#### STANDING RULES

#### Conference

1. CONFERENCE AND CAMP DATE: The Conference shall begin annually at 1:30 p.m. on the first Tuesday in August for the organization of Conference business and committee work, and continue through Saturday night or until completed, and Camp shall begin the first Sunday morning following the beginning of Conference and continue through the second Sunday.

2. ORDER OF BUSINESS: Inasmuch as it is the desire of the Conference to complete its business as soon as possible it is recommended that the

following order of business be followed:

FIRST, the front ten rows of the middle sections and the platform of

the tabernacle constitute the Conference bar.

SECOND, all recommendations to travel or study be turned directly to the assistant secretary, who shall turn them to the committee on Itineracy and Orders.

THIRD, Ministers' reports shall be given immediately after the officers

reports are given and continue whenever other business will permit.

FOURTH, business shall continue from 8:30 a.m. to 12:00 noon and

from 1:30 p.m. to the hour for the orders of the day.

3. NOMINATING COMMITTEE: There shall be a Nominating Committee of five stationed elders, including the president as chairman ex-officio, and five delegates elect. There shall be an alphabetical rotation of the churches from year to year, as well as an alphabetical rotation of elders serving on the committee, excluding elders' wives where both husband and wife are elders.

The 1963 committee shall be: C. W. Dunbar, Frank Gilger, Lowell Gilger, R. J. Gilbert, Orville Hall; the delegates elect from Kansas City, Immanuel; Lawrence, Lawrence Creek, Leavenworth, Manhattan. The purpose of this

committee shall be:

First, examine the credentials that are in the hands of the committee at the time of its first meeting.

Second, nominate all sessional committees and be prepared to report at

the first session of Conference.

Third, examine all delegates' credentials, whether regular or alternate, which are turned in to the committee after the first seating of delegates, and to report such to the Secretary, who shall read he names added to the roll at the next session at which they are automatically seated, if no objections are raised.

Fourth, nominate the personnel of all the Conference Boards and report

at an early session of the Conference.

Fifth, nominate the committee chairmen for the next year, including a full statistical committee to be elected to serve the next year, and the Ministerial Association Committee.

Sixth, nominate the District Chairmen.

Seventh, nominate the editor of the "Wesleyan Visitor," the Sunday School Secretary, Tithing Secretary, Educational Secretary, Temperance Education Secretary, and Secretary of Men's Fellowship.

4. PRESIDENT TO APPOINT TELLERS: Following the convening of Conference, and previous to the Orders of the Day for election of Conference

Officers, the President shall appoint tellers for the occasion.

5. PRESIDENT'S DUTIES: The Conference President's duties shall be (A.) Travel the Conference, visiting each church at least twice during the

year. The time of the visits and rotation of field and office work shall be left

to the arrangement of the president.

(B.) Secure quarterly reports of the pastors, and the Minister's Annual Report to the Conference, using the findings of the same for the purpose of promoting the spiritual and material welfare of the churches and the conference.

(C.) Urge the proper repair and insurance of church property.

(D.) The President may upon his own initiative or upon the request of the Board of Stewards or the pastor of a local church call a meeting to help arrange a workable financial plan for the church.

(E.) Raise funds for the church extension program.

- 6. AUDITING OF FINANCIAL REPORTS: All financial reports together with the books that are to be audited by the Conference Auditing Committee shall be submitted to said committee before being read on the Conference floor.
- 7. INTRODUCTION OF NEW BUSINESS: All new business of such a nature as to require an election must be presented not later than noon of the third day of Conference.
- 8. ORDERS OF THE DAY: (A) The Camp Meeting and Campground Committee are permanently the Committee on Orders of the Day, to prepare ahead of time the Conference Program for publication in the "Wesleyan Visitor," (B) The following services are fixed as permanent Orders of the Day:

Tuesday evening, Conference Sermon at 7:30 by the Conference

President.

Wednesday morning, Report of the president and the treasurer, followed by the election of officers.

Wednesday evening, Education service at 7:30.

Thursday evening, Public service of the W.M.S. at 7:30.

Friday evening, Sunday School service at 7:30.

