

Journal of Daily Proceedings

The one-hundred-fourth session of the Indiana Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America convened on the Fairmount Campground, Fairmount, Indiana at 7:30 p. m., August 18th, 1952.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE FOR CONFERENCE **EXTENSION**

During the course of the year 1950-1951, your Committee met on five occasions to study the problems of Conference Extension. During the year 1951-1952, the meetings were as follows:

1st Meeting, September

To summarize the reaction of Conference and to plan the program of the year.

2nd Meeting, October 1

This Committee and the District Superintendents met with the General Home Missionary Secretary for counsel and inspiration.

3rd Meeting, January 28

Reviewed the program and set up agenda for a meeting with the District Superintendents.

4th Meeting, February 25

Met with the District Superintendents and some representative laymen and discussed the following agenda:

(1) A study and review of present plan by Rev. V. Van Matre.

- (2) Efficiency Standards for Pastors and Churches 1 y Maxwell Enyeart.
- (3) Promotion of present plan by District Superintendents by Rev. R. Woodhead.
- (4) Conference Extension by other Conferences by Rev. Geo. Ott and A. D. Minx.
- General Summary by Rev. E. L. Kierstead.

5th Meeting, May 5

Summarized the work of the Committee and unanimously agreed upon the recommendations, to be presented to the Conference.

6th Meeting, May 9
Met to formulate and complete the report. The following recommendations were made:

ITEM I—We recommend that there be nominated by the Pastoral Relations Committee and elected by the Conference, a District Superintendent for each of the Conference districts, who will assist the Vice President in carrying out the Conference Extension work.

ITEM II-We recommend that the District Superintendents shall be

responsible to the President and Vice President in the carrying out of the district program.

ITEM III—

(A) We recommend that the District Superintendent shall call a meeting of the pastors in his district and a representative layman from each church who shall be chosen by said pastor and be termed the Local Secretary of Conference Extension in his church. The date shall be set by the Vice President.

(B) We further recommend that, hereafter, each church elect annually a Local Conference Extension Secretary whose duties shall be to keep the needs of Conference Extension before the congre-

gation and to act as their prayer reminder.

ITEM IV—We further recommend that it shall be the District Superintendent's duty to inform the Vice President of any possible openings for the extension of the work of the church in his district. The District Superintendent shall assist in the raising of Conference Extension funds. The pastors in each district are urged and expected to cooperate.

ITEM V—We recommend a minimum goal of \$2.00 per member for Conference Extension work to assist new and weaker churches and that the stronger churches shall not expect assistance, except in the case of emergency. Money given in response to special appeals shall be in excess of the above goal.

ITEM.—The Third Man.

(A) Records and reports reveal that openings exceed income to promote such projects.

(B) Income for Conference Extension does not justify the employ-

ment of a third man.

(C) Our survey of the Extension Program reveals that other Conferences are succeeding without a third man.

(D) It is the judgment of this Committee that with adequate supervision by the Vice President and the District Superintendents, as much or more could be accomplished.

(E) Therefore, your Committee does not recommend the employment

of a third man in 1952-1953.

ITEM VII—We recommend to the Conference that, hereafter, matters relative to Conference Extension may be referred to the Committee on Finance and Appropriation.

Whereas, it has been the publicly announced policy of the present administration in Washington to appoint an ambassador or other accredited official representative to the Vatican, We, the members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church regularly assembled in Annual Conference at Fairmount, Indiana this 22nd day of August, 1952, unanimously voice our protest against this policy for the following reasons:

- 1. We believe it to be a violation of the traditional American principle set forth in the Federal Constitution which guarantees the separation of church and state.
- 2. Even though it may be true as it is argued by administration leaders that the Vatican is one of the best listening posts in the world to discover the details of international political intrigue; we believe that the appointment of a national representative recognizes the Vatican as a civil state possessed with powers comparable to those of the organized governments of the world. We refuse to accept the Vatican on such basis.
- 3. We urge our people to express to their congressmen and United States Senators our opposition to this proposed appointment and to urge that our Indiana representatives in the Congress vote unanimously against the confirmation of such appointee.

