The sixty-fourth annual session of the Kansas Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection assembled in the auditorium at Miltonvale, Kansas, at 1:30 P. M., Monday, August 13, 1934, with the President, Rev. F. C. Hill, in the Chair. The Conference Sermon was preached at 10:30 A. M. by the President. A COMMUNICATION FROM BROTHER H. H. WILLIAMS

Miltonvale, Kans., July 23, 1934.

To the Kansas Conference, Greetings:

I have been moved by the Holy Spirit to write to you but have hardly been able so to do but I am going to make an effort and I think God will help me a little at a time. I may be several days in doing so. First I want to speak of "Eternity."

He who studies the subject of eternity most, discharges best the duty of the passing days. He who prays best works best. He who loves God most loves his neighbor as himself. The Bible will have no hand painting or decorations of exteriors. It will have the heart made right. The fountain of life cleansed, the tree itself made good at the very root and core.

Eternity crowds out time. All our days are in God's hands. There is an appointed time to man upon earth. One dies in his full strength,

being wholly at ease and quiet. Another dies in the bitterness of his soul. All God calls, starts from eternity and returns to their origin. We all came out from eternity. First, the expression takes us back over the immeasurable gulfs into which centuries have sunk. We wing our way beyond the dust of every empire, pass every orb which burns mysteriously in the dome of creation. Penetrates far beyond the sounds of the songs of the oldest seraphim. I enter the solemn pavillion of the unpeopled world; no voices sing; no footfalls resound; no heart throbs; and I stand trembling in the place of the solitary God. The silence is so terrible that it speaks, we are there before Thee. God's power has hurled the orbs forward through the silent voids: all this and infinitely more.

Dear people, here is another mystery. The expression "Eternity" bears us forward until the surging sea of life is forever hushed. The time will come when we will laugh at death; we will some day get such a view of the universe that we shall look down upon death and say, "O death, where is thy sting?" How so? Jesus Christ abolished death. If we believe in His death it will be no longer to us a specter; a ghost, an ungodly guest in the house sucking out our blood and darkening our future.

Dear Brethren, the best men of your congregation will be bargaining for a lot in the city of the dead. I need not remind a Christian congregation of the advantages that a good man enjoys under such circumstances. Well do I remember when I bargained for a lot in Miltonvale for wife. To me that place is not a wilderness given over to desolation of everlasting winter. It is a garden full of roots that will come up in infinite beauty in the summer that is yet to be. Yes, He has abolished death. It was no phantom, but an awful reality. The darkness was felt in Miltonvale. It was overwhelming and oppressive. A sanctified woman had fallen. She was a woman of peace. So deep was the shadow on the day of the funeral after we had returned to our home all voices ceased to speak, all quiet, the storm was on but there was no rainbow. The midnight and no star. I said, "Where are the flatterers of my cloudless sky?"

Oh, Kansas Conference, when the schemes of earthly ambition fail, when the hiss of the multitude follow your downfall, whither have they departed? Where are the summer birds? When the voice of the winter sighs in the leafless forests, alas, they are gone. But Jesus said, "I will never leave thee nor forsake thee." No change of fortune, no loss of influence, nothing can destroy His love. As the triumph of His children is His own, His great heart bleeds for you; His tears flow for you unbidden; His eyes follow you, whether with Him or against Him. With patience that never tires, self-denial that never ceases, He cheerfully died for your own confort. His sympathy is felt, his friendship is unalterable while on earth and strong in death. He breathed His last sigh in prayer for the welfare of His children. He knows we must stand before Him at

the judgment bar of God. Trembling at this great responsibility, let us teach the babe in Christ whose life should be our dearest care and who can measure the extent of our lessons of piety.

Hear me, young people. You who have Christian wives and are not prepared to meet them! The time will come for leave-taking for everlasting farewells to come. You will be helped into your wife's room, your chair beside her bed. She whispers, "Not our will but God's be done." But what was happening went out into the street, it was received everywhere. It was a wife now and lover standing in the dark river and receiving the last look of love from that sad, lonely husband to whom her smile was heaven, her words then were the breath of life. Now they carry you from the room with her promise, "I will meet you in heaven." These words were so sacred, too sacred for human lips to repeat, too holy for human ears to hear again. Your pastor and wife will step back into the shadows and the faithful will turn away and bow their heads, as the husband is saying farewell to the woman he loved best.

