# JOURNAL OF DAILY PROCEEDINGS

The Kansas Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America assembled for the seventy-seventh annual session in the Conference Tabernacle at Miltonvale, Kansas, at 10:00 a. m., Tuesday, July 29th, 1947, with the President, the Rev. W. A. Smith in the Chair.

The devotional hour was opened by Mrs. Luella Lloyd leading in singing. We were conscious of the gracious presence of God as the Rev. E. A. Coates led devotions reading from 1 Peter 4:8, 9 emphasizing the truth, "having fervent charity among yourselves."

Seating of Delegates-elect—The Nominating Committee presented the

names of sixty-three Delegates-elect, their credentials having been duly examined. The Delegates were seated. See roll.

The roll was called with forty-five Elders and forty-three Delegates

answering present.

Conference Bar-By vote the platform and the first ten seats in the

two center sections were made the Conference Bar.

Credentials—M. F. Bess and J. J. Stoner were elected the Committee on Credentials. The Committee presented nine Delegates-elect. The Delegates were seated.

The following roommendations were presented by the Committee: That, Dean Watson, Mrs. Dean Watson, and Wilbur Coates be received to travel under Conference direction.

That, Raymond Edwards and Donald Edwards be received to study

preparatory to travel under Conference direction.

The recommendations were referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

By letters of transfer from the Indiana Conference, Stanley Banker and Meredith Turner were received as Conference Preachers and referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders for continuation in the Course of Study.

The credentials of Charles Wilson, Elder in the Ohio Conference, were

accepted.

Orders of the Day-The report of the Committee on Orders of the Day was adopted.

Recessed on motion. Benediction by E. J. Carry.

#### Tuesday Afternoon

The Conference was called to order by the President. Alice Boyd led in singing. Brother M. F. Bess led in prayer.

Credentials-The Committee on Credentials presented the name of

one Delegate-elect. The Delegate was seated.

#### CONFERENCE TRUSTEE'S REPORT

#### Official Acts

The parsonage in Overland, Mo., was sold, and a better one, more favorably situated for the church needs was purchased. The parsonage at Langley, Kansas, was sold for \$250.00 after a prolonged effort to get more for it. Last year the church building in Formoso was moved to Mankato, Kansas. This year the lots in Formoso, where the church had stood were sold for \$30.00. The half block or more where the parsonage in Formoso stood is for sale at \$100.00, but an offer of \$50.00 is the best we have yet had for these lots.

A committee of the board went to Leavenworth, Kansas, Overland, Mo., and to Manhattan, Kansas, to approve or disapprove building activities in those places. Two trips were made to Manhattan, a College town, which is considered a strategic point for a good church. Approval was given July 8 for construction of a new church building there.

In August, 1945, a short time before his death, the late J. M. Beecher, of Concordia, Kansas, gave the Kansas Conference a gift of \$1500.00 to be used in building a gymnasium. That money has been turned over to the present building committee, and is now being used for construction work. This is an excellent way for any Christian to invest some of his surplus money in the lives of our Christian young people.

### REPORT OF THE MORAL REFORM COMMITTEE

Reform! To change for the better; to free from evils or abuses. Moral! Conformed to right conduct, ethics. Those reading these lines will doubtless need them least. But so it was in the days of Noah's appeal, and again when the prophet Isaiah sounded forth the blest announcement:

"They that be of thee shall build the old waste places. Thou shalt be called the repairer of the breach, the restorer of paths to dwell in."

We do not interpret this strong appeal to hark back to a fossilized state of mind, it is as sad to be petrified and shorn of life as to be clothed upon with the trappings of the world. We do sense the heart-throb of the prophet to mean a positive, activated state of heart and mind consumed with jealousy for the name of God. His honor is ever before the eyes of such an one, and for the same that soul goes on record as a cross current to modern trends of loose thinking, pagan practices, and a corrupt conduct.

