Tuesday, July 18, 1961.

OPENING - The Tennessee Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church convened for its Thirty-second Annual Session on the Campground at 9 A.M., Tuesday, July 18, 1961.

Conference was called to order by the President, Rev. D. P. Denton.

Rev. Robert Farley conducted devotions. Roll was called with 7 Elders, 8 Conference Preachers, 4 Students in the Course of Study, and 20 Delegates responding. The following were seated as Alternate Delegates: Mrs. Margaret Ruth Baker and Mrs. T. L. Grow.

It was voted to limit reading of the minutes to once a day.

Recessed for committee work to Call of the Chair.

Conference called to Order. Prayer by Rev. Fred Isbel.

MISSIONARY BOARD - Report of the Missionary Board was adopted as read. (See Report #4)

CAMP MEETING ASSOCIATION - Minutes and report of the Camp Meeting Association were adopted as read. (See Report #5)

RELIGIOUS SERVICES - Committee on Religious Services read its report, which was adopted. (See Report #6)

RECOMMENDATION AGAINST MERGER - The following recommendation regarding merger with other denominations was presented from the floor by Rev. Charles Haire and adopted; "Since there are continued efforts among some conferences within the denomination to effect a merger of some kind with some other groups, and since twice within the last six years God has seen fit to stop any such mergers by our church, and since some conferences have already taken action requesting that such merger moves again be opened. Therefore, be it resolved, that we of the Tennessee Conference go on record as opposed to the idea of merger, since all plans of merger that have been presented to us in the past have called for the surrender of some of our basic distinctives, and since all indications now are that any merger effected would call for more centralized government and lowering of Bible Standards; be it further resolved that a committee of five or more be elected as a Merger Committee, whose duties it shall be to study these moves toward merger, and to plan and recommend action to the conference, and to inform the conference as to such proposals."

Upon request, the Conference President was granted time between the devotions and the Orders of the Day on Wednesday morning to give his report and also present some vital items to the conference body.

REPORT - Report of Rockdale Church was read by delegate, Helen Workman.

W. Y. REPORT - W. Y. Secretary, Clyde Scott, read minutes of W. Y. Convention and W. Y. Statistical Report, which were adopted as read.

REPORTS -- Reports of Claude McCabe (Oak Ridge, Earl Seibers (Hinton Street Mission), Thomas Hampton (South Clinton), Douglas Heffner (Rockwood), Charles Haire (Knoxville, Second), W. G. Harwell (Savannah), and Harry Stockton (Freedom Hill) were heard.

Wednesday, 7:30 P. M.

CHILD EVANGELISM DIRECTOR - Sunday School Board nominated and Conference elected Mrs. Jean Wheeler, Director of Child Evangelism.

APPORTIONMENTS - Report of Committee on Apportionments was adopted with amendment as follows: That the Conference President be allowed to hold revivals and other meetings to supplement his salary. RESOLUTION AND LAWS OF THE TENNESSEE CONFERENCE

We, the Committee on Resolutions, submit the following report:

Be it resolved, that these articles shall become the standing rules and law of this Conference:

1. Before a local building committee proceeds with a building plan or program that they be required to have all plans approved by the President and his Advisory Board and the Missionary Board; and further, that no financial obligations be assumed without the consent of the Conference Trustees.
2. That the Board of Conference Trustees be, and they are hereby empowered, to sign all papers necessary for the sale or transfer of Conference, Church or Parsonage property, providing the said sale of transfer is authorized by the President and his Advisory Board and shall not violate the spirit of paragraphs 386, 387 of our Book of Discipline.
3. The Board of Conference Trustees are hereby authorized to execute papers to secure funds for the liquidation of Conference, Church or Parsonage indebtedness, providing that the Churches set forth in writing the amount and the purposes for which the loan is to be used; and that no funds so secured shall be used for any other purpose than that set forth in the notice to the trustees of the Conference.
4. When a deed for Conference, Church or Parsonage property is received and before is recorded it shall be referred to the President and his Advisory Board who are hereby designated as a Deed Examining Committee whose duty shall be to examine the deed and see that there are such disciplinary clauses included as may be necessary to make the property secure to our Church. Said Committee shall have power to engage such legal advice as may be needed to insure the proper steps regarding the reception or transfer of the property. See paragraphs 388, 389 of present Book of Discipline.
5. We shall proclaim with voice and pen and holy living the gospel of full salvation, recognizing our dependence upon, and need of the indwelling power and presence of the Holy Spirit.
6. We shall continue to interpret the teachings of the Scriptures and the Special Rules of the Discipline in accord with the standards held by the early Methodists and the Wesleyans of the past generations. To this end we reaffirm our stand against the reception of any member as a full member who wears jewelry, including the wedding band or other unnecessary ornaments and other worldly manifestations on the person and declare ourselves in favor of higher standards of dress. Our ministers are asked to refrain from performing wedding ceremonies using the ring, and to be positive in their declarations regarding this entering wedge of worldliness. We further declare our opposition to such things as commercialized ball games, Sabbath desecration, theatres, television, and such like, and shall support our ministers in their endeavors to counteract these menaces. We further urge our ministers to take an active stand in exposing the three "C's" of the world — Communism, Catholicism, and Compromise.
7. We urge all Conference Preachers and Elders to become members of the Women's Missionary Society, and that the pastors attend each meeting and encourage the women, this being one of the strong arms of the Church.
8. Each Church shall make a special effort in behalf, and loyally support the Church Extension Campaign.
9. EACH PASTOR, CHURCH, OR PARSONAGE, SHALL HAVE IN THE HANDS OF THE STATISTICAL SECRETARY NOT LESS THAN FIVE DAYS BEFORE THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE, ONE COPY OF HIS STATISTICAL REPORT IN FULL. This report shall be accompanied by a statement from the Conference Treasurer giving the amounts paid on budget under item VIII in the pastor's statistical report and the pastor's report must check with that of the Conference Treasurer.
10. The Conference Treasurer's books shall close on June 30 of each year and no credit shall be given on the Budget for that fiscal year for money received after this date.
11. The President's, Secretary's, and Treasurer's correspondence expenses shall be paid from the Conference Fund by the Conference Treasurer.

