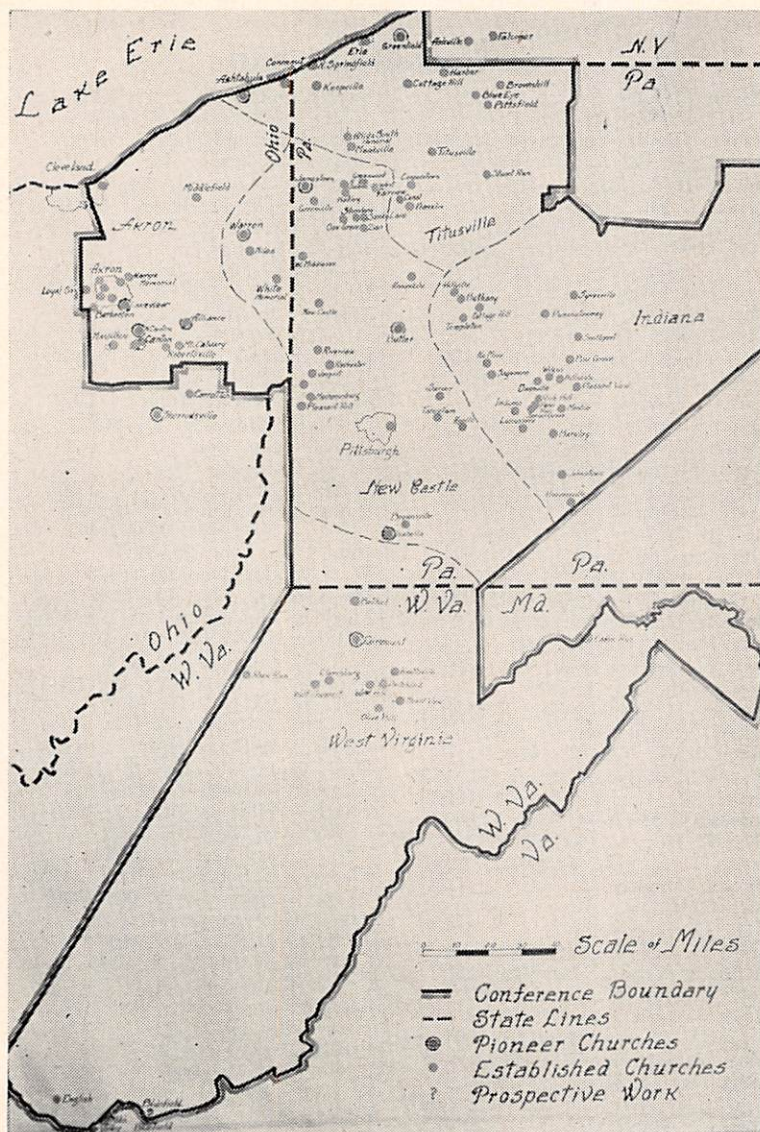

REPORTS

REPORT NO. 1

THE CONFERENCE PRESIDENT

Dear Brethren and Sisters in Christ:

To the members of the 110th Annual Session of the Allegheny Conference here assembled, Greetings in the name of Him who exhorts us to "Watch therefore; for ye know not what hour your Lord doth come . . . Therefore be ye also ready for in such an hour as ye think not the Son of Man cometh." (Matthew 24:42-44).

Again, in the good providence of God, it is our privilege to assemble upon this sacred Hill-top where God has met with us so many times. For this freedom which still is ours we shall fervently thank God. As ministers and laymen we are here assembled to take care of the work which the Lord has entrusted to our care. May all our deliberations, decisions, actions and plans be made in the fear of God. May the blessed Holy Spirit aid us in solving all the problems which confront us and may He enable us in this day of unrest, contention, dissention, name-calling, division, compromise and apostacy to care for all the work of Christ and the Church without compromise on the one hand but with earnest endeavour "to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace" on the other. Let us carefully and prayerfully manifest to this world the love one for another commanded by Christ Himself when He said, 'A new commandment I give unto you, That ye love one another; as I have loved you, that ye also love one another. By this shall all men know that ye are my disciples, if ye have love one for another.' (John 13:34-35).

The closing Conference year has been one of many perplexities but NOT OF DESPAIR. Mrs. Van Wormer's long illness has made the work much harder and much more difficult and has meant some changes. The churches which were doubled up for Quarterly Meetings received only one service on Sunday instead of two as here-to-fore. Then, too, in a few instances we had to cancel some Quarterly Meetings at the last moment on account of her sickness. We, especially, wish to thank the Lord for the good health He gave us through it all, and we are grateful that she is well on the road to full recovery.

It would be proper, we feel, to express our appreciation for the excellent co-operation given by our good vice-president, Rev. T. A. Robertson.

On several occasions due to the illness of Mrs. Van Wormer we were unable to take care of some of the problems which needed immediate attention. Bro. Robertson always managed to make a way to go and to attend to the need when it arose. In every case he has dealt with the situation with understanding, fairness, kindness, wisdom and with the definite help of the Lord. We greatly appreciate his faithful backing, brotherly kindness and wise counsel.

Then, too, we believe it would be in order to speak a word for our new

Pioneer Secretary, Rev. C. R. McPherson. This, his first year in the Pioneer Field, has been a time of getting adjusted to a new kind of work, but we are sure that the Lord has wonderfully helped him thus far. In his supervisory work he has shown firmness, wisdom and skill in handling some problems. In his report you will find that some definite progress has been made. We must remember that in these days of apostasy it is difficult to get new works started and established which will be solid, substantial and self-supporting.

The Conference Perspective—In many ways this has been a year of definite progress. At present we have five radio broadcasts within the Conference. Materially, there have been some excellent accomplishments. Penn Run, Warren, Tazewell and Akron Grace have completed beautiful new churches in which to worship. Loyal Oak, Cabin Run and Alliance have finished their basement churches which are now in use. Soldier, Abb's Valley, Sandy Lake and Barberton are in the process of building new churches. Apollo has purchased a lot and plan to build soon. Ashtabula Church has been given the church building in which they have been worshipping. Pittsfield and Coopers-town have completed their new Sunday School rooms. Oak Grove has put new Sunday School rooms in the basement of their church and have made other changes. Greenville has completely remodelled their parsonage and plan to remodel their church. Other churches have made repairs both to churches and parsonages which were much needed. A new tabernacle was erected on the camp ground for the Young People which was greatly enjoyed during the last camp. The Cleveland First Church is being forced to relocate both church and parsonage on account of a shift in population in their community. This is proving to be a real task but the Lord is graciously helping them in this matter. Be sure to remember them in your prayers. Some of the churches have made strides in paying off their debts.

Spiritually—While spirituality is a realm wherein advancement is not always an easily discernable factor, it has been our great objective. Our definite aim has been revival fires, regenerated souls, entirely sanctified believers, holy lives and holy living—these are items of supreme importance for they indicate the fulfillment of the Master's Great Design. In some sections we believe definite progress has been made while in others advance has been very slow. Our gain in membership is very small compared to last year but thank God it is a gain and not a loss. Some of our Churches have reported excellent revivals and Youth Services which went on for several weeks. Others have reported good meetings, better interest, excellent seasons of prayer, fine Watch Night meeting, etc. Some of our churches are in the best spiritual condition we have ever known them while a few others continue to be on the losing side. A number have reported that they have seen souls saved who were never saved before. This is as it ought to be.

The Lord gave us a wonderful Young People's Convention, the best Camp Meeting in a number of years and a gracious Ministerial Institute.

CONCLUSION: As we bring this report to a close we wish to thank each one of you for your splendid co-operation, for the many who have prayed for us, for the excellent gift given to us by the churches of the Conference to help care for the added expense incurred by Mrs. Van Wormer's long continued illness, for the many kindnesses which have been shown us and for the way you have loyally stood back of us. As we go into another Conference Year, we invite your attention to the slogan of the Ground Observers Corps, "Safe because you keep your eyes on the sky." Because of the subtle infiltration of naturalism, liberalism, secularism, and ecclesiasticism, the faith and security of our people are at stake if these menacing influences are allowed to wreak their destruction upon the citadels of our faith. One has said, "The time has come for each individual Christian to volunteer, at what ever sacrificial cost may be involved, to man the battlements of Christendom and scan the skies for the very appearance of evil. The time has passed when we can trust every man who wears the garb of a cleric or every professor of religion who instructs us.

