JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS.

Adjourned on motion tor Committee work

Opening.—The sixty-third annual session of the Lockport Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection (or Church) of America convened at Cattaraugus, N. Y., April 2nd, at 9 A. M., in the Wesleyan Methodist church. The President, Rev. James A. Bain, called the assembly to order and introduced Rev. A. O. Northrup, who conducted the devotional exercises.

Roll Call.—The roll was called and sixteen pastors and twelve delegates were marked present.

Bar of Conference.—The bar of Conference was fixed for the first six rows of seats across the front of the church.

Organization.-It was voted to open the morning sessions of

Conference at 8:30, and close at 11:30. The afternoon sessions to open at 1:30, and to close by vote of Conference.

All special orders were referred to the Committee on Religious

Services.

Committee Reports.—The Committee on Temporary Organization submitted its report, which was considered item by item, and after referring a few items back to the Committee for changes, the partial report was adopted.

Orders of the Day.—On motion the election of Conference officials was made the order of the day for Thursday morning at 10

o'clock.

Recess.—On motion a recess was taken for committee work, subject to the call of the chair.

Revised Report Adopted.—The Conference was again called to order by the President at 10:25 A. M. and a further partial report of the Committee on Temporary Organization was read and adopted.

Trustees of Bethesda Home Report.—H. R. Barnett, Treasurer of the Board of Trustees of Bethesda Home, submitted the annual report of that body. The report was referred to the Auditing Committee. (See Report No. 2.)

Introductions.—Rev. Clarence Barnett, of the Allegheny Conference, and Rev. Bauchman, of the Cattaraugus Lutheran church.

Sunday School Secretary Reports.—Rev. N. R. Shaffer, Conference Sunday School Secretary, submitted his report, which was both oral and written, which was adopted. (For written report see No. 3.)

Treasurer of Board of Trustees Reports.—Rev. Walter Readette, Treasurer of the Board of Trustees for Conference, submitted his annual report, which was referred to the Auditing Committee. (See Report No. 4.)

Adjourned on motion for Committee work.

First Day, Afternoon Session, April 2.

Opening.—The Conference was called to order by the President, and devotional exercises were conducted by Mrs. Clara Williams. The roll was called and the minutes read and approved.

Elected on Committee.—On motion the name of Rev. Walter Readette was placed on the Committee of Itineracy and Orders to

fill the vacancy caused by the absence of Rev. W. W. Rolf.

Motion to Rescind Former Conference Action.—A motion was made recommending that the action of the former Conferences relative to the Chestnut Ridge charge during the years of 1919 and 1920

be rescinded. The matter was referred to a Committee and the President was authorized to appoint the chairman. Following this a motion prevailed recommending that the members composing the Committee be chosen from those who were members of the Conference when the former action was taken.

Appointment of Committee.—The President appointed Rev. Walter Readette as chairman of the Committee and the following members were elected by Conference: Rev. C. W. Smith, J. S. Luckey,

H. LeRoy Fancher, Rev. L. C. Mattoon.

Rescinding of Conference Ruling.—Moved by Rev. N. R. Shaffer and seconded by Rev. J. H. Woodhouse that the Conference ruling relative to the office of traveling President be rescinded. The matter was referred to the Committee on Traveling President with instructions to report before the election of Conference Officials on Thursday morning.

Courtesies .- Rev. M. J. Mead, of the Moon Brook charge, was

introduced to Conference.

On motion the matter of changing the name of the Moon Brook charge to North Main Street Extension was referred to the Committee on Boundaries.

Seat of Honor.—On motion all visiting friends who are in harmony with the distinctive principles of Wesleyan Methodism were

given an honorary seat within the bar of Conference.

Characters Passed.—The following names were called and characters passed: H. H. Schoonover, G. E. Bathurst, A. J. Taylor, C. W. Smith.

Petition.—A petition from East Aurora for financial aid in the erection of a tabernacle was read by Edward Neiman and referred

to the Board of Trustees. (See Report No. 5.)

