Standing Rules

I. CONFERENCE OFFICERS—Resolved, that the officers be installed during Conference, at a public service announced in advance, office to take effect at the rise of Conference.

II. CONFERENCE PRESIDENT—Resolved: (1) That the Conference President be appointed, authorized and required to travel the Conference as President, having general supervision of the spiritual interests and benevolences thereof, holding at least one service at each church during the year under such date as he may announce in advance.

(2) That he shall raise funds to meet the demands of the Conference work, assisted by the pastors, and he shall receive contributions for Missions, Education, and Superannuated Ministers where there are no pastors.

(3) That he shall have general supervision of the church property, and shall inquire into the titles of the same, to see that no property is loosely held, and shall look after the rental of Conference property and see that the rent is turned into the treasury and he shall investigate the possibility and feasibility of the sale of property not in use.

(4) That he shall be authorized to grant letters to disband classes.

(5) That he shall be required to write non-resident members of the Conference asking them in case they cannot attend, to write the Conference a letter of greeting, stating the condition of their religious experience.

(6) That he shall devote as much time as possible and as occasion may afford in evangelistic and other meetings in the Conference.

(7) That he may engage help from time to time, as may be advisable and who he may consider properly qualified to assist in holding Evangelistic and Quarterly meetings, such help to be remunerated from the Church Extension Fund.

(8) That he shall be paid from the Conference President's Salary Budget the sum of seventy dollars (\$70.) per week for his services, the same to begin the first Sunday following the rise of the next Conference, and to continue through the second Sunday following the rise of the next Conference, the same to be paid monthly in advance; he shall also be paid official expenses, including secretarial help up to ten dollars (\$10) per week, and he shall be paid rent as adjusted by the Conference Board of Trustees, and he shall be paid five dollars (\$5) per week for utilities.

(9) That he shall act, or appoint to act, as Fraternal Delegate to all denominational or inter-denominational bodies, as he deems advisable.

III. CONFERENCE TRUSTEES—Resolved: (1) That the Board of Trustees shall consist of nine members, three to be elected, each for a term of three years, and each to reside within the bounds of the Conference.

(2) That the duly elected and qualified Trustees of the Annual Conference are hereby authorized and directed to sign for the purchase, sale, mortgaging and conveyance of real estate recommended by the Conference Missionary Board during the interim between the meetings of the Annual Conference, and all such action or actions shall be deemed to be legal and binding upon the Conference, and of as full force and effect as they would have been if such actions on the part of the Trustees had been specially authorized by the Annual Conference.

(3) That the President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall be authorized to sign on behalf of the Board of Trustees, such signatures to be valid and binding as if all members of the Board of Trustees had signed said papers.

IV. MISSIONARY BOARD—Resolved: (1) That the Conference Board of Trustees, and the President of the Conference Women's Missionary Society constitute the Missionary Board.

(2) That the Missionary Board is hereby authorized to pay out all monies from the Church Extension Fund.

V. COMMITTEE ON CHURCH AND PARSONAGE BUILDING AND LOCATION—Resolved: That the Conference Board of Trustees shall constitute the Committee on Church and Parsonage Building and Location.

VI. CAMP MEETING BOARD—Resolved: (1) That the Conference President, and the Conference Wesleyan Youth President be members ex-officio.

(2) That the Board be constituted of a total of ten members, elected by ballot for a term of three years each.

(3) That the Camp Ground Property shall be under the care of the Camp Meeting Board.

(4) That this Board shall have the power to engage workers beyond the present year.

(5) That this Board, together with the Conference Secretary, constitute the Orders Of The Day Committee.

(6) That all pledges and cash received during the sessions of Conference and Camp Meeting be placed in the Camp Meeting Fund unless otherwise designated.

(7) That the incidental expenses of the Annual Conference, while in session, be paid from the Camp Meeting Fund.

VII. COMMITTEE ON STATISTICS—Resolved: That a standing Committee on Statistics be elected, consisting of the Statistical Secretary and three other ministerial members. That three lay members be elected at the opening of Conference.

