# **CONFERENCE RESOLUTIONS**

1. The Resolutions of Conference shall be printed in the Conference Minutes each year.

2. All visiting members of our own, or other Churches in harmony with our principles, shall be invited to honorary seats in the Conference.

3. The Conference President shall receive twenty dollars per year for postage and stationery; also any needed traveling expense. At any time the President be required to travel the Conference, his duties and pay shall be defined by the Conference.

4. The Conference Secretary shall receive twenty five dollars per year for his labor and incidental expenses.

5. The Conference Treasurer shall receive twenty-five dollars per year for his services in caring for the funds.

6. In making his report, the Conference Treasurer is authorized to close his books one week before the Conference session. The Treasurer of the Superannuate Ministers' Relief Association also shall close his books one week before the Conference session.

7. All monies disbursed by the Conference Treasurer during the interim of Conference shall be upon order of the President, except by the Vice-President. It is understood that any payment ordered by the Conference direct may be paid by the Treasurer without an order as directed above.

8. No monies shall be loaned by the Conference Treasurer except by order of Conference, or by the consent of the President and his Advisory Board.

9. Each elder shall make his engagement as pastor with the understanding that if he be elected Conference President he shall be released in his pastoral engagement.

10. The first Sunday in each month shall be known as Home Mission Sunday, and the Sunday School offerings shall be given to Home Missions, and should be sent to the Conference Treasurer.

11. In securing Evangelists for the Camp Meeting, the Camp Meeting Committee is privileged to secure not more than one worker outside the Denomination.

12. The Camp-meeting Committee shall be composed of the Conference President, as Chairman, and three ministers and three

Rev. Northrup read from Romans 13:8-12. Text: Rom. 1:14 and 13:8. Theme—"Spiritual Bankruptcy." He drew an analogy between financial and Spiritual bankruptcy, stressing the reluctance in either case to admit debts.

The service closed with reading in unison of the first verse of "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross."

BUSINESS. Roll call. Reading of the minutes of forenoon business. They were approved after one correction.

It was voted to empower the Conf. President and his Advisory Board to have a new seal made to conform to the revised name of our Denomination.

It was voted that the 106th Annual Session of the Champlain Conference convent for its opening session on Tuesday, June 29th, 1948, at 2:30 p. m.; That the roll of elders and Conference preachers be called at this time; That immediately following this roll call the President address the Conference assembly; That the Conference Sermon be preached Tuesday evening, at 7:30; and That there be no preaching services during the day sessions of Conference week, unless an urgent need requires otherwise.

BUSINESS: The roll was called. The minutes of the forenoon business were read and corrected.

It was voted to invite the W. Y. P. S. to hold its annual business meeting in the main Conference assembly next year, as an Order of the Day.

It was voted that they recommend to the Camp-meeting Committee that they formulate some plan to set up a Youth Program for 1948. It was voted that the Conference President be given two weeks vacation with pay.

Personal cash gifts were received with which to purchase a typewriter for the Conference, to be used by the Secretary.

It was voted to send a letter of greeting to Bro. and Sr. Stark. The Pastoral Relations Committee gave the third reading of its report, and it was adopted. Number 14.

It was voted that Rev. Aldis Lamos preach the Conference sermon next year, and that Rev. Clifton Chapman be the alternate.

It was voted that the Conference buy from Bro. Dayton the safe in which to keep valuable Conference papers, etc.

These minutes were read and approved.

It was voted to adjourn, to meet at the call of the Chair, and that we sing "Praise God from Whom all Blessings Flow."

# Journal of the Champlain Conference Board On Church and Parsonage Euilding and Location

Report Number 3

SEC. I

JULY 9-10, 1946. WEST CHAZY, NEW YORK.

Rev. Charles A. Dayton called the Board to order. All members were present. Rev. Aldis M. Lamos was appointed secretary of the Board. The business was the purchase of a home for the Conference President. The property presented to the Board for this purpose was the lot with house and barn joining the Camp Grounds on the North East Corner owned by Mrs. Ina Robinson.

A thorough, detailed investigation as to necessity, location, finance, condition of property, etc. was made. Before final action was taken, the Conference Board of Trustees was called to a joint meeting with the Board On Building and Location and Mrs. Ina Robinson. Then, after further consideration, the Board On Building and Location voted unanimously to order the purchase of said property, to cost \$4000.00, for the Conference President's home; the deed to be in the name of the Champlain Conference Inc., of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection (or Church) of America, headquarters at 330 East Onondaga Street, Syracuse, New York.

#### SEC. II

### JULY 10, 1946. West Chazy, New York

Rev. Charles A. Dayton called the Board to order. All members were present. The business before the Board was the purchase of the open lot in the rear of the President's home joining the Camp Grounds on the East, the purpose to be a recreation field to be added to the Camp Grounds. Rev. Reginald Hewitt and Rev. Howard Chapman were appointed to investigate this property with the intention to purchase. After investigation they found said property was unnegotiable for purchase at this time.

