Journal of Daily Proceedings

The forty-ninth (49th) annual session of the Kansas Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection assembled in the Auditorium at Miltonvale, Kansas, Tuesday morning, at 10 o'clock, August 26, 1919, President P. A. Miller presiding.

God's blessing descended upon us in a marvelous manner at the very opening of the Conference. Brother E. R. Dodd was much helped in supplicating the throne of grace and the saints shouted aloud the praises of God. After singing "Faith of our Fathers," Brother P. A. Miller read as a Scripture lesson the fifth chapter of 1 Thessalonians and commented upon the same and led in prayer.

The Roll Call was answered by 17 Elders and 2 Licentiates.

Committee on Credentials.

On approved motion Rev. Oliver Wilson was elected a Committee on Credentials. Brother E. A. Coates was added to the Committee.

On motion the report was adopted and the Delegates seated.

Motion made and approved that the first three rows of seats constitute the Conference bar.

Motion amended that the first four rows of seats be fixed as the Conference bar. Vote taken upon the amendment. Amendment lost. Vote on the original motion was carried.

On motion the visiting brethren and sisters were invited to an honorary seat in the Conference.

Motion made and approved that during the election of our Committees that we do not refer to our Conference Minutes of last year.

Motion made and approved that the Conference convene at 9 o'clock in the morning and at 1:30 in the afternoon, and adjourn on motion.

On motion adjourned.

Benediction by Rev. C. E. Huscher.

Tuesday Afternoon.

Devotions were led by Rev. A. B. Hotchkiss, who read the 133rd Psalm. "How good and how pleasant it is for brethren to dwell together in unity" was emphasized.

Roll call and reading and approval of minutes.

Request was made by Brother P. A. Miller for Brother Walter Carey, who is at the present time at Norton, Kan. After relating some experiences of divine healing to encourage our faith, we met around the altar and earnest prayers were offered for our afflicted brother, that the Lord would be pleased to touch his body.

Prayer was also offered for Sister Hudson.

Committee on Credentials rendered a partial report, reporting the names of the following as Delegates: C. R. Brown, Jerome; Arnold Johnson, Langley; Philip Beals, Elm Row; Mrs. R. E. Young, Eskridge; F. Whitney, Miltonvale.

On motion report was adopted and Delegates seated.

Committee on Religious services announced that Brother Vanus Smith will preach at three o'clock this afternoon and that Rev. Raymond E. Young will preach this evening.

Orders of the day called for. Preaching by Rev. Vanus Smith. Rev. E. F. McCarty, President of the Michigan Conference and Missionary Field Secretary, was introduced to the Conference.

Brother McCarty made a few appropriate remarks.

The Secretary read a letter to the Conference from Rev. Walter E. Carrington, of Reuben, Oregon.

On motion the Secretary was instructed to write a letter of greeting from the Conference to Brother Carrington.

The matter of assisting Brother Carrington in a temporal way was taken up. On motion the same was referred to the Committee on Finance.

Committee on Credentials reported the name of Isaac Huscher as a Delegate from the Ames charge.

On motion the Delegate was seated.

Examination of character was taken up. The following pastors were called: T. J. Pomeroy, F. E. Shivers, and S. F. Wilson. They each read their statistical reports and gave an account of their work and their Christian experience.

On motion adjourned. Benediction by Brother Cook.

Wednesday Morning.

The devotions were led by Rev. S. F. Wilson, who read and commented upon the first Psalm. Following prayer by Rev. L. S. Currie, we were favored with a special song by Sister Young.

Roll call and reading of minutes.

Committee on Credentials render a partial report, reporting the names of the following as Delegates: Grace Woodham, Chapman Creek; M. J. Lowe, Topeka; J. M. Davidson, Bethel.

On motion the report was adopted and the Delegates seated. Committee on Orders of the Day report as follows:

"We, the Committee on Orders of the Day, recommend:

"That the Sunday School Rally be held Wednesday at 3 P. M.

