

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CONFERENCE STANDING RULES

- 1. All visiting ministers of our own or other denominations who are in harmony with our reformatory principles are invited to honorary seats in this Conference.
- 2. Conference shall convene annually on the Chambers Campground at 2:00 p. m., the last Tuesday of June, except that quadrennially it shall convene the second Tuesday after General Conference convenes. The forenoon sessions shall begin at 8:30 and close at 10:45; the afternoon sessions shall begin at 1:30 and close by vote. The six front seats shall comprise the Bar of the Conference.
- 3. Persons in the Course of Study may have the privilege of taking examinations during the interim of Conference by reporting to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders according to the departmentalized system. (See Report No. 10.)
- 4. Examinations should be in the hands of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders not later than two weeks before the opening of the Conference.
- 5. No monies are to be loaned on security by the Treasurer without the approval of the President and Secretary of the Conference.
- 6. The following order of business has been adopted for the sessions of Conference: 1. Devotional services. 2. Roll call and reading of the minutes. 3. Appointment of committees. 4. Report of committees. 5. Miscellaneous business. 6. Passage of character.
- 7. It is recommended that the local churches take the vote regarding their pastor between sixty and forty-five days before Conference.
- 8. The Conference Secretary and Conference Treasurer shall each receive \$50 annually.
- 9. Pastors shall state financial items in their statistical reports in even dollars, except in Item VIII (8), and so far as possible are requested to report all Budget items in even dollars. When the pastors fail to observe this rule in other than Budget items, the Statistical Secretary shall omit the decimals from their reports.
- 10. There shall be elected a Conference Statistician whose term of office shall not expire till the close of the Conference session following his election. He shall be the Chairman of the Statistical Committee and shall be authorized to choose the members of said committee. Pastors shall send their Statistical Reports to the Statistician not later than one week before Conference convenes.

- 11. In the reporting of statistics, pastors shall read as follows: ITEM I, only when time is less than twelve months; in ITEM II read only number of Wesleyan Methodists, Missionary Magazines, and Wesleyan Youths taken; in ITEM III read only Number reported last year, Present number, and Associate Members; in ITEM IV read only Average Attendance; read ITEMS V, VI, VIII and X in full; read no blanks. Comments by the pastor after having read his report shall be limited to three minutes.
- 12. Each local church of the Conference shall close its financial records for the conference year May 31. To receive credit all cash must be sent to the Conference Treasurer by June 10. Any money received after that date will be applied on the next year.
- 13. The report of the W. M. Society shall be made a part of the printed minutes of the Rochester Conference.
- 14. The President of the Conference and the President of the W. Y. P. S. shall be members of the Camp Meeting Committee, ex-officio.
- 15. The President of the W. M. Society shall be a member of the Missionary Board, ex-officio.
- 16. All monies coming to this Conference from the sale of Church and Parsonage buildings shall become a part of the Building Fund (heretofore known as the Pine Glenn Church Fund) and shall be used according to the rules governing the use of said fund.
- 17. The Conference Board of Trustees shall choose a Committee of three of their own number to constitute a Committee on Location of Churches and Parsonages, and the names of this Committee shall be printed in the minutes; no building project shall be undertaken without their study and approval.
- 18. No charge shall consummate the engagement of a pastor for their charge without the consent of the Conference President and his Advisory Board.
- 19. The Conference Secretary shall have authority to make any necessary corrections to the minutes.
- 20. At the time of election of Conference Officers the Conference shall elect by ballot from among the Elders a Chairman of the Camp Meeting Committee.
- 21. Each pastor shall turn in to the Conference Treasurer through his local Church Treasurer sufficient money to pay for the minutes ordered

at 25 cents per copy. The Secretary to request that the price of 25 cents per copy be stamped on each copy of the minutes.

