Journal of Daily Proceedings

The Kansas Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America assembled for the eighty-second annual session in the Conference Tabernacle at Miltonvale, Kansas, at 1:30 p. m., Tuesday, June 3, 1952. Conference was called to order by our President, the Rev. C. W. Dunbar.

E. C. Campbell led the opening song service. Rev. W. S. Hotchkiss led the devotional service. He read from I Chron. 22:1-19. He spoke to us concerning the building of the house of God. He pointed out very forcefully that it takes more than gold and silver to build a church. We must have the glory and blessing of the Lord upon it. Wednesday Morning

Conference came to order at the call of the President. James Harris led the Conference in the opening song. E. A. Coates led the devotions, reading from John 17: 13-23. He pointed out the link between the work of Christ and the will of God. He exhorted us to stay close to the divine fountain head—Jesus Christ and His word. May we live so close to Him that we can go out and speak as one having authority. W. A. Smith led in prayer.

The roll was called. The minutes were read and approved.

Orders of the Day.—Conference Sermon.

Rev. E. J. Carry had charge of the service. Ronald R. Brannon led the song service. Led in prayer by E. A. Coates. Special song by Ronald Brannon. The conference sermon was brought by our President, the Rev. C. W. Dunbar. Brother Dunbar read from I Chron. 22: 6-19. He pointed out several other verses of scripture in connection with this passage. Then he lifted three words to us for our consideration. "Therefore—Arise—Build." Let us so build that others can build on our works as we are building upon other foundations. He pointed out how our elders have sacrificed to bring about the Kansas Conference. Yet with all the very fine foundation given us to build upon, our growth is appallingly slow. He very forcefully pointed out ways to stir ourselves in the midst of this great storm, and grow. It was not when Israel became like other people that she prospered. The service was closed by singing "The Old Rugged Cross." Dismissed by E. J. Carry.

FIELD EVANGELIST

Mr. President and Members of the 82nd Annual Conference: With gratitude to God and appreciation of our co-laborers in the Gospel, we herewith present our report of the past year's activities.

On August 26, we began a revival in the rented hall at Oskaloosa, Kansas, and continued for two and one-half weeks. At the close of the meeting, the Missionary Board asked us to remain as overseer of the work. We have continued in this capacity throughout the Conference Year. The progress of the work at Oskaloosa has not been as great as we could wish, but we have felt a sense of His gracious presence. A Sunday school was started in December, which has grown slowly, but steadily. The average in April reached 22. The work is not yet self-supporting nor ready for an organization, in our humble opinion; but there is a group of interested, truth-desiring people, who have stood by us in our endeavors to present the claims and privileges of full salvation through Christ. We wish to express appreciation to Rev. Wayne Caldwell, who supplied the pulpit in our absence, and to Rev. R. E. Britton, who preached for us in a two-weeks' revival, adding strength to the work.

Apart from the Oskaloosa work, we have served as chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Conference; and as a member of the Committee on Preparation of a Kansas Conference History, have done extensive research, both in the Publishing House at Syracuse and in the files of the State Historical Society at Topeka.

As Sunday School Secretary, we worked with the Sunday School Board in arranging for and participating in a series of Conference Sunday School Conventions. The interest in these conventions was good. We

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trust they were beneficial as well. Promotional work was done for the annual Thanksgiving Offering, as well as other promotional work done in the Sunday School field.

It was our privilege to serve as evangelist for revivals at Eskridge and Leavenworth, and in April we attended the conventions of the National Association of Evangelicals and the National Holiness Association (held in Chicago and Columbus, Ohio, respectively) as one of the delegates from this body.

We offer thanks to our God who has brought us to another milestone in the Kansas Conference.

The Statistical Committee has prepared a full report for future reference and hereby submit a few of the high points.

