Journal of Daily Proceedings

The twenty-ninth annual session of the Kentucky Conference of The Wesleyan Methodist Church of America convened August 6, 1931 at 7:30 p. m. at the campground, Buchel, Kentucky. The Conference was opened with a song service led by the Rev. Carman Toler. The Rev. H. L. Barger led in prayer.

The conference message was delivered by the Rev. Stanley Kendall who used Proverbs 14:32 as a text and brought a message about sin and its cure.

Following the message there was a short business session. The roll was called. The bar of conference was set as the first five rows of seats and the platform. A report of the General Orders of the Day was accepted which set conference time at 9:00 a. m. A motion carried to adjourn. Dismissed by Brother Reynolds.

Second Meeting, Tuesday 9 a. m.

Devotions were in charge of the Rev. W. B. Dunkum.

The roll was called. The Credentials Committee reported and 30 delegates were seated by vote.

The minutes were read and accepted.

The report of the Nominating Committee was read. An amendment to the Nominating Committee's report carried, and the Rev. Ralph Golding was placed as Chairman of Memorials. The Nominating Report was accepted. (See Report No. 1.)

The President gave his report which was accepted by the conference. (See Report No. 2.)

The report of the Mission Board was read and accepted. (See Report No. 3.)

The Committee on Courtesy introduced Mr. and Mrs. Hash, Mr. Smith, and Mrs. Cole.

A motion prevailed to recess and meet at the call of the chair. Prayer by Brother Hewitt.

Third Meeting, Tuesday 1:30 p. m.

Devotions were in charge of the Rev. Kenneth Reynolds.

A motion carried to read the minutes and call the roll only once a day.

A motion was made to seat Brother Parsons, who was present without credentials, in the bar. The motion carried.

The Credentials Committee reported and 6 delegates were seated in the bar.

The Pension Board report was read and adopted. (See Report No. 4.)

A partial report of the Religious Orders Committee was read.

The following preachers and delegates gave their reports: Thomas Bailey, Susie Britton, Florence Burres, David Budensick, Harrison Davidson Sr., Roland Elam, D. W. Fossit, Christine Fowler, Hallie Gilmer, C. M. Hewitt, Jacob Hunter, Esther Hunter, E. L. Jackson, K. L. McGuyer, Lee R. Meredith, A. T. Reynolds, Calvin Revis, B. L. Seaton, W. G. Stockton, Michael Trisay, Bernice Woodward, Florence Hayes, Kenneth Reynolds, Carl Walker, Mary Davidson, and Paul Meredith.

A motion carried to adjourn.

Fourth Meeting, Wednesday 9 a. m.

Devotions were in charge of the Rev. J. E. Lee.

The roll was called. The Credentials Committee reported and 3 delegates were seated.

The Courtesy Committee introduced the Rev. J. E. Lee and Dr. W. F. McConn.

The Treasurer's Report was read, and a motion prevailed to accept the report and commend the Treasurer for his fidelity and faithfulness. (See Report No. 5.)

The Report of the Pension Plan was adopted. (See Report No. 6.)

The Order of the Day was the election of conference officials which resulted as follows: President—C. L. Blanchard; Vice-President—D. W. Fossit; Secretary—Christine Fowler.

A motion carried to elect the same Treasurer for the conference and the Pension Plan. George Basham was elected Treasurer.

The Trustees, elected for a period of three years, are: Ministerial—D. W. Fossit; Layman—K. K. Rothrock; Nominer for the Local Board of Managers, C. L. Blanchard; alternate, J. E. Hunter.

The conference voted to complete the election of officers by acclamation.

Harrison Davidson Sr. was elected Sunday School Secretary and John Basham was elected Educational Secretary.

A motion was made, and it carried by vote that the conference proceed with the customary method of election.

A motion carried to adjourn. Prayer by Brother Bolton.

Fifth Meeting, Wednesday 1:30 p. m.

Devotions were led by the Rev. A. T. Reynolds.

A motion was made that the action of the morning session in the election of the Tithing Secretary be rescinded. This was done by three-fourth vote. The election was completed as follows: Tithing Secretary, Hallie Gilmer; Sunday School Board, Harrison Davidson Sr., Earl Pom-

Blanchard, John Cole, Stanley Kendall, Catherine Harrington, Lerada Walker; Mission Board, C. L. Blanchard, Missionary President, Henry Taylor, John Cole and Superintendent of Y.M.W.B.

A motion prevailed to elect the entire Pension Board of last year which was C. L. Blanchard, George Basham, Henry Taylor.

The Tent Committee is composed of Conference President, Missionary President, and W.Y.P.S. President.

The entire Credentials Committee of last year was elected by motion and vote which was Christine Fowler and Catherine Harrington.

There was a call for the Order of the Day which was the Educational Address by Dr. Wm. F. McConn who spoke in the interest of Marion College.

The following officers were elected: Secretary of Men's Missionary League, B. L. Clark; Secretary of Evangelism, John Woodward.

