# Daily Proceedings

## Tuesday p. m.

On June 26, 1956 the Champlain Conference met for its 114th Annual Session. The first sitting began at 2:30 p.m. Sister Randall played the organ, and Brother Matson led in singing "Amazing Grace" and other selections. Brother Putney offered prayer.

The roll of Ministers and delegates was called.

The Vice President presented the Conference President, Rev. Reginald Hewitt. He gave his Annual Address on the theme "The Shepherdless Multitude." The Text was at Matt. 9:36-38.

A rising vote of thanks was given to the President.

The President then gave his Annual Report of Official Acts, Orders of the Day, etc. It was adopted by vote. (See Report No. 1)

The bar of the Conference was voted to be the first seven center rows of seats.

It was voted that the hours of Conference be—a.m.: 8:45 to 11:30; p.m.: 1:30 to closing by vote.

It was voted that the roll call be before the devotional service.

The following Committees were elected:

Committee on Passage of Character—Rev. Harry Johnson and Mr. Henry Turton

Nominating Committee—Rev. Floyd Tyler, Rev. O. Finch, Rev. Otis MacDonald, Rev. Edward Mein

Laymen—Sadie Arnold, Laura Hartman, Dorothy Binyon and Raymond Smith

It was voted to change the words "two years" to "ONE YEAR" in the Standing Rule No. 17.

Those elected as the Pastoral Relations Committee were:

Elders—Rev. Stanley Klob, Rev. Edwin Seaman, Rev. Florence Shippee

Laymen—Gordon Stark, Robert Robbins, Bertha Lamphear

The Auditing Committee was elected to be—A. O. Northrup, Jr. and Hervey Taber.

The delegate from Brant Lake was elected to serve on the Committee on Itinerary and Orders.

The matter of a hot water heater for the kitchen was discussed.

A motion that a heater be immediately purchased was withdrawn, and it was voted that Ray Smith look into the matter and be authorized to act.

It was voted that we adjourn for Committee work.

Dismissal by Brother Otis MacDonald.

## Wednesday a. m.

The roll was called.

The devotional period, in charge of Sister Perry, consisted of sing-

ing, prayer by Brother Shippee; Scripture Reading from Hebrews 11 read by the leader, with comments.

The minutes of Tuesday afternoon were read and approved as read.

It was agreed to change the 9 a.m. Order of the Day to 2:45 p.m. on Thursday.

Dr. Reisdorph was introduced to the Body, and he made a few remarks.

The report of the Conference Treasurer was received and adopted. (See Reports)

It was moved that the Conference Missions Budget be \$5.00 per member. It was moved to amend the motion and make the amount \$2.50 per member. The amendment carried by a vote of 40 to 14. The original motion as amended was carried.

The motion prevailed that the Sunday School Budget be twenty cents (20¢) per member—main school.

It was voted that the Conference pay one half of the Conference President's Social Security, provided that he is in good standing with the Pension Plan.

The following characters were passed: Gerald Matson, Charles Dayton, Wm. Knecht, Robert Wolcott, Robert Finley, Ralph Lamos, James Keysor, Stanley Klob, John Lamos, Dennis Osgood, Maurice Jesmer and Florence Shippee.

ORDERS OF THE DAY: The Tithing Secretary, Rev. Robert Wolcott, gave his report. It was adopted as read. (See Reports)

The request was granted to Rev. Edwin Seaman that he be excused from acting on the Resolutions Committee. Rev. Jas. Keysor was elected to act in his place.

It was voted to adjourn for Committee work. Prayer of dismissal by Rev. Dayton.

#### Wednesday p. m.

The roll was called.

Prayer by Brother Edwin Seaman.

The minutes of the forenoon business were read, and approved as read.

ORDERS OF THE DAY: Address of the Connectional Representative. Rev. Edwin Seaman led in singing. While the Missionary ladies were coming in to hear the address, several gave testimony.

Dr. Reisdorph addressed the Body on the theme "The Mission of the Holiness Church." The Scripture background was in Acts 2 and 3—selected portions, and the speaker brought the challenge to the Church to the same spiritual power as portrayed in the Lesson.

