Sunday, 7:30 p. m.-Evangelist George Hawthorn closed the religious services of the 107th annual session with a firey evangelistic message urging a holding to the Old Paths and Bible Standards. This service, as well as almost every other night service was graced by a good altar service.

STANDING RESOLUTIONS

1. A Committee on Auditing and Finance, consisting of three ministerial members, the Chairman being an Elder, shall be elected each year, the duties of which shall be to examine and report on the Treasurer's books and all the financial reports, except the W. M. S. and Y. M. W. B., and to be a Standing Committee to advise on financial plans.

2. All persons received into membership in the churches of our Conference excepting those whose life of Christian fidelity has been of sufficient long standing, shall be received at first as associate members only.

3. When it becomes necessary for a church to call a pastor, it shall be the duty of the calling church to make provision for the expense incurred by the pastor in removing to the new field of labor. Money raised for this purpose shall NOT be supplied on the pastor's salary. When an Elder is elected to the Conference Presidency, expenses incurred in moving to the Conference Parsonage, shall be paid from the Conference Treasury.

4. The Conference Sunday shall be the closing Sunday of the Conference year, and the out-going pastor shall be paid his salary for that Sunday by the charge he is leaving.

5. At the beginning of the Conference session the president shall appoint a Nominating Committee of not less than three members, two Elders and one layman to bring to the Conference a slate of Nominations for Committees, etc., for the Conference Temporary Organization. Delegates Credentials shall be mailed to the Secretary not later than ten days before the Convening of Conference.

6. No person shall be received into membership in Allegheny Conference until he shall have properly filled out an application blank, which application together with recommendations of his references must pass the approval of the President and his Advisory Board. Exceptions to this rule may be made by the President and his advisory Board when they deem best.

7. The pastor of any church in the Conference shall be free to hold at least one revival meeting during the year, where ever he sees fit, and it is recommended that his salary be paid him while he is absent.

8. Each pastor shall send a monthly report on the blank provided to the Conference President showing the progress and the state of the work under his care.

9. Each church may elect a nominating Committee whose duty it shall be to nominate candidates for church officers for presentation to the church at the time of the annual election of officers. Such nominations shall not exclude other nominations at the time of the business meeting.

10. Churches having business with the Conference Board of Trustees requiring a visit of that body to their church, shall be responsible for the expense attached to such calls, unless released by the board.

11. Inasmuch as trial sermons are hardly fair to the church or candidate and since the practice of having trial sermons is contrary to the usual manner of locating preachers, we recommend that no preacher shall accept any such invitation; if given. Exceptions to this rule may be granted by the Conference President upon request of any church.

12. Since considerable expense of transferring automobile title and license attends the moving of a pastor from one state to another we recommend that where possible the calling church bear this expense.

13. We recommend that all districts emphasize Sunday School activity, and that Conventions be arranged for in conjunction with the visitation of the Conference Sunday School Secretary, who shall visit one Convention of each District during the year, at Convention expense.

14. We recommend that no one be elected to Elder's Orders who does not have an abiding sense of divine call to give himself wholly to the function and ministry of an Elder in the WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH. And that no one shall be ordained to this office and work who is not applying himself wholly to this one thing in cares and studies, and clearly determining by God's grace to give himself wholly to this holy ministry, if possible, long before the appointed day of ordination, and manifesting such a determination of faithful Christian service to the church or congregation whom he was called to serve during his years of preparation, so that as much as lieth in himself, he has and will apply himself wholly to the work of the ministry, except in all cases of absolute necessity of such diversions to a legitimate avocation for livlihood which neither jeopardizes the Lord's work nor blames the ministry.

15. We recommend that each church equip its parsonage with the necessary heating and cooking equipment, because of the variation of requirements in this equipment for the individual parsonage.

16. We recommend that in election of local Church Advisory Committee each church permit the pastor to nominate the members of this committee.

17. The Conference Secretary, as Chairman, with the Conference President shall be a Standing Committee in Publications, whose duty it shall be to examine all matters pertaining to Conference printing and publication, and let contracts for same.

18. All churches shall have a systematic means of keeping records, as required by Discipline, Paragraph No. 74. The "Ideal Church Record," published by the Bethel Publishing Company, Elkhart, Indiana, is a suggested form.

19. Local church treasurers' books shall close April 30, thus making the Conference fiscal year from May 1, to April 30. All funds received after that date shall be counted in the following year. Funds will be credited on Sub-Treasurer's books if received by May 5.

To meet the requirements of Paragraph 164-4 of the Discipline regarding revision of the Roll of membership, April 30 may be considered the close of the Conference year for Statistical purpose.

20. Minister's Pocket Credentials shall be issued annually to Elders and Conference Preachers who are eligible.

21. Since the use of the wedding ring is not in accord with the standards of our church, we therefore, as a Conference, disapprove of our ministers performing or taking part in the ring ceremony.

REPORTS

Report No. 1

THE CONFERENCE PRESIDENT

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

To the members of the 107th Annual Session of the Allegheny Annual Conference, Greetings! Because of God's rich Grace and Mercy, we are again privileged to meet on these sacred grounds for the 107th Annual Session of the Allegheny Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America.

To bring you another report is a privilege. First, we wish to thank God and to praise Him—the triune God: God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit! God has helped during the past year in a marked way. At best, men can only plant and water, but it is God that gives the increase. In the last analysis, then, all of the honor and glory must go to Him. The service that men render is appreciated, but the final cause of every victory is God. We thank Him for our consecrated laymen, for our faithful preachers, for the many unusually good meetings in the various churches this conference year, for the good advancement which will be shown in some reports, made in our churches, for the new buildings He had helped us to build, for the privilege of being in a church where we can preach the true gospel without compromise, for the rising tide of evangelistic interest and for the increase of spiritual fervency in many quarters.

Once again, we are meeting in a critical period of the world's history. Every intelligent Christian recognizes that we are in a strange and challenging day. Even the Atomic Research Scientists recognize the seriousness of our day for they say, "It is four minutes to twelve midnight in the history of the world and thus the world has two or two and one half years to solve her problems." Those peaceful, slow moving days of two or three generations ago are gone for good. These are serious, crucial days in which we live. We are finding that the wisdom of men, who have failed to seek God's wisdom is not enough. As a result we must be prepared for one upheaval after another. The world has long been in a whirl of materialistic experiments because, as Israel of old, "They chose new gods, then was war in the gates." (Judges 5:6) The word "crisis" has become so common place that it has almost lost its meaning to us. Nevertheless, we are facing a world crisis. Times are more serious than we realize. As one put it, "The axe lies at the root of the American way of life." It seems as if each year brings us closer to a world-wide disaster.