Resolutions and Laws of the Indiana Conference

I. Houses of Worship.

1. Our houses of worship should not be open to any evangelist or minister of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain a regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments. A waving of the above by a contract or lease of building must be obtained through the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference.

II. Pastoral Duties

- 1. It is the duty of the pastors to look after the insurance of our church and parsonage properties. All insurance shall provide for losses caused by fire and lightning, hail, and tornado. A failure on the part of the pastor shall be a censurable offense. If the church fails to insure their property upon reasonable effort of the pastor to secure the same, then said failure shall be reported to the President of the Conference who shall then have the property insured. In such cases all insurance monies received from losses by fire, lightning, hail and tornado shall be used in Church Extension work as the Conference Board of Trustees considers best.
- 2. Each pastor and evangelist shall file a complete statistical report with the statistical committee without fail before the fifth day of August.
- A. The pastor shall report in open conference the items listed on special blanks furnished by the Conference.
- B. The official character of any pastor or evangelist shall not be passed until he shall have submitted a satisfactory report including statistics.
- C. In compiling statistics report, all figures shall be given in even dollars at the nearest dollar, i. e., \$1.01 to \$1.50 shall be reported as \$1.00 and from \$1.51 to \$1.99 shall be reported as \$2.00. The item number VIII on benevolences alone to be excepted and shall be reported exactly as paid.
- 3. All unaccounted for members appearing in the statistics in the membership list shall be referred to the discontinued list. All members in excess of the number reported shall be reported received.
- 4. The pastor shall bring a report to each Quarterly Meeting and send a duplicate to the Conference President and Vice-President, quarterly, on blanks furnished by the Conference.
- 5. This Conference asks each pastor to prepare a calling list of all the homes connected with the Church and Sunday school; listing the relationship they hold to the church; listing their names and addresses by city; street and number, the same to be kept for his own work while on the pastorate and to be given to his successor on the field.
- 6. No pastor whose total receipts are \$1500.00 or more shall hold more than two revivals yearly away from his charge, one of which is mentioned in resolution seven under pastoral duties, unless by consent of the President and his Advisory Board.

- 7. Each pastor whose total pastor's receipts exceed \$2000.00 a year should seek to organize a new class or give his services in a revival meeting to a new or weaker church, to help establish it. The church which he pastors should grant him such privileges without censure, with full remuneration of salary while in such a meeting. The Vice President shall serve as Co-ordinator, to recommend and help arrange such meetings.
- 8. Delegate's Credentials secured from the Secretary shall be mailed to the Assistant Secretary by the pastor not later than ten days before the convening of Conference.

III. Churches

- 1. All charges with a membership of twenty-five or more shall in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the pastor may live.
- 2. All charges and stations to which a pastor shall move shall pay the moving and transportation expenses of said pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary. When the Conference demands the services of any one, that it shall bear the moving expenses, if any expense shall be incurred.
- 3. No charge shall call any one as pastor, or to supply the work by ministers coming from other denominations as long as there are ministers in our Conference qualified and available to take work. The President after he has exercised his prerogative in the reception of ministers coming from other denominations. is to immediately refer them to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders, who shall make a thorough investigation as to the ministry and life of such applicants, who shall report their findings to the President, after which, appointments may be made.
- 4. Each charge should grant their pastor each year two weeks vacation with pay.
- 5. The Sunday School offerings of the first Sunday of each month shall be divided equally by the local treasurer between "Home Missions" and "Conference Expense Fund" until these budgets are in full. The same to be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer, quarterly.

IV. Conference.

- 1. Each Annual Conference shall be held at Fairmount, Indiana, beginning on the Tuesday nearest August eighth.
- 2. The first Sunday of the Annual Gathering belongs to the old conference year and the second Sunday of the Annual Gathering belongs to the new conference year.
 - 3. The fiscal year begins August 1st and ends July 31st.
- 4. The sitting of the Conference for each day is considered as one meeting.
- 5. In examination of characters the Conference officials shall be called first.
- 6. The President and his advisory board shall be consuted before any love offering shall be taken.
- 7. The Secretary and the Assistant Secretary constitute a committee on communications.

