SUNDAY SCHOOL STANDARD.

1. A total of at least 60 per cent on Denominational Standard.

2. At least one organized class, recognized by the Conference.

3. Connectional and Conference Sunday School Budget paid in full on or before April 15.

4. Annual Statistical Sunday School report in hands of Conference Sunday School Secretary on or before April 15.

5. Quarterly reports to be made on or before July 10, October 10 and January 10.

6. Wesleyan Methodist Literature used exclusively, quarterlies and papers.

7. A definite spirit of evangelism by Pastor, Officers and Teachers. (September and April suggested.)

Note.—This Standard has been adopted by the majority vote of the Conference Sunday School Board.

A certificate will be given to every Sunday School in the Conference which attains to at least 70 per cent on Standard, provided their average attendance is 75 per cent of enrollment at beginning of year. To schools that have already earned a certificate, a seal will be added each year that it is earned.

Special mention will be made in Conference Sunday School Secretary's annual report of all worthy schools.

Much prayer must accompany much success.

STANDING RULES.

At the session of Conference the following Standing Rules of Conference were adopted:

I. The Standing Rules of Conference shall be printed in the Conference Minutes each year.

II. All visiting members of our own or other churches in harmony with our principles shall be invited to honorary seats in the Conference.

III. The Conference President shall receive \$20.00 per year for postage and stationery; also any needed traveling expense. At any time the President be required to travel the Conference, his duties and pay shall be defined by the Conference. IV. The Conference Secretary shall receive \$15.00 per year for his labor and incidental expenses.

V. The Conference Treasurer shall receive \$10.00 per year for his services in caring for the funds.

VI. In making his report the Conference Treasurer is authorized to close his books April 15th of each year. The Treasurer of the Ministers' Relief Association shall also close his books April 15th.

VII. In our Camp Meeting work, after the expense of the camp meeting has been paid by the Camp Meeting Committee or by the person whom they may designate, any unexpended balance shall be turned over to the Conference Treasurer.

VIII. All monies disbursed by the Conference Treasurer during the interim of Conference shall be upon order of the President, except in case of payment to the President, when such odrer shall be issued by the Vice-President. It is understood, of course, that any payment ordered by the Conference direct may be paid by the Treasurer without an order as directed above.

IX. No monies shall be loaned by the Conference Treasurer except by order of Conference or by consent of the President and his Advisory Board.

X. Each elder shall make his engagement as pastor with the understanding that if he be elected Conference President he shall be released in his pastoral engagement.

XI. Moved that the Standing Rule No. 11 be changed to read, "The first Sunday in each month shall be known as Home Mission Sunday and the Sunday School offerings shall be given to Home Missions and should be sent to the Conference Treasurer."

XII. That in securing Evangelists for the Camp Meeting work that those of the Wesleyan Methodist Church be secured if this can be done.

XIII. That the Camp Meeting Committee be composed of the Conference President as Chairman, and three ministers and three laymen, all to be elected by ballot after the Conference of 1923, the term of office to be three years, the time of one minister and one layman expiring each year.

XIV. Pastors shall state financial items in their statistical reports in even dollars, except in items affecting the Budget, and so far as possible are requested to report all budget items in even dollars. When such rule is not followed the Statistical Secretaries are authorized to drop decimals except as provided above.

DAILY PROCEEDINGS.

Tuesday Evening Meeting.

The Champlain Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection (or Church) of America convened at Horicon, N. Y., for its eighty-fifth session at 7:30 P. M., April 20, 1926.

Rev. A. J. Allen, the President, called the Conference to order.

Songs "Marching to Zion" and "You Will Love Him When You Know Him" were sung.

Prayers were offered by E. D. Carpenter and C. E. Hill.

The Scripture lesson was read from St. Matthew, the fifth chapter, the first twelve verses.

Stanley Lawrence brought the message of the hour from Matt. 5:10, "Blessed are they which are persecuted for righteousness sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven."

Benediction by H. R. LaVere.

Wednesday Morning Meeting.

Prayer and praise service was led by William N. Osgood. Song "Down at the Cross" was sung.

Dennis Osgood led in prayer.