We heard the report of the Sunday School Secretary which was accepted. (See Report No. 7.)

A motion was made to adjourn. Prayer by Brother Barger.

Sixth Meeting, Thursday 9 a. m.

The roll was called.

Aminda Burgess, who was present without credentials, was seated in the bar by a vote of the body.

The minutes were read and accepted.

The Order of the Day was the Devotional Address by the Home Missionary Secretary, the Rev. J. R. Swanger, who spoke concerning the work of the Publishing House and the general interest of the church.

The Courtesy Committee introduced the Rev. and Mrs. Crosby, returned missionaries to South America, and the Rev. Freddie Kimberlin.

A motion carried to adjourn.

Seventh Meeting, Thursday 1:30 p. m.

The Memorial Service was in charge of the Rev. Ralph Golding. The service was held in memory of Mr. Mike Tharp of the Atwood Church, Mrs. Jennie Balcock of the Elizabeth Church, and Mrs. Mary Raper of the Highland Park Church.

The Resolutions Committee reported and the Standing Resolutions were adopted.

A motion prevailed that No. 11 of the second list of resolutions be

amended thus "to be subject to President's judgment." The amendment carried.

A motion carried that the item on pastor's salary be referred back to the Committee. The remainder of the resolutions were adopted. (See Report No. 8.)

The session adjourned by limitation of time.

Eighth Meeting, Friday 9 a. m.

The Devotions were led by the Rev. John Ferguson.

The roll was called.

The minutes were read and accepted.

The Statistical Committee report was adopted with thanks to the committees for their work. (See Report No. 6.)

The President made the appointments for his Advisory Board which were John Cole and Melvin Barger. The appointments were accepted.

The Courtesy Committee introduced the Rev. and Mrs. Ferguson, pastors of Baltimore, Maryland.

The Finance Committee read their report. A motion carried to refer No. 14 of the report back to the committee. An amendment was made to item No. 8 of the report to add the last sentence of the recommendation as it appeared last year. The amendment carried. The report as amended was adopted. (See Report No. 9.)

The report of the Auditing Committee was adopted. (See Report No. 10.)

The W.Y.P.S. Report was read and amended to read in Item II in the Ways and Means Report thus "or in some other point." The amendment carried by vote, and the report was adopted. (See W.Y.P.S. official and Ways and Means Report.)

A partial report of the Pastoral Relations Committee was read.

The report of the Publications Committee was adopted. (See Report No. 11.)

The session adjourned to the call of the chair. Prayer by Brother Hunter.

Ninth Meeting, Friday 1:30 p. m.

Devotions were led by the Rev. Freddie Kimberlin.

The Finance Committee reported concerning recommendation No. 14. A motion carried to omit No. 14 and to renumber the following ones.

A motion was made that the President of the Kentucky Annual Conference of The Wesleyan Methodist Church of America with his Advisory Board and the members of the Board of Trustees of said Conference be authorized to investigate the possibility of incorporating the Kentucky Conference according to the laws of the State of Kentucky as a corporate

body, and that they be empowered to proceed with said corporation. The motion was properly seconded and unanimously carried by a standing vote.

A motion was made to accept the proposed revision of Article 5 in the Discipline. This motion was properly seconded and unanimously carried by a standing vote.

Brother Swauger spoke briefly on the subject of Child Evangelism.

The Child Evangelism Board was elected which was C. L. Blanchard, Harrison Davidson St., Florence Burres, Lillian Budensiek, and John Basham.

C. L. Blanchard was elected as the Rural Association Secretary.

The conference voted that the matter of the conference message of next year be left in the hands of the President and his Advisory Board.

By the vote of the body any unfinished business or any arising in the interim of conference is left in the hands of the President and his Advisory Board.

A motion was made to adjourn.

The Special Order of the Day was an address by the Rev. J. R. Swauger.

Conference convened again at 3:40 and time was given for questions and answers.

Communications were read from the Rev. Harry E. Stanley and Ora M. Nanna. The character of Brother Stanley was passed. Sister Nanna was granted the request of being released from all connections.

A partial report of the Pastoral Relations Committee was given.

The report of the Itineracy and Elder's Orders was read. Robert Bart was elected by the body to Elder's Orders. Freddie Kimberlin was elected to Elder's Orders. John Van Cise was elected to Elder's Orders. The report of the Itineracy and Elder's Orders Committee was adopted. (See Report No. 12.)

The session adjourned to the call of the chair.

Tenth Meeting, Saturday 9 a. m.

The devotions were led by the Rev. Delbert Winters Jr.

The body voted that the President and Secretary and the Publications Committee add any names that were omitted in the Itineracy and Elder's Orders Report.

A motion was made and seconded that Delbert T. Winters Jr. be elected to Elder's Orders. This carried unanimously by a standing vote.

The Pastoral Relations Committee gave a final report which was adopted.

