Daily Proceedings

The forty-first annual session of the Kentucky Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church convened August 5, 1963, 7:30 p.m. at the Fern Creek, Kentucky campground with the Rev. Charles L. Blanchard presiding. Rev. H. Blaine West was in charge of the singing.

The Conference Sermon was delivered by Dr. Harold K. Sheets, General Superintendent of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, who brought a challenging and heart-warming message from the book of Habakkuk, using as his text Hab. 2:1 "I will stand upon my watch".

CALL TO ORDER—Conference was then called to order by the Conference President, Rev. Charles L. Blanchard.

Standing Resolutions

- 1. The Conference President shall in his quarterly meeting see that adequate insurance is carried by each church on its property.
- 2. The pastor's Statistical Report must be passed by the Conference Treasurer and the Committee on Character, and must be presented to the Statistical Committee before being read to the Conference body.
- 3. The Conference shall elect a Nominating Committee for the Conference year which shall be a standing committee of five members with the Conference President as a member ex-officio. This committee shall nominate the Chairmen and members of committees and the third member of the Publications Committee. Each committee on this report shall be presented to the conference body separately and

time allowed for nomination from the floor.

- 4. We recommend that the local treasurer's books shall close at midnight, June 30, and that the Conference Treasurer close his books effective midnight, July 15, and that all statistical reports are to be sent in by that date to the Conference Treasurer, and he shall in turn send them to the Statistical Chairman. All money received after that date is to be applied to a budget item on the following year. The Conference Treasurer of the Missionary Society, Wesleyan Youth, and Y.M.W.B. shall send a report immediately after their books close to the Conference Treasurer, listing amount paid on each budget item from each church.
- 5. The Conference shall convene the first Monday night of August each year.
- 6. The Board of Church Extension and Evangelism shall serve as the Committee on Church and Parsonage Location and Building.
- 7. All Ministers and Delegates attending the entire annual conference and camp are to be given rooms in preference to those not active in conference business.
- 8. No divorced person who has remarried shall be ordained in the Kentucky Conference.
- 9. All Conference officials shall assume office in the next meeting following the election.
- 10. No Charge shall call a pastor or supply from other Conferences or Denominations as long as there are available ministers in our conference qualified for the work. The Conference President, after having exercised his prerogative in the reception of ministers coming from other conferences or denominations shall immediately refer them to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders' Orders, which shall make a thorough investigation as to the ministry and life of such applicants and shall report their findings to the President after which appointments may be made.
- 11. The vote on the pastor shall be taken by ballot the first week in June, unless special permission is granted by the Conference President and his Advisory Board for another date; said ballots are to be prepared by the clerk and the results of the vote shall be reported at once to the Conference President.
- 12. Let all ministers have their membership transferred to their new appointment and the Ways and Means Committee shall figure Budget Apportionment after the final reading of the Pastoral Relations Committee.
- 13. Since tolevision in its present state is so radically demoralizing in its range, be it resolved that the Kentucky Conference register its disapproval of anyone within the conference endorsing or owning a television set. Furthermore, be it resolved that the Kentucky Conference will not license preachers or workers, ordain elders, or station ministers who own or have a television set in their possession.
 - 14. The Conference President and the Conference Secretary shall be

members of the Publications Committee ex-officio.

