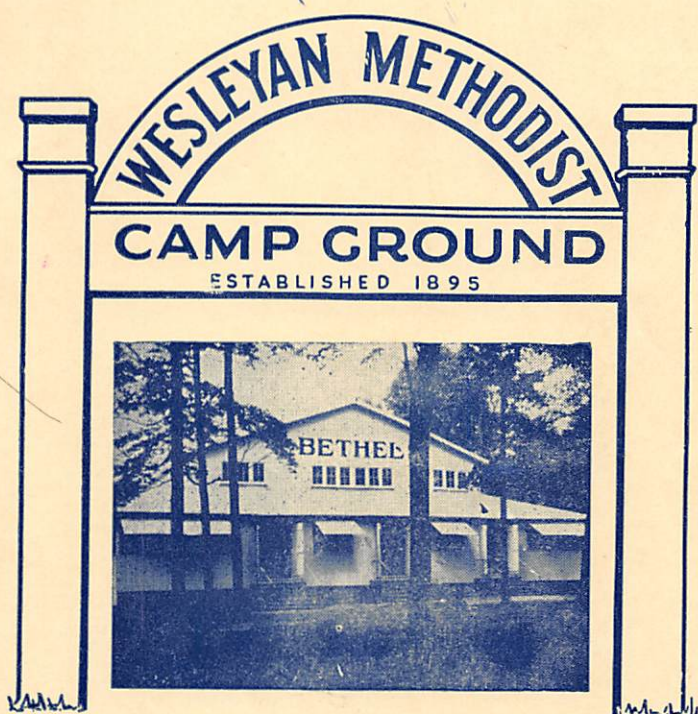

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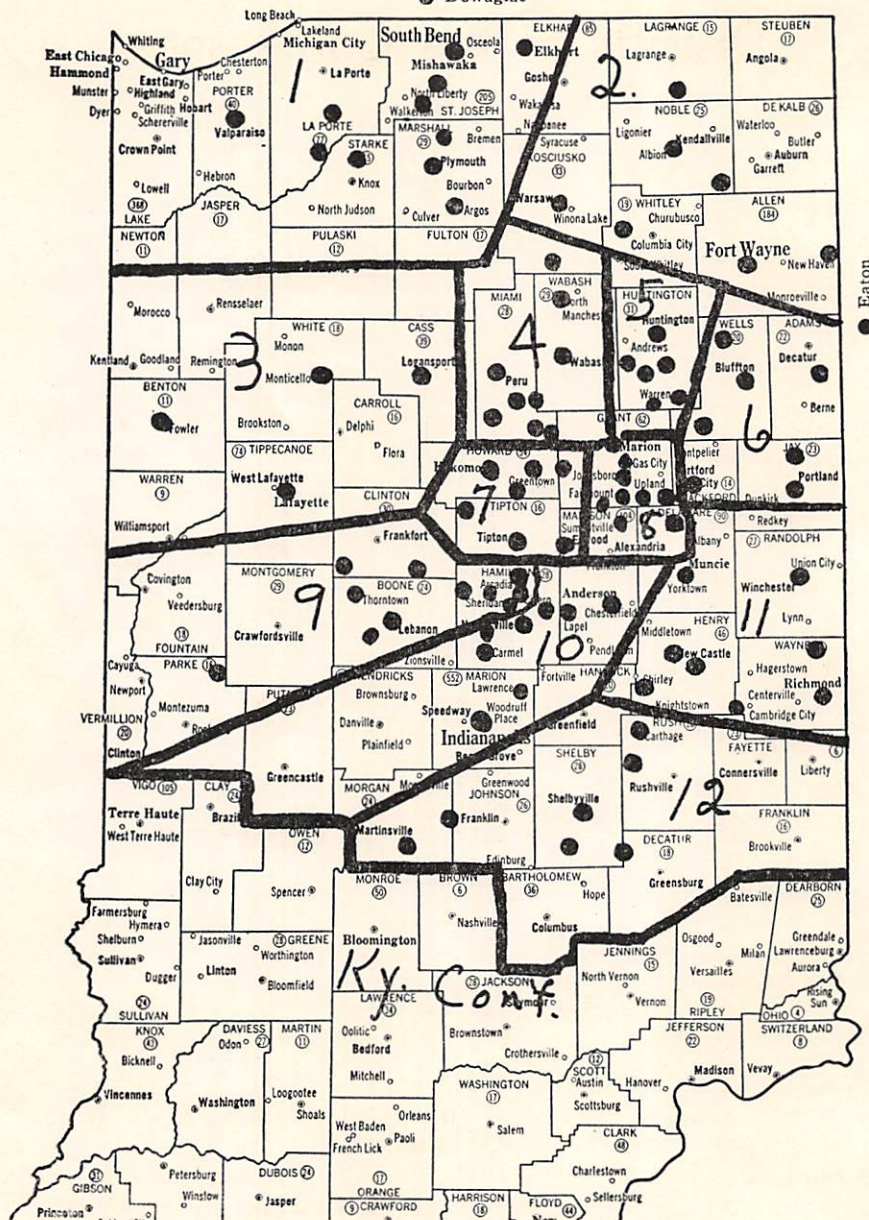

# Journal of Daily Proceedings

The One Hundred Seventh session of the Annual Indiana Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, convened on the Fairmount Campground, Fairmount, Indiana at 7:30 p.m. August the 8th, 1955.

