STANDING RULES OF THE ILLINOIS CONFERENCE OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH OF AMERICA

I. Conference President. Resolved, 1) that the Conference President be required, authorized and appointed to travel the Conference as President, having general supervision of the spiritual interests and benevolences thereof, holding at least one service at each church during the year under such date as he may announce in advance;

2) That he shall raise funds to meet the demands of the Conference work, assisted by the pastors, and he shall receive contributions for church extension, education and Superannuated Ministers, where there work,

are no pastors;

3) That he shall have general supervision of the church property, and shall inquire into the titles of the same to see that no property, and shall inquire into the titles of the same to see that no property is loosely held, and shall look after the rental of Conference property, and see that the rent is turned into the treasury, and he shall investigate the possibility and feasibility of the sale of property not in use, and report his findings to the Board of Trustees and to the next

annual conference;

h) That he shall be authorized to grant letters to disbanded classes;

5) That he shall be required to write non-resident members of Con-

ference asking them, in case they cannot attend, to write the conference a letter of greeting and state the condition of their religious

experience;

6) That he shall devote as much time as possible and as occasion

may afford in evangelistic and other meetings in the Conference;

7) That he may engage such help from time to time as may be available, and as he may consider properly qualified to assist in holding evangelistic and quarterly meetings, such help to be remunerated from the Conference Church Extension Fund;

8) That he shall represent the Conference at the annual conventions of the National Holiness Association and the National Association of

- Paragolicals, or appoint an alternate;

 9) That his name shall be placed in nomination for the office of first ministerial delegate to General Conference and for Illinois nominee to the Local Board of Trustees of Marion College.
- II. Trustees. 1) Authorization. Resolved, that the duly-elected and qualified Trustees of the Illinois Conference are hereby authorized and directed to sign for the purchase, sale, mortgaging and conveyance of real estate recommended by the Annual Conference, or, during the interim between the sessions of Annual Conference, by the Conference Board of Church Extension, which is the Board of Managers of the Illinois Conference. All such action or actions of the Trustees in compliance with the recommendations of the Conference Board of Church Extension shall be deemed to be legal and binding upon the Illinois Conference, and of as full force and effect as they would have been if such actions on the part of the Trustees had been specially authorized by the Annual Conference.
- 2) Organization. The Conference President, by wirtue of his office and supervisory duties, shall be a member of this Board and its president.
- 3) Annual Report. Resolved, that the Trustees present to Conference an annual report of official acts and of assets and liabilities of the Illinois Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, an Illinois corporation.
- III. Board of Managers (Conference Board of Church Extension). 1) Membership. Resolved, (a) that the Illinois Conference Board of Church Extension be composed of nine members, five of which shall be ministers and four laymen; that in said number the Conference Trustees shall be included as members ex-officio; (b) that the Conference President shall be the chairman of this board.
- 2) Duties. Resolved, (a) That the Conference Board of Church Extension shall be the Board of Managers of the Illinois Conference; (b) That the Conference Board of Church Extension is hereby authorized to pay out all monies from the Conference Church Extension Fund, and during the interim between Conference sessions to act as a Committee on Finance; (c) That the Conference Board of Church Extension act as the Conference Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location.

IV. Annual Conference. 1) Date. Resolved, that the annual conference session begin on the <u>first</u> Thursday <u>after</u> July 27, at 1:30 p.m., and close the following Saturday night; that Camp Meeting begin on the following Sunday and continue for eight days, including two Sundays.

2) Fiscal Year, Resolved that the Conference Fiscal Year close July 15th that each level church fiscal Year close July 20th

July 15th; that each local church fiscal year close June 30th.

3) Budget Items. Resolved, that all Treasurers shall mark receipts "Budget" or "Mot Budget."

h) Committee on Statistics. Resolved, that a Standing Committee on Statistics be elected, consisting of the Conference Statistical Secretary, the Conference Treasurer, two other ministerial and one lay member; that two lay members be elected at the opening of annual conference.

5) Statistical Report. Resolved, that no remittances postmarked later than July 5th shall apply on the church statistical report; that by July 15th each paster shall submit to the chairman of the Statistical

Committee his budget check sheet with receipts covering same, and his statistical blank completed except for the budget section; that the Committee fill in on the statistical blanks the budget items, both assigned and raised; that other items which are obviously incorrect be checked with the pastor.

6) Audit. Resolved, that a competent auditor shall be appointed each year by the Committee on Finance to audit the books of the Conference.

7) Sunday Schools. Resolved, that each additional Sunday School under the pastoral oversight of a Wesleyan Methodist pastor shall be reported on a separate annual statistical report blank, provided each Sunday School has been recognized by the Conference Board of Church Extension.

8) Board of Superannuate Ministers! Aid. Resolved, that the Board of Superannuate Ministers! Aid be composed of three members, each elected

by the Conference for a three year term of office, the terms to expire

in successive years.

9) Orders of the Day Committee. Resolved, that the President, Vice President and Secretary of the Conference shall constitute the Orders of the Day Committee.

10) Leave. Resolved, that no member shall leave Conference session without permission of the President; that no ministerial member shall without special permission leave Camp after the annual meetings until all responsibilities of the Conference are discharged, including camp clean-up.

11) Place of Meeting. Resolved, that the Camp Meeting Committee shall determine the place of meeting of each Conference session.

12) Conference Officers. Resolved, that the officers be installed during annual conference at a public service announced in advance; office to take effect at the rise of conference.

13) Minutes. Resolved, (a) That the Conference President and Secretary constitute a committee to edit and publish the Annual Conference minutes in accordance with General Conference regulations, any deviation from same to be with the consent of the Conference Board of Managers; (b) That the cost of printing the Annual Conference minutes be paid out of the Conference Fund; (c) That the total number of minutes to be printed be ascertained on the basis of family units among the membership and active constituency, who shall each be mailed a copy.

