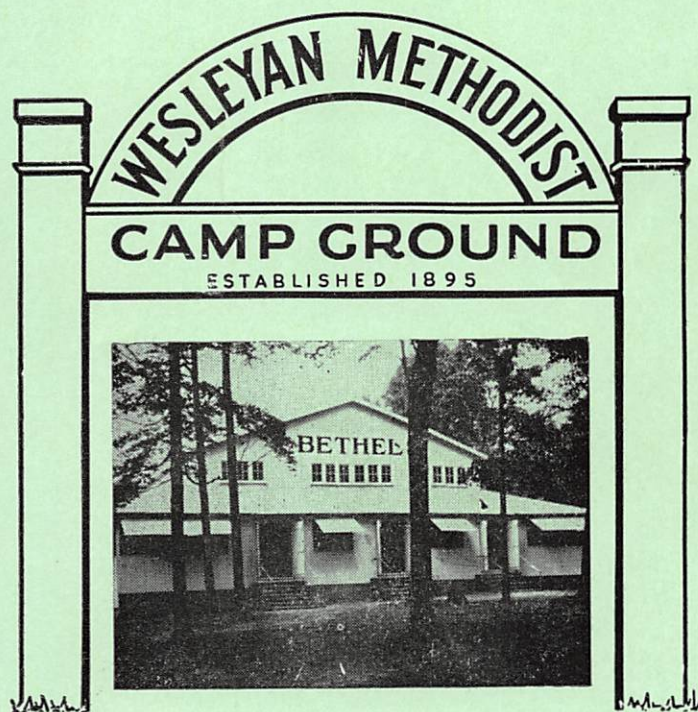

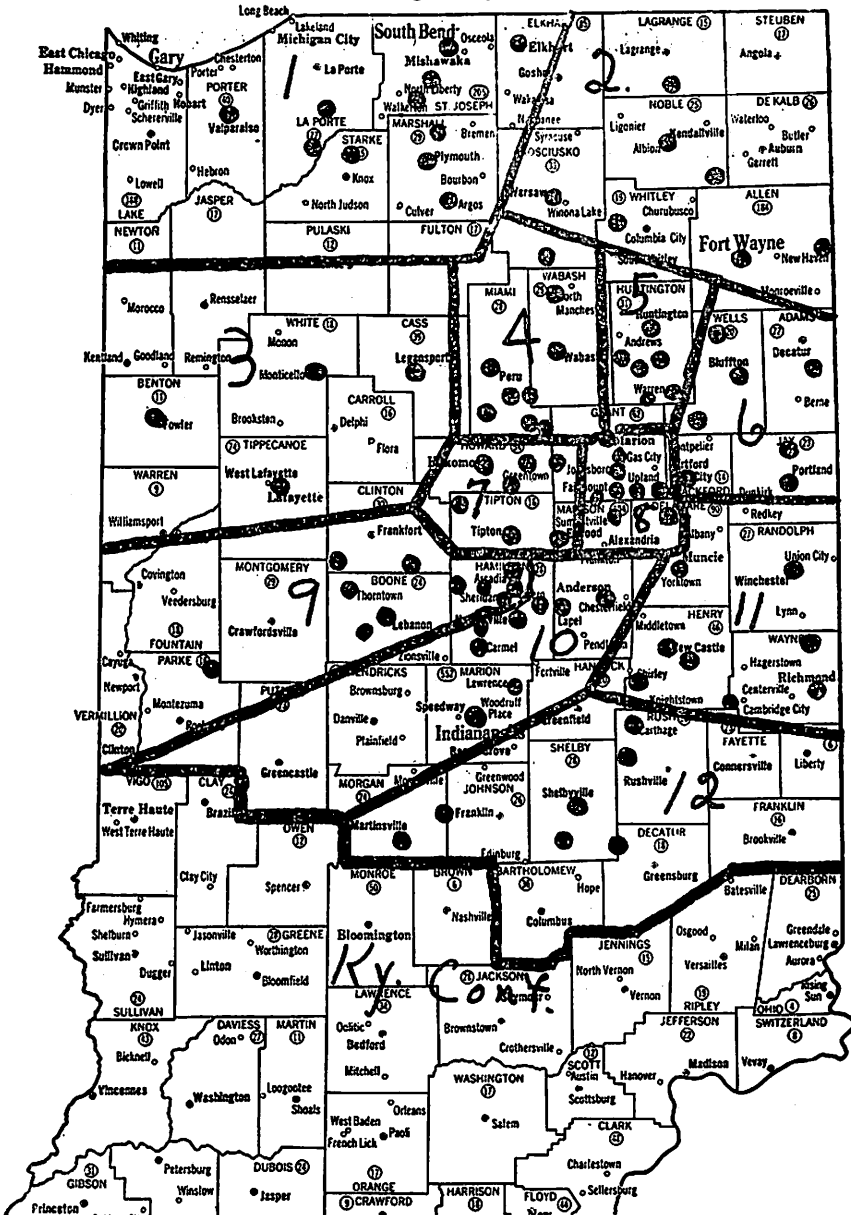

Journal of Daily Proceedings

The One Hundred Eighth session of the Indiana Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, convened on the Fairmount Campground, Fairmount, Indiana at 7:30 p.m. August the 6th, 1956.

