RESOLUTIONS AND LAWS OF THE INDIANA CONFERENCE

- 1. Our houses of worship should not be open to any evangelist or minister of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain a regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments. A waiving of the above by a contract or lease of building must be obtained through the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference.
- 2. That the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders shall require all those desiring to unite with us from any other denomination or Annual Conference to present credits equivalent to our Conference Course of Study, regardless of their standing in the body of which they have been a member, and if they cannot do this they shall be required to meet the same conditions as our local preachers before ordination.
- 3. Any candidate for Elder's Orders or traveling under the direction of the Conference, who fails to attend the Institutes and the examinations of the Committee, without sufficient cause, shall be deemed unworthy of the trust and care of souls, and refused a place among us as a minister of the Gospel, and when they shall fail to attend the Institute for two successive years they shall be dropped from the roll.
- 4. The Committee on Elder's Orders is to transfer all persons to the study list who may have been recommended to travel and may not have been given work.
- 5. All charges with a membership of twenty-five or more shall in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the Pastor may live.
- 6. It is the duty of the Pastors to look after the insurance of our church and parsonage properties. All insurance shall provide for losses caused by fire and lightning, hail and tornado. A failure on the part of the Pastor shall be a censurable offense. If the church fails to insure their property upon reasonable effort of the pastor to secure the same, then said failure shall be reported to the President of the Conference who shall then have the property insured. In such case all insurance monies received from losses by fire, lightning, hail, and tornado shall be used in Church Extension work as the Conference Board of Trustees considers best.
- 7. All charges and stations to which a Pastor shall move shall pay the moving and transportation expenses of said Pastor, the same to be done in

addition to his salary. When the Conference demands the services of any one, that it shall bear the moving expenses, if any expense shall thus be incurred.

- 8. Each Pastor shall file a duplicate statistical report with the Committee before the close of the fifth day of August with the exception of Pastor's salary and Membership. These items to be reported the first day of Conference, said report to be kept on file one year. The Pastor shall report in open Conference the amount of Pastor's salary received, the amount of Budget assigned and raised, loss or gain in membership, the number of Wesleyan Methodist papers, Missionary magazines and Young People's Journals taken. The official character of any pastor shall not be passed until he shall have submitted a satisfactory report, including statistics.
- 9. All unaccounted for members appearing in the statistics in the membership list shall be referred to the discontinued list. All members in excess of the number reported shall be reported received.
- 10. The President shall receive \$35.00, the Vice-President \$25.00, the Secretary \$75.00, the Treasurer \$200.00, the Assistant Secretary \$35.00, each member of the Auditing Committee \$10.00, each member of the Statistical Committee \$25.00, Helper to the Treasurer \$50.00, the same to be apportioned pro-rata among the various funds of the Conference. The Conference Sunday-school Secretary shall receive \$75.00 and each member of the Conference Sunday-school Board \$25.00, the same to be paid out of the Sunday-school Treasury.
- 11. In the examination of characters the Conference officials shall be called first.
- 12. The Conference shall elect three members of the Camp Meeting Committee, one to be elected each year for a term of three years.
- 13. The Pastor shall bring a report to each Quarterly Meeting and send a duplicate to the Conference President quarterly on blanks furnished by the Conference.
- 14. We believe that the healing of the body is among the gifts of the Spirit according to 1 Corinthians 12:7-11, hence not for all Christians at all times as it is not always the will of God to heal the body.
- 15. No charge shall call any one as pastor, or to supply the work by ministers coming from other denominations as long as there are ministers in our Conference qualified and available to take work. The President after he has exercised his prerogative in the reception of ministers coming from other denominations, is to immediately refer them to the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders, who shall make a thorough investigation as to the ministry and life of such applicants, who shall report their findings to the President, after which, appointments may be made.
 - 16. The Treasurers shall submit their reports to the Auditing Com-

mittee who shall audit the same and in their report to this body they shall show they have audited the same.