- 15. There shall be a standing committee on ways and means, composed of four ministers and three laymen, of which the Conference President and the Conference Treasurer shall be members ex-officio.
- 16. Pastors shall read to their congregation the General and Special Rules and instructions of the Discipline, the Standing Resolutions of the Conference, the report of the Committee on Moral Reform, and shall urge the same to familiarize themselves with the Wesleyan Methodist Discipling.
- 17. Every preacher borrowing a book from the Conference library may hold it for only one month. There will be a flat rate of twenty-five cents for the month and five cents for every day over the month.
- 18. In this age when immodesty and worldliness are subtly creeping into the Holiness Movement, let every minister of ours earnestly contend for and faithfully preach the entire Word of God without fear or favor of man. Let us refuse to compromise with the ungodly element which is robbing the church of her glory and preachers of the Divine anointing.
- 19. All ministers not attending both conference and camp without a written excuse from the Conference President and his Advisory Board shall be placed under discipline and be required to appear before Character Committee of the next annual conference for clearing. Further, no pastor shall be permitted to accept revival meetings or camp meetings if they conflict with the conference or camp meeting.
- 20. Our own Evangelists shall not conduct revivals or camp meetings in our Wesleyan Churches within the bounds of our conference at the time of our Youth Camp, Annual Conference, Camp Meeting or Ministerial Institute.
- 21. The Standing Resolutions of the Conference shall be printed in the September issue of the MESSENGER.
- 22. Church elections shall be held so that elected officials shall fill their offices on July 1, provided that the treasurer shall fill his office July 15.
- 23. For the purpose of operating the Camp Meeting, there shall be a committee of seven Wesleyans, four of whom shall be elected by the conference, the President of the Conference being ex-officio one of the four and chairman of the committee, two others being elders, and one a layman; and three of whom shall be elected by the Board of Directors of the Campground Association, the President of which Association shall be a member ex-officio, and one an elder and the other a layman. Each elected member shall serve for three years, provided that the Conference shall elect one the first year for one year, and another for two years, thereby assuring the election of one member annually.

Reports

Report No. 1 PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Members of the Conference and Friends, Christian greetings.

The world stages momentous days. She staggers under fear, frustration, and folly. Madness characterizes the so-called civilized nations. World leaders paradoxically prepare for a holocaust of atomic fire and talk peace. Ideologies of communism and catholicism openly oppose each other and at the same time compromise for peaceful co-existence, then collaboration, and final ideological colonization. Nationalism brings to birth many new nations particularly in Africa. The caldron of racism boils over. Formal dead protestantism joins papal espousal of ecumenicity which would unite all under one flag and one cross—the spurious cross of the antichrist. Supreme court decisions in America have dethroned Biblical authority and reverence. Liberalism, libertinism, and license increase. Syndicated crime, legalized gambling and evil, socially supported nudity and lust, and covetous groups sit on the throne.

The church marches hand in hand with the god of this world and politely ignores the Christ of Calvary. Worldly progress, material expension and membership gains receive prime attention. Incense arises to past church heroes, but their spiritual message remains entombed. Great transition grips the holiness ranks. Proper promotional aims to reach the world with the message of full salvation often are bogged down with institutionalism, legislation, legalism, looseness, formal holiness, dead orthodoxy, division, and dry testimonies. An attempt to compete with other educational institutions may place more emphasis on liberal arts rather than on Biblical studies and a fire-baptized ministry. Spiritual stagnation in the local church fails to produce ministerial candidates for training in our schools. Ministerial shortage, so keenly felt in the larger denominations, now threatens the holiness churches.

What is the answer to our problem-conscious age? Christ is the answer He must have priority in pulpit and pew, m home and society, in nation and world, in school and business, in family hearth and heart. A Spirit-baptized ministry training a sanctified laity for personal witnessing can do much to salvage our homes and souls. The prophet of God must fearlessly proclaim the powerful message of complete redemption, separation

from worldliness, and encouragement to the saint to become a prayer warrior. Then, in the end of this listless age one must lift up his head and heart in anticipation of the immanent return of the King of kings and Lord of lords, the greatest event awaiting the church and the world.

Conference Status

Much progress has been made over the Conference during the year. The beautiful and commodious Stonewall church in a suburb of Lexington was dedicated December 9. The parsonage was purchased and the church built for less than half of the appraised value; yet much indebtedness remains which the local church courageously shoulders with some help from church headquarters. Franklin Avenue in Pleasure Ridge Park, a suburb of Louisville, has made good progress in church improvement and excellent gain in attendance, Madison Wesleyan is finishing a beautiful Wildwood structure purchased from Church Enterprises. They expect to move into this combination church and parsonage this month. Elizabeth Church has built and paid for a five-room Sunday School annex. Glasgow, our first pioneer project under the new system, has added many new members. Calvary pioneer church at Owensboro steadily advances in attendance and community favor. The debt has been reduced this year. Other churches have made repairs and improvements and reduced debts. Milan contemplates payment of the debt on their Sunday School annex by Christmas and the building of a new parsonage this year. Clear Fork has a new church in the planning stage. Above all material gains comes the cry of new born souls into the Kingdom. Many good revivals have brought this. Let us have more.