We are glad to report a gain of 16 WESLEYAN METHODISTS, but regret the necessity of reporting a loss of 31 WESLEYAN MISSIONARIES, 118 WESLEYAN YOUTHS, and 59 SUNDAY SCHOOL BANNERS. There is a gain in church membership of 29 making a total of 1599 active members. An associate membership of 274 brings the grand total to 1873. The Sunday Schools show a loss of 251 members in the main school with a gain of 55 in the average attendance.

There are monetary gains in the grand totals paid for Pastors, Budget

and Benevolences but less paid out for the church. The grand total for all purposes, \$254,578.98.

Resolutions

1. **Fiscal Year.** Resolved, that the closing date of the fiscal year be two weeks before the opening date of the Annual Conference-Camp Period, and we request that all statistical reports be in the hands of the Conference Treasurer at least one week before the Conference-Camp Period. He shall forward the blanks to the Statistical Chairman who shall be able to report at an early session of Conference. (The fiscal year for 1952-53 shall close July 21, 1953).

2. **Conference and Camp Date.** Resolved, that the Conference begin annually at 1:30 p. m. on the first Tuesday in August for the organizing of Conference business and Committee work, and continue daily until completed, and that Camp begin on Friday night of the same week and continue through the two following Sundays.

3. **Order of Business.** Inasmuch as it is the desire of the Conference to complete its business as soon as possible it is recommended that the following procedure of business be followed:

First, the first ten rows of the middle sections and the platform of the tabernacle constitute the Conference bar.

Second, all recommendations to travel or study be turned directly to the assistant secretary, who shall turn them to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

Third, Ministers' reports shall be given immediately after Officers' reports are given and continue whenever other business will permit.

Fourth, the following order of business shall be followed in each session:

- a. Roll call
- b. Minutes
- c. Communications
- d. Special Committees
- e. Standing Committees
- f. Sessional Committees
- g. Unfinished business
- h. New business
- i. Ministers' reports

Fifth, business shall continue from 8:30 a. m. to 12 noon and from 1:30 to 4:30 p. m. each day with no adjournment for committee work, unless deemed very necessary. It is understood that important committees may meet during sessions if necessary.

4. Nominating Committee. Resolved, that we elect a committee of five elders, including the President ex-officio, and three delegates-elect, from three churches designated by the Conference to:

First, examine the credentials that are in the hands of the committee at the time of its first meeting.

Second, nominate all sessional committees and be prepared to report at the first session of the Conference.

Third, examine all delegates' credentials, whether regular or alternate, which are turned in to the committee after the first seating of delegates, and to report such to the Secretary who shall read the names added to the roll at the next session at which they are automatically seated, if no objections are raised.

Fourth, nominate the personnel of all Conference Boards and report at an early session of the Conference.

Fifth, nominate the Committee Chairmen for next year, including the chairman of the Ministerial Association.

Sixth, nominate the District chairmen.

Seventh, nominate the Board of Managers of Wesleyan Hope Mission.

5. Election of Conference Officers. Resolved, that the election of Conference Officers be held the second day of Conference at 1:30 p. m.

6. President's Duties. Resolved, that the Conference President shall first, travel the Conference and hold one-half of the Quarterly Meetings; second, urge the proper repair and insurance of church property; third, the president may upon his own initiative or upon the request of the Board of Stewards or the Pastor of a local church call a meeting to help arrange a workable financial plan for the church; fourth, raise funds for the Church Extension Program.

7. Field Man. Resolved, that we elect by ballot a General Field Man to labor under the Missionary Board whose duties shall be:

First, to promote Church Extension.

Second, to serve as Sunday School Secretary.

Third, to promote Bible School Evangelism.

Fourth, to assist the President when needed.

8. Auditing of Financial Reports. Resolved, that all financial reports, together with the books that are to be audited by the Conference Auditing Committee be submitted to said Committee before being read on the Conference floor.

9. Introduction of New Business. Resolved, that all introduction of new business of such a nature as to require an election must be presented not later than noon of the third day of Conference.

10. **Orders of the Day.** Resolved, that the Camp Meeting and Camp-ground Committees be permanently the Committee on Orders of the Day, to prepare ahead of time the Conference Program for publication in the "Visitor."