RESOLUTION AND LAWS OF THE TENNESSEE CONFERENCE CONT'D.

12. Minutes of this Conference shall be published through arrangements made by the Missionary Board and delivered to the pastors in numbers equal to 50% of their Church membership.

13. Preachers and Delegates shall remain throughout the entire Conference session unless providentially hindered or excused by the Conference.

14. All Elders received from other denominations shall be required to pass examination on our Book of Discipline, and must have passed a course of study which is equivalent to our course for ordination, and harmonize with our theological views. They shall give special attention to the requirements found in paragraphs 171 of our Book of Discipline.

15. Copies of these resolutions, together with the apportionments and the addresses of the President, Secretary and Treasurer, shall be in the hands of each pastor with two weeks of the close of the Annual Conference. The Conference Secretary be authorized to carry out this resolution.

16. Pastors shall mail all Delegates' credentials to the Conference Secretary not less than five (5) days before convening of Conference.

17. The Conference Budget shall be raised and remitted monthly to the Conference Treasurer.

18. All monies which are reported through the Conference Treasurer shall be sent to him either as cash or receipts and the Conference Treasurer's receipt for each item, and no money shall be listed paid out by the Treasurer except by check, on order of the President, and he shall be required to present cancelled checks and vouchers for each bill paid.

19. Those wishing to take examinations in the Course of Study for credit during any year, shall submit the questions before May 31 of that year, and shall have the answers in the hands of the proper instructor before June 30 for credit for that year. The Committee on Itineracy and Orders shall not be expected to answer questions or accept papers after these dates.

20. It shall be a standing rule that the Secretary shall be remunerated the sum of \$50.00 for each session of Conference.

21. We recommend that when the Conference President labors as an evangelist in any of our Churches, he be paid as other evangelists are paid.

22. Each unorganized work which is being run under the direction of the Conference and served by a member of this body, shall be allowed to elect an honorary delegate who shall be permitted to sit with the Conference and speak on matters of business, but not allowed to vote.

23. The Conference President shall be required to hold Quarterly Business Meetings at all unorganized works that are under the Conference Missionary Board or with the Conference, and the pastors of these works shall receive an offering quarterly to be sent to the Conference Treasurer and used toward the President's Salary. Treasurers of these unorganized works shall be members of some Wesleyan Methodist Church unless otherwise approved by the Conference Missionary Board.

24. In order to help maintain the spirit of brotherhood among our members and ministers, we ask that designations of titles, degrees and authority be omitted both in our public meetings and in the printed minutes, except in the first public introduction of each individual.

25. The Committee on Itineracy and Elders' Orders will be responsible for the time, place, financing, and program of the Ministerial Convention each year.

26. The Conference President and his Advisory Board is a constituted committee on Special Orders.

RESOLUTION AND LAWS OF THE TENNESSEE CONFERENCE CONT'D.