- 8. The Assistant Secretary is to act as reporter of the Conference to the Marion Daily papers.
- 9. The Treasurers shall submit their reports to the Auditing Committee who shall audit the same and in their report to this body they shall show they have audited the same.
- 10. The Board of Trustees are authorized to act as the Conference Missionary Board.
- 11. The Board of Trustees shall authorize all disbursements not otherwise provided for.
- 12. The President shall receive \$100.00, the Vice President \$50.00, the Secretary \$100.00, the Treasurer \$300.00, the Assistant Secretary \$50.00, each member of the Auditing Committee \$25.00, each member of the Statistical Committee \$40.00; the same to be paid from the Conference Expense Fund. The Conference Sunday School Secretary shall receive \$100.00 and each member of the Conference Sunday School Board \$50.00, the same to be paid out of the Sunday School Treasury.
- 13. The President of the Conference, and Vice President shall be given each year a two weeks vacation with pay, said vacation to be at a time of their own choosing.
- 14. When the churches, which have been placed in the hands of the President decides as to who shall be their pastor before the Minutes are sent to press, the same shall be entered in the minutes as if ordered by this Conference.
- 15. "The Emergency Benefit Fund" shall be used only for the relief of the ministers, or their widows, of the Conference in times of sickness, or death, or other needs of emergency character. This fund to be administered by the Conference Board of Trustees.
- 16. There shall be a January Preacher's and Worker's convention held bienially in the four sections of the Conference. These conventions shall be held during the years in which Marion College Area Ministers' Conventions are not held. The Vice President shall be responsible for planning and conducting such Conventions. He may nominate and the Conference shall elect one man from each Conference District who shall serve with him on the Planning Committee.
- 17. The Building Committee shall be elected by the Missionary Board except one member who shall be elected by the Conference.
- 18. That the Conference Secretary be authorized to purchase a floral offering for the family in the event of death of any of our ministers. The same to apply to elders or conference preachers in the event of the death of the minister's hunsband, wife, son or daughter. The father and mother of the Conference Officials, who are not pastors, shall be included. When requested the price of the flowers shall be given as a missionary memorial. The memorial to be paid from the Conference Expense Fund.

V. Committees

- 1. The Committee on Elders Orders is to transfer all persons to the study list who may have been recommended to travel and may not have been given work, providing they are meeting the disciplinary requirements in the course of study.
 - 2. When recommendations to travel and to study preparatory to

travel are presented to the Conference in session, they shall be recorded by the Secretary and automatically referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders, without having been read to the Conference.

- 3. The Camp Meeting Committee shall nominate and the Conference elect the one to preach the opening sermon of the next Conference Year with his alternate.
- 4. The Conference shall elect five members of the Camp Meeting Committee. Three of which are to be ministerial, one to be elected each year for a term of three years; two to be lay members, one to be elected each year for a term of two years.
- 5. No building or major repair involving structural changes on church property shall be undertaken without the approval of the Conference Building Committee.

VI. Other Resolutions.

1. The use of the wedding ring is not in accord with our standards as a Church, therefore we as a Conference disapprove of our ministers performing or taking part in the ring ceremony.

VII. Burial Association.

- 1. Each local church should elect a Local Secretary for the Burial Association, whose duty it would be to promote the interests of the Association and to seek to obtain new members for the same. And if the church so elects, collect the dues of members and forward them to the General Secretary.
- 2. We earnestly request that the pastor present, or have presented, the work of the Burial Association at least once during the conference year, and seek to obtain new members for the same.

VIII. Pension Plan.

- 1. Let it be clearly understood by every member of the Conference that aside from the provisions of the Pension Plan the Conference has no fund upon which to draw to meet the financial needs of the superannuated or permanently incapacitated ministers or their dependents.
- 2. Let it be further understood by the membership of the Conference that following the rise of the 1952 Indiana Annual Conference any eligible minister who has failed to join the plan will have voluntarily waived his right, and that of his dependents, to any financial aid from the Conference in the case of his superannuation, or physical disability, which forced him to retire from active service within the Conference before or after the age of retirement.