Be it further resolved, that the following services be fixed as permanent orders of the day:

Wednesday morning, Conference sermon at 10:00 by the Conference President.

Wednesday evening, Address by the Denominational representative.

Tuesday and Thursday nights, Public services of the W.M.S. and Education, alternating annually.

11. **Camp Meeting Committee.** Resolved, that the President of the W.Y.P.S. be a member ex-officio of the Camp Meeting Committee.

12. **Evangelistic Help.** Resolved, that the Campground and Camp Meeting Committee be authorized to engage evangelistic help for the Camp Meeting as far in advance as deemed advisable.

13. **Additional Delegate.** Resolved, that when more than one delegate from any one church presents credentials to this body, there shall appear in the credentials the name of the elder that entitles the church to the additional delegate.

14. **Superannuate Service.** Resolved, that one public service in each Annual Camp Meeting or Conference period be set aside in honor of the Superannuated Ministers and for the purpose of creating interest in the Superannuate Fund and that it be the duty of the Superannuate Board to arrange for such service.

15. **Tenure of Office.** Resolved, that all Conference Officers continue in office until the close of the annual session of the Conference.

16. **Board of Managers of Hope Mission.** Resolved, that the Conference shall elect a Board of Managers for Wesleyan Hope Mission in Kansas City, Mo., consisting of five elders and two laymen, including the Conference President, who shall be chairman ex-officio.

This Board shall have authority to engage workers for the operation of the Mission and shall agree on salaries and define the duties of the workers.

17. **Pastors Paid Through Conference.** Resolved, that the Church's financial obligation to the pastor whether he be leaving the field or not, be extended through the Conference and Camp Meeting Period.

18. **Pastor's Moving Expense.** Resolved, that the church hiring a minister shall within ten days after his arrival pay to him his moving expenses, this not to be applied on his salary.

19. **Pastor's Expense at Annual Conference.** Resolved, that inasmuch as the pastor is actually a representative of the local church at the Annual Camp and Conference, that the local churches pay the expense of the pastor and his wife, including room, board and transportation, the same to be paid in advance.

20. **Pastors Released for Meeting.** Resolved, that we earnestly request each of our churches to release their pastor for one meeting of three weeks' length to be held on a new field or on one of the weaker charges under the direction of the Missionary Board, and that the church pay his salary during his absence.

21. **Pastor Nominates Steward.** Resolved, that it be the sense of this Conference that the pastor be granted the privilege of nominating one member of the Board of Stewards from each church on his charge.

22. **Reporting of all Contributions.** Resolved, that the Conference President and each pastor urge the people to make all contributions through their local church and society treasuries, in view of more equitable distribution of funds.

23. **Vacations.** Resolved, that the Conference President be granted a vacation over two Sundays, that the greater part of three weeks might be taken if desired, and that he be given two weeks' pay in addition to his regular salary at the time he chooses for his vacation.

Resolved, that we recommend that each charge grant their pastor a one Sunday leave of absence from his work, that the greater part of two weeks might be spent for vacation and that the church give him one week's pay in addition to his regular salary at the time agreed upon by pastor and church for vacation.

24. **Money to Treasurer.** Resolved, that the pastors be urged to send all remittances to the Treasurer in whole dollars when possible. That the budget money be remitted quarterly from the local churches.

25. **Calling List.** Whereas, most of the friends and members of our local churches are won through the personal contact of the pastors; and whereas many of these friends and prospective members are lost in the changing from one pastor to another because the incoming pastor does not know of these people nor their interest in the church;

Be it resolved, that the Conference ask each pastor to prepare a calling list of all the homes connected with the church and Sunday school, listing the relationship they hold to the church, listing their names and addresses by city, street and number; the same to be kept for his own work while on the pastorate and to be given to his successor on the field.

26. **Church Delegate Expense.** Resolved, that the local church pay the Annual Conference church Delegate's room, board and transportation expenses, the same to be paid in advance.

