RESOLUTIONS AND LAWS OF THE INDIANA CONFERENCE

- 1. It is contrary to the spirit of the Discipline and our principles for our preachers to assist in any service with oath-bound societies.
- 2. That it is the sense of this Conference that our houses of worship should not be open to any evangelist or minister of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain a regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments. Any waiving of the above resolution by a contract or lease of building must be obtained through the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference.
- 3. Whereas, We have a scholastic standard for our preachers, and whereas those saved, sanctified and called among our own numbers are compelled to meet these requirements before ordination: Be it resolved, That the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders shall require all those desiring to unite with us from any other denomination or Annual Conference to present credits equivalent to our Conference Course of Study, regardless of their standing in the body of which they have been a member, and if they cannot do this they shall be required to meet the same conditions as our local preachers before ordination.
- 4. That any candidate for Elder's Orders or traveling under the direction of the Conference, who fails to attend the Institutes and the examinations of the Committee, without sufficient cause, shall be deemed unworthy of the trust and care of souls, and refused a place among us a minister of the Gospel, and when they shall fail to attend the Institute for two successive years they shall be dropped from the roll.
- 5. The Committee on Elder's Orders is hereby to transfer all persons to the study list who may have been recommended to travel and may not have been given work.
- 6. Whereas, The Discipline requires that the Stewards must meet the Pastors and agree as to the amount necessary for their support; Be it resolved, That the circuits may at the same time enter into an agreement in writing with the Pastor as to the service he is to render to the church. In case the Pastor shall fail to render such services, unless providentially hindered or released by the circuit, said failure shall be considered a sufficient cause to make an adjustment of the amount originally agreed upon. Otherwise the contract shall be binding upon both parties the same as any other financial obligation entered into by contracting parties.
- 7. The membership, so far as possible, shall pay all their contributions for the Conference and Connectional interests to the Pastors, who shall receipt them for the same and see that it is paid to the proper authorities. Where money is paid direct to the Conference Treasurer by the membership, he shall send a duplicate receipt to the pastor of the charge where such persons are members.

- 8. All charges with a membership of twenty-five or more shall in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the Pastor may live.
- 9. Be it resolved, That it shall be the duty of the Pastors to look after the insurance of our church and parsonage properties. All insurance shall provide for losses caused by fire and lightning, hail and tornado. A failure on the part of the Pastor shall be a censurable offense. If the church fails to insure their property upon reasonable effort of the Pastor to secure the same, then said failure shall be reported to the President of the Conference who shall then have the property insured. In such case all insurance monies received from losses by fire, lightning, hail and tornado shall be used in Church Extension work as the Conference Board of Trustees deems best.
- 10. We recommend that all charges and stations to which the Pastor moves pay the moving and transportation expenses of said Pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary; provided this shall not interfere with the previous arrangements between Pastors and charges. That where the Conference demands the services of any one, that it shall bear the moving expenses, if any expense shall thus be incurred.
- 11. Each Pastor shall file a duplicate statistical report with the Committee before the close of the second day of Conference, said report to be kept on file one year, and hereafter these reports shall not be read in open Conference. The official character of no Pastor shall be passed until he shall have submitted a satisfactory report, including statistics.
- 12. All unaccounted for members appearing in the statistics in the membership list shall be transferred to the discontinued list. All members in excess of the number reported shall be reported received. The roll of all the classes upon the charges shall be put in the hands of the Pastors and they shall have charge of the same and make all entries therein.
- 13. It shall be a standing rule of this Conference until revoked by vote that the President shall receive \$35.00, the Secretary \$50.00, the Assistant Secretary \$25.00, and each member of the Statistical Committee \$25.00, each member of the Auditing Committee \$10.00, Assistant to the Treasurer \$10.00, the same to be apportioned pro-rata among the various funds of the Conference; each member of the Camp Meeting Committee \$15.00, and the Treasurer of the Camp Meeting Association \$40.00.
- 14. It shall be a standing rule until revoked by this body that the President shall nominate his Advisory Board and the Conference shall elect his nominations.
- 15. It shall be a standing rule of this Conference that in the examination of character the Conference officials shall be called first.
- 16. The Camp Meeting Committee shall be elected as follows: One for three years, one for two years, and one for one year, and that

the person elected for three years be chairman of the Committee, and that hereafter each member be elected for three years.

