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CONFERENCE RESOLUTIONS

1. All Statistical reports shall be filed with the Statistical Committee no later than the close of the Tuesday morning meeting, and any pastor who fails to do so shall explain his reason publicly on the floor of the Conference.

2. Pastors shall equalize the amounts required for Budget before overreaching any one item, and it shall be the pastor's duty to inform his people at the beginning of the year concerning the amount to be raised and he shall at once proceed to raise the amount assessed his charge.

3. Inasmuch as the work of the Conference demands the attention and attendance of all its Elders and Licentiates, therefore we will not employ as pastor or evangelist any Elder or Licentiate or pass the character of any Elder or Licentiate except by vote, who does not attend the entire session of Conference. The Committee on Pastoral Relations shall not give employment to any preacher who does not meet the requirements of this standing rule, without bringing his excuse before the Conference for its action in the matter.

4. Any minister accepting work on a charge at the hands of this Conference who resigns or abandons it before the year is out without a good excuse or lawful reason, shall be considered by said Conference and it shall take a vote of Conference to pass his character.

5. Inasmuch as the work of the Conference demands the attendance of Delegates as well as preachers, therefore we discourage the election of any person as Delegate to Conference who does not intend to attend the entire session. Information of the Delegate's intentions shall be incorporated in their credentials.

6. We recommend that each church pay travelling expenses, board and room of Delegates and Pastor at Conference.

7. The Secretary shall prepare blanks for Delegate's credentials, including the statement required by resolution No. 5. Said blanks are to be mailed to the pastors shortly before Conference, and when filled out by them to be sent to the Chairman of a Standing Committee on Credentials if possible, in order that they may be able to report immediately after the opening of Conference. Said committee shall be composed of two members appointed by the President.

8. The Secretary shall send a statistical blank to the clerk of each charge having no pastor, requiring that the same be filled out with all available statistics and returned to the Conference Secretary.

9. For the future the Conference shall observe the disciplinary rule

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requiring each pastor to read his statistical report on the floor of the Conference, but that to expedite business he may omit all blank spaces, all of Item 2 except the first 3 numbers, all of Item 8 except W. Y. P. S. and Other Benevolences, and read only the Total for all purposes in Item 9.

10. Friday preceding Conference shall be set aside as a day of prayer for the Conference.

11. Robert's Rules of Order shall be the Parliamentary guide of this body.

12. The Special Orders of the Conference shall be: Monday evening, a communion service; Tuesday evening, Educational service; Wednesday afternoon, one hour each to Tithing Secretary and the Sunday-school Secretary; Wednesday evening, W. Y. P. S. Rally; Thursday evening, Missionary service under the W. H. & F. M. S.

13. We authorize the closing of the Conference Treasurer's and the Camp Meeting Treasurer's books one week before Conference.

14. We recommend that pastors, Sunday schools, W. H. & F. M. Societies and Y. M. W. Bands remit all funds at least quarterly.

15. Pastors shall preach on the subject of church benevolences at least once each year.

16. We understand Paragraph 51 in the Discipline to require that no one be received into membership of our local churches unless they have left off the wearing of gold including the wedding ring. Be it further Resolved, That Paragraph 52 regarding plain apparel be strictly adhered to.

17. Be it required that all pastors of the Ohio Conference attend all sessions of the Camp Meeting unless providentially hindered.

18. All charges receiving a new pastor pay the moving expenses, the amount being agreed upon by the pastor and the church.

19. We order that no money be paid from the Conference Missionary Fund except by written order of the Missionary Board.

20. Each year there shall be incorporated in the Minutes a list of those who have died in the various churches during the year, the pastors being asked to provide the Secretary with the necessary information.

21. Each occupant of the dormitory during Conference is to furnish his own bed linen and towels.

22. The new churches shall be assessed 25 per cent the first year; 50 per cent the second year; and full Budget the third year.