**Opening**—The president of the Conference, the Rev. E. L. Kierstead opened the evening service with prayer. The Rev. Russell J. Klinger led the congregation in singing three of the favorite hymns of the church.

**Invocation**—Invocation and special prayer for the Rev. Max Bennett was offered by the Rev. Thomas Wildey.

**Special Song**—The Rev. and Mrs. Russell Klinger, sang as a special song, "Guide Me O Thou Great Jehovah."

**Opening Sermon**—The President of the Conference presented the Rev. Clarence Huffman, Prof. at Marion College, who by the action of the last session of the Annual Conference was elected to preach the opening sermon. The speaker offered a word of prayer and proceeded to the message of the hour. He used as a text Acts 2:42-54 as a basis for the theme, "When the Church is Invincible." The Church was declared invincible when it had, 1. A whole hearted hunger for God's Word, 2. A Glowing Fellowship, 3. A Selfless Consecration, 4. Mighty in Prayer. The service closed with the singing of a hymn.

**Benediction**—The Rev. Orval Bradley.

## Tuesday August 9, 8:30 a. m.

**Opening**—The opening song was led by the Rev. Marvin Baker.

**Devotional Speaker**—The Rev. Ralph Coleson, pastor of the Plymouth Church gave the opening devotions. He selected scripture from the book of Acts 3:1-9 as a basis for his remarks and closed his meditations with prayer.

**Call to Order**—The Conference was called to order by the President, the Rev. E. L. Kierstead.

**Roll Call**—83 elders, 10 conference preachers, 92 delegates answered the roll call.

**Conference Bar**—The Conference was fixed, by vote, as the first seven tiers of seats in front and including the rostrum.

**Time of Conference**—A motion was made and carried by vote, that the time for conference to convene be fixed at 8:30 a.m. and 2:00 p.m.; to recess at 11:30 a.m. and adjourn upon motion in the afternoon.

**President's Message**—The President read his Annual Address which upon vote was accepted.

**President's Report**—The President then read the report of his official Acts; Appointment of Chairmen; Special Orders and Calendar of Business, which upon motions were adopted by vote. (See Report No. 1)

**Election of Committees**—The Committee on Nominations reported the nominations of committees which upon vote was adopted as amended. (See Report No. 2)

**Motion**—It was moved and carried by vote to amend the above report on nominations by substituting the name of Art A. Costello for Maxwell Enyeart on the Committee on Pastoral Relations; by substituting the name of Frank Underwood for Marian Noggle on the Committee on Resolutions.

**Communications**—A communication from Dr. F. R. Eddy, Publishing Agent of the Wesleyan Methodist Church was read to the conference.

# Resolutions and Laws of the Indiana Conference

## I. Houses of Worship.

1. Our houses of worship should not be open to any evangelist or minister of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain a regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments. A waving of the above by a contract or lease of building must be obtained through the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference.

## II. Pastoral Duties

1. It is the duty of the pastors to look after the insurance of our church and parsonage properties. All insurance shall provide for losses caused by fire and lightning, hail, and tornado. A failure on the part of the pastor shall be a censurable offense. If the church fails to insure their property upon reasonable effort of the pastor to secure, the same, then said failure shall be reported to the President of the Conference who shall then have the property insured. In such cases all insurance monies received from losses by fire, lightning, hail and tornado shall be used in Church Extension work as the Conference Board of Trustees considers best.

2. Each pastor and evangelist shall file a complete statistical report with the statistical committee without fail by July 10th.

A. The pastor shall report in open conference the items listed on special blanks furnished by the Conference.

B. The official character of any pastor or evangelist shall not be passed until he shall have submitted a satisfactory report including statistics.

C. When a pastor fails to raise, in full, the Superannuated Pension Budget, he shall report to the character committee a satisfactory reason for not doing so.

D. In compiling statistics report, all figures shall be given in even dollars at the nearest dollar, i.e., \$1.01 to \$1.50 shall be reported as \$1.00 and from \$1.51 to \$1.99 shall be reported as \$2.00. The item number VIII on benevolences alone to be excepted and shall be reported exactly as paid.

3. All unaccounted for members appearing in the statistics in the membership list shall be referred to the discontinued list. All members in excess of the number reported shall be reported received.

4. The pastor shall bring a report to each Quarterly Meeting and send a duplicate to the Conference President and Vice President, quarterly, on blanks furnished by the Conference.

5. This Conference asks each pastor to prepare a calling list of all the homes connected with the Church and Sunday school; listing the relationship they hold to the church; listing their names and addresses by city; street and number, the same to be kept for his own work while on the pastorate and to be given to his successor on the field.

6. No pastor whose total receipts are \$2500.00 or more shall hold more than two revivals yearly from his charge, one of which is mentioned in resolution seven under pastoral duties, unless by consent of the President and his Advisory Board.

7. Each pastor whose total pastor's receipt exceed \$2500.00 a year should seek to organize a new class or give his services in a revival meeting to a new or weaker church, to help establish it. The Church which he pastors should grant him such privilege without censure, with full remuneration of salary while in such a meeting. The Vice President shall serve as Co-ordinator, to recommend and help arrange such meetings.

