Standing Rules

CONFERENCE OFFICERS—Resolved: that the officers be installed during Conference, at a public service announced in advance; office to take effect at the rise of Conference.

CONFERENCE PRESIDENT—Resolved: (1) That the Conference President be appointed, authorized and required to travel the Conference as President, having general supervision of the spiritual interests and benevolences thereof, holding at least one service at each church during the year under such date as he may announce in advance.

That he shall raise funds to meet the demands of the Conference work, assisted by the pastors, and he shall receive contributions for Missions, Education,

and Superannuated Ministers where there are no pastors.

(3) That he shall have general supervision of the church property, and shall inquire into the titles of the same, to see that no property is loosely held, and shall look after the rental of Conference property and see that the rent is turned into the treasury and he shall investigate the possibility and feasibility of the sale of property not in use.

That he shall be authorized to grant letters to disband classes

That he shall be required to write non-resident members of the Con-(5) ference asking them in case they cannot attend to write the Conference a letter

of greeting, stating the condition of their religious experience.

(6) That he shall devote as much time as possible and as occasion may afterd in evangelistic and other meetings in the Conference.

(7) That he may engage help from time to time, as may be advisable and who he may consider properly qualified to assist in holding Evangelistic and Quarterly meetings, such help to be remunerated from the Church Extension Fund.

(8) That he shall be paid from the Conference Persident's Salary Budget

(8) That he shall be paid from the Conference President's Salary Budget the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) per week for his services, the same to begin the first Sunday following the rise of Conference, and to continue through the second Sunday following the rise of the next Conference, the same to be paid monthly in advance; he shall also be paid official expenses, including secretarial help up to ten dollars (\$10) per week and he shall be paid ten dollars (\$10) per week for utilities, and his premium on the Conference approved minister's health help us to ten dollars (\$10) per week and he shall be paid ten dollars (\$10) per car travel expense and be provided a Conference Parsonage. That the Camp and Conference registration fee for him and his wife be granted.

(9) That he shall act, or appoint to act, as Fraternal Delegate to all denominational or inter-denominational bodies as he deems advisable.

CONFERENCE TRUSTEES-Resolved: (1) That the Board of Trustees

shall consist of nine members, three to be elected each for a term of three years and each to reside within the bounds of the Conference.

(2) That the duly elected and qualified Trustees of the Annual Conference are hereby authorized and directed to sign for the purchase, sale, mortgaging and conveyance of real estate recommended by the Conference Board of Church Extension and Evangelism during the interim between the meetings of the Annual Conference, and all such action or actions shall be deemed to be legal and binding upon the Conference, and of as full force and effect as they would have been if such actions on the part of the Trustees had been specially authorized by the Annual Conference.

(3) That the President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall be authorized to sign on behalf of the Board of Trustees, such signatures to be valid and binding as if all members of the Board of Trustees had signed said papers

IV. BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION AND EVANGELISM—Resolved:
(1) That the Conference Board of Trustees and the President of the Conference Woman's Missionary Society constitute the Board of Church Extension and Evangelism of the Conference.

(2) That the Board of Church Extension and Evangelism is hereby author-

ized to pay out all monies from the Conference Church Extension Fund.

That the Conference Board of Church Extension and Evangelism be the

Board of Managers for the Conference in the interim of the Conference sessions.

V. COMMITTEE ON CHURCH AND PARSONAGE BUILDING ALTERATION AND REMODELING—Resolved: That the Conference Board of Trustees shall constitute the Committee on Church and Parsonage Building, Location, Alteration and Remodeling.

VI. CAMP MEETING BOARD—Resolved: (1) That the Camp Meeting Board be constituted of a total of nine members, consisting of the Conference President, Conference Wesleyan Youth President, Charles City pastor, three Elders and three laymen. One Elder and one layman shall be elected by ballot each year for a term of three years.

(2) That the camp ground property shall be under the care of the Camp

Meeting Board.

(3) That this Board shall have the power to engage workers beyond the present year.