Report No. 1

OFFICIAL ACTS OF THE PRESIDENT

- 1. August 27—After conferring with some of the members of the Silver Lake Church, I appointed Howard Crim as their pastor.
- 2. September 9—Upon visiting the Byron Church and learning that it was their desire to have the same pastors for another year, I appointed Vestal and Mary McAninch as their pastors.
- 3. October 6—Accepted the resignation of Thurman Wood from the pastorate of the Eaton, Ohio, Church.
- 4. October 9—Having received due notice of the appointment by the Department of Home Missions of Cecil Katz to work in the Mexican Mission at Carlsbad, California, under the direction of Rev. John Henley, I recognized this appointment and granted Brother Katz a Conference l'reacher's License.
- 5. October 16—At the request of the Deming Church, I appointed O. H. Guillaume as their pastor.
- 6. December 28—Having been notified that the Rev. Dallas D. Mc-Intosh, a Recorded Minister in the Friends church, had joined the West 8th Street Church and having received from the General Superintendent of the Ohio Yearly Meeting of the Friends Church a letter of recommendation of Brother McIntosh, I received him as a minister in the conference and appointed him to the work of General Evangelism in accordance with the provisions of the Discipline.
- 7. January 18—Accepted the resignation of Robert Powell from the pastorate of the Bethel Church.
- 8. January 24—Accepted the resignation of James Judy from the pastorate of the Mt. Olive Church, his resignation being due to the death of his father.
- 9. January 24—Granted Elder James Judy a Letter of Transfer to the Dakota Conference.
- 10. January 24—Having been notified that the Rev. Donald Heer of the Brethren in Christ Church had, with his wife, joined our church at Plymouth and having received a letter of recommendation from Brother Heer's Bishop, I, therefore, received him as a minister in the Conference.
- 11. January 24—The Star Church having requested by vote that Rev. Donald L. Heer be appointed, I granted their request and appointed him as supply paster of their church with his duties to begin on February 3.
- 12. January 25—Having received word that the Bethel church had by vote requested the appointment of Conference Preacher, Harold Polk, I granted their request and appointed him as their pastor.
- 13. January 25—Having received notice that the Mt. Olive Church had by vote requested the appointment of Conference Preacher, Meurice E. Gaylor, I, therefore, granted the request and appointed him as supply pastor of their church.
- 14. February 29—It was discovered that when the workers for the 1952 Camp Meeting were engaged some three or four years ago, a mistake was made in calculating the date. Consequently, the workers were called

for August 24 to 31 instead of August 17 to 24 which would have been the correct date. In view of this situation and the impossibility of some of the workers to come at the earlier date, the Conference Board of Trustees took action requesting the Conference President and his Advisory Board to change the date of the coming session of the Conference to convene on August 19 instead of August 12, thus harmonizing with the date set by the Camp Meeting Committee. I complied with this request and changed the date accordingly, the Advisory Board agreeing thereto.

A record of this action was sent immediately to the General Conference President who presented it to the Executive Board of the Board of Administration. They considered it as a request for change of date of an Annual Conference and granted the same.

- 15. March 3—A new mission work was opened in Kingsford Heights last November 4 by Rev. Vestal Van Matre and others upon authorization of the Conference Missionary Board. By mutual agreement Woodrow Shields had been supplying the work there on Sundays since that time. The Missionary Board felt that a resident pastor should be secured at the earliest possible date. It was learned that Wilbur Wolf was available to move on the work. Consequently, with the Board's sanction, I appointed Wilbur Wolf to supply as Superintendent of the Kingsford Heights Mission with his duties to begin April 14.
- 16. March 6-At her request, I granted Elder Bertha Chapman a Letter of Transfer to the Florida Conference.
- 17. March 16—I received a church of thirteen members at Lawrence, organized by Rev. Vestal Van Matre, and declared the same to be a Wesleyan Methodist church.
- 18. March 16—At the request of the newly organized Lawrence Church, I appointed Roscoe Irby as their pastor.
- 19. March 31—I accepted the resignation of Arthur D. Personett from the pastorate of the Hartford City Church. He resigned from all of his conference offices and surrendered his credentials as an Elder in the church. These also were duly accepted, the Advisory Board agreeing thereto.
- 20. April 14—I appointed Willis E. Drake to the Work of Conference Evangelism and issued him a license as an Annual Conference Preacher. I also wrote a letter of recommendation to aid him in receiving an appointment as an assistant Chaplain in the United States Navy.
- 21. April 17—At the request of the Hartford City Church, I appointed Everett Mart as their pastor.
- 22. April 22—I referred four vacancies to Rev. James Pickett, Chairman of the Committee on Vacancies. He reported that the Committee had met and made appointments to fill the vacancies as follows: Member of Auditing Committee, Robert Kenworthy; Member of Sunday School Board, Thomas Wildey; Secretary of Child Evangelism, Don H. Polston; and Member of the Committee on Ministerial Character, Roscoe C. Coleman. I approved the above appointments.
- 23. May 19—The pulpit at Eaton, Ohio, had been supplied by Eldon J. Otis, E. J. Hodgin, Paul Walters, and William Evans since the resignation of the pastor last October. The church, by vote, requested the appointment of Brother Evans. This request was granted and he was appointed as their pastor.
- 24. May 19—Received a letter of Transfer for Conference Preacher, Floyd J. Metz, from the Dakota Conference.