President's Activities

Duties increase annually which is a good sign of development evidently. The President has preached 137 times; conducted over 50 church business meetings; had about 50 conference and church board meetings; was present for three Marion College Board Meetings; attended the Conference and Area Ministerial Institutes; also, the General Conference; taught Sunday School 23 times; edited the Messenger; besides the regular routine.

RECOMMENDATIONS BY THE CHURCH EXTENSION BOARD

I. Calendar System

- 1. A pioneer calendar shall be provided by the Church Extension Board for a Sunday in September chosen as Pioneer Sunday, at which time pledges shall be taken in each church to be paid in 10 monthly payments.
- 2. A pioneer secretary appointed by each local church shall announce, or have announced on the second Sunday of each month the pledge collection on the third Sunday, and shall collect and tabulate opposite each pledge the monthly contribution, then have the church treasurer remit the total collected each month to the Conference, Treasurer.
- 3. Pioneer works may be granted permission by the Church Extension Board to use their money locally as may be needed.
- 4. Previous to Pioneer Sunday there shall be a rally of the pastors in each district presided over by the Conference President or another designated by the Church Extension Board, when goals for each church may be suggested.
 - 5. Fields and Goals.
- (1) Money shall be saved for centers of population, to be invested in property or to employ men of pioneer ability.
- (2) We urge a goal of \$10,000 this year toward reducing indebtedness.

II. Sunday School

The first Sunday of the month Sunday School offering in full shall be remitted by each Sunday School treasumer for much needed pioneer work. III. Revolving Fund

This fund shall be increased by gifts and at the discretion of the Church Extension Board from regular pioneer funds not to exceed \$500 per year.

IV. Mother Church

We urge the larger churches to co-operate with the Church Extension Board in starting a prayer meeting or a Sunday School in a new section as well as in tithing their church tithes and offerings for mothering a new work under the Church Extension Board.

V. United Effort

We suggest and urge co-operation of the Conference W. M. S. and the Youth Executive Council with the Church Extension Board to help our pioneer works as may be needed.

VI. Deeds and Legal Documents

- 1. That the Conference President be custodian of deeds and conference records to be kept in a safe.
- 2. That the Conference President shall collect all deeds or records of deeds for filing, at the time of his visitation in Quarterly Conferences.
- 3. The Board will recommend no authorization or the signature of the Conference Trustees on notes or mortgages for churches until there is a joint deed made to the local and conference Trustees.
- 4. All churches involved in any major indebtedness shall be under the supervision of the Church Extension Board.

Report No. 8 COMMITTEE ON MORAL REFORM

We, your committee on moral reform, submit to this conference and to the churches of this conference the following resolutions:

- 1. Since our homes are the tributaries which feed the stream of our national and religious life, we call upon our fathers and mothers to make our homes strongholds for Christianity. We urge them to dedicate themselves to this task by Godly example, by abstaining from the appearance of evil, by maintaining the family altar, by teaching the Scriptures, by faithful attendance to the house of God and by laboring to bring the child to a personal knowledge of salvation.
- 2. Inasmuch as we are living in a world of unrest, of contention, and of strife, which is the result of the spirit of the anti-Christ, we ask our people to seek the peace and unity of the faith once delivered to the saints, to seek understanding in the midst of misunderstanding, to cover our brother's faults with the grace of charity and by giving fellowship to those who may be weaker in the faith.
- 3. We continue to call our people to a reverence for the day of worship and the house of worship which calls for a ceasing of secular interests and indulgences on the Lord's day and a reverence for His house when we meet for worship.
- 4. Believing in the integrity and devotion of our God appointed church leaders in all levels of administration, we urge our people to support them by their prayers and cooperation in furthering the work of the Lord through the channels of the Wesleyan Methodist Church.
- 5. We further urge, that our people exercise their disapproval of obscene literature, immodest attire, tobacco, intoxicating beverages, degrading radio and television programs, also, the discouraging of television as a whole because of its general tendency to unwholesome influence.
- 6. Be it resolved that we exhort our people to fulfill their responsibility as citizens in registering their vote in all areas including local, state, and national levels.
- 7. In the midst of the racial tension we discourage our people from participating in or encouraging any pressure groups that produce unchristian attitudes. We exhort our people to treat the Negro with dignity and respect since God has made of one blood all people.

