

This issue of the Minutes of 1946 is, by order of the Conference Body, dedicated to the memory of the Rev. E. D. Carpenter.

A Tribute to Rev. E. D. Carpenter

CONFESSIO

Rev. E. D. Carpenter was born on a farm at Sandy Creek, N. Y., June 3rd, 1859. As a young man he spent his winters teaching school, and his summers on the farm, until near the time when he entered the Ministry, taking work in what was at that time, the Syracuse Conference. In 1899 he transferred to the Champlain Conference. He was elected President of that Conference in 1902, and continued in that office for 18 years, by practically a unanimous vote until in 1920, when he voluntarily retired from the office. When he was elected President of the Champlain Conference there had been no camp meeting held at West Chazy for fourteen years. In the second year of his Presidency, the present grounds at West Chazy were plotted, and leased, for the payment of said grounds, to many individuals. Camp meeting has been held continuously since that time to the present.

Rev. Carpenter was also Treasurer of the Conference Superannuate Society for twenty years; President of the General Conference for twelve years; a member of the Book Committee since 1903; and Secretary of all Connectional Boards since 1911. Surely he was honored by his Church with high honors as well as being charged with great responsibilities. Truly he served faithfully and well in every position he was called to fill.

In the winter of 1943 Brother Carpenter fell on the icy walk near his home, in which he suffered a near fracture of the hip, from which he never fully recovered. However he was able to be about his home with the aid of crutches. In the early spring of 1946 he went to the hospital for a major operation, from which he did not recover, and he slipped away from us to his eternal Home. His funeral service was held from the Sandy Creek Wesleyan Methodist Church, with the Rev. F. R. Eddy, Connectional Agent, in charge, and all that was earthly was laid to rest in the cemetery at Sandy Creek, N. Y. there to await the trumpet call. God grant that we who are left may carry on in our sphere, as faithfully and efficiently as he did in his. May we forget his faults, and emulate his virtues, and may Divine Love, as a mantle cover us all.

CONFERENCE RESOLUTIONS

- 1. The Resolutions of Conference shall be printed in the Conference Minutes each year.
- 2. All visiting members of our own, or other Churches in harmony with our principles, shall be invited to honorary seats in the Conference.
- 3. The Conference President shall receive twenty dollars per year for postage and stationery; also any needed traveling expense. At any time the President be required to travel the Conference, his duties and pay shall be defined by the Conference.
- 4. The Conference Secretary shall receive twenty-five dollars per year for his labor and incidental expenses.
- 5. The Conference Treasurer shall receive twenty-five dollars per year for his services in caring for the funds.
- 6. In making his report, the Conference Treasurer is authorized to close his books one week before the Conference session. The Treasurer of the Superannuate Ministers' Relief Association also shall close his books one week before the Conference session.
- 7. All monies disbursed by the Conference Treasurer during the interim of Conference shall be upon order of the President, except in case of payment to the President, when such order shall be issued by the Vice-President. It is understood that any payment ordered by the Conference direct may be paid by the Treasurer without an order as directed above.
- 8. No monies shall be loaned by the Conference Treasurer except by order of Conference, or by the consent of the President and his Advisory Board.
- 9. Each elder shall make his engagement as Pastor with the understanding that if he be elected Conference President he shall be released in his pastoral engagement.
- 10. The first Sunday in each month shall be known as Home Mission Sunday, and the Sunday School offerings shall be given to Home Missions, and should be sent to the Conference Treasurer.
- 11. In securing Evangelists for the Camp Meeting, the Camp Meeting Committee is privileged to secure not more than one worker outside the Denomination. 1-4 and 1224.

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- 12. The Camp-meeting Committee shall be composed of the Conference President, as Chairman; and three ministers and three laymen, all to be elected by ballot (after the Conference of 1923), the term of office to be three years, the time of one minister and one layman expiring each year.
- 13. Pastors shall state financial items in their statistical reports in even dollars, except in items affecting the Budget; and as far as possible are requested to report all budget items in even dollars. When such rule is not followed, the Statistical Secretaries are authorized to drop decimals, except as provided above.
- 14. The offerings for Superannuated Ministers shall be taken within sixty days after Conference, and forwarded to the Treasurer of the Superannuate Society.
- 15. The Committée on Credentials shall secure from each delegate the necessary credentials as provided by our Discipline, with the Post Office address of the same.
- 16. The closing Sunday of the Conference year shall be the Sunday following the beginning of the Annual Conference. The Pastor's salary on this closing Sunday shall be paid by the church of which he is pastor; and for the first Sunday of the new Conference year it shall be paid by the charge to which he is going.
- 17. Newly elected Conference Officers shall take office after the close of Conference Sunday.
- 18. The Conference President shall include in the Orders of the day a special period to consider Camp-meeting business.
- 19. A Nominating Committee shall be elected to consider and nominate all elective officers of the Conference. The Committee shall consist of four Elders and four laymen. The report of the Nominating Committee shall be read to the Conference the day preceding the election.
- 20. Each church member over fourteen years of age shall be apportioned fifty-two cents per year for Church Extension.
- 21. The delegates' credentials shall be sent to the Committee on Credentials before the opening of the Conference, and the Conference Secretary shall send printed blanks with the statistical, character, etc.