23. Be it required that all our workers, preachers and singers on the platform at Conference and Camp Meeting, wear sleeves at least to the elbows, and all their apparel in accord with the Discipline.

24. We recommend that each church grant their pastor a two Sundays leave of absence with pay; at which time he will work under the direction of the Conference Missionary Board in a pioneer evangelistic campaign, both time and place to be chosen by that Board.

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25. We shall have a travelling Conference President who shall receive \$1,800.00 annually, which shall be apportioned to the churches and paid by them to the Conference Treasurer, who shall on the first of each month beginning with August 1, each Conference year forward a check for one twelfth of the amount to him. He shall be required to travel the Conference and counsel and advise with the churches in matters of doctrine, finance and other affairs that effect the spiritual and temporal welfare of the work. After consulting with the pastors, he may confer with the stewards if necessary with the purpose in mind to increase the pastor's salary. He shall hold at least two quarterly meetings on each charge annually, the slate to be arranged by the President and published in the Wesleyan Methodist. Each charge shall have at least one Sunday service each quarterly meeting except where other satisfactory arrangements can be made by the President with the pastor.

26. Inasmuch as it is necessary for both pastor and Conference President to arrange their program for the year, be it required that the President, at the Annual Conference prepare his slate for six months in advance, and post the same on the Conference bulletin board, as a guide for the pastors in arranging their programs for the Conference year.

27. All persons having business with the Committee on Itineracy and Orders shall appear before said Committee not later than the second day of Conference; and each candidate taking the course of study shall appear before some member of the Committee or some person appointed by them to take his examinations; also all examination papers shall be in the hands of the Examiner not later than July 10.

28. We recommend that all our pastors make special effort to inform all local preachers on their charges of the disciplinary requirements needed preparatory to study and to travel under Annual Conference direction.

29. Our pastors shall urge each family in the church to set aside at least one can of fruit, vegetables, meat, and pickles to be sent to the seat of Conference and Camp Meeting, for use there.

30. We recommend that the churches in the Ohio Conference receive all members or candidates for membership, as associate or probationary except those coming in by letter of transfer, and that we strictly adhere to the disciplinary requirements in receiving them.

31. In order to assist the local church in meeting all its financial obligations, we recommend a study of the discipline relating to finance and that the duties of all officers of the church be explained. We recommend the adoption and use of the Storehouse Plan as outlined in the discipline. We recommend that a Donation Steward be elected by the church to provide a regular donation for the pastor, at least quarterly and monthly if possible; that the church be requested to provide a donation for the Con-

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ference President at the time of his visit to the church. We recommend that the Board of Stewards ascertain the financial condition of the church from the Treasurer and communicate the same at least quarterly to all non-resident and non-attending members, urging their support. We recommend that the church elect a secretary to provide tracts and information on tithing to its constituency. An offering shall be taken at least annually which shall be used to provide a tract box and suitable tracts, especially those of our own publication, on tithing, holiness, regeneration, etc. We recommend that each pastor transfer his membership to the church he is serving. We recommend that a definite agreement regarding pastor's salary be entered into within 2 weeks after Conference, through the local Board of Stewards, which shall stand until time of the First Quarterly Conference, providing no plan was agreed upon at the time of his employment. At the First Quarterly meeting an agreement shall be made for the balance of the Conference year. We recommend that the salary of the pastor shall include the two weeks of Conference and Camp Meeting; the tenure of the pastor's labors beginning the week following Camp Meeting.

