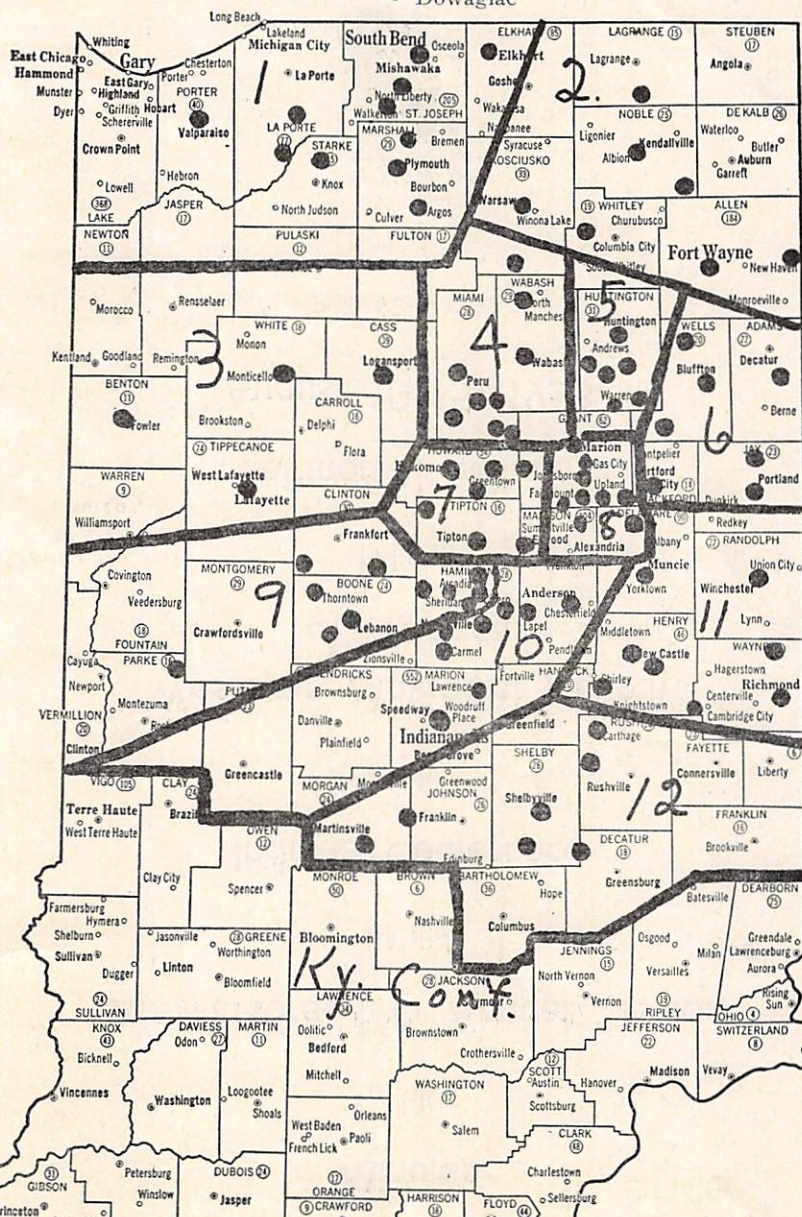

Resolutions and Laws of the Indiana Conference

I. Houses of Worship.

1. Our houses of worship should not be open to any evangelist or minister of any other church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain a regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments. A waving of the above by a contract or lease of building must be obtained through the Board of Trustees of the Indiana Conference.

II. Pastoral Duties

1. It is the duty of the pastors to look after the insurance of our church and parsonage properities. All insurance shall provide for losses caused by fire and lightning, hail, and tornado. A failure on the part of the pastor shall be a censurable offense. If the church fails to insure their property upon reasonable effort of the pastor to secure, the same, then said failure shall be reported to the President of the Conference who shall then have the property insured. In such cases all insurance monies received from losses by fire, lightning, hail and tornado shall be used in Church Extension work as the Conference Board of Trustees considers best.

2. Each pastor and evangelist shall file a complete statistical report with the statistical committee without fail by July 10th.

