Daily Proceedings

THE THIRTY-NINTH ANNUAL SESSION of the Kentucky Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church convened August 7, 1961, 7:30 p.m. at the Fern Creek, Kentucky campground with the Rev. Charles L. Blanchard presiding. Rev. H. Blaine West was in charge of the singing. Dr. Alton Liddick, Executive Secretary of World Missions of the Wesleyan Methodist Church was introduced to the body who in turn introduced his wife, Mrs. Alton Liddick; Miss Hazel Compton, missionary to India; and Rev. Neal Phipps, vice president and field representative of Brainerd Indian School. Rev. Phipp spoke a few minutes concerning the need of evangelizing the American Indians.

THE CONFERENCE SERMON was delivered by Dr. Alton Liddick, who spoke from Matt. 25:14-30 and used as his text, Luke 19:13, "Occupy till I come."

CALL TO ORDER. Conference was then called to order by the President, Rev. Charles L. Blanchard.

ROLL CALL- 23 elders, 7 conference preachers, 21 delegates. Kenneth Reynolds was appointed to collect the credentials.

MOTION CARRIED to seat all delegates read by the secretary as members of this 30th Conference.

THE DAILY SCHEDULE was approved as follows: Rising Bell at 6:30 a.m.; Prayer at 7:00 a.m.; Breakfast at 7:30 a.m.; Dinner at noon and Supper at 5:00 p.m.; Conference convenes each day at 9:00 a.m.; adjourns at noon; reconvenes at 1:30 p.m. and adjourns by motion.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE'S REPORT was read. Dorothy Basham declined as chairman of the Courtesy committee. Motion made and carried that Bob Weeks be chairman of said committee. The report was adopted. (See Report No. 1)

ADJOURNED by motion.

Second Meeting, Tuesday 9:00 a.m.

DEVOTIONS led by Rev. Neal Phipps, who spoke briefly from Matt. 9.

ROLL CALL: 23 Elders, 6 Conference Preachers, 28 Delegates.

ADDITIONAL DELEGATES were seated by motion.

CONFERENCE PRESIDENT'S REPORT was read and accepted (See report No. 2).

CONFERENCE TRUSTEES' REPORT was read and accepted (See Report No. 3).

COURTESY COMMITTEE presented Dr. Alton Liddick, Executive Secretary of World Missions.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE'S REPORT was read for information. The committee withdrew the name of G. C. Newman on the Pastoral Relations Committee and Murnal Shepherd was elected.

MOTION carried to recess at the call of the chair.

Third Meeting, Tuesday 1:30 p.m.

DEVOTIONS WERE LED BY Miss Hazel Compton, missionary to India, who spoke from John 1:1-5 and telling of her work in the leper hospital.

ROLL CALL: 24 Elders, 8 Conference Preachers, 31 Delegates.

MOTION CARRIED to seat Bessie Jones, alternate delegate from the West Terre Haute church in place of elected delegate Mabel Shaffer.

MINUTES APPROVED as read.

COURTESY COMMITTEE presented Miss Hazel Compton, missionary to India.

THE WESLEYAN YOUTH REPORT was read by the Youth President, John W. Basham and it was accepted (See report No. 4)

A REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON RELIGIOUS SERVICES AND SPECIAL ORDERS OF THE DAY was read and approved.

Standing Resolutions

1. The Conference President shall in his quarterly meeting see that adequate insurance is carried by each church on its property.

2. The pastor's Statistical Report must be passed by the Conference Treasurer and the Committee on Character, and must be presented to the Statistical Committee before being read to the Conference body.

3. The Conference shall elect a Nominating Committee for the Conference year which shall be a standing committee of five members with the Conference President as member ex-officio. This Committee shall nominate the Chairman and members of committees and the third member of the Publications Committee. Each committee on this report shall be presented to the conference body separately and time

allowed for nominations from the floor.

4. We recommend that the local treasurer's books shall close at mid-night, June 30, and that the Conference Treasurer close his books effective midnight, July 15, and that all statistical reports are to be sent in by that date to the Conference Treasurer, and he shall in turn send them to the statistical chairman. All money received after that date is to be applied to a budget on the following year. The Conference Treasurer of the Missionary Society, Wesleyan Youth and Y. M. W. B. shall send a report immediately after their books close to the Conference Treasurer, listing amount paid on each budget item from each church.