- 22. Each charge in the Conference shall give their pastor at least two weeks' vacation with pay, each year.
- 23. The Onondaga Reservation charge shall not be assigned budget for "Conference Work," the Connectional Budget only being assigned this charge.
- 24. The Budget Apportionment Committee shall apportion budget to all members regardless of age.
- 25. The Sunday School Secretary shall nominate the remaining members of the Sunday School Board.
- 26. Persons recommended to study or to travel under the direction of the Conference must appear personally before the Committee on Itineracy and Orders before they are accepted, and annually as long as they continue in the Course of Study. It is urged that persons pursuing the Course of Study leading to Elder's Orders complete a course of study of not less than six weeks duration approved by the Committee on Itineracy and Orders, which may be taken upon one of our college campuses, or some other college campus approved by said committee.
- 27. The Conference President shall be Chairman ex-officio of the committee for planning the usual Fall Ministerial Institute.
- 28. It shall be the duty of the pastors to forward to the Conference Secretary not later than one week before the Annual Conference convenes, the credentials of the delegate from his charge.

JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

First Day-Tuesday Afternoon

The Rochester Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America convened for its one hundred fourth annual session on the Chambers Campground at 2:00 p. m., Tuesday, June 29, 1948.

The Rev. Edwin Macumber led the Conference in the singing of two hymns after which the Rev. David Buchanan led in devotions.

The Conference was called to order by the President, the Rev. Wesley B. Nussey. The roll was called, showing twenty-two preachers and eighteen delegates present.

The President appointed Chester Osgood and William Woughter a

Committee on Credentials.

It was voted that Mr. Otto Namitz be seated as the delegate from the Fyler Church.

It was voted that J. R. Redstone be Conference Reporter.

A Nominating Committee was constituted by vote as follows: Wesley Nussey, chairman; Harold Douglass, Charles Guernsey, Stanley Wright, and Stanley Lawrence.

The Vice-President, the Rev. George Hilson, was called to the Chair and presented the Rev. Wesley Nussey who spoke briefly from Acts 1:8b, calling attention to the privilege and duty of witnessing for Christ, and emphasizing some of the important effects of faithful witnessing.

It was voted that the Conference recess to the call of the Chair.

Conference re-convened at the call of the Chair. The Secretary read the report of the Nominating Committee, which was adopted by vote. (See Report No. 1.)

The President appointed Clara McLeister and Bond Harlan as a

Courtesy Committee.

The President appointed as lay members of the Committee on Itiner-

acy and Orders Anne Crook and Blanche Wilson.

It was moved and seconded that in compiling its summary report the Statistical Committee omit the items under Section VIII "Total General Budget" and "Total Conference Budget"; also under Section X omit "Total for Pastor," "Total for Church," "Total for Budget" and "Total for Benevolences."

It was moved and seconded as an amendment that the Committee do not omit from its report any items under Section X.

The amendment was passed, and the motion as amended was passed. It was voted to adjourn.

First Day-Tuesday Evening

The opening evening service of the Conference was well attended.

The song service was led by Mr. Harold Stewart and the Rev. Henry Lelear offered prayer. The Conference President presented the Rev. Gerald Wright who had been elected to preach the opening sermon.

Brother Wright used as a text 1 John 1:7. During his introductory remarks he said, "One cannot have 'fulness of joy' by being a 'sinning Christian,' nor by compromising with the world." He stated two characteristics of walking in the light: fellowship (God and I), and cleansing from all sin.

Outstanding quotations from this heartsearching message are: "Walking in the light not only results in two definite works of grace, but also growth in grace." (Phil. 1:9; 2 Peter 1:2; 2 Cor. 10:15; Col. 1:10; 2 Peter 1:8.) "All that God has for us as individuals and as a Conference comes only by walking in the light." "Yes, just walking in the light will bring local and Conference wide revivals."

Second Day-Wednesday Forenoon

Conference was called to order and the Rev. C. B. Newbury led the devotions.

The roll was called and the minutes of the previous business session were read and approved.

The Committee on Orders of the Day read its report. It was voted that this report be referred to a joint meeting of this committee and the Committee on Religious Services.

The Vice-President was called to the Chair and these committees were excused for committee work.