A motion was made that the Conference Board of Trustees be authorized to build or buy a conference parsonage when they deem that sufficient funds are available to be supplemented by a loan.

An amendment was made to the motion that the Conference Board of Trustees be authorized to arrange for a conference parsonage by either buying or building as soon as possible. The amendment carried.

The main motion as amended was adopted.

A motion carried that only those whose character was not passed by the Character Committee give their report on the conference floor.

The character of Ralph Golding, Freddie Kimberlin, Blanche Burres, Reland Elam, and Carl Walker was passed by the body.

A rising vote of thanks and a pledge of confidence and support throughout the year was given to the President.

A rising vote of thanks was given to the Editor, and the contributors of the WESLEYAN MESSENGER and to the Publications Committee.

The Resolutions Committee reported that Item No. 10 had been dropped and the following resolution renumbered. This action was accepted by the conference.

The final reading of the minutes was accepted.

A motion carried to adjourn. Florence Burres dismissed the conference with prayer.

Standing Resolutions

1. The Conference President shall in his quarterly meetings see that adequate insurance is carried by each church on its property.

2. To eliminate loss of time the Committee on Character, after having signed statistical blanks shall deliver same to the Statistical Committee, who in turn shall deliver them to the pastor.

3. The Conference shall elect a Nominating Committee for the coming year, which shall be a standing committee of five members with the Conference President as member ex-officio. This committee shall nominate the chairman and committees of the conference temporary organization and the third member of the Publications Committee.

4. We recommend that Conference Treasurer close conference books effective midnight Wednesday following third Sunday in July and that all money received after said date shall be counted as benevolence on the following year.

5. The Conference Trustees shall serve as the Committee on Church and Parsonage Location.

6. The conference shall convene the first Monday night of August each year.

7. All ministers and delegates attending the entire annual conference and camp are to be given rooms in preference to those not active in conference business.

8. No divorced person shall be ordained in the Kentucky Conference.

9. Conference officials shall take office at the rise of the conference with the exception of the Secretary who shall assume office in the next meeting following the election.

10. No charge shall call a pastor or a supply from other conferences or denominations as long as there are available ministers in our conference qualified for the work. The Conference President, after having exercised his prerogative in the reception of ministers coming from other conferences or denominations, shall immediately refer them to the Committee on Itinerary and Elder's Orders, which shall make a thorough investigation as to the ministry and life of such applicants and shall report their findings to the President, after which appointments may be made.

11. The Tent Committee shall be composed of the following: The Conference President, W.M.S. President, and W.Y.P.S. President.

12. The vote on the pastor shall be taken the first week in June unless special permission be granted by the Conference President for another date; said ballots are to be prepared by the clerk and the results of the vote shall be reported at once to the Conference President.

13. Let all ministers move their membership to their new appointment, and the Finance Committee shall figure Budget Apportionment after the final reading of the report of the Pastoral Relations Committee.

14. There shall be a Conference Cabinet composed of the Conference President, the Mission Board, the Camp Meeting President, and the Young People's President. It shall be the duty of this cabinet to approve and adjust all special and unusual plans of any conference organization to raise funds during the interims of the conference sessions.

15. Be it resolved that no pastor, evangelist or Christian worker be given work within the bounds of the Kentucky Conference that owns or endorses a television in their home, and this is to be enforced.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Members of the Kentucky Conference and Friends:

With thanksgiving to the God of all grace we gather for the twenty-ninth annual session of the Kentucky Conference.

Conference Conditions

Our God has given the conference a good year. Nearly every church has had two or more revival meetings with a number of seekers. At Washington, Indiana last fall about 100 seekers knelt at the altar. At Milan in June and July nearly 100 bowed as penitent seekers. In July at West Frankfort around 75 met conditions for a Pentecost. The enemy has made encroachments at places, but we do not propose to allow him to take territory from us.

The Madison Church has spent about \$1200 this year on installation of Sunday school rooms in the basement and on redecorating the church. Bloomfield and Mt. Zion have redecorated the church buildings within and without. Paoli has under construction a concrete block parsonage. Safe Avenue has added to the church building an appealing concrete block addition, 30 x 30. The footing is laid for a new church building at Pekin, Indiana. New Albany has redecorated and improved the church basement and plans are materializing for the addition of rooms to the building used as a parsonage. New Shiloh has redecorated the basement church and made partitions for Sunday school rooms. Camp Taylor has purchased a lot beside the church on which to build a parsonage later, and the church has been redecorated. Hope, Indiana is building four Sunday school rooms and is lowering the ceiling of the church.

Rock Springs, Simpson Chapel and Owensboro have continued improvements and redecoration. The Jamestown parsonage has been re-partitioned in most of the rooms and the church redecorated. Milan, Indiana plans the construction of several Sunday school rooms to accommodate the growing Sunday school. Leavenworth has done some wholesome redecoration. Highland Park has built a garage behind their new parsonage and enclosed the back yard with a substantial fence. Winchester has purchased new pews, added more Sunday school rooms and made the pulpit platform over.

