CONFERENCE RESOLUTIONS

- 1. All Statistical reports shall be filed with the Statistical Committee no later than the second day of Conference.
- 2. Pastors shall equalize the amounts required for Budget before overreaching any one item, and it shall be the pastor's duty to inform his people at the beginning of the year concerning the amount to be raised and he shall at once proceed to raise the amount assessed his charge.
- 3. Inasmuch as the work of the Conference demands the attention and attendance of all its Elders and Licentiates, therefore we will not employ as pastor or evangelist any Elder or Licentiate or pass the character of any Elder or Licentiate except by vote, who does not attend the entire session of Conference. The Committee on Pastoral Relations shall not give employment to any preacher who does not meet the requirements of this standing rule, without bringing his excuse before the Conference for its action in the matter.
- 4. Any minister accepting work on a charge at the hands of this Conference who resigns or abandons it before the year is out without a good excuse or lawful reason, shall be considered by said Conference and it shall take a vote of Conference to pass his character.
- 5. Inasmuch as the work of the Conference demands the attendance of Delegates as well as preachers, therefore we discourage the election of any person as Delegate to Conference who does not intend to attend the entire session. Information of the Delegate's intentions shall be incorporated in their credentials.
- 6. Any member leaving Conference must present his excuse to Conference.
- 7. We recommend that each church pay two dollars towards the board of each Delegate and pastor at Conference, said amount to be sent with the Delegate's credentials. Also that each church pay the traveling expenses to and from Conference.
- 8. The Secretary shall prepare blanks for Delegate's credentials, including the statement required by the last resolution. Said blanks are to be mailed to the pastors shortly before Conference, and when filled out by them to be sent to the Chairman of a Standing Committee on Credentials if possible, in order that they may be able to report immediately after the opening of Conference. Said committee shall be composed of two members appointed by the President.

- 9. The Secretary shall send a statistical blank to the clerk of each charge having no pastor, requesting that the same be filled out with all available statistics and returned to the Conference Secretary.
- 10. For the future the Conference shall observe the disciplinary rule requiring each pastor to read his statistical report on the floor of the Conference.
- 11. Friday preceding Conference shall be set aside as a day of prayer for the Conference.
- 12. Robert's Rules of Order shall be the Parliamentary guide of this body.
- 13. Wednesday afternoon and evening of Conference week shall be designated as Young People's Day.
- 14. Thursday evening of Conference shall be set apart for public missionary service.
- 15. We authorize the closing of the Treasurer's books one week before Conference.
- 16. We recommend that pastors, Sunday Schools, W. H. & F. M. Societies, and Y. M. W. Bands remit all funds raised, quarterly.
- 17. Pastors shall preach on the subject of church benevolences at least once each year.
- 18. The first Sunday in October shall be set apart as a day for special prayer to be offered and efforts made to interest and enlist the young people of our Church in its work.
- 19. Be it required that all pastors of the Ohio Conference attend all sessions of the Camp Meeting unless providentially hindered.
- 20. All charges receiving a new pastor pay the moving expenses, the amount being agreed upon by the pastor and the church.
- 21. We order that no money be paid from the Conference Missionary Fund except by written order of the Missionary Board.
- 22. Each year there shall be incorporated in the Minutes a list of those who have died in the various churches during the year, the pastors being asked to provide the Secretary with the necessary information.
- 23. The Conference Treasurer, with all persons introduced to the Conference shall be honorary members of the Conference, and shall be accorded a seat within the Conference Bar.
- 24. Each occupant of the dormitory during Conference is to furnish his own bed linen and towels.