Resolutions and Laws of the Indiana Conference

I. Houses of Worship.

1. Our houses of worship should not be open to any evangelist or minister of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain a regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments. A waiving of the above by a contract or lease of building must be obtained through the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference.

II. Pastoral Duties

1. It is the duty of the pastors to look after the insurance of our church and parsonage properties. All insurance shall provide for losses caused by fire and lightning, hail, and tornado. A failure on the part of the pastor shall be a censurable offense. If the church fails to insure their property upon reasonable effort of the pastor to secure, the same, then said failure shall be reported to the President of the Conference who shall then have the property insured. In such cases all insurance monies received from losses by fire, lightning, hail and tornado shall be used in Church Extension work as the Conference Board of Trustees considers best.

2. Each pastor and evangelist shall file a complete statistical report with the statistical committee without fail by July 10th.

A. The pastor shall report in open conference the items listed on special blanks furnished by the Conference.

B. The official character of any pastor or evangelist shall not be passed until he shall have submitted a satisfactory report including statistics.

C. When a pastor fails to raise, in full, the Superannuated Pension Budget, he shall report to the character committee a satisfactory reason for not doing so.

D. In compiling statistics report, all figures shall be given in even dollars at the nearest dollar, i.e., \$1.01 to \$1.50 shall be reported as \$1.00 and from \$1.51 to 1.99 shall be reported as \$2.00. The item number VIII on benevolences alone to be excepted and shall be reported exactly as paid.

3. All unaccounted for members appearing in the statistics in the membership list shall be referred to the discontinued list. All members in excess of the number reported shall be reported received.

4. All quarterly meetings shall be arranged for by the pastor and his advisory board and shall be held near the close of each fiscal quarter. The pastor shall report quarterly to the President and Vice President on blanks formulated by the President. This report shall be sent in immediately following the quarterly business meeting.

5. Each pastor should prepare a calling list of all the homes connected with the Church and Sunday school; listing the relationship they hold to the church; listing their names and addresses by city, street and number, the same to be kept for his own work while on the pastorate and to be given to his successor on the field.

6. No pastor whose total receipts are \$2500.00 or more shall hold more than two revivals yearly from his charge, one of which is mentioned in resolution seven under pastoral duties, unless by consent of the President and his Advisory Board.

7. Each pastor whose total pastor's receipt exceed \$2500.00 a year should seek to organize a new class or give his services in a revival meeting to a new or weaker church, to help establish it. The Church which he pastors should grant him such privilege without censure, with full remuneration of salary while in such a meeting. The Vice President shall serve as Co-ordinator, to recommend and help arrange such meetings.

8. Delegate's Credentials secured from the Secretary shall be mailed to the Assistant Secretary by the pastor, by July the 10th.

III. Churches

1. All charges should in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the pastor may live, a heating plant for that home, and, also, payment of utilities, including fuel, electricity, water, water-conditioning, and sewage, on a basis to be worked out between the pastor and the church. The parsonage telephone, except for personal long-distance calls, shall be considered as church incidental expense and paid for by the church.

2. All charges and stations to which a pastor shall move shall pay the moving and transportation expenses of said pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary. When the Conference demands the services of any one, that it shall bear the moving expenses, if any expense shall be incurred.

3. No charge shall call any one as pastor, or to supply the work by ministers coming from other denominations as long as there are ministers in our Conference qualified and available to take work. The President after he has exercised his prerogative in the reception of ministers coming from other denominations is to immediately refer them to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders, who shall make a thorough investigation as to the ministry and life of such applicants, who shall report their findings to the President, after which, appointments may be made.

4. Each charge should grant their pastor each year two weeks vacation with pay.

5. The Sunday School offerings of one Sunday of each month shall be divided equally by the local treasurer between "Home Missions" and "Conference Expense Fund" until these budgets are in full. The same to be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer, quarterly.

6. The Annual business meeting of the local church, which is referred to in Par. 165 (4) of the Discipline, shall be held during the month of June.

7. The chairman of the local Pulpit Supply should have been a delegate in the past three years.

IV. Conference.

1. Each Annual Conference shall be held at Fairmount, Indiana, beginning on the Tuesday nearest August eighth.

2. The first Sunday of the Annual Gathering belongs to the old conference year and the second Sunday of the Annual Gathering belongs to the new conference year, this applies to pastoral appointment.

