Fairmount, Ind., August 12, 1924.

The seventy-sixth session of the Indiana Annual Conference convened on the Camp Ground at 7:30 P. M., August 11.

The Committee on Pastoral Relations made final report. Upon motion the report was adopted. See Report No. 8.

Å motion prevailed that the Secretary send a letter of condolence to Rev. Vayhinger.

The Committee on Elder's Orders gave final report which was

adopted. See Report No. 4.

The Secretary of the Pension Plan gave report. Upon motion the report was adopted. See Report No. 10. The Conference then elected H. T. Arnold as Secretary and Sub-Treasurer of the Pension Plan.

A motion prevailed that the Superannuated Funds of last and this year be placed in the Superannuated Pension Fund.

A motion prevailed that there be no money taken from the Pension Funds for annuity payments for five years.

Upon motion the time for charter membership at an entrance fee of \$3.00 be extended to January 1, 1925.

The Conference Sunday School Secretary made report, which

was adopted. See Report No. 11.

The report of the Sunday School Board was given and upon motion was adopted. See Report No. 12.

Special prayer was offered for Paul Billheimer, Flora Pitts and the daughter of J. A. Wood.

Rev. M. W. Rich was introduced to the Conference and accorded honorary privileges.

A motion prevailed that when we adjourn, we adjourn to meet at the call of the chair.

Upon motion E. J. Pitts and F. O. Spitler were elected members of the Conference Sunday School Board.

The minutes were read and approved.

Upon motion the Conference then adjourned.

Resolutions and Laws of Indiana Conference

- 1. It is contrary to the spirit of the Discipline and our principles for our preachers to assist in any service with oath-bound societies.
- 2. That any candidate for Elder's Orders or to travel under the direction of the Conference, who fails to attend the Institutes and the examinations of the Committee, without sufficient cause, shall be deemed unworthy of the trust and care of souls, and refused a place among us as a minister of the Gospel, and when they shall fail to attend the Institute for two successive years they shall be dropped from the roll.
- 3. That it is the sense of this Conference that our houses of worship should not be open to any evangelist or minister of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain a regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments.
- 4. Any waiving of the above resolution by a contract or lease of building must be obtained through the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference.
- 5. Whereas, The Discipline requires that the Stewards must meet the Pastors and agree with them as to the amount necessary for their support, be it resolved: That the circuits may at the same time enter into an agreement in writing with the Pastor as to the service he is to render to the church. In case the pastor shall fail

to render said service, unless providentially hindered or released by the circuit, said failure shall be considered a sufficient cause to make an adjustment of the amount originally agreed upon. Otherwise the contract shall be binding upon both parties the same as any other financial obligation entered into by contracting parties.

- 6. Each pastor shall file a duplicate statistical report with the Committee before the close of the second day of Conference, said report to be kept on file one year, and hereafter these reports shall not be read in open Conference.
- 7. The membership, so far as possible, shall pay all their contributions for the Conference and Connectional interests to the pastors, who shall receipt them for the same and see that it is paid to the proper authorities. Where money is paid direct to the Conference Treasurer by the membership, he shall send a duplicate receipt to the pastor of the charge where such persons are members.
- 8. All charges with a membership of twenty-five or more shall in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the pastor may live.
- 9. We recommend that all charges and stations to which the pastor moves pay the moving and transportation expenses of said pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary; provided this shall not interfere with the previous arrangements between pastors and charges.
- 10. All unaccounted for members appearing in the statistics in the membership list shall be transferred to the discontinued list. The roll of all the classes upon the charges shall be put in the hands of the Pastors and they have charge of the same and make all entries therein.
- 11. The Committee on Elder's Orders is hereby empowered to transfer all persons to the study list who may have been recommended to travel and may not have been given work.
- 12. It shall be a standing rule of this Conference until revoked by vote that the President shall receive \$35.00, the Secretary \$50.00, the Assistant Secretary, \$15.00, and each member of the Statistical Committee, \$15.00, the same to be apportioned pro rata among the various funds of the Conference.
- 13. The official character of no Pastor shall be passed until he shall have submitted a satisfactory report, including statistics.