"I Look Forward Again"

I am now looking forward to the heavenly state of the world. "And I saw a new heaven and a new earth, for the first heaven and the first earth were passed away and there was no more sea." Rev. 21:1. millennial state of edenic beauty and glory has come and gone, populating heaven with multiplied millions and earth made into a heaven. Time, that noted parenthesis in boundless eternity, has come and gone. Reckonciling man to God, restoring order in the celestial universe, driving sin out of the world and eternity, banishing Satan into outer darkness has come and gone. The period of morality and human probation is now numbered with the ages of bygone eternity. Christ's work is now completed. He now surrenders His mediatorial kingdom to the Father. Dear friends, the time will come when you will enjoy your resurrected bodies. You will have a celestial body like Jesus had after the resurrection. body, painless and deathless body to live in forever. We will have the momentum of a cannon ball, or lightning; we will wing our way from world to world, exploring the wonders of omnipotence, exploring the universities of omnipotence under the leadership of Adam, Enoc and Moses; David and Solomon as bishops, Paul and the apostles as presiding elders. Then we will have the company of all the martyrs, unfallen angels and arc angels, the first born of all the sons of God and our friendship will be eternal. Hellish slander, hateful jealousy can never attempt to alienate.

Let fancy plum her wings and range in God's universe. You will only get a faint idea of the enjoyment. Oh, Gabriel, can you give me a faint idea of my enjoyment in the future? "Yes, son, remember, it will be increasing and eternal," and I will be caught away in the rapture to an exceeding high mountain.

We have already been on the ocean and we have been in New York City. We have been up to heaven and down to hell. We have taken a trip back over immeasurable gulfs, into which the centuries_have sunk. We have gone forward and beheld Jesus in the far-off horizon. King of kings and Lord of lords.

In conclusion, should you fly to the hills for help, the mountains will be reeling like drunken men. Your houses will be no refuge, for they were crumbling and falling. The grateful and trembling heart is to know that though the mountains be carried into the midst of the sea, there are some things that cannot be shaken, and these are some of the things that cannot be shaken.

"Even from everlasting to everlasting Thou art God, Thy kingdom is an everlasting kingdom. The mercy of the Lord is from everlasting to everlasting."

R. EMERSON, Chairman. Publishing House.

MORAL REFORM

We, your Committee, on Moral Reform submit the following report:
We live in a day when the bottom seems to have dropped out of
public morals. Restraining influences are being only feebly exerted and
the tide is in the direction of human looseness and recklessness in conduct which spells disaster for the nation and literally kills the soul impulses of men.

The obligation of the Church is twofold, first, to warn and protect both old and young within her walls against the dangers of this downward trend in morals, and second, to exert a positive and effective protest against current evils through the regenerative influences of the gospel. The Church shall be successful in this only as she is able through prayer and holy living to unlock the heavens and bring the power of God to help keep within the radius of that company whom God delights to bless and honor.

We believe that Bible holiness is the only true standard of character and that sober, righteous and godly living is the only true standard of conduct—divinely adaptable and appropriate for both old and young. We would discourage any trend toward a social program in the Church designed for young people who are supposedly at an age where they cannot appreciate the prayer meeting or the revival service, but would recommend that our young people be urged to vital Christian living and be given an active place in the spiritual program of the Church. Some group gatherings more largely on the level of the social or recreational life have possibilities of good in them particularly for youth when Christian leadership and influences predominate.

The following churches show increased contributions toward postor's support: Ames, Belleville, Chapman Creek, Clay Center, Eskridge, Gaylord and Cedar, Heber, Phillipsburg and Iowa Union, Langley, Miltonvale, Ottawa, Wesley Center, Wichita Mission and Williams Chapel.

The following churches raised every item of the budget in full: Kansas City, Kansas; Topeka, First and Topeka, Gage Park. Over the Conference as a whole the Budget was approximately two-thirds raised.