1h) N. H. A. and N. A. E. Resolved, that the Illinois Conference maintain a membership in the National Holiness Association and the National

Association of Evangelicals.

15) Committee on Gredentials. Resolved, that the Secretary of Annual Conference be the Committee on delegate credentials. Delegate's oredentials shall be certified to the Committee by the presiding officer

of the quarterly conference making the election.

16) Method of Voting. Resolved, that in the election of Conference officers and committees not required to be elected by ballot it be our method, when more than one nomination is made from the floor, to vote affirmatively on each successive name by show of hands, each vote to be tallied by the Secretary, election to be effected by a majority of total votes cast.

17) Conference Sunday School Committee. Resolved, that the Conference C.Y.C. Director shall be an ex-officio member of the Conference Sunday School Committee.

18) Committee on Itineracy and Orders. Resolved, that the Committee on Itineracy and Orders appoint the preacher and alternate preacher to deliver the Conference Sermon each year.

- 19) Unfinished Business. Resolved, that any unfinished business of an annual Conference Session be left in the hands of the Board of Managers with power to act.
- V. Camp Meeting, 1) Authorization. Resolved, that there be held an annual Camp Meeting and that it be under the direction of a Camp Meeting Committee. The Committee shall include the Conference President, as chairman, the Conference W. Y. President, the Conference W.M.S. President, and five other members elected by the Illinois Conference

in session. The Camp Manager, as appointed by the Illinois Comference in session. The Camp Manager, as appointed by the Camp Meeting Committee, shall be a member of the Committee ex-officio.

2) Committee Duties. Resolved, (a) That camp grounds and buildings be under the care of the Camp Meeting Committee; (b) That the Camp Meeting Committee have charge of the Camp Meeting Fund and appoint a treasurer to receive all monies and make all authorized disbursements

from the same; (c) The the Camp Meeting Committee shall have power to engage workers beyond the present year.

3) Camp Meeting Fund. Resolved, (a) That all pledges and cash received during the sessions of Conference and Camp Meeting be placed in the Camp Meeting Fund unless otherwise designated; (b) That the incidental expenses of the Annual Conference while in session be paid from the Camp Meeting Fund

the Camp Meeting Fund.

- 4) vi. Ministers. 1) Pastoral Service Report. Resolved, that each pastor of the Illinois Conference shall report to his quarterly conference each quarter the total of his home calls, hospital calls, pastoral conferences and church business calls, and that the total of these items be reported to Annual Conference and be included in the annual statistics.
- 2) Pastors' Support During Conference. Resolved, that it be our plan that all pastors remain on their charges for one Sunday after Annual Conference and Camp Meeting and that the church's financial obligation to the pastor, whether he be leaving the field or not, be extended

through that Sunday.

3) Moving Pastors. Resolved, that each charge make provisions for the moving expenses of the incoming pastor immediately after the Annual

Conference adjourns.

- 4) Illness or Death. Resolved, that the Conference President be notified by the local church clerk in case of critical illness or death in a minister's home, and that the President shall send cards at once to the other ministers.
- 5) Minister's Vacation. Resolved, that the Conference President and all pastors be given a two-weeks vacation with pay, including two

Sundays.

- 6) Ministerial Convention. Resolved, that there be held a Ministerial Convention from the third Tuesday evening to the following Thursday afternoon of February each year. Resolved further that the place of meeting and the program presented be left in the hands of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.
- 7) Minister's Retirement Provision. Resolved, that it shall be the duty of each pastor to maintain membership in Federal Old Age Benefit (Social Security) or some other equivalent retirement income plan.
- VII. <u>Miscellaneous</u>. 1) <u>Conference Paper</u>. Resolved, that the Conference publish a monthly paper called "The Illinois Tidings"; that the Conference President shall be designated Editor-in-Chief, and that the heads of the Conference auxiliary organizations be designated contri-

buting editors.
2) Conference Prayer Interests. Resolved, that the information concerning coming revival meetings and other special prayer needs be pub-

lished in the conference paper.

3) Expenses of Conference Officers. Resolved, that all incidental expenses of all Conference Officers, Committees, Official Boards and helpers shall be paid by the Conference Treasurer when approved by the President.

JOURNAL OF PROCEEDINGS

First Meeting, 1:30 P.M., Thursday, July 30, 1964.

- 1. Opening. The fifteenth annual session of the Illinois Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America was convened in the main tabernacle at Epworth Park Camp Ground (Free Methodist), near Belvidere, Illinois, at 1:30 p.m., CDT, July 30, 1964, by Rev. Arthur L. Bray, President of the Conference. Members of the Annual Conference and the W.M.S. Conference who joined us for the opening devotional period, sang the old traditional Methodist conference hymn, "And Are We Yet Alive, and See Each Others Face?". Prayer was offered by Rev. Thomas Bailie, superannuated Elder, supplying the Chicago Roseland Church.
- 2. Communion Service. Rev. Bray offered opening meditations, and was assisted in the Communion Service by Pastors Forrest J. Gearhart and Roy E. Crawford. The theme of the communion service was the bond of our spiritual equality before God. In harmony with this emphasis, ministers and laymen joined together about the Lord's Table commemorating Christ's sacrifice.
- 3. Conference Sermon. The Conference sermon was brought by Rev. Meredith J. Bailie, pastor of the Galesburg Church, who based his sermon's on the marrative about Stephen in Acts 6 and 7. The essence of the message was that a vision of Christ convicts men of sin, gives a right concept of sin and gives purpose to our life and ministry.
- 4. Opening of the Business Session. After a brief recess, the Conference President, Rev. A. L. Bray, called the meeting to order for business.
- 5. Roll Call of Elders. Seventeen Elders were present to answer the first roll call. (See Record of Attendance).
- 6. Bar of Conference. The first eight rows in the center section of the tabernacle were declared the bar of conference, and the Elders were seated within the bar.
- 7. Partial Report of Official Acts of Conference President. Conference President Bray reported transferring Elder W. D. Craker to Virginia Conference and receiving Elder Orland L. Johnson from the Dakota Conference. By vote this was approved. (See Presidents Report No. 4).
- 8. Conference Preachers Eligible to Vote. A partial report of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders was approved, which declared that the following Conference Preachers were eligible to vote: Rev. George Hood and Rev. Clarence C. McCarty. (See Report No. 1)
- 9. Report Concerning Lay Delegates Eligible to Vote. The Secretary as the Committee on Credentials read the list of lay delegates eligible to vote, who were then seated within the bar of conference by prevailing motion. (See Record of Attendance.)