The Conference Treasurer read his annual report. It was voted to refer it to the Auditing Committee. (See Report No. 2.)

The Camp Meeting Treasurer read his annual report. It was voted to refer it to the Auditing Committee. (See Report No. 3.)

The Credentials Committee read a partial report. It was moved and seconded that the names read be placed on the Conference roll. It was moved and seconded as an amendment that the name of Howard Burnham be stricken out and that of Elizabeth Chamberlain be inserted in its place. The amendment and motion as amended were passed.

The Committee on Orders of the Day read its revised report, which was adopted. (See Report No. 4.)

It was voted that we elect a Nominating Committee for next year at this Conference session.

It was voted that the Conference Secretary be a Committee on Credentials, and by virtue of his office be a member of the Nominating Committee.

It was moved and seconded that Standing Rule 12 be changed by rewording the first sentence as follows: "All charge statistics shall be for the year beginning and ending midnight May 31." It was moved and seconded as an amendment that the first sentence of Rule 12 read, "It is recommended that each Church of the Conference close its financial records for the Conference year on May 31," and that the last sentence read, "All money received by the Conference Treasurer later than June 10 shall be applied on the following year."

Orders of the Day were called for. The Sunday School Secretary read his financial report for the year, which was referred to the Auditing Committee. He then read his annual report, which was adopted. (See Report No. 5.)

It was voted that the Silver Cup Standard remain the same as last year. (See Report No. 5.)

It was voted that the matter of amending Standing Rule No. 12 be referred to the Resolutions Committee.

The Courtesy Committee presented to the Conference the Rev. John W. Osberg, District Secretary of the American Bible Society, and Dr. I. F. McLeister, who both greeted the Conference.

The Passage of Character Committee presented a partial report, which was adopted.

It was voted to adjourn.

Second Day-Wednesday Afternoon

The Conference was called to order by the Vice-President. The Rev. George Crook led the devotions. The Roll was called and the minutes of the previous session were read and approved.

The Courtesy Committee presented to the Conference Dr. F. R. Eddy, Connectional Agent, and the Rev. Charles McPherson who both greeted the Conference.

An Order of the Day—The Rev. John W. Osberg, District Secretary of the American Bible Society, told of some of the work of the Society and presented its interests to the Conference.

It was voted that the Order of the Day relating to the awarding of the Silver Cup by the Sunday School Secretary be changed so that the award will be made during the early part of the Public Missionary Service on Thursday evening.

An Order of the Day—The Conference President gave his report which included recommendations and financial items. It was voted to refer the financial report to the Auditing Committee.

It was voted that the main report of the President, including recommendations, be adopted. (See Report No. 14.)

The President took the Chair.

The Committee on Religious Services read its report. It was moved and seconded that this report be adopted.

It was moved and seconded as an amendment that the name of Wes-

ley Nussey be stricken from the item relative to the Sunday morning service and the name of Rev. Leo Cox be inserted in its place.

It was voted that this section of the report be referred back to the committee.

It was voted that the item relative to a memorial service for Mrs. Emma Cole be referred back to the committee which is to confer with the Woman's Missionary Society.

It was voted that the remainder of the report on Religious Services (except the above mentioned two items) be adopted. (See Report No. 13.)

An Order of the Day—The President of the Conference W. Y. P. S., the Rev. Russell Bremer, gave his annual report, which was adopted. (See Report No. 6.) The Treasurer of the Conference W. Y. P. S., Mrs. Olive Dekker, gave the annual financial report, which was referred to the Auditing Committee. (See Report No. 6.)

The Committee on Passage of Character read a partial report which was adopted.

The following pastors, whose characters had been passed, reported from their churches: James Bence, George Crook, Willard Dekker, Charles Guernsey, Bond Harlan, Harley Hill, George Hilson, and Leon Jelliff.

A recommendation was presented from the Willett Memorial Church to the effect that Ezra Morgan be received to study and travel under the direction of the Conference. This was referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

It was voted to adjourn.