"That the election of Conference officers be Thursday at 2 P.M.

"That the Connectional hour be Friday at 10 A. M.

"That the W. H. & F. M. Society be given Friday evening.

"That the Educational hour be Saturday at 10 A. M.

"That so far as convenient the hour of 3 P. M. each day be given to religious services."

Motion made and approved to adopt the report.

Motion amended to give the hour of 3 P. M. instead of 10 A. M. to the Connectional interest and Education services.

Vote taken on the amendment. Carried.

Vote then taken on motion as amended. Carried.

Examination of character resumed. The following pastors and evangelists were called: E. H. Cook, I. C. Dunbar, C. E. Huscher, Raymond E. Young, Lizzie Feltar. Statistical reports were read by those who had served as pastors, and Brother Huscher and Brother Young gave an account of their work as evangelists.

Brother A. B. Hotchkiss, Conference Evangelist, related his Christian experience and gave an account of his work during the past Conference year. See report.

Rev. P. A. Miller read his annual report to the Conference.

Motion made and approved that the financial part of the report be referred to the Committee on Finance.

Motion made and approved to adopt the report. See report. On motion adjourned.

Benediction by Rev. A. B. Hotchkiss.

Wednesday Afternoon.

The devotional services were led by Rev. L. S. Currie, whoread and commented upon the sixth chapter of 2 Corinthians and offered prayer.

Roll call and reading and approval of the minutes.

Motion made and approved that next year we combine our Conference and Camp Meeting, that beginning about the 25th of August we hold our Conference and Camp Meeting together and close the same about September 3rd. Motion carried.

Motion made and carried that a Committee of three be elected to outline the work of the Conference President and the Conference Evangelist.

On approved motion the following were elected to fill the above Committee: Rev. E. R. Dodd, H. W. McDowell, and M. Watkins.

Motion made and approved that the President of the Conference be empowered to appoint in advance of the Conference the Chairman of the various Standing Committees, except such Committees as the President is already Chairman of by virtue of his office.

The Committee on Credentials rendered a partial report and read credentials recommending Ray Davidson, of the Elm Rowclass; Elbert Travis, of the Jerome class, and Wm. F. McConn, of the Miltonvale class, to travel under the direction of the Conference. The Committee also reports the name of Brother C. P. Hovey as a Delegate from the Miltonvale class.

Motion made and supported to adopt the report and seat the-Delegate, and refer the other Credentials to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

The Committee on Religious Services reported that the song

and testimony service will begin at 8 o'clock this evening, and that Rev. E. F. McCarty will preach at 8:30 P. M.

Orders of the day called for. Sunday School Rally.

Motion made and approved that we have a Conference Sunday School at 9:30 next Sunday morning and devote forty-five minutes to the study of the lesson.

The Chair requested Brother Coates to read a letter from our Connectional Agent, Brother Willett, with reference to the forward step taken at the General Conference in electing a Connectional Sunday School Secretary. The sum of \$1,500.00 will be needed to carry on this work and each scholar in the Sunday Schools of the entire Connection is asked to pay 5 cents each. The amount apportioned to the Kansas Conference is \$76.85.

Motion made and supported that we accept the amount apportioned to the Kansas Conference and refer the same to the Committee on Apportionment.

Brother Willett also stated in his letter that the expense of the next General Conference, including Delegates elected, be provided for in advance, by asking each Conference to pay 10 cents per year per member.

Motion made and supported to accept the above plan and that the amount necessary for us to raise be referred to the Committee on Apportionment.

Examination of character resumed. Revs. L. S. Currie and Wm. Millard were called. Each read their statistical report and stated briefly their Christian experience.

On motion adjourned.

Benediction by Sister Taliaferro.

Thursday Morning.

Devotions were led by Rev. Earl Carey. After prayer by Rev. H. W. McDowell, Brother Carey read as a Scripture lesson Ephesians 3rd chapter.