(4) That this Board, together with the Conference Secretary, constitute

the Orders of the Day Committee.

(5) That all pledges and cash received during the sessions of Conference and Camp Meeting be placed in the Camp Meeting Fund unless otherwise designated.

(6) That the incidental expenses of the Annual Conference, while in ses-

sion, be paid from the Camp Meeting Fund.

VII. COMMITTEE ON STATISTICS AND CREDENTIALS—Resolved: (1) That a standing Committee on Statistics be elected, consisting of the Statistical Secretary and three other ministerial members. That three lay members be elected at the opening of Conference.

(2) That there be a standing Committee on Credentials whose duty it shall be to send each pastor, Sunday School Report blanks, Character blanks and Delegates blanks. The Delegate Credentials shall be returned to him one week prior to the opening of the Annual Conference. The Statistical Secretary shall be

the Committee on Credentials.

VIII. FINANCIAL SECRETARY-Resolved: That the Conference shall elect a Financial Secretary for the Conference year, whose duty it shall be to study finances and bring recommendations to the Committee on Finance at the next Annual Conference, of which Committee he shall be first member. He shall also require the various treasurers of the Conference to secure a competent auditor and submit a certificate of audit to him. He shall give a report of the auditors to the Conference.

IX. BUDGET ITEMS-Resolved: That all Treasurers shall mark receipts "Budget" or "Not Budget."

X. LOCAL CHURCH YEAR—Resolved: That all local churches close their books on June 30. That all statistics be figured through this date and that local church officers take office July 1.

XI. CONFERENCE FISCAL YEAR—Resolved: That the Conference Fiscal Year close July 15, and that all money shall be in the hands of the proper Treasurers on or before that date; that within seven (7) days thereafter each pastor shall submit to the Conference Treasurer his budget check sheet, with receipts covering the same, and his statistical blank, completed in full, except for the budget raised; that the Conference Treasurer shall fill in the budget raised items and hold reports for the Statistical Committee the first day of Conference.

XII. CONFERENCE DATE—Resolved: That Camp Meeting begin the first Sunday of August and continue through the second Sunday. That Conference begin the following Monday and conclude Wednesday.

XIII. SUNDAY SCHOOL—Resolved: That Sunday School be held each Sunday of Conference and Camp Meeting under the direction of the Sunday School Board. That the Sunday School Secretary be responsible to report to the Annual Conference. That the C.Y.C. Director be a member of the Sunday School Board.