A. The pastor shall report in open conference the items listed on special blanks furnished by the Conference.

B. The official character of any pastor or evangelist shall not be passed until he shall have submitted a satisfactory report including statistics.

C. In compiling statistics report, all figures shall be given in even dollars at the nearest dollar, i. e., \$1.01 to \$1.50 shall be reported as \$1.00 and from \$1.51 to \$1.99 shall be reported as \$2.00. The item number VIII on benevolences alone to be excepted and shall be reported exactly as paid.

3. All unaccounted for members appearing in the statistics in the membership list shall be referred to the discontinued list. All members in excess of the number reported shall be reported received.

4. The pastor shall bring a report to each Quarterly Meeting and send a duplicate to the Conference President and Vice President, quarterly, on blanks furnished by the Conference.

5. This Conference asks each pastor to prepare a calling list of all the homes connected with the Church and Sunday school; listing the relationship they hold to the church; listing their names and addresses by city; street and number, the same to be kept for his own work while on the pastorate and to be given to his successor on the field.

6. No pastor whose total receipts are \$2500.00 or more shall hold more than two revivals yearly away from his charge, one of which is mentioned in resolution seven under pastoral duties, unless by consent of the President and his Advisory Board.

7. Each pastor whose total pastor's receipt exceed \$2500.00 a year

should seek to organize a new class or give his services in a revival meeting to a new or weaker church, to help establish it. The Church which he pastors should grant him such privileges without censure, with full remuneration of salary while in such a meeting. The Vice President shall serve as Co-ordinator, to recommend and help arrange such meetings.

8. Delegate's Credentials secured from the Secretary shall be mailed to the Assistant Secretary by the pastor, by July the 10th.

III Churches

1. All charges with a membership of twenty-five or more shall in addition to the regular stipulated salary, assume the responsibility of providing a suitable home in which the pastor may live.

2. All charges and stations to which a pastor shall move shall pay the moving and transportation expenses of said pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary. When the Conference demands the services of any one, that it shall bear the moving expenses, if any expense shall be incurred.

3. No charge shall call any one as pastor, or to supply the work by ministers coming from other denominations as long as there are ministers in our Conference qualified and available to take work. The President after he has exercised his prerogative in the reception of ministers coming from other denominations is to immediately refer then to the Committee on Itineracy and Elders Orders, who shall make a thorough investigation as to the ministry and life of such applicants, who shall report their findings to the President, after which, appointments may be made.

4. Each charge should grant their pastor each year two weeks vacation with pay.

5. The Sunday School offerings of one Sunday of each month shall be divided equally by the local treasurer between "Home Missions" and "Conference Expense Fund" until these budgets are in full. The same to be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer, quarterly.

IV Conference.

1. Each Annual Conference shall be held at Fairmount, Indiana, beginning on the Tuesday nearest August eighth.

2. The first Sunday of the Annual Gathering belongs to the old conference year and the second Sunday of the Annual Gathering belongs to the new conference year, this applies to pastoral appointment.

3. The fiscal year begins July 1st and ends June 30.

4. The sitting of the Conference for each day is considered as one meeting.

5. In examination of characters the Conference officials shall be called first.

6. The President and his advisory board shall be consulted before any love offering shall be taken.

7. The Secretary and the Assistant Secretary constitute a committee on communications.

8. The Assistant Secretary is to act as reporter of the Conference to the Marion Daily papers.

9. The Treasurers shall submit their report by July 25th, to the Audit-

ing Committee who shall audit the same and in their report to this body they shall show they have audited the same.

10. The Board of Trustees are authorized to act as the Conference Missionary Board.

11. The Board of Trustees shall authorize all disbursements not otherwise provided for.

12. The President shall receive \$100.00, the Vice President \$50.00, the Secretary \$100.00, the Treasurer \$300.00, the Assistant Secretary \$50.00, each member of the Auditing Committee \$25.00, each member of the Statistical Committee \$40.00; the same to be paid from the Conference Expense Fund. The Conference Sunday School Secretary shall receive \$100.00 and each member of the Conference Sunday School Board \$50.00, the same to be paid out of the Sunday School Treasury.

13. The President of the Conference, and Vice President shall be given each year a two weeks vacation with pay, said vacation to be at a time of their own choosing.