The salary of several pastors has raised and many churches have paid the utilities for the pastors. More salaries are to be raised for next year.

Even though the old dorm on the campground ascended heavenward in flames on the night of July 6, we rejoice that all the other buildings were left on earth for our use. Though unable to realize fully the per-

missive will of God in this loss, we accept it from Him with hearts desirous to learn the lesson He wishes to teach us. With a humble teachable attitude we shall still believe that all things work together for good when we love God with all our hearts.

Looking Ahead

Looking ahead and upward, as preachers of the Kentucky Conference, we still feel that we must lift high the great truth of full salvation, and hold a strict separation from the world in spirit and nature by shunning the wearing of jewelry, worldly adornment and a worldly spirit. We must keep the emphasis on perfect love and heart purity by the mighty baptism of the Holy Spirit in all His sanctifying fulness. Personal, community, and national sins must be exposed. Yet, it will be recalled in some instances that we cannot separate what we might consider tares from the wheat. We must be free from class, racial and denominational prejudice. Faults, failure and mistakes must be overlooked. We must not compromise the truth, yet we must agree to fellowship each other when we do not see identically.

President's Work

The president has conducted the first and fourth quarterly conferences in the churches; attended the three regular board meetings at Marion College, a round table conference at Dayton, Ohio, the Youth Camp, the General Conference and the area Ministerial Convention at Marion, and the Kentucky Conference Ministerial Convention except for the last day when he was stricken with a severe case of the flu. The Messenger has been edited regularly. Several pioneer trips have been made besides special trips on occasions necessary. The car has travelled about 22,000 miles this year much of this being directly for the conference. Considerable correspondence and business has been transacted that cannot be recorded here.

President's Acts

August 25, 1950—Met with the Conference Cabinet when we assigned definite funds for each church to raise for the conference parsonage. These assignments appeared in the September Messenger.

August 30, 1950—Accepted the transfer of Elder John Cole from the Ohio Conference.

September 17, 1950—Accepted Bloomington as a church so organized by Evangelist K. L. McGuyer on September 3.

September 26, 1950—Organized a mission church of six members at Pekin, Indiana.

October 6, 1950—Granted J. E. Hunter the privilege of using Fielding T. Howard for evangelist.

October 28, 1950—Received by transfer from the South Carolina Conference, Conference Preacher D. C. Webb and Elder Clara Webb.

November 1, 1950—Accepted Freddie Kimberlin as a conference preacher from the Pilgrim Holiness Church of Ohio, and appointed him to conference evangelism. This was referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders.

January 15, 1951—Disbanded the Emison pioneer work, Emison, Indiana, due to complications, with advisory board approval.

March 11, 1951—Granted Joseph Myers permission to use Charles Carpenter, local preacher of the Pilgrim Holiness Church, for a week's revival.

March 30, 1951—Approved Carmen Toler using the Onan Evangelistic Party of the Pilgrim Church.

April 2, 1951—Set days of fasting and nights of prayer.

April 25, 1951—Approved Calvin Revis using Rev. and Mrs. McNeese, Nazarenes, as evangelists.

May 15, 1951—Gave T. B. Bailey permission to use the Bryants as singers for a revival.

May 16, 1951—Gave Conference Preacher Bailey Reentry a letter of standing.

May 19, 1951—Accepted J. E. Lee, old time Methodist, as an Elder with credentials from the Church of God, and referred this to the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders.

Financial Statement

Salary, \$2,650; Mileage expense, \$803.79; House rent, \$325; Utilities and desk expense, \$322.34; Gifts and donations, \$125.

Some Desired Goals

1. Deepening of the spiritual life of the conference by sincere application of each individual to more prayer, Bible study and greater diligence in holy living.

2. Each member of the conference a soul-winner by seeking specific help from the pastor and others, as well as books, on this.

3. Specific effort to extend our borders by gathering more in by all good methods, and by starting other prayer meetings, Sunday schools and churches.

4. Reduction of all indebtedness as soon as possible and a curb on going into debt deeply.

5. Special preparation of Sunday school teachers by teacher training classes and such means as may be suggested by the conference Sunday School Secretary.

6. Loyalty and co-operation in each local church and throughout the conference, thus guarding against the devil's tactics to divide and destroy.

Recommendations

1. The election of a secretary of evangelism in the conference to co-ordinate the conference program with that of the denomination in promoting true evangelism.

2. That each pastor accept the challenge with his church to set aside a particular day of fasting or a night of prayer each month and report this day to the secretary of evangelism and the conference president.

3. That the conference approve the plan of the conference president to draft and mimeograph a form letter for our church people to send to their friends and relatives for the purpose of raising funds for the conference parsonage, and that each church accept this challenge of the conference president to raise \$5000 or more from this source this year.

