Standing Rules

CONFERENCE OFFICERS-Resolved: that the officers be installed during Conference, at a public service announced in advance; office to take effect

at the rise of Conference.

II. CONFERENCE PRESIDENT-Resolved: (1) That the Conference President be appointed, authorized and required to travel the Conference as President, having general supervision of the spiritual interests and benevolences thereof, holding at least one service at each church during the year under such date as he may announce in advance.

(2) That he shall raise funds to meet the demands of the Conference work, assisted by the pastors, and he shall receive contributions for Missions, Education,

and Superannuated Ministers where there are no pastors.

(3) That he shall have general supervision of the church property, and shall inquire into the titles of the same, to see that no property is loosely held, and shall look after the rental of Conference property and see that the rent is turned into the treasury and he shall investigate the possibility and feasibility of the sale of property not in use.

(4) That he shall be authorized to grant letters to disband classes

(5) That he shall be required to write non-resident members of the Conference asking them in case they cannot attend to write the Conference a letter of greeting, stating the condition of their religious experience.

(6) That he shall devote as much time as possible and as occasion may afford in evangelistic and other meetings in the Conference.

(7) That he may engage help from time to time, as may be advisable and who he may consider properly qualified to assist in holding Evangelistic and Quarterly meetings, such help to be remunerated from the Church Extension Fund.

(8) That he shall be paid from the Conference President's Salary Budget the sum of ninety dollars (\$90) per week for his services, the same to begin the first Sunday following the rise of Conference, and to continue through the second Sunday following the rise of the next Conference, the same to be paid monthbild statistical following the heat Conference, the same to be paid infonting by in advance; he shall also be paid official expenses, including secretarial help up to ten dollars (\$10) per week and he shall be paid five dollars (\$5) per week for utilities, and his premium on the Conference approved minister's health insurance policy shall also be paid. He shall also be paid five cents (5c) per mile car travel expense and ninety dollars (\$90) per month house rent or be provided a Conference Parsonage.

(9) That he shall act, or appoint to act, as Fraternal Delegate to all denominational or inter-denominational bodies as he deems advisable.

III. CONFERENCE TRUSTEES—Resolved: (1) That the Board of Trustees shall consist of nine members, three to be elected each for a term of three years and each to reside within the bounds of the Conference.

That the duly elected and qualified Trustees of the Annual Conference are hereby authorized and directed to sign for the purchase, sale, mortgaging and conveyance of real estate recommended by the Conference Board of Church Extension and Evangelism during the interim between the meetings of the Annual Conference, and all such action or actions shall be deemed to be legal and binding upon the Conference, and of as full force and effect as they would have been if such actions on the part of the Trustees had been specially authorized by the Annual Conference.

(3) That the President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall be authorized to sign on behalf of the Board of Trustees, such signatures to be valid and binding as if all members of the Board of Trustees had signed said papers IV. BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION AND EVANCELISM—Resolved: (1) That the Conference Board of Trustees and the President of the Conference Woman's Missionary Society constitute the Board of Church Extension and Evangelism of the Conference. gelism of the Conference.
(2) That the Board of Church Extension and Evangelism is hereby author-

ized to pay out all monies from the Conference Church Extension Fund.

(3) That the Conference Board of Church Extension and Evangelism be the Board of Managers for the Conference in the interim of the Conference sessions.

V. COMMITTEE ON CHURCH AND PARSONAGE BUILDING ALTERATION AND REMODELING—Resolved: That the Conference Board of Trustees

shall constitute the Committee on Church and Parsonage Building, Location, Al-

teration and Remodeling.

CAMP MEETING BOARD-Resolved: (1) That the Camp Meeting Board be constituted of a total of nine members, consisting of the Conference President, Conference Wesleyan Youth President, Charles City pastor, three Elders and three laymen. One Elder and one layman shall be elected by ballot each year for a term of three years.

(2) That the camp ground property shall be under the care of the Camp

(3) That this Board shall have the power to engage workers beyond the present year.