Indeed, we are now confronted with the great hour of destiny in the life of the world and of the church. Old dynasties, old regimes and systems have been broken up. New ideologies have arisen with visions of world conquest. The tremendous, world-circling advance of militant Atheism in the last twenty years is shocking. If something is not done America will become a pagan land in a few years. Atheists, blood-thirsty, diabolic communism is marching onward as never before. Its strides are greater; its force mightier with every passing day. The world today is a world in which the great ideologies of the earth have come to titantic combat. The dark and devastated areas of the world comprise the very world where many people believed it could not happen. Many educators, idealists, and religioists had a firm conviction that the things which have come upon the earth with the recent years were impossible things for this earth of ours Many believed that humanitarianism and brotherhood were sufficient bulworks to protect the earth from the harvest of tragedy which has come to many lands. Men did not believe that humanity could stoop to such depths of cruelty as has been manifested by the oppressor. Nevertheless, the race of destiny is on between these ideologies and the Christian faith. All the devices and inventions of modern man have failed to meet the inner cry of the hearts of men for the soul rest and peace, which they have sought. TIME IS FAST RUNNING OUT. It is commonly agreed by most informed persons that this is a time of crisis of the most serious character. We are in the midst of the development of a craze for "Security." People want to relax, to forget their worries and to look ahead to a life time of "security"-all this in a world that never was more insecure, with its threats of war, or inflation, of atom and hydrogen bombs, of revolutionary pressures abroad and of budget troubles, of money juggling and of armament demands all pressing in. No matter how optomistic you may be in your natural makeup you will have to face the grim fact that we are confronted with a crisis: (1) in religion, (2) in morals, (3) in education, (4) in the sphere of human government, (5) in men's invention of the means of self-destruction. This harvest of tensions, unrest, discontent, and devastations that have come upon the earth has sprung from the seeds of rebellion against God and His Son Jesus Christ.

Moreover, the most tragic thing of all is that during the last few years the church world, because of worldliness, compromise and unbelief, has fallen into greater confusion than ever before in the Christian era. Millions of Americans have deserted well-known paths of church life for the extreme formalism and ritualism on the one hand and just about every conceivable form of religious absurdity on the other. This has brought about the blight of modern liberalism which has hit the schools and churches of America. Hundreds of Christian Colleges that were born in a revival atmosphere became the breeding grounds of modernism which has robbed the students of their faith. Out of these institutions have come many of the present day leaders, many of whom have been made to believe a lie in the name of scholarship, culture, progress and advanced thinking. Consequently, the miracles, the inspiration of the Holy Scriptures, the atoning merits of the shed Blood of Jesus Christ for the salvation of the world, the resurrection and the Second Coming are denied. Under this blight and in the wake of this deadly trail of apostasy, the authority of the Bible was challenged; the penknife of criticism mutilated its pages and to many the Bible became only another source book on religion. While liberal preachers were moralizing and philosophizing, spirituality waned, for they offered salvation without repentance, a Christian life without a spiritual dynamic and separation from the world. Generally speaking the Christian church in all of its branches lost the consciousness and urgency of a mission to a generation which has lost its way and which is hopelessly lost until it is brought to Christ. Thus the revival was ushered out and the dance was ushered in, in thousands of churches, the prayer meeting went out and the social club came in; prophetic preaching went out and priestly ecclesiasticism came in; the passion for the lost souls went out and complacent indifference came in and as a result a corresponding moral decline came in the life of the church and the nation. Recently, Dr. Oswald Smith, of Toronto, said, "We are living in the days of awful apostasy. In my journeys through Europe, and more recently across Canada and the United States, I have been burdened regarding the religious situation and outlook as never before. The professing church, as prophesied, is fast becoming apostate. Many are turning from the faith. This means that the entire world has now become one vast mission field!" When we stop to think seriously of the times of our day-the awful absence of godliness and the prevalence of the world, the flesh and the devil throughout the land and consider the responsibility resting upon the church and the ministry, we cannot but be saddened and stirred by the absence of the Spirit's power in our pulpits and churches. Today more Scriptureless sermons, more counterfeit Christs, more denials of His atonement are featured than ever before in our nation's existence.

Beloved the Challenge is before us. The need of this hour is for a humble, penitent return to the God of our fathers through Jesus Christ. The only way we can meet the challenge of our day is to go in for more genuine revivals, more personel work, more Pentecosts, more Holy Ghost prayer, more souls won for Christ, more Christians sanctified, more real, old-time gospel salvation with its mighty manifestations, and finally more of God on the scene. We can't meet it by following the growing tendency to cater to the public will. In these days when the churches are trying all kinds of plans, but the divine plan to produce results, it will be well for us to listen to the men of God like Paul, Luther, Wesley, Steele, etc., who through faith wrought wonders and brought to pass mighty things for God and souls. To do this we will have to take the hard road chosen by Jeremiah, Isaiah, John the Baptist, Paul and every other great leader rather than to fall into the currents of the times as so many preachers are doing and be swept along with the unthinking people to lower planes of morality. The world in Paul's day was in many respects similar to our own. It was a world of dictatorship, of foreign entanglements, of high taxes, of greed and selfishness in politics, in commerce and in industry. It was a world of pressure groups which brought about even the death of our Lord Jesus Christ-a world of insecurity and unrest. What was Paul's attitude to such a world? How did he rise to such spiritual heights in the midst of such degrading circumstances? He gives us his secret; "We look not at the things which are seen, but at the things which are not seen; for the things which are seen are temporal; but the things which are not seen are eternal". By this faith in God and by this vision of the unseen he rose above the difficulties and perplexities of life and wrought wonders for God in his day.

Brethren, it is time for the followers of God to gird themselves for the greatest and mightiest crusades of all ages. If Christianity is to endure and survive, there must be a great awakening in the Christian faith. As Wesleyan Methodists and as a Conference we need to take warning. If we keep the fire of God upon our altars, if we are true to His Word and have a message

for a sin-sick world, we shall continue to have a reason to exist. But, if we allow worldliness, compromise and unbelief to creep in and take over, and if we, as ministers, cease to be true NEW TESTAMENT prophets, we must expect to fail. God is going to have a people and a witness in these the closing days of this age. If we fail, others will take our place. BUT WE MUST NOT FAIL. We need not be afraid that if we preach with the Holy Ghost power sent down from Heaven that we will have no hearers, for a real God-sent, Spirit-anointed ministry still has a place in God's scheme of redemption. What we need to fear in this hour is an unbelieving, worldly church people, a compromising ministry and a silent heaven. The need is appalling but the divine power is unlimited; and, as preachers and laymen, we will do something about it or make a mockery of what we claim to believe or have in the way of heartfelt salvation. It has always been the fewa man, a woman, a young person, here and there-people of spiritual insight and faith, people possessed of an assurance that God was able to answer prayer and meet with His power the evil conditions of the day; these people have prayed, have wrestled with God, until spiritual revivals were born, and the tide of history has been turned. It is time to act. We cannot wait for others to lead the way. We must do something ourselves. God is still sufficient to meet the needs of this day. Let's put Him to the test

ITEM XVII CONFERENCE OBJECTIVES:

Possibilities and impossibilities will constantly face us, but let us remember the God of Israel who said unto them-"Go forward," is our God, and the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ; and He makes possible the challenge: "Is there anything too hard for me?" "Forward", then, should be our slogan for the coming Conference Year. Forward to:

1. A genuine revival in every parsonage-let the revival begin in the ministry.

2. A genuine revival in every church—as long as the church is unconcerned, the sinner will remain unmoved and untouched. There is no other program that will so vitalize the church. It is evangelize or yield to compromises of the world, chilling complaisancy and substitutes. "WIN SOULS and your auditorium will be filled. WIN SOULS and your finances will increase. WIN SOULS and your Sunday School will grow. WIN SOULS and your prayer meetings will be well attended and full of fire. WIN SOULS and your church members will forget sin and worldliness in this passionate, breathless, exciting task. WIN SOULS and the pulpit will flame with zeal for Christ. WIN SOULS and the sermons will come red-hot from the throne of God. WIN SOULS and the community, the city, the country will be constrained to turn aside to see this wondrous sight of a church aflame for the Lord, yet unconsumed." 3. A greater missionary interest-more sacrificial giving beyond the budget and more interest in the regions foreign to us. "The Greatest Tragedy of 1949 was the failure to send to Japan the requested number of missionaries and New Testaments asked for by General MacArthur."

