



RESOLUTIONS AND LAWS OF THE INDIANA CONFERENCE

1. Our houses of worship should not be open to any evangelist or minister of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain a regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments. A waiving of the above by a contract or lease of building must be obtained through the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference.

2. That the Committee on Itinerary and Elder's Orders shall require all those desiring to unite with us from any other denomination or Annual Conference to present credits equivalent to our Conference Course of Study, regardless of their standing in the body of which they have been a member, and if they cannot do this they shall be required to meet the same conditions as our local preachers before ordination.

3. Any candidate for Elder's Orders or traveling under the direction of the Conference, who fails to attend the Institutes and the examinations of the Committee, without sufficient cause, shall be deemed unworthy of the trust and care of souls, and refused a place among us as a minister of the Gospel, and when they shall fail to attend the Institute for two successive years they shall be dropped from the roll.

4. The Committee on Elder's Orders is to transfer all persons to the study list who may have been recommended to travel and may not have been given work.

5. All charges with a membership of twenty-five or more shall in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the Pastor may live.

6. It is the duty of the Pastors to look after the insurance of our church and parsonage properties. All insurance shall provide for losses caused by fire and lightning, hail and tornado. A failure on the part of the Pastor shall be a censurable offense. If the church fails to insure their property upon reasonable effort of the pastor to secure the same, then said failure shall be reported to the President of the Conference who shall then have the property insured. In such case all insurance monies received from losses by fire, lightning, hail, and tornado shall be used in Church Extension work as the Conference Board of Trustees considers best.

7. All charges and stations to which a Pastor shall move shall pay the moving and transportation expenses of said Pastor, the same to be done in

WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH

addition to his salary. When the Conference demands the services of any one, that it shall bear the moving expenses, if any expense shall thus be incurred.

8. Each Pastor shall file a duplicate statistical report with the Committee before the close of the fifth day of August with the exception of Pastor's salary and Membership. These items to be reported the first day of Conference, said report to be kept on file one year. The Pastor shall report in open Conference the amount of Pastor's salary received, the amount of Budget assigned and raised, loss or gain in membership, the number of Wesleyan Methodist papers, Missionary magazines and Young People's Journals taken. The official character of any pastor shall not be passed until he shall have submitted a satisfactory report, including statistics.

9. All unaccounted for members appearing in the statistics in the membership list shall be referred to the discontinued list. All members in excess of the number reported shall be reported received.

10. The President shall receive \$35.00, the Vice-President \$25.00, the Secretary \$75.00, the Treasurer \$200.00, the Assistant Secretary \$35.00, each member of the Auditing Committee \$10.00, each member of the Statistical Committee \$25.00, Helper to the Treasurer \$50.00, the same to be apportioned pro-rata among the various funds of the Conference. The Conference Sunday-school Secretary shall receive \$75.00 and each member of the Conference Sunday-school Board \$25.00, the same to be paid out of the Sunday-school Treasury.

11. In the examination of characters the Conference officials shall be called first.

12. The Conference shall elect three members of the Camp Meeting Committee, one to be elected each year for a term of three years.

13. The Pastor shall bring a report to each Quarterly Meeting and send a duplicate to the Conference President quarterly on blanks furnished by the Conference.

14. We believe that the healing of the body is among the gifts of the Spirit according to 1 Corinthians 12:7-11, hence not for all Christians at all times as it is not always the will of God to heal the body.

15. No charge shall call any one as pastor, or to supply the work by ministers coming from other denominations as long as there are ministers in our Conference qualified and available to take work. The President after he has exercised his prerogative in the reception of ministers coming from other denominations, is to immediately refer them to the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders, who shall make a thorough investigation as to the ministry and life of such applicants, who shall report their findings to the President, after which, appointments may be made.

16. The Treasurers shall submit their reports to the Auditing Committee who shall audit the same and in their report to this body they shall show they have audited the same.

17. The Board of Trustees shall authorize all disbursements not otherwise provided for.

18. Each Pastor whose total pastor's receipts exceed \$1000.00 a year shall seek to organize a new class or give his services in a revival meeting to one of the weaker churches—whose total pastor's receipts are \$500.00 or less—to help establish it. And that the church which he pastors grant him such privileges without censure and with full remuneration of salary while in such a meeting.