- c. These failing to comply with the above regulation shall be referred to their Quarterly Conference.
- d. All conference preachers employed as pastors of organized works may vote in annual conference, not including conference evangelists or assistant pastors.
- e. We recommend that those taking the examinations in the course of study, shall take said examinations in the presence of an elder or local preacher or a conference preacher and the examination be sealed and sent by him to the proper member of the committee.

Report No. 10 INSURANCE COMMITTEE RECOMMENDATIONS

Y.; World Missions \$2.00 per full member; Australia \$.25; Brainard Indian School \$.25; Church Extension and Evangelism \$1.50; Superannuate Pension Plan, \$3.50; Church Administrative Fund, \$1.70;

General Conference Expense and Entertainment, \$.50; Board Meeting Expense \$.15; Hephzibah, \$.35; Sunday School, \$.20 per member based on the number in the main School; Educational Budget, \$4.00; and Wesleyan Seminary, \$.30.

2. We recommend that our churches pay Conference Budget as follows: Conference Work Fund, \$.75; Conference Entertainment, \$1.00; Camp Meeting Fund, \$1.00; Conference Wesleyan Youth \$.50 per full church member; Conference Parsonage Fund \$.50; Conference Sunday School \$.05 per member enrolled in the main Sunday School; Conference President's Salary \$1.00; and an amount equal to 10% of pastor's cash salary; Ministers' Group Insurance Fund \$.50 per member; and that the Sunday School offering for the first Sunday of each month be sent to the Conference Treasurer for Pioneer Evangelism. All budget money shall be sent in monthly in eyen dollars.

Item II. Pastor

- 1. Each pastor shall encourage the Storehouse plan of Tithing.
- 2. All pastors shall encourage membership in the Card Call Plan.
- 3. The pastoral year shall end following the last Sunday of Camp and the church he is serving shall pay his salary until that time.
- 4. All Churches shall provide their pastors suitable living quarters, all their utilities, fill their obligations by monthly donations and allow him two weeks vacation with pay and definitely arrange with the pastor the number of revivals he is allowed to conduct.
- 5. Each pastor's moving bill shall be paid by the contracting church. Item III. Conference President
- 1. The Conference President shall be paid \$77.50 per week, one half of his Social Security, house rent, utilities, desk expense and secretarial help, traveling at 8 cents per mile in connection with conference work and he shall be allowed two weeks vacation with pay.
- 2. The Conference President shall meet the Board of Stewards and encourage the church to provide adequate support for their pastor.
- 3. Each church shall hold four quarterly meetings annually; one, to be held by the Conference President at his convenience and three to be arranged by the pastor.
- 4. The Conference President shall give as much time as possible to supervising the pioneer works and the smaller churches.

Item IV. Miscellaneous.

- 1. The Conference Treasurer and the Conference Secretary shall receive an honorarium of \$75.00 each.
- 2. All superannuated ministers and their wives of our conference shall be entertained free during camp.
- 3. We recommend that the Board of Church Extension be empowered between the sessions of the Conference to make available for present use any surplus in any fund.
- 4. We recommend that the Kentucky Conference Ministerial Student Aid Fund at Marion College be placed under the Conference Church Ex-

tension Board with recommendations from the Doners.

5. We recommend that the minutes be sold for \$1.00 per copy. Committee Members: C. L. Blanchard, Foster Newman, John W. Basham, Paul Mills, Ernest Schermer, George Basham, General Newman.

We certainly are grateful to the Lord for his help during the past year and for all the gains that were made. For Comparison we thought it would be well to list the average Sunday School attendance for the past thirteen years.