The Scripture lesson was read from First Corinthians, third chapter.

A number of testimonies were given to the saving and keeping power of God.

The roll was called to which twelve elders, four licentiates and nineteen delegates answered to the call of their names.

The bar of the Conference was fixed to include the first four rows of seats.

The time for opening and closing was fixed as follows: Devotional, 8:30 A. M.; business, 9:00 A. M.; closing, 11:30 A. M.; opening, 1:30 P. M.; closing by vote.

Committee on Credentials made their report. Same was adopted. Committee on Courtesy introduced Prof. J. S. Luckey, of Houghton College; Rev. Maurice A. Gibbs, returned missionary from Japan; the Rev. and Mrs. C. E. Huntsman. All made brief and helpful remarks.

Committee on Orders of the Day made their report. The same was adopted as follows: Wednesday, 2:00 P. M., Sunday School Secretary, W. F. Lewis; Thursday, 9:15 A. M., Election of Conference Officers; 10:30 A. M., Tithing Secretary, E. D. Carpenter; 2:00 P. M., Educational Report, J. S. Luckey; Friday, 9:30, meeting of the Superannuate Ministers' Relief Association; 10:30 A. M., Connectional Representative, E. F. McCarty; 7:30 P. M., W. H. & F. M. Society meeting; Saturday, 7:30 P. M., Young People's meeting.

Committee on Passage of Character was appointed as follows: Stanley Lawrence and Lester Jenkins, Iayman.

E. D. Carpenter was called to the chair and the President made his annual report. The same was adopted. See Report No. 1.

The Committee on Pastoral Relations was appointed. The

Appointment of Committees: Credentials, E. D. Carpenter; Publication of Conference Minutes, Secretary of Conference; Resolutions, H. R. LaVere; Religious Services, President and Royal Woodhead; Apportionment, C. E. Huntsman; Statistics, Dennis Osgood; Courtesy, Stanley Lawrence; Orders of the Day, Conference officers.

Moved to adjourn to give place for Committee work.

Wednesday Afternoon Meeting.

The devotional service was in charge of C. E. Huntsman.

Scripture lesson was read from Second Corinthians, fourth chapter, first seven verses.

Brother and Sister Huntsman sang a duet, "The Spirit's Call."

The presence of the Lord was manifest in this service.

The roll was called. Twelve elders, seven licentiates and nineteen delegates answered to the call of their names.

The minutes of the morning session were read and the same was adopted.

The Committee on Courtesy introduced Miss Mary Williams and Rev. E. F. McCarty, Foreign Missionary Secretary. Both made helpful remarks.

Moved that the Conference Secretary write letters to all of the Superannuated Elders.

Order of the Day arrived: The Sunday School Secretary gave a very helpful and encouraging talk, and made his report. The same was adopted. See Report No. 2.

A five minute recess was enjoyed by all.

Song "Blest Be the Tie That Binds" was sung.

Howard Chapman offered prayer.

Rev. H. C. Shares brought the message from the fifth chapter of Revelation and the twelfth verse: "Worthy is the Lamb that was slain to receive power, and riches, and wisdom, and strength, and honor, and glory, and blessing."

At the close of the message, the President gave the call, and many gathered around the altar and "the Lord came down our souls to greet, while glory crowned the mercy seat."

"All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name" was sung.

The names of E. D. Carpenter, J. J. Davison, E. Trowbridge, S. A. Green and C. E. Hill were called and characters passed.

Wednesday Evening Meeting.

The song service was led by L. M. Hayes.

Songs "It Is Truly Wonderful" and "Sunshine in My Soul" were sung.

W. F. Lewis offered prayer.

The Scripture lesson was read from Revelation fourth chapter.

H. R. LaVere brought the message, using for his text Acts 5:1, 2: "But a certain man named Ananias, with Sapphira his wife, sold a possession, and kept back part of the price."

Song, "His Way With Thee."

Benediction by E. F. McCarty.

Thursday Morning Meeting.

Devotional service was led by C. A. Heath.

Songs "Is My Name Written There?" and "What a Friend We Have in Jesus" were sung.