3. The fiscal year begins July 1st and ends June 30.

4. The sitting of the Conference for each day is considered as one meeting.
5. In examination of characters the Conference officials shall be called first.
6. The President and his advisory board shall be consulted before any love offering shall be taken.
7. The Secretary and the Assistant Secretary constitute a committee on communications.
8. The Assistant Secretary is to act as reporter of the Conference to the Marion Daily papers.
9. The Treasurers shall submit their report by July 25th, to the Auditing Committee who shall audit the same and in their report to this body they shall show they have audited the same.
10. The Board of Trustees are authorized to act as the Conference Missionary Board.
11. The Board of Trustees shall authorize all disbursements not otherwise provided for.
12. The President shall receive \$100.00, the Vice President \$50.00, the Secretary \$100.00, the Treasurer \$300.00, the Assistant Secretary \$50.00, each member of the Auditing Committee \$25.00, each member of the Statistical Committee \$40.00; Pension Plan Treasurer \$100.00 and expenses; the expenses of the Committee on Itinerary and Elders Orders; the same to be paid from the Conference Expense Fund. The Conference Sunday School Secretary shall receive \$100.00 and each member of the Conference Sunday School Board \$50.00, the same to be paid out of the Sunday School Treasury.
13. The President of the Conference, and Vice President shall be given each year a two weeks vacation with pay, said vacation to be at a time of their own choosing.
14. When the churches which have been placed in the hands of the President decide as to who shall be their pastor before the Minutes are sent to press, the same shall be entered in the minutes as if ordered by this Conference.
15. The emergency Benefit Fund shall be used for the relief of ministers of the conference or their widows who shall make application to the Conference President for financial assistance in time of sickness or other emergency. This fund to be administered by the Conference Board of Trustees.
16. All churches receiving regular financial aid from the Conference Extension Fund shall be under the direction of the Missionary Board.
17. The Building Committee shall be elected by the Missionary Board except one member who shall be elected by the Conference.
18. The Conference Secretary is authorized to purchase a floral offering for the family in the event of death of any of our ministers. The same to apply to elders or conference preachers in the events of the death of the minister's husband, wife, son or daughter. The father and mother of the Conference Officials, who are not pastors, shall be included. When requested the price of the flowers shall be given as a missionary memorial. The memorial to be paid from the Conference Expense Fund.
19. In the election of President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer, the first ballot shall be a nominating ballot. The two names receiving the highest number of votes shall be the nominees.
20. The President shall call a meeting of the ministers and their wives in the different parts of the conference during the conference year. The purpose of this meeting is to promote the work of the conference.

The president shall set forth goals, suggest means of attaining these goals and in general seek to promote a greater interest in the Conference program. All pastors shall be required to attend this meeting except when a legitimate cause may hinder.

21. The President and the Vice President shall constitute the Executive Committee of the WESLEYAN MESSENGER, and the Vice President shall serve as Editor. This Executive Committee shall be empowered to select some person as Business and Circulation Manager. The departments which use the columns of the WESLEYAN MESSENGER regularly shall make contributions toward the expenses of the same.

V. Committees.

1. The Committee on Elders Orders is to transfer all persons to the study list who may have been recommended to travel and may not have been given work, providing they are meeting the disciplinary requirements in the course of study.

2. When recommendations to travel and to study preparatory to travel are presented to the Conference in session, they shall be recorded by the Secretary and automatically referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders, without having been read to the Conference.

3. The Camp Meeting Committee shall nominate and the Conference elect the one to preach the opening sermon of the next Conference Year with his alternate.

4. The Conference shall elect five members of the Camp Meeting Committee. Three of which are to be ministerial members, one to be elected each year for a term of three years; two to be lay members, one to be elected each year for a term of two years.

5. No building or major repair involving structural changes on church property shall be undertaken without the approval of the Conference Building Committee.

VI. Other Resolutions.

1. The use of the wedding ring is not in accord with our standards as a Church, therefore we as a Conference disapprove of our ministers performing or taking part in the ring ceremony.

VII. Burial Association.

1. Each local church should elect a Local Secretary for the Burial Association, whose duty it would be to promote the interests of the Association and to seek to obtain new members for the same. And if the church so elects, collect the dues of members and forward them to the General Secretary.

2. We earnestly request that the pastor present, or have presented, the work of the Burial Association at least once during the conference year, and seek to obtain new members for the same.

VIII. Pension Plan.

1. Let it be clearly understood by every member of the Conference that aside from the provisions of the Pension Plan the Conference has no

fund upon which to draw to meet the financial needs of the superannuated or permanently incapacitated ministers or their dependents.