RECORD OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

Wednesday Forenoon

The devotional service was in charge of Rev. Matson, who read a Psalm. Mrs. Shippee led in singing, and Rev. Lewis prayed.

Business: Roll call of Elders and Conference Preachers was called with 17 and 8 respectively answering.

The report of the Committee on Delegates' Credentials was read and was accepted, with the privilege of adding the names of other delegates not yet listed.

It was voted that the Bar of the Conference be the first six front center rows of seats.

The Hours of Session were fixed as follows: Forenoon—open at 8:45 and close at 11:30; Afternoon—open at 1:30, and close by vote. It was voted to hear the Conference Treasurer's report, which was accepted and referred to the Auditing Committee. See Report No. 1. The roll of delegates was called.

The Vice-President was called to the Chair, and the President read his annual report. It was voted accepted. See Report No. 2.

During the forenoon the Committee on Courtesy presented the following, and they were introduced to the Conference: Dr. Claude Ries, Rev. Geo. Hawthorne, Rev. Chas. McCallum, Mr. Albert Warner, Mr. Harris Earl, Rev. J. R. Swauger, Rev. Maurice Jesmer, and Miss Florence Carey. It was voted to insert in the President's report (at the place relative to his resignation) the words "to become effective at the close of this Conference session." A standing vote of thanks was given to President Stark for his faithful service to the Conference.

Report No. 4 SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY'S REPORT

The Sunday schools of the Conference are growing. We now have 34, the largest number in 45 years; maybe more. The enrollment is (at 3rd quarter) 1607, and the total on Rally Day, 1945, was 1834. Thank the Lord, and all you good Sunday school folks!

Every Sunday school in the Conference paid its Sunday-school budget again. So we paid the Connectional budget (82.10, the largest ever) in full again. The Thanksgiving offering lacked only five of being 100%, even though in the whole Connection the drop was proportionately more. The total received was \$287.27 toward Connectional Traveling President, if there is one. This is good!

Again it is my privilege, and responsibility, to say: "There is still much Sunday-school work to be done." There are Sunday schools without Cradle Roll, or Home Department; Training Classes, and Daily Vacation Bible Schools are almost unknown. With a rather vague (or guesswork) recording of Sunday-school scholars converted (74 last year) and scholars joining the Church (51 last year), we fall down on the job of making the Sunday schools of the Conference "life saving" or soul-winning agencies. We must awaken to the task and to the responsibilities along this line.

Through the providential care and guidance of our God we have been brought safely through another Conference year. My own heart is filled with inexpressible joy as I contemplate His great goodness to us, His children. To Him be all the glory and praise for the splendid advancement that has been made during the course of the year. To my mind, this has been the best year, from a spiritual standpoint, that I have known in the Conference. There has been manifest growth and deepening both among the clergy and the laity. We are especially grateful to note the splendid spirit of aggressiveness among our young people. Through the channel of their organization \$310.00 has been directed toward our pioneer work.

In addition to these, two new fields have been opened—one at Springfield, Mass., in the New England States and the other on the St. Regis Indian Reservation. Two others are in prospect and, we trust, will be opened immediately following this conference session, if the start has not already been made. These in view are at Keene, New York and at Potsdam, New York. Six new workers will be joining the Conference this year. Steps have been taken toward separating two of the circuits and placing a pastor on each charge. The circuits concerned in this move are Cobleskill and Carlisle, and Norfolk and Brookdale.

We are thankful to state that nearly all budgets have been paid in full and that some have been well overpaid. As my report will show, nearly \$1450.00 has been received by me personally for pioneer work. This is apart from the regular Conference Extension Fund provided by the budget. In addition to that which I have received and disbursed, Cobleskill alone

has raised over \$3000.00 from all sources. Colton has purchased a parsonage and is in the process of repairing it and putting it in proper shape for use.