#### SEC. III

### OCTOBER 4, 1946. SPRINGFIELD, MASS.

The Conference Board on Building and Location journeyed to Springfield, Mass. arriving there at 12:30 P. M. They immediately conferred with the pastor of the Springfield charge, the Rev. George Hawthorne, concerning the purchase of property in said city for a new church and parsonage. The Wesleyan people in this city had carefully considered three possible lots for their new location. Of these three they had selected one at 98 White Street at the corner of Grand Street, and this they presented to the Conference Board.

The afternoon and evening of October 4 were spent in a thorough investigation of above said property with careful consideration given to it on the location and accessability for attendance, financial ability of the constituency, cost of contracted labor and amount of donated labor necessary to build, cost and labor to maintain, etc.

The Conference Board was invited by the Springfield pastor to attend and participate in the regular evening service at Pension Hall which they did. The attendance was approximately 40, and would have been more but because of the lack of time the presence of the Committee was not widely announced. The Holy Spirit's presence was in evidence throughout the service. Rev. Charles Dayton, Chairman, appointed Rev. Howard Chapman, Committeeman, to preach. The sermon was delivered with freedom, force, and blessed Divine Unction. No seekers after Salvation came forward for prayer, but the effect of the message was to the Spiritual profit of all present.

After the evening service the Wesleyan people and the Conference Board went over to the property under consideration. A half hour of informal discussion was carried on with all concerned. Then Rev. Charles Dayton called the Board to order. All members were present, The Board voted unanimously to order the purchase of the lot at 98 White Street, owned by Mr. Damour, to cost \$2500.00, for the site of the Wesleyan Methodist Church and parsonage in Springfield, Massachusetts. The Board approved the plans and the building program for the new church made by the pastor and the people of said city.

The property is to be deeded in the name of the Champlain Conference Inc., of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, headquarters at 330 East Onondaga St., Syracuse, New York.

Sec. IV

OCTOBER 7, 1946. TICONDEROGA, NEW YORK.

The members of the Conference Building and Location Board met in Ticonderoga, New York with the local pastor, Rev. Sumner Brainard at 6:00 P. M.. The Ticonderoga Church Building Committee had made inquiry into the lots and buildings offered for sale in said village with the intention of building a church, or remodeling a building into a church, and had come to the conclusion that the land and mill building owned by Mrs. Hugh Mooer on Soutb Wayne Ave. was the best suited for the purpose. As a church building was imperative to the Wesleyan work in this village, and of an instant nature, they called the above said Conference Board to

consider the purchase of the Mooer property. The Conference Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location, the Ticonderoga Church Building Committee, and the local pastor, Rev. Brainard carefully appraised the Mooer building inside and out. After this a joint meeting of above said parties convened at the parsonage at 27 Parke Ave. Rev. Charles Dayton presided. All members were present.

The session opened with a general discussion of the property surveyed. The Board agreed that the possibilities of converting the mill building into a combined church and parsonage were good; the location was excellent; and the price of \$5500.00 was fair. However, because it would require considerable expense in money, time, and labor beyond the accessable supply to convert this massive frame, mill building into a suitable church and parsonage; and because of the expense of continual maintenance and cost of heating, the Board, with the approval of the local Committee disapproved the purchase of said property.

Rev. Brainard requested, in behalf of the Ticonderoga Church, that the Conference Board formulate a plan leading to the materialization of a church building in Ticonderoga. Considerable time was given in comprehensive discussion of this proposition. After all parties concerned had been satisfactorily advised the Conference Board unanimously voted the following proposition: "We, the Champlain Conference Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location, approve the commencement of work on the new Wesleyan Methodist church in Ticonderoga to be built on the present church property, 27 Parke Ave., or in a more favorable site if available; providing the Lord so leads."

If the people of Ticonderoga can effect a transfer of property from the present site to a more accessable site nearer the center of town, it will be necessary for them to again call the Conference Board and wait on their approval or disapproval.

#### SEC. V

## DECEMBER 12, 1946. TICONDEROGA, NEW YORK.

(In the absence of Rev. Aldis Lamos, Committee Secretary, Rev. James Keyser was appointed Secretary Pro. Tem. and recorded the following minutes of this meeting. AML)

The Building and Location Committee of the Champlain Conference met at the Ticonderoga Church parsonage Dec. 12, 1946 to consider the purchase of a lot about 300 feet south of the War Monument, for the site on which to build a new church in Ticonderoga.