Saturday evening, Youth Rally at 7:30.

Sunday morning, Ordination service at 9:30.

- 9. CAMP MEETING COMMITTEE: The President of Wesleyan Youth is a member ex-officio of the Camp Meeting Committee.
- 10. EVANGELISTIC HELP: The Campground and Camp Meeting Committee is authorized to engage evangelistic help for the Camp Meeting as far in advance as deemed advisable.
- 11. ADDITIONAL DELEGATES: (A) The delegate for an elder residing outside the bounds of the conference whose membership is with a church within the conference shall be elected by the church of which he is a member.
- (B) The delegate for an elder residing outside the bounds of the conference whose church membership is with a church outside the bounds of the conference shall be elected as follows: The president shall designate the church from which the delegate shall be elected.
- (C) When more than one delegate from any one church presents credentials to this body, there shall appear in the credentials the name of the elder that entitles the church to the additional delegate.
- 12. PENSION PLAN: Time will be given at each Annual Conference for the promotion of the Pension Plan and it is the duty of the Pension Plan

Board to arrange for such service.

- 13. TENURE OF OFFICE: All Conference Officers shall continue in office until the close of the annual session of Conference.
- 14. VACATIONS: The Conference President shall be granted a vacation over two Sundays, that the greater part of three weeks might be taken if desired, and he shall be given two weeks pay in addition to his regular salary at the time he chooses for vacation.
- 15. CONVEYING PROPERTY: All instruments conveying property for church or parsonage use shall carry the official name of the church, viz., "The Kansas Conference of The Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, Inc."
- 16. TRUSTEES AUTHORIZED: All action taken heretofore by the Trustees of the Annual Conferences concerning the purchase or conveyance of real estate are hereby approved and confirmed and held to be as binding upon the Annual Conference as they would have been if such actions on the part of the Trustees had been specifically authorized by the Annual Conference.

  The duly elected and qualified Trustees of the Annual Conference are

The duly elected and qualified Trustees of the Annual Conference are hereby authorized and directed to take such necessary action as to them seems proper and expedient and to the interest of the Annual Conference and the local church concerning the purchase, sale, mortgaging, and conveying of real estate during the interim between the meeting of the Annual Conference; and all such actions so taken by the Trustees shall be deemed to be legal and binding upon the Annual Conference and as full force as they would have been if such actions on the part of the Trustees had been specifically authorized by the Annual Conference.

- 17. BOARD OF BUILDING AND LOCATION: (A.) The Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location shall consist of the Missionary Board and the Conference Trustees; (B.) The Missionary Board shall be composed of five elders, including the President as chairman, ex-officio, and four laymen, with not more than three of the members being changed in a given year; (C.) The travel expense of the Board of Building and Location shall be allowed at the rate of 3¢ per mile in excess of 100 miles round-trip, the same to be taken from the Missionary Board Treasury.
- 18. CONFERENCE LOANS: The Conference Treasurer shall issue no loans from any Conference monies except by sanction of the Conference Trustees.
- 19. SUBSCRIPTION LISTS: All subscription lists and monies raised at Conference for all purposes shall be put through the hands of the Treasurers of the Conference, the W.M.S., or the Camp Meeting Committee; and said Treasurers shall furnish the Conference President with a copy of the subscription lists which they hold that he may furnish each pastor with a list of subscriptions from his charge.
- <sup>2</sup> 20. CANDIDATES TO ELDERS' ORDERS: All candidates to Elders' Orders shall present the Committee on Itineracy and Orders a transcript of credits which may be accepted in lieu of the Conference course and a list of books and reading other than textbooks.
- 21. PRAYER CONVENTION: Each district shall hold a District Prayer Convention, and the District Chairman shall be responsible for planning such Conventions, the time and place to be announced in an issue of the "Wesleyan Visitor."

#### Local Church

The following rules which pertain to the local churches shall be read by

the pastors to their people within six weeks after the receipt of the Conference Minutes and at least four weeks before the Annual Conference.

22. PASTORS PAID THROUGH CONFERENCE: The Church's financial obligation to the pastor, whether he is leaving the field or not, shall be extended through the Conference and Camp Meeting period.