- 25. The new churches shall be assessed 25 per cent the first year; 50 per cent the second year; and full Budget the third year.
- 26. Be it required that all our workers, preachers and singers on the platform at Conference and Camp Meeting, wear sleeves at least to the elbows, and all their apparel in accord with the Discipline.
- 27. We recommend that first, every church in the Ohio Conference be urged to enter every open door that may be found within its borders, and inaugurate a church extension campaign including a special evangelistic program, specializing on Holiness, Church Organization and Church erection. Second, each pastor be encouraged to hold at least one revival meeting a year, for some nearby pastor or at some point adjacent to his charge, with a view to organizing a Wesleyan Methodist Church.
- 28. We shall have a traveling Conference President who shall receive \$1200.00 annually, said amount to be apportioned to the churches. He shall be required to travel the Conference and counsel and advise with the churches in matters of doctrine, finance and other affairs that effect the spiritual or temporal welfare of the work. To hold at least two quarterly meetings on each charge annually, the slate to be arranged by the President and published in the Wesleyan Methodist. Each charge is to have at least one Sunday each quarterly meeting except where other satisfactory arrangements can be made by the President with the pastor.
- 29. Inasmuch as it is necessary for both pastor and Conference President to arrange their program for the year, be it required that the President, at the Annual Conference prepare his slate for six months in advance, and post the same on the Conference bulletin board, as a guide for the pastors in arranging their programs for the Conference year.
- 30. The Conference Secretary shall provide for the pastors, cards to contain the following quarterly report: Amount of salary received, Amount of Budget raised, Number of pastoral calls made, General condition. Said report to be mailed to the Conference President quarterly.
- 31. All candidates taking the Conference Course of Study shall appear before the Committee on Itineracy and Orders, some member of the Committee, or some one whom the Committee may designate, when taking their examinations.
- 32. All those having business with the Committee on Itineracy and Orders shall appear before that Committee not later than the second day of Conference.

- 33. We recommend that all our pastors make special effort to inform all local preachers on their charges of the disciplinary requirements needed preparatory to study and to travel under Annual Conference direction.
- 34. Our pastors shall urge each family in the church to set aside at least one can of fruit, vegetables, meat, and pickles to be sent to the seat of Conference and Camp Meeting, for use there.
- 35. We recommend that the churches in the Ohio Conference receive all members or candidates for membership, as associate or probationary except those coming in by letter of transfer, and that we strictly adhere to the disciplinary requirements in receiving them.
- 36. We recommend that our churches through their Board of Stewards enter into a tentative agreement on pastor's salary within two weeks after the arrival of the pastor on the work, provided the salary has not already been agreed upon. Such tentative agreement to stand until the time of the first Quarterly Conference, when a permanent salary shall be set as provided by paragraph 103 of the Discipline.
- 37. We shall have a Camp Meeting Committee consisting of 5 members, 3 ministerial and 2 lay, elected by the Annual Conference, to have entire supervision of the Campgrounds and its improvements and the making of complete arrangements for camp and Camp Meeting services, and also provide for the entertainment of the Annual Conference. One ministerial member of this Committee shall be designated as Chairman by the Conference, annually at its regular session. That the ministerial members shall serve for a period of 3 years and the lay members for 2 years, except when first elected the ministerial members shall be elected for 3 years, 2 years, and 1 year, respectively, and the lay members for 2 years and 1 year respectively. That this Committee shall designate one of its own members as Treasurer, and another as Secretary. That an itemized financial report of all money received and expended by the Committee be presented by the Treasurer to each session of the Annual Conference and this report be incorporated in the Conference Minutes. We further recommend that this Camp Meeting Committee advise with the Conference Board of Trustees as to location, erection, and improvement of Conference buildings on the Campgrounds.

RECORD OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

A large group of the Ohio Conference Preachers and Delegates met for the opening service. Rev. K. M. Lewis, the Vice-President of the Conference, preached a very fitting sermon from the text, "Say not there are yet four months and then cometh harvest." A very blessed communion service followed.

Tuesday Morning, July 26, 1938, 9:30

The first business meeting of the 31st annual session of the Ohio Conference met on Victory Campgrounds, Tuesday, July 26 at 9:30 a. m.

Devotions—John Woodhouse led the singing and the Conference President, Leslie D. Wilcox, read a scripture lesson. C. L. Wright led in prayer.

Credentials—Committee on Credentials submitted their report. Report adopted.