- 17. The Board of Trustees shall authorize all disbursements not otherwise provided for.
- 18. Each Pastor whose total pastor's receipts exceed \$1000.00 a year shall seek to organize a new class or give his services in a revival meeting to one of the weaker churches—whose total pastor's receipts are \$500.00 or less—to help establish it. And that the church which he pastors grant him such privileges without censure and with full remuneration of salary while in such a meeting.
- 19. The Storehouse Tithing Plan is the Conference plan for financing the Church work and the following percentage basis is the rule for distributing the same: Local Church Work, 70%; Budget, 30%. A Tithing Secretary be elected and that one evening service in the Conference Session be given for a Tithing Service and all Tithing Bands or churches of the Conference be called to give their yearly report, and some minister be chosen to preach on the Storehouse Tithing Plan. The expenses of Tithing Literature and Postage is to be paid from the Conference Claims Fund and churches desiring literature may secure the same from the Tithing Secretary. This service is a Special Order of the Conference.
- 20. The Assistant Secretary is to act as reporter of the Conference and Camp Meeting to the Marion daily papers.
- 21. The first Sunday of the Annual gathering belongs to the old year, and the second Sunday of the Annual gathering belongs to the new year.
- 22. The Camp Meeting Committee shall nominate and the Conference elect the one to preach the opening sermon of the next Conference Year with his alternate.
- 23. The President of the Conference, Vice-President and Conference Evangelist shall be given each year a two weeks' vacation with pay, said vacation to be at a time of their own choosing.
- 24. When churches which have been placed in the hands of the President, if they can and do decide as to who shall be their pastor before the Minutes are sent to the press, the same shall be entered in the minutes the same as if ordered by this Conference.
- 25. In case of an emergency the President and the Board of Trustees are empowered to make a special assessment to meet the need, and the

funds are to be sent to the Conference Treasurer and credited to the Sick Preachers Benefit fund.

26. Each charge shall grant to its pastor each year a two weeks' vacation with pay.

37

27. No pastor whose total receipts are \$1200.00 shall hold more than two revivals yearly away from his charge, unless by consent of the President and his Advisory Committee.

28. All building and repair on Conference property which the local church is unable to provide for satisfactorily shall pass the approval of the

Conference Building Committee before obligations are assumed.

29. The use of the wedding ring is not in accord with our standards as a Church, therefore we as a Conference disapprove of our ministers performing or taking part in the ring ceremony.

COMMITTEE ON FINANCE AND APPROPRIATION

We, your Committee on Finance and Appropriation, submit the following report:

WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH

In view of the fact that there is an evident need for a larger amount of Conference supervision and for a more intense and effective program of missionary evangelism in the Conference, we would earnestly recommend that there be plans laid and steps taken to provide for a more extended and adequate prosecution of the work in these fields during the coming year.

To this end we would recommend:

Item I. That the Conference elect a Conference Evangelist whose duties are hereinafter defined.

Item II. The President shall have supervision of the work of the Conference and shall hold Quarterly Meetings during the year.

He shall be assisted by the Vice-President and the Conference Evangelist, both of whom shall devote their full time to Conference work in the holding of Quarterly Meetings and Evangelistic campaigns in new or needy fields within the bounds of the Conference.

The Vice-President and the Conference Evangelist shall be responsible for the promotion of the Conference Missionary work,

The President, Vice-President and the Conference Evangelist shall work together jointly and coöperatively in planning the program of the Quarterly Meetings and of Missionary Evangelism for the Conference, the plans for the work of Missionary Evangelism shall be submitted to the Conference Missionary Board for its sanction before being placed in operation.

They shall report their work to the Conference at each annual session. The Conference shall furnish them with proper report blanks covering the following items:

Number other services held	
Salary received	
Mariage and funeral fees	
Gifts	
Total receipts	

These reports shall be printed in the minutes of the Conference.

That there be held at least one full weekend Quarterly Meeting on each charge during the Conference year.

Item III. We recommend that our Conference President of the past year be paid a cash bonus of \$200.00 from the Conference Claims Fund in appreciation for services rendered.

Item IV. That the salary of the President shall be \$2100.00 per year and expenses incidental to his work: and the salary of the Vice-President and

the Conference Evangelist shall be \$1800.00 each, per year, and expenses incidental to their work.