23. PASTOR'S MOVING EXPENSE: The Church hiring a minister shall

assume all responsibility of moving expense.

- 24. PASTOR'S EXPENSE AT ANNUAL CONFERENCE: Inasmuch as the pastor is actually a representative of the local church at the Annual Conference and Camp, the local churches shall pay the expenses of the Pastor and his wife, including room, board and transportation, the same to be paid in advance.
- 25. SUNDAY SCHOOL ATTENDANCE: (A) The two lowest Sundays of the fiscal year shall not be counted in the Sunday school average attendance reports made to Conference; (B) Our Sunday schools shall determine their attendance by counting only those who arrive in time to attend a portion of the class period.

26. QUARTERLY MEETING DATES: The first quarterly meeting of the conference year is to be held three months from the closing date of the previous conference fiscal year and they are to continue throughout the year at regular three month intervals. Pastors are urgently requested to make proper provision for the observance of the Lord's Supper at these intervals.

27. PASTORS RELEASED FOR ONE MEETING: At the request of the Missionary Board a church so approached shall release its pastor for one meeting, the same to be held on a new field or one of the weaker charges under the direction of said Board, and the local church shall pay its pastor's salary during the engagement. The pastor so engaged shall receive money for the special meeting expenses incurred during such employment, the same to be paid by the church or charge being served, or by the Missionary Board.

28. PASTOR NOMINATES STEWARD: The pastor shall be granted the privilege of nominating one member of the Board of Stewards from each

church on his charge.

29. REPORTING OF ALL CONTRIBUTIONS: The Conference President and each pastor shall urge the people to make all contributions through their local church and society treasuries, in view of the more equitable distribution of funds.

30. VACATIONS: Each church shall grant its pastor a two Sunday leave of absence from his work, that at least two full weeks might be spent for vacation and the church shall give him one week's pay in addition to his regular salary at the time agreed upon by pastor and church for vacation.

31. MONEY TO TREASURER: The treasurers are urged to send all remittances to the Conference Treasurer in whole dollars when possible; and the local treasurers are to send budget money each quarter to the Conference

Treasurer.

32. CHURCH DELEGATE EXPENSE: The local church shall pay the room, board and transportation expenses of all authorized delegates to the

Annual Conference, the same to be paid in advance.

33. CHURCH EXTENSION: One Sunday per month shall be designated by each church for receiving a special Sunday School offering, the same to be given to the Missionary Board for church extension and to help weaker churches not yet self-supporting, and the pastor and superintendent shall help

stimulate the giving in these offerings. These monies are to be loaned without

interest under the supervision of the Missionary Board.

34. UNLEAVENED BREAD: All our churches shall use unleavened bread in the administration of the Lord's Supper. We suggest the following recipe: One-half cup of flour, one rounded tablespoon of butter, moisten with water enough to roll. Mark in ½-inch squares and bake as pie dough. This recipe will serve 65 to 70 people.

35. ROOM RESERVATIONS: Any person reserving rooms in Conference or School dormitories shall pay room rent one year in advance. In the event the room is not to be used at Conference, the party shall inform the one in charge by the opening day of Conference, in which case monies received shall be refunded provided the one in charge is notified on or before the first

day of Conference.

36. SOLICITATION OF FUNDS: (A) Requests by and plans of all organizations and individuals desiring to visit the churches of the Conference for the purpose of soliciting funds, shall be referred to and cleared by a committee composed of the President of the Conference, the President of the W.M.S., and the Treasurer of the Missionary Board, before the completion of such plans with the local churches; (B) We urgently recommend that 50% of all monies solicited from the churches of the Conference for projects not sponsored by the Conference or the Wesleyan Methodist Denomination shall be retained by the local church involved and contributed to Denominational Missions or to Conference Church Extension.