2. Let it further understood by the membership of the Conference that following the rise of the 1952 Indiana Annual Conference any eligible minister who has failed to join the plan will have voluntarily waived his right, and that of his dependents, to any financial aid from the Conference in the case of his superannuation, or physical disability, which forced him to retire from active service within the Conference before or after the age of retirement.

3. Any person receiving a pastoral or general evangelist appointment, excepting those who were serving at the time of the 1954 annual conference or those appointed to such work at that conference, shall be required to become a member of the Superannuated Pension Plan.

Reports

Report No. 1

OFFICIAL ACTS OF THE PRESIDENT

1. August 17—At a special business meeting the Anderson, Arrow Avenue, church requested by vote that Don Grandlinard be appointed pastor. I granted the request and appointed Brother Grandlinard as their pastor.

2. August 24—The conference had approved the recommendation of the Pastoral Relations Committee to disband the Eaton, Ohio, church. On this date the Eaton church voted to sell their property and to disband the church. I, thereupon declared the Eaton, Ohio, church disbanded and issued letters of standing to the dispersing members in accordance with their action.

3. October 1—The death of Rev. Harold Fraker created vacancies in the following offices: Member of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders, Conference Tithing Secretary, and District Superintendent for Conference Extension in District Number 4. I referred these vacancies and the vacancy in the office of District Supt. for Conference Extension in District 1 to Rev. Kenneth Hutchens, Chairman of the Vacancy Committee with the request that he call his committee together soon to name successors.

4. October 3—At his request I granted a Letter of Transfer for Elder, Robert Vermilyea, to the Dakota Conference.

5. October 20—Since the sudden illness and death of Rev. H. I. Fraker, the pulpit of the West Eighth Street church has been supplied by Rev. Everett Mart. On this date I was informed that the church had by vote requested Rev. George Russell to become their pastor and he had accepted the call. I appointed George Russell pastor of the West Eighth Street church with his duties to begin November 6.

6. November 4—Received a Letter of Transfer for Elder Calvin Revis from the Kentucky Conference and appointed him to the work of Conference Evangelism.

7. November 22—Received a Letter of Transfer for Elder James: Chrispell from the Michigan Conference and appointed Brother Chrispell to the work of General Evangelism.

8. December 7—Received the resignation of James Wilson from the pastorate of the Hamlet church. The registration, which was due to the ill health of Sister Wilson, is effective as of December 25. I then appointed Brother Wilson to the work of Conference Evangelism.

9. December 22—Received a Letter of Transfer for Elder, Chester Leonard, from the Alabama Conference. Listed Brother Leonard under Other Labors as pastor of the Oak Ridge Friends church.

10. January 12—Received recommendations to Study and Travel for Local Preacher, Virgil Tucker, from the College church. I issued a Conference Preacher's License to Brother Tucker and appointed him to the work of Conference Evangelism.

11. January 12—Received the resignation of Marvin Baker from the pastorate of the Mt. Olive church. This resignation, which was due to ill health, is effective as of January 29. I then appointed Brother Baker to the work of Conference Evangelism.

12. January 20—Received a recommendation to the work of Song Evangelism for William Mangold from the Gas City church. I appointed

Brother Mangold as Song Evangelist.

13. January 29—At the request of the Mt. Olive church, I appointed Harold McIntire as supply pastor of their church with his duties to begin February 5.

14. February 27—Received a church of 10 members, organized by Kenneth Hutchens at Leith Street in Fort Wayne on February 9th. I declared this church to be a Wesleyan Methodist church and appointed Kenneth Hutchens as pastor.

15. April 5—Received a Letter of Transfer for Elder, Carl Riden, from the Tennessee Conference and appointed him to the work of Conference Evangelism.

16. May 12—Received a Letter of Transfer for Elder, Robert Klatt from the Lockport Conference and at his request placed his name on the available list for a pastorate.

Report No. 8**REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE AND APPROPRIATIONS**

We, the Committee on Finance and Appropriations submit the following recommendations:

Item I. Budget.

A. The budget apportionment shall be based as follows:

General Budget:

Foreign Missions	\$2.00 per full member
Home Missions	1.25 per full member
Australia25 per full member
Education	3.00 per full member
Hephzibah Orphanage25 per full member
Superannuated Pension Plan	1.50 per full member
Administrative Budget60 per full member

General Sunday School Work .15 per enrolled member in the main school as reported in the Conference Minutes of the preceeding year, under: (Total in main school).

Conference Expense	2.75 per full member
Camp Meeting Expense75 per full member
Emergency Benefit Fund50 per full member
Conference S. S. Work .10 per enrolled member in the main school (as above).	

