STANDING RULES

1. Date of Conference:

The annual session of the Lockport Annual Conference, Inc. shall convene the Tuesday evening preceding the last Thursday of July with adjournment scheduled not later than Friday afternoon.

2. Board of Trustees Report for Final Action:

Resolved: That all matters involving the expenditures of money to be appropriated from the Conference Treasurer be referred to the Board of Trustees for their consideration, and to be reported back by them to the Conference for final action.

3. General Conference Delegates:

Resolved: That it is the sense of the Lockport Conference that no person should accept the position as delegate to the General Conference unless he expects to be present during the entire session. The President is required to communicate this resolution to the delegates three weeks before the General Conference begins.

4. Pastor's Moving Expenses:

1. The church calling a pastor to serve them shall pay his moving expenses to the charge, the same not to apply on his salary.

2. We recommend that each church equip its parsonage with the necessary heating and cooking equipment, because of the variation of requirements in this equipment for the individual parsonages.

5. Statistical Report:

1. The Conference shall elect, to serve at the next annual conference, an Auditor of Statistical Reports, a Statistician, and an Assistant Statistician. The Auditor of Statistical Reports shall have had experience by serving at least one year as Statistician. The Statistician, whenever possible, shall have had experience by serving at least one year as Assistant Statistician.

2. June 30 shall be considered the close of the Conference year for statistical purposes. The pastor shall send to the Conference Treasurer all monies and receipts with both copies of the statistical report made out (except the Budget Item, which the treasurer will fill in and sign) by July 8. The Conference Treasurer in turn shall pass the reports to the Auditor of Statistical Reports by July 12.

The Auditor shall correct the reports and shall pass one copy to the Statistician and one copy back to the pastor by July 15. He shall audit the statisticians report and send the Budget Chairman the membership of the churches, Sunday Schools, and the W.Y. The Statistician and Auditor shall give pastors opportunity to explain apparent errors till the time that Conference convenes.

3. Pastors in reporting financial items shall report all items in round numbers except the budget items which shall be reported in full.

6. Pastor's Vacation:

Each charge shall grant to its pastor each year a two week's vacation with pay at a time he shall elect.

7. Passage of Ministerial Character:

1. One month before the first day of Conference, the President and his Advisory Board shall appoint a Committee on Ministerial Character.

2. All character blanks, filled out in duplicate, shall be mailed to the President's office not later than two weeks before the opening day of conference; one shall be returned to the minister, and the other to be given to the Pastoral Relations Committee.

3. The pastor shall read Item 3 of his statistical report. The Statistician shall place his copy of the pastor's statistical report in a convenient place at conference where they may be examined by persons who are interested. When the pastor's name is called, he shall state that he has or has not, passed in the examination of his character, and briefly state his religious experience, and report on his religious work. The delegate shall also be given the same opportunity.

4. It shall be the duty of each minister to be in attendance to the annual conference session unless otherwise excused by the Conference or Committee of Ministerial Character.

8. Adjustment of Pastor's Salary:

Resolved: 1. That churches which enter into a financial agreement with the pastor shall, when needful, make adjustments of this obligation at each quarterly meeting. When the pastor's salary is adjusted prior to the beginning of the Conference fiscal year (July 1) adjustment shall be effective at the beginning of said fiscal year unless otherwise agreed upon. A full settlement of the pastor's salary shall be made before the time of the annual conference.

2. That the churches of the Conference be urged to pay mileage for the use of the pastor's car in church work at the rate established by the Conference Trustees for conference work. Also that where possible the churches consider payment of pastor's utilities, Health Insurance premiums, Social Security as fringe benefits, in addition to the base salary. Any financial agreement on salary entered into by a church and pastor shall not be in force after the end of the conference year for which it is made, unless it is renewed by the contracting parties. The financial obligation of each church to its pastor shall be in force throughout the Conference and Camp Meeting period. He shall receive his salary the same as if he were on the charge conducting services. The second Sunday following the last Sunday of Camp Meeting shall mark the beginning of the pastor's service year.

