



Resolutions and Laws of the Indiana Conference

I. Houses of Worship.

1. Our houses of worship should not be open to any evangelist or minister of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain a regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments. A waiving of the above by a contract or lease of building must be obtained through the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference.

II. Pastoral Duties

1. It is the duty of the pastors to look after the insurance of our church and parsonage properties. All insurance shall provide for losses caused by fire and lightning, hail, and tornado. A failure on the part of the pastor shall be a censurable offense. If the church fails to insure their property upon reasonable effort of the pastor to secure, the same, then said failure shall be reported to the President of the Conference who shall then have the property insured. In such cases all insurance monies received from losses by fire, lightning, hail and tornado shall be used in Church Extension work as the Conference Board of Trustees considers best.

2. Each pastor and evangelist shall file a complete statistical report

with the statistical committee without fail by July 10th.

A. The pastor shall report in open conference the items listed on

special blanks furnished by the Conference.

B. The official character of any pastor or evangelist shall not be passed until he shall have submitted a satisfactory report including statistics.

When a pastor fails to raise, in full, the Superannuated Pension Budget, he shall report to the character committee a satisfactory

reason for not doing so.

D. In compiling statistics report, all figures shall be given in even dollars at the nearest dollar, i.e., \$1.01 to \$1.50 shall be reported as \$1.00 and from \$1.51 to 1.99 shall be reported as \$2.00. The item number VIII on benevolences alone to be excepted and shall be reported exactly as paid.

3. All unaccounted for members appearing in the statistics in the membership list shall be referred to the discontinued list. All members in

excess of the number reported shall be reported received.

4. All quarterly meetings shall be arranged for by the pastor and his advisory board and shall be held near the close of each fiscal quarter. The pastor shall report quarterly to the President and Vice President on blanks formulated by the President. This report shall be sent in immediately following the quarterly business meeting.

5. Each pastor should prepare a calling list of all the homes connected with the Church and Sunday school; listing the relationship they hold to the church; listing their names and addresses by city, street and number, the same to be kept for his own work while on the pastorate and

to be given to his successor on the field.

No pastor whose total receipts are \$2500.00 or more shall hold more than two revivals yearly from his charge, one of which is mentioned in resolution seven under pastoral duties, unless by consent of the

President and his Advisory Board.

7. Each pastor whose total pastor's receipt exceed \$2500.00 a year should seek to organize a new class or give his services in a revival meeting to a new or weaker church, to help establish it. The Church which he pastors should grant him such privilege without censure, with full remuneration of salary while in such a meeting. The Vice President shall serve as Co-ordinator, to recommend and help arrange such meetings.

8. Delegate's Credentials secured from the Secretary shall be mailed

to the Assistant Secretary by the pastor, by July the 10th.

III. Churches

1. All charges should in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the pastor may live, a heating plant for that home, and, also, payment of utilities, including fuel, electricity, water, water-conditioning, and sewage, on a basis to be worked out between the pastor and the church. The parsonage telephone, except for personal long-distance calls, shall be considered as church incidental expense and paid for by the church.

2. All charges and stations to which a pastor shall move shall pay the moving and transportation expenses of said pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary. When the Conference demands the services of any one, that it shall bear the moving expenses, if any expense shall

be incurred.

3. No charge shall call any one as pastor, or to supply the work by ministers coming from other denominations as long as there are ministers in our Conference qualified and available to take work. The President after he has exercised his prerogative in the reception of ministers coming from other denominations is to immediately refer them to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders, who shall make a thorough investigation as to the ministry and life of such applicants, who shall report their findings to the President, after which, appointments may be made.

4. Each charge should grant their pastor each year two weeks vaca-

tion with pay.

5. The Sunday School offerings of one Sunday of each month shall be divided equally by the local treasurer between "Home Missions" and "Conference Expense Fund" until these budgets are in full. The same to be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer, quarterly.

6. The Annual business meeting of the local church, which is referred

to in Par. 165 (4) of the Discipline, shall be held during the month of

June.