19. The Storehouse Tithing Plan is the Conference plan for financing the Church work and the following percentage basis is the rule for distributing the same: Local Church Work, 70%; Budget, 30%. A Tithing Secretary be elected and that one evening service in the Conference Session be given for a Tithing Service and all Tithing Bands or churches of the Conference be called to give their yearly report, and some minister be chosen to preach on the Storehouse Tithing Plan. The expenses of Tithing Literature and Postage is to be paid from the Conference Claims Fund and churches desiring literature may secure the same from the Tithing Secretary. This service is a Special Order of the Conference.

20. The Assistant Secretary is to act as reporter of the Conference and Camp Meeting to the Marion daily papers.

21. Fifteen per cent of the "Conference Missions" Budget shall be applied on the arms liabilities as the nature of the liabilities demand, and, that the Conference Treasurer is to disburse the unrestricted receipts in the "Conference College Building Debt" item as the nature of the liabilities demand, with the approval of the Conference Board of Trustees.

22. The first Sunday of the Annual gathering belongs to the old year, and the second Sunday of the Annual gathering belongs to the new year.

23. The Camp Meeting Committee shall nominate and the Conference elect the one to preach the opening sermon of the next Conference Year with his alternate.

24. The President of the Conference shall be given each year a two weeks' vacation with pay, said vacation to be at a time of his own choosing.

25. When churches which have been placed in the hands of the President, if they can and do decide as to who shall be their pastor before the Minutes are sent to the press, the same shall be entered in the minutes the same as if ordered by this Conference.

26. In case of an emergency the President and the Board of Trustees are empowered to make a special assessment to meet the need, and the

funds are to be sent to the Conference Treasurer and credited to the Sick Preachers Benefit fund.

27. Each charge shall grant to its pastor each year a two weeks' vacation with pay.

28. No pastor whose total receipts are \$1,200.00 shall hold more than two revivals yearly away from his charge, unless by consent of the President and his Advisory Committee.

29. All building and repair on Conference property which the local church is unable to provide for satisfactorily shall pass the approval of the Conference Building Committee before obligations are assumed.

30. The use of the wedding ring is not in accord with our standards as a Church, therefore we as a Conference disapprove of our ministers performing or taking part in the ring ceremony.

OFFICIAL ACTS OF THE PRESIDENT

Report No. 5

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE AND APPROPRIATIONS

We, the Committee on Finance and Appropriations, wish to submit the following recommendations:

Item I. President and Vice-President:

A. That the President and Vice-President shall have supervision of the work of the Conference, devoting their full time to the same. They shall work together, jointly, and coöperatively in planning the program of Quarterly Meetings and evangelistic campaigns for the Conference year.

B. The President or Vice-President shall conduct at least one Quarterly Meeting on each charge during the year, and shall assist the pastors

THE INDIANA CONFERENCE

in raising their budgets, and shall urge that each church provide adequate support for its pastor.

C. That the salary of the President shall be \$1800.00 per year and expenses incidental to his work, and the salary of the Vice-President shall be \$1650.00 per year and expenses incidental to his work.

Item II. Conference Claims:

That the Conference Claims Budget be forwarded quarterly to the Conference Treasurer or may be paid to the President or Vice-President when he conducts the Quarterly Meeting on the respective charges. The Conference Treasurer shall pay the salary of the President and the expenses of the President and Vice-President incidental to their work from this fund.

Item III. Conference Missions Fund:

The Conference Treasurer shall pay the Vice-President's salary from the Conference Missions Fund monthly. The President and Vice-President shall receive offerings during their evangelistic campaigns and shall forward these offerings to the Conference Treasurer at least monthly in order that they may be added to the Conference Missions Fund. These offerings shall not be credited on the budget of any church.

Item IV. Sunday-school Offerings:

That the Sunday-school offerings of the first Sunday of each month shall be divided equally by the local treasurer between Home Missions and Conference Missions until the Home Missions budget is full, and shall be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer at least quarterly.

Item V. Storehouse Plan:

A. That since the Storehouse Tithing Plan has been adopted by this Conference as the financial plan of the Conference, we urge our churches to conform to this plan as soon as possible.

B. That each church that is not using the Storehouse Tithing Plan shall elect a Board of Stewards of at least three members whose duty shall be to cooperate with the pastor in raising the budget, and that the pastor shall forward the same to the proper Treasurer at least quarterly.