8. Delegate's Credentials secured from the Secretary shall be mailed to the Assistant Secretary by the pastor, by July the 10th.

### III. Churches

1. All charges with a membership of twenty-five or more shall in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the pastor may live

2. All charges and stations to which a pastor shall move shall pay the moving and transportation expenses of said pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary. When the Conference demands the services of any one, that it shall bear the moving expenses, if any expense shall be incurred.

3. No charge shall call any one as pastor, or to supply the work by ministers coming from other denominations as long as there are ministers in our Conference qualified and available to take work. The President after he has exercised his prerogative in the reception of ministers coming from other denominations is to immediately refer them to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders, who shall make a thorough investigation as to the ministry and life of such applicants, who shall report their findings to the President, after which, appointments may be made.

4. Each charge should grant their pastor each year two weeks vacation with pay.

5. The Sunday School offerings of one Sunday of each month shall be divided equally by the local treasurer between "Home Missions" and "Conference Expense Fund" until these budgets are in full. The same to be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer, quarterly.

6. The Annual business meeting of the local church, which is referred to in Par. 165 (4) of the Discipline, shall be held during the month of June.

### IV. Conference.

1. Each Annual Conference shall be held at Fairmount, Indiana, beginning on the Tuesday nearest August eighth.

2. The first Sunday of the Annual Gathering belongs to the old conference year and the second Sunday of the Annual Gathering belongs to the new conference year, this applies to pastoral appointment.

3. The fiscal year begins July 1st and ends June 30.

4. The sitting of the Conference for each day is considered as one meeting.

5. In examination of characters the Conference officials shall be called first.

6. The President and his advisory board shall be consulted before any love offering shall be taken.

7. The Secretary and the Assistant Secretary constitute a committee on communications.

8. The Assistant Secretary is to act as reporter of the Conference to the Marion Daily papers.

9. The Treasurers shall submit their report by July 25th, to the Auditing Committee who shall audit the same and in their report to this body they shall show they have audited the same.



10. The Board of Trustees are authorized to act as the Conference Missionary Board.

11. The Board of Trustees shall authorize all disbursements not otherwise provided for.

12. The President shall receive \$100.00, the Vice President \$50.00, the Secretary \$100.00, the Treasurer \$300.00, the Assistant Secretary \$50.00, each member of the Auditing Committee \$25.00, each member of the Statistical Committee \$40.00; Pension Plan Treasurer \$100.00 and expenses; the expenses of the Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders; the same to be paid from the Conference Expense Fund. The Conference Sunday School Secretary shall receive \$100.00 and each member of the Conference Sunday School Board \$50.00, the same to be paid out of the Sunday School Treasury.

13. The President of the Conference, and Vice President shall be given each year a two weeks vacation with pay, said vacation to be at a time of their own choosing.

14. When the churches which have been placed in the hands of the President decides as to who shall be their pastor before the Minutes are sent to press, the same shall be entered in the minutes as if ordered by this Conference.

15. The emergency Benefit Fund shall be used for the relief of ministers of the conference or their widows who shall make application to the Conference President for financial assistance in time of sickness or other emergency. This fund to be administered by the Conference Board of Trustees.

16. All churches receiving regular financial aid from the Conference Extension Fund shall be under the direction of the Missionary Board.

17. The Building Committee shall be elected by the Missionary Board except one member who shall be elected by the Conference.

18. That the Conference Secretary be authorized to purchase a floral offering for the family in the event of death of any of our ministers. The same to apply to elders or conference preachers in the events of the death of the minister's husband, wife, son or daughter. The father and mother of the Conference Officials, who are not pastors, shall be included. When requested the price of the flowers shall be given as a missionary memorial. The memorial to be paid from the Conference Expense Fund.

19. In the election of President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer, the first ballot shall be a nominating ballot. The two names receiving the highest number of votes shall be the nominees.

#### **V. Committees.**

1. The Committee on Elders Orders is to transfer all persons to the study list who may have been recommended to travel and may not have been given work, providing they are meeting the disciplinary requirements in the course of study.

2. When recommendations to travel and to study preparatory to travel are presented to the Conference in session, they shall be recorded by the Secretary and automatically referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders, without having been read to the Conference.

3. The Camp Meeting Committee shall nominate and the Conference elect the one to preach the opening sermon of the next Conference Year with his alternate.

4. The Conference shall elect five members of the Camp Meeting Committee. Three of which are to be ministerial members, one to be elected each year for a term of three years; two to be lay members, one to be elected each year for a term of two years.

5. No building or major repair involving structural changes on church

property shall be undertaken without the approval of the Conference Building Committee.

#### **VI. Other Resolutions.**

1. The use of the wedding ring is not in accord with our standards as a Church, therefore we as a Conference disapprove of our ministers performing or taking part in the ring ceremony.

#### **VII. Burial Association.**

1. Each local church should elect a Local Secretary for the Burial Association, whose duty it would be to promote the interests of the Association and to seek to obtain new members for the same. And if the church so elects, collect the dues of members and forward them to the General Secretary.

2. We earnestly request that the pastor present, or have presented, the work of the Burial Association at least once during the conference year, and seek to obtain new members for the same.