The chairman of the local Pulpit Supply should have been a delegate in the past three years.

IV. Conference.

1. Each Annual Conference shall be held at Fairmount, Indiana, be-

ginning on the Tuesday nearest August eighth.

2. The first Sunday of the Annual Gathering belongs to the old conference year and the second Sunday of the Annual Gathering belongs to the new conference year, this applies to pastoral appointment.

3. The fiscal year begins July 1st and ends June 30.

4. The sitting of the Conference for each day is considered as one meeting.

5. In examination of characters the Conference officials shall be called first.

6. The President and his advisory board shall be consulted before any love offering shall be taken.

7. The Secretary and the Assistant Secretary constitute a committee

on communications.

8. The Assistant Secretary is to act as reporter of the Conference to

the Marion Daily papers.

9. The Treasurers shall submit their report by July 25th, to the Auditing Committee who shall audit the same and in their report to this body they shall show they have audited the same.

10. The Board of Trustees are authorized to act as the Conference

Missionary Board.

11. The Board of Trustees shall authorize all disbursements not oth-

erwise provided for.

12. The President shall receive \$100.00, the Vice President \$50.00, the Secretary \$100.00, the Treasurer \$300.00, the Assistant Secretary \$50.00, each member of the Auditing Committee \$25.00, each member of the Statistical Committee \$40.00; Pension Plan Treasurer \$100.00 and expenses; the expenses of the Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders; the same to be paid from the Conference Expense Fund. The Conference Sunday School Secretary shall receive \$100.00 and each member of the Conference Sunday School Board \$50.00, the same to be paid out of the Sunday School Treasury.

13. The President of the Conference, and Vice President shall be given each year a two weeks vacation with pay, said vacation to be at a

time of their own choosing.

14. When the churches which have been placed in the hands of the President decide as to who shall be their pastor before the Minutes are sent to press, the same shall be entered in the minutes as if ordered by this Conference.

15. The emergency Benefit Fund shall be used for the relief of ministers of the conference or their widows who shall make application to the Conference President for financial assistance in time of sickness or other emergency. This fund to be administered by the Conference Board of Trustees.

16. All churches receiving regular financial aid from the Conference Extension Fund shall be under the direction of the Missionary Board.

17. The Building Committee shall be elected by the Missionary Board

except one member who shall be elected by the Conference.

18. The Conference Secretary is authorized to purchase a floral offering for the family in the event of death of any of our ministers. The same to apply to elders or conference preachers in the events of the death of the minister's husband, wife, son or daughter. The father and mother of the Conference Officials, who are not pastors, shall be included. When requested the price of the flowers shall be given as a missionary memorial. The memorial to be paid from the Conference Expense Fund.

19. In the election of President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer, the first ballot shall be a nominating ballot. The two names receiv-

ing the highest number of votes shall be the nominees.

20. The President shall call a meeting of the ministers and their wives in the different parts of the conference during the conference year. The purpose of this meeting is to promote the work of the conference.

The president shall set forth goals, suggest means of attaining these goals and in general seek to promote a greater interest in the Conference program. All pastors shall be required to attend this meeting except when a

legitimate cause may hinder.

21. The President and the Vice President shall constitute the Executive Committee of the WESLEYAN MESSENGER, and the Vice President shall serve as Editor. This Executive Committee shall be empowered to select some person as Business and Circulation Manager. The departments which use the columns of the WESLEYAN MESSENGER regularly shall make contributions toward the expenses of the same.

V. Committees.

1. The Committee on Elders Orders is to transfer all persons to the study list who may have been recommended to travel and may not have been given work, providing they are meeting the disciplinary requirements in the course of study.

2. When recommendations to travel and to study preparatory to travel are presented to the Conference in session, they shall be recorded by the Secretary and automatically referred to the Committee on Itineracy

and Elders Orders, without having been read to the Conference.

3. The Camp Meeting Committee shall nominate and the Conference elect the one to preach the opening sermon of the next Conference Year

with his alternate.