Item VI. Budget:

A. That the Budget Apportionment per member shall be as follows: Foreign Missions, \$2.00; Home Missions, 50 cents; Connectional Education, \$1.50; Orphanage, 25 cents; Conference Missions, \$1.00; Conference Claims, 75 cents; Conference College Building Debt, 25 cents; Camp Meeting Expense Fund, 75 cents; Superannuated Ministers Fund, 25 cents; and General Conference Delegate Fund, 25 cents, this fund to be paid by June 1, 1943. Connectional and Conference Sunday-school Apportionment shall be 10 cents per enrolled member in main school.

B. That all church budget, excepting that raised by W. H. & F. M. S. and Y. M. W. B. be sent to the Treasurer of the Conference, Rev. C. D. Crabill.

WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH

C. That the Camp Meeting Committee shall have the privilege of putting out pledge cards in the congregations, receiving these pledges from friends, taking cash offerings throughout the camp, and designating one or two nights during the camp as dollar nights when the people may be asked to bring in a dollar offering on such nights. That the Camp Meeting pledges be sent to the Treasurer of the Camp Meeting Association, Rev. E. L. Glover.

D. That the price of the Conference Minutes shall be 25 cents per copy with an allotment of one copy of the Minutes for every six members and should any deficit occur in this fund that it be met pro rata by the various Conference arms.

All money which is listed for minutes in the pastor's statistical report shall be paid to the Conference Treasurer before the report is submitted to the Statistical Committee of the Conference.

Item VII.

That Standing Rule Number 10 be changed to read as follows: The President shall receive \$35.00, the Vice-President \$25.00, the same to take effect this Conference; the Secretary \$75.00, the Treasurer \$200.00; the Assistant Secretary \$35.00; Each member of the Auditing Committee \$10.00; Each member of the Statistical Committee \$25.00; the Treasurer's Helper \$50.00; the same to be pro rata among the various funds of the Conference. The Conference Sunday-school Secretary shall receive \$75.00 and each member of the Conference Sunday-school Board \$25.00, the same to be paid out of the Sunday-school Treasury.

That Standing Rule Number 21 be changed to read "fifteen per cent" instead of "ten per cent."

That all pastors and churches cooperate with the Bond Retirement Campaign for Marion College.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD OF
INDIANA CONFERENCE

Another year of Sunday-school activities is history and we are happy to report some advancement.

We show an increase of six in number of schools reporting with an increase of enrollment and average attendance.

In the evangelistic effort 674 scholars were converted and 213 joined the church.

In benevolences we have an increase of \$1594.76 over last year.

A number of schools conducted D. V. B. S. and report very gratifying returns in new homes contacted and conversion of scholars.

In the training department one class graduated under the guidance of Rev. William Ott. Special graduating service was conducted at Ft. Wayne at our convention for this class. We have a number of other classes enrolled in this department.

We recommend a continuation of the ten cent per member assessment of main school enrollment for Connectional and Conference work.

We recommend that conventions be held in each district in the month of October if conditions permit. The places for these conventions have already been chosen.

We wish to express our appreciation for the efforts put forth for Rally Day. The reports show that thirty-two schools or over one third of our Sunday schools had a record attendance. We urge that our Sunday-school workers begin as soon as possible after Conference to work for a new record attendance on Rally Day the last Sunday in September, and that a report of the results be sent at once to the Conference Sunday-school Secretary.

We recommend that the districts remain the same as last year with this exception—that Hartford City be changed to the Central District Eastern Central Section; and Huntington, Warren and Plummers Chapel be changed to the Central District Eastern Section with Superintendent as follows:

Report No. 12

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

The Committee on Resolutions wishes to submit the following report:

I. **Spiritual Life.** Realizing the importance of deep spirituality in our Church, we deplore the increasing tendency toward nominal Christianity, compromise with sin, and conformity to the world. Whereas, many people are living beneath Bible standards of conduct, and many have departed from the old paths of righteousness, be it resolved, that we, the Indiana Conference, do hereby reaffirm our adherence to those doctrines that have been held fundamental, namely, the Bible as the inspired Word of God, the Deity of Jesus Christ, His vicarious atonement, the resurrection of Christ from the dead, His ascension to the right hand of the Father, His second coming to earth, the creation of man by the immediate creative act of God, the fall of man from the holy state in which he was created, the doctrine of regeneration, or the "new birth," by which the sinner becomes a child of God and is delivered from the guilt of sin, and the

doctrine of entire sanctification by which work of grace the heart is cleansed by the Holy Spirit from all inbred sin through faith in Jesus Christ.

