President, one minister and two laymen who shall be asked to submit to the next Annual Conference the details for such a long range plan and which are to include the following:

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON MEN'S MISSIONARY LEAGUE

We, your Committee, submit the following report:

We recommend that the Indiana Conference memorialize the General Conference next to meet in general session at Fairmount, Indiana in the month of June, 1951, to make the following changes or amendments to the Constitution of the proposed Men's Missionary League of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America:

1. In Article V, Paragraph 1, line 8, after the word "assigned," delete the words "one page," and insert the words "sufficient space each," and continue the remainder as it now is.

2. Amend Article VI to read as follows: "This constitution may be amended by majority vote of the full Board of Administration at any regular annual meeting, subject to the approval of the General Conference next in session."

3. Insert a new Article to be numbered VII, and entitled "Conference Officers," and number the paragraph entitled "Conference Promotional Secretary" as Number 1.

4. Insert a new paragraph to be numbered 2, entitled "Conference Men's Missionary League Treasurer," which shall read as follows:

(a) "The Treasurer of the Annual Conference shall be the Treasurer of this League for the Conference. All funds, save those properly designated for local League use, shall be sent to the Conference Treasurer quarterly, and he shall forward all such funds except that portion designated hereinafter for Conference use, to the General Secretary quarterly. He shall make a quarterly and an Annual report to the General Secretary on such forms as may be furnished for that purpose."

(b) In paragraph 4 of the same Article, line 2, place a comma after the word "organization" and add the words: "and shall make a financial report to all regular meetings of the Local League." In line 2, after the word "dues," delete the remainder of the paragraph and insert the words "except that portion which is to be retained for Local League use as hereinafter provided, to the Conference Men's Missionary League Treasurer once each quarter. Each society shall have the privilege of raising special offerings for local projects which are in accord with the Discipline of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. The Treasurer shall make a report to each Quarterly Conference, and a quarterly and an annual report to the Conference Men's Missionary League Treasurer."

5. In Article VII, Change the Article to read as follows:

"Each member shall pay as dues \$1.50 per year, fifteen cents of which may be retained for Local League use, and \$1.35 shall be sent to the Conference Treasurer, who shall retain ten cents of this amount for the expenses incidental to the work of the Conference Treasurer and the Conference Promotional Secretary. The balance of \$1.25 shall be sent to the General Secretary as provided above. Of this amount, twenty-five

cents may be used for general expense of this department, fifty cents shall be used for Foreign Missions, and fifty cents for Home Missions."

6. Amend Article IX to read as follows:

"This Constitution may be amended by a majority vote of the fall Board of Administration at any regular Annual Meeting, subject to the approval of the General Conference next in session."

We further recommend that there be no special magazines published for this League, but that the work be promoted as provided by this Constitution.

Resolutions and Laws of the Indiana Conference

I. Houses of Worship.

1. Our houses of worship should not be open to any evangelist or minister of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain a regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments. A waiving of the above by a contract or lease of building must be obtained through the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference.

II. Pastoral Duties.

1. It is the duty of the pastors to look after the insurance of our church and parsonage properties. All insurance shall provide for losses caused by fire and lightning, hail, and tornado. A failure on the part of the pastor shall be a censurable offense. If the church fails to insure their property upon reasonable effort of the pastor to secure the same, then said failure shall be reported to the President of the Conference who shall then have the property insured. In such case all insurance monies received from losses by fire, lightning, hail and tornado shall be used in Church Extension work as the Conference Board of Trustees considers best.

2. Each pastor and evangelist shall file a complete statistical report with the statistical committee before the close of the fifth day of August.

A. The pastor shall report in open conference the items listed on special blanks furnished by the Conference.

B. The official character of any pastor or evangelist shall not be passed until he shall have submitted a satisfactory report including statistics.

C. In compiling statistics report, all figures shall be given in even dollars at the nearest dollar, i. e., \$1.01 to \$1.50 shall be reported as \$1.00 and from \$1.51 to \$1.99 shall be reported as \$2.00. The item number VIII on benevolences alone to be excepted and shall be reported exactly as paid.