Report No. 4

Conference President

Beloved Brethren: When John Wesley and his preachers met for annual conference they sang: "And are we yet alive and see each other's face? Glory and praise to Jesus give, for His redeeming grace. What troubles have we seen, what conflicts have we passed, fightings without and fears within since we assembled last. But out of all, the Lord hath brought us by His love. And still He doth His help afford and hides our life above." For years we have opened Conference with this fitting hymn of Charles Wesley. Never have we sung it more fervently than at opening of this our Fifteenth Conference Session in the heartland of America.

State of the Conference. This year marked the dedication of five church buildings in five months--Galesburg, Creve Coeur, Broadview, Oak Lawn, Elk Grove Village--culminating in three of them long periods of physical labor and in the other two stremuous financial appeals. The price of pioneering with severely limited resources in people and finance is high, but it must be done. God has given us a brave band of pastors, parsonage ladies and sacrificial laymen who are steadily moving forward in the face of Satanic opposition to our message of heart holiness and separation from the evil of the world.

Statistics: Our statistical report indicates that we have made slight gains in church and Sunday School memberships: Full members from 527 to 539, total membership from 760 to 768, total Sunday School roll from 1955 to 1968, main School from 1816 to 1814, average attendance from 1274 to 1334. Considering the constant drain from members moving, in an urban culture, these statistics are encouraging. However, more of our constituency need to accept the price and privilege of full membership

with its implications of spiritual commitment.

Property Holdings: With the completion of the five new sanctuary buildroperty notatings: with the completion of the live law sanctury buildings mentioned above we have passed the million dollar mark in holdings! From \$1\psi_1,100 just 15 years ago we now own \$1,136,500 in church and parsonage properties, a gain of \$199,000 over last year. Debt increase of \$195,613 to a total of \$461,749 reflects largely the cost of the large Oak Lawn and Broadview church buildings. This almost doubling of indebtedness in one year would be serious were it not underwritten by fin-ancially strong congregations led by pastors with proven records for fin-ancial leadership. In addition, Oak Lawn's \$110,000 mortgage is back-stopped with a reserve fund of \$10,000 invested with Wesleyan Investment Foundation. The debt level stands at \$1% of our holdings. We had to have these new buildings -- now we must face the task of paying for them with

faithful and sacrificial giving.

Finances: Proof of our readiness to meet the above demands is our total of \$266,673 raised this year, \$61,392 more than last year. Thus our debt is less than two-year's income. Our per capita giving is \$495.00, double the Denominational rate. Debt reduction was \$21,505 which with \$17,610 paid on interest totals \$39,115 in payments made, not including Conference and Denominational payments made on indebtedness.

Personal Service: Travel on behalf of the Conference totalled 13,517 miles (including travel to supply the Princeton church for five months) of which only 8,914 was charged to the Conference. Denominational and

evangelistic labors travel was 10,240 (about 8,000 by airplane or train). Total travel, 23,757 miles...Letters written 432... 900 calls, Office and telephone counselling times...ILLINOIS TIDINGS issued in August, October. May and July totalling 1960 separate pieces of mail.

34 Quarterly Meetings were held... four Board of Managers meetings, three Camp Committee meetings, two Youth Council meetings attended... two revival meetings and two week-end meetings, including a five service youth convention for our Reformed Baptist brethren in New Brunswick...one Hephzibah Orphanage board meeting, three Marion College board meetings and two Development Committee meetings. I served on the Chicago Bible Society board, the N. A. E. Chicago convention hotel committee. Much time has been spent in successfully securing tax exemotion for our new church and parsonage properties, effecting a savings of hundreds of dollars of the Lord's money. Special thanks is given the Chicago-Austin church for providing one-half the Conference President's housing and also for Denominational aid given.

In spite of the constant burden of pioneer church problems it has been a high honor and privilege to serve Christ, the Denominations and the Conference for the 13th year on the administrative level. God's grace and your love and patience have sufficed for every circumstance.

Official Acts.

- 1) As chairman of the Conference Board of Managers (Board of Church Extension) and as President of the Board of Trustees of the Illinois Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, an Illinois corporation, I helped promote our pioneer and extablished church building projects by counsel and by taking title in the name of the Conference. I have sought and obtained necessary loans, executing the legal documents necessary to such loans, along with Mr. William F. Tice, Secretary of the Conference Board of Trustees. (See Conference Trustees' Report No. 5 for the full record.)
- 2) As President of the Illinois Conference I certified our theological students and draft age assistant pastors to their several draft boards
- as legally qualifying for proper exemption.

 3) Throughout the year I have ordered payment of all bills owed by the Conference using a requisition form to the Conference Treasurer in each instance.
- 4) I sought and obtained tax exemption for the new Broadview church property, the Elk Grove Village parsonage, two parcels of the Oak Lawn church property and the new Princeton parsonage. A change in the Illinois law effective this year requires that the President register the tax exemption status of each parcel of land owned by the Conference every year in order to maintain exemption. This will mean 35 or more forms filed each year from now on. More exemptions must be filed for properties newly acquired, with six documents being filed for each appeal.
- 5) August 5, 1963. Received as Conference Preacher and appointed P. Douglas Kindschi as assistant pastor at Oak Lawn. Later in the fall he
- Douglas Aindschi as assistant pastor at tak hawn. Dater in the lail he resigned this position feeling he must devote more time to his graduate studies at the University of Chicago.