We urge our pastors and other leaders to teach these fundamental Doctrines, to stress the importance of public and private prayer, an intensive study of God's Word, faithful attendance of the church services, careful daily living, and a strict adherence to the family altar. Our pastors, class leaders and personal workers should insist on definite religious experiences, and definite testimonies on the part of our people.

We would urge our ministers and laymen to refrain from unnecessary employment and worldly pursuits which overemphasize material gain and which tend to prevent or hinder attendance upon the regular means of grace such as private devotions, family and public worship.

We view with alarm the modern tendency to substitute a social program for the spiritual program of the Church, and urge that our pastors supervise carefully the social activities of our churches and Sunday schools in order to avoid any atmosphere of worldliness.

Whereas the spirit of intolerance among many people has hindered the cause of holiness in many communities, be it resolved, that we encourage a spirit of tolerance under the leadership of the Holy Spirit, and without compromise.

Furthermore, we are reminded that members of the early Church went everywhere preaching the Word, and that the Lord added to the Church daily such as should be saved. Considering Christ's great commission to the Church, the fields that are already white unto harvest, and the financial increase with which God is now blessing the Church, let us seize our opportunity to evangelize new fields and build a stronger Wesleyan Methodist Church.

II. Church Program. Since the storehouse tithing plan has been adopted as the financial plan of the Conference, we urge our pastors and evangelists to enlighten and awaken our people by preaching clearly and consistently on this subject to the end that our churches may conform to this plan as soon as possible. Whereas the Tithing Secretary of our Conference has made available to our pastors Tithing Pledge Cards to be signed by tithing members, be it resolved, that each pastor distribute these cards to his congregation, forward a list of his tithing members to the Tithing Secretary, and keep the signed cards on file.

Believing that Christian education, both of our ministry and laity is essential to the progress of our Church, we urge our people to give their wholehearted support to Marion College by prayer, by financial aid, and by urging prospective students to patronize our own school. In this time of crisis, let us unite our best efforts to liquidate the bonded indebtedness of Marion College while economic conditions are favorable.

Whereas our Church provides three excellent periodicals for the instruction and edification of our people and the progress and unification of

the Church, be it resolved, that each pastor shall be responsible for presenting these periodicals to his people and community, and that he shall keep a complete record of the subscriptions on his charge, and receive renewals from subscribers. We also recommend that our people make generous use of the books and other literature, which are available at our Publishing House.

Whereas the catechism which was published by order of the General Conference may be an invaluable aid in indoctrinating our people, be it resolved, that each pastor provide for its use in children's groups, prayer meeting groups, and other groups in which this type of instruction will be acceptable.

III. **Moral Reform.** We deplore the general lowering of moral standards in our country and pledge our coöperation with every local and national organization which exists for the betterment of mankind and the promotion of Christ's kingdom. Recognizing the danger of conforming to the customs and standards of the world, we urge that our people carefully refrain from participating in questionable amusements; the wearing of scanty or improper clothing, and the use of tobacco and alcoholic beverages.

Since the sale and consumption of alcoholic beverages continue to increase, to the great detriment of the health, safety, and morals of the American people, we demand a return to national prohibition and the adoption of an intensive program of temperance education as the most feasible means of dealing with this growing menace. Believing that total abstinence from all intoxicating liquors as a beverage to be the duty of all Christians, be it resolved, that our ministers and teachers give proper emphasis to the standards of our Church on this subject.

The use of the wedding ring is not in accord with our standards as a Church, and we disapprove of our ministers performing or taking part in the ring ceremony.

We view with alarm the increasing prevalence of the spirit of indifference toward the sanctity of the Christian Sabbath. We earnestly exhort our people to refrain carefully from every activity that would hinder their duties of worship on the Lord's Day. While we realize that there are certain forms of labor that may be a necessity on the Sabbath, we warn our people against the encroaching claims of modern life which would conflict with our time-honored convictions with regard to the Sabbath Day. Therefore be it resolved, that this Conference and Holy Body advise and instruct the members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church to refrain from laboring on the Lord's Day for personal gain.