For construction of Conference Parsonage No. 2 1.00 per full member

Minute Fund .50 per copy with a minimum of one for every six members of the church, or fraction thereof, and should any deficit occur, it shall be met from the Conference Expense Fund.

General Wesleyan Youth Dues 1.50 per active member of Wesleyan Youth.

B. In accordance with the Discipline, paragraph 377, exact assessments will be made for each church on the above basis and mailed to the respective pastors by the Conference Secretary within two weeks of the rise of this Conference session.

C. All church budget excepting that raised by the W.M.S., the Y.M.W.B., and Wesleyan Youth shall be sent to the conference treasurer.

Item II. Inasmuch as the Board of Administration has voted to locate the new general headquarters in Marion, and, inasmuch as the Conference Board of Trustees upon the strength of a promise of substantial financial help from citizens of Marion has pledged to be responsible for the first \$35,000 toward the purchase of the headquarters' location, the Rally Day Sunday School offering shall apply toward this obligation.

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Item III. The President shall have general supervision of the Work of the Conference.

A. The visitation schedule shall be so arranged that each church in the Conference shall be visited once during the year by either the President or the Vice-President.

B. The Vice President shall be responsible for the supervision and promotion of the Extension Work of the Conference, subject to the counsel and approval of the Missionary Board. Each quarter he shall visit each church or pastor that is regularly receiving conference support and/or under the direction of the Missionary Board to counsel, advise, and help those pioneer pastors and churches with their problems. The pastors of those churches are asked to make monthly reports to the Vice President. He shall pass on these reports either to the Missionary Board or its Executive Committee at least quarterly. He and the district superintendents shall be responsible to seek for openings throughout the Conference and report the same to the Missionary Board. It shall be his duty to see that funds are raised for Extension Work, and he shall be assisted in the promotion of this program by two other ministers nominated by the Pastoral Relations Committee and elected by this Conference. This committee of three shall meet at least quarterly.

C. Funds for Conference Extension.

1. A minimum goal of \$4.00 per full member shall be raised for conference extension.

2. The occasion of the annual tithing service shall be used for the promotion of and the raising of funds for Conference Extension, and these funds shall not be counted toward the goal.

D. There shall be nominated by the Pastoral Relations Committee and elected by the Conference, a District Superintendent for each of the Conference Districts, who will assist the Vice President in carrying out the Conference Extension work. It shall be their duty to inform the Vice President of any possible openings for the extension of the work of the church in their respective districts. They shall assist in the raising of Conference Extension Funds. The pastors in each district are urged to co-operate and expected to do so.

Item IV. The salary of the President shall be \$325.00 per month plus utilities (including fuel, electricity, water, water-conditioning and sewage), and that of the Vice President \$275.00 plus utilities; the same to be paid by the Conference Treasurer monthly, with expenses incidental to their work. The Vice President shall receive \$40.00 per month parsonage rent. The President and Vice President shall employ secretarial help as needed, to be paid for from Conference Expense.

Item V. The Conference Board of Trustees shall be authorized to construct conference parsonage number two during this conference year on the lots at the corner of 38th and Race Streets.

Item VI. Standing Rules.

A. Under the Resolutions and Laws of the Conference, Item III, paragraph 1 shall be changed to read as follows: "All charges should in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the pastor may live, a heating plant for that home, and, also, payment of the utilities, including fuel, electricity, water, water-conditioning, and sewage, on a basis to be worked out between the pastor and the church. The parsonage telephone, except for personal long-distance calls, shall be considered as church incidental expense and paid for by the church."

B. The following shall become a standing rule: "All quarterly meetings shall be arranged for by the pastor and his advisory board and

shall be held near the close of each fiscal quarter. The pastor shall report quarterly to the President and Vice President on blanks formulated by the President. This report shall be sent in immediately following the quarterly business meeting."

C. The following shall also become a standing rule: "The President and the Vice President shall constitute the Executive Committee of the WESLEYAN MESSENGER, and the Vice President shall serve as Editor. This Executive Committee shall be empowered to select some person as Business and Circulation Manager. The departments which use the columns of the WESLEYAN MESSENGER regularly shall make contributions toward the expenses of the same."

D. The following shall also become a standing rule: "The President shall call a meeting of the ministers and their wives in the different parts of the conference during the conference year. The purpose of this meeting is to promote the work of the conference. The President shall set forth goals, suggest means of attaining these goals, and in general seek to promote a greater interest in the Conference program. All pastors shall be required to attend this meeting except when a legitimate cause may hinder."

Tuesday 1 p. m.

The twenty-seventh session of the Indiana Wesleyan Youth Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America convened in the Young Peoples' Tabernacle on the Fairmount Campground, Fairmount, Indiana, at 1 p.m., August 7, 1956.