 6) August 10, 1963. Approved Plan of Work and the slate of officers elected by the 1963 Wesleyan Youth Conference which meets annually the week after our Annual Conference session adjourns.

Report No. 5

Conference Trustees

The Board of Trusees took the following actions during the year 1963-1964:

1) August 31, 1963. In behalf of Princeton, purchased the house next door south of the church for \$12,300.

2) September 9, 1963. In behalf of Princeton, resolved (a) to borrow for sixty (60) days, \$2,500, at 6% simple interest from First National Bank of Wyanet, to finance down payment; (b) to borrow from Wesleyan Investment Foundation \$10,000, for 120 days at 6% interest, and to execute WIF promissory note No. 223 to cover same; (c) to sell the former parsonage at 303 South Pleasant Street for \$12,500., or more, to cover repayment of the above obligations; and (d) to borrow \$10,961.14 from Dorothy Powers Mercer, Harold L. Powers, Mary J. Powers, and Edward Mercer to pay off a loan of identical amount now owing same persons; new loan to rowers mercer, harold L. Powers, Mary J. Powers, and Edwarn Mercer to pay off a loan of identical amount now owing same persons; new loan to be secured by a trust deed on the new parsonage, with a promissory note bearing interest at 5% payable October 9 and April 9 of each year and due in full, unless renewed, October 9, 1968, and with principal payments in units of \$100.00 or more, on each interest date.

3) November 2, 1963. In behalf of Broadview, approved action of Broadview church in borrowing \$1,000, from Mr. C. J. Ewing of Maywood, and issued conference note (No. 69) dated September 6, 1963. Granted another \$500.00 loan from Conference Loan Fund, (Ewing money) Note No. 75. Funds to cover incidental building costs.

4) November 2, 1963. In behalf of Oak Lawn, authorized interim loan of \$10,000. with interest at 5% per annum, secured by trust deed on first mortgage on the "old" church, with the understanding that this will

be paid off in full upon sale of the church. (This loan was not consummated due to the sale of the church which provided needed funds.)

5) November 2, 1963. On behalf of Rockford First, approved their project PLEAD (Planned, Long-range Expansion And Development). Locally financed, this project covers the purchase, by annual installments due each January 1, of a two-acre tract of ground for future church and parsonage use, at the NW corner of Central Avenue and Riverside Blvd. Cost \$7,000., plus interest at 54% on upsid belance.

6) December 8, 1963. In behalf of Calesburg, renewed promissory note to Kenneth Nelson, in the amount of \$3,500., due December 8, 1964, and carrying interest at 6% per annum (Comference note No. 73).

14) June 1, 1964. In behalf of Noline project, executed one year promissory note, No. 236, with WIF for \$2,000, to provide for Item 12.

15. June 24, 1964. In behalf of Oak Lawn, sold vacant lot acquired in the sale of the "old" church to Garden School Benefactors, a corporation in the Village of Oak Lawn, for \$6,000.

16. July 6, 1964. In behalf of Princeton, renewed WIF note No. 223 (see Item 7). New expiration date January 6, 1965.

Tithing Secretary

This year our conference has continued to prosper as the result of blessings from the Lord. One important factor is that the constituency of the conference promote and practice scriptural stewardship and tithing.

During the year of the 539 full members recorded in our conference churches, 431 members are listed as tithers. This represents 80% of our full membership. Report No. 11

Conference Board of Managers (Board of Church Extension)

We, the members of the Board of Managers which is also the Board of Church Extension, composed of the Conference Board of Trustees and two other ministers and two other laymen, report as follows:

two other ministers and two other laymen, report as follows:
As the Board of Managers of the Illinois Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, we met officially on August 10, and November 2, 1963 and February 1 and May 2, 1964, to consider the state of all the churches and to plan for the extension of the Illinois Conference. Out of the full record of decision made, the Minutes of which are open for your full inspection (see Mr. William F. Tice, Secretary) we report the following summary of actions as they effect our extension efforts:

WHEATON. Denominational aid in the amount of \$100 a month on the \$450 a month obligations was sought and granted. The Wheaton folk under the inspiring leadership of Pastor F. J. Gearhart have met all their other obligations in addition to the full-time support of their pastor and have paid off \$5,005 worth of indebtedness besides. This was greatly aided by a dedicated and anonymous layman who gave \$3,000 for debt reduction. Gearharts with their family of six continue to live in one end of their parsonage and hold church in the balance of the building. This condition and increasing attendance makes it imperative that a sanctuary be built. Pray that this will be the year of breakthrough in this area.

ROCKFORD-HARRISON AVENUE. Our beloved pioneers, Pastor and Mrs. Mygard and their faithful laymen are laying strong foundations for an effective community ministry. In the Pauline tradition the Nygards are largely supporting themselves-she by teaching last year and he by teaching the coming year, in order that the approximately \$240 a month payments of the church site and parsonage-chapel may be met. Some aid has been granted by the Board to meet specific needs. A sanctuary is envisioned within the next two years. Your prayers are solicited for the consumation of this desired goal.

ELK GROVE VILLAGE. The completed Kimbel-Wildwood contemporary design sanctuary was dedicated April 21, 1964 with great rejoicing over the culmination of a long, hard "do-it-yourself" building project. Pastor David Crail continues to teach school in order that the church income may meet the approximately \$550 a month property payments. \$50 a month denominational aid was sought by the Board and granted. Fervent prayer is requested that strength in members and finances may increase in order that the pastor may be supported by the church and give himself to its development.