Item V. That the Conference Claims and Conference Mission Funds be combined, and shall be known as Conference Missions and Expense Fund.

Item VI. The Conference Vice-President and Conference Evangelist shall receive offerings during their evangelistic campaigns, and shall forward these to the Conference Treasurer, the same to be placed in the Conference Missions and Expense Fund. These offerings shall not be credited on the budget of any church.

Item VII. That the Sunday-school offerings of the first Sunday of each month shall be divided equally by the local Treasurer between Connectional Home Missions and Conference Missions and Expense Fund until these budgets are in full, and shall be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer quarterly.

Item VIII. That since the Storehouse Tithing Plan has been adopted by this Conference as the financial plan of the Conference, we urge our churches to conform to this plan as soon as possible.

Item IX. A. That the budget apportionment per member shall be as follows: Foreign Missions, \$2.00; Connectional Home Missions, \$1.00; Connectional Education, \$1.50; Orphanage, 25 cents; Conference Missions and Expense Fund, \$2.00; Conference Building Debt, 25 cents; Camp Meeting Expense Fund, 75 cents; Superannuated Ministers' Fund, 25 cents. That all church budget, excepting that raised by the W. H. & F. M. S. and Y. M. W. B. and W. Y. P. S. be sent to the Treasurer of the Conference.

B. That receipts for Educational money sent through the W. H. & F. M. S., the Y. M. W. B. and the W. Y. P. S. be sent to the Conference Treasurer, Rev. C. D. Crabill.

C. That the Conference Sunday-school apportionment be 10 cents per enrolled member in main school.

D. That the price of the Conference Minutes shall be 25 cents per copy with an allotment of one copy of the Minutes for every six members; and should any deficit occur in this fund, that it be met pro rata by the various Conference arms.

Item X. That the Camp Meeting Committee shall have the privilege of putting out pledge cards in the congregation, receiving these pledges from friends, taking cash offerings throughout the Camp, and designating one or two nights during the Camp as "dollar night" when the people may be asked to bring in a dollar offering for this purpose. All Camp Meeting pledges shall be sent to the Treasurer of the Camp Meeting Association, Rev. E. L. Glover.

Item XI. We recommend that Standing Rule No. 24 be changed to read: The President, Vice-President, and Conference Evangelist shall be

granted a two weeks vacation with pay, said vacation to be at a time of their own choosing.

Item XII. That the apportionment be printed on the Page of Information in the Minutes.

Report No. 5

REPORT OF CONFERENCE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

Through a year of changing conditions and varied experience we come to the time of another annual report of your Sunday School Board.

As we look at the statistics they reveal a slight gain in enrollment in the main school, but about six per cent loss in average attendance; also fewer conversions but more scholars joining Church. The benevolences show an increase of \$3328.31. This indicates the healthy condition of our school financially and also that we have a great task on our hands to strive toward a better attendance and more conversions.

Some schools were able to conduct D. V. B. S. and found them profitable. This is a fruitful field and we would urge our people to plan for this work wherever possible.

There are several Teacher Training Classes in the Conference but no graduates through the year. A convention was held in each of the eight districts in October. Splendid interest was shown and we trust help and inspiration was received by those attending. It is the purpose of the Board to make the conventions interesting and spiritual.

The Board tried a new venture in the Sunday School Rally on Tuesday night of Conference with Dr. F. R. Eddy as speaker and have received many encouraging words about the service and believe it to be a worth while plan.

Recommendations-

- 1. We recommend that the Sunday School Apportionment be ten cents per member of Main School enrollment.
- We recommend that Tuesday night of Conference be designated as Sunday School Night and a program in the interest of Sunday-school work be presented.
- 3. We recommend that each pastor and school plan and work for a Sunday School Rally in their school and that the day be October 17th and that all schools plan their rally for this day.
- 4. We recommend that conventions be held in the districts during the last two weeks of October.
- 5. We recommend that the districts remain as last year and the District Superintendents be as follows:

These are days of compromise, indifference and a tendency to neglect the Church and Sunday School and religious things; and it will require the best efforts of our consecrated pastors, superintendents and people to overcome these conditions and build up our schools. In the light of prophecy we can expect no improvements in conditions or world spirit; so it should impel us to greater efforts in the new Conference year. We urge our people to seek encouragement and strength from God and His Word and press forward with purpose to do all we can to gather all we can into our Sunday School and pray and work for the conversion of our scholars. Thus shall we win souls, glorify God and bring an increase in church membership and have great rejoicing in our hearts. May God bless us richly in an intensive effort of Evangelism in our Sunday School.