14. When the churches which have been placed in the hands of the President decides as to who shall be their pastor before the Minutes are sent to press, the same shall be entered in the minutes as if ordered by this Conference.

15. "The Emergency Benefit Fund" shall be used only for the relief of the ministers, or their widows, of the Conference in times of sickness, or death, or other needs of emergency character. This fund to be administered by the Conference Board of Trustees.

16. All churches receiving regular financial aid from the Conference Extension Fund shall be under the direction of the Missionary Board.

17. The Building Committee shall be elected by the Missionary Board except one member who shall be elected by the Conference.

18. That the Conference Secretary be authorized to purchase a floral offering for the family in the event of death of any of our ministers. The same to apply to elders or conference preachers in the event of the death of the minister's husband, wife, son or daughter. The father and mother of the Conference Officials, who are not pastors, shall be included. When requested the price of the flowers shall be given as a missionary memorial. The memorial to be paid from the Conference Expense Fund.

V. Committees

1. The Committee on Elders Orders is to transfer all persons to the study list who may have been recommended to travel and may not have been given work, providing they are meeting the disciplinary requirements in the course of study.

2. When recommendations to travel and to study preparatory to travel are presented to the Conference in session, they shall be recorded by the Secretary and automatically referred to the Committee on Itinerary and Elders Orders, without having been read to the Conference.

3. The Camp Meeting Committee shall nominate and the Conference elect the one to preach the opening sermon of the next Conference Year with his alternate.

4. The Conference shall elect five members of the Camp Meeting Committee. Three of which are to be ministerial members, one to be elected each year for a term of three years; two to be lay members, one to be elected each year for a term of two years.

5. No building or major repair involving structural changes on church property shall be undertaken without the approval of the Conference Building Committee.

VI. Other Resolutions.

1. The use of the wedding ring is not in accord with our standards as a Church, therefore we as a Conference disapprove of our ministers performing or taking part in the ring ceremony.

VII. Burial Association.

1. Each local church should elect a Local Secretary for the Burial Association, whose duty it would be to promote the interests of the Association and to seek to obtain new members for the same. And if the church so elects, collect the dues of members and forward them to the General Secretary.

2. We earnestly request that the pastor present, or have presented, the work of the Burial Association at least once during the conference year, and seek to obtain new members for the same.

VIII. Pension Plan.

1. Let it be clearly understood by every member of the Conference that aside from the provisions of the Pension Plan the Conference has no fund upon which to draw to meet the financial needs of the superannuated or permanently incapacitated ministers or their dependents.

2. Let it be further understood by the membership of the Conference that following the rise of the 1952 Indiana Annual Conference any eligible minister who has failed to join the plan will have voluntarily waived his right, and that of his dependents, to any financial aid from the Conference in the case of his superannuation, or physical disability, which forced him to retire from active service within the Conference before or after the age of retirement.

OFFICIAL ACTS OF THE PRESIDENT

1. August 26—After receiving word from the Winchester Church that they desired Earl E. Snider as their pastor and having received his statement that he was willing to serve them, I, therefore, appointed Earl E. Snider pastor of the Winchester Church.

2. September 1—Having learned that Woodrow Shields had agreed to serve the Deming church, I appointed him as their pastor.

3. September 1—At the request of C. D. Crabill and with the approval of the Advisory Board, I set the date for the Conference Treasurer's books to close on August 1st, 1953.

4. September 1—After learning that Wilbur G. Williams and the Mt. Olive Church had agreed together for ministerial labors for the coming Conference year, I appointed Brother Williams as their pastor.

5. September 8—The members of the Eaton, Ohio church desired Charles A. Miller of the North Michigan Conference as their pastor. and he was willing to serve them. I, therefore, appointed him as their pastor.

6. September 22—Ralph R. Prickett consented to accept the pastorate of the Valparaiso church. With the Conference Missionary Board agreeing and the church consenting thereto, I appointed Brother Prickett pastor of the Valparaiso church.

7. October 13—James A. DeWeerd notified me that he had accepted the pastorate of the Cadle Tabernacle. I recognized this appointment and later notified the Conference Secretary requesting that Brother DeWeerd's name be removed from the General Evangelist's list and placed under Other Labors as pastor of Cadle Tabernacle.