XIV. LEAVE-Resolved: That no member shall leave the Conference session without permission of the President.

- XV. COMMITTEE REPORTS—Resolved: That all reports of Committees be made in legible writing, and handed to the Secretary at the time of giving of the report.
- XVI. PASTORAL REPORT—Resolved: (1) That each ministerial member of our Conference report to his Quarterly Conference the number of sermons preached, prayer meetings attended, homes visited and pastoral calls made.
- (2) That each Sunday School under pastoral oversight of Wesleyan Methodist pastors shall be included in a separate Statistical Report.
- XVII. CONFERENCE PREACHER'S REPORT-Resolved: That all Conference preachers, not stationed by the Pastorial Relations Committee, shall report to the chairman of the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders not later than 30 days prior to the first day of the Annual Conference.
- XVIII. CREDENTIALS—Resolved: That each Annual Conference preacher present his credentials at Conference for renewal and proper signature.
- XIX. TEXT BOOKS—Resolved: That all persons shall be requested to bring the text books to Conference in which they are to be examined.
- XX. PASTOR'S SUPPORT DURING CONFERENCE—Resolved: That all pastors remain on their charges for one Sunday after Conference and that the church's financial obligation to the pastor, whether he be leaving the field or not, be extended through that Sunday.
- XXI. MOVING PASTORS—Resolved: That each charge make provisions for the moving expense of the incoming pastor.
- XXII. MINISTER'S VACATION: Resolved: That the Conference President and all pastors be given a two weeks vacation with pay.
- XXIII. MEMBERSHIP IN SOCIAL SECURITY-Resolved: That the Pastoral Relations Committee encourage each pastor eligible for Social Security to join the plan.
- XXIV. DEATH OR ILLNESS—Resolved: That the Conference Secretary be notified by telephone in case of death or critical illness in the minister's home, and that he shall send cards at once to each pastor.
- XXV. PUBLISHING OF THE EVANGEL—Resolved: That the Evangel be published monthly (except August); that the Editor be also Publisher, that he be nominated by a staff composed of President of the Conference, President of the Woman's Missionary Society, President of the Conference Wesleyan Youth and the Conference Sunday School Secretary, and after being elected by the Conference, the manner of financing the publishing of the Evangel be left to the Editor and his staff.
- XXVI. NOMINATING COMMITTEE—Resolved: That a Nominating Committee to consist of Conference President ex-officio as chairman, three Elders elected by the Conference and three church Delegates of the Conference to serve in alphabetical order of the churches. Said delegates shall notify the Conference President of their availability by July 1. Successive church delegates shall serve as alternates. Said Committee to nominate Conference session committees. They shall bring in at least two (2) nominations for each vacancy of Conference Trustee, Trustees to Miltonvale Wesleyan College and members of the Camp Meeting Committee. That the full report be read and mimeographed copies be distributed to each member at the first session of Conference.
- XXVII. MID-YEAR CONVENTION COMMITTEE—Resolved: That the Committee on Mid-Year Convention consist of three members elected for three years; one member to be elected each year. The host pastor to be a member exofficio.
- XXVIII. CITATION COMMITTEE—Resolved: That there be a standing committee on Citation composed of three members. The Secretary Treasurer of the Superannuated Pension Plan shall be chairman of this Committee. The other members shall be elected annually. It shall be the duty of this committee to prepare and present appropriately worded citations to those Elders who have served the Conference twenty-five (25) years or more on a consecutive or cumulated basis Those eligible for citation shall be notified 30 days prior to the time of presentation.

JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

The one-hundred-fourteenth session of the Iowa Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America was called to order on the camp grounds at Charles City, Iowa, Monday, August 14, 1967, at 8:30 a.m., by the President, Rev. Donald D. Calhoun.

He mentioned that if a church paid its budgets in full that it came about as no accident. He read for his scripture lesson John 14:6. He mentioned that this is a dogmatic statement — a lone way. Men are looking for the way. This is the reason for suicides on college campuses; they haven't found the way. He also read John 3:14, 15 and Numbers 21:4-9. The serpent has always been a type of sin. He doesn't care who he bites, leader or those being led. Moses didn't send the serpents; God did. Don't stir up something you can't handle. It took death to bring them to the point of repentance, Moses prayed for the people, As pastors we need to lift Christ up before our people. These are days when men don't want to look up to Christ. If you choose death, don't look to Him. We must represent Jesus Christ and God. Sometimes if the people knew the men they were calling, as well as the man they have, they might not want him. If a pastor knew the church to which he is going as well as the one he is leaving he might not want to go. Love gets through to those we seek to reach.

COMMUNION SERVICE—The Conference Communion Service was conducted by Rev. Albert R. Fookes, Conference Vice President, assisted by the Reverends Jack Wolgamuth, J. Richard Ernst, G. M. Hubby, Glen McMurphy, Donald D. Calhoun, Lowell D. Stoesz and Ola D. Campbell. Rev. Clayton P. Elsberry led in singing "There Is A Fountain." Prayer was offered by Rev. Albert R. Fookes. The body united in praying the Lord's prayer. The elements were distributed, and the body partook as one, following the prayer of dedication of the elements. Rev. Albert R. Fookes pronounced the benediction.