27. **Hope Mission Support.** Resolved, that the churches be urged to take offerings once a month for Wesleyan Hope Mission, and that the Superintendent be permitted to visit the charges of the Conference in the interest of the mission.

28. **Church Extension.** Resolved, that the first Sunday school offering of each month and all Sunday school birthday offerings be given to the Missionary Board for Church Extension and to help the weaker churches not yet self supporting; and that the pastor and superintendent help stimulate the giving in these offerings. That these monies are to be loaned under the supervision of the Missionary Board without interest.

29. **Conference Visitor.** Resolved, that each Sunday school of the Conference pay \$1.00 to supplement the subscription income of the "Visitor," the same to be sent to the editor.

30. **Conveying Property.** Resolved, that all instruments conveying property for church or parsonage use, carry the official name of the church viz., "The Kansas Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, Inc."

31. **Trustees Authorized.** Resolved, that all action taken heretofore by the Trustees of the Annual Conference in the interim between the meeting of such Annual Conferences concerning the purchase or conveyance of real estate are hereby approved and confirmed and held to be as binding upon the Annual Conference as they would have been if such action had been specifically authorized by the Annual Conference.

Resolved, that the duly elected and qualified Trustees of the Annual Conference are hereby authorized and directed to take such necessary action as to them seem proper and expedient and to the best interest of the Annual Conference and the local churches concerning the purchase, sale, mortgaging and conveying of real estate during the interim between the meeting of the Annual Conference and all such actions so taken by the Trustees shall be deemed to be legal and binding upon the Annual Conference and as full force as they would have been if such actions on the part of the Trustees had been specifically authorized by the Annual Conference.

32. **Board of Building and Location.** Resolved, that the Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location consist of the Missionary Board and the Conference Trustees.

33. **Conference Loans.** Resolved, that the Conference Treasurer shall issue no loans from any Conference monies except by sanction of the Conference Trustees.

34. **Subscription Lists.** Resolved, that all subscription lists and monies raised at Conference for all purposes be put through the hands of the Treasurers of the Conference, the W.M.S. or the Camp Meeting Committee, and that said Treasurers furnish the Conference President with a copy of the subscription lists which they hold that he may furnish each pastor a list of subscriptions from his charge.

35. **Unleavened Bread.** Resolved, that it shall be the sense of this Conference that all our churches use unleavened bread in the administration of the Lord's Supper. We suggest the following recipe: One-half cup of flour, one rounded tablespoon butter, moisten with water enough to roll. Mark in $\frac{1}{2}$ inch squares and bake as pie dough. This recipe will serve 65-70 people.

36. **New Resolutions.** Resolved, that all proposed new resolutions and changes in existing resolutions, to be considered at the next Conference, be printed in the Conference "Visitor" at least sixty days before the next session of Conference.

All proposed resolutions and changes in existing resolutions not so printed shall require a two-thirds vote to pass.

37. **Ministerial Association.** Resolved, that the Annual Convention of the Ministerial Association be held the second Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of November.

Provided also, that an offering equivalent to 25¢ per member be taken in each local church, to be sent to the Chairmen of the Ministerial Association. Such monies shall be used to defray the traveling expense of the pastors whose salary is \$1,500.00 or less, at the rate of $2\frac{1}{2}$ ¢ per mile, round trip; also that the pastor and his wife from said churches be given \$1.00 each per day for meals.

Be it further resolved, that pastors from the more distant churches that are over 200 miles from the Convention be paid $2\frac{1}{2}$ ¢ per mile in excess of 400 miles round trip, irrespective of salary.

38. **Prayer Convention.** Resolved, that each district be urged to hold a District Prayer Convention either in the month of April or May. The District Chairmen shall be responsible for planning such Conventions, the time and place to be announced in an early issue of the "Visitor."

39. **Attention to Resolutions.** Resolved, that the above resolutions which pertain to the local churches be read by the pastors to their people within six weeks after the receipt of the Conference Minutes and at least four weeks before the Annual Conference.