4. That the conference president be permitted to shorten some quarterly meeting trips to some churches in one service at his discretion in agreement with the pastor and the church concerned and to visit these or other churches between the first and fourth quarterly conferences to better care for the work or to plan for pioneer and church extension work.

Report No. 3

MISSION BOARD REPORT

As president of the Missionary Board, I wish to make the following report with Mission Board approval.

The Board consisting of C. L. Blanchard, Florence Barrés, K. L. McGuyer, J. E. Hunter and T. B. Bailey, met several times on business as the record of its meetings will show.

At the first meeting on the campground during last August, weekly allotments for pioneer work were agreed upon as follows:

Washington—\$15

Lewisport— 10

Emison— 7

At another meeting the last of December, the Lewisport workers were raised to \$15 beginning the first week of January, and Emison allotment was discontinued soon after and the work disbanded because of complications.

Later in the winter a small building at Bethlehem, Indiana, was purchased for \$250. During the year \$500 has been paid on the Washington property, reducing the debt to \$1300.

Washington, Indiana as a pioneer work has made good progress with full members and associates now numbering between 15 and 20. The spiritual condition is good and it is thought that God will continue to add to the church.

Lewisport has failed to materialize as a pioneer venture worthy of continued support at this time, as evidenced by the recent tent meeting but there may be a prospect there in the future.

Pekin, Indiana, organized last September 26, gives evidence of divine approval. A lot purchased by the local organization is now owned by the conference. The footing is poured for the construction of a concrete block church. This is an example of sponsorship by the new Albany mother church. A tent meeting last fall and one this spring have added to interest.

Bethlehem has failed to materialize as a worthwhile pioneer project.

Recommendations

We recommend:

1. That the Bethlehem building be sold and the money be used elsewhere.
2. Discontinuance of the Lewisport work for the present.
3. The raising of funds by the same methods in use.
4. The mother church idea to sponsor new works under Mission Board direction.

5. The following Mission Board Districts:

- (1) Louisville District, embracing all the churches of Louisville.
- (2) New Albany District, embracing New Albany, Jeffersonville, Clear Fork, Elizabeth, New Shiloh and Pekin.
- (3) Paoli District, consisting of Paoli, Leavenworth, Rock Springs, and Simpson Chapel.
- (4) Owensboro, embracing Owensboro and West Frankfort.
- (5) Bloomington, embracing Washington, Bloomfield, Bloomington, Whitehall, Mt. Zion, Mt. Calvary, Sylvania.
- (6) Madison, embracing Madison, Milton, Mt. Tabor, Brooksborg, Hulton, Milan, Hope.
- (7) Winchester, consisting of Winchester, Jamestown and the mountain missions.

6. That the pastors of each separate district meet before conference adjourns and elect a chairman of each district and report this to the conference body.

7. That the chairman of each district co-operate with the Conference Mission Board and the pastors of his district in helping to open new works under conference supervision.

8. That the young peoples' chairman of each district co-operate with all extension work of the conference mission district.

9. That special effort of the Mission Board to work toward a building at Jeffersonville this year receive conference approval.

For your interest and inspiration, we report the possibility of several openings around Owensboro.

SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY

We are thankful to report that the Lord's work for reaching out after and training people of all ages in the Word of God is going on through summer's heat and winter's cold. We are glad for all the faithful teachers and officers who have given lavishly of their time and energy to building bigger and better Sunday schools. Every worker is important, but perhaps the teacher carries the heaviest responsibility. He or she contributes more to the school or at least stands in the place of largest opportunity to get such a hold on their classes that scholars will not let go. Please understand, I do not mean to minimize the responsibility of the Superintendent to keep the worship service fresh and attractive, nor do I forget the obligation of the secretary or the treasurer and the department heads to do their jobs well.

Remember Dr. Mason at our Minister's Institute showed us that the largest room in the world is the room for improvement. I expect we all feel that there is more we could do. We have not reached the limit of our possibilities.

One of our biggest disappointments comes from unanswered requests. Had we received the information from every school, we could have had some helpful information upon the Rally Day attendance and the Thanksgiving Offerings. Only a few replied, but without full co-operation statistics fall short.

I have made a practice of writing to pastors, so in case you have been delinquent in getting requests into the secretary's hands, we request that you will do better.

Similar to some plans used in other conferences, we expect to have some scheme of setting before the Conference Sunday school reports that ought to stimulate the school. This too will require great faithfulness in each school sending in the desired information.

The General Assessment has been raised to ten cents per member. And now that Child Evangelism has been placed definitely in our department, that brings a new challenge to leading children to a clear cut decision for Christ.

We want this new conference year to be one of outstanding advance in our Sunday school. To that end we offer these recommendations:

1. That all pastors and Sunday school secretaries be very diligent in answering, promptly and fully, requests for information.

2. That every worker go deeper in their study of the Scripture. Then read some helpful literature on Sunday school work to better apply the Scriptures to their class.