Mrs. Stanley Lawrence led in prayer. A number of prayers were offered.

The lesson was read from thirty-fourth Psalm.

A number testified to the saving and sanctifying power of God. The roll was called and fourteen elders, seven licentiates, one deaconess and twenty-one delegates answered to the call of their names.

The minutes of the afternoon session (Wednesday) were read and the same were adopted.

Voted to reaffirm the action of last year in regard to the President's work: (See "Work of Conference President," as copied from Minutes of 1925, "Report No. 8.")

Order of the Day arrived, that being the election of Conference officers. C. E. Huntsman, Royal Woodhead and W. F. Lewis were appointed as tellers. The election was as follows: A. J. Allen, President; L. M. Hayes, Vice-President; C. L. Hill, Secretary; H. R. LaVere, Treasurer.

The Committee on Courtesy introduced the Rev. G. W. Strong, of Ganesworth, N. Y.

C. E. Hill was elected Trustee to succeed himself.

Camp Meeting Committee was elected as follows: L. M. Hayes, three years; Stanley Lawrence, two years; Layman, Lester Jenkins, three years.

Committee on Itineracy and Orders: O. G. Wyman to succeed himself, and L. M. Hayes to fill the vacancy of E. L. Elliott.

Committee on Presidency: C. L. Hill, G. D. Jock, Royal Woodhead. Laymen, Lester Jenkins and Harry Sabbatis.

Judiciary Committee: H. C. Shares, E. D. Carpenter, C. E. Hill and William N. Osgood.

Tithing Secretary, E. D. Carpenter.

Missionary Board: President of Conference, President of W. H. & F. M. Society, Stanley Lawrence and L. M. Hayes.

Order of the Day arrived: The Tithing Secretary, E. D. Carpenter, gave a very helpful and heart-searching message. Moved to extend the time fifteen minutes. At the close the President made brief but helpful remarks.

Doxology, "Praise God, From Whom All Blessings Flow." Benediction by Maurice Gibbs.

Thursday Afternoon.

The devotional service was led by Brother Howard Chapman.

Singing, "The Fight Is On" and "Where Jesus Is 'Tis Heaven." Brother Chapman related his experience relative to his entering his new field last year.

Scripture lesson, Matt. 6:19-34, followed by prayer.

Business: Roll call with fourteen elders, six licentiates, one deaconess and twenty delegates present.

Minutes of the forenoon session read and approved by correction.

The name of W. F. Lewis was called and character passed.

Order of the Day: Address by Prof. J. S. Luckey, on Education and Houghton. It was indicated that there was a deficit of \$135.50 on the Educational Budget. By cash and subscription this amount was raised.

Doxology.

Afternoon Religious Service: Scripture was read by E. F. Mc-Carty. Prayer by Brother Allen. Singing, "The Land of Beulah."

The afternoon sermon was given by Brother McCarty. Text and theme: First Peter 4:19, "A Faithful Creator to Suffering Saints." This was an inspiring message. Singing, "Jesus, Lover of My Soul."

Motion to adjourn carried.

Benediction by W. F. Lewis.

Thursday Evening Service.

The devotional service was conducted by Rev. W. F. Lewis. Songs used, "A Never Failing Friend" and "He Abides."

Brother Lewis made a few remarks, and these were followed by a song, "He Ransomed Me."

Prayer was offered by Brother H. C. Shares.

Special music: A duet sung by Rev. and Mrs. Huntsman of West Chazy.

The evening message was brought by Rev. E. D. Carpenter. The text was John 3:16. Brother Carpenter said that though this is a familiar text, he had never preached from it but once before. The message was presented with Brother Carpenter's characteristic enthusiasm, and surely under the inspiration of the Spirit. In closing, an earnest appeal for a yielding of hearts and lives to God was made. President Allen made a few remarks. Song, "Jesus Paid It All." Several hands were raised for prayer. Invitation hymn, "Why Not Tonight." Brother Carpenter closed the service.

Friday Forenoon.

The devotional service was directed by Rev. G. D. Jock. The service opened by singing "Sunshine In My Soul" and "Is My Name Written There?"