9. Delegates' Credentials:

It shall be the duty of the pastors to forward to the Conference Secretary not later than one week before the Annual Conference convenes the church (not missionary) delegates' credentials from his charge.

10. Budget Apportionment:

1. The Budget Committee shall base their appointment of the budget for World Missions, Church Extension and Evangelism, Australia, Brainerd Indian School, Hephzibah Children's Home, Administration, General Conference Expense, Board Expense, Education, Wesleyan Seminary Foundation, and General Sunday School on the rate per member recommended by the Board of Administration. 2. The Pension Budget shall be the rate per member recommended by the Board of Administration, except when the Conference Pension Sinking Fund shall fall below \$200. When this occurs, the Pension Budget for the next year shall be 10¢ more per member than the amount recommended by the Board of Administration. 3. The Conference Sunday School budget shall be at the rate of 10¢ per member. 4. The Conference Budget shall be the sum recommended by the Board of Trustees, the same to be disbursed upon their recommendation and approval of Conference. 5. The Conference Entertainment Budget shall be the amount recommended by the Board of Trustees, the same to be disbursed upon their recommendation and approval of Conference. 6. The W.Y. Budget shall be determined on the rate per active member of the according to the Discipline; the Conference W.Y. Budget shall be determined on the rate set by the Conference W.Y. 7. The Budget for the Conference President's Salary shall

be the amount recommended by the Board of Trustees, the same to be approved by the Conference. (The Sunday School Budget shall be determined by the number of persons in the Main School.)

11. Budget Credit:

Nothing but cash shall count on the Sunday School, Conference, or Conference Entertainment budgets. Money paid on L.S.U. pledges, or interests paid on Educational Notes and all money paid for current expenses of Houghton College and Houghton Academy shall count on the Educational budget. Cash and receipts acceptable to the Missionary Boards shall count on Hephzibah, World Missions and Church Extension and Evangelism budgets. Items which apply on budget credit shall be so marked by the Conference Treasurer.

12. Date for Taking Pastoral Vote:

The pastoral vote shall be taken throughout the Conference the first Sunday following May 15.

13. Communion Service:

The Conference Annual Communion Service will be observed on Tuesday evening following the preaching service, the communion table to be prepared by the stewards of the Houghton Church.

14. Conference Missionary Board and Conference Board of Church Extension and Evangelism:

1. The annual conference shall elect by ballot an Extension Secretary. This is to be a non-salaried office, receiving remunerations only for travel expenses and time spent away from regular duties in the interest of the church extension work.

2. The Annual Conference Missionary Board shall also serve as a Conference Board of Church Extension. Membership will include the President of the Conference, the President of the Conference W.M.S., the Conference Extension Secretary, and the President of the W.Y., these four ex-officio and two lay members elected by the Annual Conference. Whenever the duties of Conference President and Conference Extension Secretary are filled by the same person the sixth member shall be an elder elected from the conference floor.

3. The duties of the Extension Secretary shall be:

A. To act as Chairman of the Conference Board of Church Extension when this committee meets as such.

B. To have supervision with the Conference Board of Church Extension, of the Conference Extension work.

4. The duties of the Conference Board of Church Extension shall be:

A. To survey the Lockport Conference territory to determine the most suitable location for extension projects.

B. To give general counseling as to the development of pioneer work in co-operation with the Conference President.

C. To allocate such funds as are received for the proposed designated projects.

D. To publicize throughout the local churches the work of the department.

E. To render to the Annual Conference a detailed report of the work of the past year.

5. The treasurer of the Conference Board of Church Extension shall be elected by the Board from their number and be authorized to receive funds for this extension program, and that all funds be sent directly to the treasurer of the Conference Board of Church Extension.

6. That the Pioneer Envelope plan shall be used as a means of raising funds for this program. All offerings and contributions received in extension service shall go into this fund.

7. All pioneer works and those organized works certified to the Board by the President and his Advisory Board shall be considered as eligible for assistance from the Conference Board of Church Extension. In general, it shall be the policy not to give financial assistance to any work for a longer period than three years.