Third Day-Thursday Forenoon

Conference was called to order and devotions were led by the Rev. Stanley Lawrence. The roll was called and the minutes of the previous session were read, corrected and approved.

It was voted that the alternate delegate from Canisteo, Adeline Brown, be seated in place of the delegate, Robert Wilhelm, who was forced by illness to leave Conference.

An Order of the Day-The election of Conference Officers.

Fourth Day-Friday Forenoon

The Committee on Resolutions presented the following: (See Report No. 7.)

This Committee also brought in a recommendation relative to Standing Rule No. 12 (viz.), which was adopted.

It was voted to adopt the following recommendation to become Standing Rule No. 28: "It shall be the duty of the pastors to forward to the Conference Secretary not later than one week before Annual Conference convenes the delegate's credentials from his charge."

It was voted as an amendment to Standing Rule No. 10 that the pastors send their Statistical Reports to the Conference Statistician not later than one week before Conference sets.

The Committee on Pastoral Relations read a partial report.

It was moved and seconded that the Conference President investigate

the matter of altering the corporate name of the Rochester Conference. It was voted to refer this matter to the Committee on Resolutions.

It was voted that the alternate delegate from Waterloo be seated as a member of the Conference.

The Committee on Resolutions presented the following:

Whereas: The Wesleyan Methodist Connection (or Church) of America, in its regular General Conference session assembled in Houghton, N. Y., on June 25, 1947, voted to change its corporate name to The Wesleyan Methodist Church of America;

We appreciate the cooperation of Rev. Henry Lelear, Vice-President, Mrs. Willard Dekker, Secretary and Treasurer; and Rev. Wesley Nussey, Conference President, in the work of the W. Y. P. S. for this year.

The committee appointed to buy seats for the Young People's Tabernacle, have bought a very fine set of seats, which have been installed.

Recommendations

We recommend that we continue our present policy of:

Raising \$1.00 per society for Conference expenses.

Raising 50¢ per active member for connectional expenses.

Raising 50¢ per active member for pioneer work.

Raising 50¢ per active member for repairs on the young people's tabernacle.

We further recommend:

That each society send in ¼ of its dues to the Conference Treasurer at the end of each of the first three quarters, and the last quarter's part by May-31.

That every district of the Conference W. Y. P. S. hold at least two conventions every year.

That the members of the societies cooperate, and attend, as far as possible, the youth institute at Houghton in September.

Recommendations

1. We recommend that Rev. James E. Bence be the Editor and Publisher of the Rochester Conference News and that he be remunerated in amount of \$25.00 in addition to actual materials and printing costs.

2. We recommend the following appropriations be made: Hugh Newcomb, Pastor, Onondaga Indian Reservation, \$300.00; Stanley Lawrence, Pastor of the Westfield Church, \$500.00 and moving expenses; Paul Dufford, Pastor of the Utica Church, \$100.00; Chester Osgood, Pastor of the Taylor Church, \$50.00 toward moving expenses; William Woughter, Pastor of the Odessa Church, \$200.00; George W. Crook, Pastor of the Waterloo Church, \$200.00; Mary Carnahan, Pastor of the Redfield Church,

\$100.00; Charles Guernsey, Pastor of the East Randolph and Blatchley Church, \$100.00.

- 3. We recommend that each charge immediately take a special offering to be sent directly to Rev. Hugh Newcomb and family, and that this offering be distinctly separate from any offering taken at the request of the Home Missionary Secretary.
- 4. We recommend that, for the supervision of the Conference Work, the salary of the Conference President be \$600.00 plus 5¢ per mile and other related travel expenses, and that the President be authorized to employ necessary secretarial help.
- 5. We recommend that the Committee on Evangelism, with the advice and approval of the President and the Advisory Board, be authorized to survey possible locations for pioneer evangelism, and to conduct evangelistic campaigns if deemed advisable. We further recommend that \$500.00 be made available from the Extension Fund for this work.
- 6. We recommend that the Conference President shall contact each charge by mail, or personally, in order to emphasize the need for adjustment of pastor's remuneration, as much as possible, in line with current living costs.
- 7. We recommend that the Conference President be authorized to present to each charge of the Conference, at the time of his official visit, the provision of paragraph 386 of the Discipline that the church property, including parsonages and lots, be deeded to the Conference.
- 8. We recommend that the first sentence of Standing Rule No. 2 be changed to read: "Conference shall convene annually on the Chambers Campground at 2:00 p. m. the last Tuesday of June, except that quadrennially it shall convene the second Tuesday after General Conference convenes."