VIII. FINANCIAL SECRETARY—Resolved: That the Conference shall elect a Financial Secretary for the Conference year, whose duty it shall be to study finances and bring recommendations to the Committee on Finance at the next Annual Conference, of which committee he shall be first member. He shall also require the various treasurers of the conference to secure a competent auditor and submit a "Certificate of Audit" and the qualifications of the auditor to them. He shall give a "Report of the Auditors" to the Conference.

IX. BUDGET ITEMS—Resolved: That all Treasurers shall mark receipts "Budget" or "Not Budget."

X. LOCAL CHURCH FISCAL YEAR—Resolved: That each local church of our Conference close their books June 30.

XI. CONFERENCE FISCAL YEAR—Resolved: That the Conference Fiscal Year close July 15th: that all money shall be in the hands of the proper Treasurers on or before that date; that within seven days thereafter each pastor shall submit to the Conference Treasurer his budget check sheet, with receipts covering the same, and his statistical blank, completed in full, except for the budget raised; that the Conference Treasurer shall fill in budget raised items and hold reports for the Statistical Committee the first day of Conference.

XII. CONFERENCE DATE—Resolved: That Camp Meeting begin the first Sunday of August and continue through the second Sunday. That Conference begin the following Monday and conclude Wednesday.

XIII. SUNDAY SCHOOL—Resolved: That Sunday School shall be held each Sunday of Conference and Camp Meeting.

XIV. LEAVE—Resolved: That no member shall leave the Conference Session without the permission of the President.

XV. COMMITTEE REPORTS—Resolved: That all reports of Committees be made in writing, complete and ready for the printer, and handed to the Secretary at the earliest possible date after such report has been made.

XVI. PASTORAL REPORT—Resolved: (1) That each ministerial member of our Conference report to his Quarterly and Annual Conference the

number of sermons preached, prayer meetings attended, homes visited and pastoral calls made.

(2) That each Sunday School under pastoral oversight of Wesleyan Methodist pastors shall be included in a separate Statistical Report.

XVII. CONFERENCE PREACHER'S REPORT—Resolved: That all Conference Preachers not stationed by the Pastoral Relations Committee shall report to the Chairman of the Committee on Itineracy and Elder's Orders within the thirty day period ending the first day of the Annual Conference Session.

XVIII. CREDENTIALS—Resolved: That each Annual Conference Preacher present his Credentials at Conference for renewal and proper signature.

XIX. TEXT BOOKS—Resolved: That all persons shall be requested to bring the text books to Conference in which they are to be examined.

XX. PASTOR'S SUPPORT DURING CONFERENCE—Resolved: That it be our plan that all pastors remain on their charges for one Sunday after Conference and that the churches financial obligation to the pastor, whether he be leaving the field or not, be extended through that Sunday.

XXI. MOVING PASTORS—Resolved: That each charge make provision for the moving expense of the incoming pastor.

XXII. MINISTER'S VACATION—Resolved: That the Conference President and all pastors be given a two weeks vacation, with pay, with one Sunday's absence from their pulpits.

XXIII. MEMBERSHIP IN SUPERANNUATED PENSION PLAN—Resolved: That all all ministers be required to join the Superannuated Pension Plan before receiving Conference appointment, unless they furnish the Superannuated Ministers Committee sufficient evidence of inability to join or participation in Social Security. That this action become a Standing Rule effective as of 1954. Ministers receiving their first appointment shall have one year in which to join either or both.

XXIV. DEATH OR ILLNESS—Resolved: That the Conference Secretary be notified by telephone in case of death or critical illness in a minister's home, and that he shall send cards at once to each pastor.

XXV. MINUTES—Resolved: That the Conference Secretary bill each church for the number of Minutes ordered by that church, and that the Conference Secretary bill the Conference Fund for those Minutes not ordered by individual churches.