The time has passed when tradition alone is sufficient guarantee that an ecclesiastical establishment is preserving and promoting the "faith once for all delivered." Our loyalty is first of all to the Christ and the Church He purchased with His own precious Blood. Every one of us individually must be watchmen on the walls of His Zion that the enemies without and within may be detected and destroyed! Every true Christian in these crisis days needs to know and live the Word of God and keep his eyes on the Lord of his Salvation. If we will follow Him and Him alone the future will be bright for us and for our church. "And this I do say, brothers: the margin of time left before the Second Coming is very narrow . . . live a life of peace, not of wrangling" (I Cor. 7:29-15, Way.)

REPORT NO. 4

COMMITTEE ON AUDITING AND FINANCE

Your Committee on Auditing and Finance submits the following report and recommendations:

ITEM I. WHAT SHALL THE CHURCHES PAY?

1. The following Denominational Budget items: Foreign Missions, \$2.00; Education, \$2.00; Pension, \$1.25; Home Missions, \$1.25; Hephzibah Orphan-

age, \$.25; Administrative Budget, \$.40; General Conference Travel and Entertainment, \$.15; Australia, \$.25; (These assessments are per church member per year).

2. Undivided Conference Budget (Conference work) shall be equal to ten percent of the sum obtained by adding the three following items: Pastor's salary, parsonage rent, and church incidental expenses. (To be remitted monthly). Included in church incidental expenses are: Parsonage taxed, all kinds of insurance on church and parsonage, janitor services and supplies, church utilities and fuel, parsonage utilities and fuel when paid by the church, pastor's car expense when provided by the church, all other items which are similar to or comparable with the above. Not included are repairs, replacements, improvements, evangelistic help, and special projects, church and parsonage furnishings, Sunday School and Church literature and similar items.

3. Conference Group Life Insurance, \$.35 per member.

4. Conference Entertainment, \$.35 per member.

5. The Pioneer self-denial envelopes for remittances of \$.25 or more monthly (above tithe) shall be given our continued support.

6. General Church Extension shall be encouraged through the use of the Card Call Plan in our churches.

7. The pastor or person responsible for the sale of Conference Minutes in the local church shall remit \$.50 per copy to the Chairman of the Committee on the sale of Conference Minutes by March 31. The Chairman of said Committee shall mail statements to all who have not paid for their minutes by March 31, thus enabling the report of the Committee to be prepared by April 30.

8. The above financial items, with the exception of those mentioned in Paragraphs 6 and 7, shall be sent to the District Sub-treasurers. Church treasurers are to make monthly remittances to the credit of Conference work, Conference Missions and Pioneer Fund.

9. Church Treasurer's reports to Quarterly Conference shall be made as of the close of the month preceding the Quarterly Conference. All church treasurers' records for the Conference year shall close April 30. The Conference fiscal year is from May 1 to April 30.

ITEM II. WHAT SHALL THE SUNDAY SCHOOL PAY?

1. The first Sunday School offering of the month to Conference Missions for the use of churches not self-supporting, etc., according to the recommendations of the Conference Mission Board.

2. Sunday School Birthday offerings to Conference Missions.

3. Denominational Sunday School Budget of \$.10 per Sunday School member.

4. The three items above mentioned are to be paid to the local Church treasurer for remittance to sub-treasurer.

ITEM III. WHAT SHALL THE CONFERENCE TREASURER PAY?

1. To the Conference President:

A. \$3,640.00 annual salary.

- B. \$100.00 annual vacation bonus.
 - C. \$400.00 annually for secretary services.
 - D. \$700.00 annual travelling expenses.
 - E. The cost of providing \$100,000.00 liability insurance on his car.
2. To the Conference Vice President:
- A. \$3,380.00 annual salary.
 - B. \$100.00 annual vacation bonus.
 - C. \$800.00 annual travelling expenses.
 - D. The cost of providing \$100,000.00 liability insurance of his car.
 - E. We recommend that the housing of the Conference Vice-President be placed in the hands of the Conference Trustees who shall rent or purchase adequate housing as may be practical in view of the Conference finances and the needs of the Vice-president.
3. All expenses incurred by Conference officials, Boards, and Committee members in the pursuit of the duties of their respective offices, upon presentation of such expense accounts.
4. The following sums from the Conference Budget, in appreciation for their services: The necessary amount to bring the offering for the Secretary to \$125.00; Conference Treasurer, \$125.00; each sub-treasurer, except West Virginia, \$50.00; West Virginia sub-treasurer, \$25.00; Group Insurance Secretary-Treasurer, \$25.00; Conference Pension Plan Treasurer, \$25.00; Superintendent of Rooms for services at Conference, \$25.00; Statistical Chairman, \$15.00; Aid Treasurer, \$25.00.
5. To the Superintendent of the Camp Grounds, the cost of preparing and maintaining the grounds for the Annual sessions of Conference.
6. The expenses of the Sunday School Secretary to the National Sunday School Convention annually, and the expenses of any others whom the Conference may elect to represent the Conference at other bodies, such as the NHA or NAE.
7. The sum of \$50.00 monthly to Howard Speas from the Assistance Fund, being retroactive to April 1, 1953, by previous action of the Committee on May 12, 1953.

ITEM V. APPROVAL OF PAYMENTS:

1. By correspondence in Nov., 1952, authorized the payment of \$1,000.00 to the Camp Meeting Association to aid in cost of painting the Camp buildings and changing the dining hall into cafeteria service.

ITEM VI. SPECIAL RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. The record blanks of Budget distribution and monthly payments, which may be obtained from the Conference secretary, be used by the Church treasurers and that an extra copy be posted in each church so that church members can see what progress is being made in payment of the Budget.

2. The price of meals at Conference to those visitors not having official business with the Conference be set as follows: Breakfast, 40c; Dinner, 75c; Supper, 50c; or \$1.50 per day; and that the Superintendent of the Dining Hall have these prices posted in the dining hall in a conspicuous place, indicating to whom they apply. Free meals shall be given visiting ministers and their families for two days.

3. The Superintendent of the Dining Hall receive \$110.00 for his services, plus \$100.00 for telephone, postage, and travelling expense, same to be paid from the Conference Entertainment Fund.

4. The Conference President or Vice President shall, when necessary, by previous arrangement, meet the Board of Stewards or Finance Committee of each local church in the course of his Quarterly Meetings schedule, for the purpose of discussing the church's financial needs or abilities, and making suggestions as would tend to expedite the financial program of the church.

5. The Conference Tithing Secretary be authorized to draw on the Conference Treasury to the amount of \$25.00 annually, for supply and distribution of tithing literature among the churches.

6. A source of income for the Ministers' Aid Fund be provided as follows: When payments are made on loans from Conference funds and said payments are placed in the Church Aid Funds, 10% of said payments shall be diverted to the Ministers' Aid Fund.

7. The Conference Missions Board and the Pastoral Relations Committee annually investigate the subsidies being paid pastors from the Conference Missions Fund. All subsidies which have continued for five or more years without decrease shall be decreased by 50%. After the ensuing Conference year of 1953-54, subsidies are to be terminated after having been paid for six years. Appeals from this regulation may be made to the Conference Missions Board which shall have authority to make exceptions in special cases. Exceptions, however, shall be known as Special Cases. (The purpose for the above recommendation is that funds be released for increasing needs in the realm of church extension and that a reasonable reserve may be created.)

8. The evening offerings taken at this annual session shall be placed in the Conference Budget to help defray the cost of preparing and maintaining

the Camp Grounds for Conference use, and other costs associated with the Annual Conference sessions.

9. We recommend that the offering in the Sunday morning service this Conference be made a gift to Lorman J. Elliott who is presently in the hospital in a serious physical condition.

10. Any special offerings which may be taken for needy pastors etc., among our churches shall be sent through the Conference Aid Treasurer and not directly to the pastor in need.

11. We recommend that for each Annual Conference session, the Conference President be authorized to employ two responsible custodians (one man and one woman) for care of the rest rooms. They shall be remunerated from the Conference Budget in an amount commensurate with their duties. We recommend hourly inspection and replacement of needed supplies.

We recommend further that the Conference bear one-third of the expense of renovating the rest rooms which shall include thoroughly covering all inside walls and partitions and floors with paint, repairing or replacing all useless facilities, providing sanitary deodorizers and all necessary equipment for maintaining the same degree of sanitation we would desire in any of our homes.