#### **VIII. Pension Plan.**

1. Let it be clearly understood by every member of the Conference that aside from the provisions of the Pension Plan the Conference has no fund upon which to draw to meet the financial needs of the superannuated or permanently incapacitated ministers or their dependents.

2. Let it be further understood by the membership of the Conference that following the rise of the 1952 Indiana Annual Conference any eligible minister who has failed to join the plan will have voluntarily waived his right, and that of his dependents, to any financial aid from the Conference in the case of his superannuation, or physical disability, which forced him to retire from active service within the Conference before or after the age of retirement.

3. Any person receiving a pastoral or general evangelist appointment, excepting those who were serving at the time of the 1954 annual conference or those appointed to such work at that conference, shall be required to become a member of the Superannuated Pension Plan.

3. August 18—Received a Letter of Transfer from the Kentucky Conference for Conference Preacher, Harold Freeman.
4. August 29—Organized a church of 5 members at 1332 East Mulberry Street in Kokomo, received the church into the Conference, declared it to be a Wesleyan Methodist Church, and appointed Walter Speck pastor of the new church.
5. September 1—After conferring with two members of the Eaton, Ohio, church I appointed Calvin Revis as their pastor, subject to the receipt of his Letter of Transfer from the Kentucky Conference.
6. September 8—At the request of the pulpit supply committee of the Plymouth church, I appointed Ralph and Olive Coleson as co-pastors of their church.
7. September 9—Received written notice that the Elwood church had voted to have Paul Titus serve as assistant pastor. I granted the request and appointed him as assistant pastor.
8. October 29—Due to the ill health of his wife, L. A. Singer resigned from the pastorate of the Summitville church. I accepted his resignation and, at his request, appointed him to the work of General Evangelism.
9. November 10—Raymond Feaster had been appointed by the Conference as pastor of the Hamilton Mission church. On the above date, I received written notice that Brother and Sister Feaster had been received as members of the Carmel Wesleyan church. With prior evidence that Brother Feaster was a recorded minister in the Central Yearly Meeting of the Friends, I received him as an elder in the conference, subject to the provision of the Discipline.

## Report No. 6

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE AND  
APPROPRIATIONS

We, the Committee on Finance and Appropriations submit the following recommendations:

## Item I. Budget.

A. The budget apportionment per member shall be as follows:

Foreign Missions .....	\$2.00
Home Missions .....	1.25
Australia .....	.25
Hephizibah Orphanage .....	.25
Education .....	3.00
Superannuated Pension Plan .....	1.50
Administrative Budget .....	.50
General Conference Expense .....	.15
Conference Expense .....	2.75
Camp Meeting Expense .....	.75
Emergency Benefit Fund .....	.50
For construction of Conference Parsonage No. 2.....	1.00

B. The Sunday School Apportionment shall be 20¢ per enrolled member in the main school as reported in the conference minutes of the preceding year, under: (total in main school).

C. The Conference Minutes shall be 50¢ per copy with a minimum of one for every six members of the church and should any deficit occur, it shall be met from the Conference Expense Fund.

D. The General Wesleyan Youth dues shall be \$1.50 per active member of Wesleyan Youth.

E. All church budget excepting that raised by the W.M.S., the Y.M.W.B., and Wesleyan Youth shall be sent to the conference treasurer.

Item II. The President shall have general supervision of the Work of the Conference.

A. The visitation schedule shall be so arranged that each church in the Conference shall be visited once during the year by either the President or the Vice-President.

B. The Vice-President shall be responsible for the supervision and the Extension Work of the Conference, subject to the counsel and approval of the Missionary Board. Each quarter he shall visit each church or pastor that is regularly receiving conference support and/or under the direction of the Missionary Board, to counsel, advise, and help those pioneer pastors and churches with their problems. The pastors of those churches are asked to make monthly reports to the Vice President. He shall pass on these reports either to the Missionary Board or its Executive Committee at least quarterly. He and the district superintendents shall be responsible to seek for openings throughout the Conference and report the same to the Missionary Board. It shall be his duty to see that funds are raised for Extension Work, and he shall be assisted in the promotion of this enlarged program by two other ministers nominated by the Pastoral Relations Committee and elected by this Conference. This committee of three shall meet at least quarterly.

C. Funds for Conference Extension.

1. A minimum goal of \$4.00 per member shall be raised for conference extension.

2. Due to the high cost of buying property in a city the Rally Day offering shall apply on the Fort Wayne-Leith Street project again this

year; the offering will be counted toward the goal. This meets with the approval of the Sunday School Board.

3. Beginning with the 1956 conference session, the occasion of the annual tithing service shall be used for the promotion of and the raising of funds for Conference Extension, and these funds shall not be counted toward the goal.

D. There shall be nominated by the Pastoral Relations Committee and elected by the Conference, a District Superintendent for each of the Conference Districts, who will assist the Vice-President in carrying out the Conference Extension work. It shall be their duty to inform the Vice President of any possible openings for the extension of the work of the church in their respective districts. They shall assist in the raising of Conference Extension Funds. The pastors in each district are urged to cooperate and expected to do so.

E. Each church shall elect annually a local Conference Extension Secretary whose duties shall be to keep the needs of Conference Extension before the people and to act as their prayer reminders.