XXVI. PUBLISHING OF EVANGEL—Resolved: That the Evangel be published monthly; that the Editor be also Publisher, that he be nominated by a staff composed of President of the Conference, President of the W.M.S., President of the Conference Wesleyan Youth, and the Conference Sunday School Secretary, and after being elected by the Conference, the manner of financing the publishing of the Evangel be left to the Editor and his staff.

XXVII. NOMINATING COMMITTEE—Resolved: That a Nominating Committee be elected at each Annual Conference to serve in the succeeding Conference; to consist of: Conference President, ex-officio as chairman; three elders, elected by the Conference; and three church delegates of the Conference to serve in alphabetical order of the churches. Said Committee to nominate Conference Session Committees.

XXVIII. MID-YEAR CONVENTION COMMITTEE Resolved: That the Committee on Mid-year Convention consist of three members elected for three years; one member to be elected each year. The Host pastor to be member ex-officio.

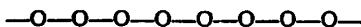

Report No. 3

President's Report

Greetings to the 105th Annual session of the Iowa Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. Your good co-operation has made this another good year. We thank God for the privilege of working together.

INTERNATIONAL HEADQUARTERS — The pastors and churches co-operated and as a result our Conference listed the highest percent of churches reporting as of June 6, 1958. Twenty-nine churches out of thirty-three reported. Our giving as of that date in cash and pledges was \$9,443.00.

CHURCH EXTENSION — Roslyn Park Church was organized with 27 members. At Cedar Rapids, Rev. and Mrs. Hubby opened services in their home until the new Church-Parsonage unit was completed. The new unit was dedicated June 22. Now they are carrying on in the new building. The new Sunday School was started at Cedar Rapids in June.

CHURCH AND PARSONAGE BUILDING — Beside the Cedar Rapids church and parsonage, Oskaloosa finished their church-parsonage unit this year. It was dedicated April 20th. The new addition to Independence Church was consecrated October 20th. The new Church at Fayette was consecrated October 27th. West Union Church built new retaining wall, driveway and steps to the parsonage. A new roof was put on the Conference kitchen. La Porte City purchased a new parsonage adjacent to the church.

The Minister's Retreat with Dr. H. K. Sheets was a time of refreshing. The church extension Sunday when pastor's changed pulpits and re-

ceived cash and pledges for Conference Missions was the best thus far. It netted in cash and pledges \$5375.96.

Sacrifice offerings for Cedar Rapids pastoral support came in during the year.

Naomi Pake toured the Conference as W.M.S. representative Oct. 17-Nov. 17.

Thanksgiving Offering for International Headquarters. Prayer week and Youth Week were observed. The Mid-year convention also entertained the area Conference Presidents who came for the Headquarters drive kick-off. Midwest youth camp with the Free Methodists Bible Crusades Little Mid-west was held at Mission Farms and Bible Crusaders Camp was held at Charles City Camp. These camps are invaluable, giving spiritual help and guidance.

Looking ahead, we face the problem of increasing our Conference Missions giving in order to maintain our new fields, to liquidate the indebtedness and to enter new fields. We face a crisis on several older church fields. They are located in strategic fields. The small congregations need to be encouraged and a way found to keep a pastor on the field. A revitalizing, spiritually, a new vision of resurrection power and the need of a Wesleyan Methodist church in these fields will help us.

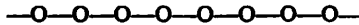

A total of \$684.68 was raised for the new international headquarter's fund through the societies.

hearing. Dr. Marilyn Birch, returned missionary to Africa, will be touring the conference October 12 through November 16th.

The Women's Missionary Society was privileged to help with the second Bible Crusaders Camp held here at the camp ground.

We have appreciated the cooperation and wise counsel of our conference president, Rev. C Budensiek throughout the year. Also that of every pastor, without your help the missionary society cannot succeed.