Report No. 6

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

The Committee on Resolutions wishes to submit the following report:

I. Spiritual Life. Whereas, the forces of evil are constantly making inroads upon the spiritual life of the Church, be it resolved, that we, the

Indiana Conference, do hereby reaffirm our adherence to those fundamental Doctrines which are set forth in our Discipline, and which characterize us as a Holiness denomination. We urge that our pastors and other leaders teach those Doctrines, stress the importance of prayer, Bible study, church attendance, holy living and definite testimony, and put forth every effort possible to resist the rising tide of worldliness.

II. Church Program. Since the Storehouse Tithing Plan has been adopted as the Financial Plan of the Conference, we urge our pastors and evangelists to preach clearly and consistently on this subject to the end that our churches may conform to this plan as soon as possible.

Recognizing the importance of Christian education in our Church program, we urge our people to continue their wholehearted support of Marion College in order that the institution may remain free from indebtedness, maintain high academic standards, and ever be a center of spiritual life and power.

Considering Christ's great commission to the Church to go into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature, we pledge our hearty support to both Home and Foreign Missions. Since war conditions tend to disrupt the Foreign Missionary enterprise, be it resolved, that we redouble our efforts to evangelize our own country, organize Sunday schools and churches and strengthen the home base so that we may be adequately prepared to enter the foreign mission doors, which no doubt will open in increasing numbers when peace is declared.

We appreciate the growing business which our Publishing House is doing not only from a financial standpoint but from the standpoint of the high quality of literature which it furnishes. We recommend that our people not only make generous use of our literature, but do their best to circulate it for the promotion of Wesleyan Methodism and the cause of Jesus Christ.

III. Moral Reform. We deplore the general lowering of moral standards in our country and pledge our coöperation with every local and national organization which is dedicated to moral reform and the promotion of Christ's kingdom. Recognizing the danger of conforming to the customs and standards of the world, we urge that our people carefully refrain from participation in questionable amusements, the wearing of scanty or improper clothing, as well as expensive apparel and superfluous ornaments. Let us insist upon plainness of dress and take a definite stand against immodesty and licentiousness.

As the use of the wedding ring is contrary to the standards of our Church, we disapprove of our ministers performing or taking part in the ring ceremony.

Since the liquor traffic operates to the great detriment of the health, safety, and morals of the American people, we demand a return of national prohibition and the adoption of an intensive program of temperance education designed to promote abstinence from the use of all intoxicating liquors as a beverage.

We view with alarm the increasing prevalence of the spirit of indifference toward the sanctity of the Christian Sabbath and exhort our people to faithfully refrain from every activity that would hinder their duties

of worship on the Lord's Day.

As the home is the foundation of church and national life, we regret the prevailing tendency toward the instability and disintegration of this basic institution. As mothers neglect their duties in the home to accept employment elsewhere, we are faced with a wave of juvenile delinquency and crime. It is high time that we emphasize the sacredness of the marriage vow, the necessity of adequate parental care and instruction of children, and the importance of the family altar.

IV. Civic Standards. Whereas, totalitarian nations threaten to overthrow our democratic government and destroy our free institutions, be it resolved, that our ministers and teachers should encourage true Americanism and defend our Christian liberties.

We are keenly conscious of the fact that many of our young men are giving their lives to defend our freedom and religious liberty, and that a number of ministers are serving as Chaplains, in which capacity they are responsible for many souls. Let us as Christian people pray earnestly that the Chaplains may carry such a vital gospel message and live such exemplary lives as to be a real spiritual blessing to the men in uniform.