Because of this growth a grave crisis developed because some word had been quoted that had not come from headquarters. The Jews felt that if the Gentiles became Christians, they must also become Jews. In dealing with this situation the disciples used some strong words: "Why tempt ye God." They were told that they were requiring more than they or their fore fathers had been able to bear. There were some necessary things. They had kept these at a minimum. They said, "this is our decision, to which the Holy Ghost agrees." The church should not require less than God, nor more than necessary, with room for good God given convictions. They sent both the letter and personal messengers. There was rejoicing in the decision. We were told that subscriptions to the Wesleyan Methodist are at the highest level since 1962. The third Sunday in January has been set as General Conference Tithing Sunday. The per capita giving of our people was \$312.65 this past year. Increases in costs of materials and labor, together with competition in the field have greatly increased printing costs. However the total income for 1967 could reach \$700,000.00 This in an increase. One-half this is in the field of Sunday School materials. By 1969 Aldersgate graded material will be ready for all grades, where desired. At present we have 120 missionaries. On all our mission fields there is a spiritual thrust being made through special evangelistic programs. The world missions department faces loss in financial income because of portions of our church which no longer contribute through our channels. However, the past year our giving surpassed that of former years. The merger with the Pilgrim Holiness and Reformed Baptist churches gives us a very strong missionary program. Gordon Wolfes are now in Hawaii. The ministerial insurance program is in effect, and ministers who wish may

We miss the mark when we emphasize tithing to raise money for a project, rather than a spiritual experience. Jack Pederson, a layman from the Waterloo, Falls Avenue church spoke of tithing

from the spiritual aspect, and told how God led him out into giving his tithe. He was led to see it as an act of faith. George Walquist, a layman from the Minneapolis, Waite Park church also spoke of tithing from the spiritual standpoint. He stated that some think of tithing as being expensive, when in reality it is cheap. God expects one-tenth of our increase, one-seventh of our time, and all of us. He stated that he has a peace that costs money if you could buy it. In Jerenniah 16:4 we find a warning that if we want trouble we don't have to go far to get it. Rev. Phillippe closed with prayer.

I would charge you not to let God's service become a wearisome grind. When there is no inner divine urge, being a minister is for less than God intended it to be. The obedient child of God comes to a second crisis of commitment and crucifixion. There can be no resurrection. I have purposefully used the word crucifixion rather than purification. Crucifixion brings us right up close to the side of Christ. The cross stands at the center of Christian experience and testimony. This is not an easy way inside or outside the pulpit. There is reproach in the cross. "God forbid that I should glory, save in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ, by whom the world is crucified unto me, and I unto the world." We need the cross in relation to the desire for recognition, etc. We dare preach nothing less than a second crisis. Let there be no compromise, toning down or dulling of the truth. Commissioned and consoled. God never said go build fine churches, train fine choirs, build for people to come, but bid us go where the lost men are. Woe is me if I preach not the gospel. Wherever you go you can profit by saying, "God sent me." You can't lose if God put you there. "He that goeth forth and weepeth, bearing precious seed, shall doubtless come again with rejoicing, bringing his sheaves with him." A gospel great enough to save the greatest, and greatest number of sinners. The gospel we preach is great enough to reach the sinner way up high, sinners. The gospel we preach is great enough to reach the sinner way up high, and way down low. Keep the Spirit. Keep the commission. As you go you can hear Him say "Lo I am with you always." The candidate for ordination was presented by Rev. Lowell D. Stoesz, Chairman of the Itineracy and Elder's Orders Committee. They were received by the Conference President, Rev. Donald D. Calhoun. CONFERENCE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the 114th Session of the Iowa Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America:

Greetings in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ!

Praise be to God for extending His mercies to us over the past year and for allowing us, in His providences, to assemble together again for this Conference Session.

MERGER

This is a historic conference in that this will be the last session of the Iowa Conference of The Wesleyan Methodist Church. The Lord willing, next June we shall merge with the Pilgrim Holiness Brethren and become a part of the new Wesleyan Church. Our Conference voted strongly in favor of the Merger last year and I have endeavored to cultivate relationships with our Pilgrim people in this area. Rev. C. B. Colaw, District Superintendent of the Pilgrim Holiness Church Central District, was invited to speak for our Mid-Year Ministerial Convention in February. In March, I spoke at the Pilgrim Holiness Central District Ministerial at Springfield, Missouri.