4. An organized, spiritual, and active youth society in every church.

5. A determined effort to increase our church membership without compromising our standards—not a single church reporting a net loss of membership at the next Annual Conference.

6. A greater Pioneer effort-at least one new Sunday School, prayer meeting or Bible Study group started in a new community in every district in the Conference-this outside of the regular work of the Pioneer Secretary. Where will that be in your district?

7. A greater periodical increase including the CONFERENCE MES-SENGER.

8. A greater personal piety through more and better Bible Study and a deeper prayer life. Aim to pray clear through daily. Without doubt most of the shallowness of Christian experience and the feebleness of Christian service, as well as the lost art of real soul burden, is traceable to the poverty of the prayer life.

9. A special effort to reduce local indebtedness, whether church or parsonage. This is necessary while times are still good.

1. That the Conference continue a uniform time for voting on the pastor.

2. That the Conference plan to have a night and a week of prayer.

3. That the preachers of the Conference continue to hold their group prayer meetings.

4. That each church do its best to hold its own Daily Vacation Bible School.

5. That a greater stress be laid upon Child Evangelism and that each church co-operate with the conference Secretary of Child Evangelism.

6. That there be full co-operation and earnest effort to reach every one of the "Mid-Century Goals" as outlined by our Denominational President, Dr. Roy S. Nicholson.

7. That we get behind the New Crusade launched at the Leaders' Meeting which is as follows:

(1) Recover forgotten emphasis.

(2) Revitalize man's faith in the Living God.

(3) Rekindle the fires of evangelism.

(4) Resist the drift towards Totalitarianism.

(5) Renovate the life of the community.

(6) Readjust to present conditions without compromise.

8. That each church elect a local Secretary for the Burial Association, whose duties shall be to promote its interest and membership. This is a department of work of our church and deserves our loyal support.

CONCLUSION:

As we bring this report to a close we wish to thank each one for his splendid co-operation, for the many who have prayed for us, for your kindness when we were in the hospital, for the offering given to help cover the hospital expense and for the way you have loyally stood back of us. We greatly appreciate this. As we enter into a new Conference Year, let us go into it with heart searching, meeting God's conditions, battle with courage and with faith in God "Who is able to do all that we ask or think, according to the power that worketh in us." Let us be determined that we are not going to be by-passed by this revival upsurge in this land. Let us make sure that our services are saturated with prayer. Let the homes where the family altar has been neglected set about to rebuild them again. Let us go into God's service with renewed courage and faith and believe for greater things than we have ever experienced in the past. Beloved, this is our hour. Let usall of us-live it as though there remained to us only sixty minutes before the coming again of our Great God and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

REPORT NO. 4.

COMMITTEE ON AUDITING AND FINANCE

Your Committee on Auditing and Finance submits the following report and recommendations:

ITEM I. WHAT SHALL THE CHURCHES PAY?

1. The following Denominational Budget items: Foreign Missions, \$2.00; Education, \$1.50; Pension, \$1.25; Home Missions, \$1.00; Hephzibah Orphanage, \$.25; Administrative Budget, \$.25; General Conference Travel and Entertainment, \$.20. (These assessments are per church member per year.)

2. Undivided Conference Budget (Conference Work) Shall be equal to ten percent of the sum obtained by adding the three following items: Pastor's salary, parsonage rent and church incidental expenses. (To be remitted monthly).

3. Conference Group Life Insurance, \$.35 per member.

4. Conference entertainment, \$.35 per member.

5. The Pioneer self-denial envelopes for remittance of \$.25 or more per month (above tithe) shall be given our continued support.

6. Promotion of the Home Missionary program shall be encouraged by subscription to the Card Call Plan among our people generally.

7. The pastor or person responsible for the sale of Conference Minutes in the local church shall remit \$.50 per copy to the Chairman of the Committee on Sale of Conference Minutes, by March 31. The Chairman of said Committee may mail statements to all who have not paid for their Minutes by March 31, thus enabling the report of the Committee to be prepared by the end of the Conference fiscal year which is April 30.

8. The above items, with the exception of Paragraphs 6 and 7, shall be sent to the District Sub-treasurers. Church treasurers are to make Monthly remittances to the credit of Undivided Budget, Conference Missions and Pioneer fund. Other items may be remitted at the discretion of the church unless otherwise specified.

9. Church Treasurer's reports to Quarterly Conference shall be made as of the close of the month preceding the Quarterly Conference. All church treasurer's records for the Annual Conference year shall close April 30. The Conference fiscal year is thus from May 1 to April 30.

ITEM II. WHAT SHALL THE SUNDAY SCHOOL PAY?

1. The first Sunday School offering of the month to Conference Missions for the use of churches not yet self-supported, etc., according to the recommendations of the Conference Mission Board.

2. Sunday School Birthday Offerings to the Conference Missions.

3. Denominational Sunday School Budget of \$.05 per Sunday School member.

4. These items to be paid to the local Church treasurer for remittance to the Sub-treasurer.

5. Remittance record blanks of Budget distribution and monthly payments are available to all pastors and church treasurers for the ensuing year. We recommend the use of these forms as an aid in the payment of a full budget on a monthly basis.

ITEM III. WHAT SHALL THE CONFERENCE TREASURER PAY?

1. To the Conference President:

A. Salary per week, \$60.00.

B. Annually, \$1,000.00 for traveling expenses incurred in the pursuit of the duties of his office. From this sum the president shall provide adequate liability insurance for his car.

C. An amount equal to his telephone bill, including all toll calls.

D. An amount equal to the cost of all miscellaneous items which relate to the duties of the president's office, such as telegrams, flowers for deceased, etc. E. The sum of \$100.00 annually for vacation purposes.

2. To Mrs. H. C. Van Wormer the sum of \$10.00 per week for secretarial servcies to the Conference President.

3. The following sums from the Conference Budget, in appreciation for service rendered: The necessary amount to bring the offering for the Secretary to \$100.00; Conference Treasurer, \$100.00; each Sub-treasurer, except West Virginia, \$50.00; West Virginia Treasurer, \$25.00; Group Insurance Secretray-Treasurer, \$25.00; Conference Pension Plan Treasurer, \$25.00; Camp Meeting Fire Marshall for services at Conference, \$10.00; Superintendent of rooms for services at Conference, \$25.00; Statitistical Chairman, \$15.00; New Aid Treasurer, \$25.00; he shall also pay the above and all other members of Conference Boards or committees an amount equal to all expenses incurred in the pursuit of their duties in connection with their respective offices, upon presentation of such expense accounts.

