Journal of Daily Proceedings.

The fifty-third (53rd) annual session of the Kansas Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, assembled in the Auditorium at Miltonvale, Kansas, Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock, August 14, 1923, President P. A. Miller presiding.

After singing "The Old Rugged Cross," and "We'll Work Till Jesus Comes," Rev. C. H. Dow, formerly pastor of the Miltonvale church, but at present a member of the Lockport Conference, was asked to take charge of the devotional services. Brother Dow read for a scripture lesson the third chapter of second Peter. His comments upon this chapter were thoroughly enjoyed by the saints, and God's presence was manifestly present in the opening service of the Conference.

The roll call was answered by 13 elders and 7 licentiates.

On approved motion Wm. A. Smith and A. J. Heisel were elected Committee on Credentials.

By vote of the Conference the first three rows of seats were fixed as the Conference bar.

On motion adjourned. Benediction by Brother Varney Martin.

Wednesday Morning.

Devotions were led by Rev. J. A. Stansbury who read for a scripture lesson the 20th Psalm and offered fervent prayer.

At the close of the devotional services, special prayer was offered especially for little Wendell Myers and others.

Roll call and reading and approval of the minutes.

Committee on Credentials render a partial report, reporting the name of Julia Adams, delegate from Easton. Delegate seated.

Brother Shivers, Chairman of District No. 2, reports two holiness conventions held during the year. On motion report adopted.

Committee on Sabbath Schools report. On motion report adopted. See report.

Rev. Maston of the Evangelical church of Huscher introduced to the Conference.

Committee on Credentials report the names of Bert Lloyd of the Chapman Creek work, and Brother Albert Johnson of Hall, as delegates to the Conference. Delegates seated.

On approved motion the Apportioning Committee was instructed to only assess the various charges at the rate of 5c per member

for Sunday School work.

Secretary read a letter from Brother W. E. Thomas, of Los Angeles, Calif.

Motion made and supported to pass the character of Brother and Sister Thomas and request the Secretary to write them a letter of greeting.

Ballot for Secretary of the Conference. No election on the first ballot.

On the second ballot Brother F. E. Shivers was elected Secretary.

Brother Shivers tendered his resignation as Secretary. On ap-

proved motion his resignation was accepted.

Ballot for Secretary. Brother Earl J. Carry elected Secretary on the first ballot. Brother Carry resigns after being elected as Secretary. His resignation was accepted.

Ballot for Secretary. Brother I. L. DeWitt elected Secretary

on the first ballot.

A rising vote of thanks was given by the Conference to Brother

Cook for his services as Conference Secretary.

On approved motion the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Conference for Rev. F. E. Shivers as Assistant Secretary. This having been done he was declared elected.

On approved motion the Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Conference for Chas. F. Pomeroy as Conference

Treasurer. This having been done he was declared elected.

By vote of the Conference, Secretary was instructed to cast the ballot of the Conference for Wm. A. Smith as Assistant Treasurer. This having been done he was declared elected.

Motion made and supported that the President be instructed to travel the Conference and serve as one of the Quarterly Conference

Evangelists.

Motion carried to have a Quarterly Conference Evangelist to

assist in holding the Quarterly meetings.

Conference voted to allow the President and Conference Evangelist the privilege of remaining on a charge in case a revival should break out at the Quarterly meeting, and that they secure some one else to hold their Quarterly meeting at the next points.

Ballot for Quarterly Conference Evangelist. No election on the first ballot. Rev. I. L. DeWitt elected Quarterly Conference Evan-

gelist on the second ballot.

Ballot for one Elder on the Conference Board of Trustees for a term of three years. Rev. Fred C. Hill was elected on the first ballot.

Ballot for one lay member of the Conference Board of Trustees for a period of two years. Brother C. H. Sheldon was elected on the first ballot.

By vote of the Conference Rev. F. E. Shivers was elected to succeed himself on the Committee of Itineracy and Orders for a

term of four years.

Brother Alfred Drake tendered his resignation as a member of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders. On approved motion his resignation was accepted. Brother E. H. Cook elected on the Committee of Itineracy and Orders to fill vacancy caused by Brother Drake's resignation.

The Secretary was instructed to write a letter of greeting to Brother and Sister Doty and Sister Alta Doty.

By vote of the Conference E. H. Cook elected Conference Sunday School Secretary.

Earl J. Carry elected as Secretary Conference Prayer League. Brother E. H. Dunbar elected as Tithing Secretary of the Conference.

Brother Travis, Chairman of Holiness District No. 1 gives his report. He reports two good holiness conventions on his district. One at Willis and one at Kansas City.

Committee on Finance report. They recommend the following: 1st. That the College be allowed to take cash offering and pledges for its benefit.

2nd. That Brother Miller's moving expenses of \$45.00 be paid by the Conference.

3rd. That for the ensuing year, the President be paid a salary of \$1,000 and traveling expenses, and that the Conference in addition, allow him \$15.00 per month or \$180.00 per year for house rent.

4th. We recommend that the deficit of \$141.64 in the President's salary be paid from the Conference Fund.

On approved motion the report was adopted.

The Conference voted to refer the matter of the Conference Evangelists' salary to the Finance Committee:

In the absence of Brother Drake, Brother Elmer Anderson was

made a member of the Apportionment Committee.

Examination of character resumed. Brother Charles Kaufman of the New Hope charge reads his statistical report and gives a

brief statement of his Christian experience.

Secretary reads a letter from Brother J. F. Presnall. His character was passed. Special prayer was offered at this time for the healing of Sister Presnall's body. The Conference gathered around the altar and fervent prayer was offered by Evangelist Clement in her behalf. The Lord especially blessed in this service.