12. We recommend that the Conference President investigate or appoint a committee to investigate the advisability of providing liability insurance for the protection of the public while on these grounds during all public gatherings. He or the Committee appointed shall report their findings with recommendations at the annual Conference session of 1954.

ITEM VII. BUDGET APPORTIONMENT

1. The Conference Undivided Budget receipts shall be distributed as follows for the ensuing year: Conference Budget, 80%; Conference Missions, 9%; Pension Plan, 9%; Assistance Fund, 2%.

RECOMMENDATION:

On May 12, at 1:00 P.M., in the Church at Erie, Pennsylvania, a special meeting of the Auditing and Finance Committee was held, the Conference President, Vice President, and Treasurer also being present.

The primary purpose of the meeting was to consider the financial support for a full time assistant to the President, travelling vice-president or any such person as the Conference may choose to elect.

We recommend that:

1. When the Conference President or his assistant pay their annual visit to the churches, if it is reasonably possible, an offering be taken for the President or his assistant and be given to him to apply on his salary. Receipts issued for said offerings are not to be used for credit toward payment of Conference Budget but should be reported on the annual statistical forms as "Conference President's Salary."

2. Rental allowances for parsonages be increased on the following bases: Each church owned parsonage in a city or large industrial town where rents are generally high shall be given rental credit of not less than \$600.00 per year (\$50.00 per month). All others shall increase their rental allowance by

one third. This will increase the Conference Budget receipts by about \$1,000. annually.

3. It is our belief that an incorporated organization the size of this Conference should maintain at all times a substantial financial reserve for emergency purposes. We believe that the adoption of the above recommendations coupled with a sincere effort to pay a full Conference Budget will enable the Conference to build and maintain that reserve, which is only a part of good business.

REPORT NO. 7

The selection of leaders and those to have charge of the devotional Services was left in the hands of the President.

That Rev. T. O. McCracken give the Address of Welcome and Rev. Guy E. Terpe the Response.

On November 14, 1952, by correspondence, the Institute Committee agreed that the services of Rev. Leslie D. Wilcox be secured for the Institute of 1954, if at all possible.

April 7th found most of the ministers, and many of their wives, assembled in the beautiful new Massillon Church for another Institute. The Rev. Guy E. Terpe is fortunate indeed in having such a beautiful and commodious House of the Lord in which to worship and to entertain such gatherings as this one. Aside from the beautiful structure in which to hold the services of the Institute, nothing was spared or overlooked that would make the stay of the members of the Institute a most pleasant one and Massillon's hospitality will be long remembered.

The Conference and Districts have always found the Massillon Church ready and willing to be host to the gatherings incidental to our business and other activities but—now—they have a church that makes it so much more easily accomplished than in the yesteryears of our Conference. REPORT NO. 9

THE CONFERENCE SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY

To the members of Allegheny Conference, Greeting!

All of us are acquainted with our General Sunday School Secretary's motto, "Bigger, better, and more Sunday Schools." There is a reason for such a motto. The one with perhaps the greatest amount of responsibility is that of reaching the twenty-seven million who are not in Sunday School anywhere. A great deal of effort is put forth to reach boys and girls, and so we should, but we need to concentrate on the HOME—the entire family. If we can reach Father and Mother, then we will have the children. The Sunday School

is the spear-head of the church. Eighty-five to ninety per cent of our members are first reached by the Sunday School, therefore, the Sunday School must get into the home.

There are evidences that the influence of the home is less strong on the construction side than in the earlier days. The influence of the home is foundational and primary. The purification and power of our national life is dependent upon the home. The over-production of spiritual pygmies today is traceable to the absence of great homes, and great homes are necessary to produce great men.

The home, as one has said, is a fold that shelters the family from the wolves of lust, strife, and unbelief—a harbor in which souls anchor and abide secure from the storms of doubt and carnal stress that are without. Moreover, a Christian Home is a fortress from whose citadel the armed forces of love, truth and chastity go forth to bless the world. Some one has said the rocking chair in the Christian home is higher than a throne.

We of Allegheny Conference need to double our efforts and work for a greater spirit of co-operation in our Sunday Schools if we are to reach the unchurched in our communities. There is need such as we have not felt for sometime for trained teachers. In every walk of life men are trained for whatever occupation they may have. Our physicians, nurses, automobile mechanics—even barbers must prepare. We feel all this is necessary in the natural realm—How much more in the Spiritual?

We need more Sunday School prayer meetings with a greater number of teachers with a passion for souls. We need to see to it that our Denominational Sunday Schools' interests are cared for, especially with the ten cents per member.

We have labored to keep the interest of the Sunday School before our people in conventions and Sunday School services as much as possible with the time we have had. It was our privilege to be in a Sunday School convention at Bradford, Pennsylvania, and also in a Sunday School Revival at Pittsburgh. We mailed out pastors blanks, as well as cared for many other duties that fell to the work of the Sunday School Secretary. We thank God for His help and for the work of the Sunday Schools this year in our Conference.

REPORT NO. 10

THE PIONEER SECRETARY

Greetings in Jesus Name! The Holy Spirit exhorts us through the Apostle Paul: "That knowing the time, that now it is high time to awake out of sleep . . . put ye on the Lord Jesus Christ and make not provision for the flesh to fulfil the lusts thereof." Rom. 13:11, 14. And Jesus charges us: "Say not ye, there are four months and then cometh harvest? Behold, I say unto you, lift up your eyes, and look on the fields; for they are white already to harvest. And he that reapeth receiveth wages, and gathered fruit unto life eternal; that both he that soweth and he that reapeth may rejoice together.

And herein is that saying true, One soweth, and another reapeth. I sent you to reap that whereon ye bestowed no labour: other men labored and ye are entered into their labors" John 4:35, 38.

Much thanksgiving is occasioned by the increased interest in the pioneer work of our church, manifested through successive years by the ministry and laity of Allegheny Conference. It always does something toward enlarging our own hearts when we seek ever to enlarge our church borders for the sake of Jesus and for the sake of spreading Scriptural Holiness over these lands. Every new pulpit opened for the proclamation of a pure New Testament Gospel opens new healing streams in the desert. Wherever these healing waters flow, there comes healing of the soul, plus life and peace.

The work of pioneering is not the work of one man, but the united effort of the constituency of our Conference. It takes mighty prevailing prayer. It takes a courageous entry into new neglected fields by pastors of vision, who are supported by people who are willing to pray, labor and give.

Words cannot tell how often I have been heartened by a kind word from the President of our Conference or from one of my brethren as I entered what was to me a new and untried field of labor. Several individuals stated that they were each day making the work of the Pioneer Department a special matter of prayer. Those who work in this way in places of obscurity hold the key that unlocks prison gates of iron and brass behind which captive souls are languishing. When captives such as these are released, there appear new recruits, strong soldiers of Jesus Christ, committed to the warfare of seeking to release their fellow-men.

Several notable things have resulted from the effectual prayers of the people of our Conference this year. At Tazewell there were remarkable conversions with an opening up of financial resources that effected the building of the Tazewell Church free of indebtedness. One woman's conversion led her to cash two \$1,000.00 bonds for the sum of \$1,565.00. Others, too, opened their hearts and treasures.

Remarkable providences have been tied around the Abb's Valley work. Sifting processes resulted in blessed conversions. Special providences have attended the church building project so that the entire building operation will be of scarcely more than thirty days duration. This has been accelerated large by the money gifts and labor of the English Church.

Divine leadings have surrounded the Fairmount work also. At times the outcome looked precarious, but God was working, giving blessings in disguise. First it was necessary for the Fairmount people to discover for themselves the futility of trying to advance spiritually while associated with an apostate church. Former ties, are now broken, and this small band of believers are launched on a new venture of faith under the direction of Brother Donald St. Clair.

The soul-burden of a devout woman for the people of her home community led to the opening up of a Sunday School in the town hall of Sherrods-ville, Ohio. This burden was quickly shared by her pastor, Bro. Willard Dunn of Second Church, Canton.

No report such as this offers adequate space for all the answers to prayer witnessed by the pastors and people of these, the younger churches of our Conference.

The 1952 Annual Conference Mission Board committed fourteen churches to the care of the Pioneer Department. They are: Ashtabula, Alliance, Barkley, Butler, Cabin Run, English, Greenfield, Hillville, Isabella, Jamestown, Loyal Oak, Soldier, Tazewell, and Warren.