4. The Conference budget shall be distributed as follows for the ensuing year: Conference Budget, 75 percent; Conference Missions, 10 percent; Miscellaneous Fund, 1 Percent; Pension Plan, 9 percent; Assistance Fund, 5 percent.

5. At the request of the Conference Treasurer, we recommend that he be authorized to engage a fully accredited auditor to audit his books annually.

6. That the following petition by the Camp Board be granted: "Whereas the Annual Conference enjoys the full use of the facilities of the Camp Grounds for more than one half the amount of time they are in use by the Camp Meeting: the Camp Board on June 7, 1950, voted to request the Annual Conference, through its Finance Committee, to pay one half the cost of water installation, including the meter, and one half of the annual payment to the Boro of \$110.00 together with the assessment for water used during the annual session.

REPORT NO. 10.

THE PIONEER SECRETARY

To the 107th Annual Session of the Allegheny Annual Conference we bring greetings from the Fioneer Department!

In the May issue of the Christian Digest there appeared an article with the title, "It is later than you think." It began by saying, "We live in a frightening age. World statesmen view the future with apprehension. Men's hearts fail for fear. Confusion reigns supreme. Can this be the end?" Then it quotes Professor Harold Urey, a Nobel prize winning scientist, as saying pessimistically, "I am a frightened man myself. All the scientists I know are frightened men." Professor Montgomery, of the University of Texas, is going up and down the country lecturing, "If our children are to survive us, we've got to make this a Christian world." Against doctor's orders for his well being, he is burning up the airlanes, railroads and highways in an intensive speaking itinerary to put Mr. and Mrs. America straight on the seriousness of the present hour in world history. Another great soldier Statesman, Dwight Eisenhour, has no illusions concerning the crisis hour in which we are living, and says, "Unless there is a moral regeneration throughout the world, there is no hope for mankind. We'll all disappear in the dust of an atomic explosion." Without doubt we are living in the last days—the end time. But regardless of the future outlook as far as this present age and world is concerned, Jesus, while still on earth gave the Church of all time her orders, We are to "OCCUPY TILL HE COMES." There is to be no' let up in our activity, our work, or our labor. Paul tells us that the ONE thing that is required of a steward is that, "He be found faithful."

At the last session of the Conference Mrs. Comadoll and I were assigned to the double task of full supervision of the newly organized church at Cooperstown as well as the work of the Pioneer Department. In the work of the latter we were to open new Pioneer fields, give supervision to those already opened and also hold quarterly meetings for a number of smaller organized churches and give them what help we could. We have sought to be faithful to the work assigned us. The work of the Church at Cooperstown will be reported in the statistical blank given for that purpose. The following report deals solely with the Pioneer field.

During the first part of August we made a trip to Keyser, W. Va., to investigate the possibility of opening a work near there. We discovered that the nearest point of contact with our Conference would have been the Brownsville and the West Virginia churches, these were approximately 100 miles distant. We likewise discovered the fact that there was nothing tangible or evident to begin with. There was one man and his wife from another Holiness denomination who were in a good degree interested in the opening of a Holiness work in this place. We did greatly appreciate their fellowship and hospitality. In discussing the situation with our Conference President, it was felt inadvisable at this time to attempt opening a work there. However, later developments have kept this work under consideration.

In October we were contacted by a group known as the Primitive Wesleyan Church. They were located in the small village of Little Hope, near North East, Pa. They were desirous that we take over this work. They also had a work in Marion, Ohio. We notified the Pioneer Secretary of the Ohio Conference of the work there. We found an excellent church building in very good repair, also a very good group of people. After frankly discussing the situation with the pastors and the church, we received them into the Pioneer Department. Rev. Harry A. Stephenson was appointed as pastor and the church has been making good progress. A solid, substantial church is in the making in this place. The set valuation of the Church is \$4500.00 The deed is in the process of being transferred to the Allegheny Conference. The picture of this church appears on our Pioneer Calendar for this coming year.

In October it was our privilege to spend about two weeks in revival services with Rev. and Mrs. Paul Halman, pastors of the Lakeview Community Church, near Akron, Ohio. This church has a fine group of people in it of Wesleyan Methodist caliber. Brother and Sister Halman are Wesleyan Methodists, having their membership in the McLeister Memorial church. They need our prayers for the overcoming of some problems that at times appear insurmountable.

For the past six or seven years the little church at Soldier, Pa., has been classed as one of the Pioneer projects, but there had been no official action taken between the Church and the Conference to make it actually so. Two years ago they asked for a full time pastor. Rev. Miss Gracia Fero was given a call and accepted. Progress since that time has been slow but steady. Recently a complete understanding was reached, all questionable points were cleared up and an article of agreement was drawn up and is in the process of being signed by the Church. We have a fine group of people in this place. They have given generously and stood loyally by the Conference for a number of years. Their next step will be organization, which we trust will be soon. This project is entirely self-supporting.

The work at Isabella enjoyed a good season of Revival this year with the Pastor doing the preaching. The work here is encouraging and we anticipate a steady and solid growing in the future. Much work has been done in a material way to improve the building. They now have a very neat, attractive and comfortable place of worship.

During the year, Brother Lewis Walborn, a layman from the Sarver church, rented a church building in North Butler and started services. We have made a number of visits to this work and have given help in every way possible. Progress has been made and there is no reason why this cannot be the beginning of a Church in Butler. This little group have paid their own way from the beginning. They are working at the job and we expect continued progress.

In March of last year we organized the church at Cottage Hill, and in July they began to build their church. It is now reaching the final stages of completion. It is of cement block construction with full basement. Much credit for this building must go to the energetic and aggressive pastor, Rev. Paul Hetrick, who, with a vision, believed it could be done. He has worked long hours and sacrificed many personal desires to see this building completed. Money paid out for labor was only \$100.00. Nearby Wesleyan Churches gave help and local labor was likewise cheerfully given. Lights valued at \$450.00 were given by the President of the local bank. A 32 inch furnace, used only a short time, and as good as new, complete with blower, was purchased for \$400.00. Good discount on most materials was cheerfully given by the firms where it was purchased. Very nice oak pews to seat the entire church were providentially provided for the nominal sum of \$300.00. The lot was given. This group have worked, prayed and trusted the Lord, and they have a very attractive and substantial building. Four new members have been gained this year as well as a twenty-five percent increase in Sunday School attendance. The dedication of this church will be in the near The picture of this church will also appear on our Pioneer Calfuture. endars this year.

The tabernacle at Vanport was moved to Jamestown, Pa., and a new Pioneer venture begun. It was opened April 23rd. A two weeks revival has been held. We see no reason why this cannot be the beginning of a permanent work in this place. We have two well located lots optioned for two years at which time we can buy them. The New Castle District has voted to make this their pioneer project for the coming year. We gave what help we could in the dismantling, moving and reconstruction of the building and also in the revival which followed. Rev. R. L. Kuhn from Greenville became acquainted with the possibilities of this field and has labored diligently to see this new venture started. We look forward to victory and progress in this field.