8. That the Board schedule one of our missionaries to visit the churches in the interests of missions at least once each year. This will in no way conflict with the present policies of the W.M.S.

15. Fire and Extended Coverage Insurance on Owned Church Property:

That it be required that each charge furnish the Chairman of the Board of Trustees (1) a copy of the deed of all church and parsonage properties, (2) a certificate of insurance on all church and parsonage properties and that this be brought up-to-date at each insurance renewal. Further, the Conference highly recommends that each charge obtain Fire and Extended Coverage Insurance on all owned church properties to cover at least 80% of the current appraisal value and it shall be the duty of each pastor to bring this recommendation before the local Board of Trustees.

16. Election of Local Church Officers:
The officers of the local church shall be elected in the month of June and their term of office shall be from July 1 to July 1. The quarters of the fiscal year shall be September 30, December 31, March 31, and June 30.
17. Pension Plan:
All eligible persons are urged to join the Federal Social Security program.
18. Delegate to N.A.E. and N.H.A.:
The President of the Conference shall be the delegate to the annual convention of the NAE and the representative to the annual convention of the NHA. The Vice President shall be the alternate delegate to each convention.
19. Standards of Auditing Procedures:
1. The confirmation of bank balances by the appointed auditors. A certified bank statement shall be furnished by the treasurer by the opening date of conference. This bank statement shall be as recent as possible before the treasurer leaves for the annual conference session.
 2. The auditors shall test-check receipts and expenditures for a designated period during the conference year.
 3. The auditors shall list notes payable and notes receivable and other obligations due or owed by the conference trustees; check on current payment or receipt of interest.
 4. The auditors shall reconcile the books with the annual report of the treasurer.
 5. The auditors shall issue an official certificate of their finding of all treasurer's books audited.
 6. Treasurers shall have their books ready for audit immediately upon the opening of the conference.
 7. The Conference shall elect the Chairman of the Auditing Committee to serve the next session of Conference.
 8. All treasurers of conference organizations shall report for the statistical year ending June 30, except for the Conference Treasurer.
20. Election of Officers:
There shall be elected on Wednesday morning of Annual Conference a Nominating Committee to submit a slate of nominations in mimeograph form, for all Conference offices not requiring a ballot election. This committee shall consist of three elders and two laymen. They shall submit at least two names for each office. The first ballot for the Conference President shall be a nominating ballot.

21. Building and Remodeling Plans:

The Board of Trustees in carrying out the work of the Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location, shall annually appoint an advisory committee, consisting of two builders or building contractors and two elders with building experience, to which it shall refer building and remodeling plans exceeding \$1,000. in cost. This committee shall endeavor to secure catalogs of desirable plans of parsonages and churches and any other information to help the building committee.

22. Duties of the Conference President:

The duties of the Conference President shall be (1) to represent denominational interests on the Conference level, (2) to plan, develop and co-ordinate projects and enterprises of the Conference, (3) to supervise ministerial service and local church activities. This shall entail conducting at least one quarterly conference on each charge during the year.

23. Campmeeting Board:

The promotion and management of the religious program, the dining hall and rooming management of the Annual Camp Meeting of the Lockport Annual Conference shall be under the control of a camp meeting board constituted as follows: Conference President, President of the Camp (Chairman), Vice President of the Camp, President of the W.Y., Conference Treasurer and four laymen, one elected each year for a period of four years.. Newly elected officers to this board shall assume office at the close of the current camp session.

RELIGIOUS SERVICES

Dr. Paul L. Kindschi brought the Denominational Address. The Sacrament of Communion was observed.

Wednesday Night Service--July 29, 1964

Rev. Paul F. Markell, conference extension secretary, conducted the service featuring reports from Angola, Hamburg, and Little Valley. Facts and figures revealing conference growth through church extension was also presented.

Thursday Night Service--July 30, 1964

Missionary interests were presented by the Conference WMS with Mrs. A. Gordon Wolfe in charge. Guest speakers were Mr. and Mrs. Robert Stowell, educational missionaries from Puerto Rico.