We were favored with a duet by Sisters Thomas and Young, which the Lord especially blessed.

Roll call and reading and approval of the minutes.

On approved motion Brother Earl Rhoades was elected Conference Post Master.

Motion made and supported that the Conference Secretary and the Conference Treasurer be reimbursed each year for their services. That we pay them each a salary of \$25.00 per year.

On approved motion the Secretary was instructed to write the State Attorney General and ascertain from him whether or not it will be necessary to have our Conference Minutes type-written in book form or written with pen and ink in a book in order to pass in law as an official record.

A resolution was read with reference to a returned Missionary traveling the Conference each year, and the resolution also referred to the matter of dividing the funds collected at this time.

Motion made and supported to adopt the resolution.,

Resolution amended that the Pastors of the Conference, instead of the Conference Treasurer, divide and send the money as directed in the resolution.

An amendment to the amendment was offered, moving that the money collected by the returned Missionary be divided equally between the local Y. M. W. B. and the local W. H. & F. M. Society and the Pastor; the Pastor to forward the amount paid to him to the Connectional Missionary Secretary.

Vote taken on the amendment to the amendment. Carried.

Vote on the amendment as amended. Carried.

Vote on the question as amended. Carried.

Motion made and supported that the W. H. & F. M. Society instruct the returned Missionary who travels the Conference with reference to the above resolution and that the Missionary make clear to the Pastors how the funds are to be divided.

On approved motion the Secretary was instructed to find out all of the Resolutions that are still in effect and have the same published in our Conference Minutes from year to year.

The Conference Sunday School Secretary read his annual statistical report. On motion report adopted. See report.

On motion Rev. Raymond E. Young was elected Conference Reporter.

Committee on Finance rendered a partial report. On motion the report of the Finance Committee was referred back to the Committee for further consideration.

On motion adjourned.

Benediction by Rev. Drake.

Thursday Afternoon.

Devotions were led by Rev. Thomas, who read as a Scripture lesson the 125th Psalm and offered prayer. Duet by Brother and Sister Young.

Roll call and reading and approval of the minutes.

The Committee to whom was referred the matter of outlining the duties of the Conference President and the Conference Evangelist rendered their report.

On motion the report was adopted. See report.

Committee on Credentials reported the name of Brother Irl Pettit, of Hollis, recommending him as a suitable person to take the course of study, preparatory to traveling under the direction of the Conference.

Motion made and supported to refer the above to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

Orders of the day. Election of permanent officers. Ballot for President of the Conference.

On the first ballot, A. B. Hotchkiss received 3 votes, P. A. Miller 18, E. R. Dodd 26, F. C. Hill 1, and R. E. Young 4. Total number votes cast, 52. Number necessary to a choice, 27. No election.

Second ballot for President: P. A. Miller received 21 votes, A. B. Hotchkiss 4, E. R. Dodd 26, R. E. Young 2. Total votes cast, 53. Necessary to a choice, 27. No election.

Third ballot for President: E. R. Dodd received 29, P. A. Miller 19, R. E. Young 2, A. B. Hotchkiss 2. Necessary to a choice, 27. Brother E. R. Dodd having received a majority of all of the votes cast in the third ballot was declared elected.

Ballot for Vice-President: Brother F. C. Hill having received a majority of all of the votes cast in the first ballot, was declared elected.

On approved motion the Assistant Secretary was asked to cast the ballot of the Conference for E. H. Cook as Secretary. This having been done, he was declared elected.

Motion made and supported that the Secretary cast the ballot of the Conference for F. E. Shivers as Assistant Secretary. The ballot was cast and Brother Shivers declared elected.

Motion made and supported that the Secretary cast the ballot of the Conference for Rev. Wm. A. Smith as Conference Treasurer.

On approved motion the Secretary cast the ballot of the Conference for Oliver G. Wilson as Assistant Treasurer.