CREVE COEUR. Pastor Arlyn Jones and his people dedicated their brick colonial sanctuary on November 3, 1963 culminating a long struggle of volunteer labor in which the pastor gave several thousand hours of labor. \$100 a month denominational aid was sought and granted to help por. \$100 a month denominational aid was sought and granted to help meet the approximately \$300 a month property and furniture payments. A discouraging loss of key members and finance has forced the pastor to obtain a teaching position for this coming year in order to see that property payments are made. Your fervent prayer support is solicited that God will give victory in this strategic place.

GALESBURG. Pastor Meredith J. Bailie and his people dedicated their Kimbel-Wildwood contemporary sanctuary on November 10, 1963 with great rejoicing. The church is moving forward under Fastor Bailie's leadership. The church is supporting him full-time and is meeting the mortage payments on the church and parsonage without outside help. They

gage payments on the church and parsonage without outside help. The thus pass from the oversight of the Board of Church Extension. Con-

OAK LAWN under the leadership of Pastor Robert L. Zuhl dedicated their new \$160,000 sanctuary on January 12, 1964. BROADVIEW led by Pastor Robert Klatt dedicated their \$125,000 colonial sanctuary on December 1, 1963. These are both strong self supporting churches, but we include them in this report because of these outstanding building advancements. As mentioned in the President's report, their indebtedness almost doubles the Conference debt load. We are trusting God that this additional load will be quickly liquidated by sacrifical giving.

HERITAGE, MOLINE is our new pioneer project for the coming year, launched in recent months by Rev. Roy M. Gibbs and his dedicated family. As pastor of Wyanet, Brother Gibbs became burdened for the 330,000 Quadcity area of Davenport (Iowa), Rock Island, Moline and East Moline, Illinois. The large colonial development, Heritage, on the south side of Moline on the north bank of the Rock River claimed his attention. After surveying the area he appealed to the Board of Managers on May 2 for permission to launch the work. Permission was granted. A loan of \$2,000 was secured from Wesleyan Investment Foundation. A house in the development at 1409 51st Street, Moline, Ill., has been purchased and the Gibbs have moved there. Pastor and Mrs. Gibbs have secured teaching positions mext year and the basement of their house has been tiled and placed in readiness for prayer and Bible study groups. Permission has also been secured from the developers to hold Sunday morning services in the community building. Several fine families have expressed interest in attending services when they begin September 20the date that envisions completion of the community building. A one and one-half acre site in the development has been promised for purchase at a cost of approximately \$12,000. This money is not in sight nor are funds available to build the first unit building. We will probably have to borrow again and trust God for a people to be raised up to meet the financial needs of this outreach. Thank God for dedicated servants of the Cross who count not their lives dear unto them-

selves that the gospel might be proclaimed in a dark age; CHICAGO-HOYNE AVENUE, our inner city church has been aided \$75 a month by our paying their property mortgage. Shifting population has made necessary this aid. However, this is not church extension and

we must seek another way of meeting this need.
PRINCETON. Several hundred dollars in interest on an interim loan on the old parsonage to finance the purchase of a new one next door to the church, has been granted to Princeton. When the old parsonage is sold this interim loan will largely be retired. However, it has remained unsold for 11 months. Pray that this problem will be solved.

INCIDENTAL AID. Aid has been granted on an incidental level to meet areas of need of our churches. See financial breakdown attached. Rockford First was granted \$300 aid to help in moving their new pastor and to give him interim support between the Dakota Conference session and our session.

Robert L. Zuhl, pastor of Oak Lawn and for ten years Conference W. Y. President, is our engaged Youth Evangelist. A full schedule of youth classes and activities is set up under the direction of W. Y. President, Rev. George Hood, pastor of Chicago-Hoyne Ave...

A group of dedicated ladies of our Conference are conducting children's classes and activities. Rev. Carl E. Clander is director of Jun-

ior Youth.

Hall Manager Stanley A. Hill and Refreshment Stand Manager Roy M. Gibbs have everything in readiness for Camp. We thank them and all our volunteer workers for their laborers. Our efficient cooks are Mrs. Laura Zehner, the Free Methodist camp cook and our own Mrs. Kay Dyer.

We report that the raising of our camp fee to \$12.00 for 8 days last year did not cut down our attendance as was feared. Instead, attendance

Our Free Methodist brethren have offered us an identical one for another five year period at a rental of \$610.00 a year, with an additional charge of \$90 when the new Missionary tabernacle-office--conference room building is completed; hopefully in time for next Conference session. It will be located just east of this building. It appears to be wise for us to renew it because our financial ability to acquire our own grounds is limited.

The Free Methodists have granted us permission to erect motel type buildings on the grounds but have denied our petition to build separate cottages. It would be wise to give your committee power to act in regard to the matter of financing and erecting motel-type buildings because our housing shortage is becoming accute. If we should move to another camp grounds the building would be sold to the Free Methodists.

Report No. 15

Member Local Board of Trustees of Marion College

As your representative on the Local Board of Trustees of Marion College, Marion, Indiana, our denomination area college, I attended Trustees meetings on October , 1963 and January 14, 15 and June 1, 1964. At these meetings the finances of the college were reviewed, budgets were set up for the new year, staff and faculty were employed and the advancement program implemented.

At the January meeting, Rev. Woodrow I. Goodman was elected President of Marion College for his second four year term. The Board took this action noting the outstanding advancements the college has made under

his administration the past four years.

I also attended Development Council meetings last September and on April 25, 1964 where members of the faculty, representatives of the student body, college trustees, the President and chief administrators sat down to conferm together with representatives of the community as to the best methods of promoting the college. Out of these deliberations and trustees' action a half million advancement program was formulated asking the community for \$250,000 and the church constituency for \$250,000 over the next five years for the building of a new \$250,000 library building and further campus development. Already the community campaign has gone over the \$125,000 mark. When Dr. Goodman speaks on Saturday, August 8, at the 1;30 p.m., Conference Educational Service he will give us the latest report on the cash and pledges received.