We urge that our Christian people communicate as frequently as possible with acquaintances in the armed forces and offer daily prayer for their bodily protection and spiritual welfare. The pastors should feel their responsibility particularly to the men from their own congregations. May God soon deliver us from the hand of the aggressor nations and give to the entire world a just and lasting peace.

STANDING RULES OF THE INDIANA W. Y. P. S. CONFERENCE

- 1. The first session of the W. Y. P. S. Conference shall convene Wednesday afternoon of Conference week at one o'clock and sessions shall be continued daily until all business is transacted.
- 2. Each organized society shall elect two Delegates and one Alternate Delegate to the Annual Conference. All pastors within the age limitation (14-40) shall be considered members of the Conference. When the pastor of a church is over 40 the local society of that church may have the privilege of electing a third Delegate.
- 3. Conference Officials and Divisional Superintendents shall be elected by ballot. Nomination shall be by first ballot.

- All organized societies shall keep permanent records of membership and finances. The list of members shall include a classification of active and associate members and shall be revised at the close of each Conference year.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

To the Young People of the Indiana Conference:

We praise God that through His mercy and providence, we are permitted to meet in this, the fourteenth session of our Young People's Conference.

Since our last Annual Conference, many have gone from our ranks into the armed forces and some have given their lives on the battlefield.

While we have not been called on to fight in this war we are engaged in a greater warfare; that of righteousness against unrighteousness; of light against darkness.

The Apostle Paul says, "put on the whole armor of God that ye may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil, for we wrestle not aginst flesh and blood, but against principalities and powers, against the rulers of darkness of the world, against spiritual wickedness in high places." We cannot afford to lose in this battle. To do so is to lose everything. Although the forces of darkness are great, yet through our Captain, Jesus Christ, we can and will be victorious.

Since conditions have made it necessary to discontinue some of our Divisional and District rallies, it becomes more important that our local societies be kept busy and that the W. Y. P. S. services be interesting and spiritual.

I wish to express my apreciation for the splendid coöperation given me during the past year in the work of the W. Y. P. S. I appreciate the cooperation of the Conference Officials, every local President and of every pastor who has sought to forward the work of the W. Y. P. S.

Young people, we must go forward. This is no time to slacken our pace. Our Conference is depending on us. Our Connection, in the last General Conference, by extending our rights and privileges, expressed confidence in us and above all God is depending on us to forward His kingdom on earth.

- 6. That the President send quarterly form letters to all churches of the Conference presenting the progress of the work and such plans as he might have for the future.
- 7. That all churches send their Statistical Report to the Statistician by August 5 and that the Statistician shall list those churches not reporting a W. Y. P. S.

RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

We, your Committee on Resolutions, submit the following report:

- 1. Whereas the Indiana W. Y. P. S. has received encouragement and support from the General and Annual Conference, we wish to express our appreciation for the recognition of same.
- 2. We reaffirm our faith in the inspired Word of God and the doctrines of our Church, and we urge our local societies to have at least one public service in which is conducted a Bible study of the twenty-one articles of religion listed in our Church Discipline.
- 3. Whereas Marion College plays an important part in our Church program be it resolved, that our young people earnestly pray for its welfare spiritually and financially, and that they attend it.
- 4. In view of the present day Sabbath desecration: be it resolved, that we keep the Sabbath holy by abstaining from all unnecessary work, family reunions, and Sunday amusements of a worldly nature. Let us redeem the time by attending the means of grace and visiting among the needy.
- 5. Inasmuch as the present war involves many of our young people be it resolved, that we give them spiritual encouragement through prayer and personal correspondence and by furnishing them with Wesleyan literature.
- 6. Let us support disciplinary requirements in regard to war in paragraph 396, quote: "Since war results in so much suffering in the bodies, minds and souls of men, is costly in the destruction of property, leaving heavy burdens upon succeeding generations, producing much of the baser passions of life, we urge that men and nations seek by every legitimate means to avoid armed conflict among the peoples and nations of the world."
- 7. Let us abhor the trend toward nudism and semi-nudism. Let us dress in modesty, refraining from the fad of going without shirts and wearing shorts and sun suits. Let our young ladies refuse to wear abbreviated dresses and masculine apparel. Let us omit unnecessary ornaments. Let us wear that which will inspire holy thoughts in the minds of those whom we contact.
- 8. Whereas the sins, drinking and cigarette smoking, are becoming common practices among youth and are injurious to health and a waste of money, we protest these evils and shall endeavor to educate our young people until they are awakened to the great dangers of these poisons.
- 9. Whereas there is a lack of holy reverence for God in many churches, homes and social gatherings we pledge ourselves to encourage a more respectful deportment.
 - 10. Whereas the greatest commission given to the Church is to evan-