- 14. It shall be a standing rule until revoked by this body that the President shall nominate his Advisory Board and the Conference shall elect his nominations.
- 15. It shall be a standing rule of this Conference that in the examination of character the Conference officials and Evangelists shall be called first.
- 16. In the membership report all members who are found on the circuits in excess of the number reported shall be reported received.
- 17. No letter of standing shall be granted in the interim of Conference or during the session of Conference, until satisfactory evidence is given by the minister making the request that no outstanding debts are unprovided for and that he has honorably withdrawn from the contract for service made with a charge or Conference.
- 18. Be it resolved, That where the Conference demands the services of anyone, that it shall bear the moving expenses, if any expense shall thus be incurred.
- 19. The Camp Meeting Committee shall be elected as follows: One for three years, one for two years and one for one year, and that the person elected for three years be chairman of the Committee, and that thereafter each member be elected for a term of three years.
- 20. Be it resolved that, It shall be the duty of the pastors to look after the insurance of our church and parsonage properties. All insurance shall provide for losses caused by fire and lightning, hail and tornado. A failure on the part of the pastor shall be a censurable offence. If the Church fails to insure their property upon reasonable effort of the pastor to secure the same, then said failure shall be reported to the President of the Conference, who shall then have the property insured. In such case, all insurance monies received from losses by fire, lightning, hail and tornado shall be used in Church Extension work as the Conference Board of Trustees deems best.
- 21. It is the duty of the Conference Evangelists to inquire, first, whether donation stewards have been elected at each church on the charge, second, whether donations are given regularly and systematically. He shall call for a report of the work of the donation stewards and urge that the charges are expetced by the Conference to give freely to the pastors.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS.

We, your Committee on Resolutions, beg leave to submit the following report:

We are living in a time of peril. Evil is more aggressive than ever and the spirit of the world is stalking boldly in many churches. Temptation is more subtle, coming often through those who pose as angels of light. Compromise is more radical, and some organizations have wiped out the line of separation between the Church and the world. In many places the vision of the leaders has been dimmed because they have been living too much in the glare of the lower lights.

Education, members, finance and popularity will not answer for a clear vision of God's purpose. Men are setting human thought above divine revelation thus destroying the faith of many. While we regret these tendencies in many places, we want to express our thanks to God for bringing Wesleyan Methodism safely through another year and His blessings along the way.

Gracious revivals have visited many of our churches. Our Conference Missionary work has been signally blessed of God and four

new churches have been added to our number.

We have a ministry that is free from compromise and schools that are free from modernism, and in all our borders can be found no destructive higher criticism. Though beset on every hand by subtle temptation, Wesleyanism has stood true. For all this we thank God.

In view of the foregoing we pledge ourselves the following:

God.

1. We reaffirm our faith in the triune God, Father, Son and Holy Ghost.

Bible.

2. We believe the Bible to be Divine Revelation plenary and authentic.

The Blood and Holiness.

 We exalt the Blood of Christ as the only remedy for sin and believe holiness as a second definite work of grace, to be the only preparation for heaven.

The Sabbath.

4. We regret the spirit of Sabbath desecration that prevails and urge our people to refrain from picnics, reunions, visiting and too much ease on the Lord's day; but to be faithful to the means of grace.

Law Enforcement.

5. We have noticed the laxity of law enforcement in many places. This is not as it should be. We urge all our men and women to go to the polls and exercise their power of franchise, to place in office men who will uphold the Constitution.

Americanism and Tolerance.

6. We consider ourselves fortunate to live under the American flag and are glad to take our stand as 100 % Americans, but we do

not believe that it takes secrecy under a sheet and pillow-slip to constitute such. Christ put no difference between men because of color or nationality, and we regret the spirit of intolerance that has sprung up among some of our Protestant friends. We hold no brief for either Catholic, Jew or Negro, but we do not care to go back to the spirit of the Dark Ages, for we believe the spirit of intolerance to be contemptible and unchristian in either Protestant or Catholic. Force will always fail, secret political organization, though of a religious flavor, will not close the breach, and the spirit of hate and intolerance will beget a like spirit. Love, love to God and our fellowmen is the power that will win. May it be ours to exercise and manifest this love that it may beget a like spirit in others.

