Journal of Daily Proceedings

The ninety-ninth session of the Iowa Annual Conference was opened in

Charles City, Iowa, Friday, August 8, 1952 at 2:00 p.m., with the singing of "My Saviour's Love," and "He Leadeth Me," led by Rev. L. Kenneth Knapp, Camp Meeting song evangelist.

Official Opening of Conference — Rev. Paul L. Kindschi, Conference President, declared the Conference to be officially opened with prayer offered by Rev. H. K. Sheets, Denominational W. Y. P. S. Secretary, and evangelist for the Comp Meeting. for the Camp Meeting.

Rev. L. Kenneth Knapp sang the special song, "The Prophet's Call."

Conference Sermon — Rev. Kindschi introduced Rev. F. L. Freiheit, who had be duly elected by the preceding Annual Conference to bring the Conference Sermon. Rev. Freiheit took for his subject, "The Power Of The Spirit," and based his message upon Scriptures as found in the book of Acts, chapter 1, verses 5 and 8, and chapter 2, verses 1 through 6 and 17 through 21. Rev. Freiheit stated that this is a day of mighty powers of many types, and that we need the power of the Holy Spirit. He also mentioned the fact that Jesus commanded his disciples to tarry for this power. To receive the Holy Spirit is conditional upon first being definitely saved, and then tarrying and praying until He, the Holy Spirit has come. Special Song — Rev. L. Kenneth Knapp sang, "My Sins Have Been Buried Down Deep."

Denominational Address — Dr. F. R. Birch was presented by the President, R. v. Paul L. Kindschi. Dr. Birch stressed the unifying effect of our publications. He also stated that these were one of the most important parts of our wrk. He mentioned the effective use of the Wesleyan Methodist in the organization of our church in Baltimore, Maryland. He urged membership in the Superannuated Minister's Pension Plan. It is the only provision made for the ministry of our church. If it is not used it is imeffective. He comended Home Missionary Department for its fine work. Dr. Birch stated that the Women's Missionary Society has harnessed the woman power of the church, and suggested that the Men's Fellowship could accomplish the same with the man power of the church. The Young Missionary Worker's Band has been a great factor in developing our interest in Foreign Missions. Dr. Birch stated his belief that the Sunday School is the most important department fo the church. The Wesleyan Young People's Society is the most promising department of the church. It is holding the teen agers that used to slip from our Sunday School. Dr. Birch mentioned the following things he felt we must emphasize: Scriptural Holiness, not traditional convictions of the elders. The emphasis of John Wesley if accepted around the world would bring the greatest revolution the world has ever known. This is the hour for the message. We need a new vision of our mandate; a new spirit of self-sacrifice and a fiercer loyalty. Dr. Birch closed address with prayer.

Adjournment was by motion. Rev. H. K. Sheets offered closing prayer.

Monday, August 11, 1952 - 9:00 a. m.

Conference was called to order by Rev. Kindschi, Conference President. Rev. Richard E. Ford led in singing, "Speak My Lord."

Kindschi suggested that this was not the last time Christians have shut themselves in for fear. They themselves shut the doors, for no other reason but fear. Doors are shut in the Iowa Conference for the same reason. Rev. Kindschi suggested that we must first decide what is right, then in a humble, Christ like way go about doing it. The following kinds of fear were mentioned: fear of what people will say; fear of not receiving proper credit; fear of mistakes. Into the midst of the disciples and their fears came Jesus, without opening the door; and said, "Peace be unto you." Then they opened the doors themselves. Let us be challenged to the great and seemingly. Rev. Kindschi called the body to their knees for prayer.

Report No. 5

CONFERENCE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the members of the Ninety Ninth Session of the Iowa Annual Conference, we herewith give greetings and present this report.

We do not choose to burden you with a long report for you will note the items listed under "Official Acts" and "Other Activities" as a summary of our past year in this office. Much credit is due Mrs. Kindschi without whose hours of secretarial work many of these activities could not have been added. of secretarial work many of these activities could not have been undertaken.

The slogan "Doubling In A Decade" was adopted by the Conference last year. This would necessitate at least a ten per cent gain in each church each year or a total gain of 10% for the Conference each year. Last year the gain was 4.7 per cent; this year the gain was 2.46 per cent. As you can see for the two year period we are already 12.87 per cent short of our goal. Let us again examine to see where the loss is.

Thirteen churches lost membership. Three of them were the same who lost members last year. One of them lost for the last two years. Seven churches held

their own with neither a loss or gain being recorded.

Past reports of this office will show that in the last three years we have been laying considerable stress on working with the existing churches in visits and various contacts. This was done in the hope that we might make the major gains where we all ready have the properties, pastors and organization. It may well be that a shift in emphasis is needed and that more attenttion and time toward organizing completely new churches and fields may best produce gains for His Kingdom.