I have held Quarterly Conferences in each of these churches, with the exception of Jamestown and Loyal Oak. In the first case the Pastor did not feel that it was justifiable at present, and in the second case dates suitable to pastors conflicted. With these exceptions, I have given each church at least two week-end services during the year, and as occasion demanded, I have given others more.

Most of the Pastors, with the assistance of an evangelist, have led their congregations in at least two revival meetings during the year. In some churches there have been three. In a number of congregations notable progress in spirituality and standards has been made. Encouraging to our hearts also are the groups of transformed souls who have been added to our Pioneer Department.

Warren witnessed a good revival this year. Their increase had not been outwardly marked, but signs point to an inward deepening and settling.

The pastor of the Alliance Church reports that two new families have manifested interest since their revival with Bro. Matherly.

Jamestown has experienced some permanent fruit from their revival with Bro. E. W. Brooks, and the Lord is helping Bro. Charles Lincoln and the people of Greenfield.

Soldier had a good revival which resulted in their organization as a Wesleyan Methodist Church. Isabella was blessed by the ministry of Sister Markey. Cabin Run has made advances spiritually and otherwise, while both English and Tazewell have witnessed unusual answers to prayer and have made advances spiritually. The Lord has blessed Loyal Oak in their building project. The pastor, Earl Smith, continues to labor on faithfully at Ashtabula with evident Sunday School attendance increases, and tokens of good for the future.

This has been a year of testing for both the endeavors at Hillville and Butler. At our last visit to Hillville, however, the Lord gave us a token of encouragement. Some difficulties have confronted the progress of the work in Butler. It would be a mistake, however, to conclude that the Lord does not have in mind a strong work in this populated center. This project should challenge the faith and labor of love of those stronger churches in the Butler vicinity, and engage the interest and prayers of our whole Conference.

The new work of our Conference looks encouraging. Under the authority of the President and his Advisory Boards, I organized the Soldier group March 29, into a Wesleyan Methodist Church with thirteen members and one

associate. This new church came out of a former Baptist group and became a center of cultivation under Sister Oneida Gleason's labors as Pioneer Secretary. The work here shows signs of real progress. Isabella Wesleyan Methodist Church was organized by Rev. Clyde Blair under the approval of Conference Advisory Board, Nov. 18, 1952.

Abb's Valley was organized as a Pioneer group Nov. 2, 1952. This work resulted from a six-weeks tent meeting led by Bro. K. O. Brown. I assisted him two and one half weeks in this meeting.

The Fairmount group, yet unorganized, under the direction of Bro. Donald St. Clair, is now worshipping in a clean, new, two-room store building, with furnace and wash-room. The building is located in the Meredith Springs Community on Route 19 at the north edge of Fairmount. There is suitable parking space and the building is adequate for the present needs of the group. The building is leased for six months, and the rent may eventually be applied toward the purchase of the building if so desired.

At Sherrodsville, Ohio, there is an unorganized group worshipping in a vacant store-room. Bro. Willard Dunn, pastor of the Second Church of Canton has been directing the new work with the support of his church. Brother Dunn reports that there has been an attendance of 30 at Sunday School and 35 at the night preaching services. Bro. Paul Rexrode has been pastoring this new group since the middle of February. Sherrodsville is South of our Conference boundary line, in the territory of the Ohio Conference. However, Bro. Willard Dunn has conferred by letter with R. J. Stratton, President of the Ohio Conference, who gave an answer as follows:

"The Board met on March 24, and considered the matter of the new work at Sherrodsville. It was agreed that the work at Sherrodsville be left to your care and to the oversight of Allegheny Conference, since it would be difficult for the Ohio Conference to step in and care for the work financially or otherwise at this time. You may feel free to continue in the new project under the direction of your own Conference. Signed, R. J. Stratton, President Ohio Conference."

As to the increase of church property under the Pioneer Department the last year, the Lord has indeed favored us. At Tazewell, Va., under the leadership of Rev. K. O. Brown, a new cinder block church with full basement, 32' x 50' has been completed free of debt, with a total expenditure of nearly \$9,000.

The Cabin Run Church, due to the labors of Brother Dale Holley and others, has completed a basement church 30' x 50' with an expenditure of \$2,500.00. This Church is indebted to the Conference to the amount of only \$1,000.00.

The Alliance basement Church, 70' x 34', with pastor's living quarters above, was dedicated last September 28. This well constructed building is the result of the financial investment of the Conference, and the labors of T. W. Comadoll, assisted by Bro. Willis Muir and others. The building represents an estimated value of \$15,000.00 and will serve the Alliance community for many years to come. Improvements continue to progress under the labors and directions of Bro. Willis Muir. The outside walls are in the

process of being faced with brick. Brother Muir's father contributed several days' labor to this end.

Loyal Oak has dedicated a new attractive basement church with an investment of \$10,000.00. In addition, there was much donated labor and material.

Under the direction and with the labors of Bro. K. O. Brown, Abb's Valley has a new cinder block church building 32' x 50' near completion. The total expenditure will be around \$4,500.00. Much labor has been donated by Bro. Brown, also by men of Abb's Valley and English. In addition, the people of the English Church have raised nearly \$1,000.00 for this new project. The Church is to be dedicated soon after Conference.

As to new prospects, Bluefield, W. Va., is the immediate field of operation to be considered by the constituency of our Conference under the direction of the Pioneer Department. A small group of people in or near Bluefield have been praying to this end. Several have met the President of our Conference and have extended an invitation to start a work here. Bro. K. O. Brown is to pitch his tent in East Bluefield during the week of June 11, to be assisted in meetings by the Pioneer Secretary.

This project will need the united prayers of the pastors and people of Allegheny Conference. Prayer moves the hand of God that unlocks the hearts of men and gives access to the financial treasures that are necessary for His work. You are invited to be "workers together with God." The establishing of a permanent home will involve considerable money for the necessary building.

REPORT NO. 11

THE CONFERENCE SECRETARY OF EVANGELISM

This report of necessity will be brief due to the fact that the ministry of the pastorate is in the main quite removed from the field of general evangelism. However, the need of revival is evident to all. In no hour was the need more apparent than in the hour in which we live. Several decades have elapsed since we first began to hear the expression, "Revival, or Ruin;" if this was true then, it certainly is much more so now. We need revival. We must have revival. And it is the concern of ministry and laity alike that we have revival.

The hour is dark, very dark, and late, very late, but there are lights along the horizon, and from these we take heart.

The presence of a President in the White House who evidences a genuine regard for prayer and faith, and the value of the spiritual, we believe, is a definite answer to prayer. We believe with Thomas Chalmers, "The expulsive power of a new affection" will settle a lot of things, and settle them for "keeps." Mr. Wesley's religion of "love on fire" is still the greatest moral and spiritual force in the universe. Then, brethren, let us on with the revival, on with a mighty crusade in prayer, on to where "love on fire" is the experience of every heart and the expression of every life.

Nor is this to be the goal of the ministry alone. This, I am increasingly persuaded, is the imperative of our laity as well. The stream of spiritual revival will only reach "flood stage" and overflow into our communities and adjacent territories as it touches every member of our churches. The record of the Acts of The Apostles is that the Baptism of the Holy Ghost made every member of the New Testament church a flaming evangelist and witness for Christ in whatever spot he was found. There was no shirking their responsibility nor their opportunity.

May this be a year of genuine revival in all of our hearts and churches is our humble prayer.

Granted the request of Rev. Delmar Kaufman to transfer the personal loans made to him for the Warren project to the Warren Pioneer Organization. These loans were for \$1,000.00 and \$650.00.

Granted a loan of \$200.00 from Minister's Aid to Rev. Roy J. Wade.

Homer Waid joined the meeting at this time.

Considered plans presented by Rev. Kenneth Hartley for Loyal Oak Church Basement and authorized the Church to proceed with building according to plan. Building to cost approximately \$10,000.00.

THE ALLEGHENY CONFERENCE

Granted a loan of \$2,000.00 from Church Aid to the Loyal Oak Church to apply on construction of this Basement.

Authorized underwriting a loan of \$4,000.00 for the Loyal Oak Church to be secured from private sources.

Adjourned by motion.