Rev. Charles Dayton called the Board to order, Rev. Reginald Hewitt and Rev. Howard Chapman were present. Rev. Walter

Lewis and Rev. Aldis Lamos were unable to be present. The pastor of the local church, Rev. Sumner Brainard, and two of the Church Trustees, Mrs. Hulbert and Miss French were present. The third trustee of the church, Mrs. Ploof, was confined to her home because of illness. Prayer was offered by Miss French.

The above said property was for sale a few years ago, and was considered for a church site, but before negotions could be made Mrs. Jessie Lambers purchased the property. Mrs. Ploof contacted Mrs. Jessie Lambert a few days ago and found that the property was for sale again at \$500.00.

After discussing the subject, it is the opinion of the Conference Board, and of the local Church Trustees, that the property owned by Mrs. Jessie Lambert is an ideal location for the new church. The conference Board unanimously voted \* to approve the purchase of above said property by the Church Trustees.

The Board recommended the sale of the parsonage, the money received to be used in building a new parsonage in connection with the church.

The Board unanimously voted \* that the Conference Board of Trustees give the Ticonderoga Church Trustees the privilege of selling the parsonage and applying the funds received on the new building project.

The deed of this property is to be made out to the Champlain Conference Inc., of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection (or Church) of America, Headquarters at 330 East Onondaga Street, Syracuse, New York.

\*Rev. Walter Lewis and Rev. Aldis Lamos gave their approval to the above Board action by telephone.

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A SHITTEREPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

has the activity we the members of the Champlain Conference reaffirm our faith in the Holy Scriptures as the inerrant, inspired Word of God and the only sufficient rule of faith and conduct.

2. We reaffirm our appreciation of the Wesleyan Methodist discipline as being a valid expression of the faith, doctrine, rules of our Church, and pledge our adherence and loyalty to it.

3. We view with alarm the terrible breakdown in the social, moral and domestic life of our day, which is witnessed by a wave of evil sweeping over the entire nation, such as juvenile delinquency, wholesale divorce, desecration of the Christian Sabbath, the evil influence of the modern moving picture show, the easy access to places where alcoholic beverages are sold, the low moral standard evidenced by indecent dress, smoking, and some becoming bar-maids:

By way of restraining these evils, we resolve that with voice and pen we will proclaim with renewed emphasis the inevitable and unalterable terrors of the judgment;

That we will extol and exalt the unbounded efficacy of the Gospel of Christ to save from all sin; that we will magnify by experience and practice the glorious doctrine of Holiness.

#### Report Number 7

### SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY'S REPORT

The Sunday Schools of the Champlain Conference are growing. As I write this report it is not apparent how much but a definite gain. The enrollment (3rd qtr.) was 1726 in main school, the average attendance for first three quarters was 1288 plus. Rally Day 1946 we made a new record with 2111 present then. Also we made a new record for the Thanksgiving offering \$461.02.

EVERY Sunday school in the Champlain Conference, AS USUAL, paid their Sunday school budget, and in turn paid the Connectional S. S. Budget.

My work during the year has been largely office work. However, it was a privilege to teach a class at the Young People's Convention last August. I enjoyed and profited by it, I trust others did.

While SOME Sunday schools are making wonderful gains, others are not. It would appear that MUCH depends on the Pastor AND the Sunday School Superintendent, plus the cooperation of many helpers. If all Sunday Schools would try (inspiration plus perspiration) faith and WORKS, we could have an enrollment of 2500, or more, and an average of 2000. BUT REMEMBER you do not get and keep your Sunday School youngsters (and most older young folks or anyone else) by just wishing. It takes planning, systematic and continuous-all the year around, prayer and work to grow. Of course I know that winter storms, sickness, and counter attractions work against attendance. therefore build strongly

through special days, and regular programs to make EVERY SUN-DAY COUNT.

Several Sunday Schools have made new records, it is hardly wise to mention the names because others as worthy might be missed. You who have worked hard, should feel repaid in your evangelistic endeavors. For after all our aim must be to "win them for Christ and the Church". Even an occasional Sunday (always strive to get them regular) may bring the message of Salvation to some who have never before heard or accepted it.

Because I have completed 21 years as Sunday School Secretary of the Champlain Conference it would seem that a few recommendations are in order.

1. Numbers DO help. Therefore strive to have as many people at Sunday School EVERY Sunday, as possible. Know your community, or city, as well as possible, and go after those with no church and "bring them in from the fields of sin".

2. Regularity is an assett. Special Days should be observed to get new recruits STARTED, then for the sake of never dying souls KEEP TRYING to build regular attendance. Example of church members can assist mightily in this.

3. Varied programs on regular Sunday School sessions are beneficial. IF the S. S. Supt. cannot or will not, build worshipful beginning and ending of every session then get a new supt. or a program commitee to help.

4. A successful and growing Sunday School doesn't just happen. It takes planning. Hence a monthly "Workers Meeting" ( for want of a better name ) can mean the difference between growth or stagnation. You choose.