We, on the other hand, are just getting started in an evangelistic effort throughout the Conference and it may mean that once momentum is gained we may go over the top in "Doubling in The Decade."

In the meantime, whatever course may be taken let none of us relax our labors or be found negligent of our responsibilities For God Is For Us!

MISSIONARY BOARD ACTIVITIES

Your Missionary Board begs to submit the following report:
1. The Board authorized the construction of a new building at Maywood Church in Waterloo, Iowa and voted \$1,000.00 from Conference Missions and

Card Call to assist in the same. The cement block 30 by 60 has been completed

and is now in use. Dedication will come sometime this fall.

The funds from the sale of the hockford, Iowa church are reported as \$1,,192.77 after all bills were paid. This money is being held in a separate fund by the conference treasurer for the Rockford Church until such time as they

will need it for building purposes.

3. The St. Paul, Minnesota church was given considerable attention this year. Finances for making much needed repairs and improvements on property was authorized. After a survey of the community around the church, a decline in interest and attendance, a failure to meet current operational costs and an action on the part of church membership to authorize the conference to sell the property, your board authorized the sale of it at the May 5, 1952 Board meeting with the understanding that all assistance paid by the conference by reimbursed to the Conference from the sale of the property after the mortgage and other outstanding bills are paid.

It is understood that the congregation will worship in other acceptable

quarters as soon as they might be secured after the sale of the property.

 Guthrie Center, Iowa church was given \$200.00 assistance toward the installation of a new \$800.00 furnace. The work is progressing well there.
 Cedar Falls, Iowa Church was authorized to proceed on the construction of a new 62 by 36 Brick church. The church was granted \$1000.00 from the Missionary Funds and Card Call along with \$1000.00 from the Denominational Church Extension Fund. Work is progressing rapidly on this fine new building and the good congregation hope to occupy the new structure early this fall.

Oskaloosa, Manchester and Des Moines cach came in for some help this year but have become quite largely self-supported and did not ask or

require more than granted in the financial report below.

7. Denison, Iowa required assistance for the first half of the year but have been successful in managing with very little aid since. Good work is being done and a few new people are now joining hands in the work of the Kingdom there.

McGrath, Minnesta took our attention this past year in that a Mr. T. R. Durkee has urged us to open a work in the country about 9 miles north of Mc Grath. This field is still under consideration and if things work out favorable a meeting may be held there to learn further the possibilities of the field.

9. Ft. Dodge, Iowa is another open field. Mr. and Mrs. John Schmidt have given invitation to open a church there and are pledging their support for the same. We surveyed the field and tried to locate a favorable place in which to hold services but to date have found none. We also investigated the possibility of purchasing a suitable lot on which to build but were not able to find one which seemed to be satisfactory. Further attention will be given Ft. Dodge this next year,

Special Report

The Camp Meeting Committee, desiring that the most fair and considerate judgement be made regarding the following matter, voted that this recommendation with explanaton be placed in the hands of delegates and Pastors as soon as possible. Thus, this material is given to you before the actual report is read to the Conference body.

Action taken by the 1951 Conference is as follows: "RESOLVED: That the Camp Meeting Committee be authorized to investigate tho-

roughly the possibility of renting the Riverview Park Camp Grounds at Cedar Falls, Iowa, for the 1953 Camp, with a report to be brought to the next Annual Conference." (Page 10, 1951 Conference Minutes)

2. The Camp Meeting Committee, following the authorization, has made further investigation and study and proposes the following recommendation: "Recommendation—motion passed that we have our 1953 Centennial Camp at Riverview Park Camp Crounds as a trial The units was in the true Medical Conference of the confer Riverview Park Camp Grounds as a trial. The vote was six to two. Motion passed that August 17-26, 1953 be the date of the Centennial Camp." (Iowa Camp Meeting Committee Minutes, May 5, 1952)

The Camp Meeting Committee recommends that pastors and delegates be subsidized in the following manner: 1. That one-half of housing cost of pastors, pastor's wives, church delegates, W.M.S. delegates, and W.Y.P.S. delegates be paid. 2. That all housing costs for pastor's dependent children be paid. In this manner housing costs would be equalized so that in no case would a pastor pay more than six dollars (\$6.00) for the total encampment housing. (Iowa Camp Committee Minutes, July 21, 1952)

The following considerations have led the Camp Committee to make these recommendations: 1. Centennial Year — The year 1953 completes our Conference Centennial year. The more adequate facilities of the Riverview Park Camp Grounds, accommodating more campers, would be a blessing. 2. The Centennial Year could strue "as a trial" according to the recommendation, allowing for careful consideration and decision concerning future grounds. 3. The needs of our grounds at Charles City are great, a. New Tabernacle b. New Dormitor-

ies and remodeling of old dormitories c. Kitchen and Dining Room equipment d. Installation of a sanitary system to provide proper facilities..... Why this proposal? a. The cost of building construction seems to prohibit an adequate improvement plan. b. The cost of maintenance of the improved ground would be very high. c. The question of stewardship of the Lord's money, when the grounds are only used for ten days, seems very pertinent. d. The problem of volunteer labor to maintain the grounds, even in their present condition, is becoming more and more difficult. e. The problem of securing organization, to rent our property, if improved, would be great, involving much pubicity, responsibility, and the risk of not being able to rent them.