8. January 15—I accepted the resignation of William P. Fessenden from the office of Conference Temperance Secretary.

9. January 17—Having received a Letter of Standing from the Secretary of the Indiana Conference of the Pilgrim Holiness Church for Elder Walter Speck and having received written notice that he had joined the South Side Wesleyan Methodist Church in Kokomo, I, therefore, received him as a minister in the conference subject to the provisions of the Discipline. I then recognized his appointment as pastor of an interdenominational tabernacle in Kokomo.

10. January 31—With the approval of the Conference Missionary Board, I appointed George Manlove superintendent of the mission work in Hamilton.

11. February 19—Accepted the resignation of Helen F. Brock from the pastorate of the South Salem Church and appointed her to the work of Conference Evangelism.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE AND APPROPRIATIONS

We, the Committee on Finance and Appropriations submit the following report:

Item I. That the budget apportionment be per member as follows:

Home Missions	1.25

All church budget excepting that raised by the Y.M.W.B., the W.M.S., and the W.Y.P.S. be sent to the conference treasurer.

Item II. Superannuate Pension Plan.

Any individual, eligible for membership and having failed to join the plan, may become a member by paying the enrollment fee, providing he shall waive service credit for such years as he has not paid assessments.

When a pastor fails to raise, in full, the Superannuate Pension Budget, he shall report to the character committee a satisfactory reason for not doing so. Also the question, on statistical blank read to conference, shall be answered, "Are you a member of the Superannuate Pension Plan?"

Item III. That the Sunday School Apportionment be 20¢ per enrolled member in the main school as reported in the conference minutes of the preceding year, under: (Total in main school).

Item IV. That the Conference Minutes be 40¢ per copy with a minimum of one copy for every six members of the church and should any deficit occur, that it be paid from the Conference Expense Fund.

Item V. That the General W.Y.P.S. dues be \$1.00 per active member of the W.Y.P.S.

Item VI. That the President shall have general supervision of the work of the Conference.

A. We recommend that the President or Vice President arrange their schedule to visit each church in the conference at least once during the year.

B. The Vice President shall be responsible for the supervision and the promotion of the Extension work of the Conference, subject to the counsel and approval of the Missionary Board. Each quarter he shall visit each church, which is regularly receiving conference support and/or under the direction of the Missionary Board, to counsel, advise, and help those pioneer pastors with their problems. The pastors of these churches are asked to make monthly reports to the Vice President and to the Superintendent of the district in which the church is situated. The Vice President shall pass on these reports either to the Missionary Board or its Executive Committee at least quarterly. He and the District Superintendents shall be responsible to seek for openings throughout the border of the Conference and report the same to the Missionary Board. It shall be the duty of the Vice President to see that funds are raised for Extension work, and he may secure assistance as he may deem necessary to successfully carry out the same.

C. The minimum goal of \$2.00 per member be raised for Conference Extension. The Rally Day offering count on this goal and that every effort be put forth to meet a goal of two new churches this year.

D. 1. We further recommend that there be nominated by the Pastoral Relations Committee and elected by the Conference, a District Superintendent for each of the Conference Districts, who will assist the Vice President in carrying out the Conference Extension work.

2. We further recommend that each church elect annually a Local Conference Extension Secretary whose duties shall be to keep the needs of Conference Extension before the people and to act as their prayer reminders.

3. It shall be the duty also of the District Superintendent to inform the Vice President of any possible openings for the extension of the work of the church in his district. The District Superintendent shall assist in the raising of Conference Extension Funds. The pastors in each district are urged to co-operate and expected to do so.

4. We further recommend that the local church Conference Extension Secretaries and the District Superintendents promote the General Church Extension Program through the Card Call Plan in conjunction with their promotion of the Conference Church Extension Program.

Item VII. All quarterly meetings shall be arranged for by the pastor and his advisory board, and shall be held near the close of each fiscal quarter. The pastor shall report quarterly to the President and Vice President on blanks formulated by the President.

VIII. That the salary of the President be \$325.00 per month and the Vice President \$275.00 per month; the same to be paid by the Conference Treasurer monthly, with expenses incidental to their work.