37. VOTE ON THE PASTOR: (A) The Churches shall conduct their pastoral vote between the fourth Sunday in May and the second Sunday in June. If for any reason a church or pastor deems it necessary to hold the pastoral vote at an earlier date, approval must be secured from the Conference President and his Advisory Board. (B) To avoid uncertainty and to allow equality among all churches and pastors, it is strongly urged that the pastor who is not returning the following year shall refrain from giving such information to his church until first advising the Conference President. (C) Each pastor shall answer any return call to a church within a period of one week after receiving said call (unless the Committee agrees to an extension which shall not exceed one extra week). (D) Each pastor shall answer any church extending a new call within a period of ten days and in each instance the pastor shall inform the Conference President of his decision.

38. PARSONAGE RENT: It shall be the responsibility of the local trustees and the pastor to determine the allowance for parsonage rent. This allowance should reflect the current local rental scale for comparable facilities.

39. INSURANCE: (A) Since the group insurance plan adopted by the Conference could well effect the economy of the local church, it is urged that each church pay at least half of their pastor's group insurance premium.

(B) In the event of a change of pastors, the church's responsibility shall include the August premium.

Pastor

40. 1½% ASSESSMENT TO BE PAID: Every active minister of the Kansas Conference receiving an appointment by the Conference shall be required to pay 1½% assessment on the total receipts for the current Conference year as determined by the rules and regulations of the Pension Plan of The Wesleyan Methodist Church of America; membership in the plan being optional with the minister.

41. CALLING LIST: The Conference asks each pastor to prepare a calling list of all the homes connected with the church and Sunday School, listing the relationship they hold to the church, listing their names and addresses by city, street and number; the same to be kept for his work while on the pastorate and to give to his successor on the field.

42. PASTORS VACATING PARSONAGE: Each pastor when moving from his charge shall vacate the parsonage during the first week following the close of Camp Week or at such time as designated by the Annual Conference

or the President and his Advisory Board.

43. FISCAL YEAR: (A) The closing date of the fiscal year shall be June 30, and we request that all statistical reports be in the hands of the Conference Treasurer by July 15. We further request that he forward the blanks to the Statistical Chairman not later than July 25. (B) Delegate credentials, a copy of the statistical report and the report of the Minister to the Annual Conference (sometimes referred to as the Character Report) should be sent to the Con-

ference President not later than July 20.

44. WESLEYAN VISITOR: (A) The Conference shall publish the periodical known as the "Wesleyan Visitor," the single subscription price to be \$1.00 per year beginning July 1, 1963; (B) The Publication Board shall consist of the Conference President and Treasurer and Editor; (C) Each Church of the Conference shall receive one subscription for every two full members and shall remit at the rate of 65¢ per copy to the Editor; (D) The "Visitor" shall be sent to the Area Wesleyan Youth President; the Conference Presidents, Sunday School Secretaries, Wesleyan Youth Presidents of this Area; the General President and Executive Secretary of Wesleyan Youth; the Editor of the Wesleyan Methodist and the General Superintendents. We further urge the Editor to contact Editors of the papers of the other Conferences and arrange with them an exchange of the same. The expense of the above shall be paid from the Conference Fund.

45. MINISTERIAL ASSOCIATION: (A) The Annual Convention of the Ministerial Association shall begin on the second Tuesday of March and continue through Thursday of the same week. (B) An offering equivalent to 25¢ per member shall be taken in each local church, to be sent to the chairman of the Ministerial Association. Such monies shall be used to defray the traveling expenses of the pastors whose salary is \$1,850 or less, at the rate of 2¢ per mile, round trip; also the pastor and his wife from said churches shall be given \$1.00 each per day for meals. (C) Pastors from the more distant churches that are over 200 miles round trip from the Convention shall be paid 2¢ per mile in excess of 400 miles round trip; irrespective of salary. (D) The Ministerial Association Committee with the President of the Conference shall be authorized to engage Convention speakers as far in advance as it may seem advisable.

46. MORAL REFORM: In recognition of a growing indifference to the social and political sins of our time, and a concern for the preservation of the foundations upon which has been built our Church and Country, we as Weslevan Methodist strongly urge the following positions:

A. DRUNKENNESS: For us to remain a nation worthy to be called both civilized and Christian it is necessary that we oppose with all available means the use of intoxicating beverages. Total abstinence, be it assuredly

known, is the position of Wesleyan Methodist people everywhere.