Report No. 13

Secretary of Evangelism Report

Several activities were undertaken by your Secretary of Evangelism in the belief that the conference assignment constituted a genuine interest in the promotion of the interest of evangelism. The earliest of these actions was a mailing made to every pastor in the fall of 1957. Included in this mailing was a brochure written by the secretary designed to stimulate our interest in evangelism. Also included was a list of persons available to the pastors of the conference for evangelistic services. A further suggestion of this fall mailing was that every pastor advise the secretary of evangelism of scheduled services. Since we know that revival is the product of prayer, it was felt that the cause of evangelism conference-wide would be aided if the prayer help of all could be secured. It was our intention to make available to the personnel of this conference a schedule of revival services so that prayer interest could be aroused. The plan failed — primarily because only five meetings were reported during the year, and some of these too late for any effective publicity to secure general prayer support. It is still the conviction of the conference secretary on evangelism that meetings duly publicized in the Evangel or through

some other way would profit from the extra prayer interest which would result.

A second major project was the mailing of a questionnaire concerning evangelistic activity within the conference. Here again the response was disappointing, with only 57% of the pastors returning their questionnaires. But the results, incomplete though they are, were interesting.

Among the 19 responding churches, 24 evangelistic meetings were held during the conference year. Ten of these were for two weeks, 7 for one week, and two for ten days. One meeting was for less than one week. Eight of the 19 churches conducted nine other special services, such as youth week observances, missionary convention, etc.

The personnel of these services was secured largely out of the conference — 15 meetings were so led, to be exact. Leadership for six came from the Iowa Conference, while persons outside the denomination accounted for leadership in 7 campaigns.

Only two of the 19 churches reported poor attendance, while four stated their attendance was the best that could be remembered, or had prevailed for some years. Also, most of the reporting churches seemed pleased with the results, although of course satisfaction could rarely be reported in this area. However, few of the nineteen — less than a half dozen, felt free to report that these services had brought real revival.

Herein lies the challenge of evangelism. When we consider the great expenditure of time, effort, and money in the cause of evangelism, it is regrettable we should achieve so little. It would seem fitting that we officially adopt some method of united prayer for the evangelistic efforts within our conference.

Child Evangelism Report

This is the first year that we have been able to organize even to a limited extent the various phases of the work of Child Evangelism. For what may have been accomplished we are thankful and give God praise, for what remains yet to be done, we seek God's help.

In October of this year, we attended the National Wesleyan Sunday School Convention and the National Sunday School Association Convention

at Grand Rapids, Michigan, which proved very helpful in our work through the year. Thank you for making possible this privilege.

In December we spoke in the 5 district Sunday School rallies in Iowa on the subjects of Teacher Training and Child Evangelism.

Throughout the year we have endeavored to contact and challenge the churches to seek the interest of the children in their local communities by Bible Crusader Clubs, Camp, Children's Church, Released time classes and Bible Schools.

Twelve churches named a local Child Evangelism Director with 9 of those reporting to me regularly. I, in turn, have sent the statistics which I have compiled quarterly to Miss Mary Bennett, Director of Child Evangelism.

We were privileged in both camps to have a fine corps of consecrated workers whose compensation for their many labors was to hear the testimonies of the many children who received definite spiritual help.

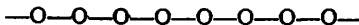

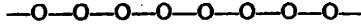

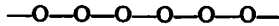

REPORT NO. 16

We, the Committee on Plan of Work, submit the following report:

1. Home Work

We recommend:

1. That each society contribute liberally to the General Home Fund and Church Extension work through the Home Mission Department.
2. That an offering of five dollars be sent to Hepzibah Orphanage.
3. That local societies inquire into the needs of the home mission stations and orphanages before sending used clothing and that no monetary value be placed on same; that such boxes of new merchandise be reported as to monetary value and that sending society evaluate the same, the voucher evaluation signed by the missionary be forwarded to Conference Woman's Missionary Society Treasurer for proper receipting.
4. That each local society promote the card call plan and thus assist in the general extension program of the church and receipts be sent to the Conference W.M.S. Treasurer.
5. That a public program for Educational Harvest Day be held in October with divided offering for Education Budget and the Harvest Day

project which is non-budget. The harvest Day project is equipping the new Home Economics department.