REPORT No. 18 RESOLUTION ON THE RECOGNITION OF GOD IN OUR PUBLIC INSTITUTIONS

Whereas the historic attitude of the United States Government toward the worship of God has been one of friendliness, as may be substantiated by any number of evidences, and

Whereas the American citizenry today, of whatever creed, is overwhelmingly characterized by faith in God and a recognition of our national and personal dependence upon Him, and

Whereas the intent of our founding fathers is forbidding the establishment of religion in the First and Fourteenth Amendments of our Constitution was manifestly not to remove all vestiges of our theistic faith from government-sponsored premises and activities, and

Whereas in recent years there has been a determined effort by an atheistic minority, having every personal privilege of disbelief, to secure judicial decisions purportedly based upon the Constitution to shield themselves from reminder of their minority status by the banishment of all theistic traces from publicly sponsored activities and premises, notably from our public schools which, because of compulsory attendance requirements, affect the lives of the vast majority of our children, thus undermining the historic foundation of our moral and ethical value system, and

Whereas successive actions of the Supreme Court, occasioned by the persistent appeals of atheists and agnostics, seem to indicate a growing inclination to ban from public life all worship of God, in however broad terms, and all recognition of Him,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that this Kentucky Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America assembled in its forty-first annual Conference at the Campgrounds, Fern Creek, Kentucky, August 5-9, 1963, respectfully petitions our legislative leaders to discover for us and for the great God-fearing majority of our people some adequate lawful redress from the above-described disability. We presume that such may require a Constitutional Amendment recognizing the sovereignty of almighty God for our nation (while granting freedom of conviction and propagation to those who choose not to recognize Him) reaffirming the doctrine that units of the Government are to avoid acts and policies involving the support or establishment of organized religion, but declaring the principle that it is not deemed a contravention of this doctrine that the name of God be honored in state and civic life and that men be encouraged to read the Bible in its various versions and to worship God in accordance with the dictates of their own conscience, not excluding the incidental occurrence of such activities even from premises built or financed in whole or in part by public moneys, that this nation may indeed be a nation under God.

BE IT RESOLVED FURTHER that we, urge all our people to circulate petitions after this tenor, these as well as individual communications to be sent to the national legislators from our various areas of residence, en-

deavoring thus to show the concern of God-fearing peoples in America that the public recognition of God, the Creator of all men, who is revealed fully through His Son Jesus Christ, be not destroyed from among us.

Report No. 2 PRESIDENT'S REPORT

We have a challenge before us—"Prepare the King's Highway", the theme for the ensuing quadrennium. How fitting that it follow last quadrennium's theme of "The Night Cometh." May we put forth every effort to prepare His Highway for His Coming.

This year has been different. As you recall there were two trips to New York, immediately following Conference. God in His love and mercy let us see Mother Blanchard while she could recognize us and hear our prayers.

According to our records we were at Mt. Zion and Mt. Calvary, September 9 and 10. I accompanied my husband on his travels to the various churches until February 11, when the Asian Flu bug got hold of me. In March we had the privilege of entertaining Doctor Sheets in our home while he and my husband were touring the Conference Brother Phipps and the Rattlingleafs stopped over with us, too. During Ministerial we enjoyed the fellowship of Doctor Flexon. In between times we prepared for Open House the first of April. Later the Beirnes family stopped to brief us on recent advances in Jamaica.

We traveled 5597 miles in the conference, visiting 33 different churches. Eight of these churches do not as yet have an organized W.M.S. Walker Chapel was not included in the eight mentioned above—we hope they will be organized this year. Two new societies, Stonewall and Elizabeth were organized at the close of last conference year. We have obligations to meet if we "Prepare the King's Highway" in Kentucky Conference.

Your representatives attended the session of the General Conference. Last quadrennium the W.M.S. plan of Work was completely reorganized. This session revisions were made which we feel will be helpful.

During Miss Alma Aldinger's tour, we gave nearly \$800 to help build a Secondary School in Sierra Leone, West Africa. Shall we invest prayer time in the school and for her faculty and student body. These students in years to come will be leaders of that new nation.

Reverend Robert Crosby, missionary to Columbia, South America, will tour our conference next spring from March 11, to 29. Miss Virginia Hooker, returned missionary to Haiti, will begin her tour April 1—attend Ministerial Institute then continue touring until the 19th of April.

We have used the Missionary Column in the KENTUCKY WESLEYAN MESSENGER all but twice this year as a personal letter of information and direction to you. We mailed a circular letter to the pastors' wives suggesting we use an hour early each Tuesday morning for prayer for one another and our families. Besides these we mailed about one hundred letters and cards.