Prayers were offered by Brothers William Osgood, O. G. Wyman, Lester Jenkins and G. D. Jock.

Business Session: Roll call, with twelve elders, four licentiates, one deaconess and sixteen delegates present.

Minutes of the last session read and approved.

A letter from Rev. F. S. Lee, President of Rochester Conference, was read by President Allen. This was in regard to the transfer of Rev. and Mrs. C. H. Robinson of the Rochester Conference. It was voted that Rev. and Mrs. Robinson be received into the Champlain Conference, and entered on the Conference roll.

The report of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders was read. Voted that it be adopted. See Report No. 3.

The following names were called and characters passed: A. J. Allen, G. D. Jock and E. L. Elliott.

A request from Brother Elliott for a transfer to the Lockport Conference was granted by vote of the Conference.

Order of the Day: Meeting of the Superannuated Ministers' Relief Association. See Report No. 4.

The meeting was followed by a vote of the Conference that the

offering for the Superannuated Ministers' Relief Association be taken within the first sixty days of the new Conference year.

Other names were called and characters passed as follows: A. E. and T. A. Moses, F. E. Wood, H. R. LaVere, Mary Williams, J. F. Wright, F. H. Wright and O. G. Wyman. Letters from the absent brethren were read.

The Conference Treasurer's report, including report of Camp Meeting Committee, was read by Brother LaVere. Voted to accept the report. See Report No. 5.

Announcements and adjournment. Benediction by H. R. LaVere.

Friday Afternoon.

The devotional service was in charge of Rev. H. Miller.

After singing, prayer was offered.

Brother Miller read the eighth chapter of Romans.

Singing, "Dwelling in Beulah Land."

Business: Roll call, with eleven elders, four licentiates and sixteen delegates present.

Minutes of the forenoon session were read and corrected.

The name of Floyd Banker was called and character passed.

Order of the Day: Rev. E. F. McCarty delivered the Connectional Address, which was very original, suggestive and inspiring.

After a five-minute recess, the afternoon religious service was opened by singing "Jesus Saves."

The sermon was preached by Rev. H. C. Shares. Text: "Be filled with all the fulness of God." This was a splendid message indeed.

Brother Stanley Lawrence followed with prayer. Following a verse of song, the regular business was continued.

The matter of the Mountain Glen Church was considered. Voted to accept the offer of one hundred and fifty dollars for the property. President Allen was authorized to make the transfer. See Report No. 6.

The following names were called and characters passed: H. C. Shares, C. L. Hill and L. M. Hayes.

Voted to adjourn.

Friday Evening Service.

The evening service was in charge of the W. H. & F. M. Society. Rev. Maurice A. Gibbs delivered the address on Japan, and about \$760 was raised by subscription.

THE PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT,

May 1, 1925 - April 20, 1926.

To the Brethren of the Champlain Conference and Fellow Laborers in the Master's Vineyard:—Greetings in the name of Him Whom we love and serve.

Through the goodness, mercy and protection of our God, we are privileged to meet again in our annual Conference. We bow devoutly and humbly with thankful hearts to our heavenly Father for many blessings which He has so bountifully bestowed upon us; for the precious blood that cleanseth from all unrighteousness, and

the faithfulness of the blessed Holy Spirit. He has not left us alone. Through the kind, providential care of our Lord and Saviour, death has not entered the ranks of the ministry. Yet while we rejoice in all this, our hearts have been saddened by the news of some of our loyal and faithful laymen, who have been called to their eternal reward. Especially do we miss our brother of the church here at Horicon, where we are holding this Conference, Brother Vaughn, who was always at his post. Others as faithful will be missed. However it is no time for us who are left to be discouraged, but to take hold of the work they loved so well, and to carry it on to victory in Jesus' name. And this we will do, will we not?

This has been a gracious year to our souls. God has again and again vindicated His own Word in the outpouring of the blessed Holy Spirit, in the meetings, and on the seekers for pardon and purity. All glory to His matchless name! While we look back over this closing Conference year, we see many signs for encouragement. Calls have come for meetings of full salvation, and the preaching of Bible truths of repentance, regeneration and sanctification as a second definite work of grace. Souls are hungry for something that will satisfy that longing. Not only are calls coming for work, but workers. Young men, well qualified to preach the gospel, are asking for a place where they can preach and work for the Master, where they will not be held down by the powers of human invention.