3. All unaccounted for members appearing in the statistics in the membership list shall be referred to the discontinued list. All members in excess of the number reported shall be reported received.

4. The pastor shall bring a report to each Quarterly Meeting and send a duplicate to the Conference President and Vice-President, quarterly, on blanks furnished by the Conference.

5. This Conference asks each pastor to prepare a calling list of all the homes connected with the Church and Sunday School; listing the relationship they hold to the church; listing their names and addresses by city; street and number, the same to be kept for his own work while on the pastorate and to be given to his successor on the field.

6. No pastor whose total receipts are \$1500.00 or more shall hold more than two revivals yearly away from his charge, one of which is mentioned in resolution seven under pastoral duties, unless by consent of the President and his Advisory Board.

7. Each pastor whose total pastor's receipts exceed \$2000.00 a year should seek to organize a new class or give his services in a revival meeting to a new or weaker church, to help to establish it. The church which he pastors should grant him such privileges without censure, with full remuneration of salary while in such a meeting. The Vice-President shall serve as Co-ordinator, to recommend and help arrange such meetings.

8. Delegate's Credentials secured from the Secretary shall be mailed to the Assistant Secretary by the pastor not later than ten days before the convening of Conference.

III. Churches.

1. All charges with a membership of twenty-five or more shall in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the pastor may live.

2. All charges and stations to which a pastor shall move shall pay the moving and transportation expenses of said pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary. When the Conference demands the services of any one, that it shall bear the moving expenses, if any expense shall thus be incurred.

3. No charge shall call any one as pastor, or to supply the work by ministers coming from other denominations as long as there are ministers in our Conference qualified and available to take work. The President after he has exercised his prerogative in the reception of ministers coming from other denominations, is to immediately refer them to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders, who shall make a thorough investigation as to the ministry and life of such applicants, who shall report their findings to the President, after which, appointments may be made.

4. Each charge should grant their pastor each year two weeks vacation with pay.

5. The Sunday School offerings of the first Sunday of each month shall be divided equally by the local treasurer between "Home Missions" and "Conference Expense Fund" until these budgets are in full. The same to be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer, quarterly.

IV. Conference.

1. Each Annual Conference shall be held at Fairmont, Indiana, beginning on the Tuesday nearest August fifteenth.

2. The first Sunday of the Annual Gathering belongs to the old conference year and the second Sunday of the Annual Gathering belongs to the new conference year.

3. The fiscal year begins August 1st and ends July 31st.

4. The sitting of the Conference for each day is considered as one meeting.

5. In examination of characters the Conference officials shall be called first.

6. The President and his advisory board shall be consulted before any love offering shall be taken.

7. The Secretary and the Assistant Secretary constitute a committee on communications.

8. The Assistant Secretary is to act as reporter of the Conference to the Marion daily papers.

9. The Treasurers shall submit their reports to the Auditing Committee who shall audit the same and in their report to this body they shall show they have audited the same.

10. The Board of Trustees are authorized to act as the Conference Missionary Board.

11. The Board of Trustees shall authorize all disbursements not otherwise provided for.

12. The President shall receive \$100.00, the Vice-President \$50.00, the Secretary \$100.00, the Treasurer \$300.00, the Assistant Secretary \$50.00, each member of the Auditing Committee \$10.00, each member of the Statistical Committee \$40.00; the same to be paid from the Conference Mission and Expense Fund. The Conference Sunday School Secretary shall receive \$100.00 and each member of the Conference Sunday School Board \$50.00, the same to be paid out of the Sunday School Treasury.

13. The President of the Conference, and Vice-President shall be given each year a two weeks' vacation with pay, said vacation to be at a time of their own choosing.

14. When the churches, which have been placed in the hands of the President, decides as to who shall be their pastor before the Minutes are sent to press, the same shall be entered in the minutes as if ordered by this Conference.

15. "The Emergency Benefit Fund" shall be used only for the relief of the Ministers, or their widows, of the Conference in times of sickness, or death, or other needs of emergency character. This fund to be administered by the Conference Board of Trustees.

