Standing Rules

CONFERENCE OFFICERS-Resolved: that the officers be installed during Conference, at a public service announced in advance; office to take effect at the rise of Conference.

CONFERENCE PRESIDENT-Resolved: (1) That the Conference President be appointed, authorized and required to travel the Conference as President, having general supervision of the spiritual interests and benevolences thereof, holding at least one service at each church during the year under such date as he may announce in advance.

That he shall raise funds to meet the demands of the Conference work, (2)assisted by the pastors, and he shall receive contributions for Missions, Education,

and Superannuated Ministers where there are no pastors.

(3) That he shall have general supervision of the church property, and shall inquire into the titles of the same, to see that no property is loosely held, and shall look after the rental of Conference property and see that the rent is turned into the treasury and he shall investigate the possibility and feasibility of the

sale of property not in use.

(4) That he shall be authorized to grant letters to disband classes

(5) That he shall be required to write non-resident members of the Conference asking them in case they cannot attend to write the Conference a letter of greeting, stating the condition of their religious experience.

(6) That he shall devote as much time as possible and as occasion may af-

ford in evangelistic and other meetings in the Conference.

(7) That he may engage help from time to time, as may be advisable and who he may consider properly qualified to assist in holding Evangelistic and Quarterly meetings, such help to be remunerated from the Church Extension Fund.

(8) That he shall be paid from the Conference President's Salary Budget the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) per week for his services, the same to begin the first Sunday following the rise of Conference, and to continue through the second Sunday following the rise of the next Conference, the same to be paid monthly in advance; he shall also be paid official expenses, including secretarial help up to ten dollars (\$10) per week and he shall be paid five dollars (\$5) per week for utilities and his premium on the Conference approved minister's health week for utilities, and his premium on the Conference approved minister's health insurance policy shall also be paid. He shall also be paid five cents (5c) per mile car travel expense and be provided a Conference Parsonage.

(9) That he shall act, or appoint to act, as Fraternal Delegate to all denominational or inter-denominational bodies as he deems advisable.

CONFERENCE TRUSTEES-Resolved: (1) That the Board of Trustees shall consist of nine members, three to be elected each for a term of three years

and each to reside within the bounds of the Conference.

(2) That the duly elected and qualified Trustees of the Annual Conference are hereby authorized and directed to sign for the purchase, sale, mortgaging and conveyance of real estate recommended by the Conference Board of Church Extension and Evangelism during the interim between the meetings of the Annual Conference, and all such action or actions shall be deemed to be legal and binding upon the Conference, and of as full force and effect as they would have been if such actions on the part of the Trustees had been specially authorized by the Annual Conference.

(3) That the President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall be authorized to sign on behalf of the Board of Trustees, such signatures to be valid and binding as if all members of the Board of Trustees had signed said paners

BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION AND EVANGELISM-Resolved: (1) That the Conference Board of Trustees and the President of the Conference Woman's Missionary Society constitute the Board of Church Extension and Evangelism of the Conference.

(2) That the Board of Church Extension and Evangelism is hereby authorized to pay out all monies from the Conference Church Extension Fund.

(3) That the Conference Board of Church Extension and Evangelism be the Board of Managers for the Conference in the interim of the Conference sessions.

V. COMMITTEE ON CHURCH AND PARSONAGE BUILDING ALTER-

ATION AND REMODELING-Resolved: That the Conference Board of Trustees shall constitute the Committee on Church and Parsonage Building, Location, Alteration and Remodeling.

VI. CAMP MEETING BOARD—Resolved: (1) That the Camp Meeting Board be constituted of a total of nine members, consisting of the Conference President, Conference Wesleyan Youth President, Charles City pastor, three Elders and three laymen. One Elder and one layman shall be elected by ballot each year for a term of three years.

(2) That the camp ground property shall be under the care of the Camp

Meeting Board.
(3) That this Board shall have the power to engage workers beyond the present year.

(4) That this Board, together with the Conference Secretary, constitute

- the Orders of the Day Committee.

 (5) That all pledges and cash received during the sessions of Conference and Camp Meeting be placed in the Camp Meeting Fund unless otherwise designated.
- (6) That the incidental expenses of the Annual Conference, while in session, be paid from the Camp Meeting Fund.

VII. COMMITTEE ON STATISTICS AND CREDENTIALS—Resolved: (1) That a standing Committee on Statistics be elected, consisting of the Statistical Secretary and three other ministerial members. That three lay members be elected at the opening of Conference.

(2) That there be a standing Committee on Credentials whose duty it shall be to send each pastor, Sunday School Report blanks, Character blanks and Delegates blanks. The Delegate Credentials shall be returned to him one week prior to the opening of the Annual Conference. The Statistical Secretary shall be the Committee on Credentials.