Quote: "When the Church is without the power, it has its problems. When it has the power, others have the problems."

The following characters were passed—C. L. Hill, O. Finch, Ray Morgan, Gerald Hewitt, Quentin Hayes, A. Northrup, Jr.

The Statistical Committee reported, and it was approved. (See Reports)

**ORDERS OF THE DAY**—Camp Meeting Business.

The Camp Meeting Treasurer read her report, and it was adopted.

It was voted that a nice Camp Meeting sign be purchased and placed in the center of the village (West Chazy), with an arrow pointing to the Campground.

A motion to reconsider a previous motion relative to the time of roll call was lost.

The Camp Meeting Committee was given a rising vote of thanks in appreciation of the new Administration Building.

The motion prevailed that the matter of a Youth Camp available in Keen Valley be referred to the Camp Meeting Committee.

It was voted that the above motion be reconsidered. The motion that it be referred to the Camp Meeting Committee was LOST.

The Body voted that the matter be Laid on the Table.

It was voted that the Building and Location Committee investigate the sale offer of several acres of land back of the Campground and across the river, and report back to this Body at this session.

The Conference voted that the W. Y. President reply to the offer of the property in Keene Valley.

The Nominating Committee read its report.

It was voted that the Nominating Committee bring in a prepared ballot.

Adjournment by vote, and prayer by Brother Henry Turton.

#### Thursday a. m.

Rev. Robert Finley offered prayer.

The roll was called.

The devotional period was in charge of Sister Florence Shippee. There was singing, Scripture Reading Psalm 103, and prayer by Brother Taber.

The minutes of the Wednesday afternoon business were read and approved.

**ORDERS OF THE DAY:** The ELECTION OF CONFERENCE OFFICERS.

The Committee read the report of the Nominations, and the Conference proceeded to vote, using the prepared ballot system.

After collecting the ballots, the tellers withdrew to count the ballots.

The Pastoral Relations Committee gave the first reading (partial) of its report.

Having been nominated by the Sunday School Board, the Body elected

Mrs. Thelma Thurston as the Director of Child Evangelism.

District Chairmen were elected as follows:

St. Lawrence District—Rev. Ray Morgan

Central District—Rev. Thomas Boghosian

Southern District—Rev. Kenneth Ross

Northern District—Rev. Gerald Matson

Rev. Dayton spoke in relation to the National Holiness Association. It was voted that the Champlain Conference join the National Holiness Association. By vote it was left to the President to appoint a delegate to the N.H.A.

The motion prevailed that Rev. Northrup, Jr. be authorized to apportion the W.Y. \$2.50 per member.

Brother and Sister Witthuhn, Missionaries, were introduced, and they brought words of greeting.

The Conference Body voted that an offering be received for the National Holiness Association. This was done, and the amount received was announced as \$41.00.

It was voted that we have a Ministerial Institute this year. The motion prevailed that the previous motion be reconsidered. It was done; and the motion that we have a Ministerial Institute this year was LOST.

### SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY'S REPORT

Dear Friends of the Champlain Conference:

Greetings in His Name. We are engaged in a great work. The world places much emphasis upon the job we are doing. Presidents, Chief Justices, Governors, Judges, Courts of Law, Social workers, Psychiatrists, and many others have given the Sunday School a place of honor and respect. They each and all have thanked the Sunday School for keeping millions of children and teenagers away from their courts and out of their hospitals and penal institutions.

Not only is this true but whenever they have a very bad boy or girl to deal with, they bring them to the Sunday School, and say, "shelter this boy under your wings. His trouble is not that he ignores the law of the land, but rather that he breaks the Law of God and is totally ignorant of the example, life and love of Jesus Christ. You teach him the Law and the way of life." The doctor brings his mental patient to the Sunday School and says, "you can do more for her than we can." The Psychiatrist brings his emotionally upset patient and says, to the Sunday School, "we know "peace of mind" and true sense of values come only by having Peace with God."