B. IMMORALITY: During the decline and to the end of historic civilizations there has always been an accompanying break-down of morals. Obscene literature, vulgar language, maudlin jokes, lewdness and perversion quite common today should be a warning to us. We deplore any tendency to minimize such things or to shrug off their seriousness.

C. COMMUNISM: No thoughtful person is unaware of the fact that Communism is making steady gains in all the world. We call for an end to indifference and would urge upon all a greater fear and a better understand-

ing of this great evil. We urge a more vigorous opposition to it.

D. ROMANISM: Let it not be forgotten that self-styled and admittedly unchanging and unchangeable Romanism is as convinced today as ever in the past that Protestants are "heretics" and undesirable. In countries where her power makes it possible she proceeds today, as always to persecute and would, if possible, exterminate the so-called "heretic." Respect for our neighbor should not blind us to what he could and may yet be induced to do to us, should political power enough to accomplish it ever fall into his hands.

E. MATERIALISM: The word "Materialism," like the word "Worldliness," is a bit ambiguous. For the most part they mean the same thing. Reduced to their simple meaning, either word has to do with a common trend to be possessed by possessions, snared by the sensual and fascinated by foolishness. Mere THINGS, like the husks on which the prodigal fed, do not satisfy. We should remain careful lest they become too important to us.

F. ONE-WORDISM: Since UNESCO propaganda has largely made Patriotism obsolete and loyalty to the American flag only secondary to that of the United Nations, be it known that patriotically Wesleyans are Americans and proud to remain so. We remain believers in the "free-enterprise" system as opposed to all forms of State Socialism. We believe in traditional so-called "state's rights" and that the Federal Government if becoming too dominant may cease to be "by, of and for the people." Instead of remaining the servant of the people of sovereign States, an overmuch centralized Government may well become the master of the people.

The Eskridge Band received the lighted picture as first place Honor Band, and Wichita West Side received a reading Course Book as second place honor Band.

The theme of the program was "What We Learn in the Y.M.W.B." The following outline was followed: WE SING, demonstrated by Uncle Lynn and the children, ase they sang a number of choruses; WE LEARN GOD'S WORD; and the Abilene Band gave the Y.M.W.B. Scriptures, memorized this past

year. WE LEARN ABOUT GREAT MISSIONARIES; The Morgan Chapel Band represented several of the Great Missionaries and told some interesting things about each. WE LEARN ABOUT OUR OWN MISSIONARIES; The Abilene Band gave a review of some of our own Missionaries. WE READ: seated around a table, several members of the Clay Center Band, told of the Reading Course, as outlined by the Y.M.W.B. WE GIVE: At this time the Bethany Chapel Band represented the five Missionary Children supported by the Kansas Y.M.W.B. and mention was made of the various projects the Y.M.W.B. have helped to support this year.

5. That the money be sent quarterly to the Superintendent, Mrs. Oletha Hoerner, 216 N.E. 4th, Abilene, Kansas. Quarters ending September 30, December 31, March 31, and June 30 and remittances postmarked not later than the third of the following month.

6. Our membership goal to be 2,700 and our goal for dues and offerings

to be \$4,600.

- 7. That at Conference an award be given to the Band that has met the largest number of the following items:
  - (1) For having reached a goal of 100% on the Efficiency Standard.
  - (2) For having the greatest per cent increase in membership.

(3) For raising the largest amount of money per member.

(4) For bringing a poster or membership chart to Conference.

(5) For at least 50% of the active members memorizing the assigned Scripture.

(6) For fulfilling obligations mentioned in items 10, 11, and 12 of

this Plan of Work.

8. The New Superintendent elected at the annual election of the W.M.S. take office at the beginning of the new Conference Year and the same to be treasurer of the band. We request each Superintendent to attend Conference if possible. She will be seated in the W.M.S. sssions, but without voting privileges.

9. The superintendents' books be closed June 30, and the annual report sent to the Conference Superintendent, postmarked not later than July 5, 1962.