5. The Conference shall convene the first Monday night of August each year.

6. The Board of Church Extension and Evangelism shall serve as the Committee on Church and Parsonage Location and Building.

7. All Ministers and Delegates attending the entire annual conference and camp are to be given rooms in preference to those not active in conference business.

8. No divorced person who has been remarried shall be ordained in the Kentucky Conference.

9. All Conference officials shall assume office in the next meeting following the election.

10. No Charge shall call a pastor or a supply from other Conferences or denominations as long as there are available ministers in our conference qualified for the work. The Conference President, after having exercised his prerogative in the reception of ministers coming from other conferences or denominations, shall immediately refer them to the Committee on Itinerary and Elders' Orders, which shall make a thorough investigation as to the ministry and life of such applicants and shall report their findings to the President after which appointments may be made.

11. The vote on the pastor shall be taken by ballot the first week in June unless special permission is granted by the Conference President and his Advisory Board for another date; said ballots are to be prepared by the clerk and the results of the vote shall be reported at once to the Conference President.

12. Let all ministers have their membership transferred to their new appointment and the Ways and Means Committee shall figure Budget Apportionment after the final reading of the Pastoral Relations Committee.

13. Since television in its present state is so radically demoralizing in its range, be it resolved that Kentucky Conference register its disapproval of anyone within the conference endorsing or owning a television set. Furthermore, be it resolved that the Kentucky Conference will not license preachers or workers, ordain elders or station ministers who own or have a television set in their possession.

14. The Conference President and the Conference Secretary shall

be members of the Publications Committee ex-officio.

15. A standing committee on ways and means shall be elected at the regular conference election, of which the Conference President and Conference Treasurer shall be members ex-officio.

16. Pastors shall read to their congregations the General and Special Rules and instructions of the Discipline, the Standing Resolutions of the Conference, the report of the committee on Moral Reform, and shall urge the same to familiarize themselves with the Wesleyan Methodist Discipline.

17. Every preacher borrowing a book from the Conference library may hold it for only one month. There will be a flat rate of twenty five cents for the month and five cents for every day over the month.

18. In this age when immodesty and worldliness are subtly creeping into the Holiness Movement, let every minister of ours earnestly contend for, and faithfully preach the entire word of God without fear or favor of man. Let us refuse to compromise with the ungodly element which is robbing the church of her glory and preachers of the Divine anointing.

19. All ministers not attending both conference and camp without a written excuse from the Conference President and his advisory board shall be placed under discipline and be required to appear before the character committee of the next annual conference for clearing. Further, no pastor shall be permitted to accept revival meetings or camp meetings if they conflict with the conference and camp meeting.

20. Our own Evangelists shall not conduct revivals or camp meetings in Wesleyan Churches within the bounds of our conference at the time of our Youth Camp, Annual Conference, Camp Meeting or Ministerial Institute.

21. The Standing Resolutions of the Conference shall be printed in the September issue of the MESSENGER.

22. It is hereby resolved and ordered by the Kentucky Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America, in session assembled this 10th day of August 1961: That the Trustees of said conference are hereby fully empowered to buy, sell, convey, mortgage or lease property for, or on behalf of said conference, provided however, that between the sessions of the Kentucky Conference, a majority of the Conference Board of Church Extension and Evangelism, as the designated Board of Managers of the said Kentucky Conference, shall signify their agreement therewith by a special resolution and order authorizing each and every transaction.

Report No. 2

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Members of the thirty-ninth annual Kentucky Conference:

Greetings in the name of the Living Lord and coming King of Kings.

We meet in the midst of local, national and world turmoil, socially, religiously, and politically. Tensions were never tighter. The cold war may become a global hot war of annihilation. Communism and Catholicism seek world mastery. Democratic freedoms are fast passing away even in America. Encroaching bureaucracy lords it over the society. Heavy American taxation grinds man under burdens constantly becoming weightier with the idea that nothing is too costly for democratic freedom.