War.

7. Regardless of peace treaties and Conferences, there still prevails a spirit of suspicion and animosity between the nations of the world. A short time ago Great Britain held a review of "The Greatest Navy in the World," and 192 ships of the latest and best type passed the reviewing station. Men have used their inventive genius to produce machines to destroy their fellowmen and as a result we have the "Death Ray," "Death Fog," "Super Airplanes," and many other things promised that will make our next war more terrible than any former war. Our own nation spends by far the most of every dollar received for the building of or maintaining machines of war, both human and mechanical. This war spirit we believe to be diametrically opposed to the spirit of Christianity and of Christ. We believe in Gospel Missions and not in machines of death, in arbitration and not in destruction, and in neighborly, brotherly love both among men and nations. The spirit, principles and teaching of Christianity are the same as that of the Prince of Peace. We are opposed to war, the preparation for war, and the doing of things that will incite the spirit of war. Let us who are followers of Christ, "Seek peace and pursue it," and try to inculcate the same in others and to make it a part of our National thought and life.

Consecration.

8. We are resolved, that in the midst of compromise we will, "Shun the very appearance of evil," and endeavor to maintain a high standard of Christian life, both by living and teaching. We believe in the "Whole Bible for the whole man and the whole world," and a program of evangelism that will accomplish this. To this end we

freely and fully dedicate our lives, talents and means to God and His glad service. Amen.

Report No. 3.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FINANCE AND APPROPRIATIONS.

We, your Committee on Finance and Appropriations, submit the following report:

Inasmuch as the Gospel ministry is a high and holy calling and should receive the loyal support of all the membership of the Church, we recommend and insist that proper support be given the pastors of the several charges and also those ministers engaged in other lines of gospel work. We note with regret the disposition of some to withhold and diminish such support if any opportunity for excuse is offered. We believe this tendency is a manifestation of a lack of spirituality and consecration to the cause of Christianity. We urge that our people consider the responsibility that is upon them and rally to the support of the work as the need appears. We recommend the sum of \$1,000 as a reasonable minimum salary for pastoral support.

Whereas the Ministers' Pension Plan has been adopted by this Conference and needs the hearty co-operation of both preachers and laity we recommend that we seek to raise the requirements of the Discipline of fifty-two cents per member, and that this with all other offerings of similar nature be placed in the Superannuated Ministers' Pension Fund.

Whereas those charges which have adopted the weekly pay system, or the envelope system, for supporting the pastor and meeting other expenses of their work have found it workable and successful, we urge its general use as a step toward the adoption of the plan given in Mal. 3:10.

Recognizing the sacredness of a contract between a church and pastor and that it is binding until fulfilled by both parties, we insist that the provisions of such contracts be faithfully performed.

Evangelists.

We recommend that the Conference President's salary be \$1,400 with an additional \$100 as a compensation for his official duties as President, and that his expenses incidental to his official duties as President be paid by the Conference, the same to be paid out of the arm of the work he represents.

We recommend that the two Conference Evangelists receive \$1,400 each and wherein the quarterly meeting apportionments fail to meet this amount the deficit shall be paid out of the arm of the work which they represent.

We also recommend that the Missionary Evangelist receive \$1,400, and should the offerings taken in his work fail to reach this amount, the balance shall be taken from the Home Mission Fund.

College.

Inasmuch as the Marion College administration has proven true to the Church and the fundamentals of Christian doctrine as taught by the Word of God, and the college is no longer a cherished hope but a proven success, we recommend that the Conference pledge President Leedy and his loyal faculty its hearty co-operation and support.

We, your Committee, take special pleasure in announcing to the membership of the Indiana Conference that if all the endowment interest and pledges, including the L. S. U., Educational Budget and Standardization Fund, were paid promptly and faithfully the year just closing would be finished with running expenses fully met and money in the treasury.

We, therefore, recommend that the pastors raise the Educational Budget assigned them and send the same in quarterly payments to the treasurer of Marion College.