10. One cent per active and honorary member be sent to the Conference Superintendent as General Conference Expense.

Superintendent as Desk Fund. (Superintendent's Expense)

#### MORAL REFORM

To the Kansas Woman's Missionary Society, we submit the following report:

In the light of the Word as found in First Peter the third chapter, we find admonition given to Christian women of all time in these words, "While they

DECEMBE

(the people) behold your chaste conversation coupled with fear.

"Whose adorning, let it not be that outward adorning. . . . But let it be the hidden man of the heart, in that which is not corruptible, even the ornament of a meek and quiet spirit, which is in the sight of God of great price."

This is the manner in which holy women should adorn themselves. Surely the great display of pride we see so prevalent among so-called Christian people is an abomination to the Lord. (Prov. 6:7)

Billy Graham, in a recent newspaper release, gave five major reasons for the decline of American society. The five reasons are:

- 1. We in America have gone on a sex binge that has no parallel in history.
- 2. Our preoccupation with materialism.
- 3. Our lust for pleasure-physical and sensual.
- 4. Our building of armaments. I tell you all the arms we build will not save us.
- 5. The decay of religion in America. We play at being Christians. We believe in God with our intellects. We serve Him with our lips.

Also in cautioning teen-agers at the Chicago Crusade, Billy Graham said, "It is almost impossible for young people to live clean lives under today's conditions."

Quoting Mr. Graham, "Never before has there been a period in the history of the world when the sex stimulus has been thrust at us so often and at every angle.

"One out of every three and one-half marriages ends in divorce. The chances for young people's happiness in marriage is only one in two today."

We need as mothers to alert our young people to these dangers and do all we can to exert proper influence, good reading material, and wholesome godly examples in the home to bring our children up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord.

The annual report is to be prepared by the President, Secretary and Treasurer, which serves as an audit of the Treasurer's reports and send to the Chairman on Statistics—Mrs. Frances Miller, 914 W. Hi-Way 9, Concordia, Kansas, postmarked not later than July 10. Delegates credentials to be sent to Lorine Hotchkiss, 1117 Washington, Concordia, Kansas, by July 10.

12. Pledge at Public Conference Missionary Service: Library for Brainerd Indian School. Non-Budget.

13. Bring poster depicting missionary message to conference.

14. Each society shall grade themselves by the efficiency standard.

### EFFICIENCY STANDARD

1. That the Efficiency Standard be read in the society the first meeting after conference (5% credit) and that arrangement be made for one missionary prayer meeting each month (5% credit).

That a minimum of ten meetings be held during the year at which time prayer requests are presented and remembered and business transacted

(5% credit) and at least one public meeting (5% credit).

3. That a Women's World Fellowship Secretary be appointed by the local W.M.S. Executive Board, who shall promote the program of the General

Women's World Fellowship (5% credit). That a Women's World Prayer Circle be formed under the direction of the W.W.F. Secretary, and that the report be sent to the Conference W.W.F. secretary within sixty days after the annual conference (5% credit).

- 4. That a solicitor be elected for the Wesleyan Missionary, gaining not less than two subscriptions a year, and that she use the conference-church key combination on all subscriptions (5% credit). That the President, Secretary, Treasurer, and the equivalent of 75% of the active members be subscribers to the Wesleyan Missionary (5% credit).
- 5. That a Mission Study Secretary be elected and she report to the Conference Mission Study Secretary by January 15 (5% credit). That 10% of the active members read at least four of the recommended books (5% credit).
- 6. That a delegate be elected to the annual conference W.M.S. and that she be instructed by the local society regarding the amount to be pledged by that society at the annual conference session (5% credit) and that the Y.M.W.B. Superintendent be seated in the annual session and be granted the privilege of speaking, and provision be made by her society for such representation (5% credit).
- 7. That the \$1.00 membership dues be sent to the Conference W.M.S. Treasurer and be forwarded to the General W.M.S. Treasurer for the General Fund (10% credit).
- 8. That we secure every woman in the church as a member of the society, or achieve a ten per cent gain in total membership (10% credit).
- 9. That each local society pay annually into the Conference Working Fund the amount assessed by the Conference W.M.S. (10% credit).
- That the newly-elected local President or Vice-President attend the conference session and provision be made by her society for such representation (10% credit).