Item III. All quarterly meetings shall be arranged for by the pastor and his advisory board and shall be held near the close of each fiscal quarter. The pastor shall report quarterly to the President and Vice Presidents on blanks formulated by the President. This report shall be sent in immediately following the quarterly business meeting.

Item IV. The salary of the President shall be \$325.00 per month, and that of the Vice-President \$275.00; the same to be paid by the Conference Treasurer monthly, with expenses incidental to their work. The Vice President shall receive \$40.00 per month parsonage rent. The President and Vice President shall employ secretarial help as needed, to be paid for from Conference Expense.

Item V. The INDIANA WESLEYAN MESSENGER.

A. The President and the Vice President shall constitute the Executive Committee of the WESLEYAN MESSENGER.

B. The Vice President shall be the Editor.

C. The Executive Committee shall be empowered to select some person as Business and Circulation Manager.

D. The departments which use the columns of the WESLEYAN MESSENGER regularly shall make contributions toward the expenses of the same.

Item VI. Ministerial Meetings.

A. The President shall call a meeting of the ministers and their wives in the different parts of the conference during the conference year.

B. The purpose of this meeting is to promote the work of the conference. The President shall set forth goals, suggest means of attaining these goals, and in general seek to promote a greater interest in the Conference program.

C. All pastors shall be required to attend this meeting except when a legitimate cause may hinder.

Item VII. Standing Rules.

A. Under the Resolutions and Laws of the Conference, Item IV, paragraph 15 shall be changed to read as follows: "The Emergency Benefit Fund shall be used for the relief of ministers of the conference or their widows who shall make application to the Conference President for financial assistance in time of sickness or other emergency. This fund is to be administered by the Conference Board of Trustees."

B. The following shall become a standing rule: "When a pastor fails to raise, in full, the Superannuate Pension Budget, he shall report to the character committee a satisfactory reason for not doing so. Any person

receiving a pastoral or general evangelist appointment, excepting those who were serving at the time of the 1954 annual conference or those appointed to such work at that conference, shall be required to become a member of the Superannuated Pension Plan."

C. The following shall also become a standing rule: "The expense of the Committee on Itinerary and Elders' Orders shall be met from the Conference Expense fund."

## REPORT OF THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

We, your Committee on Resolutions, submit the following report:

We bow our heads in reverence and thank our heavenly Father for His kind providence over us, for the progress which has been made during the past year, and for the challenge of the opportunities before us.

1. We reaffirm the historic position of the church on matters of Christian doctrine and holy living. We plead that our people guard against imitating the world in its strut and mannerisms, as is portrayed by radio, television, and the printed page. We urge our people to practice and teach diligently, reverence for the Lord's Day. We uphold the standard of the church regarding the wearing of modest apparel, as becometh saints.

2. Recognizing the great evil of divorce, we believe that we should teach our youth, by precept and example, the sanctity of the home. We regret the many moral and spiritual losses resulting from marriages with those of non-evangelical faith, and we commend our youth camps and organizations for their efforts toward preserving our youth to the church.

3. In view of the local, national, and international situations facing the church, we recommend continued support of our Wesleyan Service-men's commission, our educational institutions, and temperance organizations. Let every member of the church be faithful in the performance of civic duties.

4. With the growing unrest about us, we urge our people to be living witnesses of the abundant grace of God, and to manifest a quiet and restful spirit. We believe this can be realized by maintaining the family altar, by showing reverence in the house of worship, and by faithfully attending the prayer meetings. Let us be diligent in honoring God with our material substance, and in showing respect for our God-appointed ministry and leadership. We exhort both our ministry and laity to seek fresh anointings in the performance of love service to God and the church.

## Report No. 15

## SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

Realizing the great opportunity that is ours and the challenge presented on Sunday School night by Dr. Nicholson, we urge that every pastor

and Sunday School Board plan and work for a great increase in attendance and revival in our S.S. The population is increasing every year; new public schools are being erected to house the growing population of children. We must reach more for Christ and the Church. We recommend whole hearted co-operation with the denominational program and September as crusade month. Rally Day is set for Oct. 2. We recommend that a big Rally Day offering be received for Church Extension and that this count on the \$4.00 per member goal.

The following memorial was passed at General Conference and voted to become effective at once.

Amend paragraph 73 as follows: Classify material now appearing in paragraph 73 as subparagraph (1). Place the following as subparagraph (2):

"The church may receive as Junior Members, children and young people between seven and sixteen years of age who give affirmative answers to the questions: (1) Does the Lord now forgive your sins? (2) Will you endeavor to govern your life by the Word of God and the teaching of the Church?"

Junior Members may be advanced to associate or full membership at any time by vote of the Church. Junior Membership shall terminate automatically when one becomes seventeen years of age. The church shall not be assessed budget for Junior Members. Junior members shall not be permitted to vote or hold office in the church. This provision for Junior Membership should in no sense be considered a substitute for those who are qualified for full membership."

We recommend that more consideration be given our children and that they be received into Junior Membership as soon as they qualify.