- 25. June 25—Received a Letter of Transfer for Elder, Philip M. Jones, from the Ohio Conference.
- 26. July 7—Accepted the resignation of William Evans from the pastorate of the Eaton, Ohio, Church. I then appointed him to the work of Conference Evangelism.
- 27. July 16—Received a Letter of Transfer for Elder W. T. Mc-Mahan from the Tennessee Conference.
- 28. July 21—Received a Letter of Transfer for Elder C. J. Mowrer from the Oklahoma Conference.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE AND APPROPRIATIONS

We, the Committee on Finance and Appropriation submit the following report.

Item I. That the budget apportionment be per member as follows:

All church budget excepting that raised by the Y.M.W.B., the W.M.S., and the W.Y.P.S. be sent to the conference treasurer.

Item II. Superannuate Pension Plan.

Any individual, eligible for membership and having failed to join the plan, may become a member by paying the enrollment fee, providing he shall waive service credit for such years as he has not paid assessments.

When a pastor fails to raise, in full, the Superannuated Pension Budget, he shall report to the character committee a satisfactory reason for not doing so. Also the question on statistical blank read to conference shall be answered, "Are you a member of the Superanuate Pension Plan?"

Item III. That the Sunday School Apportionment be 20¢ per enrolled member in the main school as reported in the conference minutes of the preceding year, under; (Total in main School).

Item IV. That the Conference Minutes be 40¢ per copy with a minimum of one copy for every six members of the church, and should any deficit occur, that it be paid from the Conference Expense Fund.

Item V. That the General W.Y.P.S. dues be \$1.00 per active member of the W.Y.P.S.

Item VI. That the President shall have general supervision of the work of the conference.

- A. We recommend that the President or Vice President arrange their schedule to visit each church in the conference at least once during the year.
- B. The Vice President shall have direct supervision of the Conference Extension work, subject to the counsel and the approval of the Conference Missionary Board. He shall be responsible for the promotion of raising funds for Conference Extension and may secure assistance as he may deem necessary to successfully carry out the same.
- C. The Minimum goal of \$2.00 per member be raised for Conference Extension. And the Rally Day offering count on this goal. Also that every effort be put forth to meet the goal of two new churches this year.
- D. 1. We further recommend that there be nominated by the Pastoral Relations Committee and elected by the Conference, a District Superintendent for each of the Conference Districts, who will assist the Vice President in carrying out the Conference Extension Work.
- 2. The District Superintendents shall call a meeting of the pastors in his district and a representative layman who shall be chosen by pastor from his church and be termed the Local Secretary of Conference Extension. The date of the meeting shall be set by the Vice President.
- 3. We further recommend that, hereafter, each church elect annually a Local Conference Extension Secretary whose duties shall be to keep the needs of Conference Extension before the people and to act as their prayer reminder.
- 4. It shall be the duty also of the District Superintendent to inform the Vice President of any possible openings for the extension of the work of the church in his district. The District Superintendent shall assist in the raising of Conference Extension Funds. The pastors in each district are urged to co-operate and expected to do so.
- Item VII. All quarterly meetings shall be arranged for by the pastor and his advisory board, and shall be held near the close of each fiscal quarter. The pastor shall report quarterly to the President and Vice President on blanks formulated by the President.
- Item VIII. That the salary of the President be \$300.00 per month and the Vice President \$275.00 per month; the same to be paid by the Conference Treasurer monthly, with expenses incidental to their work.
- Item IX. The Vice President shall receive \$40.00 per month parsonage rent.
- Item X. We recommend that the President and Vice President employ secretarial help as needed, to be paid from Conference Expense.
- Item XI. We recommend the following concerning the INDIANA WESLEYAN MESSENGER.
- A. That the President and Vice President constitute the Executive Committee of the Wesleyan Messenger.
 - B. That the Vice President be the Editor.