Report No. 14 CONFERENCE PRESIDENT

To the members of the Rochester Conference, we extend Christian greetings:

It is through Divine providence that we are permitted to gather for the 104th Annual Session of the Rochester Conference being held this year in Chambers, N. Y.

First of all, we desire to recognize the guiding hand of our Lord and Master throughout this conference year. Then, we would thank all of the conference brethren for their coöperation and charity with us in this, our first year as Conference President. The duties of the office have been rendered lighter by the experienced counsel of the Advisory Board, Rev. David A. Rees and Mr. Floyd G. Douglass. The Vice-President, Rev. George B. Hilson, has given readily of his assistance whenever asked. We now take this opportunity to publicly thank these three brethren. We further recognize the valuable service rendered the Conference by the Secretary of Evangelism, Rev. Henry Lelear, in publishing and circulating the stirring leaflet, The Evangelistic Messenger. It has brought to some of us a needed uncomfortableness.

Official Acts: Following the rise of Conference last year, we issued Authorization Papers to those whose names were given to us by the Committee on Itinercy and Orders. The supplying of a pastor for the Shady Grove Church was left in the hands of the President. Acting closely with the Shady Grove Church and the Advisory Board, Mr. Edwin E. Macumber was secured to supply for the conference year. We are glad to be able to state that the appointment has been well received and has been blessed of God.

The work at Union Center was also left in the hands of the President. Shortly after the rise of Conference, we received an offer on the property there. The Advisory Board was consulted on the advisability of officially discontinuing the work at Union Center. This they voted to do. The Board of Trustees then voted to sell the property to H. Stacey Young and his wife, Ella J. Young, for the price of \$2,000. After considerable work, the sale of the property was completed on June 22, 1948.

The work at Groton, N. Y., was left in the hands of the President. We regret that we were not not able to make a pastoral appointment.

The purchase of the parsonage property at Redfield, N. Y., for the sum of \$2,500 was completed at Oswego, N. Y., on September 19, 1947.

During the year we have visited most of the churches and carried on the necessary correspondence. It has been our aim to answer all correspondence immediately though in a few cases our reply may have been somewhat tardy due to more urgent business of the moment or to the call of our own pastorate. It was our pleasant task to take part in a note-burning service at Riverside Church, Painted Post, N. Y., on the morning of Sunday, May 23, 1948. We regret that due to car trouble we were prevented from assisting in the rededication of the renovated church at West Jasper, N. Y.

It was our privilege to attend the first Leaders' Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church that was ever to be held. The place was the College Church, Marion, Indiana, with the Indiana Conference and Marion College acting as hosts. The time was March 30, 31 and April 1. Space will not permit an account of this conference. Suffice it to say, that we came away fired by the possibilities that are ours, but with no illusions concerning the adversaries which we face.

Recommendations:

- 1. That a Committee on Evangelism be elected whose chairman will be the Secretary of Evangelism. The duties of this committee is to be the exploring of promising territory for evangelism, and the devising of methods for the realizing of new churches in these places. This committee is to work in close counsel with the Conference President and the President of the W. Y. P. S. We urge that the conference youth be given a responsible part in our pioneer projects.
- 2. That the Conference Treasurer be authorized to pay the Conference President's expenses to the 1949 Leaders' Conference.
 - 3. That every pastor make a supreme effort to be present at our

annual camp meetings permitting no easy excuses to keep him away. Further, that every pastor plan to come to and remain throughout the Bible Institute. Both the camp meeting and Bible Institute need YOUR support if they are to succeed.