Friday Night Service--July 31, 1964

The service was sponsored by the Sunday School Board. The Sunday School plaque was won by Silver Creek, but they requested that it be awarded to Lockport. The reason is that an oddity in the rules allows a Sunday School to win without a gain in average attendance.

Sunday Morning Service--August 2, 1964

Larry L. Lutz and Nelson G. Owen were ordained elders in the Wesleyan Methodist Church. Dr. Wilbur Dayton brought the ordination sermon.

DAILY PROCEEDINGS

The Lockport Annual Conference, Inc. of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America convened for its 103rd session on the Campgrounds at Houghton, New York on July 28, 1964 at 7:00p.m. E.D.T.

Opening: The President, the Rev. Daniel A. Heinz, called the Conference to order. The Rev. Milton Putnam led in the singing of the hymn, "Holy Ghost With Light Divine". The Rev. Eugene Cockrell sang a solo. The Rev. Alton Shea led in prayer.

Roll Call: The roll of ministers was called and 29 were marked present.

Committee on Credentials: The Committee on Credentials made its report which was accepted. The name of Minnie Clark was substituted for the name of Thelma Ketchner of Wells-ville. The name of Jessie Taylor of Bellville was sub-

stited for that of Charles Rounds. These were declared the duly elected delegates by the President.

Roll Call: The roll of delegates was called and 24 were marked present.

Bar of Conference: The bar of Conference was fixed as follows: the first 9 rows of seats in the second, third and fourth sections of the auditorium.

Presentation: Dr. Paul L. Kindschi was presented to the Conference. Motion prevailed that Dr. Kindschi serve as co-chairman.

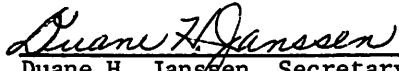

Report No. 4

PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT

Greetings to the members of the Lockport Annual Conference, met in its one hundredth and third year of service this twenty eighth day of July, 1964, at Houghton, New York.

The Church Extension challenge as presented at our last year's session of Conference was accepted and carried out. As a Conference we paid the salary of a full time Conference Missionary.

The results of this have been gratifying. The Pioneer Project at Angola has been strengthened to the place that we trust in the near future to have a church building. We have received the deed from the Evans Land Company to three acres of land for a building site.

The Conference Board of Trustees has approved the building of the first unit as soon as the local congregation is able to assume a reasonable amount of the local expenses. We are looking forward to receiving the denominational self-denial offering from the Woman's Missionary Society. We are grateful for this consideration.

To date our Conference has invested \$9,300 in the Angola project for the support of our Conference Missionary and for related expenses. To date the local congregation has contributed \$3332. The Sunday School has averaged 46 for this past year. The morning worship attendance is even more encouraging as this consists largely of adults. The worship service has averaged 63. We are challenging the local congregation to a weekly income of \$125. For the last quarter, they have averaged \$81.46.

To God be the glory for all He hath done in Angola. From the human viewpoint, Pastor and Mrs. Richard Kaylor are worthy of our sincere appreciation. Let us assure them of our continued support.

We have sought to be faithful to our various responsibilities. In addition to the routine visitation of the Churches of the Conference, we have represented the Conference interests on the Local Board of Trustees of Houghton College, as a director for the Houghton Academy, as a delegate to the National Holiness Association, the Area Leaders' Conference and at the Annual Ministerial at Asbury Seminary. One of the high points of the year was June 28 when we assisted Pastor Wolcott baptize sixteen believers in the local river. Twelve of these had been recent converts.

A review of the statistics reveals the following facts: present full membership 1304, a gain of 46; total present membership 1861, a gain of 87; Main Sunday School enrollment 3827, a gain of 366; a gain of 151 in the average attendance of the Sunday School. All but five churches reported the General and Conference Budgets assigned were paid in full.

A comparison with the 1940 statistics show the following results:

- a gain of over 468% in Foreign Mission giving
- a gain of over 909% in giving for All Purposes
- a gain of over 1211% in giving for Education
- a gain of over 428% in giving for Pioneer Work (in 14yrs)
- a gain of over 106% in main Sunday School Enrollment
- a gain of over 138% in average attendance in Sunday School
- a gain of over 51% in Church Membership.