Then our own people are taking on faith and courage, going deeper and rising higher in spiritual life and power. Yes, but some will say, "Are there not discouraging things also?" Yes, there are and always will be, so long as Satan lives. But these are not the things that we are to look at, but look to the hills from whence cometh our help. We cannot overlook these hindrances and pass them lightly by, but overcome them by the help of the Almighty God.

In passing, a few thoughts on the Budget and finances of the Church: The budget plan has proven the best and most successful plan we ever have had, and when worked systematically, the whole budget can be raised. But when left till the last of the year, it works a hardship. But if the pastors will take it up quarterly, and see that each quarter is full, it will be much better. Or, as Brother Olney of West Chazy told me, he lets his hens pay his budget, and does not have any trouble about it at all. That is, he takes his Sunday eggs (and the hens lay wonderfully well on Sundays). But all have not hens, but there is a way out, if we will ask our heavenly Father about it.

Now if we do not enter these open doors, some one will. Who will be to blame. You answer not to the President, but to God.

Then last but not least, the salvation of souls, or the unchurched, yea, the lost men and women—young and old—in each community; they are our responsibility. What shall we do about it? Will we rest? Or will we take hold by faith, courage and works, and go after the lost ones and the unchurched, until they are safely sheltered in the fold? Ought we not to have a good increase in every church in the Conference? Will we not pledge ourselves and make this our motto for the coming year: A full budget, a good substantial gain in membership, yea, a church or two! "For our God is able to make all grace abound toward you: that ye always having all sufficiency in all things may abound to every good work." 2 Cor. 9:8. We trust the Conference will work out some definite plan in which this can be carried out.

Then the camp meeting is another source of encouragement. The last one was the best attended by pastors and people in general. Every room on the grounds was occupied. The preaching by Brother Hotchkiss and the pastors was good and well received, and the singing was good also.

The outlook for the coming camp in July (7th to 18th) is bright. Every room on the grounds was engaged at the close of the last meeting, and the need of more rooms was evident. The committee has that in mind, and will build as the needs demand. We urge all our pastors to take hold, and talk it up with his people, and get a good delegation from each church, for it is worth while, and will pay both pastor and people.

Before closing this already too long report, shall we not take our stand to uphold the Constitution of America, especially the Eighteenth Amendment and the Volstead Act, and oppose any party or man who stands for the modification of either of these acts?

Again shall we not state our belief in the Bible as the Word of God, His revealed will to man, and pledge the best there is in us, to uphold and defend the holy doctrine as taught therein? Amen.

PLAN OF WORK FOR LOCAL SOCIETIES.

We recommend a definite plan of work and that we work the plan so far as possible as follows:

1. As a means of information to ourselves and help and inspiration to others we should have some sort of missionary study or programs at our meetings and let earnest, God-inspired prayers be made for our work and workers at each meeting.

2. The missionary magazine should be in every home as a means of education and in order to promote the cause of Christ. Each Society should elect a Committee to get new subscriptions, but especially to keep track of renewals.

3. Two statistical report blanks are sent to each local society each year. One to be filled out and given to the Statistical Committee at beginning of Conference and the other retained to be read by delegate. Local Societies should see to it that receipts and disbursements on reports balance before sending them to the Conference.

4. Our General Conference meets in Houghton, N. Y. in June, 1927, and each Local Society is requested to send the sum of 20 cents per member before next April 15 to the Conference Treasurer to defray our part of the expense.

5. Each Society should send \$6 annually through the Conference Society Treasury to the General Treasurer for Home work.

6. As we are a Home and Foreign Missionary Society and not an Aid Society let us see to it that our money be used for missionary work instead of using it for local church work. Also that no money be paid out without a majority vote of the Society.

7. Each Local Society is requested to send some amount annually to the Conference Society to be used as they may direct.

8. We wish further to emphasize that ALL money or receipts MUST be sent to the Conference Treasurer by April 15 if credit is expected to be given for the same.