- 4. That Standing Rule No. 14 be changed to read: "The President of the Conference and the President of the W. Y. P. S. shall be members of the Camp meeting Committee, ex-officio."
- 5. That the Rev. S. W. Blanchard be listed as an Elder of the Rochester Conference upon the adoption of this report and the receipt of his transfer from the Canada Conference.

- 3. Clothing and other contributions may be sent to Home Mission Stations as listed on the back cover of the Wesleyan Missionary. The value of the boxes of clothing and bandages should be reported under items of interest and not included in the cash report. (Miss Stella Wood, our editor will place stars before those stations which do not want clothing. Watch the Missionary Magazine.)
- 4. The Onondaga Indian Reservation is in charge of Rev. H. C. Newcomb, Nedrow, N. Y., Route 1. Write for information concerning their needs.
- 5. Remember Educational Harvest Day for Houghton College with a program, and with contributions of cash, fruit and vegetables. Address President S. W. Paine, Houghton, N. Y.
- 6. Each local society is urged to continue sending money to the Treasurer to apply on the Building Fund.
- 7. Fruit and vegetables will be needed next year in the dining room at Conference time. Credit will be given as follows: Fruit per quart jar, 35 cents; vegetables, 25 cents; jams and jellies, 40 cents per quart; meat by weight. These figures are subject to change in accordance with prevailing prices. The following is a list of articles needed for the dormitories for the coming year: mattresses, pillows, bath towels, wash cloths and roller towels.
- 8. Mrs. Beatrice Lelear, Wallace, N. Y. is Matron of the Dormitories. Write her early for room reservations for 1949.

III. Efficiency Standard

We urge each Society to adopt and work the Efficiency Standard—Ten points each.

- 1. Ten meetings during the year in which prayer service is held and business transacted.
- 2. Five programs given, choice of the following: Africa, India, South America, China, Japan, Australia, Home Missions, Education, or use of Text Book.
 - 3. One public meeting, or one meeting conducted by the men.
- 4. Designate members to correspond with our missionaries, Home and Foreign, or use of the Prayer Partner Plan.
- 5. The President, Secretary and Treasurer a subscriber to the Wesleyan Missionary, and 75% of the active membership reading the magazine.
- 6. A Solicitor elected for the Wesleyan Missionary who shall secure new subscriptions and renewals, gaining not less than two subscriptions a year.
- 7. A Delegate elected to the Annual Conference Woman's Missionary Society.
 - 8. Report blanks properly filled out, on time.
- 9. At annual meeting instruct the delegate as to the amount to pledge at the Conference Society.
 - 10. Officers elected at the last meeting of the conference year.
- 11. All money received as dues, both active and honorary, shall be sent to the Conference Treasurer and designated as such. Dues are one dollar per member.
 - 12. A Superintendent and organization of the Y. M. W. B.
- 13. A 10% gain in membership or every woman a member and every man an honorary member.
- 14. Money sent to the Conference Treasurer fourteen days before Conference meets.
- 15. Have one lesson on Parliamentary Law and two Parliamentary Drills during the year.
- 16. That the Efficiency Standard be read in the society at least once a year.
- 17. That arrangements be made with the pastor for one Missionary Prayer Meeting each month.

THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETINGS OF W. M. S.

The next item discussed was the Sanitation System. There were three letters read, one from Mrs. Olive Dekker telling us of the business transacted at Conference time, about the sanitation system and two letters

from Mrs. Pearl Douglass.

It was moved and seconded that our Treasurer be instructed to take one hundred dollars from the Building Fund and one hundred dollars from the General Fund to be applied on the Sanitation System. This is to be sent at once. Adopted unanimously.

Moved and seconded that all money coming in this year for the building fund be applied on the Sanitation System Project. Adopted unani-

mously.