32. We shall have a Camp Meeting Committee consisting of 5 members, 3 ministerial and 2 lay, elected by the Annual Conference, to have entire supervision of the Campgrounds and its improvements and the making of complete arrangements for camp and Camp Meeting services, and also provide for the entertainment of the Annual Conference. One ministerial member of this Committee shall be designated as Chairman by the Conference, annually at its regular session. That the ministerial members shall serve for a period of 3 years and the lay members for 2 years, except when first elected the ministerial members shall be elected for 3 years, 2 years, and 1 year, respectively, and lay members for 2 years and 1 year respectively. That this Committee shall designate one of its own members as Treasurer, and another as Secretary. That the Treasurer and the Secretary shall both report to the Annual Conference and the report be incorporated in the Conference Minutes. The Treasurer's Report shall also be audited. We further recommend that this Camp Meeting Committee advise with the Conference Board of Trustees as to location, erection, and improvement of Conference buildings on the Campground.

33. The fourth Monday in July shall be the permanent date for the opening of Conference; the Camp Meeting to follow.

34. The Conference Missionary Board shall hereafter be elected by ballot.

35. To further Church Extension we recommend that the pledge plan be continued, but that the President appoint a Secretary-Treasurer who shall take the responsibility of administering the same. He shall

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secure pledges and the payment of them shall be made to him, after the new building project has been approved by Conference President and Trustees. (Not to exceed three appeals in one year.) He shall notify those who have made pledges, also the pastors who are building may write a personal letter to the pastors of the Conference, asking them to take an offering and send it to the Secretary-Treasurer of this fund, who in turn will forward it to pastor or the Building Committee. Expenses of printing cards and mailing to be paid from the Conference Incidental Fund.

36. We recommend that the Treasurer's and Sunday School Treasurer's books of the several churches be audited annually.

37. There shall be incorporated in the Minutes annually an Honor Roll of those churches raising a full budget; those who have an equivalent of one half of its membership taking the Wesleyan Methodist, and those using the Storehouse Tithing Plan. Also the Conference Calendar and the locations of the churches shall be incorporated.

38. Hereafter the Ohio Conference shall be authorized to charge 4% on loans from the Superannuated Elders' Fund; all others to draw 2%. (Any notes for loans on the Conference Treasury shall from now on be drawn up on the form in the 1940 Minutes.)

39. We recommend a standard traveling expense of .03 a mile to the Conference Board of Trustees, Missionary Board, and Camp Meeting Committee, to be paid from the Conference Incidental Fund, the Conference Missions Fund and the Camp Meeting Treasury, respectively.

RELIGIOUS SERVICES

Monday Evening, July 26, 1943. God was pleased to meet with His people when on Monday evening they came from all corners of the Conference to hold the 36th annual session of the Ohio Conference. It was a goodly number of ministers and delegates. Nearly every charge of the Conference had representatives present at this first service. The message was brought by Rev. L. L. Folger, of the Indiana Conference. This elderly warrior of the Cross brought a splendid message on "If we walk in the Light." Having known personally, many of the founders of the denomination the references to them at this service denoting the close of a century of denominational and Conference existence were very fitting. A communion service at which there were probably at least 125 communicants followed.

Tuesday Evening. This service by Conference order has for the last few years been denoted as Educational service night. Although the representatives from Marion College that were expected did not arrive, the Conference Educational Secretary did well in improvising for the occasion. Four young people who were graduates of Houghton, Marion, Cleveland Bible and God's Bible Colleges spoke briefly. The talks were not competitive at all. At the close of these talks, Rev. Reisdorph brought a fitting close. An offering was taken to pay off the small amount of Educational Budget that the Conference failed to raise through the regular avenues of the churches. The offering was sufficient for the purpose.

Wednesday Evening. Wednesday evening at Ohio Conference session is always Young People's night. The service was in charge of Rev. Eldon Martin, the Conference Y. P. President. Many and varied were the preliminaries; the message was brought by Rev. G. I. Norman, of the Northridge church. A blessed altar service followed when many, both young and older, found help at the Throne of Grace. An offering was taken to be used in the purchase of an American flag, which was later obtained. The offering was also designated to be used to defray the expense of the service flag, and if there were a sufficient balance, a Christian flag was to be purchased. All these ends were attained with a slight deficit which was made up out of the Conference Y. P. Treasury. The flags were obtained and presented on Friday.