In the face of dire necessity, which this age imposes, we, your committee, recommend a prayerful and constant alert toward the following:

1. Sabbath Observance:

Again we would listen to the prophet Isaiah, "If thou turn away thy foot from the sabbath, from doing thy pleasure on my holy day, and call the sabbath a delight, the holy of the Lord, honorable; and shalt honor him, not doing thine own ways, nor finding thine own pleasure, nor speaking thine own words: Then shalt thou delight thyself in the Lord; and I will cause thee to ride upon the high places of the earth." Let us as Wesleyan Methodists be worthy recipients of the promise by refraining from buying or selling, excessive visiting and labors on God's holy day.

2. Cultural Development:

"Out of the abundance of the heart the mouth speaketh." Choice of literature, choice of music, choice of friends are three elements which do much toward shaping our thinking and thus our lives. Let these be of the highest type. Let us not only display a Bible in our homes, but let it be the mainspring of a deep family devotion to the cause of righteousness.

3. Alcohol and cigarettes:

Total abstinence for the individual and total prohibition for the State is the only safe, sane and Christian policy to be followed concerning all alcoholic beverages, including beer, fermented wine and fermented cider. Let everyone read carefully and observe the admonition of Sect. 58 in our Discipline. An examination of the political parties of the present day would convince the Christian citizen that consistency would cause him to affiliate with the Prohibition Party to help it organize and grow.

Are we sufficiently alarmed that 68% of the tobacco raised is used by women, many of whom are mothers, not only of the present generation, but of the coming generations? These two demons must be banished.

4. Standard of Honor:

In a world where man's word means little let us set a standard of honor. Let our "yea" be "yea" and our "nay," "nay."

5. The Maintenance of Domestic Discipline:

"The fire shall ever be burning upon the altar, it shall never go out." Our hearts are stirred at the lack of parental training along Bible lines. Let us guard jealously our Church of tomorrow. Proper respect for holy things must begin in the home, inspired by the blessed fellowship of communion in the secret closet, the family altar and the worshiping together in the house of our God. "Honor thy father and thy mother" implies as great a responsibility today as for parent and child as when Moses received that sacred command from God's own hand.

6. Preservation of the Virtuous Standard:

"Who can find a virtuous woman? For her price is far above rubies." The true standards of virtue has never fluctuated from Solomon's time down to the present. John Ruskin so beautifully words it thus: "Home is where true woman is found; the glowworms of the night cold grass may be the fire which warms her feet—the stars may be the canopy which covers her head, but Home is where she is."

A modern writer in a current magazine sums up the plight of our present world by calling for a return to chastity, a strong realization of the sanctity of marriage and we would add a deep sense of need of a Guide and a goal for each life. May the blessed Holy Ghost be our Guide and may a race of courageous women and stalwart men marching side by side toward

a better world be our goal.

In a final analysis we would bring this thought "as becometh holiness" must be the watchword of our Church in word, thought and deed. May our ministers be fearless in heralding forth "Thus saith the Lord." May our laity be constant in heeding the precious Word "This is the way, walk ye in it."

1. Evangelistic Help. Resolved, that the Campground and Camp Meeting Committee be authorized to engage evangelistic help for the Camp Meeting as far in advance as deemed advisable.

2. Election of Conference Officers. Resolved, that the election of Con-

2. Election of Conference Officers. Resolved, that the election of Conference Officers be held the second day of Conference at 9:00 a. m.,
3. Subscription Lists. Resolved, that all subscription lists and monies raised at Conference for all purposes be put through the hands of the Treasurers of the Conference, the W. M. S., or the Camp Meeting Committee, and that said Treasurers furnish the Conference President with a copy of the subscription lists which they hold that he may furnish each pastor a list of subscriptions from his charge.

4. Sanctity of God's House. Resolved, that such work as making quilts and disposing of the same be performed in the homes of the people

and not in the houses erected for public worship.

5. Pastors' Moving Expense. Resolved, that the class hiring a minister shall within ten days after his arrival pay to him his moving expenses, this not to be applied on his salary.