Request for Orders of Day.—On motion the matter relative to the Conference voting on the proposed amendment of the Discipline affecting the tobacco question was referred to the Committee on Religious Services with the request that it be made the orders of the day to follow the election of Conference Officials.

Addition to Committee .- On motion the name of Rev. J. R. Pitt

was added to the Committee on Religious Services,

Characters Passed.—The following names were called and characters passed: A. O. Northrup, J. A. Mann, W. W. Rolf, C. E. Woodhead, Walter Readette.

Letter of Greetings.—On motion the Secretary was instructed to send a letter of greetings to all absent members of Conference who report by letter to Conference.

Adjourned for Committee work, the benediction being given by Rev. Walter Readette.

Second Day, Morning Session, April 3, 1924.

Opening.—The Conference was called to order by the President and devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. G. E. Bathurst. The roll was called and the minutes read, corrected and approved.

Seating of Delegates.—On motion the delegates from the Allegany and Moon Brook charges, who were duly elected, but whose credentials had not reached the Secretary, were given a seat in Conference.

Rescinding of Conference Ruling.—The Committee on Traveling President, to whom was referred the question of rescinding the rule of Conference affecting the traveling President, submitted its report and its adoption was recommended. After some debate the previous question relative to the adoption of the report was called for and upon vote the recommendation was voted down. A vote was then taken and the rule of Conference was rescinded by a vote of 27 to 9. (See Report No. 6 of Traveling President Committee on rescinding.)

Conference President Reports.—The Conference President submitted his report and after referring the financial item to the Auditing Committee, the report was adopted. (See Report No. 7.)

Rev. N. R. Shaffer was elected on the Auditing Committee to fill the vacancy caused by the absence of Rev. C. I. Armstrong.

Introductions.—Rev. Fred Collins of the Bradford class was introduced to Conference.

Orders of the Day.—The time for the Orders of the Day having arrived the President appointed Rev. L. C. Mattoon and Rev. A. J. Taylor as tellers and Conference proceeded to the election of Conference Officials.

Election of President.—On the ballot for Conference President, Rev. James A. Bain received 29 of 38 votes cast and was declared elected.

Election of Vice-President.—On ballot for Vice-President, Rev. J. R. Pitt received 20 of 39 votes cast and was declared elected.

Election of Secretary.—On the ballot for Secretary, Rev. Francis B. Markell received 35 of 38 votes cast and was declared elected.

Assistant Secretary Elected.—The Secretary nominated Rev. Walter Readette as Assistant Secretary and the nomination was indorsed by action of Conference.

Election of Treasurer.—On ballot for Treasurer Rev. G. H. Clarke received 32 of 38 votes cast and was declared elected.

Election of Sunday School and Tithing Secretaries.—By acclamation Rev. N. R. Shaffer was elected Sunday School Secretary, and Rev. M. A. Bateman as Tithing Secretary.

Election of Trustees .- Rev. Walter Readette was elected on first

ballot by a vote of 32 of 37 ballots cast.

On second ballot, Rev. Arthur J. Taylor received 30 of 34 votes cast, and was declared elected.

Mr. Ernest B. Houghton was elected Lay Trustee on the third

ballot, receiving 31 of 35 votes cast.

Passing of Characters.—The following names were called and

characters passed: Joseph R. Pitt, J. H. Woodhouse.

Courtesies.—Rev. E. F. McCarty, Connectional Foreign Missionary Secretary, was introduced to Conference and made suitable remarks.

Adjourned by limitation of time, Rev. A. O. Northrup giving the benediction.

Second Day, Afternoon Session, April 3, 1924.

Opening.—The Conference was called to order by the President, and devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. W. A. Backus.

The roll was called and the minutes read, corrected and ap-

proved.

Characters Passed.—The characters of the following were passed: C. P. Munson, George Clement, W. A. Backus, N. R. Shaffer, W. J. Roth, M. A. Bateman.

Petition.—A petition from the Machias charge for financial aid in the erection of a parsonage was read and referred to the Board of Trustees for favorable consideration. (See Report No. 8.)