gelize, let us do all we can in prayer, finance, and attendance to encourage personal and mass evangelism.

We, the Committee on Finince and Appropriation, submit the following recommendations:

- 1. That the Area Vice-President receive traveling expenses while traveling our Conference, to be paid by that group asking his services.
- 2. That the Conference W. Y. P. S. President receive from the state treasury: (a) A salary of twenty-five dollars. (b) Desk and traveling expenses.
- 3. That the Conference W. Y. P. S. Secretary-Treasurer receive from the state treasury: (a) A salary of twenty dollars. (b) Desk and traveling expenses.
- 4. That the Divisional Superintendents, providing they visit the districts, receive from the state treasury: (a) A salary of ten dollars each. (b) Desk and traveling expenses. (c) These amounts shall be pro rated as follows: Fairmount District, \$11.00; Bakers Corner District, \$11.00; Warren District, \$11.00; Wabash District, \$11.00; New Castle District, \$11.00; Shelbyville District, \$11.00; Kokomo District, \$8.00; Plymouth District, \$8.00; Bluffton District, \$8.00; Fort Wayne District, \$8.00; LaFayette District, \$5.00. (d) These amounts shall be forwarded to the Conference W. Y. P. S. Treasurer.
- 5. That each society pay an assessment equivalent to 10 cents per church member to be sent to the state W. Y. P. S. Treasurer.
- 6. That the Connectional dues of fifty cents per active member be sent to the Conference W. Y. P. S. Treasurer who shall forward the same to the Connectional Agent in a lump sum. These dues shall be sent in by December 31, 1943.

- That traveling expenses shall be figured on the basis of five cents per mile.
- 8. That all finances raised in pioneer evangelistic campaigns conducted under the auspices of the Conference W. Y. P. S. shall go into the Conference treasury, and all expenses and support shall be paid by the Treasurer from his funds.
- 9. That the Conference W. Y. P. S. raise at least two hundred and fifty dollars to meet the great need for Conference evangelism and forward the same to our Conference Treasurer as pro rated by this committee: Fairmount District, \$28.00; Bakers Corner District, \$28.00; Warren District, \$28.00; Wabash District, \$28.00; New Castle District, \$28.00; Shelby-ville District, \$20.00; Kokomo District, \$20.00; Plymouth District, \$20.00; Bluffton District, \$20.00; Fort Wayne District, \$20.00; LaFayette District, \$14.00.
- 10. That all receipts for monies paid out by local societies be sent to the Conference W. Y. P. S. Treasurer who shall return receipt for receipts.
- 11. That all benevolences be sent to the Conference W. Y. P. S. Treasurer who shall remit same to Rev. C. D. Crabill, the Conference Treasurer, who in turn shall credit same to each individual church. Benevolence is construed to mean all Conference budget items as Home Missions, Foreign Missions, Orphanage, Connectional Education, etc.
- 12. That the Executive Committee of each local W. Y. P. S. consult with the pastor and his Board of Stewards before planning its financial program for the year.
- 13. That the local societies raise the major part of their benevolences in the field of Connectional Education by supporting the Loyalty Fund Chart plan or a similar plan.
- 14. That the young people of each local society receive two offerings for the Hephzibah Home, one at Christmas time and the second to be received at Easter.
- 15. That the books of the State Treasurer and the local Treasurers be closed by August first next.
- 16. That the Conference W. Y. P. S. Secretary call attention to the above recommendations by communicating with each local President and each District President.