He stated that the state of the church at home and overseas is good. He stated that reports which were coming in reveal that Camp Meetings throughout the church have been better attended, finances have come more easily, seekers have been more numerous and solid work accomplished greater. He reminded us that the church can only make progress as a good relationship exists between the denomination, conference and church. In sneaking concerning the departments of the church a few items were outstanding. The department of Church Extension and Evangelism is encouraging our people to loan their money to the various church investment groups of the denomination or conferences. The Woman's Missionary Society has given excellent support to missions. The White Christmas offering this year was the highest ever. There was an excellent self denial offering. The office of our Service Men's department takes on new significance due to the escalation of the draft quotas. The department of Sunday Schools is providing the best and most attractive material ever. We now have the best tools with which to work we have ever had. The department of World Missions faces an unusual and difficult work. We have now moved from the mission type operation to overseas conferences, with operations similar to ours. The fastest growing area of our church is overseas. Three areas of prayer ugency were mentioned: 1. A doctor for the La Gonave. 2. Permission to receive off-set printing equipment for our Colombia field. 3. A mathematics teach-

er for Puerto Rico. Editors George Failing and Marie Lind edit the best papers for Wesleyan Methodists. Wesley Press proves to be an increasingly difficult operation. We do have problems. There are internal problems within conferences. There are the problems resultant from the tornado. Bad as things were we have much for which to be grateful. All important records were not bothered. Earthly buildings are temporal. Only things of spiritual value are permanent. We must live with eternities values in view. The Board of Administration decided to rebuild in the same place, on the same foundation. We must be dependent upon the leadanthin of the University of the leadership of the Holy Spirit. The leaders of our church have labored to the point of exhaustion for God and the church. Friends and neighbors have responded with sacrificial expressions of assistance. Times of difficulty cannot turn us from our mission of evangelism. We must change our strategy from debt reduction to reconstruction. A special General Conference has been called for four reasons: 1. To transact any business of any General Conference. 2. Certain internal problems exist which only the General Conference can deal with. 3. Problems relating to our publishing work. 4. Church merger. God was not in the tornado which destroyed Job's children, but was there to prove Job and show his genuineness as a believer. God has taken us through the fire and the wind, and now the still small voice. We will have to get quiet to hear it. What will history write as your part to help in reconstruction?

CONFERENCE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the 112th session of the Iowa Conference:

Greetings in the wonderful name of our Lord Jesus Christl

I praise God for allowing me to complete another year of ministry in our conference. This past year has been a very busy one for me and I wish to take this opportunity to thank each of you for your help and patience in the labors which we have shared together.

The spiritual trend of a conference is always of utmost importance, therefore, I wish to report that we have experienced some real movings of the Holy Spirit in many of our churches.

Our pastors have reported that a goodly number of individuals have sought salvation and sanctification at the altar of prayer. In some cases, whole families have been saved and brought into the church.

The various conference youth camps also added souls to the kingdom of Christ as well as challenging the young people to Christian service. Many of our churches are having extra prayer meetings in a dedicated effort to bring about a Conference and Denominational wide revival. The forces of evil are pressuring the Church from every side, but God, by His enabling grace, can make us more than conquerors.

During this year, we have entered into \$450,000.00 worth of new building projects in the conference. Several of these projects have been completed already. A completely rebuilt church and new educational unit has been built at Bennezette; a beautiful new church with seating capacity of 300 has been completed at Emily; the largest single project in the history of the conference, an educational building, is under construction at Waite Park; Cedar Rapids has started a new church building and five (5) parsonages have been added this year. We now have a new parsonage at Anoka, at Roslyn Park, at Clarksville, and a new conference parsonage and office in Charles City. In addition, an older home has been purchased for a parsonage at Waseca.

Securing the conference parsonage is the culmination of many hours of prayer and planning. I believe the new conference parsonage and office is a credit to our conference and will surely be a comfortable accommodation to our president's families in the years to come. Our Conference Trustees and Church Extension Board members are to be commended for their vision and labors.

A number of our people have made investments in the Conference Revolving people would need their money on short notice. At the present time, this mony is Fund this past year. One item that will not show in our Treasurer's report, \$10,000.00 is being held in reserve for the Revolving Fund in case any of our invested in the Wesleyan Investment Foundation.

Even with added financial responsibilities, the Conference Funds continue to show improvement for which we praise God. I wish to commend the Churches for their faithfulness in caring for the budget items and church extension challenges.

The Church Extension Board has approved the field of the South Minneapolis-Burnsville area for our church extension project this year. This venture of faith will take considerable funds but I am sure the rewards will be great.

There was a gain of two full members this year.