- 17. It shall be a standing rule of this Conference until revoked by vote that the Conference Sunday School Secretary receive \$50.00, and each of the other members of the Conference Sunday School Board receive \$25.00, the same to be paid out of the Conference Sunday School Treasury.
- 18. Be it resolved, That if any lay-member of the church shall be guilty of immorality, and later be brought to repentance; that they shall not be put into any position of public leadership in the church either by election or appointment, until after at least two consecutive years of exemplary Christian life.
- 19. The Pastor shall bring to each Quarterly Meeting a fully itemized report of his labors during the quarter. The report shall be itemized as follows: 1. Number of sermons preached. 2. Number of prayer meetings attended. 3. Number of other services held. 4. Amount of cash salary received. 5. Amount of gifts and donations. 6. Number of pastoral calls. 7. Number of members received in full relationship, in associate relationship. 8. Amount of budget raised.

We, the Committee on Resolutions, beg to submit the following report:

We firmly believe in the restraining influence of law as a corrective moral measure, therefore we urge our people to help encourage law enforcement and especially to use our influence and ballot to nominate and elect men to office such as will enforce the eighteenth amendment.

Inasmuch as the liquor interest and organized vice are resorting to every means to increase their profits, and in doing so have become a menace to society, we therefore urge our people to pray earnestly for our beloved nation, especially for her law-enforcement officers.

We also deplore the present break-down in moral standards, particularily in sex relations, cigaret smoking, especially among women, ludeness of dress, letting down of womanly modesty and reserve in general. We adjure our people to avoid such behavior and dress as is the vogue of the world and contrary to the Word of God. Inasmuch as certain influential social leaders are advocating the pernicious practice of companionate marriage and birth control, we believe this is not only unchristian, but if permitted by law would be a gross sin against society and amount to nothing less than legalized prostitution.

We therefore recommend that our ministry keep informed on these matters and faithfully warn our people.

We firmly believe the teaching of the Word of God and vital

religion to be the only solution to prevalent moral problems.

Realizing the church and home, the two greatest institutions of our national life, we urge our people to guard with zealous care the family altars and places of Bible study and secret prayer as a sefeguard to our children, and as a means of promoting the work of God in general.

We deplore the brazen immorality of the modern movie, and whereas those at the head of the large corporations have acknowledged that they must use the sex appeal and illicit love to make it a profit ble business, and whereas those that are connected with this business I ave repeatedly said if the church people of this country would withd aw their support they could no longer operate, we recommend that our church keep her testimony sounding out against the vice propaga ing business.

In order that a greater degree of church loyalty and intelligent service may be rendered by our people, we recommend that our ministry urge our members to read the annual conference minutes, and especially to be informed of the church discipline, and, when deemed necessary, that parts of the discipline be read in public meeting or a drill be conducted at the suitable times. าเป็นเทคเทศ การกระโดย เดิม ค.ศักราน

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FINANCE AND APPROPRIATION

Report No. 5

Your Committee on Finance and Appropriation respectfully submit the following recommendations:

- 1. That the President shall have general oversight of all the work of the Conference and that he shall hold at least one Quarterly Meeting on each Charge and the pastors shall arrange for the remaining Quarterly Meetings. He shall co-operate with the pastors in the raising of the budgets and the pastors are to report to him quarterly the amount of budgets raised, and where pastors fail to report in doing this it shall require a vote of the Conference to pass his character. The President's salary to be \$1,550.00 and expenses incident to his work.
- 2. That the Missionary Evangelist's salary be \$1,500.00, and his expenses not to exceed \$200.00.
- 3. That Conference Claims be \$1.00 per member, the same to be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer quarterly, except the Quarterly Meeting apportionment should be paid to the President when he holds the Quarterly Meeting.
- 4. That all charges shall be apportioned 25 cents per member for College Building Fund.
- 5. That the pastors and churches comply with the provisions of the discipline in paragraph 146 as it relates to Superannuated Ministers' Fund, and that the Trustees of the Conference, through their Treasurer, collect notes that are past due and outstanding obligations to this fund.
- 6. That the pastors and churches raise an amount equal to 25 cents per member as apportioned by the Book Committee for the Orphanage in the South. All money for this fund to be forwarded to the Superintendent of the Orphanage, Mr. D. L. Jones, Macon, Georgia.
- 7. That the Foreign Missionary Treasurer be requested to report all money received during the year to the Conference Treasurer not less than 10 days before the Annual Conference.
- 8. That the Home Missionary Treasurer and Women's Society report all Home Missionary money raised quarterly to the Conference Treasurer.
- 9. We recomend favorably the President's recommendation as to budget for new churches organized; that no budget shall be levied on new churches for the first year and only free will offerings the second.
- 10. That our churches adopt the Tithing or Storehouse Plan and that a Commission be elected to standardize the distribution of the tithe.
- 11. That there be added to Resolution No. 19 of the Conference Minutes, Item No. 8: Amount of budget raised.

THE INDIANA CONFERENCE

- 12. That the first Sunday School offering of each month be known as Home Mission Sunday, the same to be divided as follows: Forty per cent shall be applied on the 50-cent Connectional Home Mission budget and 60 per cent for Conference Missions.
- 13. That the Local Board of Control of Marion College recommend to the Book Committee that all interest on endowment notes apply on Educational budget.
- 14. That the apportionment be as follows: Conference Claims, \$1.00; Conference Missions, \$1.00; Educational Budget, \$1.00; Home Missions, 50 cents; Foreign Missions, \$2.50; Orphanage, 25 cents; College Building Fund, 25 cents; Minutes, same as last year.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON STANDARD OF APPORTION-MENT OF THE TITHE

We appreciate the growing interest and obedience to the law of the tithe, as taught in the Holy Scriptures, and as therein setting forth God's plan for financing His cause. It cannot be reasonably imagined that an All-wise Person would launch a gigantic enterprise like the work of redemption to be carried on by His Church without providing an adequate plan for successfully financing all the work involved.

All that legitimately belongs to the work of the church is important and vital, and each interest should receive its proper consideration and support. The law of the tithe provides for this. The New Testament history informs us that there was the institution of the Christian ministry, succeeding the priesthood of the old dispensation; the evangelization of the world, and the care of the poor and needy. These suggest, in general, the field our benevolences should cover.

In our denominational or church relationship we unite to promote the work of Christ, as by this method we can most successfully carry forward these arms of religious activity. We have therefore our local church expenses and the benevolences incident to our Conference and Connectional enterprises. With each of these, by our vows of church relationship, we are each definitely related, and for their support we

are responsible.

The divine plan for the disposition of the tithe is the Store House method. See Mal. III-10. As the local church is at the basis of all activity it must first provide for its own maintenance. This involves the support of the ministry, the maintenance of the house of worship, and the care of the needy, or such incidental expenses as success may require.

Since it is proper for all who contribute their tithe to know for what interests their money is expended it is obligatory upon us to state HOW it shall be apportioned to the various arms of the work. In the Store House plan this is done, and the church, rather than the individual, is honored in the success that will surely follow our co-operative adherence to the divine plan.

#### Standard of Apportionment

A careful study and observation of the distribution of the tithe confirms our conviction that the following apportionment is sure to conserve the interest of all phases of our work, both local and general. A little variation may be in order under certain local conditions, but in general the following basis of apportionment will prove to be a safe, fair and successful rule:

60% Retained for local church.

12% Conference work.

8% Education.

16% Home and Foreign Missions.

4% Miscellaneous.

With this percentage of apportionment as a basis it is the mind of the committee that when each arm of the work is provided with the amount required for it, the balance may be placed in the miscellaneous division and voted out from there to where it is needed, as the Tithing Band shall judge best.