Thursday Evening. This is always Missionary night. The service was under the direction of the Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Society. Mrs. Mary Greene Seekins was the principle speaker. The offering resulted in \$1,300.00 in cash and pledges.

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Sunday Morning. At this hour the Ordination service, ordered by the Conference, was held. Rev. A. L. Vess, one of our Camp Meeting evangelists, brought the message. The subject, "The Character of the Preacher," was based on the example of Appolos, from the Acts. Eight of the Conference Preachers were ordained. They were: George Hawthorne, Ira Shanafelt, Eldon Martin, C. B. Newbury, James Myers, M. E. Mitchell, Harry McQuigg and Caroline McQuigg.

RECORD OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

Tuesday, July 27, 1943, 9:30 a. m.

Conference was called to order by the Conference President, Rev. Leslie D. Wilcox.

Devotions—Singing was led by John Murdock; Chairman read a scripture from 1st Peter 1; Lee Shultz led in prayer.

Credentials—Committee on Credentials reported. Report adopted.

Nominations—Committee on Nominations was elected, consisting of Harry Stanley, George Fisher, R. J. Stratton, J. C. Zuch and H. P. Osborn.

Bar of Conference—Conference Bar was set to include the first six seats in the three south sections of the auditorium, and the platform.

Hours—Hours of Conference were set at 9:30 a. m. and 1:30 p. m.

Roll—Roll was called and corrected.

Courtesy—Committee on Courtesy was elected. K. M. Lewis and Nellie Hamilton to serve.

Order—Election of Officers be held Thursday, 2:00 p. m.

Order—Ordered that the vacancies on the Committee on Itineracy and Orders be filled immediately following the report of the Committee on Nominations.

Orders—2:00 p. m. Wednesday set as the hour to hear the Sunday School Secretary, and 3:00 p. m. the same day for the Tithing Secretary's speech.

Courtesy—Committee on Courtesy presented the following: Rev. and Mrs. Thomas Shirk of Holliday's Cove; J. D. Keller of Africa; Rev. and Mrs. Wendell Weaver and Miss Lucille Longest from Fairview; Mrs. Speck from S. W. REPORTS

Report No. 1

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE PRESIDENT

To the Thirty-Sixth Annual Session of the Ohio Conference:

Through the blessings and the mercy of Almighty God we have been permitted once again to assemble in annual session. We are meeting in troublous times. War conditions affecting especially the questions of travel and of employment have created new and special problems which we are having to meet throughout the Conference. The war spirit, the rush of duties, and an attitude of pre-occupation and of anxiety, all combine to make spiritual work more difficult. But the complications created by such conditions are calling forth a greater diligence and a deeper devotion on the part of those who love the Lord. We see indications of this in special signs of Divine favor, and in greater blessings which are coming to us here and there. So, in spite of conditions which outwardly appear unfavorable, we thank God that we can report that in general our work is in good and healthy condition and shows evidence of progress.

I have continued throughout the year in the tasks assigned to the President. I have visited each charge on two quarterly meeting occasions and have also held a number of meetings and made special visits where I could be of some help to the work. We have also assisted a great deal in the work of pioneer evangelism carried on under the direction of the Missionary Board. In pursuance of the duties of the Presidency we have travelled 8,200 miles at an estimated expense of \$230. This is irrespective of travel for the Missionary Board or for the Camp Meeting Committee. Our work has involved some 164 preaching services, 54 business meetings, and 3 organization services. We have received from the Conference Treasurer the sum of \$1,500 salary; from various churches and individuals, cash gifts and offerings to the sum of \$255; and donations totalling a value of \$55. For all these we express our gratitude.

Membership of the Conference

We report the following changes in the membership of the Conference.

On August 15, we granted T. B. Bailey a letter of standing.

On Nov. 18, I granted a transfer to the Oklahoma Conference to H. B. Brannon.