During the past year two of our Elders have answered the call to their Heavenly reward. The Rev. Vernon Hoffman, of Marion, Indiana, was called home September 4, 1963. On

March 9, 1964, Rev. Wilbur Beers was released from this earthly tabernacle of pain to gain the victor's crown in the Land that knows no suffering.

The Church Builders' Foundation has begun to grow. From August 1962 through April 1964, a twenty month period, we received \$20. Since May 1964, a three month period, we received \$782. cash in response to our May letter. The receipts from the sale of the Glennwood Avenue Church in Buffalo have also been assigned to this Fund. Mr. R. C. Nelson, Treasurer of the Board of Trustees, will report on this Fund. We would urge your continued support of this most worthy project.

The primary concern for true followers of the Lord is for spiritual progress. We rejoice at the measure of blessing we have had in numerical growth and in financial strength. But our greatest joy has been in seeing the Lord work in the lives of men and women. Our altars have not been baren. There have been spiritual gains in our churches.

Let us who know the Lord, determine by His grace to press the battle for Holiness of heart and life. With inward peace let us challenge a troubled world. With the Light of Life let us guide a darkened world. Realizing that it is not by might or by power, but by His Spirit, let us in confidence seek to be faithful servants of the Master. May we so labor that in the final hour, we will hear His "Well done, thou good and faithful servant."

We further dedicate ourselves to the Quadrennial emphasis "Evangelize Now" through World Missions, Education, Institutions, Wesleyan Youth, and the Local Church.

Report No. 18b

(additional report of the Resolutions Committee)

We, the members of the Lockport Annual Conference, endorse the statement on race relations prepared by the Board of Administration and reported in the April 29, 1964 issue of the "Wesleyan Methodist" and recommend that it be printed in our Annual Journal. (Reprint begins with "Spiritual Principles" as recommended by committee. For prior text see the "Wesleyan Methodist" April 23, 1964 issue.)

Spiritual Principles

1. We believe on Biblical authority that God has created of one blood all men, and that He is no respecter of persons in offering the grace of Christ to all.
2. We believe that all Christians are "children of God by faith in Christ Jesus" (Gal. 3:26). As such they are members of the "body of Christ" (Eph. 4:12).
3. We believe that worship in the house of God should be open to the whole family of God, and that all who care to worship with us should be welcomed.
4. We believe that as Christians, we are obligated to evangelize all men, regardless of race or condition, at home or abroad. As those who preach a full and free gospel, we are responsible for the development of mature Christian disciples through the Church.
5. We reaffirm our conviction that Christians in particular should be concerned that there be secured "to all men the enjoyment of every natural right" and access to opportunities ordinarily open to the public.
6. We believe that these principles place an inescapable obligation upon the local congregation to evangelize its own neighborhood, as well as to extend its ministry as widely as possible.

Social Principles

1. We support the decisions of the Supreme Court of the United States that there shall be no segregation on the basis of race or color in tax-supported institutions.

2. We believe that equal rights bring equal responsibilities, and that no society or group has the responsibility to maintain unlimited privileges for those who refuse to accept normal and proportionate responsibility. There should be no discrimination against individuals on account of their ancestry. On the other hand, we believe that members of all races should demonstrate their desire to be true worshipers when they enter our churches, to be law-abiding citizens when they enter business establishments, and to live consistently with neighborhood standards when buying or renting a home in a section which is predominantly of another race. We believe that all should receive equal pay for that which is done with equal excellence. As the person of any race becomes a regular member of the church or community, assuming proportionate financial and other responsibilities, he should be fully treated as such.

Recommendations

1. We recommend that the periodicals of the Church continue to publish material which will inform our people on the matter of discrimination, pointing out the Biblical principle that all men, irrespective of race or color, must be treated as integral members of the human race.

2. We recognize the substantial ministries carried on in the field of interracial evangelism by The Wesleyan Methodist Church. We commend further study in this entire area with a view to finding the most fruitful means of advancing the work. Particular attention should be given to recruiting and training consecrated workers from among members of the various races. The value of scholarships is pointed up as a means of implementing the training of such leaders.