FINANCIAL SECRETARY-Resolved: That the Conference shall elect a Financial Secretary for the Conference year, whose duty it shall be to study finances and bring recommendations to the Committee on Finance at the next Annual Conference, of which Committee he shall be first member. He shall also require the various treasurers of the Conference to secure a competent auditor and submit a certificate of audit to him. He shall give a report of the auditors to the Conference.

IX. BUDGET ITEMS—Resolved: That all Treasurers shall mark receipts "Budget" or "Not Budget."

X. LOCAL CHURCH YEAR-Resolved: That all local churches close their books on June 30. That all statistics be figured through this date and that local church officers take office July 1.

XI. CONFERENCE FISCAL YEAR-Resolved: That the Conference Fiscal Year close July 15, and that all money shall be in the hands of the proper Treasurers on or before that date; that within seven (7) days thereafter each pastor shall submit to the Conference Treasurer his budget check sheet, with receipts covering the same, and his statistical blank, completed in full, except for the budget raised; that the Conference Treasurer shall fill in the budget raised items and hold reports for the Statistical Committee the first day of Conference.

XII. CONFERENCE DATE—Resolved: That Camp Meeting begin the first Sunday of August and continue through the second Sunday. That Conference begin the following Monday and conclude Wednesday.

XIII. SUNDAY SCHOOL-Resolved: That Sunday School be held each Sunday of Conference and Camp Meeting under the direction of the Sunday School Board. That the Sunday School Secretary be responsible to report to the Annual Conference. That the C.Y.C. Director be a member of the Sunday School Board.

XIV. LEAVE-Resolved: That no member shall leave the Conference session without permission of the President.

XV. COMMITTEE REPORTS-Resolved: That all reports of Committees be made in legible writing, and handed to the Secretary at the time of giving of the report.

XVI. PASTORAL REPORT—Resolved: (1) That each ministerial member of our Conference report to his Quarterly Conference the number of sermons preached, prayer meetings attended, homes visited and pastoral calls made.

JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

The one-hundred-thirteenth session of the Iowa Annual Conference was called to order on the camp grounds at Charles City, Iowa, Monday, August 15, 1966 at 8:30 a.m. by the President, Rev. Donald D. Calhoun.

OPENING PRAYER was offered by the Conference President, Rev. Donald D. Calhoun.

OPENING SONG — Rev. Richard L. Jamieson was asked to lead the body in an opening song. He led in singing "A Charge To Keep I Have."

PRAYER — Rev. Albert R. Fookes, Conference Vice President, was asked to lead in prayer, especially for God's blessing in our conference business, and upon the one who was to bring the Conference Sermon, and upon the communion service.

CONFERENCE SERMON — Rev. Donald D. Calhoun, Conference President, presented Rev. Kenneth G. Rumppe who delivered the Conference Sermon. To begin with Rev. Rumppe spoke to the point of some questions with which he had had to come to grips in his ministry. How should God's property be cared for? Can God be glorified, and the church deserve the respect of the community as ours is cared for? How long has it been since you have studied your Discipline? Here can be found guide-lines for personal standards, duties to new converts and new members. He drew attention to the fact that there is a difference between destructive and constructive criticism. He read from Galatians chapter 6, and pointed out that we should cultivate a proper attitude toward the erring, and exercise proper care lest we err. He asked, Will your life and ministry stand observation? He exhorted to real prayer. He asked how we testify. Do we testify generally, or to definite experience? He exhorted to an infilling with the Holy Spirit, He stated that we will either keep the blessing of God, or there is no use keeping on. He challenged us with the fact that opportunities are as great as ever, but to make the best of them we need God's best. He stated that every boy and girl in our church ought to have the privilege of seeing in his own church the Holy Spirit come when they can say "This is it."

Yorton Clark, Rev. Stanley D. Gravett, Rev. Richard Stoneberg, Rev. Ola D. Campbell, Rev. Albert R. Fookes offered the prayer of consecration of the elements. The elements were distributed, and partaken together as a group. Howard Yarrington offered the closing prayer.

CONFERENCE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the 113th session of the Iowa Annual Conference: Greetings in the name of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ! I give witness today of His saving and sanctifying power.

Each conference year seems to have its peculiar problems and changes, but how grateful I am that we are serving one who is the same yesterday, today and forever.

In this report I would like to give a view of the conference work under

several various headings.

SPIRITUAL TREND

The revival meeting emphasis and evangelistic outreach of our churches has been most encouraging. I am confident that without exception, as a conference, we are presenting the message of salvation through the blood of Christ and the message of heart purity by the infilling of the Holy Spirit from our pulpits.

There does appear, however, to be a gap between our message and the actual reaching of the souls who are living in sin. Let us hold fast our doctrine, but let us also pray that the Holy Spirit will give us direction as to how to im-

plement our message.