A block of homes across from the Administration building is being purchased; the houses will be wrecked or moved depending on their condition. The new library will be erected in this new area which will connect the northern and southern portions of the campus. Your representative is a member of the library building committee and attended a preliminary planning session on June 11. Basic decisions were approved indicating the library will be a two story building with a basement elevated four feet out of the ground and fully finished for visual aid viewing and other needed areas. An elevator with outside ground level entrance will make possible serving handicapped students and community people. It will also be adjacent to the dock area for carrying book shipments to the upper floors.

Student enrollment was approximately 475 this year, a modest gain over a year ago. However this is encouraging because entrance requirements are being strengthened. We are still admitting Wesleyan students on probation for one semester whose High School grades do not meet entrance requirements, in order to continue to serve our constituency which includes those drawn from disadvantaged elements of our national

social structure.

Attendance at summer school was lill in the first session and 107 in the second. The total is above the summer of 1963.

Business Manager Russell Baldwin continues to manage to operate in

Business Manager Russell Baldwin continues to manage to operate in the black although with stringent economies. Additional income is greatly needed to repay borrowings at Marion banks caused by using operating monies in previous years for capital improvements. We trust the Advancement Program will meet some of this need.

President Umbeck of Knox College of Galasburg is the North Central advisor for our accreditment program. He invited President Goodman, Dean Burns and Business Manager Baldwin to attend a seminar at Knox College this spring to acquire information and skills to forward our advance to full accreditation. The self study and application brochure is being prepared for presentation to North Central this coming spring of 1965. We are hoping for a favorable response to our application.

Your continued financial, student recruitment and prayer support is solicited on behalf of our fine area college--the school that "puts first things first"!

Board of Superanmuate Minister's Aid

Your Pension Committee reports that Mr. S. Hugh Paine of Houghton, New York, has received during the year the balance of assessments due under the former operation of the Pension Plan from most of the churches. Those who did not pay their assessments created a deficit in excess of one hundred dollars which Mr. Paine has paid personally. He has closed out the account with all former budget and pasters' assessments paid in full to denominational headquarters, thus safeguarding the service credit of each minister to the cut-off date of last Conference time, as legislated by the 1963 General Conference. Mr. Faine requests that delinquent payments still be made, not to him, but to the Conference Fund of this Conference, as a gift from him to our Conference Fund. It should be remitted to Rev. John Friske, Conference Treasurer, 2310 S. 11th Avenue, Broadview, Illinois.

We also report that all the ministers of our Conference have complied with Standing Rule VI, item 7, requiring each minister to maintain membership in Federal Old Age Benefit (Social Security) or some other equivalent retirement income plan, except....for four brethren (who have agreed to meet these requirements as social as possible.)

We report that Oak Lawn, Oak Park, Wheaton, Rockford First have complied with the recommendation of last Conference to pay one-half of the Pastors Social Security costs and recommend that all our churches plan by setting aside a weekly amount to meet this need next April.

We report that our churches have paid in full the \$3.50 Pension Budget assessment this year, except for four churches. One has promised to make up this deficit. We recommend that the pastors of the other churches receive a special offering for this need after Conference, pointing out to their people that our beloved pensioners, Rev. and Mrs. Thomas Bailie, will have their pension allotment cut this coming year because of this shortage, unless it is paid in full by the Conference.

Some distress has been expressed because the Pension Plan will pay forty cents on the dollar to those who wish to withdraw their ministerial assessments from the Plan. May we point out that there is no need to withdraw and suffer this loss. If the money is left in it will pay the highest dividends of any financial investment anywhere. Even though the amount is small the payments on retirement will be many times the amount invested. Furthermore, most of our Illinois pastors assessments were paid by the churches as part of the budget and the pastors have made no personal contribution and have nothing to lose by leaving the money in the plan.

lose by leaving the money in the plan.

According to last Conference action this committee continues to exist to handle withdrawals (if insisted upon), retirements and certifications of the same which will be required by the denomination. (See Report No. 26 for final report of S. H. Paine, Pension Treasurer.)

Report No. 17

Committee on the Growth of the Church

We, the Committee on the Growth of the Church, recognize the Holy Spirit as the "Church Builder" --"But you shall receive power -- ability, efficiency and might -- when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you shall be My witnesses in Jerusalem and all Judea and Samaria and to the ends -- the very bounds -- of the serth" (Acts 1:8 Amplified New Testament). "And they were all filled -- diffused throughout their souls -- with the Holy Spirit..." (Acts 2:4 Amplified N.T.). "... and the Lord kept adding (to their number) daily those who were being saved (from spiritual death)" (Acts 2:47b Amplified N.T.). Therefore, we acknowledge the utter necessity for those of "The Way" of the Spirit-filled life maintained by a consistent prayer life and intensive study of the Holy Scriptures. Herein is the basis of growth in the Church -- spiritually, numerically and financially. In addition, we recommend:

ion, we recommend:

1) That a greater emphasis be given to the ministry of the laity in the area of evangelism. The Committee feels this ministry is, as it has always intended to be, one of the main avenues for reaching the lost and building the Church. A vigorous program of cultivating interest in others, getting well acquainted with newcomers in the church

and a house-to-house visitation program be put into effect.

2) That on the part of our pastors, there be a re-evaluation of the pulpit ministry as to the responsibility for instructing lay members in the methods and techniques of personal evangelism. The Committee feels there are many fine published materials available on the subject. We further strongly recommend the ministry of Mr. Nate Krupp, Director of Lay Evangelism, Inc., Wheaton, Illinois, in the churches of the Conference.