3. That the churches give more attention to teacher training course. There is much we can learn from others.

4. That a conference assessment of five cents per member be raised for the Sunday school work.

5. That workers co-operate with Sunday School Association Convention to help build a larger Sunday School movement.

Report No. 8

COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

1. Pastors read with the instructions, the General and special rules of the Discipline to their congregation.

2. All elders and conference preachers shall send \$1.00 or a designated book of the course of study to the conference Librarian, and the Librarian shall give a list of needed books to the conference.

3. A Pastor (or Church) shall use only Wesleyan ministers for Evangelists unless special consent be granted by the conference president.

4. We insist that every pastor and evangelist attend annual conference and camp meeting if they expect to retain their relationship with us, unless providentially hindered, with no exceptions.

5. Every preacher borrowing a book from the conference Librarian may hold it for only one month. There will be a flat rate of twenty-five cents for the month and five cents for every day over the month.

6. Let us vigorously protest against liquor by every means possible to the Christian, including a refusal to patronize merchants who handle the same. We shall likewise oppose the wholesale prostitution existing in the Army and National life by exalting a virtuous life and instructing the young people and parents.

7. In this age when immodesty and worldliness are so subtly creeping into the Holiness movement, let every minister of ours earnestly contend for and faithfully preach the entire word of God without fear or favor of man. Let us refuse to compromise with the ungodly element which is robbing the Church of her glory and preachers of the divine anointing.

8. Let no minister return to visit members of his previous charge without first consulting the pastor if possible, and let him receive no title from any member of said charge. The title belongs to the local charge.

9. We insist that all pastors take only two, two weeks revivals and that every one abide by this rule with no exceptions.

10. The conference president hold at least two pioneer meetings, subject to the President's judgment, between his first and fourth quarterly meeting.

Report No. 9

FINANCE

1. We recommend that all churches paying less than 1,000 salary endeavor to raise the salary to that amount.

2. We recommend that this conference pay General Budget Assessments. (See Budget Apportionment.)

3. We recommend that each member pay \$1.00 to the Conference Work Fund. This money shall be disbursed by the Conference Treasurer with the approval of the Conference President and his Advisory Board.

4. We strongly recommend the Storehouse Plan of Tithing as the general financial plan of the church. Each pastor shall encourage the adoption of this plan by his church. (See Malachi 3:8-10.)

5. We recommend that the Conference Treasurer and the Conference Secretary each be paid \$75.00 a year.

6. We recommend and endorse the Church Extension Card Cail Plan. Let all pastors present the same to their churches as soon as possible after returning from Conference.

7. We recommend that the conference year for the current or outgoing pastor shall end immediately following the last Sunday of camp and that the church he is serving pay his salary until that time.

8. We recommend that the Conference President be paid \$60.00 per week (this to be paid weekly) plus house rent and utilities. Also, whenever it is necessary for him to move, that his moving bill be paid by the Conference. His travelling expense figured at 7 cents per mile be paid

on mileage in connection with Conference work. This shall be raised by the \$1.00 per member, and by the tithe of the preachers' cash salaries. These funds are to be sent by the Church Treasurer to the Conference Treasurer monthly. All accruing funds above the foregoing designation shall revert to Pioneer Evangelism Fund. We recommend that any church in it's first year be allowed to appeal to this fund for aid.

9. We recommend that any church not having a parsonage for their pastor pay the rent for, or buy or build a parsonage and also pay all utilities such as water, lights, fuel, and telephone.

10. We recommend that each active member of the local W.Y.P.S. pay \$1.00 annually on the General W.Y.P.S. Budget. (It is understood that this amount be paid by the local society.) We further recommend that no church budget be considered paid in full until this item is paid.

11. Each pastor's moving bill shall be paid by the contracting church.

12. Let all churches feel their obligation to give monthly donations to their pastors.

13. We recommend, in accordance with the action of the Board of Administration that all newly organized churches and organized missions be exempt from the General Budget the first two years; furthermore that they be exempt from the Conference Budget the first year and take free will offerings for Conference Budget the second year.

14. We recommend that 75 cents per member be raised throughout the Conference for the conference entertainment for the preachers, their families, and delegates.

15. We recommend that \$1.00 per member be paid for Pioneer Evangelism. Then, additionally, we recommend that the Sunday school offering of the first Sunday of each month shall accrue to Pioneer Evangelism and that each pastor and Sunday School Superintendent present this offering to their people each month. This offering is to be sent to the Conference Treasurer monthly.

16. We recommend that each member be assessed \$1.00 a year, this money to be placed in a fund known as the Camp Meeting Fund, the money to be used to help pay the expense on the Camp Meeting.

17. We recommend that a copy of the Report on Finance be typed and placed on the bulletin board in every church.

18. We recommend that the Sunday school of each church pay the amount due on the subscriptions to THE WESLEYAN MESSENGER.

19. We recommend that each member be assessed \$1.00 a year, this money to be placed in a fund known as the Conference Parsonage Fund.