Item IX. The Vice President shall receive \$40.00 per month parsonage rent.

Item X. We recommend that the President and Vice President employ secretarial help as needed, to be paid from Conference Expense.

Item XI. We recommend the following concerning the INDIANA WESLEYAN MESSENGER.

A. That the President and Vice President constitute the Executive Committee of the Wesleyan Messenger.

B. That the Vice President be the Editor.

C. That the executive committee be empowered to select some person as Business and Circulation Manager.

D. That the executive committee be authorized to employ an assistant as the need demands, to be mailing secretary for the business manager.

E. That the departments which use the columns of the Wesleyan Messenger regularly shall make contributions toward the expense of the same.

Item XII. We recommend that:

A. The President call a meeting of the ministers, and their wives, and Local Extension Secretaries, in the different parts of the conference early in the conference year.

B. The purpose of this meeting is to promote the work of the conference. The President shall set forth goals, suggest means of attaining these goals, and in general seek to promote greater interest in the Conference program.

C. All pastors shall be required to attend the meeting in item thirteen except when a legitimate cause may hinder.

Item XIII. In compliance with the recommendation in item thirteen of last years report, the committee studied, "plans for closer co-ordination between churches, pastors, and conference officials." This study revealed that other conferences have similar problems and have been looking for better methods of promoting the work.

It is the judgment of your committee that no plan, or combination of plans, now used by other conference would serve our purpose better than the one we are using. We recommend, however, that the Committee on Finance and Appropriations for the ensuing year continue to study and if a method of conference supervision is then found which would be an improvement over our own, they may recommend its adoption.

REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL BOARD

We recommend whole hearted co-operation with the denominational program with Sept. designated as a special emphasis month, and Rally Day being Oct. 4.

We recommend the Rally Day offering be received for the new church at Kingsford Heights and that this count toward our conference Extension goal.

The Junior Bible Camp enrollment of 287 continues to show a great interest and possibility of service to our Juniors. We greatly appreciate all who helped in the Camp this last year. Although this is a tremendous responsibility for the S. S. Board, we recommend that another such camp be held next summer the week following Youth Camp.

Report No. 14

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

We recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

1. By the adoption of this report the conference re-affirms the historic stand of the Church on matters of Christian doctrine and practice. Whereas we as a Wesleyan Methodist Church believe we have been called into existence to spread scriptural holiness "over these lands." We feel it important that we have an increased emphasis of the Wesleyan Doctrine of Perfect Love, or Entire Sanctification and that all our people be affectionately and earnestly urged to seek its attainment as a personal experience. We urge strict adherence to the discipline as to the standards of dress, parental authority, and reverence for holy things. Let those who appear in places of leadership, adhere to the standards of the church, especially those in the local church.

2. Whereas: There is an increasing tendency on the part of selfish and Godless interests to make our Sabbath more and more a day of commercial sports, amusements and business; and

Whereas: The best defense against Communism and other subversive organizations is the Church of Jesus Christ; and

Whereas: The church is seriously handicapped by the open Sunday, Therefore, Be it resolved that we condemn all efforts of the selfish interests to make Sunday a fun-day and a day of business and will continue our efforts to oppose every desecration of our Sabbath; and Be it further resolved that we appreciate the work done by the Lord's Day Alliance and pledge our hearty support.

3. Our youth are being constantly propagandized by the tobacco and liquor interest through radio, television, newspaper and magazine advertising. Therefore, we urge that our people give active support to the Indiana Temperance League and the Woman's Christian Temperance Union in the organized attempts to get more effective scientific temperance and narcotics education in the public schools, and that our churches through public meetings, the Sunday School Temperance lesson, the daily vacation Bible School and other co-operative methods seek to build in the community the ideals of total abstinence. Recognizing that we are living in the "Perilous Times" of the last days and seeing the danger that the church faces from the influence of television to destroy her deep spiritual life and also to hurt church attendance; Be it resolved: That our pastors sound a warning to Wesleyan Methodism and inform our people of this danger to the church.

4. We also go on record in support of the work being done by the House UnAmerican Activities Committee to uncover and weed out communism in the church and clergy. We further suggest that this investigation include Protestant, Catholic, and Jew. We also recommend that a copy of this resolution be sent to the said committee.