# Journal of Daily Proceedings

**Tuesday 1 p. m.**

The twenty-sixth session of the Indiana Wesleyan Youth Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America convened in the Young Peoples' Tabernacle on the Fairmount Camp Ground, Fairmount, Indiana, at 1 p.m., August 9, 1955.

**Opening**—Congregational singing was led by the Rev. W. T. McMahan. Devotions were conducted by the Rev. James Eastburn, who read from the book of Exodus 32: 25-30. He commented on verse 26 and offered prayer.

**Call to Order**—The conference was called to order by the president, Don H. Polston.

**Roll Call**—Four officers, 2 district chairmen, 2 Camp Meeting Committee members, 7 presidents, and 48 delegates answered the roll call.

**Conference Bar**—By vote the conference bar was fixed as the first six rows of seats including the rostrum.

**Motion**—It was moved and supported that we seat the pastors as honorary members of the conference and that they have the right to speak on any question.

**President's Message**—The president read his annual message and upon motion it was accepted.

**Calendar of Business**—The president presented the Calendar of Business and Special Orders. Upon motion those were adopted. (See Report No. 1)

**Election of Committeess**—The report of the Nominating Committee was read and upon vote was adopted as amended. (See Report No. 2)

**Special Order**—The Special Order, reports of district chairmen, was called. Report from districts 7, 12, 5, 6, 4, and 1 were read and upon motion were approved.

**Adjournment**—Adjourned by limitation of time.

**Benediction**—Rev. Lee Haines.

**Wednesday 1 p. m.**

# Standing Rules

1. The first session of the W.Y.P.S. Conference shall convene Tuesday afternoon of conference week at one o'clock, and sessions shall continue daily until all business is transacted.

2. The president shall appoint the chairman of each committee, and the executive council shall nominate the rest of the members of the committee; their report to be read and voted upon in the first session of annual conference.

3. All organized societies shall keep permanent records of membership and finances. The list of members shall be revised at the close of each conference year.

4. The Ways and Means Committee shall be composed of five members elected by the W.Y.P.S. Conference and a sixth member chosen from and by the Committee on Finance and Appropriations, of the main conference body.

5. There shall be a W.Y.P.S. Camp Meeting Committee of five members. The president of the W.Y.P.S. shall be chairman ex-officio; the others. The president of the W.Y.P.S. shall be chairman ex-officio; the other four members to be elected for a term of four years. One shall be elected annually or until their successor is elected; so that the term of all will not expire at the same time. The W.Y.P.S. Camp Meeting Committee shall elect one of its members as treasurer of the Youth Camp.

6. There shall be a Youth Camp of one week duration and the date of the camp shall be set by the W.Y.P.S. Camp Meeting Committee.

7. Members of the Executive Council shall not hold the office of District Chairman, but shall work in co-operation with and under the direction of the president.

8. There shall be elected an assistant secretary whose duty shall be to assist the secretary and to compile the statistics. The secretary shall be given the privilege of making the nomination.

9. All churches shall send their delegates credentials and statistical report to the secretary by July 5.

10. The Executive Council of the W.Y.P.S. shall have complete charge of helping new works.

11. The local society president shall consult with the pastor when making out their annual W.Y.P.S. report, to avoid inconsistencies in the same.

12. Two copies of the report of the Ways and Means Committee shall be mailed to each church and district, within three weeks after the close of conference.

13. Special mention will be made of all societies raising full budget.

14. The executive committee of each local W.Y.P.S. should consult with the pastor and his board of stewards before planning its financial program for the year.

15. All money raised by the local societies, other than local projects, shall be sent to the conference W.Y.P.S. treasurer not later than July 5.

16. There shall be a missionary committee elected by each local society, who shall be responsible for one missionary service each month.

17. The W.Y.P.S. treasurer shall pay from the Conference Expense Fund each year the sum of twenty-five dollars toward the expense of printing the minutes. The W.Y.P.S. secretary shall co-operate with the conference secretaries in determining the number of pages used.

18. The Camp Meeting Committee shall be seated as members of the Conference.

19. Each district shall elect an adult counselor to counsel and assist in the plans of the district. This advisor may be beyond the age of membership in Wesleyan Youth.

## Report No. 6

REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE  
(Finance and Appropriations)

## I. Rallies

A. We recommend that each district co-operate with the following conference program as to rallies:

1. That quarterly rallies and, if possible, monthly rallies be held in each district, and that each church be notified at least two Sundays previously, and that notices of said rallies be sent to pastors and local presidents.

2. That an additional promotional rally be held in each district, as soon as possible after conference, under the supervision of the Conference Executive Council, and that they be authorized to secure the Area President or another denominational leader.

3. That the district president call a meeting of the local presidents, district officers, and district adult counselor as soon as practical after the promotional rally for the purpose of setting definite goals, including more rallies in the district, better planned programs, better promotional plans, and a definite evangelistic emphasis.

4. That the following point system for district banner be adopted: local society president or vice president present at rally, 5 points; pastor present, 5 points; for each new subscription to the WESLEYAN YOUTH since the last rally, (that new subscriptions shall be those who have not been subscribers within the last year) 5 points; for each renewal to the WESLEYAN YOUTH, since the last rally, 3 points; an organized society, 10 points; for each 1 per cent of the active society members present (to be based on the current number of members), 1 point; for each non-member present, 1 point; for each mile traveled to the rally site, 1 point. The reports of at least the highest two shall be read at the rally and the society with the highest total is to be the winner.