Nominations—C. L. Wright, A. D. Osborn, R. J. Stratton, J. S. Dunn, and J. L. Stevens, were elected as the Committee on Nominations.

Statistics.—V. O. Priddy, the Chairman of the Standing Committee on Statistics, was allowed to choose his own help. Chas. W. Taylor was named.

Conference Bar—Ordered that the bar of Conference be the first five seats, not including the first one, in the center sections, and the platform.

Roll-Roll was called and corrected.

Letter—The Conference Secretary read a letter from Rev. H. W. Thompson.

Hours—Hours of the Conference was set to be 9:30 a. m. and 1:30 p. m.

Courtesy—G. W. Calhoon was elected to be Committee on Courtesy. Later the adopted report of the Committee on Nominations supplemented this Committee by Monna M. Rogers.

Courtesy—Committee on Courtesy presented Rev. Roy S. Nicholson, the Connectional Representative and Sunday School Editor.

Hour Set—The hour of 10:00 a. m. Thursday was set as the time for the presentation of the Connectional Interests.

Courtesy-The Committee on Courtesy presented Mrs. Ella Zuch of the Vine Street Church, Rev. Nicholas Plementosh of the Fairmount Church, Rev. and Mrs. Harmon McConn of the Wheeling Mission, Rev. and Mrs. Ira Shanafelt, of the Fairview Church, Rev. Albert Swift of the Marion Church and Mrs. Mitchel, Delegate from the new Edgemont, Dayton Church.

Greetings-Ordered that the Conference Secretary send greetings to Rev. James Zuch.

Excuse—Ordered that the Young People who are members of the Conference be excused Wednesday morning following roll call so that they might attend the W. Y. P. S. business session.

Morse—Rev. G. W. Morse, pastor of the Zanesville Church, spoke briefly of the dedication of their new church building.

Campground Fund—Conference Treasurer asked to prepare and submit an itemized report of the Campground Fund.

Report—Vice-President was called to the Chair and the Conference President submitted his report. Report adopted. (See Report No. 6.)

Ways and Means—Ordered that a Committee of Ways and Means be appointed to call the attention of the churches and their stewards to the matter of increasing the item "Pastor's Salary." Adopted. Committee named including C. L. Wright, J. M. Williams, and A. D. Osborn. E. R. McMillan and J. L. Stevens ordered added to the Committee.

Hour Set—Ordered that 2:00 p. m. Thursday be the hour for the Tithing message.

Adjourned.

Tuesday, Afternoon, July 26, 1938, 1:30

Devotions—Song service was led by Ira Shanafelt and the devotions were led by S. L. Vorhies.

Roll Call—Roll was called. Committee on Credentials submitted the name of Fay Taylor. Ordered added to the roll.

Minutes—Minutes were read and approved as corrected.

Hour Set—Election of Conference officials was set as the Order of the Day at 10:00 a. m., Friday.

After a song service, led by Ira Shanafelt, Rev. C. L. Wright preached a splendid sermon on the subject, "Steadfast Saints," using as a text Psalm 119: 165. He stressed the points, Piety, Peace and Perseverance.

Wednesday Morning, July 27, 1938, 9:30

Devotions—Song service was led by Donald Howard, and prayer by W. C. Roberts.

Roll Call-Roll was called and corrected.

Minutes-Minutes were read and approved.

Courtesy—Committee on Courtesy presented Brothers Fisher and Major, students at Marion College.

Excuse—The young people were excused from the Conference so that they might attend the W. Y. P. S. business session.

Report—The Conference Treasurer presented an itemized report of the Campground Fund. (See Report Nos. 13A and 13B.)

Hour Set—Ordered that an Order of the Day at 11:00 a. m. Thursday, be a discussion of Campground Management and Improvement.

Amendment—Amendment offered to the Resolution on Camp Meeting Committee. Ordered added to the Resolution. (See Resolution No. 37.)

Report—Committee on Itineracy and Orders reported in full. Report adopted. (See Report No. 8.)