I preached 128 times, conducted 24 business meetings, held 5 revivals, assisted in the Dedication of three (3) churches and one (1) parsonage, and traveled 34,450 miles with the following expenses:

4. We would urge that the ministers and laymen of our church take active part, based upon Scriptural principles, regarding moral issues which confront us in civil and state government.

5. We urge that Wesleyan Methodists support the constitution of the United States in its declaration of equal rights and freedom for all peoples.

6. That we maintain a strong family loyalty by daily worship and wholesome recreation.

7. We would maintain the need of holy Christian examples in areas of con-

versation, apparel and general living.

8. Viewing the degeneration of morals in our times and the near second coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, we would exhort to deeper life and watchfulness.

9. We recommend that our people promptly bring all possible pressure to bear upon Congress to act upon, and pass a constitutional amendment that will define the areas of freedom within which a teacher and student may engage in Bible reading and prayers in the public schools.

10. Observing the trends of the educational system of today we stress the need of a Christian education and would recommend that we support our Wesleyan Methodist Schools and that we also give careful consideration for Christian

education on the elementary level.

11. We urge upon all believers the necessity and importance of witnessing and soul winning in their daily lives.

COMMITTEE ON FINANCE REPORT

We recommend:

- 1. That all orders on the treasuries of Conference funds, except those authorized by the Conference Body, must be authorized by the Conference President, and paid by the Conference Treasurer from the gneral funds, upon receiving said authorization.
- 2. That the Conference Treasurer send a trial balance to the Conference President each month.
- 3. That the goal for Church Extension and evangelism be \$12,500.00 with the suggestion that each individual church have a goal of 3% or more of their total raised for all purposes as reported in this year's Minutes.
- 4. That each organization contemplating a change in financial policy check with the Financial Secretary before bringing their report to the Conference.
 - 5. That the following changes be made in the Conference Budget Items:

W.M.S. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Greetings to the one hundred and twelfth session of the Iowa Conference.

Again this year we are rejoicing in the wonderful working of our great God. God's kingdom has been expanded because of the men, women, and youth of our conference who have helped to "Prepare the King's Highway."

The missionary work involves more than our loyal women. It must involve the entire church and every member of every family. With this wonderful cooperation of pastors and churches, and the W.M.S. services as a channel for funds and prepared to Cod has helped us to raise our total giving this year to an all times. and promotion God has helped us to raise our total giving this year to an all time high. Above that He has helped us to realize an increased missionary vision in our conference churches.

All cooperated in the fall tour when Miss Lois Sheridan, returned missionary to Africa, brought missionary information and interest to every local church.

was raised last year; Scholarship to Miltonvale Wesleyan College, \$50; chairs for the camp dining room, \$125; Alice Davis for equipment, \$100; also cared for the cleaning and supplies for the camp guest rooms. The total raised by the W.M.S. was \$14,672.73, by the Y.M.W.B. was \$3,511.82, making a total of \$18,184.55.

Our conference missionary tour will be January 4-16, 1966. The speakers will be Rev. Paul Dekker and Miss Esther Smeenge.

Miss Alice Davis will go as our representative to Columbia, South America, this fall. We have committed our conference for her entire support of \$3,600 as well as the partial support of \$1,200 of Alma Aldinger. It is an answer to prayer to have one of our own go to the mission field after a period of almost twenty years since we have had a representative. Alice will need our financial support but more than this she must have our prayers.

We praise the Lord for what He has done. May He give us as a conference the strength and courage to "Evangelize Now" in our neighborhoods as well as to

send the message abroad.

- 6. Each Y.M.W.B. should solicit the entire Sunday School and church as members of the Y.M.W.B. Those through 13 as active members and those over 18 as Honorary members.
- 7. Each Y.M.W.B. should use the materials found in the Young Missionary and subscribe to the flannelgraph, using both in the monthly meetings.
- 8. We recommend the continued use of the Missionary Reading Course, the issuing of awards as they are earned, and the distribution of Prayer Partners among our children.
- 9. We recommend a careful study of this Plan of Work and the Efficiency Standard. Each Supt. should strive to make the Honor Roll.

 - For having the greatest percent increase in membership.
 - (2) For raising the largest amount of money per member.

 - For having the greatest percentage of active members memorizing (4) each monthly Scripture verse.
 - (5) For raising the asigned support of Matthew Woolsey.
 - For having the greatest percent participation in the Reading Course and Prayer Partner Plan.
 - For bringing to Conference original projects or helps made and used during the year.