April 16-23 we were with Brother Strait and the Robertsville folk for services. On Sunday morning, April 23rd we organized the Church at Robertsville, exactly six years from the day they held their first service. We organized the church with 18 full members and one associate, and with 126 in the Sunday School. Three years ago they built a basement church and expected to liquidate the remaining debt by conference time. The promise, "In due season we shall reap, if we faint not," has been fulfilled in this place. Mrs. Comadoll organized a Missionary Society and a Child Evangelism class during the week.

On April 30 we organized the church at Blue Eye with 13 full members. This was a Pioneer point that had progressed to the place where organization was possible, and not only possible, but needful for future progress. The growth and progress in this place has been slow. Each pastor has done hisbest, and now the organization has been completed. Rev. Harry Reid is the present pastor.

It would be unfair to close our report without giving due credit to Mrs. Comadoll for her part in the year's work. She was with me for the revival at the Lakeview Community church and for the week of services at Robertsville. When our schedule took us from home through the week she went along and assisted in the services. When I had to go for Sunday services she stayed behind and cared for the home church. Her music, singing, prayers and consistent living has meant much to the services both at home and in the field.

We also desire to express our sincere appreciation for our loyal and devoted group of workers in the Pioneer Fields. The records reveal the fact that they have indeed done "Exploits for God." We also wish to express our gratitude to the pastors and laymen of the Conference who have supported the work of this department with their money and prayers. Above all we praise God for His blessings without which all our money, plans and labors would have been in vain.

During the year we traveled 15,500 miles in pursuit of our duties, preached 114 times, conducted 47 quarterly meetings and Pioneer visitations, held one two-week revival, and one one-week revival preceding the organization of the church at Robertsville. We also preached at the Ohio Conference Young People's Convention. We have pastored the Cooperstown work also.

6. December 5, 1949: By permission of the President and the Mission Board, authorized the payment of \$50.00 per month to Harry A Stephenson.

7. February 14, 1950: Authorized payment of \$50.00 to Glen Brink for moving tabernacle from Vanport to Jamestown, Pa.

8. February 24, 1950: Authorized payment of \$20.00 to F. W. Brown for rent on two lots at Jamestown for two years.

9. April 11, 1950: Authorized Rev. Miss Gracia L. Fero to organize the group at Soldier into a regular Pioneer Organization.

10. April 23, 1950: By authorization of the President, Organized church at Robertsville, Ohio, with 18 full members and one associate.

11. April 26, 1950: Authorized payment of \$137.47 to M. Dale Andrews Lumber Co., Jamestown, Pa.

12. April 30, 1950: By authorization of the President, Organized the church at Blue Eye, Spring Creek, Pa., with 13 full members.

FINANCIAL STATEMENT

Salary, \$1,820.00; Expense allowed, \$500.00; Gifts and other remunerations, \$302.11. Total, \$2,622.11. The church at Cooperstown provided our living quarters and a part of our salary for the past year, and as a token of appreciation to the Conference for the help given them they are giving the parsonage rent free to the Pioneer Department for the coming year.

CONCLUSION: In closing we thought you might be interested in' a brief summary of the work of the Pioneer Department for the last four years. It is as follows:

1. 8 new churches organized with a total of 92 new members.

2. 8 new church buildings and 2 new parsonages with a total valuation. of \$55,750,00 and with only \$4,850.00 indebtedness.

3. During the past four years we have spent approximately one year working at manual labor, and at the same time we kept up all other work as well.

. 4. During the four years we have spent one and one-half years in charge of a pastorate, while at the same time we have carried on the Pioneer program as well. So in the four years we have actually given the Conference six and one-half years of service. The labor we have done has saved the

Conference at least \$1,000.00 and we have also returned to the Conference \$578.02 from the revivals held in Pioneer work.

5. During the four years we have traveled 76,500 miles, held 27 revivals, preached 617 times, held 112 Quarterly Meetings and Pioneer visitations, and helped in the West Virginia Camp for two years.

REPORT NO. 13.

THE SECRETARY OF CHILD EVANGELISM

The fact that there is said to be living in the United States 53,000,000 children, of which number only 16,000,000 are receiving any form of religious training, while 37,000,000 are growing up in gross ignorance, has created a challenge which the Wesleyan Methodist Church has accepted.

In June 1949, a Denominational Child Evangelism Crusade was launched to make a beginning in reaching these neglected children. In this Conference, this Spring, a questionaire was mailed to each pastor to determine what was already being done. Forty-seven pastors responded and the report is as follows: 28 churches report a weekly children's service other than Sunday School. 12 churches are interested in beginning children's work. 7 churches are not able to begin services at present.

The goal for the Denomination is 1,000 Bible Clubs in 1950. I believe with the help of the Holy Spirit, Allegheny Conference can furnish seventyfive of these groups this year where boys and girls can find Jesus.

Voted to authorize the Massillon Church to proceed with the building of a basement church at an estimated cost of \$5,000.00.

The meeting was continued at Barberton, Ohio. Here the Board was shown 8 lots bounded by 26th, 27th, and Oak Streets and approved the purchase of the same by the Barberton Church for the sum of \$3,300.00.

From Barberton the Board went to Akron, Ohio, where they met with Mr. Fred P. Wilkerson and Mr. Ord Hathway and went over plans for the remodeling of the McLeister Memorial Church. It was voted to approve these plans and to authorize the McLeister Memorial Church to proceed with the remodeling of their church at an estimated cost of \$27,981. 00.

9. September 7, 1949, by correspondence: Voted to loan the Mentcle Church \$300.00 from the Church Aid Fund for the purpose of finishing the basement.

10. September 20, 1949, by personal contact by the Chairman of the Board, Rev. H. C. Van Wormer, it was voted to instruct the Church at Cottage Hill to proceed with the building of the super-structure of their church. It was also voted to grant a loan of \$700.00 to the Cottage Hill Church to apply on their building.

11. October 12, 1949, a meeting of the Conference Board of Trustees was held in the Mechanicsburg Church. The following business was transacted:

Voted to authorize the trustees of the Mechanicsburg Church to sell their present church building.

Voted to authorize the Mechanicsburg Church to proceed with the erection of a new church building 26 feet wide and 44 feet long on their present location at a cost of \$1,350.00 with donated lumber and help.

Voted to grant the Cottage Hill Church a loan of \$600.00 to apply on their new church building. \$300.00 of which was to come from Conference Budget and \$300.00 from Church Aid Fund.

12. November 15, 1949, a meeting of the Board of Trustees was held in the Wesleyan Methodist Church at Titusville, Pa. The following business was transacted:

Voted to grant the Titusville Wesleyan Methodist Church permission to purchase property on the corner of Franklin and Spruce Streets at the sum of \$4500.00.

Motion was made and carried to authorize the church to make a loan of \$4500.00.

13. November 15, 1949, the Board of Trustees met at Boyers, Pa., with the pastor, and viewed the property of Mrs. Plummer Bell, with the purpose of purchasing said property.

Voted to grant the Annandale Wesleyan Church premission to purchase the Plummer Bell property for a parsonage.

14. December 6, 1949, by telephone and correspondence a loan of \$400.00 was approved by the Conference of installing a new heating system in their parsonage.