Orders of the Day.—It was made the Orders of the Day to vote on Tobacco Amendment Friday morning, following the devotional exercises.

Adjourned on motion for Committee work, subject to the call of the chair.

Conference was called to order by the President at 4:50, and adjourned on motion, the benediction beging given by Rev. M. A. Bateman.

Third Day, Morning Session, April 4, 1924.

Opening.—The Conference was called to order by the President and devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. A. J. Taylor.

The roll was called and the minutes were read and approved.

Postponement of Orders.—The time for the Orders of the Day having arrived, they were postponed until nine o'clock.

Leave of Absence Granted.-The request of Rev. C. W. Smith

for leave of absence was granted.

Thanks.—The Committee on Thanks submitted its report, which was adopted and requested read by the Secretary in the Sunday morning service. (See Report No. 9.)

Orders of the Day.—The time for the Orders of the Day having arrived, the Conference proceeded to vote on the Tobacco Amendment. THE AMENDMENT CARRIED BY A VOTE OF 33 for and 1 AGAINST.

16 elders voting yes.

1 elder voting no.

17 delegates voting yes.

Committee on Rescinding Reports.—The Committee to whom was referred the matter of rescinding the action of the Conference of 1919 and 1920 relative to the Chestnut Ridge charge submitted its report which was adopted. (See Report No. 10.)

A motion prevailed authorizing the restoration to membership of those persons whose names were not retained by the Judic'ary Committee when the Chestnut Ridge church was suspended in 1918.

Second, That the matter be referred to a Standing Committee composed of three elders and two laymen, of which Rev. James A. Bain shall be chairman and the remaining members to be appointed by the chairman at his convenience. This Committee to hold at least one meeting during the year at the Chestnut Ridge charge at which all who were members of the church when it was suspended be invited to be present. The Committee to report at the next session of Conference, 1925.

Committee on Boundaries Reports.—The Committee on Boundaries submitted its report, which was adopted. (See Report No. 11.)

Committee on Conference Finance.—On motion Miss Rachel Davidson was elected a Committee to deliberate with the Conference Treasurer in working out a system of Conference Finance for the coming year. The pastors are requested to hold all Conference Funds until they get a written statement of proceedings from said Committee.

Adjourned for Committee work, subject to the call of the chair. The Conference was called to order by the President at 10:30.

Time for Orders Extended.—The time for the Orders of the Day having arrived, the time was extended for ten minutes to give

the members of the W. H. & F. M. Society the privilege of being present.

Characters Passed.—The names of L. C. Mattoon and C. I. Arm-

strong were called and characters passed.

Rev. E. F. McCarty Addresses Conference.—The extended time for orders having expired, Rev. E. F. McCarty, Connectional Foreign Missionary Secretary, addressed the Conference on missionary work.

Adjourned by limitation of time, the benediction being pronounced by Rev. W. A. Backus.

Third Day, Afternoon Session, April 4, 1924.

Opening.—The Conference was called to order by the Secretary and the devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. G. H. Clarke. The roll was called and minutes were read and approved.

Communications.—A communication from Rev. David Anderson was read and his character passed. His request to be placed on the general evangelistic list was referred to the Committee on Pastoral Relations.

A communication from Rev. C. H. Dow was read and his character passed. A request relative to a financial item was referred to the Board of Trustees.

Educational Interests Presented.—The Educational interests of Houghton Seminary were presented by President J. S. Luckey, assisted by Royal Woodhead and Professor H. LeRoy Fancher.

Auditing Committee Reports.—The Auditing Committee submitted a partial report, having O. Kd the Treasurer's report; report of the Board of Directors of Bethesda Home; and the report of Treasurer of the Board of Trustees. The reports were adopted.

Excuses From Conference Granted.—A request to be excused from Conference was granted to the following persons: Rev. C. P. Munson, Minnie Eager, M. J. Mead.

The report from the Moon Brook charge was read by M. J. Mead, the supply pastor.