It was moved and seconded that Beatrice Lelear and Mrs. Myrtle Lawrence be a committee for needed paint and repairs for the worker's cottage and to secure the needed labor to accomplish it. Adopted.

A suggestion was given that Mrs. Lawrence write Rev. Wesley Nussey

about the Utica need and whether money should be sent.

Motion made and seconded that the following rules be adopted for the rooms at camp with the approval of the Camp Meeting Committee. Adopted. (Rules listed at close of this report.)

Motion made and seconded that the matron buy receipt books and

issue receipts to renters. Adopted.

The plans for the Conventions were made with the first convention at Riverside on the 27th; Canandaigua 28th; and Sandy Creek 29th. The speakers for the conventions are to be Rev. J. R. Swauger and Rev. Archie Argo and Mrs. Argo.

Rules for Roomers at Camp

1. One Dollar Deposit To Hold From Year to Year. In order to hold a room from year to year, a deposit of One Dollar must be left with the Matron. This deposit is held until the matron is notified that the Room Holder gives up the right to the room. The dollar will apply on

the room rent if the person holding the room uses that room. The Matron must be notified that you are or are not going to use your room at least two weeks before Conference. Matron must send reply post card reminders to room holders at least three weeks before Conference.

- 2. To Retain Room When Not in Use. If the Room Holder does not desire to use the room for any certain year, by notifying the Matron two weeks before Conference the room may still be held the following year. If the one dollar is paid as referred to in Rule 1 and the room is not used, the Room Holder will be liable for the entire rent, unless notice is given at least two weeks before Conference.
- 3. When Room Holder Forfeits. If the Room Holder does not notify the Matron at all the room will be considered forfeited at the discretion of the Matron and will be given to another.
- 4. No Rooms Sublet. A Room Holder may not sublet a room without the consent of the Matron.

It was voted that Beatrice Lelear be Matron for the next year.

W. M. S. PRESIDENT'S REPORT June 30, 1948

To the Rochester Conference Woman's Missionary Society Convened at Chambers, N. Y.

Greetings in the name of Him who loved us, and gave Himself for us and washed us in His precious blood.

As usual, the first duty I faced was that of securing a missionary to tour the Conference. While at Chambers, I wrote Brother Birch concerning this matter. For a time, it seemed doubtful that we would secure a missionary but God intervened in our behalf and Miss Job came to us. As far as I have heard, the various societies enjoyed Miss Job. We entertained her several days and found her to be a most enjoyable person.

In September, I sent out circular letters containing plans and suggestions for the year.

In early October, I sent letters to all local presidents and pastors relative to Miss Job's itinerary. I want to express my appreciation for the way pastors and local presidents took care of Miss Job. She said she had no trouble or unnecessary waits but was well provided for.

On October 4, I sent 30 packages of posters to pastors to advertise Miss Job's meetings. I would appreciate knowing if they met the need or if some other method of advertising would be better.

On October 31, I received a letter from Opal Gibbs asking me to help supply gifts and treats for our Sunday school children in Japan for Christmas. Accordingly, I contacted Wallace, Haskinville, Beuna Vista, Riverside, and Canisteo. Each of these societies responded gladly and the need was abundantly met as you, no doubt, read in Brother Gibbs' letter in the magazine.

November 15, I sent out my third circular letter. It concerned camp kitchen supplies, the showers for the Davises and places for the Spring conventions. I received a letter of appreciation from Sister Davis giving an account of what various societies have done for them. I appreciate this generous response.

Fifty-three dollars and 55 cents have been sent to Sister Douglass toward equipment for the camp kitchen. January 7, after consultation with the Executive Committee, I appointed Mrs. Ethel Collier Conference Mission Study Secretary.

Early in January, I began corresponding concerning the Spring Conventions. The district leaders, Mrs. Redstone, Mrs. Hilson, and Mrs. Edna Wright, were most cooperative as was the Executive Committee.

Having secured Brother and Sister Argo and Brother Swauger as convention speakers, the Executive Committee met at Haskinville, February 24 to romplete plans for the conventions and transact other accumulated business.