5. Inasmuch as institutions not operated by our church are continually seeking financial support from our people to the detriment of the storehouse tithing plan, be it resolved: That we disapprove of the solicitation of tithe money among our members by any Wesleyan Methodist who is not soliciting for the interest of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, and that we disapprove of the sending of tithe money by our members to independent or charitable institutions. Let such gifts be made not in tithes but rather in the offerings over and above the tithes.

6. The work of Missions being a church responsibility and not only

for women, let our pastors co-operate with the Missionary Society in promoting the days of fast and prayer.

7. Whereas the Revised Standard Version Bible has many changes in it that do an injustice to the Holy Scripture and in view of the Theological bias of the translators which is revealed in the version, we view it as not a safe version for our people. Recognizing this, we commend that our people be discouraged in the use of this version and that our preachers not use it in any public services.

8. While we rejoice that the fighting has ceased in Korea, still we realize that many of our boys and young men will be called into the various branches of military service, oft times breaking their connections and contact with the local church and Christian associations, we earnestly recommend that each church strive to keep in contact with these boys who are thus thrust into positions where sin and temptations are on every hand.

We further recommend that our pastors and churches co-operate wholeheartedly with our Wesleyan Service Men's Commission, which is so nobly carrying on this work in both camps and on the battle field, by supporting it by earnest prayer and continuing financial aid.

Standing Rules

1. The first session of the W.Y.P.S. Conference shall convene Tuesday afternoon of conference week at one o'clock, and sessions shall continue daily until all business is transacted.

2. The president shall appoint the chairman of each committee, and the executive council shall nominate the rest of the members of the committees; their report to be read and voted upon in the first session of annual conference.

3. All organized societies shall keep permanent records of membership and finances. The list of members shall be revised at the close of each conference year.

4. The Ways and Means Committee shall be composed of five members elected by the W.Y.P.S. Conference and a sixth member chosen from and by the Committee on Finance and Appropriations, of the main conference body.

5. There shall be a W.Y.P.S. Camp Meeting Committee of five members. The president of the W.Y.P.S. shall be chairman ex-officio; the other four members to be elected for a term of four years. One shall be elected annually or until their successor is elected; so that the term of all will not expire at the same time. The W.Y.P.S. Camp Meeting Committee shall elect one of its members as treasurer of the Youth Camp.

6. There shall be a Youth Camp of one week duration and the date of the camp shall be set by the W.Y.P.S. Camp Meeting Committee.

7. Members of the Executive Council shall not hold the office of District Chairman, but shall work in co-operation with and under the direction of the president.

8. There shall be elected an assistant secretary whose duty shall be to assist the secretary and to compile the statistics. The secretary shall be given the privilege of making the nomination.

9. All churches shall send their delegates credentials and statistical report to the secretary by July 5.

10. The Executive Council of the W.Y.P.S. shall have complete charge of helping new works.

11. The local society president shall consult with the pastor when making out their annual W.Y.P.S. report, to avoid inconsistencies in the same.

12. Two copies of the report of the Ways and Means Committee shall be mailed to each church and district, within three weeks after the close of conference.

13. Special mention will be made of all societies raising full budget.

14. The executive committee of each local W.Y.P.S. should consult with the pastor and his board of stewards before planning its financial program for the year.

15. All money raised by the local societies, other than local projects, shall be sent to the conference W.Y.P.S. treasurer not later than July 5.

16. There shall be a missionary committee elected by each local society, who shall be responsible for one missionary service each month.

17. The W.Y.P.S. treasurer shall pay from the Conference Expense Fund each year the sum of twenty-five dollars toward the expense of printing the minutes. The W.Y.P.S. secretary shall co-operate with the conference secretaries in determining the number of pages used.

18. The Camp Meeting Committee shall be seated as members of the Conference.

Report No. 6

REPORT OF THE WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

I. Rallies

A. We recommend that each district co-operate with the following conference program as to rallies:

1. That quarterly rallies and, if possible, monthly rallies be held in each district, and that each church be notified at least two Sundays previously, and that notices of said rallies be sent to pastors and local presidents.