- C. That the executive committee be empowered to select some person as Business and Circulation manager.
- D. That the Executive Committee be authorized to employ an assistant as the need demands, to be mailing secretary for the business manager.
- E. That the departments which use the columns of the Wesleyan Messenger regularly shall make contributions toward the expense of the same.

Item XII. We recommend that:

- The president call a meeting of the ministers, and their wives, and Local Extension Secretaries, in the different parts of the conference early in the conference year.
- The purpose of this meeting is to promote the work of the conference. The President shall set forth goals suggest means of attaining these goals and in general seek to promote greater interest in the Conference program.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS' REPORT

We, your Conference Sunday School Board, respectfully submit the following report:

The Sunday Schools of the Conference have enjoyed a very good year. The increase of 621 in average attendance is an appreciable gain. There were 39 schools, (17 over last year) that had 10% gains or more in average attendance this conference year. We recommend that our pastors receive into associate church relationship children of the Sunday School who evidence sufficient spiritual experience and interest in spiritual things.

We recommend that the two Sundays of Camp Meeting not be counted in the year's average attendance.

The Junior Bible Camp enrollment of 253 shows an increase in interest and possibility of service among the Juniors of our Sunday Schools, We recommend that another be held next year the week following Youth Camp.

We recommend that Rally Day be October 5 and that the Rally Day offering be applied on Conference Extension, and may be counted on the \$2.00 per member goal.

Since the Thanksgiving offering goes to Marion College for the new Men's Dormitory we wish to urge each school to make this a big offering.

Report No. 14

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

We bow our heads in reverence with praise and thanksgiving to our

Heavenly Father for His tender mercies, for the gain in membership, and the advancement which He has enabled us to make through His guidance and leadership.

We recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

- 1. By the adoption of this report the conference re-affirms the historic stand of the Church on matters of Christian doctrine and practice. We urge strict adherence to the discipline as to the standards of dress, Sabbath observance, parental authority, and reverence for holy things.
- 2. In view of the great loss of our young people of later teen-age in our Sunday-schools and churches, let us more vigorously apply ourselves to their evangelization, training, and proper use of their individual talents, until they are made to feel that they are an important part of our church life and effort.

Recognizing the great evil of divorce in our church and society, we deem it wise, not only to preach against divorce in our churches, but, also, to go to the head of the stream and teach our youth in the sanctity of the home, especially, our teen-age group should be taught of the problems and joys of marriage, and we think it advisable to insert a course in our Youth Camp for this group on marriage in an effort to stem the tide of the divorce evil within our Church.

3. Since many of our own young men are being called to the armed forces to defend Democracy, let each local church pray fervently that each serviceman experience a saving knowledge of Jesus Christ, continued growth in grace, and God's protection. We recommend that each pastor maintain personal correspondence with all servicemen of his church and Sunday School thus indicating the interest of the local church in their spiritual and physical welfare.

The future church will be made up of the young people of today and our servicemen will constitute a large part of this number. If the church loses contact with them during their periods of service they may be gone forever. Therefore, be it resolved: That we cooperate wholeheartedly with the Wesleyan Servicemen's Commission both with our prayers and adequate financial support.