5. That the conference print and distribute to the local societies suitable blanks to implement the point system.

6. That there be a conference rally held on the campground on Memorial Day, and that the conference banner be awarded using the district rally point system except that the WESLEYAN YOUTH new subscriptions and renewals shall not be counted. The president or vice president, pastor, members, and non-members shall be counted for each service.

## II. Projects

A. For conference project we recommend the following:

1. In keeping with the emphasis of the church extension program, that we offer services or finances needed for at least one evangelistic campaign or survey this year, and that this assistance be rendered in such areas as deemed advisable by the Conference Board of Trustees, and to such an extent as deemed advisable by the Executive Council.

2. That we participate in a Foreign Missionary Project (under the suggestion and counsel of the W.M.S.) to such an extent as deemed advisable by the Executive Council.

3. That we participate in the crusade plans sponsored by the General Conference W.Y.P.S. (Wesleyan Youth).

B. For local society we recommend the following:

1. That the General W.Y.P.S. (Wesleyan Youth) Efficiency Standard be adopted and promoted, and that each society rating be reported in the annual statistical reports.

2. That each society plan visitation programs and special meetings

with members of the society such as jail services, hospital and shut-in visitations, distributing tracts, radio programs, and street meetings.

### III. Finance

#### A. For finance we recommend the following:

1. That the area president receive entertainment and traveling expenses while traveling our conference, the same to be paid by the group asking his service.

2. That the salary of the conference officers be as follows:

- a. President—\$120.00
- b. Vice President—\$50.00
- c. Secretary—\$50.00
- d. Treasurer—\$75.00
- e. Assistant Secretary—\$10.00

Said salary to be paid in equal payments, on December 15, and the other June 15.

3. That the desk and traveling expenses of the president, vice president, secretary, and treasurer, be paid from the Conference Expense Fund; and the desk and traveling expenses of the Youth Camp Committee be paid from the Youth Camp Treasury and the said expenses be paid at least quarterly. That traveling expense be figured on the basis of 6 cents per mile.

4. That the budget for the following year be as follows:

- a. General Dues, \$1.50 per active member of the society.
- b. Conference Budget (based on church membership)
  - 20 cents, Conference Extension Fund
  - 25 cents, Conference Expense Fund
  - 20 cents, Youth Camp Fund

c. That above funds be sent in quarterly on remittance blanks furnished by the conference. Inasmuch as this is based on church membership, the church should feel its responsibility to aid the society when necessary.

d. That all churches assisted by Wesleyan Youth Conference Extension Fund shall report church attendance, finance, and spiritual condition quarterly to the Conference W.Y.P.S. (Wesleyan Youth) President, who shall in turn report the same to district chairmen.

5. That the Executive Council shall have power to appropriate money from the Conference Expense Fund for the general promotion of the youth work.

6. That all offerings above the operating expenses of the District Rallies be sent to the Conference Treasurer to apply on conference projects.

7. That all monies raised within the society for missions be forwarded to the W.Y.P.S. (Wesleyan Youth) Conference Treasurer for departmental credit and that said money be raised by monthly missionary offerings, and be sent in quarterly with the W.Y.P.S. (Wesleyan Youth) budget.

5 Conference Officials, 33 Presidents and 47 Delegates responded to the calling of the roll.

The minutes were read and approved as read.

The Conference Magazine Solicitor reported 67 subscriptions to the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY had been received.

The Registrar gave a final reading of her report which upon motion was adopted.

The report of the Finance Committee was read and accepted by vote. (See Report No. 8)

The Prayer Partner Report of 78 Prayer Partner circles and 1491 Prayer Partners in the conference was given by the Prayer Partner Secretary.

The Courtesy Committee presented Dr. David T. Tsutada, president of the Immanuel church in Japan and three Japanese young men, Samuel Arai, Benjamin Saoshiro and John Tsutada. Dr. Tsutada spoke briefly leaving with us three words from Hebrews 3:14, hold—confidence—steadfast. He solicited our prayers as he returns to Japan to labor among his own people.

Each of the three Japanese young men who graduated from Houghton College this June "cum laude" gave their testimonies. The Lord's presence was very near and our hearts melted as they sang "What a Friend we have in Jesus". May our prayers be with them as they return to their native land to preach the glorious gospel.

The President stated that by Conference action a \$4.00 per member goal had been set for Conference Extension and suggested that the W.M.S. raise one fourth of this amount the third quarter.

A motion carried that when we adjourn we adjourn to meet at the call of the chair.

The minutes were read and approved as read.

Adjourned upon motion.

The closing prayer was offered by Mrs. Eva Crim.

**Special Order—Public Service, Friday, 7:30 p. m.**

Mrs. Elizabeth Leach, Conference W.M.S. President was in charge of this service which was held in Bethel tabernacle. Congregational singing was conducted by Mrs. Ruth Ann Polston.

Mrs. Olive Coleson, former missionary to India, offered prayer.

A special number in song entitled "A World Wide Revival" was presented by a preachers wives sextette.