W. Y. P. S. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Greetings to the 28th Annual Session of the Wesleyan Young People's Society of the Kansas Conference.

I have counted it a great privilege to serve as your President this past year. For every forward movement you have made possible, we thank God! We have endeavored to serve to the best of our ability, but as we view the years activities we regret that there are some phases of the youth work that have not been promoted as they should or could have been.

We humbly submit the following report to you the stockholders of the Kansas W. Y. P. S.

Membership Gain

Our goal of 10% gain in membership has been exceeded, topping our goal of 520 members.

Finance

There has been a 15% increase in contributions. Over \$2500.00 was received by the W. Y. P. S. Treasurer, making nearly \$5.00 contributed per member.

"Missionary Support" Project

The committee in counsel with Rev. F. R. Birch, has chosen Rev. Harold Johnson, of Baraboo, Wisconsin for the one to receive our "Missionary Support" funds. Rev. and Mrs. Johnson are missionaries elect to Japan. Our pledge to him in his salary support which is \$825.00 a year. I am thrilled to report that \$942.00 was raised for this project.

"Pioneer Evangelism Crusade"

This apportionment was overpaid some \$22.00, making it possible to give \$100.00 to the Pioneer Tent Meeting at Oskaloosa and \$100.00 to the new work at Gas City.

Conferences and Conventions

It has been our privilege to attend the General W. Y. P. S. Conference held at Fairmount, Indiana last June; the Miltonvale Area Leaders Workshop at Miltonvale last December; The Conference Leaders Workshop at Miltonvale, also in December and to be at six different District rallies and workshops.

District Contacts

The Districts contacted this year were Clay Center, Concordia, Denver,

Lawrence, Topeka and Wichita. Plans for visiting the other three Districts did not materialize.

Conference W. Y. P. S. Equipment

Projects promoted by the Leavenworth and Clay Center Districts resulted in the purchase of an Elliot Addresserette and a Speed-O-Print mimeograph respectively. The Denver W. Y. P. S. raised funds for a combination 3 drawer, 3 shelved filing cabinet. This office equipment will greatly expedite the work of the Conference W. Y. P. S. President.

Fellowship Youth Camp

It has been a joy to help promote Fellowship Youth Camp, in co-operation with the Kansas Free Methodist youth. Joint committee meetings were held at Miltonvale, McPherson, Abilene and Topeka in formulating this years plans.

Other Items

723 pieces of mail were sent out.

4,726 miles were traveled in the interest of the Youth Work.

We have endeavored to actively promote the sale of youth literature and promotional material. Total amount collected for such sales was approximately \$90.00.

The thrill of service has compensated fully for all services rendered in His name and my prayer for the Kansas W. Y. P. S. is that we shall continue to fill our place in the forward movement of our beloved Kansas Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church and the world-wide vision of the General Wesleyan Young People's Society.

As a reminder that God wants to do great things for us and thru us, let me quote in closing II Chron. 16: 9, "For the eyes of the Lord run to and fro throughout the whole earth, to shew himself strong in behalf of them whose heart is perfect toward him."

SUGGESTIONS FOR W.Y.P.S.**Local**

1. That each society sponsor a Youth Revival, the Executive Council being responsible for securing the evangelist, advertising and financing the meeting.

2. That the leaders for Young People's services be carefully chosen and the leaders' names be posted quarterly. It is recommended that the President lead at least once a quarter.

3. That emphasis be given to the monthly Missionary Meeting of the W.Y.P.S., noting that the offering received applies on Church Budget and is divided 50% to Foreign Missions, 25% to Home Missions, and 25% to Education.

4. That emphasis be placed on the offering of W.Y.P.S. Educational Sunday which is the third Sunday in July. All educational budget money received during the summer quarter may be credited to the W.Y.P.S. (See paragraph 254, section 13 of the Book of Discipline.)

5. That all societies sending money to the Conference Treasurer

remit the same by check or money order rather than small change and that remittance envelopes be used and filled out properly.