16. There shall be a January Preachers' and Workers' convention held biennially in the four sections of the Conference. These conventions shall be held during the years in which the Marion College Area Ministers' Conventions are not held. The Vice-President shall be responsible for planning and conducting such Conventions. He may nominate and the Conference shall elect one man from each Conference District who shall serve with him on the Planning Committee.

17. The Building Committee shall be elected by the Missionary Board except one member who shall be elected by the Conference.

V. Committees

1. The Committee on Elders Orders is to transfer all persons to the study list who may have been recommended to travel and may not have been given work, providing they are meeting the disciplinary requirements in the course of study.

2. When recommendations to travel and to study preparatory to travel are presented to the Conference in session, they shall be recorded by the Secretary and automatically referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders, without having been read to the Conference.

3. The Camp Meeting Committee shall nominate and the Conference elect the one to preach the opening sermon of the next Conference Year with his alternate.

4. The Conference shall elect five members of the Camp Meeting Committee. Three of which are to be ministerial, one to be elected each year for a term of three years; two to be lay members, one to be elected each year for a term of two years.

5. No building or major repair involving structural changes on church property shall be undertaken without the approval of the Conference Building Committee.

VI. Other Resolutions.

1. The use of the wedding ring is not in accord with our standards as a Church, therefore we as a Conference disapprove of our ministers performing or taking part in the ring ceremony.

VII. Burial Association.

1. Each local church should elect a Local Secretary for the Burial Association, whose duty it would be to promote the interests of the Association and to seek to obtain new members for the same. And if the church so elects, collect the dues of members and forward them to the General Secretary.

2. We earnestly request that the pastor present, or have presented, the work of the Burial Association at least once during the conference year, and seek to obtain new members for the same.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

OFFICIAL ACTS OF THE PRESIDENT

1. September 20—Upon the recommendation of the Conference Missionary Board, I appointed Rev. Ivan L. Sisk as Superintendent of the Mission at Lawrence, Indiana, with the understanding that his responsibilities begin October 9, 1949.
2. September 20—Received the transfer for Conference Preacher, Paul West, from the Allegheny Conference.

Report No. 7**COMMITTEE ON FINANCE AND APPROPRIATION**

We the Committee on Finance and Appropriation submit the following report:

Item I. That the Budget Apportionment be per member as follows: Foreign Missions, \$2.00; Home Missions, \$1.00; Education, \$1.50; Pension Plan, \$1.50; Orphanage, \$.25; General Executive, \$.25; General Conference Expense, \$.25; to be paid by June 1, 1951. Conference Expense, \$2.75; Camp Meeting, \$.75; Emergency Benefit, \$.25 to be disbursed at the discretion of the Conference Trustees.

That all church budget, excepting that raised by the W. M. S., Y. M. W. B. and the W. Y. P. S. be sent to the Conference Treasurer.

Item II. Superannuate Pension Plan

All who expect to participate in the Plan are required to pay a membership fee of \$25.00 each, and 1% of their total receipts from August 1, 1947 plus such interest on back assessments as may be determined by the General Pension Board. The above to apply only in the case of those eligible for membership on the above mentioned date. Those not so eligible on that date, shall pay 1% assessment plus interest only from the date of their first eligibility for membership in the plan. All pension budget and assessments and entrance fees shall be sent to the Conference Pension Treasurer. When a Pastor fails to raise any budget on Superannuate Pension Plan it shall require a vote of the Conference to pass his character.

Item III. That the conference Sunday School apportionment be 10 cents per enrolled member in the main school as reported in the conference Minutes of the preceding year under (Total in Main School). Send all Sunday School Apportionment money to the Conference Treasurer.

Item IV. That the price of the Conference Minutes shall be 35 cents per copy, with a minimum of one copy for every six members of the church and should any deficit in the fund occur, that it be paid from the Conference expense Fund.

Item V. That the General W. Y. P. S. dues be 50 cents per active member of W. Y. P. S. This money to be sent to the Conference W. Y. P. S. Treasurer.