2. June 20, 1952. Trustee Meeting at Penn Run, Pa., Parsonage. Prayer by Rev. Jos. B. Markey and Paul Lindquist. All members were present except Homer Waid.

Considered proposal of Rich Hill Charge to move Rich Hill church building to Penn Run. Requested pastor to take a vote of the Spruce Grove Church to ascertain their attitude toward uniting with Rich Hill to form one body for this building project. In case of a majority favoring this authorized the pastor to proceed to re-organize the two churches as one and proceed with plans for re-building the church on lots in Penn Run.

If and when, re-organization is effected authorized the new organization to be known as Penn Run Wesleyan Methodist Church to secure lots across the road from the parsonage as a building site. The purchase price to be \$900.00 or less.

Rev. A. G. Carlson was chosen as one member of the Advisory Committee on Building. The other member to be chosen at a later date.

Voted to give Sr. Coon \$3.00 for the fine dinner.

3. August 19, 1952. Meeting at the Camp Office. Rev. H. C. Van-Wormer, Rev. Dwight L. Robertson and Rev. Jos. B. Markey present. Prayer by Rev. D. L. Robertson.

Rev. C. C. Cross presented situation confronting the Cleveland Church and Parsonage on account of the ingress of Negro population about the church. Granted the Cleveland Church privilege of disposing of their parsonage, and church if necessary, and secure new location for one or both.

Discussed proposal of Rev. D. R. Kaufman to purchase lot on Clairmont Street, Warren, Ohio; adjoining Warren church property.

Granted a loan of \$200.00 from the Minister's Aid to Rev. T. O. McCracken.

4. July 12, 1952. Meeting at the Camp Office. The Conference Advisory Committee was called to this meeting. All members present.

Discussed the matter of Rich Hill church re-organization.

Authorized a loan of \$1,000.00 from Church Aid and \$1,000.00 from Conference budget to the Rich Hill Church. Loan to be available when sanctioned by the Conference Advisory Committee.

Granted a loan of \$175.00 from Minister's Aid to Rev. Harold McIntire upon his request.

Considered proposal of Rock Run to build a parsonage and gave authorization to proceed with plans as presented, provided a lot is secured and pro-

perly deeded to the Allegheny Conference and they can secure their own loan.

Expense: Homer Waid, \$4.20. P. J. Lindquist, \$8.00. Total \$12.20.

Adjourned by motion.

5. August 20, 1952. Meeting at the Camp Office. Rev. H. C. Van Wormer, Rev. D. L. Robertson, and Rev. Jos. B. Markey present.

Elected Richard Rough and V. E. Sell as second and third members of the Advisory Committee on Building.

Adjourned by motion.

6. August 28, 1952. Meeting at the Press and Radio Building, Apollo, Pennsylvania. All members present except Rev. H. C. Van Wormer. Rev. Jos. B. Markey acted as Chairman by regular Chairman's request.

Viewed prospective location for church building in Apollo. By motion the Apollo Church was authorized to purchase two lots 50' x 150' located on Route 66 at \$600.00 or less. Also granted the church privilege of an option on two additional lots adjoining. All lots purchased to be deeded to the Allegheny Conference.

10. December 31, 1952. By Correspondence. Granted request of Rev. Delmar Kaufman for a loan from Minister's Aid of \$200.00.

Granted request of the Greenville Church for a loan of \$1,000.00 from the Church Aid.

11. Feb. 27, 1953. By Correspondence. Granted request of Rev. George Kopp, Jr., for a loan of \$85.00 from the Minister's Aid.

12. March 12, 1953. Meeting at the Wesleyan Church in Ashtabula, Ohio. All members present. Prayer by Homer Waide and Rev. Jos. B. Markey. Rev. Smith presented plan for securing church property as offered by the trustees of the Finnish Evangelical Lutheran Church at 825 Joseph Avenue. Title may be secured by payment of Attorney fees necessary to the transfer.

By motion Rev. Smith was authorized to contact the Lawyer representing the Lutheran Church Trustees and instruct him to proceed with the steps necessary to secure the property to the Allegheny Conference.

By motion provision for a loan to cover any expense of this transfer which the local church was not able to handle was authorized to the Ashtabula Church.

Rev. Hoiem presented a plan to add Basement rooms to the Middlefield, Ohio, Wesleyan Church building for Sunday School use.

Rev. Hoiem was authorized to proceed with Basement as planned. Also to secure a loan from local sources to best advantage to finance the project. Conference to underwrite this loan.

Rev. W. H. Armstrong presented a request for permission to sell the lot adjoining the Allida Smith Memorial Church, Black Corners, Meadville, Pa., on the north, reserving a 25 foot strip the length of the church lot abutting the north side of the church lot. This request was granted.

Expense: Homer Waid, \$8.00. P. J. Lindquist, \$8.00. Dwight L. Robertson, \$5.28. Jos. B. Markey, \$3.00. Total, \$24.28.

Adjourned by motion.

13. March 31, 1953, meeting at the Soldier Church, Soldier, Pa. All members present. Rev. Kenneth Brown was present and prayed.

Rev. Kenneth Brown presented plan for a new Church building at Abb's Valley, W. Va. The local group anticipated absorbing the entire financial responsibility.

Rev. Brown was authorized to proceed with the new building as planned. The estimated cost was approximately \$4,700.00, which the local group would supply. We bid Bro. Brown and his courageous people God's speed.

Considered plans for relocation and rebuilding of the Soldier Church building and authorized them to proceed with the building project as funds are available.

REPORT NO. 23

STONEBORO CAMP PRESIDENT

In compliance with the duty imposed upon the president by the Camp Meeting Association, the following report is herewith submitted.

The 1952 Annual Camp Meeting will go down on the records of camp history as being greatly owned and blessed of God from the very first service to the last. There was a marked absence of visiting and loitering on the grounds. Prayer and fasting was entered into with a determination to get prayers through to the answering point. As a result the long altars and front seats were filled again and again, several times without any preaching. We quote from Sr. Markey who said, "Thirty years it has been my privilege to attend 'Old Stoneboro Hill-top.' I have never felt so much of God or witnessed so much of His power, or heard mightier preaching than in the Camp of 1952."

The attendance was excellent from the first to the last. On Sunday the attendance was so large that we had to have three overflow services. There were over 250 children in the Children's Tabernacle. Usually at the end the crowds thin out but this was not the case with the 1952 Camp. For the last service the tabernacle was practically full.

The last day of the Camp was a day of power and a day of seeking God. The fear of God was on both saint and sinner. The burden on the people of God seemed to reach its climax on this day and in the afternoon meeting there came an overwhelming sense of conviction that folk who might be having their last opportunity were not responding as they should. The feeling became more and more intense until a number were prostrate under the terrific burden they were bearing. As a result the altar and front seats filled up but the burden continued. This afternoon service continued on into the evening service. At the close of prayer before an offering could be taken or announcements given the folk began to pile into the altar. There was no preaching on this last night of the camp but the altars and three front rows of seats were full of seekers. We have never seen a closing scene like it at Stoneboro Camp. At the close of the altar service the camp closed with the largest and most glorious "Hallelujah March" we have ever witnessed. It was estimated that nearly a thousand stayed for the march. The best part of it is we have met results of the camp which have continued throughout the year.

One of the highlights of the camp was the dedication of the new Young People's Tabernacle, which was ready for use this year. This has been a long cherished dream of our young people. We are thankful that it is now a reality. We are trusting that our precious young people will receive great benefit from it.

One bright spot was the good response to the appeal for Bro. Ted Bartlett who was then ill with cancer, but who since has gone to heaven. The people at the camp gave \$1,278 to help pay his hospital bills, etc. It was our privilege to take the check to his home in Clemson, S. C., and give it to him. This was a privilege we shall never forget. May the Lord bless every giver.

Missionary day proved to be a special day with the blessing of the Lord.

Our evangelists were the Rev. J. P. Trueblood, the Rev. Dennis R. Matherlee and the Bloom Sisters with Miss Martha Bloom conducting the singing in the large tabernacle. We are unable to improve upon the words Bro. Cross used in describing their work and so we shall quote from him. "To say of each of them that, their preaching was in demonstration of the Spirit and of Power would be no exaggeration whatever and would be equally true of every service. They were indeed God's prophets for the hour. Bro. Trueblood's unusual knowledge of the Scriptures and his presentation of truths for which there is a crying need among us right now made his messages of untold value to preachers and people alike. Bro. Matherlee carried a burden seldom equaled and preached the rugged truths of the kingdom with no unerring sound with so much of the anointing of the Holy Spirit that his hearers felt, indeed, that he spoke as of the 'oracles of God.'" Sister Bloom's messages made one feel that she, indeed, preached as one who felt they were a dying person between dying people and an endless eternity. The Lord certainly used her and only eternity will reveal all the result. This writer does not recall ever having known of three evangelists who entered more fully into each other's ministry or prayed more fervently while one of the others were preaching."