16. That we grant the request of the College to use the Tabernacle for a Physical Education teaching station.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE PIONEER MISSIONARY

We praise God for what He has done in the area of Church Extension and Evangelism this past year.

I have been employed by the Conference for this past year in the capacity of full time Conference Pioneer Missionary. My work has been somewhat divided between the Angola Pioneer church, doing promotion work both by direct mail and by holding services in the churches of the Conference.

The greatest part of my time has been spent on the field in Angola. The work there is progressing very well and we have had a minimum of problems. The yearly average attendance for the Sunday School is 46; and the Worship Service is 63. We do not have an evening service because of the lack of a building. Our mid-week Bible study has averaged between 8 and 10 throughout the year.

The highest attendance for the year was 78 in the Sunday School and 111 in the Worship Service, this gives us some indication of the potential that we have in this growing area.

The total offerings from March 1963 to June 30, 1964 are as follows:

Total offering (Sunday School & Church)	\$3331.70

The highlight of the year was when we were informed officially by the denomination that we would receive the W.M.S. Self-Denial Offering for the year. The goal that was set was \$10,000. We are still waiting word on the results of this offering. We certainly feel at this time that we owe a debt of gratitude to the denomination for this wonderful gift. The congregation in Angola sent in an offering of \$425. toward this goal. Since we were informed that this offering was to be given to us, the local congregation has tripled their weekly offerings.

We now have a group of 18 adult Christians committed to the church and others have indicated spiritual needs. This, of course, is the most critical need we face--we need to build a solid group of spiritual men and women who can stand with us in prayer and faith.

We hope to begin our building within a month. We have a price of \$35,000. for a building that will seat 150. We have also been informed that a 132 house sub-division is to be built directly across from the site of our church building. We believe this is another indication of how God has led from the very beginning in this work.

A Bible Study is still being held in Tonawanda. A very unusual situation is developing there. God is doing something there that is remarkable. We have had in attendance every type of person from the pastor of one of the largest liberal churches in the city of Buffalo to a Jewish taxi-cab driver. We need much prayer to be concentrated on this meeting.

During the year we conducted 17 promotion services in the following churches: Bradford, Big Tree, Blossom, Cleveland Drive, Cuba, East Aurora, East Leon, Ellicott, Forestville, Hamburg, Hess Road, Higgins, Little Valley, Lockport, McRae Brook, Oakland and Wellsville.

A total of 5,000 pieces of mail have also been sent out to our mailing list of 700 interested friends and members of the Conference.

The Cleveland Drive Church has taken some time out of my schedule. For about six weeks I was asked by the Conference to fill the pulpit and take care of prayer meetings and do some calling in the absence of the pastor. I was happy this did not have to be an extended time.

Personally, I am very optimistic about the outreach of our Conference at the present time. Much has been done, but there remains much yet to do. I believe that God has a further plan for us in this area of extension. As I travel over the area to make contacts and survey locations, I am challenged with

what must be done to reach the lost within the bounds of our Conference. Within 15 years the metropolitan area of Buffalo will triple, and the area between Niagara Falls and Lockport will be a solid urban area. We must move out into these areas and drive our stakes for God and the Church.

What has been done has been done because the people of the Conference have given of their material substance as never before, and also they have prayed definitely for this work. There is no limitation to what we can do, under God, if we see the need and want to do something about it.

The Conference Board of Church Extension has asked me to continue on as Conference Pioneer Missionary, working in Angola until such a time as manpower and finances make it possible for me to return to a full time capacity in the field.

Both my wife and I have appreciated, more than we can ever say, the backing of the Conference and your confidence in us. We feel constrained to encourage you to pray for us as we endeavor to serve our Lord and our Church.

REPORT OF THE WOMAN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY

The women of the Conference interested in missions around the globe have extended their prayers and efforts both near at home and to far away places during the fiscal year just past.