PLAN OF WORK

I. Home Work

1. We recommend that each local society contribute liberally to the General Home Fund for the support of Special Missions (see back cover of Wesleyan Missionary) and Church Extension Work through the Home Mission Department.

2. We recommend that each local society contribute five dollars or more annually for the support of the Hephzibah Orphanage, the same to be applied on budget.

3. Thank-offering boxes are designed especially for Home Missions. Therefore, we recommend their use in raising Home Missionary funds.

4. We recommend that local societies inquire into the needs of the home mission stations and orphanage before sending used clothing and that no monetary value be placed on same; that such boxes be reported merely as to the number sent; that boxes of new merchandise be reported as to monetary value and that the sending society evaluate same, the voucher of evaluation signed by the missionary be forwarded to Conference Woman's Missionary Society Treasurer for proper receipting.

5. We recommend and urge each local society to respond to the Card Call Plan and thus assist in the extension program of the Church.

6. We recommend the observance of Educational Harvest Day with program and contributions of supplies and cash; the cash to apply on educational budget.

II. Foreign Work

We recommend:

1. That we continue to co-operate with the Foreign Missionary Secretary in the support of missionaries to the fields of Africa, India, South America, China, Japan, Haiti, and our entire foreign missionary program.
2. That we forward promptly all Sunday school charts, cards and flannelgraph material to our foreign mission fields, remembering to enclose the charts in their original pasteboard rolls.
3. That we contribute as the needs are presented toward the furnishings of the Missionary Home in Jersey City.
4. That we contribute as the needs are presented toward the Woman's Institute of Africa.

III. Medical Missions

We recommend:

That we continue medical work as heretofore for the foreign fields, viz:

1. That our local societies make bandages and that these be forwarded promptly to the Missionary Home, 32 Bergen Avenue, Jersey City, New Jersey, to await outgoing missionaries, the number of pounds to be reported with no value attached.
2. That each local society render an annual program at which time an offering shall be taken for the support of medical missions.
3. That each local society contribute three dollars or more annually to the Medical Student Fund, not to apply on budget.

IV. Literature

We recommend:

1. Since it is essential, in order to sustain active interest in missionary work, that every member read THE WESLEYAN MISSIONARY, and that a concerted effort be put forth to maintain the subscription list of 14,000 by faithfully submitting renewals as well as securing as many new subscriptions as possible. To accomplish this, let each Conference and Local Society elect an efficient magazine solicitor.
2. That we promote the Mission Study and Reading Course; the use of the Study Book designated each year with Program Calendars and other helps.
3. Since posters emphasize truth and tend to create missionary knowledge, zeal and activity, that such be prepared frequently for use in missionary meetings, conventions, and Annual Conferences.

DEVOTIONAL

We recommend:

1. That we carefully observe the Monthly Prayer requests in Wesleyan Missionary Magazine and other special requests as presented.

2. The observance of the Monthly Fast and Prayer Day and the designated Self-Denial Month.

3. The promotion of Prayer Partner Circles in each society; making use of new prayer partner reminders and that reports be sent to General Conference Prayer Partner Secretary before January 1st.

4. That stress be placed on Personal Evangelism with special emphasis upon the Jew.

VI. Local Church Work

We recommend:

1. That each local society raise \$1.00 per member after returning home from conference and send it immediately to Missionary Conference treasurer (Mrs. Martha Pierce, 1424 E. 8th St., Louisville, Ky.) to be applied on a caretakers cottage on the campground at Buechel, Ky.

2. That each society pay twenty-five cents per member to our conference treasurer as our offering for our conference president.

3. That the President's traveling expenses be paid from the conference treasury except those concurring out of the annual tour of the conference which are to be paid by the churches visited.

Standard of Efficiency for Local Society

We recommend:

1. That arrangements be made with the pastor for one missionary prayer meeting each month.

2. That a minimum of ten meetings be held during the year in which prayer is given prominent place and business is transacted (5%) and at least one public meeting (5%).

3. We recommend the formation of prayer partner circles in each society with a Prayer Partner Secretary to keep record of the same and report to the Conference Prayer Partner Secretary, to be sent at least sixty days after the setting of Annual Conference.

4. That the President, Secretary, Treasurer, and 25 per cent of the active membership be subscribers to THE WESLEYAN MISSIONARY.

5. That a Solicitor be elected for THE WESLEYAN MISSIONARY, gaining not less than two subscriptions a year.

6. That a Delegate be elected to the Annual Conference Woman's Missionary Society (5%), and that the Delegate be instructed by local society regarding the amount to be pledged by that society at the Annual Conference Session (3%).

7. That the dues \$1 per member be sent directly to the conference treasurer, 50% of which shall be divided by her as specified and applied on budget, (5%) credit; and that all monies and vouchers be sent to the conference treasurer at least quarterly. (5%)

8. That we secure every woman in the Church as a member of society, or bring about a ten per cent gain in total membership.