4. The Conference shall elect five members of the Camp Meeting Committee. Three of which are to be ministerial members, one to be elected each year for a term of three years; two to be lay members, one to be elected each year for a term of two years.

5. No building or major repair involving structural changes on church property shall be undertaken without the approval of the Conference Build-

ing Committee.

VI. Other Resolutions.

1. The use of the wedding ring is not in accord with our standards as a Church, therefore we as a Conference disapprove of our ministers performing or taking part in the ring ceremony.

VII. Burial Association.

1. Each local church should elect a Local Secretary for the Burial Association, whose duty it would be to promote the interests of the Association and to seek to obtain new members for the same. And if the church so elects, collect the dues of members and forward them to the General Secretary.

2. We earnestly request that the pastor present, or have presented, the work of the Burial Association at least once during the conference

year, and seek to obtain new members for the same.

VIII. Pension Plan.

1. Let it be clearly understood by every member of the Conference that aside from the provisions of the Pension Plan the Conference has no

fund upon which to draw to meet the financial needs of the superannuated

or permanently incapacitated ministers or their dependents.

2. Let it further understood by the membership of the Conference that following the rise of the 1952 Indiana Annual Conference any eligible minister who has failed to join the plan will have voluntarily waived his right, and that of his dependents, to any financial aid from the Conference in the case of his superannuation, or physical disability, which forced him to retire from active service within the Conference before or after the age of retirement.

3. Any person receiving a pastoral or general evangelist appointment, excepting those who were serving at the time of the 1954 annual conference or those appointed to such work at that conference, shall be required to become a member of the Superannuated Pension Plan.

General Wesleyan Youth Dues 1.50 per active member of Wesleyan Youth.

B. In accordance with the Discipline, paragraph 377, exact assessments will be made for each church on the above basis and mailed to the respective pastors by the Conference Secretary within two weeks of the rise of this Conference session.

C. All church budget excepting that raised by the W.M.S., the Y.M.W.B., and Wesleyan Youth shall be sent to the conference treasurer.

Item II. Inasmuch as the Board of Administration has voted to locate the new general headquarters in Marion, and, inasmuch as the Conference Board of Trustees upon the strength of a promise of substantial financial help from citizens of Marion has pledged to be responsible for the first \$35,000 toward the purchase of the headquarters' location, the Rally Day Sunday School offering shall apply toward this obligation.

The President shall have general supervision of the Work Item III. of the Conference.

The visitation schedule shall be so arranged that each church in the Conference shall be visited once during the year by either the Presi-

dent or the Vice-President.

The Vice President shall be responsible for the supervision and promotion of the Extension Work of the Conference, subject to the counsel and approval of the Missionary Board. Each quarter he shall visit each church or pastor that is regularly receiving conference support and/or under the direction of the Missionary Board to counsel, advise, and help those pioneer pastors and churches with their problems. The pastors of those churches are asked to make monthly reports to the Vice President. He shall pass on these reports either to the Missionary Board or its Executive Committee at least quarterly. He and the district superintendents shall be responsible to seek for openings throughout the Conference and report the same to the Missionary Board. It shall be his duty to see that funds are raised for Extension Work, and he shall be assisted in the promotion of this program by two other ministers nominated by the Pastoral Relations Committee and elected by this Conference. This committee of three shall meet at least quarterly.

. Funds for Conference Extension.
1. A minimum goal of \$4.00 per full member shall be raised for conference extension.

The occasion of the annual tithing service shall be used for the promotion of and the raising of funds for Conference Extension, and these

funds shall not be counted toward the goal.

D. There shall be nominated by the Pastoral Relations Committee and elected by the Conference, a District Superintendent for each of the Conference Districts, who will assist the Vice President in carrying out the Conference Extension work. It shall be their duty to inform the Vice President of any possible openings for the extension of the work of the church in their respective districts. They shall assist in the raising of Conference Extension Funds. The pastors in each district are urged to co-operate and expected to do so.