15. December 23, 1949, in an emergency, it was approved by telephone to loan the Vanport church \$500.00.

16. January 18, 1950, a meeting of the Conference Board of Trustees was called to be held at Grace Wesleyan Methodist Church, Akron, Ohio. Business was transacted as follows:

Voted to loan Hampe Memorial Church \$150.00, this amount to be borrowed from the McLeister Fund. It was agreed to repay this loan at \$5.00 a month.

Voted to authorize the Grace Church to purchase lots located on the corner of Eastwood and Kennebeck Avenues, for the sum of \$2200.00 providing they can secure commercial zoning and proper drainage.

17. February 3, 1950, a meeting of the Board of Trustees was held in the Smithport Wesleyan Methodist Church, at Smithport, Pa. The following business was transacted:

Voted to grant the Smithport Wesleyan Methodist Church a loan from the Conference. The amount, \$2,000.00. This is to be taken from the following funds: \$750.00 from Conference Missions, \$750.00 from the Pioneer, and \$500.00 from the Conference Budget.

Motion made to grant the church permission to secure a loan of \$1,000.00. 18. January 26, 1950, By telephone: Voted to loan the Franklin Church \$200.00 to be borrowed from the McLeister Fund, to be paid back at the rate of \$30.00 per month.

19. February 21, 1950, the Conference Board of Trustees was called to meet at Akron First Church, Akron, Ohio. The Board met in the parsonage at 317 West South Street. The following business was transacted:

Voted to grant First Church permission to purchase the property located at 1261 Diaginal Road, Akron, Ohio, for the sum of \$12,500.00.

Motion was made and carried to authorize the Church to make a loan of \$4,000.00, at the rate of 4 per cent. Conference to underwrite the note.

Motion was made and carried to authorize First Church permission to sell their present parsonage to the best advantage providing the church is agreed.

20. February 27, 1950, the Conference Board of Trustees met with the Massillon Pastor, Rev. G. E. Terpe, and his Board of Trustees at Titusville in the Conference parsonage. The following business was transacted:

Voted to authorize the Massillon Church to secure a loan of \$17,000.00.

Voted to loan Punxsutawney Church \$800.00 The sum of \$700.00 to be taken from the Church Aid, and \$100.00 from the Conference Budget.

Voted that the secretary write Earl Garvin asking him to vacate the Johnstown Parsonage by May 17, 1950.

21. May 11, 1950, Voted to loan Rev. H. E. Robertson, Sr. \$150.00, Rev. H. A. Markell, \$150.00 and Rev. Mark Larson \$125.00 to be taken from the Minister's Aid Fund.

22. Conference Board of Trustees met at Wolf Summit, West Virginia, May 23, 1950. The following business was transacted:

Motion made and carried to approve the plans presented by the church, and to authorize them to start the construction of the church basement.

Voted to loan the Wolf Summit Church \$1,500.00 as soon as available.

Trustees approved the price set by the church.

Voted to authorize the President, Rev. H. C. Van Wormer, to have necessary reparis made on the Conference Parsonage.

Voted to authorize President. H. C. Van Wormer, to exchange old typewriter for new one, which would be more adequate for the work.

RESOLUTIONS:

Your Trustee Board has considered Resolutions presented by Jos. B. Markey concerning rules governing the granting and payment of loans to church and ministers and it is the sense of this Board that the rules set up at the time of the adoption of the plan are sufficient. The Trustee Board already has been trying to put into effect the sense of Rev. Markey's resolution and will continue to do so.

1. BE IT RESOLVED: That at this annual session we thank our Heavenly Father for His manifold blessing and the loving care with which He has led us through the 107 years of our Conference existence; That we praise the precious Holy Spirit for the rich blessing He has showered upon us; That we revere the memory of the men and women of God who have blazed a trail before us that we might keep the faith that holds, "For such a time as this."

2. RESOLVED: That we pledge ourselves in the coming year to employ every means of grace, i.e., church attendance, private devotions, family worship, fasting, tithing, Bible study, reading of Christian literature and personal evangelism, to maintain the growth and advancement of our beloved Zion.

3. RESOLVED: That we exhort our people to refrain from the purchasing of television sets, since we recognize television in its present operation as an influence to evil, and believe it may be the means of ruining the sanctity of our homes and retarding spiritual life and growth. N.B.-Quote, (Norman Cousin, Saturday Review of Literature) "Out of the wizardry of the television tube these days such an assault is coming against the human mind, such a mobilized attack on the intelligence, such a mass invasion against good taste, as no communication medium has ever known."

4. RESOLVED: That we, both minister and laity, will constantly seek the anointing and unction of the Holy Spirit for the performance of any task to which the Church may call us.

AND, BE IT RESOLVED FURTHER: That we deplore the easing of, and disregard of our Disciplinary standards against the wearing of jewelry, including the wedding ring, and urgently urge our Denominational Missionary Headquarters to insist upon missionaries sent out to represent the Wesleyan Methodist Church in our mission fields adhering strictly to this Disciplinary Standard.

C. RESOLVED FURTHER: That we, as a Conference, request that our denominational Editors exercise more diligence in selecting picture cuts used in our publications, and register a protest against the use of such pictures in our Wesleyan periodicals as are not in accord with our standards and Discipline, and such as would tend to lessen deep spirituality, or give occasion for gainsaying by the worldly minded into whose hands our periodicals may come.

Our prayer is that God may bless these young women and make them leaders in spiritual things in our own ranks and among our own young people wherever they go."

Saturday Morning, June 10: Missionary choruses led by Ann Hartley, were sung to open the morning meeting. Prayer by Bessie Robbie followed.

Minutes of previous meeting read and approved. Roll Call; 24 Conference Society members, 34 presidents and 60 delegates.

The following appraisal of posters was read by the president: Your Committee feels that, from the standpoint of poster make-up and workmanship, first place belongs to the poster entitled, "Send Saunders Back," prepared by Miss Velma Smith of Massillon, Ohio, Akron District. Second place goes to the poster on "Increase our Subscriptions," by Olive Stonebraker of Indiana, Pa. From the standpoint of poster make-up, honorable mention should be made of the poster on "Send Saunders Back," by Dale Lappin of Canton Second, but it should be noted that the maps therein are somewhat inaccurate. The poster on "Increase our Subscriptions," by Kelley of Indiana, presents a splendid poster idea, but colors are not sufficiently vivid. Adjourned by motion.

Saturday Afternoon: With singing and prayer the afternoon meeting come to order. Minutes read and approved. Roll Call: 17 Conference Society members, 50 presidents and 54 delegates.

Three other delegates to the Area Missionary Convention gave their reports on their assigned services.

The Courtesy Committee presented Miss Florence White, from Hephzibah Orphanage, who gave some recent news of the Orphanage.

Societies Reported: Rock Run, Falconer, Stewart Run, Tarentum, Titusville, Vanport, West Middlesex, Wilgus, Wolf Summit and Zion.

Report of the Magazine Solicitors: New subscriptions to the Wesleyan Missionary, 63; Renewals, 61; Total, 124. Kathryn Chess, Chairman.