Ballot for Conference Evangelist. On the first ballot R. E. Young received 21 votes, A. B. Hotchkiss 19, C. E. Huscher 9, P. A. Miller 5. No election on the first ballot.

Second ballot for Conference Evangelist: R. E. Young received 30 votes, A. B. Hotchkiss 6, C. E. Huscher 9, P. A. Miller 4. Brother R. E. Young having received a majority of all of the votes cast was declared elected.

Ballot for one ministerial and one lay member on the Conference Board of Trustees. The first ballot was for the ministerial member for a term of three years. No election on the first ballot. On the second ballot P. A. Miller received 34 votes, S. W. Bond 15, S. F. Wilson 1. Brother P. A. Miller declared elected.

Ballot for lay member. No election on the first ballot. On the second ballot Samuel B. Burgan was elected for a term of two years.

Motion made and supported that the Secretary of the Conference cast the ballot of the Conference for F. E. Shivers for a term of four years on the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

By vote of the Conference the following Committees were elected:

On motion T. J. Pomeroy was elected Conference Sunday School Secretary.

Sunday School Board—E. R. Dodd, T. J. Pomeroy, S. W. Bond. On motion Conference adjourned for Committee work. Benediction by Rev. P. A. Miller.

Friday Morning.

The Conference met around the altar for a season of prayer. The Lord's blessing descended upon us while we kneeled before Him.

Sister Eberhart, returned Missionary from India, introduced to the Conference.

Rev. Thomas, of the Kansas City Mission, introduced to the Conference.

Roll call and reading and approval of the minutes.

Committee on Credentials report the name of Rev. Earl J. Carry, of the Miltonvale class, as a suitable person to travel under the direction of the Conference.

On motion the above was referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

On approved motion the Conference President was elected as a representative of the Wesleyan Methodist Church and Conference to attend the annual State Holiness Camp Meeting, to be held at Wichita, Kansas, next year about the middle of August.

On approved motion Brother Tremaine McDowell was elected as the alternate representative.

Report from the Chairman of the various districts regarding Holiness Conventions held during the year.

No Conventions were held on Districts Nos. 1 and 2.

Brother Currie reports two Conventions held on District No. 3.

Brother F. E. Shivers reports a good Holiness Convention held
at Jerome, on District No. 4.

Rev. C. P. Sage reports two Conventions held on District No. 5. On motion the reports were adopted.

On approved motion Rev. Edward Huscher was elected as Chairman of Holiness Conventions for District No. 3.

Rev. Oliver G. Wilson was elected Chairman of District No. 1.

Rev. E. H. Dunbar was elected Chairman of District No. 4.

Rev. Wm. A. Smith was elected Chairman of District No. 2. Rev. T. J. Pomeroy was elected Chairman of District No. 5.

Motion made and supported that the Chairmen of the different Holiness Conventions give a written report next year of their work.

The first reading of the report of the Committee on Pastoral Relations was given.

The Secretary read a letter from Sister Vera G. Macy, written from Masumbo, Africa. Sister Macy reports progress in their work there and the Lord's blessing as resting upon them.

CONFERENCE PRESIDENT AND CONFERENCE EVANGELIST.

Your Committee to whom was referred the matter of duties for Conference President and Conference Evangelist beg to submit the following report:

The President shall travel the Conference and receive a salary of \$900.00. He shall hold at least two Quarterly Meetings on each charge during the year. He shall give special attention to the matter of church property and see that it is kept in repair, and also look after titles to church property. He shall see that proper provision is made for the salary of the pastor and shall assist in the raising of the Budget. He shall spend much time on the charges assisting the pastors, especially helping in personal work, pastoral visiting and adjusting any difficulties in the churches.

The report of the President shall include the number of Quarterly Meetings held and the work done on each charge.