Item IV. The salary of the Presdent shall be \$325.00 per month plus

utilities (including fuel, electricity, water, water-conditioning and sewage), and that of the Vice President \$275.00 plus utilities; the same to be paid by the Conference Treasurer monthly, with expenses incidental to their work. The Vice President shall receive \$40.00 per month parsonage rent. Th President and Vice President shall employ secretarial help as needed,

to be paid for from Conference Expense.

Item V. The Conference Board of Trustees shall be authorized to construct conference parsonage number two during this conference year on the lots at the corner of 38th and Race Streets.

Item VI. Standing Rules.

Under the Resolutions and Laws of the Conference, Item III, paragraph I shall be changed to read as follows: "All charges should in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the pastor may live, a heating plant for that home, and, also, payment of the utilities, including fuel, electricity, water, water-conditioning, and sewage, on a basis to be worked out between the pastor and the church. The parsonage telephone, except for personal long-distance calls, shall be considered as church incidental expense and paid for by the church."

B. The following shall become a standing rule: "All quarterly meetings shall be arranged for by the pastor and his advisory board and shall be held near the close of each fiscal quarter. The pastor shall report quarterly to the President and Vice President on blanks formulated by the President. This report shall be sent in immediately following the

quarterly business meeting.

C. The following shall also become a standing rule: "The President and the Vice President shall constitute the Executive Committee of the WESLEYAN MESSENGER, and the Vice President shall serve as Editor. This Executive Committee shall be empowered to select some person as Business and Circulation Manager. The departments which use the columns of the WESLEYAN MESSENGER regularly shall make contributions toward the expenses of the same."

D. The following shall also become a standing rule: "The President shall call a meeting of the ministers and their wives in the different parts of the conference during the conference year. The purpose of this meeting is to promote the work of the conference. The President shall set forth goals, suggest means of attaining these goals, and in general seek to promote a greater interest in the Conference program. All pastors shall be required to attend this meeting except when a legitimate cause may

hinder.

Standing Rules

- 1. The first session of the Wesleyan Youth Conference shall convene Tuesday afternoon of conference week at one o'clock, and sessions shall continue daily until all business is transacted.
- 2. The president shall appoint the chairman of each committee, and the executive council shall nominate the rest of the members of the committee; their report to be read and voted upon in the first session of annual conference.
- 3. All organized locals keep premanent records of membership and finances. The list of members shall be revised at the close of each conference year.
- 4. The Finance and Appropriations Committee shall be composed of five members elected by the Wesleyan Youth Conference and a sixth member chosen from and by the Committee on Finance and Appropriations, of the main conference body.
- 5. There shall be a Wesleyan Youth Camp Meeting Committee of five members. The president of the Wesleyan Youth shall be chairman ex-officio; the other four members to be elected for a term of four years. One shall be elected annually or until their successor is elected; so that the term of all will not expire at the same time. The Wesleyan Youth Camp Meeting shall elect one of its members as treasurer of the Youth Camp.
- 6. There shall be a Youth Camp of one week duration and the date of the camp shall be set by the Wesleyan Youth Camp Meeting Committee.
- 7. Members of the Executive Council shall not hold the office of District Chairman, but shall work in co-operation with and under the direction of the president.
- 8. There shall be elected an assistant secretary whose duty shall be to assist the secretary and to compile the statistics. The secretary shall be given the privilege of making the nomination.
- 9. All churches shall send their delegates credentials and statistical report to the secretary by July 5.
- 10. The Executive Council of the Wesleyan Youth shall have complete charge of helping new works.
- 11. The local president shall consult with the pastor when making out their annual Wesleyan Youth report, to avoid inconsistencies in the same.
- 12. Copies of the report of the Finance and Appropriations Committee shall be mailed within three weeks after the close of Conference, one copy to each District Chairman, pastor, and local president. These reports shall be carefully presented to each local by its president as soon as soon after conference as possible.
 - 13. Special mention will be made of all societies raising full budget.