2. That an additional promotional rally be held in each district, as soon as possible after conference, under the supervision of the Conference Executive Council, and that they be authorized to secure the Area President or another denominational leader.

3. That the district president call a meeting of the district officers and advisors as soon as practical after the promotional rally for the purpose of setting definite goals, including more rallies in the district, better planned programs, better promotional plans, and a definite evangelistic emphasis.

4. That the following point system for district banner awards be adopted: local society president or vice-president present at rally, 5 points; pastor present, 5 points; for each new subscription to the WESLEYAN YOUTH since the last rally, (that new subscriptions shall be those who have not been subscribers within the last year) 5 points; an organized society, 10 points; for each 1% of the active society members present (to be based on the current number of members), 1 point; for each non-member present, 1 point; and for each mile traveled to the rally site, 1 point. The society with the highest total is to be the winner.

5. That the conference print and distribute to the local societies suitable blanks to implement the point system.

6. That there be a state-wide rally, held on the Campgrounds on Memorial Day, and that a new state banner be purchased from the conference expense fund and be awarded, using the above point system.

II. Projects

A. For conference projects we recommend the following:

1. In keeping with the emphasis of the church extension program, that we offer services and finances needed for at least one evangelistic campaign or survey this year, and that this assistance be rendered in such areas as deemed advisable by the Conference Board of Trustees, and to such an extent as deemed advisable by the Executive Council.
2. That a goal of \$2,000 be set for the liquidation of the obligation to the Conference Board of Trustees for the Hamilton project.
3. That the Executive Council set a goal for each district and that each district chairman give special emphasis to reaching the goal.
4. That we participate in the crusade plans sponsored by the General Conference W.Y.P.S.

B. For local society projects we recommend the following:

1. That the General W.Y.P.S. Efficiency Standard be adopted and promoted, and that each society rating be reported in the annual statistical reports.
2. That each society plan visitation programs and special meetings with members of the society such as jail services, hospital and shut-in visitations, distributing tracts, radio programs, and street meetings.

III. Finance

A. For finance we recommend the following:

1. That the area president receive entertainment and traveling expenses while traveling our conference, the same to be paid by the group asking his service.
2. That the salary of the conference officers be as follows:
 - a. President—\$120.00
 - b. Vice President—\$50.00
 - c. Secretary—\$35.00
 - d. Treasurer—\$65.00
 - e. Assistant Secretary—\$10.00

Said salary to be paid in equal payments, on December 31 and the other June 30.

3. That the desk and traveling expenses of the president, vice president, secretary, and treasurer, be paid from the Conference Expense Fund; and to the desk traveling expenses of the Youth Camp Committee be paid from the Youth Camp Treasury and the said expenses be paid at least quarterly. That traveling expense be figured on the basis of 6 cents per mile.

4. That the budget for the following year be as follows:

- a. General Dues, \$1.00 per active member of the society.
- b. Conference Budget (based on Church membership)
 - 20 cents, Conference Extension Fund
 - 25 cents, Conference Expense Fund
 - 15 cents, Youth Camp Fund
- c. That above funds be sent in quarterly. Inasmuch as this is based on church membership, the church should feel its responsibility to aid the society when necessary.
- d. That all pastors assisted by Conference Extension Fund shall report church attendance, finance, and spiritual condition monthly to the

Conference W.Y.P.S. President, who shall in turn report the same to district chairman.

5. That the Executive Council shall have power to appropriate money from the Conference Expense Fund for the general promotion of the youth work.

6. That the Executive Council shall have power to appropriate money from the Conference Expense Fund for the general promotion of the youth work.

6. That all offerings above the operating expenses of the District Rallies be sent to the Conference Treasurer to apply on conference projects.

7. That all monies raised within the society for missions be forwarded to the Conference Treasurer for departmental credit, and that said money be raised by monthly missionary offerings, and be sent in quarterly with the W.Y.P.S. budget.

REPORT OF THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE

A. Be it resolved:

 2. That we recognize and fulfil our responsibility to our local churches in regular and special services.
- D. We offer the following recommendations:
1. That youth rallies be very carefully planned and appealingly advertized, and that the local societies give their whole-hearted support to the same;