On March 8, I received the surrender of the Annual Conference license of Guy Blankenship.

The new members received are as follows:

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Elder G. I. Norman by transfer from the Lockport Conference, Aug. 23.

Annual Conference Preacher, Thomas L. Shirk, by transfer from the Alabama Conference, Sept. 14.

Elder Arthur Calhoun by transfer from Dakota Conference, Oct. 3.

Annual Conference Preacher, Charles Day, on presentation of equivalent credentials from the Christian Union Church, March 22.

Rev. E. C. Bond, June 3, on presentation of credentials of ordination from the Church of Christ, Evangelical. We are referring Brother Bond to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders for determination of his standing in the Wesleyan Methodist Church.

Elder Olga Marie Norman, on transfer from the Lockport Conference, July 14.

Pastoral Appointments

The churches left in the hands of the President by the last annual session of the Conference were Northridge and Kenton.

On August 23, G. I. Norman was appointed as pastor at Northridge.

Soon after Conference the Kenton church decided by vote to retain David Morgan as their pastor.

On Nov. 18, Herbert Brannon resigned from the pastorate at Riverside. Thomas Shirk was subsequently employed at their pastor for a time. But on March 5 he resigned and the church has since been supplied by a young lady from the Bible School, Mrs. Ruby Shockley. The church received quite a set-back due to the unsettled conditions and abrupt changes, but is beginning to show signs of improvement more recently. In the last few weeks a good revival meeting has been held there which has been of considerable benefit to the work.

On Feb. 3, I received word that Guy Blankenship had left the work at Toronto. Due to various conditions it has seemed impossible to make a permanent decision regarding a pastor, and the work has remained since that date under the pastoral oversight of Allen Baker.

On March 10, C. B. Newbury gave notice of his resignation from the pastorate at Africa, such resignation to take effect April 15. On April 20 I recognized the choice of the church for J. D. Keller as pastor, appointing him to the pastorate subject to transfer from the Free Methodist Church.

Three new churches have been organized during the year, bringing the total number of churches in the Conference to thirty-six. These new churches are:

Empire, organized on Nov. 1 with a class of 10 full and 1 associate members. Allen Baker was appointed as pastor. The work showed fine promise at the beginning but has since suffered a set-back in a rather in-

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inexplicable way. However, the chief members of the church are fully persuaded of the necessity and the possibility of firmly establishing Wesleyan work in the town. This augurs good for the future.

Rittman, organized on May 9 with 12 members. C. E. First appointed pastor. The work at Rittman appears to be in a thriving condition. It is making steady gains.

Newark, organized July 9 with a class of 20 full and 12 associate members. This is one of the finest groups and most promising it has ever been my privilege to organize into a Wesleyan Methodist Church. We believe the future has good things for Wesleyan work in Newark.

Such is the present status of the membership and the work of the Ohio Conference. God has been graciously blessing our work during past days. He has given us a splendid and spiritual corps of workers with whom to labor. We thank God for this, for herein, next to the blessing of God, lies our best hope for the future. We know not what that future shall hold. There may be even harder tasks ahead, and problems most difficult of solution, but with firm confidence in God, and absolute reliance upon His promises, standing shoulder to shoulder in the cause of God, we address ourselves to the task He has set us.

Report No. 2

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE MISSIONS BOARD

We submit to you the following report. First let us consider the churches placed under our direction by the last Annual Conference.

1. Allen's Chapel: Feeling that the best method of procedure at this point was to open work in a nearby locality with the hope of developing a circuit that would eventually become self-supporting, we immediately after Conference took the tent to Paden City, W. Va., where there was a group of interested individuals. We employed George Hawthorne and Harry Kastle as workers for this meeting, which continued with good interest for a couple of weeks until the tent was wrecked by a storm. After the fragments were returned to Camp Victory services were continued in a rented church building. Harry Kastle continued the work, pastoring both at Paden City and Allen's Chapel. Particular progress has been noted at Allen's Chapel, and the prospects at Paden City remain fair.