Item VI. That the President shall have general supervision of the work of the Conference.

A. Each church shall be visited by one of the Conference officials for two services during the year. He shall be available for counsel and advice with the Pastor and any board that may desire to meet with him previous to the announced service.

B. The Vice-President shall have direct supervision of the Conference Extension work, subject to the counsel and approval of the Conference Missionary Board. He shall be responsible for the promotion of raising Conference Extension Funds, and he may secure assistance as he may deem necessary to successfully carry out the same.

C. The goal of \$2.00 per member be raised and the Rally Day offering go to the Conference Extension Fund. Also that every effort possible be put forth to meet the goal of two new churches this year.

D. We further recommend that there be nominated by the Stationing Committee and elected by the Conference one man in each of the conference districts, who shall assist the Vice-President in the carrying out of the Conference Extension Work. It shall be his duty to inform the Vice-President of any possible openings for the extension of the work of the church in his district and the Vice-President shall investigate the same. The District man shall also assist in raising of Conference Extension Funds.

Item VII. All Quarterly Meetings shall be arranged by the Pastor, and shall be held near the close of each fiscal quarter. The Pastor shall

report quarterly to the President and the Vice-President on blanks formulated by the President.

Item VIII. That the salary of the President be \$65.00 per week and that of the Vice-President be \$60.00 per week, the same to be paid by the Conference Treasurer monthly, with expenses incidental to their work.

Item IX. The Vice-President shall receive \$30.00 a month for Parsonage rent.

Item X. We recommend the following concerning the Indiana Wesleyan Messenger:

A. That the President and Vice-President constitute the Executive Committee of the Wesleyan Messenger.

B. That the Vice-President be the Editor.

C. That the Executive Committee be empowered to select some person to act as Business and Circulation Manager.

D. That the Executive Committee be authorized to employ an assistant as need demands to be mailing secretary for the Business Manager.

E. That the various Departments which use the columns of the Wesleyan Messenger regularly shall make contributions toward the expense of the same.

Item XI. We recommend that:

A. The President call a meeting of the Ministers in different parts of the Conference early in the Conference Year.

B. The purpose of this meeting is to promote the work of the Conference. The President shall set forth goals, suggest means of attaining these goals and in general seek to promote greater interest in the Conference work.

C. All Pastors be required to attend the meeting for their District except when a legitimate cause may hinder.

Item XII. We recommend a registration fee be charged to those who are outside the Indiana Conference who are not delegates to the General Conference. The fee to be determined by the Entertainment Committee.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

We recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

1. In the midst of a world crisis which endangers our most cherished institutions and which threatens to plunge the nations into a third world war, we hereby confess the coldness and indifference of heart that afflict much of Christendom today and that are too much in evidence even in our beloved Zion. At the same time we bow in humble praise to God for the spirit of revival that He is graciously pouring out in many parts of the world. And be it resolved: That Wesleyan Methodists everywhere go down before God in earnest supplication that He may be pleased to give us a great revival in the Indiana Conference, in our Denomination as a whole, and throughout the world.

2. We recognize that Communism is an atheistic, materialistic and totally undemocratic ideology that seeks to undermine the very foun-

dations of our Christian liberties; also that the steady increase of statism in the Western world leads directly to Socialism and hence opens the door for further Communist advance. Therefore be it resolved: That we alert our members to the danger of Socialism in every form, that we take our stand against it on every suitable occasion, and that we pray earnestly for deliverance from so great an evil.

3. Inasmuch as institutions not operated by our church are continually seeking financial support from our people to the detriment of the storehouse tithing plan, be it resolved: That we disapprove of the solicitation of tithe money among our members by any Wesleyan Methodist who is not soliciting for the interest of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, and that we disapprove of the sending of tithe money by our members to independent religious or charitable institutions. Let such gifts be made not in the tithes but rather in the offerings over and above the tithes.