On April 11, the Christian Outreach truck came from Detroit, Michigan to collect the tons of repaired used clothing brought to Houghton from the local societies. The camp ground kitchen and dining room has been replenished with new aprons, dish towels and holders made or purchased by the local WMS ladies.

We are happy to join the societies across the denomination in promoting and contributing to the Easter Self-denial offering. This was of special interest to our conference people since the project was designated for pioneer work in the Buffalo area. In our Conference, this amounted to \$1659.41.

Initial steps have been taken toward a scholarship fund for missionary children attending Houghton Academy. Some offerings have been contributed for this project and we are expecting the fund to grow as the need becomes better known and understood. The fund now stands at \$181.50.

Two furloughed missionaries residing in Houghton toured the Conference during the last two weeks in May. Rev. Robert Crosby of Colombia, South America, and Rev. Glenn Barnett, of Haiti, presented the needs of their respective fields and a missionary challenge to each of the local churches.

STANDING RULES

1. Temporary Organization:
The Committee on Temporary Organization shall consist of the Executive Committee of the Conference Society. (President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, Superintendent of Y.M.W.B.)
2. Election of Officers:
The election of Conference Society officers shall be held on Thursday afternoon of Conference. The election of local officers: the annual meeting for the election of the local officers shall be held during the month of June. The local officers shall take office July 1.
3. Missionary Funds:
All money raised by the Societies shall be used for missionary work, and no money shall be paid out without the vote of the local societies. All missionary monies shall be remitted once quarterly to the Conference Treasurer through the local treasurer using the official remittance blanks. The quarters shall close Sept. 15, Dec. 15, March 15, June 15. Remittances shall be sent to the Conference Treasurer by the first of the following month to count on the previous quarter. June 30 shall be the end of the fiscal year.
4. Membership Dues:
The dues of \$1.00 per member, both active and honorary, shall be remitted directly to the Conference Treasurer through the local treasurer. Each society shall also send to the Conference Treasurer the amount equal to sixty cents per active member reported the preceding year, for the Conference Working Fund.

5. Benevolent Credit:

All benevolent receipts that are acceptable shall be sent to the Conference Treasurer, if they are to be included in the Annual Report. Benevolences include: Card Calls, Offerings for projects, for which appeals have been made through the society. To obtain credit where no receipt is available, a statement shall be sent to the Conference Treasurer, of the items and amounts, signed by the local president and secretary.

6. Closing Books and Annual Reports:

Each local treasurer's book shall close following the June meeting, but not later than June 15. All monies and vouchers shall be in the hands of the Conference Treasurer by June 20. Any remittance received after June 20 shall be credited to the new year. The Conference Treasurer shall fill in all disbursements on both copies of the Annual Report blanks, after her books close, and send them to the local treasurers who shall immediately fill in the rest of the report and return one copy before July 5, to the Conference Treasurer to be checked. When correct the Conference Treasurer shall send it to the Statistician. The other copy is to be retained by the local society for the delegate to read at the first meeting of the society following conference.

7. Y.M.W.B.

All money orders and checks for the YMWB shall be made out to the order of the Young Missionary Worker's Band and sent to the Conference YMWB Superintendent. Three cents per member shall be sent to the Conference Superintendent as desk fund. Each local YMWB shall close their books on June 15 and shall send all money to the Conference Superintendent, who shall close her books by June 20.

8. Local Magazine Solicitors:

The president of each local society shall report the name and address of the local solicitor to the Conference Solicitor by July 1.

9. Appointments:

The Executive Board shall appoint a statistician, and an auditor, who shall audit the books of the Treasurer and the YMWB Superintendent before Conference.

10. Credentials:

It shall be the duty of the incoming local President to attend Conference. The name of the new President and Delegates credentials shall be sent to the Conference Secretary at least two weeks prior to the Conference.

11. Fasting and Prayer:

The Friday before Conference shall be observed as a day of fasting and prayer.

12. Conference Body:

The voting body of the Annual Conference Society shall consist of the Conference Officers, Presidents and Delegates from each local society. Lady pastors, pastor's wives, YMWB Superintendents and Missionaries shall be granted honorary seats, and shall have the privilege to speak.