In closing, we wish to give due credit to all the workers, superintendents, etc., who have labored so diligently to make the camp possible. Only those who have it to do, know the tremendous amount of work that goes into getting such a camp ready, in maintaining it, in keeping order, etc. To all those who have labored to make the camp a success we say a great big thank you.

This year we have made a venture in reducing the price of meals down to where we feel that everyone should be able to eat in the dining hall. The dining hall has been changed from the home style to cafeteria style. We trust that everyone will co-operate with us to make it a success. We cannot feed the people at the price asked for the meals for the ten days of camp; but, if we can get enough to eat in the dining hall, we will come out all right.

Let us labor to keep Stoneboro Camp old-fashioned, God-controlled, Christ-centered and Holy Spirit-anointed. These are days when we need old-fashioned camps more than ever. Trusting in the continued blessing of the Lord as our only hope to have an old-fashioned camp, let us go on with increased courage and effort.

In doing this, he shall select a proportionate number of churches from each Holiness District. This should leave him time open for dedications, special services, emergencies, etc.

4. That all monthly reports shall be sent to the President by the pastors each month as now.

RESOLUTION

Your committee on resolutions submit the following report;

1. By adopting this report, the Conference re-affirms the historic stand of the church on matters of Christian doctrine and practice, and urges strict adherence to the Discipline on matters of dress, Sabbath observance, parental authority and reverence for holy things.

2. That we re-affirm our love and our loyalty to our beloved denomination, by praying for our leaders.

3. That we resolve to show our appreciation for the officials of our Conference by praying for, and standing by them. That we refrain from burdening them with nonessential problems.

4. Considering the great loss of our young people of later teen-age in our Sunday Schools and churches, let us more earnestly apply ourselves to their salvation and proper use of their talents, that they may feel that they are a very important part of our church.

5. Recognizing the great evil of divorce, we deem it wise to preach against it and also go to the head of the stream by instructing our youth in the sanctity of marriage and the home in an effort to stem the tide of the divorce evil.

6. We recognize the great sacrifice our service men are making in defense of democracy. We urge our churches to have special times of prayer for their salvation and protection. We also recommend that each pastor main-

tain personal correspondence with all service men of his church and Sunday School.

7. That we continue to exhort our people to refrain from purchasing television sets, since we recognize television in its present operation as an influence to evil, and believe it may be the means of ruining the sanctity of our homes and retarding spiritual life and growth.

8. That we encourage the maintenance of the family altar in every Wesleyan Home in Allegheny Conference as a means of bringing our people to a better spiritual state, and also encourage systematic fasting among our people.

9. We recognize communism as a subtle Godless influence that is seeking to supplant our democratic way of life.

Therefore be it resolved:

A. That our ministers, and our church leaders sound a warning, we also recognize the present trend toward a welfare state is the opening wedge of socialism which leads to materialistic communism.

B. Therefore be it resolved that we recognize our obligation to pray for President Eisenhower, that God would grant him wisdom and courage in his fight against this evil, and that our people vote against it where possible.

10. Due to the rapid change of population in our industrial areas and realizing that many are lost to God and to our Wesleyan Methodist Church on this account, We recommend that the pastors keep each other informed of those moving into their area from our Wesleyan Churches and Sunday Schools.

Standing Resolutions

1. A Committee on Auditing and Finance, consisting of three ministerial members, the Chairman being an Elder, shall be elected each year, the duties of which shall be to examine and report on the Treasurer's books and all the financial reports, except the W.M.S. and Y.M.W.B., and to be a Standing Committee to advise on financial plans.

2. All persons received into membership in the churches of our Conference excepting those whose life of Christian fidelity has been of sufficient long standing, shall be received at first as associate members only.

3. When it becomes necessary for a church to call a pastor, it shall be the duty of the calling church to make provision for the expense incurred by the pastor in removing to the new field of labor. Money raised for this purpose shall NOT be applied on the pastor's salary. When an Elder is elected to the Conference Presidency, expenses incurred in moving to the Conference Parsonage, shall be paid from the Conference Treasury.

4. The Conference Sunday shall be the closing Sunday of the Conference year, and the out-going pastor shall be paid his salary for that Sunday by the charge he is leaving.

5. At the beginning of the Conference session the president shall appoint a Nominating Committee of not less than three members, two Elders and one Layman to bring to the Conference a slate of Nominations for Committees, etc., for the Conference Temporary Organization. Delegates Credentials shall be mailed to the Secretary not later than ten days before the convening of Conference.

6. No person shall be received into membership in Allegheny Conference until he shall have properly filled out an application blank, which application together with recommendations of his references must pass the approval of the President and his Advisory Board. Exceptions to this rule may be made by the President and his Advisory Board when they deem best.

7. The pastor of any church in the Conference shall be free to hold at least one revival meeting during the year, wherever he sees fit, and it is recommended that his salary be paid to him while he is absent.

8. Each pastor shall send a monthly report on the blank provided, to the Conference President showing the progress and the state of the work under his care.

9. Each church may elect a Nominating Committee whose duty it shall be to nominate candidates for church officers for presentation to the church at the time of the annual election of officers. Such nominations shall not exclude other nominations at the time of the business meeting.

10. Churches having business with the Conference Board of Trustees requiring a visit of that body to their church, shall be responsible for the expense attached to such calls, unless released by the board.

11. Inasmuch as trial sermons are hardly fair to the church or candidate and since the practice of having trial sermons is contrary to the usual manner of locating preachers, we recommend that no preacher shall accept any such invitation, if given. Exceptions to this rule may be granted by the Conference President upon request of any church.

12. Since considerable expense of transferring automobile title and li-

cense attends the moving of a pastor from one state to another, we recommend that where possible the calling church bear this expense.

13. We recommend that all districts emphasize Sunday School activity, and that Conventions be arranged for in conjunction with the visitation of the Conference Sunday School Secretary, who shall visit one Convention of each District during the year, at Convention expense.

14. We recommend that no one be elected to Elder's Orders who does not have an abiding sense of divine call to give himself wholly to the function and ministry of an Elder in the WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH, and that no one shall be ordained to this office and work who is not applying himself wholly to this one thing in cares and studies, and clearly determining by God's grace to give himself wholly to this holy ministry, if possible, long before the appointed day of ordination, and manifesting such a determination of faithful Christian service to the church or congregation whom he was called to serve during his years of preparation, so that as much as lieth in himself, he has and will apply himself wholly to the work of the ministry, except in all cases of absolute necessity of such diversions to a legitimate avocation for livelihood which neither jeopardizes the Lord's work nor blames the ministry.

15. We recommend that each church equip its parsonage with the necessary heating and cooking equipment, because of the variation of requirements in this equipment for the individual parsonage.

16. We recommend that in election of local Church Advisory Committee each church permit the pastor to nominate the members of this Committee.

17. The Conference Secretary, as Chairman, with the Conference President shall be a Standing Committee on Publications, whose duty it shall be to examine all matters pertaining to Conference printing and publications, and let contracts for same.

18. All churches shall have a systematic means of keeping records, as required by Discipline, Paragraph No. 74. The "Ideal Church Record" published by the Bethel Publishing Company, Elkhart, Indiana, is a suggested form.

19. Local church treasurer's books shall close April 30, thus making the Conference fiscal year from May 1, to April 30. All funds received after this date shall be counted in the following year. Funds will be credited on Sub-Treasurer's books if received by May 5.

To meet the requirements of Paragraph 164 of the Discipline regarding revision of the Roll of membership, April 30, may be considered the close of the Conference year for Statistical purpose.

20. Minister's Pocket Credentials shall be issued annually to Elders and Conference Preachers who are eligible.

21. Since the use of the wedding ring is not in accord with the standards of our church, we therefore, as a Conference, disapprove of our ministers performing or taking part in the ring ceremony.