Subscriptions to the Wesleyan Methodist have nearly doubled during the year, there being a total of 326, or an average of one subscription to every four members of the church.

RESOLUTIONS

- 1. Evangelistic Help.—Resolved, That the Camp Ground and Camp Meeting Committee be authorized, if they see fit to do so, to engage Evangelistic help for Camp Meeting two years in advance.
- 2. Pastor's Support.—Resolved, That it be a part of the Quarterly Conference Evangelist's duties at the first Quarterly Meeting to assist the Stewards of the Circuits to secure proper subscriptions for the Pastor's support.
- 3. Election of Conference Officers.—Resolved, That the Kansas Conference fix the second day of its regular session as the time of the election of its Conference Officers.
- 4. Subscription Lists.—Resolved, That all subscription lists and money raised at Conference for all purposes be put through the hands of the Conference Treasurer or the Treasurer of the W. H. & F. M. Society, and that all subscription lists be kept by these Treasurers, and that notice of indebtedness be given all subscribers by means of a list sent to their pastors early in the year.
- 5. Sanctity of God's House.—Resolved, That such work as making quilts and disposing of the same be performed in the homes of the people and not in the houses erected for public worship.
- 6. Pastor's Moving Expenses.—Resolved, That the class hiring a Minister shall within ten days after his arrival pay to him his moving expenses, this not to be applied on his salary.
- 7. Support of Conference Evangelist.—Resolved, That in case the Conference Evangelist arrives on any circuit to hold the Quarterly Meeting and service cannot be held on account of storm or other causes, provision shall be made by the Church to recompense the Conference Evangelist.
- 8. Statistical Report.—Resolved, That the Conference require each Pastor and Evangelist to submit their Statistical Reports upon the first roll call at the opening of the Conference. If it is not possible for him to be present at the opening session of the Conference, he shall mail his report to the Conference Secretary so that it may be submitted at that time.
- 9. Reporting All Offerings to Pastors.—Resolved, That all monies be reported to the Pastors for entry on their Statistical Report in order to give due credit both to the Charge and to the Conference.

- 10. Conference Evangelists.—Resolved, That it be the sense of our Conference that our Conference Evangelists by virtue of their office, if not elected as members, be advisory members of the Committee on Pastoral Relations.
- 11. Subscription Lists Record.—Resolved, That the President and the Conference Evangelist be supplied with all Subscription Lists taken at Conference to be carried with them in traveling the Conference, and that the Secretary supply all Pastors with such Subscription Lists.
- 12. Unleavened Bread.—Resolved, That it be the sense of this Conference that all our Churches use unleavened bread in the administration of the Lord's Supper. We suggest the following recipe: ½ cup flour, 1 teaspoon butter (heaping), moisten with milk enough to roll. Mark in ½ inch squares and make as pie dough. The above will serve 50 persons.
- 13. Pastor Nominates Steward.—Resolved, That it be the sense of this Conference that the Pastor be granted the privilege of nominating one member to the Board of Stewards from each Church on his Charge.
- 14. Group Convention Leaders.—Resolved, That a Convention Committee be composed of representatives of the W. H. & F. M. S., Holiness Conventions, Sunday School Rally, and the W. Y. P. S. for their respective Districts to plan such joint Conventions over such period of days as they may see fit.
- 15. To Hold Quarterly Meetings.—Resolved, That the Conference President shall travel the Conference and care for one-half of the Quarterly Meetings.

Further, That we have a Conference Evangelist who shall travel the Conference and care for the other half of the Quarterly Meetings, together with any other duties assigned him by the Conference.

- 16. Offerings For Minutes.—Resolved, That the Pastors of the various Charges of the Conference take an offering on their Charge some time during the year to defray the expense of publishing the Conference Minutes, the amount of the same to apply on the Conference Budget.
- 17. Inspection of Church Property.—Resolved, That it is the sense of the Annual Conference that the Conference President and Quarterly Conference Evangelist should inquire at each Quarterly Conference whether the local church property is properly repaired and insured.