Yesterday we heard about "The Multitudes" from our conference President. Oh, how great is the need and the laborers are so few! You could rightly be hearing words of praise for what you have been doing in your Sunday Schools. For while our churches have lost members the past year, our Sunday Schools have made a very substantial gain in enrollment, average attendance, new schools, new buildings and financially. However, it is more important that your secretary say to you "The Sunday Schools of our land are lacking in vital contact with the individual."

They are not keeping in step with the increase in population. If

you think they are, just take a look at the country. New schools, new hospitals, gas stations, theaters, new homes, new stores, etc. You can't get all the shoppers into the little neighborhood grocery or the little country store any more. No, today we have Central Markets and million dollar Shopping Centers and Thrift Shops, where Spend-thrift fathers and mothers spend wildly for groceries and car loads of coughs (cigarettes) and cart-loads of Extra light & dry. And my friends, to serve this same crowd up and down our land many churches and communities are using the same old methods and equipment of the "Old Days"!

Sunday School workers need to fall in step with people, (boys and girls, fathers and mothers) and walk a mile beside them and try to make them see that someone is interested in them. Millions will walk a mile for a camel, but find me ONE Sunday School teacher, who will walk  $\frac{1}{4}$  of a mile and talk with a boy or girl! Friends, our cities and towns are filled with sin-sick hearts and twisted lives. And their souls are precious in His sight!

It is time to re-value the life and work of the church! A well-known Church leader says, "membership of the church is not so important. The thing which spells out the strength and worth of the church is the enrollment in the Sunday School." WHY? My friend it is here they get the Personal touch—personal example—personal instruction—energizing fellowship, all of which makes life worth-while for everybody all along the line, from babe-in-arms to Grandma and Grandpa.

If you take the time to re-value the life and work of the church in the light of all this—you will have to come to the conclusion that teaching the Bible and Personal Evangelism is the thing that counts most. Not big programs, not big advertising. But it is "seeing the Multitude", showing sympathy and understanding and having compassion.

During the year, your secretary has been thrilled by contact with the growing Sunday Schools of our conference. You have done a good job, therefore I know you can do better! May God bless you all in this labor of love. There are three new schools, all making good progress. We were privileged to assist in the Dedication of three new Sunday School Building or additions and more are in the process of building. Seven persons from the Champlain conference attended the National Sunday School Convention at Providence last fall. Two pastors and their wives, One Sunday School Supt., and his wife, as did also your secretary. You will hear something of that tonight.

Friends, while we take pleasure in reviewing the success and growth of the past year, we do realize that our work belongs to "Today." 365 days in the year, but only ONE working day and that is "TODAY"!

The Sunday School Board is formulating some definite plans for the near future and throughout the year. We look forward to sharing many more victories for our King. May I congratulate you all on your splen-

did records and co-operation. God bless you each and all.

### Recommendations

We recommend:

1. That the Conference President visit each charge at least once a

year and that he have supervision of the Plattsburg work.

2. That the President be authorized to obtain a preacher who would move into the Plattsburg parsonage and act as supply pastor in the absence of the President.

3. That the President be granted 2 weeks vacation with pay, and be given permission to hold not more than 2 meetings during the year outside the Conference.

4. That the President's salary be sixty dollars (\$60) per week, plus telephone, fuel, lights, and traveling expense not to exceed five cents per mile for the service of the Conference.

5. That the Conference be divided into four districts as follows:

6. That the Conference budget be four dollars (\$4) per member, and be raised quarterly if possible.

7. That any church engaging the President for revival meetings shall send the offerings direct to the Conference Treasurer. These offerings shall be above budget.

8. That Ogdensburg, Plattsburg, Hopewell Junction and Catskill be the pioneer churches of the year.

9. That the Ogdensburg Pastor be subsidized (\$20) twenty dollars a week, and that we match the Ogdensburg Church dollar for dollar up to (\$500) toward liquidating the debt.