On motion the case of M. J. Mead relative to his relations to the Conference was referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders

Letter of Transfer.—A letter of transfer of Rev. Clarence Barnett from the Allegheny Conference was read and referred to the Committee on Pastoral Relations.

Communication.—A communication from Rev. J. R. Babcock was read and his character passed.

The case of Rev. A. C. Dow in transferring his membership to the Lockport Conference was referred to the Committee on Pastoral Relations.

Characters Passed.—The following names were called and characters passed: J. A. Bain, F. B. Markell, G. H. Clarke.

The Committee on Traveling President submitted its report and its adoption was recommended. After some debate the question was postponed indefinitely. (See Report No. 12.)

Conference Budget.—On motion the Conference Budget was placed at two dollars (\$2.00) per member:

On motion the Committee on Statistics was authorized to secure for the Allegany charge a report of membership from last year's minutes and a report of Finance from the Conference Treasurer. The report for charges sending none was to be secured from last year's minutes.

Adjourned on motion subject to the call of the chair.

Fourth Day, Morning Session, April 5, 1924.

Opening.—The Conference was called to order by the President and the devotional exercises were conducted by Rev. M. A. Bateman The roll was called and the minutes read and approved.

Nomination of Standing Committees.—On motion the names of Rev. J. R. Pitt and J. A. Lockwood were added to the Committee on Temporary Organization and to this Committee was referred the work of nominating the Standing Committees.

Recess Taken.—A recess was taken for Committee work.

The Conference was called to order by the President at 9:25.

Leave of Absence Granted.—A leave of absence was granted to Rev. A. O. Northrup.

Annual Report of Bethesda Home.—The annual report of the Bethesda Home was read by Miss Anna Freeman, matron. The report was adopted. (See Report No. 13.)

On motion the question of salary for the matron of the Home was referred to the Missionary Board.

The Committee on Temporary Organization, to whom was referred the work of nominating Standing Committees, submitted its report. It was considered item by item and adopted. (See Report No. 14.)

Advisory Board Nominated.-The President nominated Rev. G.

H. Clarke and E. B. Houghton as his Advisory Board. The nominations received the approval of Conference.

The Committee on Budget submitted its report, which was adopted. (See Report No. 15.)

The report of the Conference Treasurer was read and adopted.

(See Report No. 16.)

Expenses of Travel and Pulpit Supply for Conference President.

On motion the Conference President was authorized to draw on the Conference Treasurer for finances sufficient to defray all traveling expenses and expense of pulpit supply while absent from his charge on Conference business.

The Committee on Itineracy and Orders submitted its report, which was considered item by item and adopted. (See Report No. 17.)

Deficit on Conference Tent.—On motion the matter of the deficit on Conference tent still owing Manley Crowell was referred to the Board of Trustees.

Ordering of Conference Minutes.—On motion the matter of ordering printed the Conference Minutes was placed in the hands of a Committee elected for that purpose. F. B. Markell, G. H. Clarke and Walter Readette were elected.

Conference Treasurer Borrowing Money.—On motion the matter of the Conference Treasurer borrowing money to meet necessary expenses of the Conference when the treasury was depleted, was referred to the Board of Trustees.

Funds for Payment of Minutes.—On motion one-half the cost of the minutes is to be paid from the Conference treasury, the other half to be secured from the sale of the minutes.

On motion the matter of financial aid to be given to Rev. C. P. Munson as voted on by the Conference of 1923 was referred to the Board of Trustees.

The Conference was called to order by the President at 4:50.

Excuse Granted.—Rev. W. A. Backus was excused from Conference.

CONFERENCE SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY'S REPORT.

District Sunday School Conventions.

To promote efficiency the Conference is divided into three districts, viz., District No. 1, Ashwood, Chestnut Ridge, Hess Road, Ransomville, Ellicott. District No. 2, Allegany, Fillmore, Higgins, Houghton, Machias, Wyoming. District No. 3, Ball Hill, Bradford, Cameron, Cattaraugus, East Leon, Jamestown Mission, Levant, Moon Brook, Olean. We have held but one district convention and that was with the Levant Sunday School. The district was well represented and a good convention was reported by those present. County and State conventions are good and Wesleyan Sunday Schools ought to co-operate as much as we can, but we need greater activity along the line of Wesleyan Sunday School conventions.