THE KANSAS CONFERENCE

- 18. Opening Date of Conference.—Resolved, That the opening date for Conference be on the Monday nearest August 10.
- 19. Night Services Evangelistic.—Resolved, That it is the sense of this body that all its night services be conducted along strictly evangelistic lines.
- 20. Nominating Committee.—Resolved, That all Conference Sessional Committees be filled through a Nominating Committee, and that the Conference President be Chairman ex-officio.
- 21. Delegate Arranging for Pastor.—Resolved, That if any Delegate leaves Conference without completing arrangements for a Pastor, the Pastoral Relations Committee may be free to appoint to their Charge any Pastor that they may select.
- 22. Theological Institute.—Resolved, That the Theological Institute begin the first Monday in April and continue through Thursday, and that the Ministerial Association begin Thursday at 2 P. M. of that week and continue over Friday.
- 23. Vote on Pastor.—Resolved, That we as a Conference set the second week in June as the time when the Churches shall take the vote on retaining their Pastor, providing he has not expressed his purpose to change.

- 6. That we pay Sister Woodruff \$13.14 out of the money returned from the closed bank.
- 7. That we place \$15.00 of the money returned from the closed bank into the Conference Mission Fund.
 - 8. That we give Sister McLeister \$15.00 on her expenses.
- 9. That we allow the Assistant Recording Secretary her bill of postage, also the Y. M. W. B. Superintendent her bill of postage and traveling expenses.
- 10. We, as a W. H. & F. M. Society, wish to express our appreciation to the Annual Conference for their courtesy and kindness during the past years in paying for printing the Conference Minutes and we desire to present \$10.00 to the Conference Treasurer to help defray the expenses this year.

REPORT OF AUDITING COMMITTEE

We, the Auditing Committee, find the Treasurer's books correct.

BESSIE CAMPBELL, Chairman.

PLAN OF WORK

We, the Committee on Plan of Work, hereby recommend the following:

Division I. Local Work

- 1. That this Plan of Work and the Efficiency Standard be read quarterly in each Local Society.
 - 2. That we observe the "Red Letter Days":
 - A. Harvest Home Day for Educational Work.
 - B. Easter-programs, gifts and offerings for Home Missions.
- C. The World Day of Prayer—that we cooperate in observing the World Day of Prayer.
- D. May Day—to be known as gift day, bandages and such gifts as can be sent with out-going missionaries or used in our home field.
- 3. That October 19 be observed as Harvest Home Day. We urge each Local Society to send cash or make donations to the Dormitory and report the same to the Harvest Home Committee to receive credit on the Educational Budget.
- 4. That by recommendation of the General Conference Society all local dues be sent to our Conference Treasurer and be divided as follows: 25 cents to be forwarded to the Treasurer of the General Conference for general fund; 25 cents to be retained in the Conference treasury, and the remaining 50 cents be used for missionary work and be applied on Local Church Budget. Please designate specifically where credit is desired.
- 5. That each Local Society elect a Solicitor for the Wesleyan Missionary, the same to be a permanent officer. Her duties shall be to secure renewals and fill up the quota for her society.
- 6. We recommend the use of a monthly envelope system for the collection of dues, the Treasurer to keep record of the amounts paid in.
- 7. That each Society contribute 10 cents per member to pay General Conference Delegate's expenses.
- 8. That each Society contribute at least \$6.00 for Home Missions Connectionally supported.
- 9. That each Society contribute at least \$5.00 to the Hephzibah Orphanage. Such contribution to be applied on the Budget.

WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH

- 10. That the Annual Report and Efficiency Standard be in the hands of the Committee on Statistics, Mrs. N. Mae Clark, 674 Watson Ave., Topeka, Kansas, two weeks before Conference. The names of out-going President and Secretary should appear on the regular report and the names of the newly elected President and Secretary should appear on the back of the Report Blank.
- 11. That the President of each Local Society be made responsible to arrange with the Pastor for one evening of the third week of each month to pray especially for the Mission work; the same to be preceded by a day of fasting. We also recommend that an offering be taken at each of these services:
- A. September and February for Miss Woodruff, our nurse in training.
- B. October, for the Educational Deficit. We urge that each Society make this \$1.50 if possible in order to complete payment of our pledge.
- C. November for Missions in the Kansas Conference. This applies on Budget.
- D. December for Miss Grace Davis, Taulbee, Ky., Zion's Hill Mission. Let the offering consist of little remembrances as well as cash.
- E. January, for Miss Esther Sniffin, Taulbee, Ky., another of our Kansas girls who too can use small articles in furnishing her little home.
- F. The remaining offerings to be devided half Home and half Foreign. This also applies on Budget.
- 12. We recommend the use of the programs printed in the Wesleyan Missionary.
- 13. That all bandages be sent to Rev. E. F. McCarty, 222 S. Clemens Ave., Lansing, Michigan, receiving credit of 50 cents per pound but does not apply on Local Church Budget. Before sending donations of clothing for use in Home Mission work secure information from the workers concerning proper addresses for mailing packages. See Magazine Directory for addresses.
- 14. That all money be disbursed through our Local and Conference Treasurers. That all money or receipts applying on Budget be sent from the Local W. H. & F. M. S. Treasurer to the Conference Treasurer. This money should all be in the hands of the Conference Treasurer by August 1. That each Local Society use the Treasurer's Book prepared

by the General Conference Society, the same to be audited by a committee of two before the report is adopted.

15. That each Local President appoint a committee of two whose duty shall be to visit the sick and to work in harmony with the Pastor in rendering assistance that will help in reaching souls and building up the Kingdom of God.

Division II. Conference Work

- 16. That the W. H. & F. M. S. Conference open Thursday at 10 A. M. of camp meeting week, and that we accept the kindly offer of the Camp Meeting Committee giving us the first Sabbath afternoon of the Camp for our public meeting.
- 17. That our Conference President, Y. M. W. B. Superintendent, and District Organizers arrange two programs for the coming year, the first to be on Foreign Missions at Convention time and the second on Home Missions at Easter time.
- 18. That the President and District Organizers arrange the time and recommend the worker for the convention. Also that they prepare the schedule for the visitation of our worker and report through our Church publications.
- 19. That each District be supervised by the District Organizer under the direction of the Conference President. The Organizer shall be Prayer Secretary and Magazine Committee of her District and shall report the condition of her District to the President quarterly. We suggest that each Organizer make definite plans for the observance of the World Day of Prayer.
 - 20. The Districts are as follows:
- District 1.—Topeka 1st, Gage Park, Ottawa, Fairview, Eskridge, William's Chapel, Kansas City, Kansas City, Mo.; Willis, Easton.
- District 2.—Clay Center, Chapman Creek, Bethany Chapel, Wesley Chapel, Abilene, Antioch, Manning, Miltonvale.
- District 3.—Concordia, Hall, Belleville, New Hope, Morgan Chapel, Heber, Hollis.
- District 4.—Wichita Church, Wichita Mission, Excelsior, Grace Chapel.
- District 5.—Mankato, Wesley Center, Formoso, Victor, Cedar, Phillipsburg, Iowa Union, Inglewood, Gaylord.

WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH

- 21. That each Society grade themselves by the Efficiency Standard. A grade of ten per cent will be given on each of any ten points chosen. Societies making a grade of 90 per cent will receive honorable mention and those making a grade of 100 per cent will be placed on the Honor Roll.
- 22. That the Gleaners observe the monthly prayer hour. That each be a subscriber to the Wesleyan Missionary, or a 20 per cent increase in subscriptions and furnish ten pounds of bandages and write at least once to each of the Mission Fields.

' Division III. Moral Reform

- 23. In these days of sinful nudeness and carelessness in dress even among professed Christian women we feel the need of emphasizing that our women of the W. H. & F. M. Societies be modest examples in their dress and in the dress of their children, encouraging others to do likewise.
- 24. In the coming election of November, 1934, when the voters decide the fate of the Eighteenth Amendment in our state, we believe we are facing the most important crisis in the history of Kansas. Hence we urge, first, that we as a missionary organization cooperate with other dry organizations in combatting the liquor interests; second, that we educate our children and youth concerning the evils of 3.2 per cent beer and all other intoxicating liquors; third, that we urge our women to vote against the liquor interests at the November election; lastly, that we beseech the Throne of Grace for divine assistance in this combat with the enemies of Prohibition.