We are challenged by such statistics as set forth by Dr. Roland Q. Leavell; in round percentages he presents the status of the christian

church:

20 percent never pray 25 percent never read their Bible 30 percent never attend church 40 percent never give to any cause 50 percent never go to Sunday School 60 percent never attend evening services 70 percent never give to missions 80 percent never go to prayer meeting 90 percent never have family worship 95 percent never win a soul to Christ

3) That a study be undertaken by each congregation regarding its attitudes and policies toward people of other races in the light of the Scriptures.

4) That the membership of the church be made aware of their respon-

sibility in the area of financial stewardship.

5) That the pastors give more attention to the receiving of qualified persons into the membership of the church.

6) That interest in foreign missions be promoted by one or more

missionary conventions conducted in the local church or in co-operation with other local churches of the Conference each year.

7) That every opportunity for Church Extension be vigorously pursued

in our Conference.

8) That our churches be encouraged to consider the possibilities of

ministry in the public institutions of their area.
We feel the above recommendations are essential in order to strengthen our present advances in church growth under the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

.15 per member in main school General Sunday School Dues: Conference Sunday School Dues:

IV. President's Support and Expense.

- A. Three per cent of the gross income of each church, less expenditures for building and benevolence (as indicated in the statistical report of that church for the previous year) shall be paid into the Conference Administrative Fund. (In case a church does not remit the above monthly, the pastor of that church is authorized to send in the tithe of his cash church salary, to the Conference Treasurer for Conference
 Administrative Support. In addition, he may prayerfully consider remitting one-half of the tithe from any secular income.)
 B. The Conference President's salary shall be \$100.00 per week
- to be paid out of the Conference Administrative Fund.
 C. The Conference President's incidental expenses, and auto travel allowance at the rate of seven cents per mile shall be paid
- from the Conference Fund.

 D. One half the Social Security and the full hospitalization assessments for the Conference President, as well as \$30.00 per month for parsonage fuel and utilities, shall be paid from the Conference Fund.
- E. The Conference President has undertaken to provide his own housing by taking over the contract and payments on the Ferdinand Street property in Chicago, under an agreement which preserves to the Conference its present equities and provides that in the case the President should require help in meeting payments, the monies advanced by the Conference for this purpose shall increase the Conference equity by the amount of the principal reduction which results.

٧. Miscellaneous Recommendations.

- A. We nominate Rev. Roy E. Crawford as Assistant Conference Treasurer, to serve as registrar and treasurer during Conference and camp meeting, and to represent the treasurer with the work of the statistical committee.
- B. In case of the failure of the local church to completely pay the pastor's hospitalization assessment, by the end of each quarter, the pastor will be responsible to make up the arrears so as to retain current status in this plan; however, such arrears shall be considered a continuing obligation of the church to be refunded when funds are available to do so.
- C. We recommend that all budgets be assessed on a ten-month basis, with payments due only in the months of September through June.
- D. We request that each church pay one-half of the Pastor's Social Security costs.

Report No. 19

Social Action Committee

I.

Moral Issues. A. Self Control

- 1. Abstinence--Believing the use of beverage alcohol, tobacco. and narcotics is harmful to the body and leads to social decadence, and believing that the Scriptures demand physical
- and moral purity, we maintain the view of total abstinence. 2. Moderation--In all legitimate areas such as labor, leisure, and diet, we affirm the Scriptural standard of moderation. In dress we call for attractive modesty.

B. Marriage

We call upon our people to hold in reverance the marriage bond and for all to respect the home as a God-given institution basic to our society.

C. Public communications

Realizing that our means of communication greatly influence public opinion and social actions, we call for high morality in literature, television, movies, radio, and advertising. We stand for stronger legislation and better enforcement through individual vocal protests and for conscientious Christian discernment regarding participation.

D. Integration

We go on record as recognizing the rights of all men to equality of citizenship. While agreeing that there have been While agreeing that there have been gross injustices, we see the solution in Christian love and in enforced lawfulness rather than through violence.

E. Activities

Believing that the Christian's obligation is to glorify God in every aspect of life, we call for higher moral living among our people. We must take every opportunity of nurturing this Christian goal of life through positive attitudes and activities. As to the use of the Lord's Day, we recognize increased laxity and call for renewed reverence: family attendance of all worship services, family fellowship, in-dividual devotional practices, and prohibition of unnecessary business transactions and irreverant (although at other times legitimate) recreational activities. Participation in activities that never glorify God must be banned: acts of crime, gambling, sexual immorality, dancing, etc.

Economic Issues A. Poverty

Even though Christ said, "Ye have the poor always with you" (Matt. 26:11), it is the duty of Christians to minister to the physical needs as well as to the spiritual needs. However, it is the duty of man to labor for his own needs, in as far as possible. Moreover, honest labor must be given for fair wages.

B. Population

The population explosion is a matter of concern for the church. Our main burden must be to evangelize the growing ment of government upon the lives of any people.

III. Political Issues
A. Government multitudes for Christ. We decry the unnecessary infringe-

We recognize that governments are instituted by God and that the Scriptures command us to support and obey them. Therefore in all areas of government Christians ought to be engaged in all areas of government Christians ought to be engaged in active participation: understanding of issues, voting, office holding, financial support, and all other areas which demand the patriotism upon which the freedom of our nation rests. We believe in separation of church and state but not in the separation of God and state. We must vigorously protest the encroachment of atheistic and other forces which seek to underwise our religious heritage. seek to undermine our religious heritage.

B. Peace

The Bible tells us to strive to live peacably with all men. However, we believe in the defense of our freedoms and the rights of all nations. Futhermore, we do not believe that righteousness and evil can be permitted to co-exist without hindering the purpose of God. Knowing that ultimately righteousness will conquer all evil, we now call for all people to strive for victory over evil forces whether the war be hot or cold.