4. Whereas the trend toward worldliness in all forms continues to invade the church and to weaken its testimony, therefore be it resolved: That we observe scrupulously our discipline as to the sale and use of liquor, the sale and use of tobacco, modesty in dress, careful spending of income, and abstention from questionable amusements.

5. Whereas the success of our church program depends upon the full co-operation and loyalty of all our people, therefore be it resolved: That pastors and laymen throughout the accessible area rally wholeheartedly to the support of our Sunday school conventions, missionary conventions, youth rallies and revival meetings so that our strength may be concentrated systematically for the promotion of the cause of God.

6. Inasmuch as the Fairmount Campground has benefited substantially the extensive improvements recently made, be it resolved: That the Indiana Conference hereby express its appreciation to the Camp Meeting Association and to the Campground Superintendent for their arduous labors to this end.

Wednesday, 1 p. m.

The song service was conducted by Rev. Robert Vardaman.

The Rev. Don Polston had charge of devotions. He read from I Timothy 4: 8-16 and led in prayer.

The roll call was responded to by 3 officials, 1 district chairman, 15 local presidents, and 67 delegates.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

Friday, 1 p. m.

The song service was conducted by Rev. Layland Smith.

The devotions were in charge of Harold Polk. He read from St. Matthew 5: 14-16, commented upon the scripture given, and led in prayer.

The conference consented to dispense with the reading of the roll.

The minutes were read and approved as corrected.

The Special Order, continuing the election of officers, was called.

Camp Meeting Committee members elected were:

 Richard Howell—2 years

The secretary nominated Betty Taylor as assistant secretary. Upon motion she was elected.

Since Ivan Eisk was not an active local society member of District No. 8, Robert Klatt was elected district chairman in his stead.

The president contacted John Reed and reported that Rev. Reed would be able to meet with the committee the rest of his term.

The executive council gave their report on the recommendation referred to them. The report was as follows:

"That all pastors not elected as delegates shall be honorary members of the annual conference: and are urged to sit within the bar. They shall have the privilege of speaking on any question in an advisory capacity."

The conference consented to have 3 additional members on each committee. Members elected were:

Alternate delegates: Betty Taylor, Robert Vardaman

A motion carried that conference meet at 12:45 p. m., Saturday.

Upon motion meeting adjourned. Benediction by Buford Walsh.

Saturday, 12:45 p. m.

The session was opened with singing led by Rev. Harold Boyce.

The Rev. Arthur Personett led in prayer.

Conference was called to order and 4 officers, 1 Camp Meeting Committee member, 1 district chairman, 9 local presidents, and 26 delegates responded to the roll call.

The minutes were read and approved as corrected.

Upon motion the following recommendation as amended was adopted:

"That the executive council take steps to install a public address system, if after proper investigation it is feasible."

A motion carried that we drop Standing Rule 15. Also by consent the secretary was given the privilege to re-number the rules.

A motion to give a standing vote of thanks to Rev. Homer Rich for the use of his public address system was passed.

By consent the executive committee was authorized to pay for expense on the public address system.

A motion carried that when we adjourn we do so adjourn to reconvene at the call of the chair.

The Committee on Resolutions gave their report. Upon motion it was adopted. (See Report No. 7.)

The Committee on Ways and Means gave their final reading. Upon motion it was adopted. (See Report No. 8.)

Upon motion the following recommendation as amended was adopted.

We recommended that the following become a part of the Sunday Rules and the same to be placed in the minutes before Standing Rule 5.

"That there be a W. Y. P. S. Camp Meeting Committee of five members. The president of the W. Y. P. S. shall be chairman ex-officio; the other 4 members to be elected for a term of 4 years. One shall be elected annually, or until their successor is elected: so that the term of all will

not expire at the same time. That the W. Y. P. S. Camp Meeting Committee shall elect one of its members as treasurer of the Youth Camp."

The Conference Treasurer read the list of churches having their budget paid in full.

A motion to give a rising vote of thanks to Rev. Smith and Rev. Personett, officers retiring from their office, was passed.

The statistician read her report and upon motion it was adopted. (See Report No. 9.)