The Conference Evangelist shall be under the direction of the Missionary Board of the Conference and shall devote his time to evangelistic work. Should a revival be held where there is no pastor, arrangements shall be made for the Evangelist to care for the work until a suitable pastor can be secured. Arrangements shall be made for regular services as often as may be in churches left without a pastor.

The Evangelist shall receive a salary of \$900.00. All collections and contributions shall be applied on the salary of the Evangelist, and any deficiency shall be paid from the Conference funds.

Pastors are urged to co-operate to the fullest extent in arranging the time for evangelistic help and assist in keeping the Evangelist fully employed.

Remarks:—Out of twenty-five Sunday Schools reporting this year only two report a Home Department; only six report a Cradle Roll Department; and six report a Teacher Training Department. Most of the Sunday Schools fail to report on the

Efficiency Standards. Let us study this and try and bring our Sunday Schools up to the standards set by our Denomination, or as nearly so as possible.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Dr. J. H. Vincent says: "The Sunday School is a department of the Church in which the Word of God is taught for the purpose of bringing souls to Christ and building up souls in Christ." Therefore the purpose of the Sunday School is to teach the Word and save souls.

The Sunday School is neither a social club nor a literary society. While we should be sociable, and sociability should be cultivated, the tendency of the age is to make this the most conspicuous part of the Sunday School work. But while the Sunday School should be made interesting and attractive, we have a higher calling than to simply entertain. The purpose of the Sunday School is to "bring souls to Christ, and to build up souls in Christ." To accomplish this there should be the fullest co-operation of the Church, its members, and the pastor with the Sunday School. Our motto should be, "Every member of the Church a member of the Sunday School." The machinery of the Sunday School is · sufficient to accomplish this. An honest effort should be put forth to persuade every member of the church, and of the neighborhood as far as possible, to attend the regular Sunday School services. Where cases are found that cannot or will not attend the Sunday School, they might be induced to study their lesson at home and join the Home Department. We are sadly lacking in this department of the Sunday School work, and also in the Cradle Roll Department. Out of twenty-five Sunday Schools reporting this year, only three report a Home Department, and only six a Cradle Roll. Brethren, these things ought not to be so. The "shut-ins" should not be neglected, and the great Master Himself gathered the children in His arms and said, "Suffer little children to come unto Me, and forbid them not." We urge those Sunday Schools which have not as yet organized these departments to do so this coming year.

Teachers and officers of the Sunday School should be Holy Ghost men and women. Without this equipment they cannot be successful in "bringing souls to Christ" or "building souls up in Christ," the goal we are aiming at.

A great responsibility rests upon the workers in the Sunday School. The destiny of souls rests largely upon them. In youth the heart is most impressive. Truths taught at this time linger with the individual throughout life. Then how careful the teacher ought to be in seeing that the lesson taught is in the most impressive way possible. Much time should be spent in the preparation of the lesson and invoking the blessing of the Lord upon their efforts.

Also, as far as possible, the teacher should qualify himself for teaching. As important as the work is, no person ought to neglect the opportunities afforded by the Teacher's Training Course of better fitting himself for the place to which God and the Sunday School Board has called him.

BOOKS AND PERIODICALS.

Your Committee on Books and Periodicals begs to submit the following report:

The public press is a most potent influence in molding character and determining life. What one reads gives direction to thought and thought directs the man. The person who does not read is circumscribed in his thought and therefore limited in his activities. However, it is better that one read not at all than that he read the pernicious and poisonous literature which circulates so freely in books and periodicals today.

But we would stress the words of Paul to Timothy, "Give attendance to reading." The very best and most wholesome literature is abundant and inexpensive and therefore within the reach of all. We would strongly urge upon our people the reading of the best books, and especially religious books.

The newspaper and current magazine have their place, but are frequently given too large a place with us as individuals and as families. We commend the reading of religious papers and magazines. The first should be our own publications, the reading of which keeps us in touch with the work of our Church as well as with its life and thought.