6. Reporting All Offerings to Pastors. Resolved, that all monies be reported to the pastors for entry on their statistical report in order to give

due credit to the charge and to the Conference.

7. Unleavened Bread. Resolved, that it shall be the sense of this Conference that all our churches use unleavened bread in the administration of the Lord's Supper. We suggest the following recipe: one-third cup flour, one teaspoon butter (heaping), moisten with milk enough to roll. Mark in one-inch squares and bake as pie dough. The above will serve 50 people.

8. Pastor Nominates Steward. Resolved, that it be the sense of this Conference that the pastor be granted the privilege of nominating one member of the Board of Stewards from each church on his charge.

9. President's Duties. Resolved, that the Conference President shall First, travel the Conference and hold one half of the Quarterly Meetings. Second, urge the proper repair and insurance of church property. Third, call a meeting of the Board of Stewards and help arrange a work-

able financial plan for the church.

10. Vacations. Resolved, that the Conference President be granted a vacation over two Sundays, that the greater part of three weeks might be taken if desired, and that he be given two weeks' extra pay in addition to his regular salary at the time he chooses for his vacation.

Resolved, that we recommend that each charge grant their pastor a one Sunday leave of absence from his work, that the greater part of two weeks might be used for vacation and that the church give him one week's pay in addition to his regular salary at the time he may choose for vaca-

Nominating Committee. Resolved, that we elect a committee of five elders, including the President ex-officio, and three delegates-elect, from three churches designated by the Conference to: First, examine the credentials that are in the hands of the Committee at the time of its first meeting. Second, Nominate all sessional committees and be prepared to report at the first session of the Conference. Third, nominate the personnel of all Conference Boards and report at an early session of the Conference. Fourth, nominate the Committee Chairmen for next year. Fifth, nominate the District Chairmen. Sixth, nominate a minister of the Conference to preach the Conference sermon next year.

12. Theological Institute. Resolved, that the traveling expenses of the instructors to and from the Institute be paid from the Conference Fund

and also such books as may be needed.

13. Superannuate Service. Resolved, that one public service in each Annual Conference Session be set aside in honor of the Superannuated Ministers and for the purpose of creating interest in the Superannuate Fund and that it be the duty of the Superannuate Board to arrange for such a service.

14. Conference Loans. Resolved, that the Conference Treasurer shall issue no loans from any Conference monies except by sanction of the

Conference Trustees.

15. Additional Delegate. Resolved, that when more than one delegate from any one church presents credentials to this body, there shall appear in the credentials the name of the elder that entitles the church to the additional delegate.

16. Fiscal Year. Resolved, that all statistical reports must be in the hands of the Conference Treasurer at least one week before Conference. He shall forward the blanks to the Statistical Chairman who shall

be able to report at an early session of Conference.

17. Pastors Paid Through Conference. Resolved, that the church's financial obligation to the pastor, whether he be leaving the field or not, be extended throughout the Conference and Camp Meeting period.

18. Orders of the Day. Resolved, that the Camp Meeting and Camp-

ground Committee be permanently the Committee on Orders of the Day, to prepare ahead of time the Conference Program for publication in the "Visitor."

19. Camp Meeting Committee. Resolved, that the President of the W. Y. P. S. be a member ex-officio of the Camp Meeting Committee. 20. Trustees Authorized. Resolved, that all action heretofore taken by the Trustees of the Annual Conference in the interim between the meetings of such Annual Conference concerning the purchase or conveyance of real estate are hereby approved and confirmed and held to be as binding upon the Annual Conference as they would have been if such action had been specifically authorized by the Annual Conference.

Resolved, that the duly elected and qualified Trustees of the Annual Conference are hereby authorized and directed to take such necessary action as to them seem proper and expedient and to the best interest of the Annual Conference and the local churches concerning the purchase, sale, mortgaging and conveyance of real estate during the interim between the meeting of the Annual Conference and all such actions so taken by the Trustees shall be deemed to be legal and binding upon the Annual Conference and as full force and effect as they would have been if such actions on the part of the Trustees had been specifically authorized by the Annual Conference.