Rescind—Motion on Memorial to General Conference ordered rescinded.

Resolution—Conference Resolution on settlement of amount of pastor's salary adopted. (See Resolution No. 36.)

Report-Committee on Budget reported incompletely.

Educational Interests—Order of the Day was called and President McConn of Marion College presented the Educational Interests.

Recess-Recessed to 1:00 p. m.

Reconvened—Reconvened at 1:00 p. m. and a song was sung and prayer offered.

Report No. 5

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON WAYS AND MEANS

Whereas it is evident both from a statement issued recently by Roger W. Babson, Boston economist and Moderator of the General Council of the Congregational Christian Church, that "it requires an increase in about 75 per cent of our ministers' salaries to give them a wage comparable with what carpenters, bricklayers and plasterers are getting," and from our pastor's reports to the Conference, that they also are among the underpaid.

We, your Committee on Ways and Means, advocate the following plan whereby we believe not only the pastors' salary may be increased, but all the financial obligations of the Church met:

- 1. The adoption of the Storehouse Tithing Plan, as recommended by the Discipline.
- 2. That there be at least a quarterly donation for the pastor, and that the Conference President also be remembered with donations at the time of his Quarterly Meeting visitation.
- 3. That the non-resident and non-attending members be communicated with once a quarter and informed of the condition and needs of the church, by the stewards.
- 4. That there be a study of the Discipline relating to finance and stewards duties, and also the duties of all church officers at least once a quarter.
- 5. That the pastor be paid weekly, including his time at the Annual Conference and Camp Meeting.
- 6. That each church elect a tract, tithing and educational secretary, who shall secure a tract box, to be kept filled with literature on tithing, especially that published by our Church, and other religious subjects. Offerings shall be taken for this purpose:
- 7. That each pastor transfer his membership to the church he is serving.

Report No. 6

REPORT OF PRESIDENT OF THE OHIO CONFERENCE

Thirty-one years ago there was formed within the boundaries of this state a new Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist denomination. Composed by the union of two Conferences which had formerly occupied respectively the eastern and western portions of the state, it thus became the chief proponent of Wesleyanism in Ohio. The aim of its organization was to propagate Bible holiness as taught originally by John Wesley and also to foster those reform principles which were so dear to the hearts of the fathers of American Wesleyanism. Through the years God has blessed and helped toward the attainment of these ends. Today as we are met

together in the thirty-first annual session of the Ohio Conference, we stand committed by the very fact of our membership in such an organization to these principles of Wesleyanism. Upon us has fallen the task which the founders began. The torch is now in our hands to pass on to needy multitudes who perish, and to another generation of workers in the Master's vineyard. Our task is magnified and our problem intensified by the unspiritual and immoral tendencies of the times. Therefore we need to give the more earnest heed to maintaining those principles for which we stand. This is no time for relaxation; but rather for redoubled exertion and more vigorous praying. An unspiritual age demands a consistent testimony to Bible holiness and a strong advocate of righteous living. Perilous times call for powerful action. But we cannot meet the challenge either by might or by power but only by the Spirit of the Lord. May God grant us a vision and a zeal commensurate with the great task which He has given us, that we may faithfully champion the cause of holiness and uprightness until that day come when righteousness shall cover the earth as the waters cover the sea!

The past year has in several respects been an unusually good one. A deeper desire for revival than ever before has been manifested in many parts of the Conference. Naturally this has been followed in a number of places by revival meetings of more than usual depth and power. This is the best sign of prosperity a Church could hope for. We trust it shall continue and develop. Beside this there is a growing interest from all quarters in our camp meeting. This presents us a great opportunity for usefulness if we faithfully meet the challenge. There also continue to come calls from various places throughout the state, which indicate that more and more people are looking to the Wesleyan Church for spiritual help and a standard of sane and sound religion. During the year two new churches have been organized and one new mission opened. Concerning this new mission in Wheeling, W. Va. where Brother and Sister Harmon McConn are working, more details will be found in the report of the Missionary Board. Early in the year, Allan Deloach, a local preacher from West Dayton, began holding services in another section of the city. This soon developed into a mission and finally on May 22 a new church was organized. Nine members were received at that time with a few more to follow. Allan Deloach was continued in charge of the work. We recommend that this church be received into the Conference and that it be known as the Edgemont, Dayton Church.