Rev. R. S. Nicholson, Jr., missionary to Japan, spoke briefly. He said in part "Jesus is coming soon, this fact makes our hearts rejoice yet we are sad because millions are not ready. More heathen people have heard the name of Jesus Christ as an oath on the lips of American service men than have heard of Christ as a Saviour." He introduced Dr. David Tsutada of Japan who was the speaker of the evening.

Dr. Tsutada brought an inspiring message. He stated that his desire was to show us how God has undertaken in Japan and to impress upon our hearts the fact that our God is a living God, an able God, a rich God, a Faithful God and a Willing God. He informed us that the greatest need at present in the work is an enlargement of the College buildings so they can accommodate the many young people who are waiting to attend college.

A Missionary offering in Cash and pledges amounting to \$2,041.50 was received for the expansion of the college in Japan.

Mrs. Eilene Kindley, Conference Y.M.W.B. Superintendent, offered the closing prayer.

### **RESOLUTIONS, RECOMMENDATIONS AND STANDING RULES OF THE SOCIETY**

1. It shall be a standing rule of this body until revoked, that no person or society be permitted to solicit funds for benevolent or missionary purposes that are not provided for in the regular channels, excepting they shall first obtain the approval of the Executive Board.

2. We recommend that the one dollar dues be sent in undivided.

3. We recommend that the local treasurer's books close June 30.

4. We recommend that the credential blanks be sent to the Conference Secretary by July 5.

5. We recommend that the Conference Treasurer's books of the Woman's Missionary Society and the Y.M.W.B. close July 5.

6. We recommend that we discontinue the observance of Harvest Day as observed heretofore.

7. The President shall receive \$100.00, the Vice President \$50.00, the Secretary \$50.00, the Treasurer \$75.00, the Y.M.W.B. Superintendent \$50.00 and each member of the Statistical Committee \$10.00. The same to be paid from the undivided fund.

8. We recommend that the time of the business meetings be as follows: Tuesday, Thursday and Friday, 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m.; Wednesday 8:00 a.m. to 11:00 a.m.

## Report No. 4

## PLAN OF WORK

We, the Committee on the Plan of Work submit the following recommendations in accordance with the General Conference Plan of Work.

## I. Devotional

We recommend:

1. That we carefully observe the monthly prayer requests in the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY magazine and other special requests as presented.
2. The observance of the Monthly Fast and Prayer Day.
3. That April be designated Self-Denial Month.
4. The promotion of a Prayer Partner Circle in each society making use of new prayer partner reminders and that reports be sent to the Conference Prayer Partner Secretary.
5. That stress be placed upon personal evangelism including children, adolescents, the aged, and with special emphasis upon the Jew.

## II. Home Work

We recommend:

1. That each local society contribute liberally to the General Home Fund for the support of Special Missions (See WESLEYAN MISSIONARY) and church Extension Work.
2. That each local society contribute five dollars or more annually for the support of the Hephzibah Orphanage, the same to be applied on budget.
3. The use of designated Thank-offering envelope for Home Missions.
4. That local societies inquire into the needs of the Home Mission stations and orphanages before sending used clothing and that no monetary value be placed on same; that such boxes of new merchandise be reported as to monetary value and that the sending society evaluate the same, the voucher evaluation signed by the missionary be forwarded to Conference Woman's Missionary Society Treasurer for proper receipting.
5. We urge each local society to respond to the Card Call Plan and thus assist in the extension program of the Church.

## III. Foreign Work

We recommend:

1. That we co-operate with the Foreign Missionary Department in the support of its entire foreign missionary program.
2. That we forward Sunday School charts, cards, and flannelgraph materials to our Missionary Home, 32 Bergen Avenue, Jersey City, New Jersey.
3. The continuance of the mile-of dimes project, monies from such to be allocated for mission field equipment.

## IV. Medical Missions

We recommend:

1. That our local societies make bandages\* and that these be forwarded promptly to the Missionary Home, to await outgoing missionaries, the number of pounds to be reported with no value attached.
2. That each local society contribute three dollars or more annually to the Medical Student Fund, not to apply on budget.

\*Bandages should be 2", 3", or 4" in width, sewn together in 10 yard



lengths with flat seams, and rolled firmly into rolls, not exceed 3" in diameter. Bound squares of blankets are needed in infant care.

### V. Educational

We recommend:

1. The co-operation of our local societies in the promotion of the Honorary Enrollment Plan for the Colleges. The monies for this project should be channeled through the Local Conference.

2. That we supplement our Educational Program by giving to the Foreign Student Aid Fund.

### VI. Literature

We recommend:

1. The use of the combination treasurer's blank for the remitting of money by the Local Conference Treasurers.

2. That a concerted effort be made to increase the subscription list of the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY by faithfully securing renewals and new subscriptions to include every home in the church and Sunday School, with January being observed as campaign month.

3. That we promote the Mission Study and Reading Course; the use of the Study Book designated each year with Program Calendars and other helps.

### Area Work

We recommend:

1. That all home and foreign appeals for special needs be made to the General Executive Board of our Woman's Missionary Society and they in turn channel these needs to the Area Chairman who will present them to the conference presidents in their areas.

We further recommend that the gifts be sent as directed by the Area Chairmen.

We further recommend that the Conference W.M.S. President direct Christmas gifts according to suggestions from Area Chairmen.