Teacher Training Work.

Sufficient teachers and the right kind of teachers is the problem of almost every Sunday School. To meet this need the Teacher Training work has been devised and ought to be pushed by more vigor by every one of the Sunday Schools in the Conference. We have

but two Teacher Training classes at the present time, viz. Cattaraugus and Fillmore. During the past year we have examined eighteen papers submitted to us and returned all with excellent marks.

Quarterly Reports.

It is the plan of the Conference Sunday School Secretary that each Sunday School report quarterly on the blanks furnished them so he may be able to keep in closer touch with the Sunday Schools and to promote a friendly rivalry that shall result in better schools. We have twenty-three organized Sunday Schools within the bounds of the Conference and all received, through their pastor, quarterly report blanks but only ten reported during the year. On one side of these blanks is the part for the quarterly report and on the other side is the Efficiency Standard that is recognized by the Wesleyan Methodist Connection as the proper standard for all of our Sunday Schools. There seems to be a lack of understanding concerning the Standard and some carelessness in reporting on the blanks. Of the ten Sunday Schools reporting only six reported on the Efficiency Standard.

Cattaraugus Sunday School having the highest showing of those schools reporting with an average of eighty-eight and three-fourths per cent is awarded the Banner and to be known as the Banner Sunday School of Lockport Conference for the coming year.

George Bathrust, stationed at Ellicott, is our pastor. The congregations are not large, but are blessed of God. East Aurora has a W. H. & F. M. Society of nine members, also a Y. M. W. B. of twenty-four members. The weekly cottage prayer meetings are spiritual. The Trustees of the Class have purchased a lot on Willow Street which is between the central and western part of the village, one lot from Main Street. The price of this lot was \$750 and was pledged by the Class. The soliciting committee has collected cash

and pledges to the amount of \$650 toward the contemplated tabernacle, this amount being given by business men and a few interested individuals in the village and vicinity. While there are several churches in this large village, we do not know of any that preaches holiness. The size of the lot is 50×176 , and the building is to be 32×40 feet. The complete estimation of same will be about \$3,000. At this writing the basement has been dug and the foundation laid. Most of the work being done voluntarily. We covet your prayers and desire that this appeal be brought before the Conference for consideration, trusting you will act in the matter as God may lead. Report No. 1.

MATRON OF DORMITORY HOUGHTON CAMP GROUND, 1923.

There are twenty rooms in the dormitory, all were occupied with the exception of the first two nights. After this the matron gave up her room, and after two nights gave up her cot bed, and besides turned away more than a dozen people after filling near-by rooms and sending some to her own home.

There were three families owning rooms who gave them up and slept in tents to accommodate those who dare not sleep in tents.

It is very desirous that there be better toilet accommodations. It was suggested that the society build an addition on the rear, making two more rooms upstairs and two down, taking off of each one down stairs to make toilets, one for men and one for women. There has been one man who estimated the cost around three hundred dollars. There was forty dollars pledged toward the plan there last year and more could be gotten easily if the plan carried.

We realized from the rooms last year seventy-three dollars and forty cents (\$73.40) received a pledge of one dollar (\$1) for electric light bill, paid for stove, brooms and receipt book six dollars and seventy-five cents (\$6.75) leaving a balance clearance of sixty-seven dollars and sixty-five cents (\$67.65).

There are several things needed badly. One dozen rugs for the rooms. We asked the different societies to send one but have had no response as yet. There is quite a quantity of wool ingrain carpet that could be made into rugs enough to make eight or ten fair size rugs at least, and a lady within five miles who does that kind of work if the society should so desire. We need four pairs of curtains for the reception room and front bed room. One dozen stand spreads and eight mirrors.