6. That each society participate in the Miltonvale College honorary enrollment which will supply equipment for the Home Economics department.
7. That an offering be received for Australia to be applied on budget.

2. Foreign Work

We recommend:

1. That we continue to cooperate with the Foreign Missionary Department in support of its entire foreign missionary program.
2. That each society send an offering for field support of Alma Aldinger which will apply on Foreign Missions Budget.
3. That each society send an offering for the support of medical missions which will apply on Foreign Missions Budget. Also contribute \$3.00 or more for medical student fund not to apply on budget.
4. That each society have a Men and Missions service in November besides the regular meeting, with the goals of (a) increasing honorary membership by gaining each man of the church as a member, (b) sending the offering to the conference missionary treasurer to apply on Foreign Budget.

3. Local Society

We recommend:

1. That the local president present the plan of work and read the efficiency standard to the society at the September meeting.
2. That each local society: (a) send \$1.00 to the conference missionary treasurer for the upkeep of the dining hall; (b) each active member be assessed 25c for kitchen improvement.
3. That two report blanks be sent to each society to be carefully filled out. One of the reports is to be sent to the Chairman of the Statistical committee along with the delegates' credentials by July 15.
4. That we emphasize the work of the Y.M.W.B. and that report be brought to the local Women's Missionary Society two times a year, that we encourage the use of the Y.M.W.B. reading course.
5. That we: (a) promote the reading course
(b) urge the use of the Study Book
(c) follow the program calendar
(d) be guided by the treasurer's guide
(e) encourage Scripture memorization
6. That each local solicitor continue to fill out the Wesleyan Missionary subscription report blanks quarterly and send to the conference solicitor, Mrs. Hazel Calhoun, 1004 S. 18th Street, Oskaloosa, Iowa.

4. Devotional

We recommend:

1. That we carefully observe the monthly prayer requests in the Wesleyan Missionary Magazine and other special requests presented.
2. The observance of the monthly Fast and Prayer Day.
3. That the April self denial month be observed with offering to be sent to the conference W.M.S. treasurer and said money to be used as directed at that time.
4. That stress be placed on personal evangelism and women of our community to Christ and to our Society.
5. That we pray for the opening of a Wesleyan Methodist work in Alaska which is now under consideration by the Commission on Home Missions.
6. That the Women's World Fellowship Day of Prayer be observed individually each Tuesday by every member.

We recommend:

1. That the Efficiency Standard be read in the society the first monthly meeting after conference (5% credit) and that arrangements be made with the pastor for one missionary prayer meeting each month (5% credit).
2. That a minimum of ten meetings be held during the year at which time prayer requests are presented and remembered and business transacted (5% credit) and at least one public meeting (5% credit).
3. We recommend the formation of one or more prayer partner circles in each society with a prayer partner secretary, who shall report the names of same to Conference Prayer Partner Secretary, within sixty days after the sitting of Annual Conference.
4. That the President, Secretary, Treasurer and the equivalent of seventy-five percent of active membership be subscribers to the Wesleyan Missionary.
5. That a solicitor be elected for the Wesleyan Missionary gaining not less than two subscriptions a year.
6. That a delegate be elected to the Annual Conference Women's Missionary Society and that she be instructed by local society regarding the amount to be pledged by that society at the Annual Session (5% credit) and that the president attend the Annual Conference Session (5% credit).
7. That the dues per member be sent directly to the Conference Treasurer at least quarterly (5% credit).
8. That we secure every woman in the Church as a member of the Society or achieve a ten per cent gain in total membership.
9. That each local society pay annually an amount equal to 25c per active member to be used as a General Administrative Fund not to apply on budget.
10. That the local Y.M.W.B. Superintendent be seated in the annual session and be granted the privilege of speaking, and provision be made by her society for such representation.