C. Extremism

We believe in the individual's inalienable right to freedom of thought, speech, and action. No person should be forced to conform at the expense of his conscientious convictions. Extreme effort in the defence of liberty is not wrong. However, we abhor the actions and attitudes of extremist groups who seek the overthrow of our government. We call upon our people to be aware of the serious threat posed upon them by communism which is both anti-American and anti-Christian. Let us realize the urgency of a possible Communist take-over due to the strength of their internal infiltration and their present world strength. We must work diligently and pray earnestly for God's intervention.

Report No. 22

Amendments to the Discipline

Herewith are presented amendments to the Discipline adopted by the 1963 General Conference with explanatory notes by Rev. Carl Beaver, Secretary of the General Conference summarized:

PROPOSAL A

The following statement, if approved, will become a new Article of Religion and will be placed in the Discipline as Article XIX, preceding the present XIX entitled "Rites and Ceremonies of the Church."

THE CHURCH

"The Christian Church is the entire body of believers in Jesus Christ. The Founder and only Head of the Church is Christ."

"A local church is a body of believers formally organized on gospel principles, meeting regularly for purposes of worship, edification, and evangelism."

"The Wesleyan Methodist Church of America is a denomination consisting of those members within annual conferences and local churches who hold the faith set forth in these Articles and acknowledge the ecclesiastical authority of its governing bodies."

NOTE: The purpose of this proposal is to give a clearer definition of the church and specifically to denote that the term "church" refers to more than a local organization, as seems to be indicated in Paragraph 41 of the Discipline.

PROPOSAL B

The proposed change would cause paragraph 60 (1), line 2 to read as follows:

Par. 60. The constitutional rights of each annual conference shall include the following:

(1) The right to take charge of all the ministers and churches within its bounds (as modified by VIII 5 below) except such of the general officers...(The remainder is unchanged.)

PROPOSAL C

It is proposed that the second paragraph in Par. 30 of the Discipline be deleted, because the words "every particular church" is thought by some to mean every "local church" which obviously does not have the right to abolish rites set up by our denomination.

Par. 30. "It is not necessary that rites and ceremonies should in all places be the same or exactly alike, for they have always been different and may be changed according to the diversities of countries, times, and men's manners, so that nothing be ordained against God's Word."

"Every particular church may ordain, change, or abolish rites and ceremonies, so that all things may be done to edification."

The proposal is to delete the last short paragraph.

This past year began with a fruitful Youth Camp under the direction of former president, Rev. Robert L. Zuhl. A total of 92 were enrolled in the Youth Camp program. That was a time of spiritual gains as many were brought to a knowledge of Christ as Savior and many others went

on to have the Holy Spirit cleanse their heart from all unrighteousness.

The fourth annual Leader's Retreat was held at Lake Bloomington.

This time of inspiration was under the direction of former President Zuhl as he had done most of the preliminary work prior to Conference and, it was felt by the Conference that this would be a good way to gradually introduce the new president to his task. There were 61 who registered for the retreat. Furnishing a room in Shatford Hall, the new girls' dormitory at Marion College, was adopted as the Conference project. A total of \$645.00 was pledged by the locals for this project. A Conference wide attendance and promotion contest was formulated using the theme of football. Weekly reports giving each Sunday's scores were sent to all the Pastors and Presidents. The Chicago-Hoyne Avenue Wesleyan Youth won the contest. Dixie Merriman from Wheaton was the in-dividual winner. Awards were given at a Rally held in Wheaton on November 16th. At the rally a skit was presented by the youth of the Chicago Area, a film, "Born to Witness" was shown, and all went to see a Wheaton College football game. Approximately 120 attended the rally. Youth Week was held from January 26 to February 2 with promotion from the general and conference officers. This was followed by our Conference of the general and conference of the second of the of the sec

ence Spring-O-Rama at Camp Rude. There were approximately 130 that attended this retreat. The Marion College Varsity Quartet was there. This time together was especially blessed of the Lord in making a

spiritual impact upon young lives.

I conducted three Executive Council meetings and attended the I conducted three Executive Council meetings and attended the Area Youth Council in Marion, Indiana. I took several weeks at the beginning of the year to organize material and prepare myself to best serve the Illinois Wesleyan Youth. As your President, I visited the following youth groups: Hoyne Avenue, Austin, Broadview, Cak Lawn, Oak Park, Wheaton, Galesburg, Creve Coeur, Rockford First, Harrison Avenue, and Wyanet. I published three issues of the Youth Notes mailing 337 copies each time. I wrote 17 personal letters. T promoted the Wesleyan Youth magazine by personal notes to local Business Managers. I met with Illinois students of Marion College in the fall.

Illinois now has ten organized locals. There are four W.Y. fellowships now meeting regularly. Our total membership presently is 181.

Our total subscriptions to the <u>Wesleyan Youth</u> add up to 97.

This year has been one of the most challenging years of my life. I have found the teens in Illinois Wesleyan Youth are among the best in the nation. I want to extend to you Illinois Wesleyan Youth my thanks for being allowed to serve you as President this past year. For all the good that has been done, we give God the glory and praise the name of Jesus our King.

Report No. 8

Resolutions Committee

We, the Resolutions Committee, because of our loyalty to Christ, do bring the following resolutions for the spiritual advancement of Wesleyan Youth of Illinois.

We resolve:
1) That: In order to "Study to show ourselves approved unto God,"
(II Tim. 2:15), prayer and daily Bible reading are vital in our Christian lives. Time spent every day in God's Word and in talking to Him

2) That: Whereas Christ's love for us is portrayed in John 3:16, --"For God so loved the world, that he gave His only begotten Son, that whoseever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life, " -- we shall demonstrate our love toward Him by being faithful to the House of the Lord.