The unprecedented teenage crime wave has swept over America and the world. It is the youth age, the loose age, when youth is in the saddle. Society is fast becoming what it hears on the radio; what it reads in the newspaper and in salacious literature; what it sees on the billboard, in the comic strip, in the daily paper, in the movie, and on television.

A culture Christianity characterizes major protestantism. The protestant churches have become business organizations instead of divine institutions; social clubs listening to discussions of current topics rather than congregations worshipping and hearing a messenger of the Most High; socially adjusted audiences seeking psychological improvement instead of churches of born again believers seeking holiness of heart and life. Even the holiness church is fast becoming a humanly manipulated organization having a name, merely possessing an academic cultured holiness. In church circles the vital vocabulary consists of ecumenicity, union, merger, numbers. Little stress is heard on prevailing prayer, divine manifestation, the baptism of the Holy Ghost, divine afflatus, powerful conversion, and the dynamic sanctification of believers. In formal parlance the terms "saved" and "sanctified" are acceptable in holiness groups. So academic have these terms become that today a person may profess the states of grace signified by these terms and show little separation from the world. Just as there is a breakdown of holiness standards, there is an attempt to erase the line between the races and the sexes. Furthermore, many holiness people are money-minded, commercially crazy, self seeking, flesh pot lusters, knowing not self-sacrifice. Holy people are in the world, but are not of it.

It is time to call a halt. It is still the day of grace. The exceeding great and precious promises of the Bible are yet ours. God has promised to be with us to the end. If the God of the Bible met the needs of Elijah's day, turned the tide of sodomie conditions in Wesley's eighteenth century England, and delivered Israel from autocratic Egypt, can He not meet the appalling needs of the twentieth century? We need praying preachers; interceding laymen; powerful prophets. Kentucky Conference, let us join hands, heads, and hearts with the Holy Spirit, our Christ, and our Father in the divine task before us, that to rescue a lost world.

STATE OF THE CONFERENCE

Much material progress has been made in a number of churches and parsonages this year. Notable among these are improvements in the form of a driven well, installation of rest rooms and septic tank, and provision for a drinking fountain at Franklin Avenue; overhauling being done at Ninth Street; and additional improvements at Sale Avenue.

Newburgh church was sold last fall and the money used to help pay off the debt at Glasgow.

The Greatest conference pioneer project undertaken yet is the building of Owensboro Calvary pioneer church. Since last conference the parsonage on two acres of ground was purchased and the new church built beside it. Now it becomes the obligation and privilege of the conference to pay off this debt by the help of the local church and to start another. There must be a mighty spirit of prevailing prayer that souls may be garnered into Calvary pioneer church. Glasgow, first pioneer project under the calendar plan, was organized last spring and is making steady progress. Lexington is mothering another church in the city where plans are already under way. Vast opportunities are before us. More pioneer men and more money are urgently needed.

PRESIDENTS ACTIVITIES

The President drives his car about 25,000 miles per year mostly in the work of the church. He has held 38 quarterly meetings; preached 126 times; attended or held 44 conference or church board meetings; served on nine committee and board meetings at Marion College; attended the conference ministerial institute, also the Marion College Area Ministerial Convention, six pastors' pioneer rallies, the dedication of Calvary pioneer church, and taught Sunday school 17 times. He has made numerous pioneer trips, held many interviews, written hundreds of letters, worked on a thesis, and edited the Messenger.

THE WESLEYAN YOUTH

We have just closed one of the largest youth camps in the history of the Kentucky Conference. We are happy to report that there were 224 registered for the week with a number attending over the week-end. Night after night the altar was lined with seekers. My heart rejoiced to hear the testimonies of new found victory. This is the main purpose of our youth camp and the only hope for the Kentucky Conference.

As I review my activities for the youth of the conference, I have tried to serve to the best of my ability in the following ways:

1. September, 1960 - Presided over the conference wide Youth Leader's Workshop in Louisville.
2. October, 1960 - Represented our conference at the Area Council meeting in Marion, Indiana.
3. January, 1961 - met with the Youth Camp committee and made plans for the 1961 Youth Camp.
4. April, 1961 - attended the Marion Area Youth Leaders' Workshop in Marion, Indiana.
5. May and June, 1961 - conducted youth rallies in all ten districts and a special rally at West Frankfort, Illinois.