THE KENTUCKY CONFERENCE

9. That each local society pay annually an amount equal to 25¢ per active member to be used as a general administrative fund, not to apply on budget.

10. That the Efficiency Standard be read in the society at least once a year.

(Ten per cent credit shall be given for each of the above items, and all societies making a grade of eighty per cent shall be placed on the Honor Roll.)

VII. Standard of Efficiency for Y.M.W.B.

Let us emphasize the work of the Y.M.W.B. and take great care in training our children and encouraging our youth by interesting them in mission study. We urge that each band adopt the Standard of Efficiency.

1. Held twelve or more band services. The value of prayer, God's Work and personal service were stressed. 10%

2. Held one public service during the year. 10%

3. Send in band funds quarterly or oftener. 10%

4. Used mite boxes, envelopes, membership cards or some other systematic method for gathering in of dues and offerings. 10%

5. The Superintendent of the Band a reader of THE WESLEYAN MISSIONARY. 10%

6. Had an increase in membership. 5%

7. Had an increase in funds raised. 5%

8. Sent in an offering for Home Missions. 10%

9. Sent in an offering for Education. 10%

10. Sent one cent per member to Conference Superintendent as desk fund. (Does not count on annual report total.) 10%

11. Sent in the annual report on time. (That is, to Conference Superintendent two weeks before conference opens or at other time she may designate.) 10%

WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

We, the Committee on Ways and Means, wish to make the following recommendations:

1. Duties of Officers

A. The President shall have general oversight of the W.Y.P.S. Conference and seek to promote the Youth Program within the Conference.

1. He shall co-operate with the General and Area Youth Program of the Church.

2. He shall attend at least one District Rally in each district and if possible visit each local church in the interest of the Youth Program during the year.

3. The District Chairman and the local W.Y.P.S. President shall extend an invitation and the group requesting his services shall bear travelling expense at the rate of five (5) cents per mile.

B. The Vice-President shall co-operate with the President in every way possible and in case of absence, resignation, or death of the president, he shall perform the duties of the office.

C. The Secretary shall keep records of all proceedings of the Executive Council and shall attend all matters of correspondence for the Conference Society.

D. The Treasurer shall receive, and upon order of the Council, shall disburse all money of the Society and keep a systematic record of the same.

II. We recommend that the Lewisport work or some other point be the pioneer project to be continued under direction of the W.Y.P.S. Executive Council in co-operation with the Conference Committee on Pioneer Evangelism.

III. We recommend that a Conference Youth Camp be held on the Campground June 16-22, and that the plans for the same be left in the

hands of the W.Y.P.S. Executive Council, and that this camp be known as the Kentucky Conference Youth Camp.

IV. We recommend that our Annual W.Y.P.S. Convention convene during Youth Camp.

V. We recommend that each district have at least three rallies during the year and that one be a week-end rally.

VI. We recommend that we use our Young People in a variety of programs for these rallies rather than always securing an outside speaker.

VII. We recommend that each local society have one Missionary Service a month and that an offering be taken for Missions at this meeting.

VIII. We recommend that each local society have an Educational Service once a quarter and that an offering be taken for Education at this service.

IX. We recommend that the local Treasurer send in an Annual Report to the Conference Treasurer, Miss Rosemary Pommeroy, by June 5, and that all money received after this date be credited on the following year.

X. We recommend that the Executive Council appoint a Gospel Team to travel the conference in the interest of the Tabernacle-Dormitory building to be built on the campground.

XI. Finances:

1. We recommend that each Society raise the amount of fifty (50) cents per active member for the General W.Y.P.S. Program and that those churches not having an organized society take an offering for the General Youth Program.

2. We recommend that each society raise the amount of fifty (50) cents per active member for the Conference Expense Fund.

3. We recommend that the Area Assessment be paid out of the Conference Expense Fund.

4. We recommend that each society raise the amount of fifty (50) cents per active member for Pioneer Evangelism to be used for our pioneer project and that this be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer during the month of September.

5. We recommend that each society raise the amount of fifty (50) cents per active member for the Youth Camp Fund.

6. We recommend that each society take a special offering for the Youth Camp Fund May 25, 1952.

7. We recommend that \$10.00 be raised in each Louisville District Rally and \$5.00 in each Rally of the other districts for Pioneer Evan-

gelism, the same to be forwarded to the Conference W.Y.P.S. Treasurer quarterly.

8. We recommend that every second Sunday of the month an offering be taken to establish a fund for youth buildings on the campground.

9. We recommend that all desk fund be paid out of the Conference Expense Fund.

10. We recommend that the \$15.00 voted by the Conference as the young people's assessment to help subsidize the Conference Messenger be paid from the Conference Expense Fund.

12. We recommend that the Executive Council shall have power to appropriate money from the Conference Fund for the general promotion of Youth Work.

13. We recommend that all money be forwarded quarterly to the Conference W.Y.P.S. Treasurer and that the Treasurer's books close June 5.