22. The pastoral vote shall be taken on each charge on the first Sunday in April. When it is the desire of the charge to vote on a week night, it will be done sometime during the week previous to the designated Sunday. Permission to vote on another Sunday may be obtained from the President and the Advisory Board.

23. Each church shall allow their pastor a reasonable vacation with pay to be taken at his convenience. Two weeks is suggested.

THE W.M.S. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the 47th Annual Session of the Woman's Missionary Society of the Allegheny Conference, greetings in the Name of Him Whom we love and serve!

In the good Providence of God we are again enabled to meet in His Name to carry on the work of His Kingdom. It has been a troublous year with continued "wars and rumors of wars," with political and social upheaval and spiritual crises. We have not yet seen the spiritual awakening we need either

in America or on our mission fields, but we have had revival fires here and there wherever God's people have paid the price in humility, obedience, prayers and tears. We thank God for the move in India and for some manifestations of revival on other stations as well as for the miraculous delivery of our missionaries in South America. Still there is nothing yet to satiate our hunger and thirst for God's outpouring of His Holy Spirit in the salvation of the multitudes left outside the fold.

Instead, every evidence points to the soon Coming of our Lord in the Rapture. The Prophetic Word for May states: "With the shock of a bomb explosion came the news that the India Government now prohibits foreign missionaries from preaching the gospel. They are allowed only in social welfare activities. Indian preachers may propagate the Christian faith, but not foreigners." The same article says that missionaries are given 5 to 10 years in Africa before Nationalism will close the door to them there. With China already closed and South America bitterly opposed to the gospel we are reminded that our time to labor is fast drawing to a close in foreign lands and perhaps everywhere.

Then, too, there is a decline in finances throughout our denomination which has forced reduction in budgets to the various fields. This creates a crying need for money with which to carry on the already open doors to say nothing of others that are still untouched though ripe and ready for the willing gleaner. Though the needs both spiritual and material are immense, the Great Lord of Harvest is able abundantly to supply them "according to His Riches in Glory by Christ Jesus"—if we truly pray.

Though the past year has been a difficult one to us and our labors have been at a minimum, we have found His grace sufficient and His promises unfailing, for which we thank Him with all our heart. Besides, we wish here to publicly thank each and every member of our Societies for their wonderful expressions of interest and concern for our welfare during our past illness. The nice cards, the sympathetic letters, gifts of money, Sunshine boxes, floral tributes and most of all your sincere prayers and faithful co-operation and forbearance have been appreciated more than words can ever express. We thank you for the beautiful basket of flowers sent us last summer while in the Meadville Hospital and again for the lovely basket of flowers sent us the fourth of May at the Home Going of our sister. We thank the Meadville W.M.S., their president, Mrs. Mary Warmenhoven, and every Society for the beautiful name quilt they brought to us in April. Then we wish to thank the Penn Run W.M.S. for the Sunshine Box sent us after our second operation, the Pine Grove and Hillsdale W.M.S. for the nice Sunshine Bag, the Pittsburgh W.M.S. for their lovely box, the Titusville W.M.S. for the electric heating pad—all of which came after the third operation. We also thank the Cooperstown W.M.S. for the basket of delicious fruit and the other Societies who sent love gifts of money which went to pay the doctors' bills, medicine, etc. We assure you nothing went to waste and all was appreciated from the package of postal cards to the largest gift. God bless you all whether or not you were able to give.

We only feel so unworthy and so indebted to you and especially to the Savior who prompted you to hold us up during this time of need. It makes us more determined than ever to be faithful to the Lord and to you precious people as He enables us so to do. We believe we are here only in answer to your prayers and because of your whole-hearted co-operation. May the Lord help us to be a blessing to you as you have been to us. God bless and reward you many fold, is our prayer.

The missionary activities of the year are as follows:

In our absence and the absence of our vice-president at Stoneboro Camp, Mrs. Eunice Comadoll, our Recording Secretary, very kindly and very ably carried on the daily prayer meetings of the Camp, holding them in the new Young People's Tabernacle for the first time. Splendid reports were given of these daily meetings as well as of the public service, also in charge of Mrs. Comadoll, when Rev. and Mrs. Ferdinand Witthuhn, missionaries from Haiti, were the inspired speakers.

During most of October and November, Rev. and Mrs. Archie Argo made a tour of our conference with excellent spiritual and financial results.

Two new Societies have been organized this year: Warren, Ohio, organized July 24, 1952, with 7 active and 6 honorary members; Greenfield, organized February 25, 1953, with 12 active and 5 honorary members. May the Lord make them fruitful societies for His glory.

Our Standard of Efficiency for the year is 89 per cent. By the Lord's help we were able to keep up the necessary correspondence during the year, which consisted of three circular letters making a total of about 360 pieces of mail.

Though all of our conference missionaries but Dr. and Mrs. Benninger are either home on furlough or coming home this summer we have been unable to secure any of them for this conference. Thus, we have Rev. and Mrs. W. N. Wager, missionaries from Japan and formerly from China, engaged for our conference service, June 5th.

Since this is our Golden Jubilee Celebration Year we will have special emphasis placed on the occasion elsewhere.

Prayerfully we submit the following aims for your consideration for the coming year:

- (1) Let us pray more earnestly; remembering our missionaries daily;
- (2) Let us give more liberally of our time, money and efforts to promote the cause of missions;
- (3) Let us attend more faithfully and pray more regularly for our monthly meetings;
- (4) Let us strive diligently to maintain our present Magazine Subscriptions, adding new subscriptions as able;
- (5) Let us promote the securing of as many paid members as possible as early in the year as possible;
- (6) Finally, let us be faithful in all our stewardship toward God and man.

COMMITTEE ON PROGRAM AND PLAN OF WORK**WE RECOMMEND:**

1. That the first meeting after conference each local society hold an installation service which includes the outline of the work and consecration to their office.

2. a. That the program and plan of work be read and discussed as soon as the minutes are received.

b. That we urge the president of each society to refer to those as a reminder during the year.

c. That each society stress the "Golden Jubilee Goals" as given in the Wesleyan Missionary:

Deepened Devotional Life

Increased watchfulness for opportunities of personal witnessing and soul winning.

Fifteen percent gains in:

1. Giving for General Home and Foreign Missions—\$355,000.00.

2. Membership (including honorary) 23,000.

3. Subscriptions to the Wesleyan Missionary—14,000.

3. a. That each society endeavor to hold a public monthly prayer meeting especially for the requests found in the Wesleyan Missionary. We urge that a spirit of evangelism be carried on in our local communities by the members of the society, each one feeling a personal responsibility to bring at least one soul to Christ during the year.

b. That our District Holiness Conventions, where possible, observe a missionary service.

4. That we urge our societies to carry out the Prayer Partner Plan, and keep in touch with our Home and Foreign mission fields, thereby bringing first hand knowledge to our societies. Reports to be sent to Conference Prayer Partner Secretary, Mrs. Ruth A. Hoen, Middlefield, Ohio, at least by Nov. 1.

5. That each society have an aggressive solicitor for the Wesleyan Missionary, whose duty it shall be to report all subscriptions to the district solicitor. We also recommend that the Local Society President, vice president, secretary and 75% of all members be subscribers to the Wesleyan Missionary.

6. a. That all society officers and delegates to annual conference be members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. We also recommend that Conference Society members be members of the Wesleyan church and their local Wesleyan Missionary Society.

b. That each local society have a nominating committee, if possible.

c. That since the retiring president is Acting President during the Conference Session, we suggest that the society send her to the Conference, and elect the new president as delegate, assuming the expense for transportation.

d. That the delegates credentials be sent at least two weeks before Conference to the Conference Wesleyan Missionary Society Secretary, Mrs. Eunice Comadoll, R. D. 2, Utica, Penna.

e. That Statistical Blanks with all vouchers not sent to the Sub-Treas-

urer and statements for local work, be sent at least two weeks before Conference to the Statistical Chairman, Mrs. Neva Golden, 40 Plummer St., Oil City, Penna.

f. That each society send fruit and vegetables, or the equivalent in cash to Conference. The larger societies sending two dozen quarts and the smaller at least one dozen. Fruit and vegetables to be all of one kind from each society. Same to be credited at purchase price. We recommend giving cash where possible, same to be sent anytime during the year to the superintendent of the dining hall, Rev. W. R. Kopp, 416 East Main St., Titusville, Pa., or brought to Conference. Amount to be credited under "Other Objects."

g. That twenty-five cents be raised for each active member for Conference Entertainment and sent to the Sub-Treasurer before the books close April 30.

h. That each society instruct their delegate how much to pledge at the public missionary service. Unless otherwise specified pledges will be divided one-third for Home and two-thirds for Foreign Missions.