PIONEER PROJECTS

Soon after conference last year, Rev. and Mrs. Albert Fookes moved to Burnsville, Minnesota and started services in the Vista View Elementary School. A number of new people have already been contacted through this new project. A lovely parsonage property has been purchased. We are continuing our investigation of various lands in an endeavor to find a piece of property suitable for a church building.

Mrs. Fookes has worked during the year to assist with the family support. We thank God for the sacrificial labors of our dedicated pastors.

Another step of progress was taken last year in our church extension program by the St. Paul Minnehaha Church assuming self-support. At the present time, Burnsville, Sioux City, and Waseca are the only new works receiving

conference subsistance.

The Conference Church Extension Board has designated Marshalltown, Iowa as the project for the 1966-67 year. A parsonage and five extra lots have already been purchased in preparation for this project. It is our plan to send a pastor to this new field following this conference session. The continued and increasing support of all of our conference people has made the plans for this new project possible. The Marshalltown project so closely following the Burnsville project is a tremendous step of faith, but we are confident that we can accept the challenge.

BUILDING PROJECTS

The following building projects have been completed during the last year: Waite Park, a beautiful new three-story educational unit,

Independence, a four bedroom parsonage,

Cedar Rapids, a new stone church building with wall-to-wall carpeting and air conditioning.

Albaton, an \$11,000.00 educational and fellowship building dedicated debt-

and Anoka, a parsonage and educational unit.

CONFERENCE FUNDS

I would like to express sincere appreciation to the Churches for their financial support in raising the conference and general budget items. In some

cases this has been accomplished by real sacrifice on the part of the local Church.

The conference funds are in good financial condition.

The Conference Revolving Fund now stands at \$45,717.40, an all time high. Of this amount, \$10,690.30 is invested in Wesleyan Investment Foundation for reserve funds and \$24,724.82 is loaned to church extension projects. The balance is on hand to be loaned for present church extension works. The additional control of the standard of tional loans this past year reflect the desire of our people to have their money used for church extension work.

MARENGO CHURCH

For several years our conference has endeavored to renew the Marengo church work without success. No services have been held at the church for the last two years, therefore, it is my recommendation that the Marengo Church be declared disbanded and the property disposed of by the conference trustees.

PASTORAL SHORTAGE

The shortage of pastors which has long affected other denominations is now affecting our Wesleyan Methodist Conferences as well. In our own conference some of the shortage has been precipitated by our energetic church extension program. We have used a large number of our own experienced pastors in the pioneer works of our conference. Of course, we would not want to curb our church extension work, therefore, it may be necessary for us to merge smaller churches in some cases and to provide circuits in other cases to make the best use of the valuable time of our men called of God to preach the gospel.

We recommend:

1. That all orders on the treasuries of conference funds, except those authorized by the conference body, must be authorized by the Conference President, and paid by the Conference Treasurer from the general funds, upon receiving said authorization.

2. That the Conference Treasurer send a trial balance to the Conference

President each month.

3. That the goal for Church Extension and Evangelism be \$12,500,00. with the suggestion that each individual church have a goal of 3%, or more, of their total raised for all purposes as reported in this year's Minutes.

4. That each organization contemplating a change in financial policy, check with the Financial Secretary before bringing their report to the confer-

ence.

5. That the Conference President's Salary Budget item be changed from

\$3.50 to \$4.00.

That Standing Rule II, division (8) be changed to read as follows: "That he shall be paid from the Conference President's Salary Budget the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) per week for his services, the same to begin the first Sunday following the rise of conference, and to continue through the second Sunday following the rise of the next Conference, the same to be paid monthly in advance; he shall also be paid official expenses, including secretarial help up to ten dollars (\$10) per week, and he shall be paid five dollars (\$5) per week for utilities, and his premium on the conference approved minister's health insurance policy shall also be paid. He shall also be paid five cents (5c) per mile car travel expense and be provided a conference parsonage.

7. We recommend that each church at the first meeting of the financial board following the annual conference seek to analyze the financial agreement with the pastor. We further recommend a minimum salary of \$70.00 per week, the payment of hospital insurance premium, social security, parsonage and utilities or the equivalent. Realizing the necessity of a higher standard of living, being pressed upon our ministers, and in order that we may retain and attract a high standard of ministers in our churches, we strongly recommend the imple-

mentation of this recommendation.

8. We recommend that the churches which have failed to pay their Superannuated Pension Plan budget assigned for the conference year 1965-66, be billed for the unpaid balance by the Conference Secretary Treasurer of the Superannuated Pension Plan, to be paid no later than November 1, 1966.

9. That each minister and delegate emphasize to their congregations the importance of paying in full their Conference and Denominational budgets.