All societies making a grade of eighty per cent shall be on the Honor Roll.

#### CONFERENCE WORK

- 1. Conference goal for coming year: 850 active members; 325 honorary members; 1,000 magazines.
- 2. The Conference will provide some form of leadership training for W.M.S. members—clinics, workshops or training classes and one workshop for the Y.M.W.B. and Children's Workers annually.

- 7. The Nominating Committee shall be made up of the Executive Committee and two delegates from the Societies beginning with Abilene and Ancell (now Scott City) in 1958 and rotating in alphabetical order to:
  - a. Examine the credentials which are in the hands of the Committee at the time of its first meeting.

b. Nominate all sessional committees and District Leaders and be prepared to report at the first session of Conference.

- c. Examine all delegates' credentials whether regular or alternate which are turned in to the committee after the first seating of delegates and to report such to the Secretary, who shall read names added to the roll at the next session at which time they are automatically added to the roll and
- 8. All Committee Chairmen shall prepare three copies of the report on 8 by 11½-inch typewriting paper, double-spaced to be given to the Secretary.

#### STANDING RULES

The Standing Rules shall be read to the local within 30 days after conference and within 30 days of the closing of the fiscal year.

#### Conference

- 1. PRESIDENT'S ITINERARY: That the Conference Wesleyan Youth President visit each district once during the year. The itinerary of visitation shall be worked out with the District Chairmen so that mileage expenses may be kept at a minimum.
- 2. CONFERENCE YOUTH RALLY: The Conference Youth Rally shall be held Saturday evening of the week of conference, such meeting to be planned by the Executive Council. An attendance award shall be presented to the district earning the highest number of points. (The point schedule shall be determined by the Executive Council.)

3. BIBLE QUIZ CONTEST: A portion of the Annual Conference Youth Rally shall be given to a General Conference Bible Quiz and/or a Conference Bible Quiz Contest in lieu of a scheduled General Conference Contest.

A. The Conference Wesleyan Youth Vice President shall act in the capacity of Conference Bible Quiz Director to work with the Executive Committee in selection of the book to be used and to make necessary

preparation.

B. District Bible Contest teams' travel expense to all Conference Bible Quiz playoffs shall be paid from the Conference Fund at the rate of five cents per mile one way. It is suggested that board and room expense shall be paid by the respective districts.

4. EFFICIENCY STANDARD AWARD: An award shall be given to the "A" Local which earns the highest points on the efficiency standard. This award will be determined by per cent of gain in case of a tie for first place.

- 5. NOMINATING COMMITTEE: There shall be a nominating committee composed of the Wesleyan Youth Conference Executive Council and the first delegates elect from Manhattan and Mankato locals and pastors from Abilene and Antioch. (Locals rotate alphabetically.) The duties of the committee shall be:
  - A. To nominate all sessional committees for the current year, and committee chairmen for the ensuing year.
  - B. To examine all credentials and certificates.
  - C. To nominate all District Chairmen.
  - D. To nominate members of the standing committees.
  - E. To select tellers and secretaries to serve in the election of officers.
  - 6. ANNUAL WESLEYAN YOUTH CONFERENCE:
    - A. The Annual Wesleyan Youth Conference shall convene at 8:45 a.m. Saturday morning of the Annual Conference and shall continue business at 1:15 p.m., and each day following with the exception of Sunday until the following Tuesday noon. All unfinished business shall be at the call of the chair.
    - B. The first ten rows of the tabernacle and the recording table shall constitute the conference bar.
- 7. ORDERS OF THE DAY: Orders of the Day for the annual conference shall be:

#### SATURDAY 8:45 a.m.

- A. Report of the Nominating Committee.
- B. Report of the President.
- C. Report of the District Chairmen and Officers.
- D. Report of Youth Camp Directors.

#### MONDAY 8:45 a.m.

A. Election of officers.

#### WEDNESDAY MORNING

A. Youth Hike.

88. OFFICERS' EXPENSES: The expenses of the President and the Executive Council incurred in the interest of the Conference Wesleyan Youth shall be paid from the Conference Promotional Fund. (See finance report.)