6. That each individual society have its books closed and its report sent to the Conference Secretary at least two weeks prior to Youth Conference.

7. That attention be given to local representation at the Annual W.Y.P.S. Conference:

- a. That the local President or Vice President elect is delegate ex-officio.
- b. That each society is entitled to two delegates elect and one additional delegate for societies whose membership exceeds 25.
- c. In case there is no local W.Y.P.S. organization, the Pastor may appoint a representative (age 13-40) to the annual W.Y.P.S. Conference.

8. That the delegates' credentials and certificate for local President or Vice President elect, be sent to the Conference Secretary along with the Local report, in order that these credentials may be in hand when the Nominating Committee meets.

District:

9. That each district plan at least three Conventions a year, one of which shall be under the direction of the Conference President.

10. That the Conference W.Y.P.S. President work out the District visitation itinerary with the District Leaders to the end that mileage expense may be reduced.

11. That the Annual W.Y.P.S. Conference convene on Tuesday morning of the Annual Camp meeting and that sessions be held from 8:30 a. m. to 10:30 a. m. and 1:00 p. m. to 2:30 p. m. each day until business is completed.

Journal of Daily Proceedings

The Kansas Conference Woman's Missionary Society assembled for the forty-ninth session in the Conference Dining Hall at 1:30 p. m., June 3, 1952. The conference was called to order by the president, Beulah Gilger. She asked the group to stand while they sang, "The Doxology" after which Lola Smith led in prayer.

A highlight of the song service was the seal of the Holy Spirit upon the service as our hearts were lifted while we sang "My Desire" and "Spirit of the Living God."

Devotions—Ida Britton introduced the theme and speaker. "Key to Change Our Ways" by Veda Garlow. She used the phrase "turn from their wicked ways" as the foundation for the lesson. "Wickedness," she said, "is anything displeasing to God." Prayer was offered by Esther Casey. The Holy Ghost took charge of a major portion of the time usually allowed for business, lubricating the mechanism of the body with the oil of joy.

Special Speaker—Dr. Birch spoke to the group. All over the world stand ruins of little independent works. He urged that all Wesleyans channel their money through our own departments. Mrs. Mary Bigham, Wichita; Mrs. Hattie Skinner, Topeka; Rose Lawson, Clay Center; Mrs. Lois Smith, Wichita Missions; Mary Curtis, Kansas City; Mrs. Minnie Gomer, Wayne; Miss Mary Helen McCartney, Idana; Mrs. Clementine Masons, Mrs. Alice Child, and Mrs. Charlotte Pomroy, all of Miltonvale. PLAN OF WORK

We, the Committee on Plan of Work, hereby recommend:

Division I. Local Work

1. That our Conference goal for the coming year be 800 members, 325 honorary members, and 1000 magazines.
2. That a Men and Missions program be sponsored by the men to solicit their help and interest in the cause of missions.
3. That we observe at least four of these "Challenge Days";
 - A. Harvest Home Day, October 3. We urge each society to send cash to the College Office and provisions to the College Kitchen. (Not to be applied on Budget.)
 - B. Wesleyan Missionary Day. Stress should be placed on getting new subscriptions circulating among the unsaved.
 - C. World Day of Prayer. We recommend that each society observe this occasion, an offering being taken for Medical Missions. (Not to be applied on Budget.)
 - D. Easter. Programs and offerings for Home Missions denominationally supported.
 - E. May Day. A designated day for gifts including clothing, bandages, money, or other articles to be sent with outgoing missionaries or used on home fields. We recommend that local societies inquire into the needs of the home mission stations and orphanages before sending used clothing and that no monetary value be placed on same; that such boxes be reported merely as to the number sent; that boxes of new merchandise be reported as to monetary value and that the sending society evaluate the same, the voucher of evaluation signed by the missionary be forwarded to Conference Woman's Missionary Society Treasurer for proper receipting.