13. Memorials:

Memorials shall be special offerings given, or dues paid in memory of someone.

Report No. 5 PLAN OF WORK

We recommend:

1. That we secure every woman in the church a member of the society or achieve a gain in membership.
2. That a Women's World Fellowship Secretary be elected by the local society who shall promote the General Women's World Fellowship Program of prayer circles, prayer partners, monthly prayer and fast days and encourage every member to use the prayer calendar requests in the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY.
3. That each society use the Penny-a-meal Plan for General World Missions; the Foot of Dime Strips for Mission Field Equipment; and send these funds to the Conference Treasurer; and promote a Community Missions Program.
4. That each society gather reusable discards of clothing and household items and sent to Christian Outreach, Detroit, Michigan, or as directed by our Conference WMS President.
5. That we assume the field support of Ella Woolsey in Sierra Leone.
6. That each society contribute annually at least \$3.00 to Medical Missions; \$10.00 for General Church Extension and Evangelism; \$8.00 for Hephzibah Childrens Home; \$5.00 to Australia; \$5.00 to Brainerd Indian School, and a special offering for the Houghton Academy Scholarship Fund to help our missionary children.
7. That each society elect a Card Call Secretary to promote the plan and collect the stubs to be sent to the Conference Treasurer for benevolent credit.
8. That each society promote the Honorary Student Enrollment Plan of Houghton College, sending pledge cards to the College and monies to the Conference Treasurer.
9. That we observe WESLEYAN MISSIONARY Subscription Campaign month in January; World Day of Prayer in February; Self Denial during Lent; Education Day in October, White Gift Christmas in December; and one month to study and pray for the needs of the Jewish work.

10. That the Conference Standing Rules and the Plan of Work be read in each society at least once a year.

11. That each society make arrangements with the pastor for one prayer meeting each month, stressing missionary needs.

12. That each society send cash equivalent to a case of fruit or vegetables for Conference and Camp use to the Conference Treasurer not later than the third quarter remittance.

13. That each society contribute at least .60 per member to the Conference Working Fund to help provide additional equipment for the Camp Kitchen and meet other Conference Society expenses.

14. That each society, in case of the death of a member or other person in the community, encourage setting aside or collecting money for some missionary project, rather than buying flowers, and that a memorial card be sent to the family.

15. That each society appoint a Temperance Secretary to bring in Temperance information and prayer items.

16. That an offering for the American Bible Society be taken during Universal Bible Reading Period, and channeled through the Conference Treasurer.

STANDING RULES

1. Conference Dues:
Each local society shall pay into the Conference W. Y. treasury the sum of fifty cents per active member. Such money shall be used to carry on the work of the Executive Council.
2. Date of the Annual Convention:
The date of the Annual W.Y. Convention of the Lockport Conference shall be left in the hands of the Executive Council.
3. Closing Treasurer's Books:
The Conference W.Y. treasurer is hereby authorized to close all books July 5. Therefore, all monies and receipts should be in her hands by that time if credit is desired on the Statistical Reports.
4. Delegates' Credentials:
The secretary of each local shall forward to the Conference secretary, not later than one week before the Annual W.Y. Convention, delegate credentials from the local.
5. Youth Camp:
 1. President of Youth Camps - W.Y. President
 2. Director of Youth Camp - Appointed by Executive Council.
 3. Director of Youth Adult Camp - Appointed by Executive Council.
6. Nominating Committee:
The Executive Board shall be the Nominating Committee for the District Chairman and all Conference Officers except the President.
7. Pastors:
All pastors shall be entitled to a vote and a seat within the bar of the Annual Convention.

8. Pioneer Secretary:
All organized W.Y. should elect a local pioneer secretary to promote and support the Conference Church Extension program.
9. Executive Council:
The District Chairmen shall be included in the Executive Council.
10. District Organization:
Following his election, the District Chairman shall call his district into official session at the Convention to elect the remaining members of his committee, and the committee shall meet and plan the year's activities. (for the W.Y. budget apportionment see the report of the budget apportionment committee of the Annual Conference.)