9. PUBLIC RELATIONS DIRECTOR: The Public Relations Director

shall be a member of the Executive Council. His duties shall be:

A. To promote the interest of youth throughout the conference.

B. To serve as Wesleyan Youth Devotional Chairman for the Annual

Conference as well as for the Youth Conference and Camp.

10. STANDING RULES MAILED: A copy of the Standing Rules shall be mimeographed and mailed to the local presidents immediately following the closing of Wesleyan Youth Conference.

11. GUIDANCE: We recommend that the President attend the Youth sessions of such National Conventions as he and the Council would deem advisable, in order to keep posted on current youth trends.

#### District

12. RALLIES: We recommend that each district plan four rallies a year, and that the District Chairmen be responsible for making a report of these rallies to the Conference Visitor.

# Conference District

#### 13. YOUTH CAMPS:

- A. All Youth Camp Committees, programs, officers, and workers shall be approved by the Conference Executive Council.
- B. Youth Camp committees shall be composed of not less than five members.
- C. Members of the Executive Council whose churches are included in the Kansas Youth Camp shall serve on the Kansas Youth Camp Committee.
- D. Pastors and District Chairmen shall serve as the Youth Camp Committee for District Camps (Missouri and Colorado) and the District Youth Camp Director shall be elected by the District Youth Camp Committee.

#### Conference Local

14. CONFERENCE VISITOR: The local president and adult counselor shall receive the Conference Visitor; these subscriptions shall be paid by the conference Wesleyan Youth Treasurer with the post office committee compiling the subscription list. (See finance report.)

#### Local

15. YOUTH WEEK: Each local is urged to sponsor a Youth Week program. The Executive Council shall be responsible for all activities. Where Evangelistic help is secured, the evangelist, advertising, and financing are to be approved by the Advisory Committee of the church.

16. LEADERS: We urge that leaders for Wesleyan Youth services be carefully chosen and their names with lesson topics be posted quarterly. It is

recommended that the President lead at least once each quarter.

17. MISSIONARY MEETING: Emphasis should be given to the Missionary Meeting of the Wesleyan Youth, noting that the offering received applies on Church Budget and is divided 25 per cent to World Missions, 25 per cent to Church Extension and Evangelism, and 50 per cent to Education.

18. EDUCATIONAL SUNDAY: Emphasis should be placed on the disciplinary provision for an offering on Wesleyan Youth Educational Sunday, the third Sunday in July. All educational budget money received during the sum-

mer quarter may be credited to the Wesleyan Youth.

19. WESLEYAN YOUTH SUBSCRIPTION MONTH: Special emphasis shall be given to the circulation of the Wesleyan Youth (both new and renewal subscriptions) during the month of November. It is recommended that all members of the Local Executive Council have a subscription of the Wesleyan Youth.

- 20. MONEY TO TREASURER: All Locals sending money to the Conference Treasurer shall remit the same quarterly by check or money order rather than small change and the remittance slips should be used and filled out properly. This remittance shall be mailed within five days following the close of the quarter.
- 21. CONFERENCE REPRESENTATION: Attention shall be given to local representation at the Annual Wesleyan Youth Conference.

A. The newly elected President or Vice President.

B. Two delegates. (One additional delegate for locals whose member-ship exceeds twenty-five.)

C. The Pastor.

- D. In case there is no Wesleyan Youth Local, the pastor may appoint a representative. (age 13-40)
- 22. FISCAL YEAR: The Fiscal Year shall close the thirtieth of June and all monies sent to the Conference Youth Treasurer must be postmarked by the fifth of July; the Conference Treasurer's books and financial statement shall be sent to the Conference auditor the first week of the Annual Conference. All reports are to be sent to the Conference Youth Secretary by the twentieth of July. These include:
  - A. Annual Report.
  - B. Delegate Credentials.

C. Efficiency Standard Report.

23. LABORATORY DESK FUND: One service shall be designed for the promotion of the New Science Building Laboratory Desk Fund of M.W.C. (See finance report.)