- 4. Our youth are being constantly propagandized by the tobacco and liquor interest through radio, television, newspaper and magazine advertising. Therefore, we urge that our people give active support to the Indiana Temperance League and the Woman's Christian Temperance Union in their organized attempts to get more effective scientific temperance and narcotics education in the public schools, and that our churches through public meetings, the Sunday School temperance lesson, the daily vacation Bible School and other co-operative methods seek to build in the community the ideals of total abstinence.
- 5. We recognize godless Communism as a present, subtle influence that is seeking to supplant our Democratic way of life, which guarantees religious freedom. We also recognize that the present trend toward a welfare state is the opening wedge of Socialism which leads to materialistic Communism. Therefore, be it resolved: That our ministers and our Church leaders sound a warning and inform us as to the danger of this false security offered by Socialism. We urge our people to exercise their privilege to vote against this evil whenever possible.
- 6. In view of the importance of Christian education in the work of the Church and the increasing difficulty of maintaining Marion College, be it resolved: That the Indiana Conference pledge itself to give its very best

support to Marion College, both by earnest prayer and by financial aid.

7. As part of a plan for progress we recommend that the great loss of Wesleyan funds be checked by informing our people of the good sense and sound stewardship of a planned program of grants, estate notes, annuities and other financial contracts. We also recommend that our ministers and other authorized persons make contacts with interested parties or prospects, and report the same to the Conference Board of Trustees.

Standing Rules

- 1. The first session of the W.Y.P.S. Conference shall convene Tuesday afternoon of conference week at one o'clock, and sessions shall continue daily until all business is transacted.
- 2. The president shall appoint the chairman of each committee, and the executive council shall nominate the rest of the members of the committees; their report to be read and voted upon in the first session of annual conference.
- 3. All organized societies shall keep permanent records of membership and finances. The list of members shall include a classification of active and associate members and shall be revised at the close of each conference year.
- 4. The Ways and Means Committee shall be composed of five members elected by the W.Y.P.S. Conference and a sixth member chosen from and by the Committee on Finance and Appropriations, of the main conference body.
- 5. There shall be a W.Y.P.S. Camp Meeting Committee of five members. The president of the W.Y.P.S. shall be chairman ex-officio; the other four members to be elected for a term of four years. One shall be elected annually or until their successor is elected; so that the term of all will not expire at the same time. The W.Y.P.S. Camp Meeting Committee shall elect one of its members as treasurer of the Youth Camp.
- 6. There shall be a Youth Camp of one week duration and the date of the camp shall be set by the W.Y.P.S. Camp Meeting Committee.
- 7. Members of the Executive Council shall not hold the office of District Chairman, but shall work in co-operation with and under the direction of the president.
- 8. There shall be elected an assistant secretary whose duty shall be to assist the secretary and to compile the statistics. The secretary shall be given the privilege of making the nomination.
- 9. All churches shall send their delegates credentials and statistical report to the secretary by August 4.
- 10. The Executive Council of the W.Y.P.S. shall have complete charge of helping new works.
- 11. The local society president shall consult with the pastor when making out their annual W.Y.P.S. report, to avoid inconsistencies in the same.
- 12. Two copies of the report of the Ways and Means Committee shall be mailed to each church and district, within three weeks after the close of conference.
 - 13. Special mention will be made of all societies raising full budget.
- 14. The executive committee of each local W.Y.P.S. should consult with the pastor and his board of stewards before planning its financial program for the year.

- 15. All money raised by the local societies, other than local projects, shall be sent to the conference W.Y.P.S. treasurer not later than August 4.
- 16. There shall be a missionary committee elected by each local society, who shall be responsible for one missionary service each month.
- 17. The W.Y.P.S. treasurer shall pay from the Conference Fund each year the sum of twenty-five dollars toward the expense of printing the minutes. The W.Y.P.S. secretary shall co-operate with the conference secretaries in determining the number of pages used.
- 18. The Camp Meeting Committee shall be seated as members of the Conference.

We, the Committee on Resolutions, humbly submit the following:

- A. 1. Be it resolved that we, the Wesleyan Youth of the Indiana Conference reaffirm our faith in the Holy Scriptures as set forth by the prophets and apostles.
 - 2. Also the doctrines and standards of our church be properly emphasized as set forth by our church discipline.
 - 3. Also that we, in all of our Youth services seek and give place to the presence of the Holy Spirit.