27. In the judgment of the Tennessee Conference, viewing television programs is an impediment to the development of holy character. We deplore the television program's evil effect upon the moral and spiritual life of the nation. The principles of Wesleyan Methodism, being an epitome of the christian religion, obligate Wesleyan Methodists to an unblameable life which constantly rebukes every form of evil and zealously advocates holiness of heart and life. Therefore, we most earnestly request our ministers and members, as those who must give account unto God in the Day of Judgment for anything which tends to influence toward evil, to refrain from the purchase of television sets and from viewing television programs for Jesus' sake. Inasmuch as ministers are examples and patterns to the flock of Christ, the Tennessee Conference expects each of its ministers to set a wholesome example and to be a godly pattern in this respect, so that those to whom he ministers will follow his example and avoid exposure to this which menaces vital godliness.

28. That outgoing pastor's responsibility continue through the Sunday following Annual Conference. Also, that a church allow its pastor at least two meetings away from the church and that he be given at least one week's vacation pay; that last provision to include the Conference President.

29. That no budget credit be given until payment is itemized, or otherwise specified.

30. That all officers and standing committees assume their duties at the close of the sitting of conference at which they are elected.

31. Before any of these resolutions and laws of the Tennessee Conference can be changed or repealed, it shall require a two-thirds standing vote of the Conference body.

32. The Missionary Board shall be the Board of Managers of the Tennessee Conference.

33. It shall be the polity of the Conference that our own Conference Officials preside over the Conference Sessions.

REPORT I

CONFERENCE PRESIDENT

Report of the Conference President to the thirty-second session of the Tennessee Conference.

Greetings: God in His mercy has seen fit to allow us to gather again for a Conference Session at the end of another year of labors for Him. Whatever of success or failure may have attended our ways, it is done, and we cannot relive the years that are past. All we can do is to humbly praise Him for the successes, and to sincerely seek His mercy because of our failures.

As we close this ninth year of service to the Conference as its President, we do it with a feeling of our utter failure for Him, and of our unworthiness of the trust which the Conference has placed in us. Whatever may have been done of good has been done because of His mercy and Grace. Whatever failures have been made have come because of our ignorance and inability and not because of any intention to do wrong. I have no boasting to do, nor apologies to make, but simply leave the record in the hands of God and the Conference.

There are some things that I do know, and to which I must testify:

One- That I love God with all my heart, soul, mind and strength, and have no desires outside of His will;

Two- That I love everyone sincerely and have nothing against any man;

Three- That I love my Conference and think that I have been highly favored of God by being allowed to labor among you;

Four- That I can look you and the world in the face and honestly say that, under the circumstances, I have done the very best that I could do for the cause of God and the Conference. To Him and you we have given all of our time, all of our strength, all of our money, and all of our love. We have no regrets but would do the same if we had it to do over again.

We would like to pay tribute to those who have labored so faithfully with us this year; Our Conference Vice-President, Conference Secretary and Conference Treasurer, along with the President's Advisory Board, the Missionary Board, the Wesleyan Youth Officers, the Women's Missionary Society Officers, the Camp Meeting Board, the Pension Board, the Pastors, and that group of faithful laymen and laywomen who have upheld the work so earnestly during the past year. May God add His blessings and multiply them upon these Co-workers.

The Conference left us with four appointments unfilled. These were all made soon after Conference with the exception of Knoxville, First Church, which has remained without a Pastor during the year. We have seen that the Pulpit there was filled during the year, speaking part of the time ourselves and using various Brethren for the other services. In spite of the lack of a Shepherd, God has blessed the Church through the year.

On July 21, 1960, I appointed Earl Seibers as Supply Pastor of Hinton Street to work under the arrangement as made by the Conference.

On July 21, 1960, I appointed Claude McCabe, Conference Preacher, as Pastor at Oak Ridge.

On August 1, 1960, I appointed Douglas Heffner, Elder, as Pastor at Rockwood, his transfer having been received in proper order.

In January we helped the Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders to plan and promote the Annual Ministerial Convention. This Convention was held at Rockwood and was a good gathering.

We have held 53 Quarterly Conferences; met with various Boards and Committees numerous times; preached 274 times; made 530 visits with prayer; been in 292 other services; and have tried to assist the Churches in every way I possibly could. I have worked an average of more than 40 hours a week on Church buildings and the Camp this year, and have averaged more than 18 hours per day in the work. I have travelled 40,882 miles, of which 35,600 was in the work of the Conference. We have been outside of the Conference very little this year except on Conference business. In the office we have supervised the printing of the Conference Tidings, the Conference Minutes, the setting up and operation of the Wesleyan Ministers Insurance Plan, and the forms and information about the new Conference Pension Plan. We have also carried on a heavy correspondence about the Conference work, and have issued a number of pastoral letters during the year.