10. That the Catskill Pastor be subsidized (\$50) a month towards his rent, plus moving expenses not to exceed (\$25).

11. That we give Plattsburg (\$50) a month to meet their payments on indebtedness.

12. That the Conference give \$1000 for a Parsonage at Hopewell Junction.

13. That we request the W.Y. and W.M.S. to give (\$500) each to sponsor the purchase or building of a new parsonage at Hopewell Junction, paying this amount to the Conference Treasurer, who will advance the money to the church as soon as necessary.

14. That all monies raised to subsidize, build, or repair new or old churches or parsonages be listed under Conference Missions by all treasurers and societies of the Conference.



15. That Churches send their Pastor to the Refresher Course, and that the church assist the Pastor with expenses, as far as possible.

# Standing Rules

1. The Resolutions of this Conference shall be printed in the Minutes of the Conference each year.

2. All visiting members of our own, or other Churches in harmony with our principles, shall be invited to honorary seats in the Conference.

3. The Conference Secretary shall receive fifty dollars (\$50) per year for his labor and incidental expenses.

4. The Conference Treasurer shall receive fifty dollars (\$50) per year for his services in caring for the funds.

5. The Treasurer of the Superannuate Ministers' Relief Association also shall close his books one week before the Conference Session.

6. All monies disbursed by the Conference Treasurer during the interim of Conference shall be upon order of the President, except in case of payment to the President, when such order shall be issued by the Vice President. It is understood that any payment ordered by the Conference direct may be paid by the Treasurer without an order as directed above.

7. No monies shall be loaned by the Conference Treasurer except by order of the Conference, or by the consent of the President and his Advisory Board.

8. Each Elder shall make his engagements as Pastor with the understanding that if he be elected Conference President he shall be released from his engagement as Pastor within the period of three months following his election.

9. The first Sunday of each month shall be known as Missions Sunday, the Sunday School offerings to go alternately to Home Missions and Conference Missions, in that order, and be sent to the Conference Treasurer. The Committee on Finance defines "Conference Missions" as the establishing of new and (or) subsidizing of the needy fields of the Conference.)

10. In securing Evangelists for the Camp Meeting the Camp Meeting Committee is privileged to secure not more than one worker outside the Denomination.

11. The Camp Meeting Committee shall be composed of the Conference President, as Chairman, and three ministers and three laymen, all to be elected by ballot, the term of each office to be three years, the time of one minister and one layman expiring each year; also, the President of the Missionary Society and the President of the W.Y. shall be members of this Committee.

12. Pastors shall state financial items in their statistical reports in even dollars, except in items affecting the Budget; and as far as possible are requested to report all Budget items in even dollars. When such

rule is not followed, the statistical secretaries are authorized to drop decimals, except as provided above.

13. The Committee on Credentials shall secure from each delegate the necessary credentials as provided by our Discipline, with Post Office address of the same.

14. The closing Sunday of the Conference year shall be the Sunday following the beginning of the Annual Conference. The Pastor's salary for this closing Sunday shall be paid by the Church of which he is Pastor; and for the Sunday of the new conference year it shall be paid by the Charge to which he is going.

15. Newly elected Conference Officers take office after the close of Conference Sunday.

16. The Conference shall include in the Orders of the Day a special period to consider Camp meeting business.

17. A Nominating Committee shall be elected to consider and nominate all elective Officers of the Conference. The Committee shall consist of four Elders and four laymen. (NEW PART) No one shall repeat service on this Committee until an interim of one (1) year has elapsed. The report of the Nominating Committee shall be read to the Conference the day preceding the election.

18. The delegate's credentials shall be sent to the Committee on Credentials BEFORE THE OPENING DAY OF CONFERENCE, and the Conference Treasurer shall send printed blanks with the Statistical, Character, etc.

19. The Conference recommends that each Charge grant its Pastor two weeks vacation, and also grant him permission to hold a two weeks meeting (over two Sundays) away from his local Charge—both vacation and meeting to be without loss of pay, and exclusive of Annual Conference and Camp meeting.

20. The first Sunday in May shall be PASTORAL VOTE SUNDAY.

21. CHURCH EXTENSION. (1) The Conference President shall act as Pioneer Secretary. (This does not create the office of Pioneer Secretary.) The Conference Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location shall be the Church Extension Committee.