- B. Be it resolved that we the Wesleyan Youth pray, boost, and whole-heartedly co-operate with our leaders in the youth program.
- C. Be it resolved that we launch and support a more aggrssive program of evangelism by:
 - 1. Greater support of the church revivals and Youth Week.
 - 2. Fulfilling the keynote sounded at the 1951 General Conference of the W.Y.P.S.; which was personal evangelism and crusading for Christ.
- D. We offer the following recommendations:

Report No. 5

REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

I. Rallies

- A. We recommend that each district co-operate with the following conference program as to rallies:
- 1. That quarterly rallies and, if possible, monthly rallies be held in each district, and that each church be notified at least two Sundays previously, and that notices of said rallies be sent to pastors and local presidents.
- 2. That an additional promotional rally be held in each district, in the month of September, if possible, under the supervision of the Conference Executive Council, and that they be authorized to secure the Area President or another denominational leader.
- 3. That the district president call a meeting of the district officers and advisors as soon as practical after the promotional rally for the purpose of setting definite goals, including more rallies in the district, better planned programs, better promotional plans, and a definite evangelistic emphasis.
- 4. That the following point system for district banner awards be adopted: local society president or vice-president present at rally, 5 points; pastor present, 5 points; an organized society, 10 points; for each 1% of the active society members present (to be based on the current number of members), 1 point; for each non-member present, 1 point; and for each mile traveled to the rally site, 1 point. The society with the highest total is to be the winner.

That the conference print and distribute to the local socities

suitable blanks to implement the point system.

6. That there be a state-wide rally, held on the Campgrounds on Memorial Day, and that a new state banner be purchased from the Conference Expense Fund and be awarded, using the above point system.

II. Projects

- A. For conference projects we recommend the following:
- 1. In keeping with the emphasis of the church extension program, that we offer the services and finances needed for two evangelistic campaigns this year, and that this assistance be rendered in such areas and to such extent as deemed advisable by the executive council.
- That each district set a goal and the district chairman give special emphasis to raising finance for at least one of these campaigns.
- 3. That we participate in the crusade plans sponsored by the General Conference W.Y.P.S.
- For local society projects we recommend the following:
- 1. That the General W.Y.P.S. Efficiency Standard be adopted and promoted, and that each society rating be reported in the annual statistical reports.
- That each society plan visitation programs and special meetings with members of the society such as jail services, hospital and shut-in visitations, distributing tracts, radio programs, and street meetings.

III. Finance

- A. For finance we recommend the following:
- That the area president receive entertainment and traveling expenses while traveling our conference, the same to be paid by the group asking his services.
 - That the salary of the conference officers be as follows:

President-\$90.00

- Vice President-\$40.00 Ъ.
- Secretary—\$25.00 c.
- Treasurer-\$55.00

Said salary to be paid in equal payments, on January 31 and the other July 31.

- That the desk and traveling expenses of the president, vice-president, secretary, and treasurer, be paid from the Conference Expense Fund; and the desk and traveling expenses of the Youth Camp Committee be paid from the Youth Camp Treasury and that the said expenses be paid at least quarterly. That traveling expense be figured on the basis of 6 cents per mile.
 - That the budget for the following year be as follows:

 - a. General Dues, \$1.00 per active member of the society.
 b. Conference Budget (based on church membership)
 20 cents, Church Extension Fund
 25 cents, Conference Expense Fund
 15 cents, Youth Camp Fund

That above funds be sent in quarterly. Inasmuch as this is based on church membership, the church should feel its responsibility to aid the society when necessary.

- d. That all pastors assisted by Church Extension Fund shall report church attendance, finance, and spiritual condition monthly to the Conference W.Y.P.S. President, who shall in turn report the same to the district chairman.
- 5. That the Executive Council shall have power to appropriate money from the Conference Expense Fund for the general promotion of the youth work.
- 6. That all offerings above the operating expenses of the District Rallies be sent to the Conference Treasurer to apply on conference projects.
- 7. That all monies raised within the society for missions be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer for departmental credit, and that said money be raised by monthly missionary offerings, and be sent in quarterly with the W.Y.P.S. budget.