A motion carried to have the suggestions for treasurers that appeared in last year's Minutes reprinted in this year's Minutes.

Minutes read and approved. Adjourned Sine Die.

The public missionary service was conducted by Ivah B. Van Wormer, president, in the main tabernacle. The singing was directed by Wm. Leyshon. Special messages in song were sung by the ladies Trio and Lois Thornton. Intercessory prayer led by Price Stark.

An appealing message on the text in II Samuel 24:24, "Neither will I offer burnt offerings unto the Lord my God of that which doth cost me nothing," was given by Sister Helen Stark, our engaged Missionary Speaker. With the large number of candidates who have offered their services for the mission fields waiting for funds with which to send them, Sister Stark challenged us to be sacrificial in our giving that there might be sufficient funds to send them.

The offering and pledges were taken by Sister Georgia Markey. A good spirit of liberality prevailed with the result of cash offering of \$505.23 and pledges of \$13,985.00, making a total of \$14,490.23.

THE W. M. S. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Greetings in His Triumphant Name to the forty-fourth Annual Allegheny Conference of the Women's Missionary Society of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, June 6, 1950.

"But of the times and seasons, brethren, ye have no need that I write unto you. For yourselves know perfectly that the day of the Lord cometh as a thief in the night. But ye, brethren, are not in darkness, that that day should overtake you as a thief." I Thess. 5:1, 2, 4. We admit that if it were not for the light of the Scriptures we would be most troubled and disheartened with the upheaval of world conditions and the falling away of real spirituality, But the Word shows us that we are in the closing days of the Gentile dispensation. Therefore, "we must work the works of Him that sent us while it is yet day, for the night cometh when no man can work." May the words of the sacred song writer be the passionate cry and endeavor of our souls in these crucial times; "To serve the present age, My calling to fulfill; Oh may it all my powers engage to do my Master's will."

The progress of this year has been spectacular but, we believe, by the help of the Lord, we have made some substantial gains. Four new societies have been organized this year, one by Mrs. Comadoll and two by the president:

1. Harbor, June 22, 1949 with 4 active and 5 honorary members;

2. Robertsville, April 20, by Mrs. Comadoll, with 11 active and 5 honorary members.

3. Olive Hill, April 26, with 9 active and 3 honorary members.

4. Hillville, June 7, 1950. Organized by the pastor.

This gives us a total of 86 Societies, one on each charge and a number on Pioneer works.

We sent out circular letters of various information to the presidents six different times during the year, as well as a good number of other pieces of mail that we did not count.

On July 16, 1949, we held a missionary service at West Virginia Camp, when Mrs. Catherine Bloom gave a very thrilling account of their trip to a mission on the Bahama Islands. Later we spoke at a missionary service in one of our churches.

The daily W. M. S. prayer service at Stoneboro Camp was well attended and profitable. The public missionary service at Camp was ably filled by Rev. and Mrs. W. N. Saunders, when over \$5,600.00 was raised in addition to what had been raised at Conference. Mrs. Mary Lane Clark, Missionary to Africa, and Rev. and Mrs. Henry Ortlip, returned missionaries from China, were also present a couple of days and spoke in an afternoon service. Also, Mrs. Alice McMillen, our W. M. S. Vice-president, spoke on one occasion, Mrs. Clenna Slater talked once on Hephzibah and Rev. and Mrs. Saunders each addressed an afternoon service. All these speakers were interesting and Spirit anointed and the services were attended with the usual missionary enthusiasm of Stoneboro Camp. August 30, 31 and September 1, your president with four duly elected delegates (one who was elected did not go.) attended the Quadrennial Convention held at Houghton, N. Y. In many ways this was the most spiritual and profitable convention we have had for some time.

Rev. and Mrs. W. N. Saunders started their tour of the Conference in July, working in what they could then and later finishing the itinerary from September 4 to November 6. From these services we heard wonderful reports of unusual interest and missionary fervor.

In November a call came from our denominational prayer leader to call local societies to monthly prayer and fast services and to ask for self denial offerings. A good response was reported from this call, though not all who should, have yet responded.

Miss Hazel Jones, R. N., and Rev. and Mrs. J. L. Landrey and family are still filling in their terms of service in India. Good reports have come from the same.

Rev. and Mrs. Henry Ortlip and Karen Ruth are now in Haiti where God is mightily helping and using them. Though the change from being in China was great, they have beautifully adjusted to their new situation.

Since Miss Grace Woods has returned home from Australia her support from the Conference has ceased.

Finally, we would like to make the following recommendations, both new and old:

(1) That since, we are in such a great financial need in this branch of our work, each local Society endeavor to gain as many new subscriptions and as many renewals to the Wesleyan Missionary as possible this year; (If we do this we must make a special drive!)

(2) That each local society call a monthly prayer and fast service with self-denial offerings at the same:

(3) That each Society use the Study Book by means of an interesting oral reviewer, or at least pass it among the members to be read outside, if the first suggestion is not possible;

(4) That, since our Conference ladies are editing the 1950 Program Calendar, each Society procure Program Calendars for program use and reading and studying course record;

(5) That each Society endeavor to enroll each member in the Study or Reading Course, as this is also an admonition from the Word, "Study to show thyself approved unto God."

(6) That those desiring to start or needing assistance in Child Evangelism work, refer such need to our newly elected Child Evangelism Secretary, Miss Evangeline Dunkerly, 115 Highland Ave., Beaver Falls, Pa.

In the last place, we cannot complete our report and yours without expressing a great big "Thank you" to all our dear W. M. S. Presidents and members for your wonderful co-operation and your hearty responses to all calls and appeals of need sent to your Societies. Especially did you outdo yourselves in liberality and loving remembrance in meeting the appeal for Saunder's equipment to return to Africa.

Thank you again. Truly the Lord can fully reward you for your faithfulness and prayers and when His jewels are gathered over yonder may you have an abundant share of stars in your crowns.

It was also with a sense of deep gratitude and satisfaction that we found our Allegheny W. M. S. led the list in the denominational Prayer Partner Groups. God bless you! May Old Allegheny ever aspire to the deeply spiritual, consecrated prayer life for which she has ever known. Our only purpose of existence is for this end and only this—"for me to live for Christ!"

COMMITTEE ON PROGRAM AND PLAN OF WORK

WE RECOMMEND:

1. That the first meeting after Conference each local society hold an installation service which includes the outline of the work and consecration to their office. Suggested helps, Section 13 and 30 of the Discipline.

2. a. That the program and plan of work be read and discussed as soon as the Minutes are received. This includes the Standard of Efficiency as drawn by General Conference for Local societies, to be secured from the Literature Department, 3901 South Washington Street, Marion, Indiana.

b. We also urge that the President of each Society refer to those as a reminder during the year.

3. a. That each society endeavor to hold a public monthly meeting, praying especially for the requests found in the Wesleyan Missionary. We suggest that a spirit of evangelism be carried on in our local communities by the members of the Society, each one feeling a personal responsibility to bring at least one soul to Christ during the year.

b. That our Holiness Conventions, where possible observe a missionary service.

4. a. That we urge our societies to carry our Prayer Partner plan. Information regarding this to be sent to each society by the "Prayer Partner" Secretary.

b. That each society urge their prayer partners to keep in touch with our Home and Foreign mission fields, thereby bringing first hand knowledge to our societies.