(2) There shall be at least one Church Extension service on each Charge in the Conference this year, at which time all of the Church Extension activities within the Conference shall be presented. This service shall be under the supervision of the Conference President, or one whom he may appoint.

Any person traveling the Conference in the interest of Church Extension must be appointed and under the direction of the Conference President. Those thus appointed to travel the Conference in the interest of Church Extension shall receive not to exceed five cents per mile.



(3) All offerings taken for Church Extension shall be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer, and credited to CONFERENCE MISSIONS. The Conference Treasurer, upon recommendation of the Conference President and the Committee on Church Extension, shall disburse these funds. Any designated funds can be disbursed by notice received in writing from the Conference President.

(4) Whereas the W. Y. is an organization that is aggressively supporting the Conference Pioneer projects, we recommend that as far as possible all monies for Pioneer work be passed through the local W.Y. Treasurer to the Treasurer of the Champlain Conference.

We further recommend that the local Church Extension program be sponsored by the W.Y., as far as possible.

22. During the year each Sunday School shall take an offering for the maintenance of the Conference President's home.

23. The Conference President shall be ex-officio member of the Board on Church and Parsonage Building and Location; the term of the other members shall be two years each, the term of two members expiring each year.

24. No new business shall be introduced to the Conference Body after Friday noon, without a two-thirds vote of the Body.

25. Our Conference shall meet for its Annual Session the first Tuesday after the last Monday in June, except the years of the General Conference. On such years our Conference shall begin the second Tuesday following the General Conference.

26. Each Church member over 14 years of age shall be apportioned \$2.50 per year for CONFERENCE MISSIONS.

27. May 25th shall be considered the close of the Conference year for Statistical purposes. By June second the Pastor shall send to the Conference Treasurer all monies and receipts, with both copies of his report made out, except Budget items, which the Conference Treasurer will fill in and sign. In the event that the Conference Treasurer discovers a deficit in any of the Budget items, he shall notify the Pastor.

The Conference Treasurer, in turn, shall pass the reports to the Auditor of statistical reports by June 9th. The Auditor shall correct the reports, and shall pass one copy to the statistician, and one copy back to the Pastor, by June 16th.

He also shall send to the Apportionment Committee the membership of the Churches, Sunday Schools and W.Y. The statistician and auditor shall give Pastors opportunity to explain apparent errors until the time the Conference convenes.

28. The Pastors shall not be required to read their statistical reports (before the Conference Body.)

# Campground Rules

## General Rules

Ever bear in mind that these grounds and buildings are church property, and respect them as such.

The religious services are for your benefit—take advantage of them.

Only young people who come at the recommendation of their pastor will be permitted the benefits of the Young People's Financial Plan.

Each young person is required to attend the regular Young People's Meeting; also—the evening service, and one other service during the day.

## I. Care of Grounds

1. Place waste paper and garbage only in containers provided. Do not throw it on the grounds.
2. Waste paper and other refuse may be burned only in drums provided for this purpose.
3. Empty waste water in appointed place—at back of the grounds. Do not throw it out the window or on the grounds.
4. Do your part toward keeping the grounds around your cottage or dormitory neat and looking clean.

## II. Personal Conduct

1. The use of tobacco, profanity, obscene literature, card playing and gambling are prohibited on the Campgrounds.
  2. Wearing apparel must be modest at all times. The wearing of slacks, shorts, gym clothes or bathing suits is prohibited on the grounds.
- Men are requested to wear shirts, and ladies to wear hose.

## III. Dormitory and Cottage Rules

1. Campers are requested to be in their rooms for the night at 10:30 unless engaged in the tabernacle.
2. The rights of your neighbors must be respected: therefore, quiet must prevail in all rooms and dormitories.
3. Remember that there are others who will occupy these rooms after you; therefore, keep them clean, and leave them in good condition.
4. Because of fire hazards, there must be no cooking of food in the dormitories.

**Plan of Work**—The Committee on Plan of Work reported for the last time. It was voted to accept the report. (See Report No. 8)

It was voted to amend the action taken about Statistical report dead lines to read "Post Marked June 1st" rather than in the hands of the Statistician by June 1st.