- 5. A Comparison A careful check of Wesleyan potential in a forty mile radius of the Charles City grounds will reveal 144 church members, as compared to a potential in a forty mile radius of the Riverview Park Grounds, Cedar Falls 316 church members; in the Charles City area, 145 average attendance in Sunday School, within Cedar Falls area, 587 average attendance in Sunday School (Taken from 1951 Conference Minutes) This potential can mean a great deal in the effectiveness of the camp as a Conference Camp.
- 6. New Camp Facilities What are the facilities of the Riverview Camp Grounds? 1. The Name The Riverview Park Camp Grounds. 2. Owner Evangelical United Brethron Church. 3. Location Northeast corner of Cedar Falls, Iowa. 4. Property 26 acres . . . Main tabernacle seating 1200 1500, with some rooms. . . Missionary Hall, seating 400 450, with 5 large committee rooms, Prayer Chapel, seating 150 200, with 4 large committee rooms, full basement, two toilet rooms. . . Missionary Rest Cottage. . . Playground equipment: Softball, croquet, volley ball, swings, slides, sandboxes . . . 5. Housing Cottages, everything except sheets and towels furnished (including dishes, cooking utensils, stoves, heaters, furniture, beds, and all bedding), modern including sinks and tools some showers. Dormitories, modern. 6. Public Toilet facilities. . . complete sets, with showers. 7. Cafeterial meals available for those who care to use this service.
- 7. The Total Cost 1. For the Camp: Public buildings, dining hall \$270.00; Subsidies, Pastors and families \$468.00; Subsidies, Delegates \$175.00; Total COST TO CAMP \$913.00. 2. For Individuals: Visiting campers are accomodated for 60c per person per night, in cottages; 50c per person per night, in dormitories. Utilities additional: 1.25 per week per cottage for iron, radio, cooking, etc.
- 8. 'The Camp Meeting Committee is deeply concerned that each member of the Conference (pastors and delegates) study carefully this proposition and be prepared to make a reasonable decision as to what is best for the Conference as a whole in the total outreach and mission of God's Kingdom. May God give us all understanding and heavenly wisdom in our deliberations.

Standing Rules

- Conference President-Resolved, (1) That the Conference President be required, authorized and appointed to travel the Conference as President. having general supervision of the spiritual interests and benevolences thereof, holding at least one service at each church during the year under such date as he may announce in advance; (2) That he shall raise funds to meet the demands of the Conference work, assisted by the pastors, and he shall receive contributions for Missions, Education, and Superannuated Ministers, where there are no pastors; (3) That he shall have general supervision of the church property, and shall inquire into the titles of the same, to see that no property is loosely held, and shall look after the rental of Conference property, and see that the rent is turned into the treasury, and he shall investigate the possibility and feasibility of the sale of property not in use, and report his findings to the next Annual Conference; (4) That he shall be authorized to grant letters to disband classes; (5) That he shall be required to write non-resident members of the Conference asking them in case they cannot attend, to write the conference a letter of greeting and state the condition of their religious experience; (6) That he shall devote as much time as possible and as occasion may afford in evangelistic and other meetings in the Conference; (7) That he may engage help from time to time, as may be available, and who he may consider properly qualified to assist in holding Evangelistic and Quarterly Meetings, such help to be remunerat d from the Church Extenson Fund; (8) That he shall be paid from the Conference Budget the sum of sixty of dollars (\$60) per week for his services; the same to be paid monthly, in advance; he shall also be paid official expense, including secretarial help up to \$10 per week, and he shall also be paid rent as adjusted by the Camp Meeting Committee; (9) That he shall act, or appoint to act, as Fraternal Delegate to all denominational or inter-deniminational bodies, as he deems advisable.
- Legal Duties of Trustees-Resolved, that the duly-elected and qualified Trustees of the Annual Conference are hereby authorized and directed to sign for the purchase, sale, mortgaging and conveynce of real estate recom-mended by the Conference Missionary Board during the interim between the meeting of the Annual Conference, and all such action or actions shall be deem meeting of the Annual Conference, and all such action or actions shall be deemed to be legal and binding upon the Annual Conference, and as of full force and effect as they would have been if such actions on the part of the Trustees had been specially authorized by the Annual Conference. It is further resolved that the President and the Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall be authorized to sign on behalf of the Board of Trustees, all necessary papers in carrying out the authorized actions of the Board of Trustees, such signatures to be valid and binding as if all members of the Board of Trustees had signed said papers.