Supplies for foreign mission fields should be sent to 32 Bergen Ave., Jersey City, New Jersey. Following mailing instructions in Magazine Directory in sending gifts to home fields.
4. That the President of each society be responsible for arranging for one evening each month to pray especially for Mission Work, the same to be preceded by a day of fasting. That an offering be taken for the arm of the Work listed monthly, giving emphasis to that work:

July—Wesleyan Hope Mission

August—Child Evangelism

September—Jewish Work

October and November—Education

December—Orphanage

January and February—Kansas Conference Missions

March and April—Home Missions

May and June—Foreign Missions

5. That each society elect an alert magazine solicitor to secure new subscriptions and all renewals to meet quadrennial goals.
 - A. That the magazine solicitor of each society be responsible for placing the magazine and other literature in as many public places as possible.
6. We recommend an active, interceding, Corresponding Prayer Partner group in each society with a secretary to report to the Conference Secretary, Mrs. Pearl Freeborn, 913 Hill St., Concordia, Kansas.
7. That the missionary activities among the Jews be continued under the direction of Nina Miller, 1615 Atchison, Topeka, Kansas. Each society should devote some definite time and attention to this work.
8. In view of the fact that our missionaries are to be benefited by the Pension Plan, we recommend that each society help support this worthy cause: all monies for Pension Plan to be sent to Conference W.M.S. Treasurer and specified on Budget.
9. That each society elect an active Missionary Study Secretary whose duty will be to stimulate interest in religious reading and to report to the Conference Missionary Study Secretary.
10. That the President review the Plan of Work quarterly before the society.
11. That we avail ourselves of the excellent materials given in the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY and WESLEYAN METHODIST, also that the adopted study book be used in regular meetings.
12. That each local president appoint a committee to contact the sick in person or by correspondence and assist the pastor in every possible way in reaching souls and furthering the kingdom.
13. That the president of each society be responsible for the reading of the Moral Reform at a public service during the year.
14. That all local dues, including honorary, be sent to the Conference Missionary Treasurer, Mrs. Georgia Hall, 2523 Clay, Topeka, Kansas, one-half of the same to be applied on Missionary budget. Please designate specifically where the credit is desired.
15. That all membership dues be paid by April 1st to local treasurer.
16. That all money be disbursed quarterly through our local and conference treasurers. That this money be in the hands of the conference treasurer by July 24th.

17. In view of the great need in the Home Mission fields we urge an increase in the Card Call pledges.
18. That each society contribute at least \$5.00 for the Hephzibah Orphanage except in cases where the church Budget is less than \$5.00.
19. That each society contribute at least \$6.00 for Home Missions denominationally supported.
20. That each society contribute \$1.00 per member (active and honorary based on membership of preceding year) to the salary of some chosen missionary.
21. That each society contribute \$5.00 toward the redecoration of Abbot Hall Dormitory (not to apply on budget).
22. That each society contribute .10 per member active and honorary for the purchase of an adding machine to be used by the W.M.S.
23. That the annual report be prepared by the President, Secretary, and Treasurer of the local society, which serves as an audit of the Treasurer's report. One copy to be sent the Chairman on Statistics, Leah Macy, Longford, Kansas, by July 24th; the duplicate to be brought to Conference by the delegate.
24. That the president of each society appoint a committee to gather supplies and cash for the conference dining hall.
25. That each society grade themselves by the Efficiency Standard.
26. That we issue an award to each local society that makes a grade of 80% or more in standard efficiency, that secures magazine subscriptions equal to the active membership of the society, that has prayer partners, sends newly-elected president or vice-president to the annual conference, and sends its report to the statistical committee by July 24th.
27. We recommend that the forms in the Discipline, page 316, Article 438 be used for the delegate credentials for annual conference.

Division II. Conference Work

28. That the President and District Chairmen arrange the time and recommend the worker for Conventions or Conference Visitations.
29. That each district be supervised by the District Chairmen under the direction of the Conference President.
30. That the districts are as follows:

Wichita District—Wichita First, Wichita West Side, Wichita Seneca Street, Hopewell, Hutchinson, Arkansas City.