"THE CHAMPLAIN CONFERENCE CHALLENGER"

This work as your editor has been a delight to me. It has, under God, been a benefit to the Conference, as well as to me. To some extent the paper has failed to be all that I wish it might have been. Personally, it was experimental, and many mistakes were made. I am sorry. Financially, it was not a paying proposition; but, by your permission, in using Conference Sunday-school funds we came through without any debt. As it appears to me there are a few things that need to be settled before we leave Conference, should it be desired to continue the paper. First, we need about \$200 as a minimum for expense, providing for six issues. Or \$400

to make it a monthly, provided either ten cents per copy, or \$1 per year for the monthly, or ten cents a copy and fifty cents per year for semi-monthly. If single subscriptions were the method, we should have 500, (we mailed out 446 the last issue) for there would be extra expense.

Beside the assured financial method, we need a more regular reporting by Conference officers (the Conference President, and Conference W. H. & F. M. Society President were 100%), pastors and others. It is quite a job (and an unnecessary one) to write a card notice each issue. (If a monthly paper, the reporting could be done the first of the month.)

And if District meetings, Conference and Camp Meeting could assume some expense—as advertising, I believe it would be better, in publicity as well as good judgment financially. This is true in part for all the periodicals of the Church also.

STANDING RULES

1. The Standing Rules of the Conference Missionary Society shall be printed in the Conference Minutes each year.

2. The Conference Treasurer is authorized to close her books one

week before the Conference session begins.

3. One of the two statistical blanks sent to each society, after being carefully filled in, is to be given to the statistical committee at the beginning of conference; the other is to be retained by the delegate and read to the local society at the first meeting of the new year. Receipts and disbursements must be made to balance before being placed in the hands of the statistical committee; also giving rating according to efficiency standard.

4. All money raised by the society shall be used for missionary work,

and no money paid out without a vote of the society.

5. The Conference President shall receive annually \$5.00, the Treasurer \$10.00 and the Secretary \$2.00, to defray expense of postage and writing material.

The voting body shall be composed of conference officers, Y. M.
 W. B. superintendents, presidents of local societies, and one delegate from

each local society, lady pastors and pastor's wives.

7. Each local society shall continue sending \$6.00 to Southern Mountain Work, and \$5.00 or more to Hephzibah Orphanage. This must be

sent through the Conference Treasurer and applies on the budget.

8. It is required that twenty-five cents per member of the local society dues be forwarded through the Conference Society Treasurer of the General Conference for the general fund. Also that twenty-five cents be retained in the conference treasury and the remaining fifty cents be used directly for missionary work and be applied on local church budget.

The local societies shall disburse all conference and general conference funds through the Conference Treasurer, who shall in turn remit all general

conference funds to the general conference treasurer.

 Each society is to make provision for a missionary to travel the Conference as early in the year as possible, allowing ample time for each charge.

10. The Plan of Work should be read quarterly to our local societies

to keep us enthused in our work.

PLAN OF WORK

We recommend that each local W. H. & F. M. Society:

1. Have regular monthly meetings at which we urge the use of Program books, Study Book, missionary paper, offering and business. Arrange with the pastor for one public, well-advertised meeting, also regular missionary prayer meetings using suggested topic in program book.

- 2. Observe special days with special, planned programs or special speaker, if available.
- 3. Endeavor to secure every woman of congregation and any interested individual outside as a member of the Society and encourage men to join or have their own society.
- 4. Organize an active prayer band including men, women and children.
- 5. Officers to be subscribers to and readers of "Wesleyan Missionary" and "Wesleyan Methodist"; also 75% of the members to be subscribers to each.
- 6. Continue contributions of well mended, cleaned, pressed, usable clothing, new materials, notions, Sunday School Charts, Scripture pictures, and home remedies to missionaries following the suggestions in the Magazine, cheerfully accepting the estimated values set by the workers.
- 7. Continue sending canned and other supplies for the needs of the camp, as pillows, mirrors, rugs, quilts, towels, and dresser scarfs; introducing a special canning day at a society meeting in localities where practical.
 - 8. Exhibition of various original ideas at Conference.
- 9. Bring a correctly balanced, complete statistical blank and present it to the Statistical Committee at the first sitting of Conference.
- 10. Send at least ten cents per member for cleaning of campgrounds, not later than May first, to the Treasurer, Mrs. Myrtle Larabee, Mooers, N. Y.
- 11. At the last meeting of the year before Conference, elect efficers for the coming year, including solicitor for the magazine and a delegate, other than church delegate, if possible, whose room and board also be provided for the Conference week. Instruct the delegates the amount to pledge at Conference for Missions. Each Band instruct their delegate the amount to pledge at Conference, this amount to be paid through the Conference Superintendent.
- 12. That each delegate present a clear, comprehensive report to her society at the first meeting following Conference.