21. Introduction of New Business. Resolved, that all introduction of new business of such a nature as to require an election must be present-

ed not later than noon of the third day of Conference.

22. Installation of Officers. Resolved, that all Conference Officers continue in office until the close of the annual session of the Conference when there shall be an installation service held, for the installation of the Officers as are to appear in the Conference Minutes; this service to be arranged by the Pastoral Relations Committee.

23. Pastors-Released for Meetings. Resolved, that we earnestly request each of our churches to release their pastor for one meeting of three weeks' length to be held on a new field or on one of the weaker charges under the direction of the Missionary Board, and that the church

pay his salary during his absence.

24. Money to Treasurer. Resolved, that the pastors be urged to

send all remittances to the treasurer in whole dollars when possible.

25. Conveying Property. Resolved, that all instruments conveying property for church or parsonage use carry the official name of the church, Viz. "The Kansas Conference of The Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, Inc.

26. Engaging Pastors. Resolved, that charges when engaging a pastor take note of paragraphs 86 and 131 in the Discipline.

27. Calling List. Whereas, most of the friends and members of our

local churches are won through the personal contact of the pastors;

And whereas many of these friends and prospective members are lost in the changing from one pastor to another because the incoming pastor

does not know of these people nor their interest in the church;

Be it resolved, that this Conference ask each pastor to prepare a calling list of all the homes connected with the church and Sunday school, listing the relationship they hold to the church, listing their names and addresses by city, street and number. The same to be kept for his own work while on the pastorate and to be given to his successor on the field.

28. Conference and Camp Date.

Whereas, Conference by vote has directed the Committee on Resolutions to submit a plan for Conference and Camp, with a view to changing the date of the same from the month of August to the month of June, as soon as practicable, therefore, be it

Resolved, that Camp Meeting begin annually on the first Sunday of

June, and continue through the following Sunday.

That there be a session of Conference the first Monday morning of Camp week, for the purpose of electing committees, so that said com-

mittees may meet from time to time during camp week.

That Conference shall adjourn following this first session, to meet the following Monday, on which day shall be the election of officers, and the reports of officials. On Tuesday, Tuesday evening and Wednesday,

shall be business sessions, with the ordination service Wednesday afternoon. The Orders of the Day Committee shall arrange for other services, which may be held during camp week, at times not to conflict with

Evangelistic services.

This plan shall take effect in June, 1948, provided the Camp Meeting Committee shall be able to make suitable arrangements with the workers already engaged for 1948. Otherwise, it shall take effect in June, 1949, and the 1948 Conference and Camp shall be held according to Resolution 27, of the 1946 Conference Minutes: "That Conference convene at 10:00 a. m. on Tuesday nearest August First and that our Camp Meeting begin Saturday evening of the same week."

29. Order of Business. Inasmuch as it is the desire of the Conference to complete its business as soon as possible it is recommended

that the following procedure of business be followed:

First, All delegates' credentials, whether regular or alternate, which are turned in after the first seating of delegates, be turned directly to the Nominating Committee who shall examine such credentials, and report such to the Secretary who shall read the names added to the roll at the next session at which time they are automatically seated, if no objection is raised.

Second, All recommendations to study or travel be turned directly to the Assistant Secretary who shall turn them to the Committee on

Itineracy and Orders.

Third, Ministers' reports shall be given immediately after Officers' reports are given, and be continued whenever other business will permit. Fourth, The following order of business shall be followed in each

session:

a. Roll call

b. Minutes

- d. Special Committees
  - e. Standing Committees f. Sessional Committees
  - g. Unfinished business i. Ministers' Reports

Fifth, Business shall continue from 8:30 to 12 noon and from 1:30 to 4:30 each day with no adjournment for committee work, unless deemed very necessary. Ie is understood that important Committees may meet during sessions if necessary.