IV. **Civic Standards.** Whereas our national life is proving to be tainted with communism and totalitarian sympathies, be it resolved, that our ministers encourage the spirit of Christian Americanism, faithfulness to the Christian principles of the nation, and the defense of our Christian liberties.

Recognizing the horrors of war, we urge that men and nations seek by every legitimate means to avoid armed conflict among the peoples and nations of the world and to propagate the truth of the gospel until Christ, the Prince of Peace, shall rule in every heart, until men shall be brothers the world over, until all the nations are at peace, and until righteousness shall cover the earth as the waters cover the sea.

While we should give moral support to the sincere, conscientious objector, who cannot with a clear conscience bear arms in military conflict, we wish to honor the boys who represent us in military service and who are undergoing hardship and endangering their lives in the defense of our free institutions. We hereby pledge ourselves to give to these boys our loyal support and to faithfully bear them to a throne of grace in earnest prayer.

Let us as a body support the movement for coöperative effort on the part of our military leaders and the Church, not only to remove from our soldiers in the camps the evil influences of the liquor traffic and commercialized vice and other temptations, but to furnish Christian literature and provide suitable religious services for the soldiers.

While we do not condemn membership in labor unions as such, yet we do desire to warn our people against participation in union activities of a violent or riotous nature, and against any union affiliations that would obligate one to engage in such lawless activities, or to desecrate the Sabbath Day.

PLANS COMMITTEE

We, your Committee on Plans, submit the following report:

COMMITTEE ON FINANCE AND APPROPRIATIONS

We, the Committee on Finance and Appropriation, wish to submit the following recommendations:

1. That the Area Vice-President receive: (a) A salary of ten dollars to be paid from the State treasury. (b) Traveling expenses while traveling our Conference, to be paid by that group asking his services.

2. That the Conference W. Y. P. S. President receive from the State treasury: (a) A salary of twenty-five dollars. (b) Desk and traveling expenses.

3. That the Conference W. Y. P. S. Secretary-Treasurer receive from the State treasury: (a) A salary of fifteen dollars. (b) Desk expenses.

4. That the Divisional Superintendents receive: (a) A salary of five dollars each. (b) Desk and traveling expenses. (c) These amounts shall be met equally by the districts within the division.

5. That each society pay an assessment equivalent to five cents per church member to be sent to the State W. Y. P. S. Treasurer.

6. That the Connectional dues of one dollar per society be sent to the Conference W. Y. P. S. Treasurer who shall forward the same to the proper general official in a lump sum. These dues shall be sent in by December 31, 1942.

7. That traveling expenses shall be figured on the basis of four cents per mile.

8. That fifteen dollars per Delegate be paid from the Conference treasury to apply on the General Conference providing that Conference is held at Houghton.

9. That all finances raised in pioneer evangelistic campaigns conducted under the auspices of the Conference W. Y. P. S. shall go into the Conference treasury, and all expenses and support shall be paid by the Treasurer from his funds.

10. That the Conference W. Y. P. S. raise at least one hundred and fifty dollars to meet the great need for Conference evangelism and forward the same to our Conference Treasurer as pro rated by this committee: Fairmount District, \$17.00; Baker's Corner District, \$17.00; Warren District, \$17.00; Wabash District, \$17.00; New Castle District, \$17.00; Shelbyville District, \$11.00; Kokomo District, \$11.00; Plymouth District, \$11.00; Bluffton District, \$11.00; Fort Wayne District, \$11.00; LaFayette District, \$10.00.

11. That all receipts for benevolences be sent to the Conference W. Y. P. S. Treasurer who shall return a receipt for receipts.

12. That the Executive Committee of each local W. Y. P. S. consult with the pastor and his Board of Stewards before planning its financial program for the year.

THE INDIANA CONFERENCE

13. That Local Societies raise the major part of their benevolences in the field of Connectional Education.

14. That the young people of each Local Society receive two offerings for the Hephzibah Home, one at Christmas time and the second to be received at Easter.

15. That the books of the State Treasurer be closed by August first, next.

Again we urge that no such donations be brought to the college sooner than two weeks after canning. We recommend that each can bear the label of contents and the contributing society.

5. We recommend that next year Harvest Day be changed from the third to the second Friday of October.

6. We recommend that each Local President be responsible for the attendance at the Harvest Day program of representatives of her church, that their interest might be renewed, their vision enlarged and the cause of Christian education encouraged.