- 14. The executive committee of each local Wesleyan Youth should consult with the pastor and his board of stewards before planning its financial program for the year.
- 15. All money raised by the locals, other than local projects, shall be sent to the conference Wesleyan Youth treasurer not later than July 5.
- 16. There shall be a missionary committee elected by each local, who shall be responsible for one missionary service each month.
- 17. The Wesleyan Youth treasurer shall pay from the Conference Expense Fund each year the sum of twenty-five dollars toward the expense of printing the minutes. The Wesleyan Youth secretary shall cooperate with the conference secretaries in determining the number of pages used.
- 18. The Camp Meeting Committee shall be seated as members of the Conference.
- 19. Each district shall elect an adult counselor to counsel and assist in the plans of the district. This advisor may be beyond the age of memberhip in Wesleyan Youth.
- 20. That the General Wesleyan Youth Efficiency Standard be adopted and promoted and that each society rating be reported in the annual statistical reports.
- 21. That the area president receive entertainment and traveling expenses while traveling our conference, the same to be paid by the group asking his service.

Report No. 5

REPORT OF THE FINANCE AND APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE

I. Rallies

We recommend that each district co-operate with the following con-

ference program as to rallies:

That quarterly rallies and, if possible, monthly rallies be held in each district, and that each church be notified at least two Sundays previously, and that notices of said rallies be sent to pastors and local presidents. If no other system is being provided by the district, rallies should be held on the fifth Sunday when it occurs.

B. As the Scripture recognizes that Christ grew in wisdom (education), stature (physical), and in favor with God (spiritual), and man (social), we too suggest that the rallies be as equally well balanced in their interests.

C. That a promotional rally be held in each district, as soon as possible after conference, under supervision of the Conference Executive Council and district chairmen, and that the Executive Council be authorized to secure workers for this rally.

D. The president or vice president shall participate in a rally in each district during the months of April or May for the purpose of promoting

the May 30th rally and Youth Camp, with a special evangelistic emphasis.

E. That the district chairmen call a meeting of the local presidents, district officers, and district adult counselor as a part of the promotional rally and in conjunction with work shops conducted by members of the Executive Council. The president shall work with the district officers and local presidents, the vice president with local program chairmen, the secretary with local secretaries, and the treasurer with local treasurers.

F. That the Executive Council call a meeting of all district chairmen semi-annually. These meetings are to be held on Saturday of conference week and May 30th.

G. The local president shall be responsible to see that each active and associate member signs a membership card annually. No one shall

be reported as a member until the pledge card is signed.

H. That the following point system for district banner be adopted: local president or vice president present at rally, 5 points; pastor present, 5 points; for each 1% of active members present (to be based on the current number of members), 1 point; for each non-member present, 1 point;

for each mile traveled to the rally site, 1 point. The reports of at least the highest two shall be read at the rally and the society with the highest total is to be the winner.

I. That the conference print and distribute to the local societies suitable blanks to implement the point system.

J. That there be a conference rally held on the Campground on Memorial Day, and that the conference banner be awarded on the basis of an efficiency standard modeled after the Wesleyan Youth efficiency standard as prepared by the Executive Council by the time of the promotional rally.

II. Projects

A. For conference project we recommend the following:

1. As befits our interest in the education of the Wesleyan Youth, we would seek to express our interests in the future development of Marion College to the extent of the purchase price of one of seventeen acres of

land. The funds for this purchase are to be raised by the districts.

2. In keeping with the emphasis of the church extension program that we offer services or finances needed for at least one evangelistic campaign or survey this year, and that this assistance be rendered in such area as deemed advisable by the Conference Board of Trustees, and to such extent as deemed advisable by the Executive Council.

3. In view of the fact that a Bible quiz program has been initated for the 1957 Youth Camp, a special committee of three members shall be elected to implement state-wide participation and preparation for this.

B. For locals we recommend the following: That each local plan visitation programs and special meetings with members of the local such as jail services, hospital and shut-in visitations, distributing tracts, radio

proprams, and street meetings.