REPORT IV

TREASURER OF THE WESLEYAN MINISTERS' INSURANCE PLAN

At its Fall meeting in 1960, the Conference Missionary Board gave permission for the Conference President to work out an Insurance Plan for ministers, and to invite the brethren of the Conference to join it. After considerable study and search, a plan was formulated by The American Frontier Insurance Company, through its local representative, that seemed to meet the need for low-cost coverage, and at the same time offer something of real protection to our men. There was nothing compulsory about the plan, and no man had to join it, but 22 of the men did join it, of which 21 remain members at this time. By this plan, the ministers are covered for a specific amount, and the wives are covered for \$1000 of life insurance, and each child under 19 is covered for \$500. The coverage on the wife and children only costs \$.75 per month, while the present rate on the men is only \$.88 per thousand. Thus a man under sixty years of age may have \$3000 on himself and have his wife and children covered for the small amount of \$3.39 per month. This is the best plan and the best rate of which we have ever heard.

We now have covered:	21 ministers for a total of	\$57,000
	20 wives for a total of	20,000
	23 children for a total of	11,500

A total of \$88,500 in insurance for a total premium of \$65.16 monthly.

As of July 15, 1961, the fund stands thus:

Past due premiums from members.....	32.92
Premiums paid ahead by members.....	34.12

So it can be seen that the plan is fiscally sound only so long as the premiums are promptly paid.

We have sought to interest the churches in paying the premiums for their pastors, and believe that any church in the Conference could assume this added obligation. Certainly in case of death, it would be a great relief, not only to the family, but also to the church and Conference. We trust that the laymen will get behind this and do something about it.

The plan is open to all elders, conference preachers, and local preachers in the conference who are under sixty years of age. We do have two members who were in the original group who are over sixty, but the company asks that we limit the age now to that, and thus it pays us to get in early.

We recommend that the operation of this plan be left in the hands of the Missionary Board.

Voted not to pay Bro. Harvey anymore until we have the committee report and not to start payment until after Conference of this year.

Approved Bro. Schade writing each of the churches a letter asking for a special Easter offering for the Pension Plan.

Voted to stand by and accept Bro. Denton's letter to Bro. Reisdorff.

Discussion was held concerning the report of the Pension Plan Committee to the executive board of the Board of Administration.

Voted to accept Bro. Denton's letter to Bro. Sheets as our answer to the report from the Pension Plan Committee to the Executive Board of The Board of Administration.

Voted that the Conference hold its present standing concerning the Pension Plan.

Named the insurance plan that Bro. Denton set up "The Wesleyan Minister's Insurance Plan" and elected Bro. Denton treasurer.

Voted that the Conference Trustees deed the church property back to the local corporation if and when they are incorporated.

Voted for Bro. Denton to write a letter of protest to Governor Ellington about the liquor bills that are in the legislature and to send a copy of the letter to the News-Sentinel and the Knoxville Journal.

Voted to give Bro. Denton the balance of \$28.31 that was in the treasury for printing minutes.

Voted that the details of the Conference entertainment be left up to the Executive Committee.

Approved the use of Sister Katherine French as missionary speaker for Monday Night's Missionary service.

Voted for Conference President to draw up a statement of our position of T. V. and make it a table to parents and papers of out state.

Voted that the board go on record favoring starting a school for our children.

May 26, 1961. Business by mail. Voted that we take the difference between what we received from the churches on Bro. Stephens moving bill and the disbursements out of the money from the Elizabethton money and put it back in the Conference Fund.

Elected a Committee of Bro. Charles Haire, Chairman, Bro. Thomas Hampton and Carl Johnson to study the conference finances and to bring in report with suggestions.

Voted that the Conference President work out the askings of each church for Conference entertainment on the same basis as last year.

Voted for Bro. Dennis Barbour to visit our Conference and encourage the prayer meetings and prayer bands, and to hold Rallies in the different districts of the Conference. His expense would be met from the offerings from the rallies.

Authorized the using of some of the Elizabethton money to pay the mortgage on the Temple Church until it can be replaced.

June 7, 1961. The Executive Committee met and discussed the situation at the Archwood Church.

Discussed the situation at the Corinth Church and asked Bro. Denton to write the Building Supply Co. about the unauthorized indebtedness and for Bro. Denton to write the pastor of the Corinth Church suggesting that he get rid of the pipe organ that was given to the church.

Agreed to put \$10,000 worth of insurance of the Conference President's Parsonage with Brotherhood Mutual.

Advised Bro. Schade as to the handling of certain Pension Fund money.

July 15, 1961. Missionary Board met, approved the transaction of the Executive Committee.

We recommend to the annual Conference that there be a separate Conference Treasurer, separate General Treasurer, separate Pension Fund Treasurer, separate Pioneer Pardon Fund Treasurer, different from the Camp Meeting Treasurer.