As a member of the General Board of Administration, it has also been my privilege to work with the leaders of the Pilgrim Holiness Church on the Polity Committee in preparation for the 1968 Merging Conference. In all of my association with the Pilgrim Holiness leaders, I have found them to be wonderful people of God.

THANKS

I wish to express special thanks and appreciation to Eldon Jamieson, our new conference treasurer, for his excellent work in taking over the tremendous task of caring for the Conference Treasurer's books. He assumed the work following conference last year and has cared for all of the responsibilities in an efficient manner.

SPIRITUAL TREND

Many of our Churches have reported real movings of the Holy Spirit in convicting power with a number of souls being saved and sanctified during the past year. In some cases, the new converts have added greatly to the spiritual and financial aspects of the Church.

CHURCH EXTENSION

Soon after Conference last year, Rev. and Mrs. G. M. Hubby moved to Marshalltown, Iowa to open our new pioneer church project. God has blessed their efforts in a great measure during the year. At the present time, plans are being drawn for a church building.

We have experienced a great deal of difficulty in our pioneer work at Burnsville, Minnesota in securing property and approval from the city officials for church use of the location, but all of these items have now been cleared and plans are being secured for a church building. Rev. and Mrs. Albert Fookes are to be commended for their faithful labors.

Our Church Extension goal for the 1967-68 conference year is for the construction of church buildings at both of our pioneer locations, Burnsville and Marshalltown.

BUILDING PROJECTS

In the early part of the conference year we experienced a tight-money attitude from lending agencies along with all of the business world but God has helped us again and again to borrow and build even when others could not.

At La Porte City, a beautiful new church building is under construction; the Rochester Church has purchased a new parsonage and construction is underway for a new sanctuary. All of the old property has been sold to the Christian Missionary Alliance Church; Falls Avenue has completed a new educational unit to be dedicated this fall; Cedar Rapids Church completed their parsonage by renovating the former chapel area; Charles City Church has a new parsonage nearly completed, and plans are being made for a new church building at Cedar Falls, and a new parsonage at Sioux City.

MANCHESTER CHURCH

We have endeavored to reopen the Manchester Church several times without success. No services have been held for nearly two years and the buildings are in very poor repair. Several letters have been received from the city officials requesting us to do something about the property.

It is with reluctance that in my best judgment I must recommend that the work be disbanded and the property disposed of by the Conference Trustees. If the Lord should lead us to establish a work in Manchester in the future it would need to be in a new location and with better facilities than what we now have.

OUTLOOK

As we view the Mid-East situation, many of us feel that these are days when prophecy is being fulfilled and the words of Jesus as recorded in Luke 21:28 should be heeded, "And when these things begin to come to pass, then look up, and lift up your heads; for your redemption draweth nigh." In the light of "these things" which Jesus spoke of we are not to stop or lesson our labors for the Lord in the churches of our conference, but we are to work more diligently than ever before to promote His cause for the salvation of souls.

LABORS

Considerable time was spent this last year in attending Conference, College and General Church Board Meetings, and in working with our two pioneer projects.

I preached 115 times, conducted 19 business meetings, held two revivals, toured the conference in the interest of church extension holding rallies in each district, participated in the dedication of one educational unit and two ground breaking ceremonies and traveled 37,750 miles with the following expenses:

CAMP MEETING BOARD REPORT

The following action was taken by the Camp Meeting Board through the

year July 15, 1966 to July 15, 1967.

Camp Insurance - Insurance was taken out on the Snack Building for the following amount: \$2,000.00 on the building, \$500.00 on the contents. There is full insurance on the camp ground buildings owned by the conference, liability insurance was purchased to cover \$100,000-\$300,000 on the camp grounds throughout the year.

Camp Improvements -- The following camp improvements were made: \$850.00 for camp concession stand, \$600.00 for gas line installation and the

purchase of a tractor for \$250,00.

Camp Statistics - Camp and Conference registration for 1966 was 87 adults

and 151 youth and children. The total registration income was \$2,651.13.