Opening—Congregational singing was led by the Rev. Bill Degenkolb. The Rev. and Mrs. Degenkolb sang, "When We See Christ." Devotions were conducted by the Rev. Robert W. McIntyre, General Secretary of Wesleyan Youth, who spoke on, "What Is Truth?" based on John 18:38.

Call to Order—The conference was called to order by the president, Don H. Polston.

Roll Call—Four officers, 3 district chairmen, 3 Camp Meeting Committee members, 11 presidents and 39 delegates answered the roll call.

Conference Bar—The conference bar was fixed as the first six rows of seats including the rostrum, by vote of the conference.

Motion—It was moved and supported that we seat the pastors as honorary members of the conference and that they have the right to speak on any question.

President's Message—The president read his annual message and upon motion it was accepted.

Calendar of Business—The president presented the Calendar of Business and Special Orders. Upon motion those were adopted. (See Report No. 1)

Election of Committees—The report of the Nominating Committee was read and upon vote was adopted as amended. (See Report N. 2) read and upon vote was adopted as amended. (See Report No. 2)

Report—The Auditing Committee reported. Report adopted by vote. (See Report No. 3)

Special Order—The Special Order, reports of district chairmen, was called. Report from district 1 was read and approved. Reports from districts 7, 12, 11, 6, 2, and 4 were read.

Adjournment—Adjourned by limitation of time.

Report—The Wesleyan Youth treasurer reported and upon motion the report was adopted. (See Report No. 4)

Motion—It was moved and supported that the first ballot cast for the remaining conference officers be a nominating ballot.

Election—Since Barbara Coalson was unable to attend the conference, Rev. Robert Rinkenberg was elected to fill the vacancy on the Resolutions Committee.

Adjournment—Adjourned by limitation of time.

Thursday 1 p. m.

Standing Rules

1. The first session of the Wesleyan Youth Conference shall convene Tuesday afternoon of conference week at one o'clock, and sessions shall continue daily until all business is transacted.

2. The president shall appoint the chairman of each committee, and the executive council shall nominate the rest of the members of the committee; their report to be read and voted upon in the first session of annual conference.

3. All organized locals keep permanent records of membership and finances. The list of members shall be revised at the close of each conference year.

4. The Finance and Appropriations Committee shall be composed of five members elected by the Wesleyan Youth Conference and a sixth member chosen from and by the Committee on Finance and Appropriations, of the main conference body.

5. There shall be a Wesleyan Youth Camp Meeting Committee of five members. The president of the Wesleyan Youth shall be chairman ex-officio; the other four members to be elected for a term of four years. One shall be elected annually or until their successor is elected; so that the term of all will not expire at the same time. The Wesleyan Youth Camp Meeting shall elect one of its members as treasurer of the Youth Camp.

6. There shall be a Youth Camp of one week duration and the date of the camp shall be set by the Wesleyan Youth Camp Meeting Committee.

7. Members of the Executive Council shall not hold the office of District Chairman, but shall work in co-operation with and under the direction of the president.

8. There shall be elected an assistant secretary whose duty shall be to assist the secretary and to compile the statistics. The secretary shall be given the privilege of making the nomination.

9. All churches shall send their delegates credentials and statistical report to the secretary by July 5.

10. The Executive Council of the Wesleyan Youth shall have complete charge of helping new works.

11. The local president shall consult with the pastor when making out their annual Wesleyan Youth report, to avoid inconsistencies in the same.

12. Copies of the report of the Finance and Appropriations Committee shall be mailed within three weeks after the close of Conference, one copy to each District Chairman, pastor, and local president. These reports shall be carefully presented to each local by its president as soon as soon after conference as possible.

13. Special mention will be made of all societies raising full budget.

THE INDIANA CONFERENCE

14. The executive committee of each local Wesleyan Youth should consult with the pastor and his board of stewards before planning its financial program for the year.

15. All money raised by the locals, other than local projects, shall be sent to the conference Wesleyan Youth treasurer not later than July 5.

16. There shall be a missionary committee elected by each local, who shall be responsible for one missionary service each month.

17. The Wesleyan Youth treasurer shall pay from the Conference Expense Fund each year the sum of twenty-five dollars toward the expense of printing the minutes. The Wesleyan Youth secretary shall co-operate with the conference secretaries in determining the number of pages used.

18. The Camp Meeting Committee shall be seated as members of the Conference.

19. Each district shall elect an adult counselor to counsel and assist in the plans of the district. This advisor may be beyond the age of membership in Wesleyan Youth.

20. That the General Wesleyan Youth Efficiency Standard be adopted and promoted and that each society rating be reported in the annual statistical reports.

21. That the area president receive entertainment and traveling expenses while traveling our conference, the same to be paid by the group asking his service.