Since the secretary would no longer be preparing statistics a motion carried that she receive a rising vote of thanks for her services.

Also a motion passed that a rising vote of thanks be extended to Rev. Russell Klinger and Rev. Arthur Personett, for former services as Camp Meeting Committee members.

The motion carried that we give a rising vote of thanks to Rev. Ott, Rev. Personett, John Croy, and Raymond Cline, for finishing up the tabernacle rooms.

The conference consented that the executive council prepare goals for the coming year.

The minutes were read and approved as corrected.

Adjourned upon motion. Benediction by Rev. Layland Smith.

Standing Rules

1. The first session of the W. Y. P. S. Conference shall convene Tuesday afternoon of Conference week at one o'clock; and sessions shall continue daily until all business is transacted.

2. The executive council shall nominate the chairman and members of committees; their report to be read and voted upon in the first session of annual conference.

3. All organized societies shall keep permanent records of membership and finances. The list of members shall include a classification of active and associate members and shall be revised at the close of each conference year.

4. The Ways and Means Committee shall be composed of five members elected by the W. Y. P. S. Conference and a sixth member chosen from and by the Committee on Finance and Appropriations, of the main Conference Body.

5. That there be a W. Y. P. S. Camp Meeting Committee of five members. The president of the W. Y. P. S. shall be chairman ex-officio; the other 4 members to be elected for a term of 4 years. One shall be elected annually, or until their successor is elected: so that the term of all will not expire at the same time. That the W. Y. P. S. Camp Meeting Committee shall elect one of its members as treasurer of the Youth Camp.

6. There shall be a Youth Camp of one week duration and that date of the camp be set by the W. Y. P. S. Camp Meeting Committee.

7. No members of the executive council shall be a district president: but shall work in co-operation with and under the direction of the president

8. An assistant secretary shall be elected; whose duty shall be to assist the secretary and to care for statistics. The secretary shall be given the privilege of making the nomination.

9. All churches send their delegates' credentials and statistical report to the secretary by August 4.

10. The executive council of the W. Y. P. S. shall have complete charge of helping new works.

11. The local society president shall consult with the pastor when making out their annual W. Y. P. S. report, to avoid inconsistencies in the same.

12. Two copies of the report of the Ways and Means Committee shall be mailed to each church and district, within three weeks, after the close of conference.

13. That special mention be made of all societies raising full budget.

14. The executive committee of each local W. Y. P. S. should consult with the pastor and his board of stewards before planning its financial program for the year.

15. All money raised by the local societies, other than local projects, be sent to the conference W. Y. P. S. treasurer not later than August 4.

16. There shall be a missionary committee elected, by each local society, to be responsible for one missionary service each month.

17. The W. Y. P. S. treasurer pay from the general fund each year the sum of twenty-five dollars, for the expense of printing the minutes. And that the W. Y. P. S. secretary co-operate with the Conference Secretaries in determining the number of pages used.

18. The Camp Meeting Committee shall be seated in the conference.

Report No. 7

COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

We, the Committee on Resolutions, humbly submit the following:

- A. Be it resolved that we give prayer and due recognition:
 - 1. To Almighty God for the progress, the victories, the blessings that are ours up to the present time.
 - 2. To the founders and promoters of Wesleyan Methodism, for 101 years of Christian heritage that is ours through the foresight, sacrifices, and the faith of our fathers.
- B. Be it resolved that we, the Wesleyan youth will not slacken the pace, nor lessen the zeal in continuing the good fight of faith; through much prayer, and waiting upon God, are we able to do this.
- C. We recommend to our local societies these methods of attack:
 - 1. Work for higher spiritual efficiency. Prov. 7:7, "I discerned among the youths, a young man, void of understanding."
We resolve that we will endeavor to reach all age levels with spiritual food. (Review Article V under local W. Y. P. S. Constitution.)
 - 2. We resolve that we will strive to present a practical everyday gospel.
 - a. Explain religious vernacular to the teen-age mind periodically: give tangible definitions to such phrases as "the beauty of Holiness" or "saved by the blood."
 - b. To recognize the delinquency problem in its fullest sense, and its relation to the church.
 - c. Let us stress the importance of following up our evangelistic campaigns with a united effort upon our part, as to instructing and counseling, and an individual interest in the new convert.
 - 3. Work for higher efficiency in service.
 - a. Keep step with the newly organized commission of Child Evangelism. We recommend new efforts to be supervised by the societies in this field. Let us remember that the slogan "Give me a child until he is seven" is not idle thinking.