Disicipline - A motion prevailed that any major discipline problems in the encampment be referred to the Camp Meeting Board by the Head Counselor.

Dress on Camp Grounds — A motion prevailed that the following dress regulations be observed on the camp grounds: Boys — trousers and shirts; Girls — skirts and blouses or dresses at all times. Slacks may be worn by girls in recreation hours. No shorts or peddle pushers shall be worn at any time.

Dining Hall Equipment - The president authorized Rev. Yorton Clark to purchase 36 Samsonite chairs from Latta's at \$4.00 each. It was moved and supported that 20 tables at \$22.50 each be purchased for the dining hall.

Lighting - It was moved and supported that two electric poles and outlets

be installed for trailers at the east side of the camp ground.

Building - By motion the Board approved the building of a Workers Building according to the plans submitted by Rev. Calhoun (a building 20' x 36') to be built at the west side of the camp ground; that the water and sewer be extended to the building at the approximate cost of \$2,500.00 for the building

and \$1,000.00 for water and sewer.

Youth Directives - The following directives were established by motion: (1) That a youth council of five youth with the youth President and Councelor shall handle the problem of youth except for the severe cases which shall be referred to the Camp Board. The youth shall be one from each district. (2) That youth staying in the conference building be charged fifty cents rental fee for one night, or one dollar for two nights or more and that this be paid with their registration. (3) That teen-agers get permission slips from the Camp Dean or authorized counselor when leaving the camp grounds.

We recommend:

2. That the Conference Treasurer send a trial balance to the Conference

President each month.

3. That the goal for Church Extension and Evangelism be \$12,500.00, with the suggestion that each individual church have a goal of 3 one-half percent or more of their Total for All Purposes, less monies for Building, Amount Paid on Indebtedness and Amount Paid On Expenses of Indebtedness, of Item 8 of the Statistical Report as recorded in this year's Minutes.

4. That each organization contemplating a change in financial policy, check

with the Financial Secretary before bringing their report to the conference.

5. That Standing Rule II, item (8) be changed as follows: Deletion of "\$5.00 per week" for utilities and insertion of "\$10.00 per week" for utilities. Also the addition of the following: "That the Camp and Conference registration fee for him and his wife be granted."

- 6. We recommend that each church at the first meeting of the financial board following the annual conference seek to analyze the financial agreement with the Pastor. We further recommend a minimum salary of \$70.00 per week, the payment of hospital insurance premium, social security, parsonage and utilities, or the equivalent. Report No. 2

Interim Minutes of the Executive Committee

September 20, 1966

It was agreed that Mrs. Hubby keep a fund marked for travel and desk expense.

Plans for the missionary conventions were discussed suggesting that the conference missionary secretary, the conference president and the W.M.S. president be used as speakers.

It was voted that it would be well to place a copy of the W.M.S. Manual mentioned in the general plan of work in the hands of each pastor.

February 14, 1967 at the Waite Park Church

Mrs. Hubby asked each officer to send her a report to be published in the Evangel.

The Y.M.W.B. superintendent was granted permission to use any surplus from the "Larry Kinde Fund" to apply on the support of another missionary child.

From the summary of finances the decision was made that no missionary should be over paid while others' support is still lacking.

June 17, 1967

By letter the Conference Treasurer was authorized to pay \$150.00 from the Kitchen Improvement Fund to Rev. Calhoun for tables and chairs for the conference dining hall.

By letter the treasurer was also instructed to pay \$100 toward the furnishing of one room of the new workers cabin.

August 12, 1967

We voted to continue Alma Aldinger's field support.

We voted to pay Alma Aldinger's travel expense and an honorarium of \$50. We voted to pay Alice Davis' travel expense and a love gift of \$10. We voted to give Mrs. Monroe a love gift of \$15.

Plans were reviewed for the Missionary Rally. We recommend that all pledges received be for missionary support and church extension. 20 per cent of all pledges be for church extension, Alma Aldinger to receive field support to the amount of \$1,200 and our other missionaries, Alice Davis, Mitchell and Ella Cotrone and Don and Joan Kinde to receive equal amounts unless specified. We recommend that the cash offering be for the project presented by Miss Aldinger.