Report No. 5

REPORT OF THE FINANCE AND APPROPRIATIONS
COMMITTEE

I. Rallies

We recommend that each district co-operate with the following conference program as to rallies:

A. That quarterly rallies and, if possible, monthly rallies be held in each district, and that each church be notified at least two Sundays previously, and that notices of said rallies be sent to pastors and local presidents. If no other system is being provided by the district, rallies should be held on the fifth Sunday when it occurs.

B. As the Scripture recognizes that Christ grew in wisdom (education), stature (physical), and in favor with God (spiritual), and man (social), we too suggest that the rallies be as equally well balanced in their interests.

C. That a promotional rally be held in each district, as soon as possible after conference, under supervision of the Conference Executive Council and district chairmen, and that the Executive Council be authorized to secure workers for this rally.

D. The president or vice president shall participate in a rally in each district during the months of April or May for the purpose of promoting the May 30th rally and Youth Camp, with a special evangelistic emphasis.

E. That the district chairmen call a meeting of the local presidents, district officers, and district adult counselor as a part of the promotional rally and in conjunction with work shops conducted by members of the Executive Council. The president shall work with the district officers and local presidents, the vice president with local program chairmen, the secretary with local secretaries, and the treasurer with local treasurers.

F. That the Executive Council call a meeting of all district chairmen semi-annually. These meetings are to be held on Saturday of conference week and May 30th.

G. The local president shall be responsible to see that each active and associate member signs a membership card annually. No one shall be reported as a member until the pledge card is signed.

H. That the following point system for district banner be adopted: local president or vice president present at rally, 5 points; pastor present, 5 points; for each 1% of active members present (to be based on the current number of members), 1 point; for each non-member present, 1 point;

for each mile traveled to the rally site, 1 point. The reports of at least the highest two shall be read at the rally and the society with the highest total is to be the winner.

I. That the conference print and distribute to the local societies suitable blanks to implement the point system.

J. That there be a conference rally held on the Campground on Memorial Day, and that the conference banner be awarded on the basis of an efficiency standard modeled after the Wesleyan Youth efficiency standard as prepared by the Executive Council by the time of the promotional rally.

II. Projects

A. For conference project we recommend the following:

1. As befits our interest in the education of the Wesleyan Youth, we would seek to express our interests in the future development of Marion College to the extent of the purchase price of one of seventeen acres of land. The funds for this purchase are to be raised by the districts.

2. In keeping with the emphasis of the church extension program that we offer services or finances needed for at least one evangelistic campaign or survey this year, and that this assistance be rendered in such area as deemed advisable by the Conference Board of Trustees, and to such extent as deemed advisable by the Executive Council.

3. In view of the fact that a Bible quiz program has been initiated for the 1957 Youth Camp, a special committee of three members shall be elected to implement state-wide participation and preparation for this.

B. For locals we recommend the following: That each local plan visitation programs and special meetings with members of the local such as jail services, hospital and shut-in visitations, distributing tracts, radio programs, and street meetings.

C. That the desk and traveling expenses of the president, vice president, secretary, and treasurer, be paid from the Youth Conference Expense Fund; and the desk and traveling expenses of the Youth Camp Committee be paid from the Youth Camp Treasury and the said expenses be paid at least quarterly. That traveling expense be figured on the basis of 7 cents per mile.

III. Finance

For finance we recommend the following:

A. That the salary of the conference officers be as follows:

1. President—\$120.00
2. Vice President—\$50.00
3. Secretary—\$75.00
4. Treasurer—\$75.00
- y. Assistant Secretary—\$10.00

Said salary to be paid in equal payments, on December 5, and the other June 1.

B. That the desk and traveling expenses of the president, vice president, secretary, and treasurer, be paid from the Youth Conference Expense Fund; and the desk and traveling expenses of the Youth Camp Committee be paid from the Youth Camp Treasury and the said expenses be paid at least quarterly. That traveling expense be figured on the basis of 7 cents per mile.

C. That the budget for the following year be as follows:

1. General Dues, \$1.50 per active member of the local.
2. Conference Budget (based on church membership)
 - a. \$.20, Conference Extension Fund
 - b. \$.25, Youth Conference Expense Fund
 - c. \$.20, Youth Camp Fund

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3. On the basis of the above apportionment exact assessments for each item shall be made for each local and mailed to the pastors and local presidents by the conference secretary within two weeks of the rise of this conference session.

4. That above funds be sent in quarterly on remittance blanks furnished by the conference. Inasmuch as this is based on church membership, the church should feel its responsibility to aid the local when necessary.

D. That the Executive Council shall have power to appropriate money from the Youth Conference Expense Fund for the general promotion of the Youth work.

E. That all monies raised within the local for missions be forwarded to the Wesleyan Youth Conference Treasurer for departmental credit and that said money be raised by monthly missionary offerings and be sent in quarterly with the Wesleyan Youth budget.