Our women have shown a progressive spirit in providing for the publication of a missionary magazine. This should have the liberal support and patronage of our people. The Wesleyan Methodist and the Wesleyan Missionary should be in every home.

The women of the Kansas Conference have taken an advance step in recommending that a missionary library be placed in each local Society. This and the Sunday School library may be made channels of great blessing to many and deserve the most liberal support.

Children and young people should and will read. The parent, the pastor and the Church should do their utmost not only to prevent the reading of undesirable literature, but to provide and encourage the reading of the best.

Next we should make ourselves familiar with the life and thought of the world and the Church at large, that we may be the better able to take our place and do our part in the world-wide work of Jesus Christ. For it is only when we observe the world-wide workings and movements that we can fully understand the application of Scripture and prophecy to present conditions and needs. Therefore "give attendance to reading."

REPORT ON MORAL REFORM.

The tendencies of the age in which we live are downward. The moral decadence is becoming more apparent as in line with 2 Tim. 3:1, "In the last days perilous times shall come." Selfishness, greed, blasphemy abound on every hand. Immoralities are increasing at an alarming rate; the holy Sabbath is being desecrated by pleasure

seeking to such an extent that the places of religious worship are sadly neglected—"lovers of pleasure more than lovers of God."

Christian scientists and physicians not long ago were quite pronounced in their declarations about the harmful effects following the use of tobacco, and especially the cigarette. But during the recent war the young soldier was encouraged to indulge in the habit, being told that it was necessary for the best physical condition on the battlefield and that it was manly. Today some of these same young men, who before the war were free from the vile habit are now slaves to the evil and will possibly be wrecked in body, mind and soul forever. As a Church we are decided in our stand against the use of tobacco or liquor in any form.

In this commercial age, men are becoming avaricious in their grasp after wealth and in order to gratify their covetous desires will use foul means to get the object of their quest. Some otherwise good people seem to think it a credit to their ingenuity to take advantage and get the best of the other party in trade. Money honestly obtained and consecrated to the will of God is a great blessing, but where it is obtained through dishonest methods, or hoarded up as "riches for the last days," to heap it upon one's own lust, it becomes a curse.

The truth of the above statement becomes apparent in the light of present day subordination of spiritual interests to the mere temporal and material.

Again, new fangled ideas are being substituted for the Word of God and the old-time preaching of the Gospel. The modern picture show is taking the place in some localities of religious worship with the view of getting increased attendance, but how sadly at the sacrifice of spirituality and good morals!

The Apostle in his letter to Timothy says, "Keep thyself pure." This injunction from holy writ is enjoined upon the people of this age as well; but what a contrast to the present day social corruption! Unholy alliances are becoming very numerous. It has been stated that every six minutes there is a divorce. That means that every six minutes a home is wrecked. Womanhood and manhood is being sacrificed upon the altar of lust. We are thankful for the move made by the State and Nation to bring about better social conditions, but we fear this matter will not be settled right until it is settled on the Word of God.

We as a Church take a positive stand against the above mentioned evils and everything that conflicts with the teaching of God's Word. We believe in cleanliness of body and spirit, modesty of apparel, sobriety, sound speech that cannot be condemned, proper observance of the Sabbath, which God says is to be kept holy, and separation from all that is sinful.

Resolved, That we heartily endorse the work of the Tidings of Joy Mission, and give the Mission our sympathy, prayers and financial support.

No. 9. Conference Evangelist.

Resolved, That it be the sense of our Conference that our Conference Evangelists, by virtue of their office, if not elected as members, be advisory members of the Committee on Pastoral Relations.

PRESIDENT'S ADDRESS.

Sisters of the Kansas Conference and of the W. H. & F. M. Society—Greetings in the name of our all-sufficient Lord, and with the Apostle Paul we would give thanks unto God, who always causeth us to triumph in Christ and maketh manifest through us the savour of His knowledge in every place.