Report No. 4 WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

We, the Committee on Ways and Means, wish to make the following recommendations:

I. CONFERENCE

- a. The W.Y. President shall attend one rally in each District during the year and each District shall bear the traveling expenses at the rate of seven cents a mile. The W.Y. Secretary shall notify each District Chairman of this obligation previous to the President's tour.
- b. We recommend that the pioneer project for this year be the Brazil Pioneer Work in cooperation with the Conference Board of Church Extension and Evangelism.
- c. We recommend that the W.Y. Executive Committee continue a quarterly Youth Bulletin, to be sent to the young people of the conference.
- d. We recommend that a Conference-wide Youth Rally be held Friday night following the Annual Conference and Saturday be known as Youth Day at which time the Youth Conference will convene.
- e. We recommend that the Conference shall elect a Nominating Committee for the conference year which is to be a standing committee of five members with the Youth Conference President and Secretary as members ex-officio. This committee shall appoint the chairman and members of the (1) Ways and Means Committee, (2) Resolutions Committee, (3) Statistical Committee, and (4) Auditing Committee.
- f. We recommend that a Conference-wide "Youth Leaders' Workshop" be held the second Saturday of September each year for the purpose of promoting the conference youth work. We urge the Pastors, District Chairmen, and all local youth officers to attend.

II. DISTRICT

- a. We recommend that the Districts be set up the same as the Conference Board of Church Extension and Eyangelism.
- b. We recommend that each District have at least four rallies during the year and that we use our Young People in a variety of programs for these rallies rather than always securing an outside speaker.

III. LOCAL

a. We recommend that the local treasurer's books shall close June 30.

IV. FINANCES

- a. We recommend that each Local raise the amount of two dollars (\$2.00) per active member for the General W.Y. Program and that those churches not having an organized Local take an offering for the General Youth Program.
- b. We recommend that each Local raise the amount of one dollar (\$1.00) per active member for the Conference Expense Fund.
- c. We recommend that each Local raise the amount of fifty cents (\$.50) per active member for the Youth Camp Fund.
- d. We recommend that each Local raise the amount of ten cents (\$.10) per active member to subsidize the expense of the Youth Bulletin.
- e. We recommend that the Executive Committee shall have the power to appropriate the youth money for the promotion of the General and Conference work.
- f. We recommend that each District in their District Rallies raise the following amount for our missionary project:

- g. We recommend that we support the Brazil Pioneer Church and endeavor to send them ten dollars (\$10.00) per month.
- h. We recommend that the \$15.00 voted by the Conference as Young People's assessment to help subsidize the Conference Messenger be paid from the Conference Expense Fund.
- i. We recommend that the Area Assessment and all desk funds be paid from the Conference Expense Fund.
- j. We recommend that all money be forwarded quarterly to the Conference W.Y. Treasurer. The Conference W.Y. Treasurer's books shall close July 7.

- 5. That special attention be given to the planning of special programs for Youth Week, and that the Local young people participate in these programs.
 - 6. That each Local sponsor a youth revival annually.
- 7. That each president inform his Local concerning plans adopted at Youth Conference and that he strive to put them into force during the year
- 8. That all organized Locals keep permanent records of membership and finances. The list of membership shall include a classification of active and associate members and shall be revised at the close of each conference year.
- 9. That our young people dress modestly and well pleasing in the sight of God as becometh Holiness. (I Peter 3:3, 4; Deut. 22:5; I Tim. 2:9, 16)
- 10. That our young people, in order to maintain a high level in their Christian experience refrain from: a. the viewing of Television, b. the reading of harmful literature, c. improper conduct in dating.
- 11. That our young people, while maintaining their standards, manifest a Christ-like spirit toward other young people who are not saved, or have not had the sufficient light.
- 12. That each pastor and youth president attend the District Youth Conventions and the Youth Camp, and encourage his people's attendance.
- 13. That the district chairman send a quarterly report to the conference W. Y. President summarizing their district conventions.
- 14. That the Efficiency Standard of the W.Y. be printed in the Annual Journal and each Local plan its program according to the standard.
- 15. That each Local send in a quarterly report by the designated time and that they strive to be on the honor roll.
- 16. That all monies received after July 7, 1964, be applied on the Local's next year's report.
- 17. That all local officers be elected in June and begin their duties July 1st. The newly elected local president be a member of the conference body.
 - 18. That the Efficiency Standard, Ways and Means and Resolution Com-

mittee Reports be read in a local meeting as soon after conference as possible.