7. That each society use the designated study book, also urge the use of the Program Calendar and other helps. That we encourage our members to follow the Missionary Reading Course as recommended by General Conference. All reports to be sent to Mrs. Ruth Stonebraker, 160 Village St., Johnstown, Pa., Conference Secretary of the Mission Reading Course.

b. That all literature including Program Calendars, Study Books and Efficiency Standards, be obtained from our Conference Literature Dept., address Mrs. Ruth Leyshon, Sarver, Pa.

That each society have a program committee varying once a quarter. We suggest the president act as chairman of said committee.

8. a. That each society contribute five dollars or more annually for the support of Hephzibah Orphanage, the same to be applied on budget.

b. That each society contribute three dollars or more annually to the Medical Student Fund. This not to apply on budget.

9. That each society be urged to respond to the Card Call Plan and thus assist in the Extension Program of the Church. All card call money to be sent to Rev. J. R. Swauger, Box 117, Salina Station, Syracuse 8, New York, and stubs to be sent to Mrs. Neva Golden with the statistical blank. This not to apply on budget.

10. That we send Program suggestions, Sunday School literature, flannel-graph materials and used Christmas Greeting Cards to our Foreign Missions, Mountain Missions, Hephzibah Orphanage and Indian Missions. Also bandages for home and foreign when required. (NOTE: Bandages should be cut two to four inches wide and tightly rolled. Number of pounds to be reported as Item of Interest on Annual Statistical Blank.)

b. That the number of boxes of used clothing sent to Home Missions be reported on Statistical Blanks under Item of Interest. No monetary value to be placed thereon.

11. That we endeavor to raise one-quarter of the Church educational budget. This is to include L.S.U. pledges.

12. a. That the Red Letter Days as given in the Program Calendar be observed where possible. That Easter and Self-Denial offerings be used for Home Missions, and the Penny-a-meal offerings be used for Foreign Missions.

b. That the societies observe the monthly Fast and Prayer Services and that the self-denial offerings taken at these services be applied on Home Missions.

13. a. That where possible each society have a Mercy and Help Committee, whose duty it shall be to visit the sick and needy and give aid where necessary, and send flowers and greeting cards to shut-ins.

b. That we encourage the giving of special remembrance gifts as recommended by General Conference for the promotion of definite missionary work as living tribute to the memory of deceased loved ones, instead of the usual extravagant floral tribute.

14. a. That we put forth a special effort to secure every woman in the church as a member of the society, or bring about a fifteen percent gain in membership.

b. That the month of September be designated as membership month.

15. a. That one dollar dues be paid by all members, active and honorary. That said dues be sent, UNDIVIDED, through the local church treasurer to the Sub-Treasurer. The Sub-Treasurer shall divide them thus: .25 Home Missions, .25 Foreign Missions and .50 Dues. All monies to be sent in, at least, quarterly.

b. That each society be assessed .25c an active member for General Conference Administrative Fund. This is not a budget item.

16. That each society give the delegate an appropriate amount of money for the purchasing of literature for the society and for small offerings taken during Conference.

1. That, since the theme of our Annual Conference is "Hearts Aflame," our Woman's Missionary Society adopt this theme for the coming year, realizing with John Wesley that if we "get on fire for God, people will come and watch us burn."
2. That we give ourselves to Bible study, systematic fasting, and intercessory prayer and that we be "doers of the Word;" going out two by two in home visitation, believing that "prayer and pains plus faith in Jesus Christ can accomplish anything."
3. a. That we give diligent attention to all missionary work at home and abroad. Let us not be negligent by our indifference, selfish motives and pleasures, and so lose sight of our sacred task of inspiring the missionary spirit.
b. That we encourage the men to attend and participate in our missionary prayer services, and to become honorary members.
4. a. That we give ourselves to prayerful study of the Wesleyan Missionary and other helpful material, that our interests may be widened and our prayers more effective.
b. That in all our missionary meetings we stress the need of prayer for our missionaries, churches and officials, rather than engaging in social functions.
5. That we adhere to Scriptural methods of raising funds for missions, and out of sacrificial hearts and lives, give heartily as unto the Lord and His holy cause, for the Lord loveth a cheerful giver.
6. a. That we faithfully hold to the Biblical standards of our Discipline in creating a wholesome atmosphere in our homes.
b. That we stress the maintenance of a family altar in every home, with the children having a part. That we, as parents, faithfully instruct our children concerning the plan of salvation, urging them to obtain a personal experience, knowing that this will create in them the desire to follow Bible standards.
c. That we pray faithfully for our children in school, that they may reject any erroneous teachings presented.
7. a. That we abstain from all worldly amusements, including the theater, the dance, cards, etc. That we abstain from reading or allowing our children to read worldly comic books, listening to unwholesome radio programs, buying

Sunday newspapers, and other Sabbath desecrations, such as pleasure riding, buying, etc. Isa. 58:13, 14.

b. That we urge our people to refrain from buying television sets, realizing that television in its present operation is an evil influence, and may mean the loss of souls.

8. a. That we who are mothers tell our children the true story of life and instruct them in the care of their bodies, in order that they may hold these truths sacred and be prepared to withstand the low moral standards of this day.

b. That we parents be companions to our children, and provide for them wholesome recreation frequently.

c. That we as mothers guard well our children and, as far as possible, know where they are and what they are doing at all times.

d. That mothers carefully select their "baby-sitters" since there is so much immorality prevalent today.

e. That, since modern mixed bathing is conducive to loose morals, we urge parents not to allow their children to participate in such unwholesome activity.

9. a. That we uphold by precept and example modesty of dress, as becometh holiness, by which we mean wearing dresses of proper length, with long sleeves and modest neck-line, which things accompany purity and deep spirituality. 1 Tim. 2:9, 10. Also that we adhere to Deut. 22:5, "the woman shall not wear that which pertaineth unto a man—for all that do so are an abomination unto the Lord thy God."

b. That we refrain from the wearing of jewelry, which includes brooches and other ornaments. Isa., chapter 3. Also that we do not wear nude shades of hose and hats that display flowers, feathers or veiling. Furthermore we urge our women to wear hose and dress modestly in the home, that we may be examples of modesty to those who approach our doors.

c. That we do not adhere to the worldly style of cutting or curling the hair, or the long bob. 1 Cor. 11:15. Also we believe with John Wesley on the Scripture, 1 Tim. 2:9 that 'broidered' hair means curled hair.

d. That we also dress our boys and girls modestly, which includes wearing long hose.

10. That we urge the avoidance of unnecessary debts, and neglecting long standing bills.

11. a. That, as far as possible, we refrain from patronizing establishments selling intoxicating beverages, and also discourage the use of tobacco in all its forms, since we greatly detest the use and effects of both II Cor. 7:1. Also that we refrain from patronizing establishments opened on the Sabbath day.

b. That we be patriotic by displaying the American Flag in observing national holidays, thereby honoring God who gives us freedom and liberty.

12. That these resolutions be read in each society quarterly, that all members be kept informed of the proposed attainments and requirements.

This report was adopted by the convention by vote during the Friday afternoon service.

The first regular business meeting of the convention was called to order on Saturday morning at nine o'clock by our President, Rev. T. O. McCracken. Bro. Miller lead in singing "Take the Name of Jesus With You." Prayer by Bro. Christie. Bro. McCracken brought the scripture lesson from I Corinthians.

(c) Indulgence in exaggeration, slang, gossip and idle talk.
(d) The use of alcohol, tobacco, and narcotic drugs.
(e) Worldly amusements and sports.
5. That, due to the problems of modern education, we pledge our increased support to our own church schools with our prayers and finances; and that we encourage our young people to attend.
6. That our societies be evangelistic in our plan of work by supporting the Sunday School and other church services, by distributing tracts, streetcar evangelism, street meetings, personal work and pioneer work.
7. That our regular and business meetings be restricted to a time of spiritual uplift instead of a time of eating, drinking, and frivolity.

11. That the W.Y.P.S. augment the church and Sunday School library or where there is none, sponsor one, with our Wesleyan periodicals and Christian books.