Believing that Marion College is a gift of God and that the duty is devolved upon us to give it our loyal support, we recommend that each pastor raise thirty-one cents per member, as per present enrollment, for the purpose of meeting our portion of the College deficit as handed down to us by the Educational Society and apportioned by this Conference, the same to be paid during the first quarter.

We recommend that each pastor raise fifteen cents per member, as per present enrollment, to take care of the interest on the College Building Fund for the current year.

Conference Missions.

Whereas the results of using the Sunday School offerings on the first Sunday of each month for Home Missions have been so gratifying and have assisted so materially in the work of Conference Missions, we recommend that the usual Conference Mission Fund be reduced to one-half the former apportionment for those schools which observe this order and we urge our pastors and people to the universal adoption of this plan. We recommend further that these offerings be promptly forwarded to the Conference Treasurer so that the thirty per cent which is apportioned to the use of the Home Missionary Secretary may reach him without unnecessary delay. We recommend further that all monies raised for Home Missions go through the hands of the Conference Treasurer, except gifts for special work.

We recommend that the Minute Fund be raised on the basis of thirty cents per copy and that the quota be kept up to the present level.

We recommend the following apportionments to the various charges for the coming Conference year:

Report No. 12.

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD.

The Sunday School is a department of the Church of Jesus Christ at work studying the Bible with the intent that souls might be saved. It ought therefore to be carefully organized so that its work may be effective and its results conserved.

The classes and departments ought to be carefully enrolled and the attendance and welfare of all who are enrolled should be a serious concern for those who are given responsibility. Let us not con-

sider our work too lightly.

The Wesleyan Methodist Sunday School literature is the cleanest and best material for the use of our schools. Our doctrines are fundamental and are clearly taught in our own literature, and by its use we may assure ourselves that people who attend our schools will become indoctrinated in the great truths that the Holy Spirit uses to lead men to salvation.

The new arrangement of our "Efficiency Standards for Wesleyan Methodist Sunday Schools" have been very successful in inspiring effort and zeal among our schools and this we cannot too highly

commend.

Districting.

We recommend that the Conference work be divided and District Superintendents be supplied as follows:

Northern—F. O. Spitler. North Central—R. D. Wise. Eastern—Eugene Hunter. Western—C. L. Enyeart. South Central—J. H. Brown. Southern—E. L. Glover.

Reorganization, Statistics and Information.

1. We recommend that all schools in the Indiana Conference reorganize between the first and fifteenth of July.

2. Each Sunday School Superintendent shall report the work of the Sunday School quarterly to the Church or Quarterly Confer-

ence and furnish a duplicate to the pastor.

- 3. The pastor shall report the work of the Sunday School to the Conference Sunday School Secretary by the first of August on the information blank furnished him for each school under his care.
- 4. Each Departmental Superintendent shall report the work of their department to the District Departmental Superintendent, who shall make a report of the progress of the work to the District Convention.

Conventions.

The Circuit and District Conventions are a great help and inspiration to our people and should be continued.

1. We recommend that there be no Fall Conventions held, but that special effort be made to make the Spring Conventions very interesting and helpful.

2. The District Conventions shall be held by the District Superintendents under the direction of the Conference Sunday School Secretary.

3. We recommend that the Conference apportionment be ten cents per member, total enrollment, including Cradle Roll and Home Department. One-half shall be for the Connectional Sunday School Secretary to be used in improving our literature and the other half for use in the Conference work.

We recommend that this amount be raised and sent to the Conference Sunday School Treasurer not later than August 1.

We further recommend that each school comply with the Discipline in giving the first Sunday's offering of each month for Home Missions.

Motion prevailed that we accept the cordial invitation extended to us by Dr. Huffman and that we hold a two days' Convention at Marion College, the planning of the same being left to the Executive Board.

The report of the Committee, Mrs. Mow and Mrs. Crim, showed that 73 new subscriptions and 128 renewals to the Wesleyan Missionary were secured during Conference.

Post Office Adresses Committee made their report which, after some slight corrections, was adopted.

The Statistical Committee made a partial report which was adopted with the provision that they complete same ready for the minutes.

Motion carried that the Executive Board be empowered to consult with the camp meeting board relative to the enlarging of the dormitory facilities of the camp ground.