IV. Standing Rules

A. That the General Wesleyan Youth Efficiency Standard be adopted and promoted and that each society rating be reported in the annual statistical reports.

B. That the area president receive entertainment and traveling expenses while traveling our conference, the same to be paid by the group asking his service.

C. We recommend that Standing Rule No. 12 be changed to read: "Copies of the report of the Finance and Appropriations Committee shall be mailed within three weeks after the close of Conference, one copy to each District Chairman, pastor, and local president. These reports shall be carefully presented to each local by its president as soon after conference as possible.

C. Be it resolved:

2. That we recognize and fulfill our responsibility to our local churches in regular and special services, seeking the will of God in order to render a better service.

E. We offer the following recommendations:

1. That youth rallies be very carefully planned and APPEALINGLY ADVERTISED, and that the locals give their whole-hearted support to the same;
2. That Youth Week be observed by all locals, and that speakers, as the spirit directs, deal with the more serious phases of youth problems;
3. That the local co-operate with their district chairman in the conference program of Bible Quiz Teens;
4. That each local strive to increase their subscriptions to the WESLEYAN YOUTH by at least 10 percent.

Tuesday 1:00 p. m.

The President, Mrs. Elizabeth Leach, called the conference to order. Mrs. Eilene Kindley offered the opening prayer. Mrs. Alberta Metz, director of music for this session led the congregational singing accompanied by Mrs. Ruth Landis, pianist for this session.

Devotions were conducted by Mrs. June Huffman, Conference Prayer Partner Secretary. She read Psalm 19 and gave helpful comments concerning "our words" and "the Word." Kathryn Beaver led us to the throne of grace in prayer.

We were favored with a special number in song entitled, "My Word Shall not Pass Away" by Mr. and Mrs. Howard Coolman.

5 Conference Officials, 39 Presidents and 61 delegates responded to the calling of the roll.

By vote the Conference bar was set to include the first fourteen pews in each tier.

The President gave her annual message, which upon motion was accepted. (See Report No. 1)

The report of the Nominating Committee was read and adopted by vote. (See Report No. 2)

The Secretary read the minutes of the meetings of the Executive Board held the past Conference year.

The Auditing Committee gave their report which upon motion was adopted. (See Report No. 3)

The Treasurer gave her annual report and stated that this was the largest report she had been privileged to give as our Treasurer. The report was accepted by vote. (See Report No. 10)

The Courtesy Committee presented Mrs. Ruby Reisdorph, the General W.M.S. President, who expressed appreciation for the Indiana women and brought greetings from the General Executive Board. She also introduced the recently elected General Treasurer, our own Mrs. Ruth Felton, who has already assumed the duties of her new office.

Adjourned by motion.

Wednesday 8:00 a. m.

An inspirational song service was conducted by Mrs. Alberta Metz. The Spirit's presence was very precious near as we sang together, "My Desire to be Like Jesus."

A fine group of children from the Greentown Band under the direction of Mrs. Alma Crow, gave an interesting program including a rhythm band playing "Onward Christian Soldiers," a children's choir singing a number of Missionary songs and choruses and a vocal duet. Mrs. Crow also conducted some memorization of scripture and the presentation of a missionary train.

Mrs. Ruby Reisdorph, General W.M.S. President, presented the need for funds to promote the printing ministry in Colombia, South America. An offering amounting to \$75.00 was lifted for this purpose.

Congregational singing of the hymns "Jesus Saves" and "Send the Light" was conducted by Mrs. Alberta Metz with Mrs. Ruth Landis and Miss Joyce Cheeseman presiding at the instruments.

Miss Gracia Fero, Editor of the Wesleyan Missionary, offered prayer.

A group of children from the Greentown Y.M.W.B. sang some missionary songs and played a rhythm band number.

A ladies sextet composed of Marcella Klinger, Aimee Crowe, Alberta Metz, Madaline Smith, Edna Wildey and Thelma Jones brought a special number in song entitled, "The Sweet Old Story."

Rev. and Mrs. George Huff, who have recently returned to the States following a term of service on the African field, were introduced. Mrs. Huff brought greetings and spoke briefly. Rev. Once again through Divine Providence we have assembled here on the Fairmount Campgrounds to mingle together in Christian Fellowship. We have not come only to renew acquaintances, but, we have assembled to do business for the Master, and to plan to fulfill the purpose and objective of our organization.

The book of Discipline states, "The purpose of our organization is to extend the kingdom of God in the home and foreign fields, by increasing the knowledge of missions, stimulating interest, therein, and encouraging a spirit of prayer and giving for the work. The objective of the Missionary Society is to secure systematic cooperation throughout the conference in the interest of home and foreign missions."