2. Fairview was put under the charge of the Westview pastor, L. A. Wilcox and Wendel Weaver, a local preacher of the Westview charge. Brother Weaver has taken care of the preaching services with assistance

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from Brother Wilcox in prayer and revival meetings. Satisfactory progress has been made throughout the year.

3. S. W. Sharron: Brother Borden has remained as pastor throughout the year. The work dropped to a low ebb in midyear at which time the Board sponsored a revival with some results. Since that time the work has shown better prospects of being able to exist.

Second let us consider the new prospects carried over from last year.

1. Empire: The work made good progress under the leadership of Brother Allen Baker until in November it was deemed opportune to organize.

2. Fairmount: John Cole continued as pastor. The work has made remarkable progress in some ways, particularly in finances. In other phases it has been rather disheartening. We feel that this point remains a challenging opportunity.

3. Mt. Blanchard: Regardless of the faithful labors of Brother G. W. Calhoun this work continued to decline until it seemed wise to discontinue services.

4. Newark: Under the pastorate of R. C. Gibson the work has made substantial and steady progress in interest, attendance, and spirituality. The Newark folk we believe were thoroughly in sympathy with Wesleyan doctrine and practice at the time of organization in early July.

5. Zanesville: Although this work contained good prospects, it suffered such setbacks that it became expedient to discontinue it for the present.

Third: Record of work begun this Conference year.

1. Dresden: Prayer meetings begun early in the year by Brother Harry Stanley developed in interest. The Conference tent was taken to this point early in July, and the meetings are still in progress under the direction of Harry Stanley.

2. Hammondsville: An abandoned church building was rented by James Myres, and a Sunday school was started early in the year. At least two revivals were held on this work. A goodly number of children are being reached as well as some adults.

3. Holliday's Cove: Correspondence with interested parties in this town revealed a considerable interest in a Wesleyan work. About the middle of May we employed Thomas Shirk to lay the ground work for a tent meeting which started about June first. Brother Shirk and Charles Fisher were the workers in this campaign. This meeting was interrupted by a storm which tore the tent and made it necessary to remove same to the Campground for repairs. Some of the most encouraging prospects of our current efforts are being noted at this point.

4. Nelsonville: Contact has been made with an independent holiness group in this place; some of whom are interested in Wesleyan work. The pastor, E. C. Bond, has become a member of our Conference, and in order

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to help crystalize the interest we took the tent to Nelsonville for a two-weeks' meeting. Results cannot be tabulated.

5. Oakfield: Another group of interested folk at Oakfield, Ohio, employed Brother Bond for a meeting. There were good results in the meeting, and they are looking our way.

6. Paden City: This project has been dealt with in a preceding paragraph.

7. Rittman: C. E. First has been pastoring a mission work in this locality, and at his request the work was taken under our supervision shortly after last Conference. The work is in good condition, and has been organized into a class.

8. Springfield: Earnest J. Haerr for some time has been conducting an independent work in Springfield. About a year ago he made overtures to us relative to a possible affiliation with our Conference. We have visited the work and kept in contact with it and have hopes of a Wesleyan church in this city.

We have had considerable misfortune with our tents this year. We thought last fall the Conference tent almost irreparable, but thanks to the help of the ladies from Africa and Westerville we managed to get the tent back in useable condition and have employed it in two meetings since. This spring we have also had access to the use of another tent which we employed in the meeting at Holliday's Cove. Due to the storms we have encountered the repair and maintenance of these tents has involved a great amount of labor and expense during the year.

We do appreciate the splendid financial and spiritual backing which the Conference has given us in our labors throughout the year. Your interest, your prayers, and your support have made possible the advances which we are reporting today. Finally, we do humbly thank God for the way He has owned and blessed and granted success to our human efforts in this field of pioneer evangelism.