 III. Church Extension Fund — Resolved, that the Missionary Board is hereby authorized to pay out all monies from the Church Extension Fund.

- IV. Committee Reports Resolved, that all reports of Committees be made in writing, complete and ready for the printer, and handed to the Secretary at the earliest possible date after such report has been made.
- V. Camp Meeting Committee Resolved, (1) That the Camp ground property be under the care of the Camp Meeting Committee; (2) That this Committee shall have the power to engage workers beyond the present year; (3) That this Committee, together with the Conference Secretary, constitute the Orders Of The Day Committee.
- Sunday School Resolved that each Sunday School under the pastoral oversight of Wesleyan Methodist pastors shall be included in a separate

Statistical Report.

VII. Minutes — Resolved, that the Conference Secretary bill each church for number of minutes ordered by that church and that the Conference Secretary bill the Conference Fund for those minutes not ordered by individual churches.

VIII. Conference Officers — Resolved, that the officers, be installed during Conference, at a public service announced in advance, and office to take effect at rise of conference.

IX. Leave—Resolved, that no member shall leave the Conference Session without the permission of the President.

X. Pastor's Report—Resolved, that each ministerial member of our Conference report to his Quarterly and Annual Conferences: the number of sermons preached; prayer meetings attended; homes visited and pastoral calls made.

XI. Text Books—Resolved, that all persons shall be requested to bring the text books to Conference in which they are to be examined.

XII. Credentials—Resolved, that each Local and Annual Conference Preacher present their credentials at Conference for their renewal and proper signature.

XIII. Camp Meeting Fund—Resolved, (1) That all pledges and cash, received during the sessions of Conference and Camp Meeting, be placed in the Camp Meeting Fund unless otherwise designated; (2) That the incidental expenses of the Annual Conference, while in session, be paid from the Camp Meeting Fund.

XIV. Sunday School-Resolved, that Sunday School shall be held each Sunday of Conference and Camp Meeting.

XV. Death or Illness—Resolved, that the Conference Secretary be notified by phone in case of a death of critical illness in a minister's home, and that he shall send cards at once to each pastor.

XVI. Conference Fiscal Year—Resolved, that the Conference Fiscal Year close July 15th; that all money shall be in the hands of the proper Treasurers on, or before that date; that immediately thereafter, each pastor shall submit to the Conference Treasurer his budget check sheet with receipts covering same, and his statistical blank completed except for the budget section; that the Conference Treasurer shall fill in budget items and return to the pastor as soon as possible.

XVII. Moving Pastors—Resolved, that each charge make provision for moving expense of the moomnig pastor, within thirty days after the Annual Conference adjourns.

XVIII. Pastors Support During Conference—Resolved, that it be our plan that all pastors remain on their charges for one Sunday after Conference, and that the churches financial obligation to the pastor, whether he be leaving the field or not, be extended through that Sunday.

XIX. Minister's Vacation—Resolved, that he Conference President and all pastors be given a two weeks vacation with pay, with one Sunday absence from their pulpits.

XX. Camp Meeting Committee Member—Resolved, that the Conference President, and the Conference W. Y. P. S. President be members ex-efficio of the Camp Meeting Committee, and that the Committee be constituted of a total of ten members, elected by ballot for a term of three years each.

XXI. Publishing of Evangel-Resolved, that the Evangel be published

monthly; that the Editor be also Publisher; that he be nominated by a staff composed of President of the Conference, President of the W. M. S., President of the Conference W. Y. P. S., and the Conference Sunday School Secretary, and after being elected by the Conference, the manner of financing the publishing of the Evangel be left to the Editor and his staff.

XXII. Conference Date-Resolved that Camp Meeting begin the first Monday after the 3rd of August, that Conference open on Friday afternoon at 3:30 for Committee organization; that the Camp Meeting close on Sunday night;

that Conference close on Wednesday.
XXIII. Financial Secretary—Resolved, that the Conference shall elect a Financial Secretary for the Conference year, whose duty it shall be to study finances and bring recommendations to the Committee on Finance at the next Annual Conference, of which committee he shall be first member; he shall also work with the Statistical Secretary in figuring budget totals for each church to be entered on the statistical blanks. He shall also secure the services of a competent auditor to audit the book of the Conference.

XXIV. Budget Items-Resolved, that all Treasurers shall mark receipts

"Budget" or "Not Budget."

Committee on Statistics-Resolved, that a standing Committee on Statistics be elected consisting of Statistics Secretary and three other minister-

ial members. That three lay members be elected at opening of Conference.