5. Trained workers are vital to continued fruitfulness. Any person or class or Sunday School can have special training, if they will. Why don't you? There are hardly ever more than two or three training classes in the Champlain Conference, sometimes not that. Do we need new books, new courses, or what?

6. More local Sunday School councils or institutes are needed. Several Superintendents and Pastors realize this. One night meetings, maybe a supper meeting and Round Table discussion, are in the offing. A limited number, maybe should be started this Fall.

7. Evangelism is our keynote for really successful Sunday schools. BE SURE everyone who attends your Sunday School, even for a single Sunday—does not leave without a warm handclasp, an invitation to come again, AND a Gospel message of Salvation.

It is the authorized plan of our Church. We already have 8 or 10 churches in our Conference using this Plan. Why not give it a try?

#### Report Number 10

### RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE CHURCH EXTENSION COMMITTEE TO CONFERENCE

I. The Conference President shall act as Pioneer Secretary. (This does not create the office of Pioneer Secretary.) The Conference Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location shall be the Church Extension Committee.

II. There shall be at least one Church extension service on each charge in the Conference this year, at which time all of the Church Extension activities within the Conference shall be presented.

This service shall be under the supervision of the Conf. President, or one whom he may appoint. Any person traveling the Conference in the interests of Church Extension must be appointed and under the direction of the Conf. President. Those thus appointed to travel the Conference in the interests of Church Extension shall receive not to exceed five cents per mile.

III. All offerings taken for Church Extension shall be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer, and credited to Church Extension. The Conf. Treasurer, upon the recommendation of the Conf. President and the Church Extension Committee, shall disburse these funds. Any designated funds can be disbursed by notice received in writing from the Conf. President.

IV. Whereas the W. Y. P. S. is an organization that is aggressively supporting the Conference Pioneer projects, we recommend that as far as possible all monies received for Pioneer work be passed through the local W. Y. P. S. treasurer to the treasurer of the Champlain Conference.

We further recommend that the local Church Extension program be sponsored by the local W. Y. P. S. as far as practical.

#### FRIDAY EVENING-PUBLIC MEETING

Our public meeting was in charge of the President, Mrs. Marjorie Stevenson. Professor Herman Baker led the song service. Sister Birch read II Kings 7:1-9. Prayer by Brother Birch.

A special in song by the choir. A duet by Rev. Banker and Mrs. John Vaughn. Also a male quartette was enjoyed by all.

Brother Banker used II Kings 7:9 as a basis for his talk. One thousand new missionaries needed in Japan now. Let us "Go Forward On Our Knees." The evening offering in cash and pledges amounted to two thousand one hundred and seventy-eight dollars.

Pictures were shown from India, Africa, and Mexico.

#### SATURDAY MORNING

Reverend Miss Florence Carey addressed the body bringing thanks for last years support.

The Magazine Solicitor reported thirty-two subscriptions to the "Wesleyan Missionary."

The meeting was closed with prayer.

### STANDING RULES

1. The Standing Rules of the Conference Missionary Society shall be printed in the Conference Minutes each year.

2. The Conference Treasurer is authorized to close her books one week before the Conference session begins.

3. One of the two statistical blanks sent to each society, after being carefully filled in, is to be given to the statistical committee at the beginning of conference, the other is to be retained by the delegate and read to the local society at the first meeting of the new year. Receipts and disbursements must be made to balance before being placed in the hands of the statistical committee also giving rating according to efficiency standard.

4. All money raised by the society shall be used for missionary work, and no money paid out without a vote of the society.

5. The Conference President shall receive annually five dollars, the Treasurer ten dollars and the Secretary two dollars, to defray expense of postage and writing material.

6. The voting body shall be composed of conference officers, Y. M. W. B. superintendents, presidents of local societies, and one delegate from each local society, lady pastors and pastor's wives.

7. Each local society shall continue sending six dollars to Southern Mountain Work, and five dollars or more to Hephzibah Orphanage. This must be sent through the Conference Treasurer applied on the budget.

8. It is required that twenty-five cents per member of the local society dues be forwarded through the Conference Society Treasurer of the General Conference for the General fund. Also that twenty-five cents be retained in the conference treasury and the remaining fifty cents be used directly for missionary work and be applied on local church budget.

The local societies shall disburse all conference and general conference funds through the Conference Treasurer, who shall in turn remit all general conference funds to the general conference treasurer.

9. Each society is to make provision for a missionary to travel the Conference as early in the year as possible, allowing ample time for each charge.

10. The Plan of Work should be read quarterly to our local societies to keep us enthused in our work.

11. We recommend that the treasurer of the Conference Society be elected as a committee of Remembrance with authority to send flowers or other suitable tribute, to those of our number who shall be called to their eternal reward. We further recommend that this shall include all pastor's wives and officers of our Conference Missionary Society.
