbing the Church of her glory, and preachers of the divine anointing.
- 8. Let no minister return to visit members of his previous charge, or correspond regularly with them after leaving that field to begin labors elsewhere unless necessity demands.

COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

We, the Committee on Resolutions, submit the following report: We thank our Heavenly Father for every blessing!

Resolved:

- 1. That, since intercessory prayer is the greatest need of our missionary work, we urge our members to pray much for a revival in the foreign and home fields while the harvest is ripe.
- 2. Recognizing the fact that juvenile delinquency, more properly called parental delinquency, is sweeping over our land and also recognizing the power of example as shown by Paul's words to Timothy, "Be thou an example of the believers in word, in conversation, in charity, in spirit, in faith, in purity," be it resolved that all our women set before our youth the godly example of a consistent Christian life evidenced by deep spirituality, a passion for the lost, prevailing prayer and modesty in dress and action.
- 3. Realizing the need among our people of real heart purity and sound holiness teaching, especially for our young people, be it resolved that special emphasis be placed on the doctrine and experience of perfect love during the ten days between the anniversaries of the Ascension and Pentecost.
- 4. Whereas "the Prince of the power of the air" is waging an aggressive warfare against family life and whereas his major attack has been against the Word of God, be it resolved that we, as "mothers in Israel" shall challenge his attack by restoring the family altar both by precept and example.
- 5. REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

. We, the Committee on Ways and Means, wish to make the following recommendations:

I. Duties of Officers

- A. The President shall have general oversight of the W. Y. P. S. Conference and seek to promote the youth program within the Conference.
- He shall co-operate with the General and Area Youth Program of the Church.
- He shall attend at least one district rally in each district and if possible visit each local church in the interest of the youth program during the year.

- 3. The District Chairman and the local W. Y. P. S. President or Pastor shall extend an invitation and the group requesting his services shall bear traveling expense at the rate of five (5) cents per mile.
- B. The Vice-President shall co-operate with the President in every way possible and in case of absence, resignation, or death of the President, he shall perform the duties of that office.
- C. The Secretary shall keep accurate records of all the proceedings of the Annual Convention and of the meetings of the Conference Executive Council and shall attend all matters of correspondence for the Conference Society.
- D. The Treasurer shall receive and upon the order of the Council shall disburse all money of the Society and keep a systematic record of the same.
- II. That a new pioneer project be launched, the same shall be under the direction of the W. Y. P. S. Executive Council in co-operation with Conference Committee on Pioneer Evangelism.
- III. That a week end Conference Convention be held on the campground the third week end in June and that the plans for the same be left in the hands of the W. Y. P. S. Executive Council.
- IV. That each district have at least three rallies during the year and that one be a week end rally.
 - V. That two new districts be organized, namely, Winchester and Paoli Districts. The Winchester District shall include the Winchester, Hope, Zions Hill, Means, Insko, and Preston churches and missions. The Paoli District shall include the Rock Springs, Simpson Chapel, Paoli, and Leavenworth churches.

VI. Finances

- 1. That each Society raise fifty (50) cents per active member for the General W. Y. P. S. Program, and that those churches not having an organized Society take an offering for the General Youth Program.
- 2. That each Society raise the amount of one dollar (\$1.00) per active member for the Conference Expense Fund.
- 3. That the Area Assessment be paid out of the Conference Expense Fund.
- 4. That each Society raise the amount of fifty (50) cents per active member for Pioneer Evangelism to be used for our new pioneer project.
- 5. That at each district rally an offering be received for Pioneer Evangelism, the same to be forwarded to the Conference W. Y. P. S. Treasurer.

- 6. That every second Sunday of each month an offering be taken to establish a fund for youth buildings on the campground.
- 7. That all desk expense be paid out of the Conference Expense Fund.
- 8. That the Executive Council shall have power to appropriate money from the General Fund for the general promotion of the youth work.
- 9. That all money be forwarded quarterly to the Conference W. Y. P. S. Treasurer and that the Treasurer's books close July 22.