The committee would like to recommend a goal of \$10,000 for this year for

missionary support.

Missionaries Glenn Barnett and Betty Freeborn will tour the conference from November 12-26. We recommend that there be fall missionary tours in the form of rallies with the W.M.S. president and other conference personnel traveling with the missionaries.

Report No. 3

WMS PRESIDENT'S REPORT

It is a delight to report, in behalf of the Conference Womans Missionary Society, some of the labors of love — done in His name — during the 1966-1967 conference year.

CHALLENGE

We have been alerted to the unprecedented challenge before us to reach the otherwise unreached. This is the day to evangelize in haste. Jesus said "go" — and as long as there is an open door it is our business to go through that door to evangelize.

Projects of the year:

- 1. Support of Evelyn Casiano from Puerto Rico, student at Miltonvale Wesleyan College, to the amount of \$400.00 from our Student Aid Fund.
- 2. Observance of "Missionary Emphasis Sunday" which was introduced in the Plan of Work for this year. Reports indicate that this was an occasion of combined missionary enthusiasm throughout the departments of the local churches.
- 3. Total Thrust Rallys were held in six areas of the conference. This was a tour of personnel representing the interests of Church Extension, Education and Evangelism in Missions.
- 4. Hospital supplies have been brought, by local societies, to this session of WMS Conference. They are being packed in shipping drums and sent directly to our Sierra Leone field.

The YMWB also reached an all time high this year with a total of \$3,138.00.

Making a combined total from WMS and YMWB of \$30,087.00.

PLAN OF WORK

We recommend:

- 1. That we observe the monthly prayer requests in the WESLEYAN MIS-SIONARY, Wesleyanagram and other special requests as presented, and that we observe the monthly date for prayer and fasting. (See Efficiency Standard.) We encourage Scripture memorization and the use of "The Bible and Missions" found in the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY.
- 2. That the month'y meeting emphasize the study of the Wesleyan fields and missionaries, making use of the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY, the GUIDE and WESLEY FILM SERVICE.
- 3. That we promote the work of the Y.M.W.B. and assist with the purchase of the Y.M.W.B. Reading Course Books and other supplies as needed.
- 4. That each Society inquire into the needs of Brainerd, Wesleyan Indian Missions and Hephzibah before sending boxes, and that each society continue to prepare for the needs of World Missions without sending boxes until further notice.
- 5. A. That the local Vice-President cooperate with the Conference Vice-President in promoting Community Missions, especially during March (Focus Month), conducting, under the supervision of the Vice-President, an aggressive soul-winning campaign, with tract and Scripture distribution.
- B. That each society engage in community relief work, under the supervision of the work director, reporting same according to conference recommendations.
- 6. That the local societies promote the subscription of the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY by a subscription campaign in January, striving to secure ALL renewals and using assigned conference-church key and zip codes when remitting to Wesley Press. (See Efficiency Standard.)
- 7. A. That officers hold an annual planning session, preferably before the first meeting after conference, at which they will decide methods and times for carrying out the local section of the Plan of Work and the conference Plan of Work.
- B. That the local president personally review the Standard of Efficiency before each monthly meeting.
- 8. That the program for Homecoming be held in the fall, at which time the offering be received for education budget and the book project for Miltonvale College Library be promoted.
- 9. That the conference pledges made by each society be divided as follows: 20% for Conference Church Extension and the balance for Miss Alma Aldinger, Miss Alice Davis, Rev. and Mrs. Cotrone, and Rev. and Mrs. Kinde until

the field support for Miss Aldinger (which is \$1200) has been raised. Then the pledges will be divided among the others named. A society may specify differently as desired.