Voted to accept the Y.M.W.B. Superintendent's report.

The minutes of the afternoon session were read and accepted as read.

It was voted to forego the reading of the remaining Statistical reports.

It was voted to designate our Penny-a-meal offerings as Mrs. Witthuhn's support when sending it in to the treasurer and fill-out our Statistical reports.

Voted to adjourn.

### Special Meetings

#### Executive Committee Meetings

The first meeting of the year was held at the adjournment of Conference July 1955. Mrs. Doris Lamos was authorized to date an unsigned check for the Exhibit expense. Quarterly Blanks were discussed. Mrs. Stevenson was appointed to be responsible for the same. The District meetings in the fall were discussed. It was decided to have two instead of four. One is to be held at West Chazy with Mrs. Earl and Mrs. Marjean Chapman as co-chairman. One was to be held at Corinth with Mrs. Josephine Dayton as chairman. Missionary speakers were discussed. Mrs. Stevenson was instructed to contact the Elliots from Marion College who were spending the summer in Puerto Rico to see if they were available. The Liddicks from the Missionary Office were to be held in reserve if they could not come. We were adjourned.

**Second Meeting**—The Executive Committee met again on July 15th.

The following business was transacted. All members of the Executive Committee are to attend both District Conventions in the Fall if at all possible.

The money coming from renting rooms was considered. It was voted to keep what is taken in in a separate building fund.

Voted to pay \$10.00 toward the Challenger expense.

We were adjourned.

**Third Meeting**—The Committee met at Corinth on Nov. 3 during the District Convention. There were four members present. It was voted to take \$150.00 of the \$300.00 in the building fund and give it to the Camp Meeting Committee to apply on the new Administration building.

Honorary Enrollments in Houghton College were discussed. The lack of them and ways to increase them were considered. No action was taken.

The Secretary was instructed to order five copies of the General Conference Minutes in order that each member of the Committee might have one.

It was voted to secure Miss Vera Clocksen through the Foreign Missionary Office to travel the Champlain Conference in the Spring. Voted to adjourn.

**Fourth Meeting**—The Committee met prior to the calling of the conference Session. The following action was taken. The late Statistical Blanks are to be included this year in the final report. This is the last year they will be in the Minutes unless they are post marked on or before June 1st.

**Fifth Meeting**—On June 27, 5:30 p.m. the following recommendation was formulated to be presented to the W.M.S. Conference Body. We recommended that the W.M.S. President be requested to visit each local Society during the ensuing Conference year at her own convenience. This visit shall take the place of our District meetings of other years. We also recommend that the expense of such travel be covered by local offerings of at least \$2.00 from the smaller Societies and \$5.00 from the larger Societies. Any amount left over from these offerings is to be kept in a separate travel fund for future use.

The General Work Shop was considered. There also was some discussion about a motel type dormitory. We adjourned.

**Sixth Meeting**—On June 28, 7:00 p.m. It was voted to pay the Witt-huhn's travel expense of \$30.00 from the Travel fund and also to give them a gift of \$20.00 from the General fund.

It was also voted to recommend that Mrs. Florence Northrup be the Conference Representative at the Work Shop to be held in Charles City, Iowa Aug. 28-30. The expense of this trip is to be paid partly from the travel fund and partly from the general fund. Adjourned.

### **Special Educational Meeting**

We met on Saturday morning at the request of Rev. Tysinger, President of Houghton Academy. He presented the need of money to start a Home Economics Course in the Academy. No official action was taken. The request is to be handed down to our local Societies with the added request that it be considered early in the year.

At this time the Exhibit Committee took the opportunity to present gifts to Mrs. Anna Lamos, Mrs. Martha Wolcott, Mrs. Helen Seaman, Mrs. Russel Bissel and Mrs. Marjorie Stevenson. Voted to adjourn.

Rev. Ferdinand Witthuhn spoke on our close neighbor, Haiti. He said that we in America don't realize the power of the Devil in such a land of darkness; but the power of the Gospel is greater. Our open door in Haiti is the native people.