- b. Counter-attract the lures of the world by balancing the spiritual program with social and recreational activities. (Review Article IV, clause 7 of local society By-Laws.) We are endeavoring to capture the youth's interest, desire, thought life and ultimately his soul.
- c. Exploit the material of the Wesleyan Youth magazine in our programs. This will boost subscription sales.
- d. That we urge each local society to co-operate with the church in raising money for church extension and the use of the College loyalty fund chart.
- e. To place more emphasis upon missions and their support.
- f. We recommend the society sending two or more teen-agers (preferably non-Wesleyan background) to the Youth Camp, by paying their enrollment fee.
- g. Finally, let us do our very best for the Master.

Report No. 8

WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

We, your Committee on Ways and Means, submit the following report:

- I. We recommend that each District co-operate with the following Conference program as to Rallies:
 - a. At least four rallies, one to be held quarterly in each District, and that church be notified at least two Sundays previously, and that notices of said rallies be sent to pastors and local presidents.
 - b. The following point system for district banner awards be adopted: local society president at rally, 5 points (if president is absent the Vice-President shall receive the same number of points), Pastor present, 5 points; current number of Wesleyan Youths taken, 1 point each subscription; an organized society, 10 points; for each 1% of the active society members present (to be based on the current number of members), 1 point; 1 point for every person present; and for each mile traveled to the Rally site, 1 point. The society with the highest total is to be the winner.
 - c. That the conference print and distribute to the local societies suitable blanks to implement the point system.
- II. That each District Executive Committee plan for a visit of either the Conference President or Vice-President once during the year in a District Convention.

For Finance we recommend the following:

- I. That the Area President receive traveling expenses while traveling our conference, the same to be paid by the group asking his services.

- II. That the salary of the Conference officers be as follows:
- a. President, \$80.00
 - b. Vice-President, \$40.00
 - c. Secretary, \$25.00
 - d. Assistant Secretary, \$10.00
 - e. Treasurer, \$50.00
- Said salary to be paid in equal payments, one on January 31 and the other July 31.
- III. That the desk and traveling expenses of the President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer be paid from the Conference Expense Fund; and the desk and traveling expenses of the Youth Camp Committee be paid from the Youth Camp fund and that the said expenses be paid at least quarterly. (That traveling expenses be figured on the basis of five cents per mile.)
- IV. That the budget for the coming year be as follows:
- a. General Dues, 50 cents per active member of the society.
 - b. Conference Budget (based upon Church Membership):
 - 20 cents, Conference Extension Fund
 - 20 cents, Conference Expense Fund
 - 20 cents, Youth Camp Fund
 - 5 cents, General Conference Expense Fund. This item to be paid by June 1, 1951, and disbursed by the Executive Council. Any balance in this fund at next Conference shall be turned into the Conference Expense fund.
 - c. That above funds be sent in quarterly. In as much as this is based on Church membership, the church should feel its responsibility to aid the society when necessary.
 - d. That all pastors assisted by Conference Extension fund shall report church attendance, finance, and spiritual condition monthly to the Conference W. Y. P. S. President, who shall in turn report to the Executive Council at its next meeting.
- V. That the Executive Council shall have power to appropriate money from the Conference Expense Fund for the General Promotion of the Youth work.
- VI. That the District Executive Council be permitted to maintain a working balance in the District Treasurer and that all offerings above the expenses of the District Conventions be sent to the Conference Treasurer to apply on Conference Extension, each District setting a definite goal toward which they shall work.
- VII. That all monies raised within the society for missions be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer for departmental credit, and that said money be raised by monthly missionary offerings.