- 10. That the offerings received above expenses at the district conventions be used for the support of our conference missionaries, Miss Alice Davis, Rev. and Mrs. Mitchell Cotrone, and Rev. and Mrs. Don Kinde.
- 11. A. That each society meet its financial obligations as listed in Section IV under Finance of the Efficiency Standard.
- B. That the Penny-a-Meal Plan be used at the discretion of each Society.
- C. That each society send 25c per active member plus \$1.00 for the upkeep of the camp dining room and kitchen.
- D. That each society send \$1.00 per active member to the Conference Working Fund.
- E. That each treasurer forward all signed vouchers as statements of expense for which the society wishes to receive credit to the Conference W.M.S. Treasurer.
- 12. That, with the permission of the pastor and under his direction, each local society designate one Sunday of the year as Missions Emphasis Day. The societies are encouraged to prepare the hearts of their people for this day by special missionary emphasis during the preceding week.
- 13. A. That the 1967 White-Gift Christmas Offering will support a greater outreach in New Guinea.
- B. That the 1968 Self-Denial Offering will assist in the pioneering of a church in Honolulu, Hawaii.
- 14. A. That each society, during the September membership thrust set as its goal a gain of at least two new active members.
- B. That members of local societies be encouraged to sponsor honorary memberships.
- 15. That the annual report blanks be carefully filled out, one report being sent with the delegate's credentials to the Statistical Secretary, Miss Alice Barnett, Aredale, Iowa, 50605, by July 15th and the other report being brought to conference by the delegate and returned to the local treasurer following conference.

The thirty-fifth session of the Iowa-Minnesota Wesleyan Youth Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist church of America convened in the Youth Tabernacle on the camp grounds at Charles City, Iowa, at 9:00 A.M., August 10, 1967.

Rev. Huffman introduced Rev. Bob McIntyre to the body. Rev. McIntyre spoke, bringing greetings on behalf of the Wesleyan Youths across America.

WORDS OF GREETINGS — Rev. Don Calhoun, Conference President, gave a few words of greeting.

Rev. Calhoun moved that the platform be made a part of the Conference Bar and that our denominational representative, Bob McIntyre, be seated on the platform. Both motions were seconded and carried.

AGENDA — By motion, seconded and carried, the agenda was adopted. ROLL CALL — Forty-one delegates answered the roll call.

By motion, seconded and carried, David Mast as Conference Youth Treasurer was seated in the Conference Bar.

CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE — Mark Pedderson and Robyn Lewko were elected as the Credentials Committee.

ELECTION OF WESLEYAN YOUTH PRESIDENT — Rev. Huffman informed the group that he was ineligible as Conference Wesleyan Youth President for future years as he has reached forty. Rev. Tice spoke on behalf of the Conference Wesleyan Youth thanking Rev. Huffman for his service as Conference Wesleyan Youth President. The body stood in expression of our appreciation.

By motion, seconded and carried, the President appointed four tellers.

Upon vote by ballot, Rev. Gary M. Noyes was elected the Conference Wesleyan Youth President.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE (to consist of three pastors and three youths)— By motion, seconded and carried, this election was by acclamation.

RECESSED - We recessed for caucus meetings.

After re-convening for the announcement of the nominated district leaders, the meeting was recessed for the Nominating Committee Meeting.

1:00 P.M.

Rev. Paul Huffman called the meeting to order.

ROLL CALL — Forty-one delegates answered roll call.

Minutes of the morning session were read. A correction was made in the minutes changing "the President elected four tellers" to "the President appointed four tellers." By motion, seconded and carried, the minutes were adopted as corrected.

MID YEAR CONVENTION (Teen Retreat) – It was moved, seconded and carried, that we continue having the Teen Retreat.

TEEN RETREAT COMMITTEE — It was moved, seconded and carried, that the Teen Retreat Committee consist of three members and the youth president. By motion, seconded and carried, Rev. William Tice was elected a member of this committee. By motions, seconded and carried, Kathy Wells and Dorothy Happes were elected members of this committee.

The South Minnesota District invited the Conference Wesleyan Youth to their district for the Teen Retreat. A motion was made to accept this invitation; seconded and carried.