Early in the fall the Missionary Board sent a worker to the field in Marion, O., where the Conference owns a church building. The work here has been very slow and suffered many reverses but finally a small but loyal group was gathered together and a church of six members was organized with Albert Swift as pastor. We recommend that this church also

be received and be known as the State St., Marion Church, rather than by the former name of Marion Mission.

From the financial angle, the work of the Conference has been somewhat curtailed by depression conditions. From all indications we would look for a smaller income on all budget items this year than last. But in spite of economic handicaps, five churches have already reported to the President that they have raised a full budget, and there may be others which have done so. This is splendid in view of conditions. Furthermore, in the very face of depression, an unusual amount of building and remodeling has been done. The Zanesville Church recently dedicated a splendid brick structure on the site of the former frame church which was destroyed by fire two or three years ago. The Belmont, Dayton Church erected a new parsonage on the lot beside the church building. The Shadley Valley Church purchased another lot and building in the village of Jelloway. The new quarters, which have been nicely improved and redecorated, should prove a more central location from which to work. It is recommended that the name of the church be changed on the Conference rolls from Shadley Valley to Jelloway. A new lot in a fine location on the Dixie highway has been purchased by the Northridge, Dayton congregation and they expect soon to begin building. The Vine St., Cincinnati Church has been greatly improved by the removal of one partition, the refinishing of floors and walls and other alterations. The Fargo congregation is rejoicing over a church newly redecorated and electric-lighted. And other churches have improved their property or decreased their indebtedness. This alone is an unusual record of accomplishment.

Perhaps the matter of pastors' reports to the Conference President would be of interest. For the first half of the year 17 pastors reported, for the third quarter, 7 and for the last quarter, 7. The reports for the last half are too meager to tabulate but some idea of the work of the year may be obtained by doubling the figures submitted for the first half. The 17 churches reporting for the first half, report a total of \$4987 pastors' salary, or an average of \$293 per church. Only 14 churches reported on budget, giving a total of \$1103 or an average of \$71 per church. Only thirteen pastors reported the number of calls made for the first half. They present a wide variation from 19 to an estimated 300. The total number of calls was 1252 or an average of 96 per pastor for the six month period. Fifteen churches reported on condition of the work. Of these, 6 reported the work very good, 7 reported hopefully and only 2 gave a report which seemed less encouraging.

The following official actions should also be reported:

On July 31, Rev. T. B. Bailey was granted a transfer to the Kentucky Conference.

On Oct. 7, the choice of the Vine St. Church was sanctioned by the appointment of John Murdoch to the pastorate. He remained for one

month after which the work was supplied locally until Dec. 19 when Rev. James C. Zuch and wife, Ella V. Zuch were obtained as pastors.

Following Conference the work at Baker seemed to be at an end until a revival meeting which was held there in the late fall after which the work was continued as a mission rather than a church. The name was also changed from Baker Chapel to Rine Memorial Mission. The work was under the direction of Fred Fields until he was incapacitated by ill health, after which it was supplied locally.

The work at Fairview has been supplied throughout the year by Ira Shanafelt.

The church at Fly continued under the direction of Robert Rine until April 5 when notice was received of his resignation. Since that time the work has remained in the hands of the President. W. B. Ward, Lee Shultz and Kenneth Dunn, have each supplied the pulpit temporarily.

Ira M. Ison continued as pastor at Portsmouth but in the early fall, complaints were received which seemed to warrant investigation. Accordingly the President and one member of the Advisory Board made a trip to Portsmouth, finding conditions which would justify drastic action. The majority of the church, however, took offense and on Nov. 18 notice was received that they had voted to withdraw from the Conference.