5. That each society have an aggressive solicitor for the Wesleyan Missionary. Where it is difficult to get subscriptions we urge the use of the club plan.

6. That the President of each society remind those attending Stoneboro Camp Meeting of the daily Missionary Prayer meeting from 4:15 to 5:00 o'clock, urging them to be faithful in this work of intercession.

7. a. That all society officers and Annual Conference Delegates be members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. b. That each society put forth a special effort to send their President and a delegate to Annual Conference, assuming their expense for transportation.

c. That the delegate's credentials and Statistical reports be sent to Mrs. Eunice Comadoll, Cooperstown, Pa., at least two weeks before Conference.

d. That each society send fruit and vegetables, or its equivalent in cush to Conference. The larger societies sending two dozen quarts and the smaller at least one dozen. Fruits or vegetables to be all of one kind from each society. Same to be credited at purchase price. We recommend giving cash where possible, same to be sent anytime during the year to the Superintendent of the Dining Hall, or brought to Conference. Amount to be credited under "Other Objects."

e. That twenty-five cents per member be raised for delegate's entertainment and sent to the sub-treasurer before the books close April 30th.

f. That each society instruct their delegate how much to pledge at the public missionary service. Unless otherwise specified, these pledges will be divided one-third for Home and two-thirds for Foreign Missions.

8. a. That each society use the designated Study Book, also urge the use of the Program Calendar and other helps and as far as possible encourage all members to follow the Mission Study Course as recommended by General Conference. All material to be secured from Ruth Stonebraker, 160 Village Street, Johnstown, Pa., Conference Secretary of the Mission Study Course.

b. That each society have a program committee varying once a quarter. We suggest the President act as Chairman of said Committee.

9. a. That each society contribute five dollars or more annually for the support of Hephzibah Orphanage, the same to be applied on budget.

b. That each society contribute three dollars or more annually to the "Medical Student Fund." This not to apply on budget.

10. That each local society be urged to respond to the Card Call plan and thus assist in the extension program of the church. All Card Call money to be sent to Rev. J. R. Swauger, 330 East Onondaga Street, Syracuse 2, N. Y.

11. a. That we send program suggestions, Sunday School literature flannelgraph lessons and used Christmas greeting cards to our Mountain Missions, Hepzigah Orphanage and Indian Missions. Also bandages for Home and Foreign when required. (Note: Bandages should be cut two to four inches wide and tightly rolled. Number of pounds to be reported as item of interest on Annual report blank.)

b. That credit received for boxes of used clothing be placed under Receipts, Item 6, Other Sources.

c. That new clothing and provisions may be placed under Receipts, Item 2, Offering as cash.

12. That we endeavor to raise one-fourth of Church Educational Budget, including L. S. U. pledges.

13. a. That the Red Letter Days as given in the Standard of Efficiency be observed where possible. That Easter and Self-Denial offerings be used for Home Missions.

b. That the societies observe the monthly Fast and Prayer Service and that the self-denial offerings taken at these services be used for budget items where the society deems best.

14. a. That where suitable, each society have a Mercy and Hely Committee, whose duty it shall be to visit the sick and needy and give aid where necessary, and send flowers and greeting cards to shut-ins.

b. That we encourage the giving of special remembrance gifts as recommended by the General Conference for the promotion of definite missionary work as living tribute to the memory of deceased loved ones, instead of the usual extravagant floral tribute.

15. a. That we put forth a special effort to secure every woman in the church as a member of the society, or bring about a ten percent gain in membership.

b. We suggest the month of September be designated as "Membership Month."

16. a. It is required that one dollar dues be paid by both active and honorary members: That said dues be divided and fifty cents be sent in, specified as "Dues:" The other fifty cents to be placed in the treasury to be paid out with the offering for any budget expenditure.

b. That all dues and monies be sent through the local church treasurer to the District Sub-Treasurer.

17. That each society give the delegate an appropriate amount of money for the purchasing of literature for the society and also for small offerings taken during the Conference.

18. That since the retiring President is Acting President during the Conference session, we suggest that the society send her to the Conference, and elect the new president as delegate.

b. That we observe our monthly Prayer and Fast Service at which time the self-denial offering shall be received.

3. That we shall by the help of the Holy Spirit endeavor to faithfully attend all missionary work at home and abroad. We shall not be negligent by our indifference and selfish motives and pleasures, in our sacred task of inspiring and having a missionary spirit.

4. a. That we individually give ourselves more earnestly to prayerful and intellectual study of the Wesleyan Missionary and other helpful material whereby we may obtain profitable information from our missionary fields as to their activities and needs. James 1:5.

b. That in our missionary prayer meetings we stress the necessity of prayer for our missionaries, churches and officials, rather than engaging in socail functions.

5. That we adhere to Scriptural methods of raising funds for missions, and out of sacrificial hearts and lives, give heartily as unto the Lord and His holy cause, for the Lord loveth a cheerful giver.

6. a. That we faithfully hold to the Biblical Standards of our Discipline in creating a wholesome atmosphere in our homes.

b. That we stress the maintenance of a family altar in every home, with the children having a part, thus creating in them the desire to follow the Bible Standards and helping them to overcome the temptations that present themselves to our youth today.

7. That we abstain from attending the motion picture theater, reading and allowing our children to read the worldly comic books, listening to unwholesome radio programs, viewing questionable television, buying Sunday papers, and Sabbath desecration. Matt. 5:8.

8. a. That we who are mothers tell our children the true story of life and instruct them in the care of their bodies, in order that they may hold these truths sacred and be prepared to face the moral standards of this day.

b. That we as mothers guard well our children and as far as possible know where they are and what they are doing at all times.

c. That mothers carefully select their "baby sitters," since there is so much immorality prevalent today.

9. a. That we uphold by precept and example modesty of dress, as becometh holiness, by which we mean wearing dresses at least half way between the knees and ankles, with long sleeves and modest neckline, which should accompany purity and deep spirituality. I Timothy 2:9-10. Also that we adhere to Deut. 22:5, "The woman shall not wear that which pertaineth unto a man . . . for all that do so are an abomination unto the Lord thy God."

b. That we refrain from the wearing of jewelry, nucle shades of hosiery and ornamental hats. I Peter 3:3-4. Furthermore, we urge our women to wear hose at home as an example of godliness.

c. That we do not adhere to the worldly style of cutting or curling the hair, or the long bob. I Corinthians 11:15. Also, we believe with John Wesley on the Scripture, I Timothy 2:9, that "broidered hair" means curled hair.

d. That we also dress our girls and boys modestly, which includes wearing long hose.

e. Further, that we urge the avoidance of unnecessary debts, and neglecting long standing bills.

10. a. That we refrain from patronizing establishments selling intoxicating beverages, and also discourage the use of tobacco in all its forms, since we greatly detest the use and effects of both. II Cor. 7:1.

b. That we be patriotic by displaying the American Flag in observing our national holidays, thereby honoring our God who gives us freedom and liberty.

11. That these resolutions be read in each society frequently enough that all members be informed of the proposed attainments and requirements.