As a token of our love and esteem to our President, Brother Miller, at this time Brother F. C. Hill, in behalf of the Conference, states that money has been contributed toward buying a good seal skin, leather lined, silk sewed Bible for Brother Miller. Brother Miller expressed his deep appreciation for this manifested kindness.

A letter was read to the Conference from Walter E. Carrington of Oregon. Secretary was instructed to write a letter of greeting to Brother Carrington.

Motion prevailed to reconsider the action of the Conference in

adopting the President's report.

Moved and supported that the matter of granting a letter of standing to Brother J. F. Hiner be referred to a special committee to be elected by the Conference.

On motion adjourned. Benediction by Brother Cook.

Roll call and reading of the minutes. Minutes approved after

correction.

Committee on Books and Periodicals report. On motion report

adopted. See report.

Brother and Sister Hardy, both Elders from Nebraska, were introduced to the Conference. They both spoke a few words of greeting and expressed their pleasure at being present with us.

Recommendation read from the W. H. & F. M. Society at Topeka, requesting that a deaconess be assigned to the Topeka work. They further request that Miss Grace Davis be assigned to this place.

Moved and supported to refer the above to the Committee on Pastoral Relations and that their recommendation be brought before the Conference for their consideration.

Examination of character resumed. The following preachers of the Conference were called: J. H. Hinchsliff, F. E. Shivers, C. E. Huscher, Elmer Anderson, S. F. Wilson, L. S. Currie, E. H. Cook, A. B. Hotchkiss. They each gave an account of their work for the past year and also briefly related their Christian experience. Their characters were all passed.

Committee on Credentials report recommending Brother David Styles of the Kansas City charge to travel under the direction of the Conference.

On motion the above referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

The special committee to whom was referred the matter of granting a letter of standing to Brother J. H. Hiner report. On motion report adopted. See report.

On motion the President's report was adopted with the above exception.

Orders of the Day. Hour given to the W. H. & F. M. Society.

Thursday Afternoon.

Conference called to order by the President. Prayer by Rev. J. A. Stansbury.

Orders of the Day. Hour given to our Connectional Representative, Rev. E. F. McCarty. Brother McCarty spoke of the good condition of our publishing and Sunday School interests. Brother McCarty also thoroughly discussed the missionary interests in a very interesting manner. He stated that in the Foreign Missionary work in the last quadrennial, we spent almost \$100,000 more than was spent during the four preceding years.

Two P. M. Hour given to our Educational interests. A number of interesting talks were given. Emphasis was given to the fact that it was not the aim of the school at Miltonvale simply to look after the development of the intellect, but to especially seek the spiritual good of all of the students. Fourthly—Keep only such books and periodicals before yourselves and children that will assist you in your progress toward that Heavenly City, and build a character through the atoning Blood of Jesus Christ that will stand the test throughout the eternal ages of our God.

SABBATH SCHOOLS.

We believe that the literature of our denomination is unexcelled and recommend its use in all Wesleyan Methodist Sunday Schools.

We recommend that Sunday School Conventions be held in our own churches and that rightful methods should be employed in the

Sabbath Schools so as to make it so attractive that the young may be anxious to attend. And above all, over all, in all, and through all, we should seek to let the Holy Spirit have His way remembering that it is "not by might, nor by power, but by my Spirit" that we shall prevail.

Report No. 3.

REPORT OF ORGANIZER AND CONFERENCE SUPERIN-TENDENT OF BANDS.

Sisters of the Kansas W. H. & F. M. S., we humbly submit the

following report:

Traveled from Nov. 17 to Dec. 5, making seventeen days, held eleven meetings, organized one society at LeRoy, one Y. M. W. B. at Kansas City with fifty members. Freewill offerings taken at Topeka, Keene, Willis and LeRoy amounting to \$35.60. Expense account for this trip totaled \$16.85. Salary for fifteen days at \$1.25, \$18.75. Making a total of \$35.60.

We commenced early in the year to prepare for our Spring Conventions, which resulted in three conventions being held. One at Chapman Creek, District No. 2, May 9, 10, 11; one at Keene, District No. 1, May 26, 27; and the last at Wesley Center, District No. 3, May 29, 30, 31. Because of heavy rains and floods none was held in District No. 4. We will refrain from giving any further report of these Conventions, allowing the District leaders this privilege, except briefly mentioning the financial part. The expenses of these Conventions were fully met each in their own District with several dollars over in Districts 1 and 2. That raised over and above in District 1 was credited to the Keene W. H. & F. M. S. The \$11.23 raised in District 2 was very kindly given to the Organizer on her expenses in the future.

The W. H. & F. M. S. put on one day's program at the Holiness Convention held at Antioch in June. The evening service was devoted to the Y. M. W. B., at which time twenty-three little people under ten years of age gave the program with the help of the Superintendent. At the close of the service the offering of \$6.77 was presented to us by the Band.

On the 8th of July we held one service in Kansas City preparatory to the organization of a W. H. & F. M. S. there in the near future.

Several meetings have been held outside of our own denomination. Contributions amounting to about \$75.00 have been turned to the General Missionary work from these meetings.

Have written over three hundred letters to the Bands and Societies during the year. This has been a privilege, not a hardship or task that we dreaded. It has brought us into closer touch with those that have the same interests at heart as we. The Lord bless them, every one. This writing has necessitated a bill of \$5.91 for stamps and stationery.

During the past year, as Organizer and Superintendent, we have tried to labor just as faithfully as the year prior, when we traveled the Conference in the interest of the work. But you will readily notice that not nearly the amount of money has passed through our hands for the mission work as the year previous. But the Lord has His own way of working things out and I believe the results of this past year will bring forth more fruit than the year before. The burden of my heart all the year has been to bring to our people so vividly the great need that they will catch the vision of this lost world and see the direct need of the lost humanity in every land. If we succeed in this the means will be forthcoming.