C. That the desk and traveling expenses of the president, vice president, ecretary, and treasurer, be paid from the Youth Conference Expense Fund; and the desk and traveling expenses of the Youth Camp Committee be paid from the Youth Camp Treasury and the said expenses be paid at least quarterly. That traveling expense be figured on the basis of 7 cents per mile.

III. Finance

For finance we recommend the following:

That the salary of the conference officers be as follows:

1. President-\$120.00

Vice President-\$50.00 2. 3.

Secretary—\$75.00 Treasurer—\$75.00 Assistant Secretary—\$10.00

Said salary to be paid in equal payments, on December 5, and the

other June 1.

- B. That the desk and traveling expenses of the president, vice president, secretary, and treasurer, be paid from the Youth Conference Expense Fund; and the desk and traveling expenses of the Youth Camp Committee be paid from the Youth Camp Treasury and the said expenses be paid at least quarterly. That traveling expense be figured on the basis of 7 cents per mile.
 - C. That the budget for the following year be as follows: General Dues, \$1.50 per active member of the local.
 - Conference Budget (based on church membership)

a. \$.20, Conference Extension Fund

Youth Conference Expense Fund b. \$.25, Youth Conferencec. \$.20, Youth Camp Fund

3. On the basis of the above apportionment exact assessments for each item shall be made for each local and mailed to the pastors and local presidents by the conference secretary within two weeks of the rise of this conference session.

That above funds be sent in quarterly on remittance blanks furnished by the conference. Inasmuch as this is based on church membership, the church should feel its responsibility to aid the local when necessary.

That the Executive Council shall have power to appropriate money from the Youth Conference Expense Fund for the general promotion of the Youth work.

That all monies raised within the local for missions be forwarded to the Wesleyan Youth Conference Treasurer for departmental credit and that said money be raised by monthly missionary offerings and be sent in quarterly with the Wesleyan Youth budget.

IV. Standing Rules

That the General Wesleyan Youth Efficiency Standard be adopted and promoted and that each society rating be reported in the annual statistical reports.

That the area president receive entertainment and traveling expenses while traveling our conference, the same to be paid by the group

asking his service.

C. We recommend that Standing Rule No. 12 be changed to read: "Copies of the report of the Finance and Appropriations Committee shall be mailed within three weeks after the close of Conference, one copy to each District Chairman, pastor, and local president. These reports shall be carefully presented to each local by its president as soon after conference as possible.

Report No. 1

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Greetings to the sixty-seventh annual session of the Indiana Confer-

ence Women's Missionary Society.

Once again through Divine Providence we have assembled here on the Fairmount Campgrounds to mingle together in Christian Fellowship. We have not come only to renew acquaintances, but, we have assembled to do business for the Master, and to plan to fulfill the purpose and ob-

jective of our organization.

The book of Discipline states, "The purpose of our organization is to extend the kingdom of God in the home and foreign fields, by increasing the knowledge of missions, stimulating interest, therein, and encouraging a spirit of prayer and giving for the work. The objective of the Missionary Society is to secure systematic cooperation throughout the conference in the interest of home and foreign missions."

In tabulating the results, this has been a good year. We had a gain of 34 in membership. The quadrennial goal is every woman in the church and Sunday School a member of the W.M.S. Let us strive to attain this

goal.

We had a loss of 29 Missionary Magazine subscriptions. May each of us keep up our subscription and help the local solicitors in securing new subscriptions. It is through the medium of the printed page that we receive information about our missionaries and their labors.

Throughout the year several projects were presented, beginning with the College Project, the new lighting system, the Emmanuel Bible College in Japan, Honorary Enrollment, Foot of Dimes, Zion's Hill extermination project, White Gift Christmas and Self-denial. The total

amount raised for these projects was \$6099.73.

These projects were climaxed with the spring conventions March 6-23 with Mrs. Alice Calhoun, returned missionary to Haiti, and Miss Mary Bennett, General Y.M.W.B. Superintendent, as the speakers.