Report No. 3

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON MORAL REFORM

We, the Ohio Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, recognizing the ever-increasing trend to evil, do pledge ourselves to wholeheartedly support every properly constituted effort toward moral reform and do especially urge our ministers and departmental leaders to give definite attention to the following:

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1. We recommend careful teaching concerning proper respect for the sacredness of the body, and for modesty of dress. Therefore, we do earnestly urge that all our women set a godly example as instructed in 1 Peter 3: 3, 4, "Whose adorning, let it not be that outward adorning of plaiting of the hair, and of wearing of gold, or of putting on of apparel, but let it be the hidden man of the heart, in that which is not corruptible, even the ornament of a meek and quiet spirit, which is in the sight of God of great price," and 1 Timothy 2: 9, 10, "In like manner also that women adorn themselves in modest apparel, with shamefacedness and sobriety; not with broided hair, or gold or pearls, or costly array; but (which becometh women professing godliness) with good works."

2. We further urge that our children be taught the facts of life so they may know the reasons for proper modesty in dress.

3. Deploring the tendency of nudity of body and limbs, and fearing the awful influx of immoralities after this demoralizing war, we do again urge that unitedly and individually we train our children and youth to wear apparel which does not tempt the opposite sex to sinful lusts that mar and destroy the soul.

4. We do further urge careful instruction of the Bible standards regarding divorce, the sanctity of marriage and the sacredness of the home.

5. Coveting the full blessing of Isaiah 58: 13, 14, we do urge the faithful teaching of the evils of Sabbath desecration, of drinking and of smoking and that we warn against the marijuana cigarette drug.

6. We strongly recommend that urgent protests be made against the anti-Christian and modern school program, which undermines the faith of our children and young people and tends to deify the sex life and remove the restraints of the same.

7. Again we urge upon our ministers:

a. A more definite and active opposition to the forces of intemperance, both in public messages and in private conversation.

b. We also recommend that both preachers and people write to our senators and representatives, urging them to whole-heartedly support all temperance and reform bills.

REPORT OF CAMP MEETING COMMITTEE

We, your Camp Meeting Committee, have sought during the past year to labor for the best interests of our people and for vital godliness in our midst which alone can commend us as children of God before the world. We have endeavored to give careful attention to both the material and spiritual requirements of the camp.

At the close of the last Conference year it became necessary to consider the employing of a new caretaker for the campground due to the failing health of Brother Oscar Marshall who has but recently been released from earthly labors and now, we believe, enjoys the delights of that never-ending camp meeting. Ehregott Schaefer was engaged as the new caretaker and immediately took up his labors.

In the month of September the Committee met in joint session with the Auxiliary Committee elected last Conference session to discuss possible

changes and regulations relative to the kitchen and dining hall. At this meeting it was agreed to change from the free-will offering plan of financing kitchen and dining hall needs. Later the following schedule of rates was outlined: single meals—breakfast, twenty cents; dinner and supper, twenty-five cents. Reduced rates were as follows: ten meals, \$1.75; fifteen meals, \$2.50; forty-two meals, \$6.50. Twenty cents per hour is to be paid those who work in kitchen and dining hall toward their camp expenses, they in turn to pay for their meals in cash.

In order to provide better oversight of and activities for the children during the time of Conference and Camp Meeting we engaged Miss Lucille Fisher as Children's Worker and Supervisor of Children's activities. At present, material facilities are not all we desire in this work but we purpose to provide increased facilities as needed.

There has been no construction of new Conference buildings during the year due to difficulties in purchase of materials and in securing labor. The Committee purchased thirty church pews from the Jelloway church to be used in the young people's tabernacle when it is built.

In engaging workers for the Camp Meeting services we have sought to secure those persons whom we believed would aid us in bringing about a deepening and strengthening among us on vital spiritual lines that would insure future days of genuine usefulness under God in a needy world.