The Congregation sang "Lord, Give a Vision."

### Report No. 8

#### PLAN OF WORK

For each local W.M.S. we recommend:

1. The election of consecrated officers of vision to carry on a work which is ever new and challenging.
2. The use of program calendars and other prepared helps.
3. The efficiency standard for the local society, plan of work, and standing rules be read at the first monthly meeting after Conference and once more during the year.
4. The voting body shall be composed of Conference officers, Presidents of Local Societies and one delegate from each Society.
5. That a day of fasting and prayer be observed monthly, and that an active prayer partner group be formed. (Report on this group to be submitted within 60 days after Conference.)
6. That arrangements be made with the Pastor for one missionary prayer meeting each month.
7. The election of a Mission Study Secretary, who will keep a record

of all reading done in the prescribed reading course, reporting statistics to the Conference Mission Study Secretary by the 15th of January.

8. That the men be encouraged to join the society as honorary members, particularly emphasizing March and September as membership months. Also, all efforts should be made to foster public missionary meetings.

9. That the financial obligations of the society, per member, be stated as follows:

a. Dues of \$1.00 to be sent directly to the Conference Treasurer, 50 of which shall be divided by her and applied on budget, half home and half foreign unless otherwise specified and that all monies and vouchers be sent to the Conference Treasurer at least quarterly.

b. An annual amount equal to 25 per active member to be used as general administrative also to be sent to conference W.M.S. Treasurer.

10. That money disbursed receiving no budget credit be listed as follows:

- a. General Administrative
- b. Penny-a-meal Fund
- c. Card Call
- d. Conference Missions Funds
- e. Honorary College Enrollment
- f. Mile of Dimes
- g. Medical Student Fund

11. That at a meeting before Conference, when officers for the coming year are elected, a delegate (other than the Church Delegate, if possible) be elected, whose room and board for the Conference week shall be provided by the local society. She shall be instructed as to the amount of the pledge for missions and her report shall be given at the first meeting after Conference.

12. Since our witness for Christ is to begin in Jerusalem, let us seek to win souls in our home communities by personal work, calling on new families, inviting others to our meetings, in thoughtful service to others, that our prayers and an offering be given for the urgent need of evangelism of the Jews.

# Standing Rules

1. The Standing Rules of the Conference Missionary Society shall be printed in the Conference Minutes each year.

2. The Local Treasurer is to send a statistical blank to the statistician on or before June 1st. All blanks arriving after the deadline will not be included in the statistical report. Send the delegates credentials to the Conference Missionary Secretary two weeks before Conference. Receipts and disbursements must be made to balance before being sent, also rating according to efficiency standard. Take one home after conference to read to the local Society.

3. We recommend that the Treasurer of the Conference Society be elected as a Committee of Remembrance with the authority to send flowers or other suitable tribute to those of our number who shall be called to their eternal reward. We further recommend that this shall include pastor's wives and officers of our Conference Missionary Society.

4. That each society respond to the Card Call plan by subscribing as a group in addition to those already receiving the Card Call.

5. The continuation of supporting worthwhile projects, such as sending goods, usable clothing, notions, pictures and medical supplies to our home missionaries, forwarding Sunday School charts and flannelgraph material to our foreign fields, and the preparation of exhibits to be displayed at conference and send to Home and Foreign Mission Stations. These exhibits shall be packed at the close of conference, the postage being paid from the conference treasury. (It is considerate to contact the Missionaries as to urgent needs.)

6. The sending of necessary supplies to the Campground to be itemized in the Challenger.

7. That since there is an urgent need for refurnishing dormitory rooms, those societies interested in co-operating may contact the matron in charge. (Mrs. Josephine Hewitt)

## 8. Special Projects

a. Conference Missions Project money amounting to the equivalent of 10 per active member per month or \$1.20 annually to be sent to the conference W.M.S. treasurer.

b. That special attention be given to the penny-a-meal fund which provides for the support of our Missionary, Mrs. Witthuhn. That prayer and love be mingled with generous giving.