The church at Sugar Creek has been supplied throughout the year by Clyde Sedgwick while the church at White's Chapel has been supplied for part time by Fred Fields.

On Nov. 29, notice was received that Marian Deitz must leave the pastorate at Fairmount, Cincinnati, on account of ill health. Miss Mary Pratt supplied until in January when a student from Bible School, named Nicholas Plementosh was secured as pastor. The condition of the work there seems now to be steadily improving.

On Jan. 13, Floyd Sartwell, having taken pastoral work for another denomination, was granted an appointment to do pastoral work in the field of his own choice.

On Mar. 19, notice was received of the resignation of W. B. Ward from the pastorate at Senecaville. Since then the work has been conducted by the aid of such local help as was available.

On July 25, there were received from the Kentucky Conference, transfers for elders James C. and Ella V. Zuch.

During the year the President has received the amount of \$1001.91 cash salary from the various churches, either direct, or through the Treasurer. The following items of information may also be of interest.

Gifts and donations from the several churches have been received to a valuation of \$80.

President's mileage in conference work has amounted to 9116 miles. Figuring automobile travel at 2½ cents per mile and railroad travel at the

exact cost of fares, this amounts to \$198.81 for traveling expense. Expenses for postage and telegrams \$8.88.

Report No. 7 MISSIONARY BOARD REPORT 1938

The work of the Missionary Board for the present Conference year has not been as extensive as we could have desired. We have felt that it was better to more fully undertake each individual work than to attempt too much and so dissipate our labors and finances.

Several times we have planned for using a tent in the field but always openings came from such places as halls and abandoned churches until it seemed unwise to add the further expense of a tent and equipment.

. We have a balance in our Conference Missions Fund of approximately \$245 at the close of the year.

From last Conference until the end of 1937 we paid the rent on the hall for the Westerville Mission. After prayer and much deliberation we decided to notify the people of the Mission that we thought best to discontinue this support and they were notified to this effect. Brother D. E. Howard was appointed superintendent and with the assistance of Brother Chrystler and Brother Lee Shultz has continued through the year. The The withdrawing of financial support from this work resulted in the local people assuming the obligation themselves and for more than eight months they have continued unassisted and bid fair to soon become a regularly organized church.

Soon after last Conference Brother Wilcox and Brother Priddy went to Wheeling, West Virginia where Brother Harmon McConn planned to open a work in a needy field. These members continued there for four days assisting in the opening of the work. This work has continued with our assistance and though progress has been slow there seems to be a real need for the mission in this section of our territory and of the city of Wheeling. Please pray for Brother and Sister McConn and their work. Likewise we assisted in the support of the pastor and mission in the city of Marion, Ohio, where Brother Albert Swift was in charge. On June 12 of this year the mission was made a full church, and although small there is promise for the work there.

The work of touring the Conference this year was divided into districts and assigned to members of the Board in such a way as to conserve time from our own work and save cost of trips. Each time two of the members and once all three members travelled, visiting with a possible exception all of the churches. With a total expense for travel of \$40.00 we received in cash

and pledges \$345 which means that for every dollar spent we returned to the Treasury \$8.60. More than 400 miles were made at no expense to the Conference.

There is for the future consideration of the Missionary Board of the Conference three or four openings which hold bright prospect in good location. As a suggestion we request that these places be entered as soon as possible, assisting in the opening and actual operation if needed for a longer or shorter period sufficient to get them established in the minds of the people and community as will warrant their moral and financial support. We are convinced that ten day or two week meetings are too short to get the favor of a community or to try out ambitious workers. We would urge our people and encourage our churches to give due consideration to the Conference Missions arm of Conference work. This is certainly no time to retrench and with the continued support which the present Board has received from the churches we shall "enlarge our borders" and fulfill our obligation to the people within our territory. Jesus is able, God is willing and while our people have this work on their heart, let us continue to pray, give and work for two churches where there is now one within the borders of Ohio Conference.

We believe the people of Ohio will continue to support Extension work and that He which hath begun a good work among us will perform it until the day of Jesus Christ.