After singing "God be with you" Mrs. Martindale pronounced the benediction.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE.

Dear Sisters of the Indiana Woman's Home and Foreign Missionary Society:—It gives me great pleasure to be permitted once more to greet you in Jesus' name in the Missionary Chapel at our annual gathering this August, 1924.

We, the Committee on Plans for Work, beg leave to submit the following report:

First, we advise that each meeting be opened with devotions, including earnest prayer for the blessings of God on the work performed and endorse the plan recorded in last year's minutes. The plan follows:

- 1. We advocate the tithing plan.
- 2. We recommend the saving of Sunday eggs once a month.
- 3. An interesting program once a month at the homes, and one or more public meetings during the year with offerings.
- 4. Members who are not permitted to attend our local meetings to give a freewill offering of not less than five cents per member.
 - 5. Birthday offerings, freewill offerings also at regular meetings.
- Quilting, crocheting, knotting comforters, and all kinds of sewing.
- 7. That each family tithe their winter supply of fruit and vegetables, distributing the same according to their best judgment.
- 8. That a box from each society be prepared and sent to Marion College.
 - 9. The use of the thank offering boxes to be opened monthly.
- 10. The selling of our religious books, especially missionary books and photos, the profits to be applied to the missionary fund. We suggest that at Christmas time a supply of books from the Publishing House might be easily disposed of.
 - 11. The use of soliciting cards,
- 12. A D. W. B.—Do Without Box and frequent self-denial meetings.
- 13. The donation of articles to the society, to be sold at each meeting, the same to be known as "The Traveling Basket." Basket is provided and the articles placed in it as the donor arrives at the meeting place. The articles may include baked goods, aprons, caps, yokes, bonnets, holders, notions of all kinds, canned goods, etc.
 - 14. Investment plan.

WORK COMMITTEE REPORT.

We, your Committee for drafting plans and suggestions for stimulating the work of the local society, submit the following report:

1. Elect to the office of President the most efficient woman who has this work of God on her heart.

2. The President should have as her officers, women devoted to God and their particular tasks.

3. It should be the aim of the officers and membership to make each meeting so interesting and spiritual, that none could afford to miss.

4. We recommend the use of the study book and magazine, also other helps, many of which may be secured from Mrs. Mary L. Clarke, Houghton, N. Y., our Connectional Y. M. W. B. Superintendent.

5. We advise the election of a program committee, to arrange the programs as far ahead as is deemed best for the work.

6. Where the Society is large, in order to properly divide the work among the women we recommend: (a) The grouping of the names into one or more divisions, each division electing its leader, who, with her women, is to be responsible for the success of the meetings assigned to them; by providing a hostess, persons to fill each number on the program, and notify the membership of the society, and when necessary providing transportation for those in need of the same. (b) The leader in each section is to collect the money from her women, reporting and turning the same to the treasurer. (c) In order to assist in the finances, we recommend the envelope system, with the following items printed on the envelopes:

7. Where item No. 6 is adopted, the duties of the President will be to introduce the leader, and preside during the business session.

- 8. Where the society is small, if desired, the program committee may act as the division leader, each member being responsible for the success of the number of meetings allotted to her.
- 9. Whereas God has endowed us with a social nature, as well as a spiritual, we think it profitable to have an occasional all-day meeting, taking our dinner and engaging in those things throughout the day in keeping with Christian womanhood.

"RED LETTER DAY" COMMITTEE REPORT.

We, the Committee on "Red Letter Day," beg leave to submit the following report:

We recommend that the three days known as Red Letter Days in the minutes of last year be observed.

We recommend the first one to be known as "Harvest Day" and to be observed the third Friday in October. The purpose of this day is to express our appreciation, as a Missionary Society, for Marion College by bringing provisions of fruits and vegetables.

We further recommend that all societies of the Indiana Conference be well represented, bringing baskets well filled, not failing to bring the young people that they may catch the inspiration.

We recommend that Easter, the most important day, be our second "Red Letter Day," on which each member of the Society gives the eggs gathered, or a freewill offering, the same to be used for home missionary work.