8. I have tried to promote the work with over 800 pieces of mail.

9. I have traveled around 3000 miles in conference interest.

10. I have written for the Kentucky Messenger each month.

We have paid \$150 for the support of David Ellis in Africa and \$120 to our pioneer project at Brazil, Indiana. We have purchased a mimeograph machine and an adding machine. The project that was promoted in the district rallies was for a new serving table in the dining hall and some kitchen supplies. We also purchased the adding machine with the money that was left from the district rallies.

We wish to thank the conference for the \$258. 09 which we received from the church Wesleyan Youth budget. We assure you that we will put this to good use, endeavoring to reach young people for our churches and the conference.

It has been disappointing to sense the lack of cooperation in our WESLEYAN YOUTH subscription campaign. We could double our subscription list if every church and pastor would cooperate. It is important to get Christian literature in the hands of our youth. You can not find a better magazine for our young people than the WESLEYAN YOUTH. Let us push it in the coming year.

It has been a joy and privilege to serve the youth of the Kentucky Conference for the past 14 years. It is not an easy job but a rewarding one. May we focus our attention in the coming year to reach the youth of our community for Christ and the church.

Report No. 7

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON WAYS AND MEANS

Item I. Budget

1. We recommend that this conference pay General Budget Assessment as follows: General Wesleyan Youth Budget \$1.50; World Missions \$2.00 per full member; Australia \$.25; Bruinard Indian School \$.25; Church Extension and Evangelism \$1.50; Superannuate Pension Plan \$2.00; Church Administrative Fund \$1.00; General Conference Expense and Entertainment \$.50; Board Meeting Expense \$.25; Hephzibah \$.35; Sunday School \$.20 per member (based on the total number of members in the main Sunday School); Educational Budget \$3.00.

2. We recommend that our churches pay Conference Budget as follows: Conference Work Fund \$.75; Conference Entertainment \$1.00; Camp Meeting Fund \$1.00; Conference Wesleyan Youth \$.50 per full church member; Conference Parsonage Fund \$.50; Conference Sunday School \$.05 per member enrolled in the main Sunday School; Conference President's Salary \$1.00; and an amount equal to 10% of pastor's cash salary; Ministers' Group Insurance Fund \$.50 per member; and that the Sunday School offering for the first Sunday of each month be sent to the Conference Treasurer for Pioneer Evangelism. All budget money shall be sent in monthly.

Item II. Pastor

1. Each pastor shall encourage the Storehouse plan of Tithing.
2. All pastors shall endorse and encourage membership in the Church Extension Card Plan.
3. The pastoral year shall end immediately following the last Sun-

day of Camp and the church he is serving shall pay his salary until that time.

4. All churches shall provide their pastors suitable living quarters, all their utilities, fill their obligations by monthly donations and allow him two weeks vacation with pay, and definitely arrange with the pastor the number of revivals he is allowed to conduct.

5. Each pastor's moving bill shall be paid by the contracting church.

Item III. Conference President

1. The Conference President shall be paid \$77.50 per week, house rent, utilities, desk expense, traveling at 8 cents per mile in connection with conference work and shall be allowed two weeks vacation with pay.

2. The Conference President shall meet the Board of Stewards of all churches paying less than \$1,000 salary and lend encouragement to the church to provide adequate support for their pastor.

3. Each church shall hold four quarterly meetings annually; one to be held by the Conference President at his convenience and three to be arranged by the pastor. These quarterly meetings are to be held the first weeks of October, January, April and July.

4. The Conference President shall give one Sunday preaching service to each church annually when possible, and shall give as much time as possible to supervising the pioneer works and the smaller churches.

Item IV. Miscellaneous.

1. The Conference Treasurer and the Conference Secretary shall each be paid \$75.00 a year.

2. All supernannuated ministers and or their wives of our conference shall be entertained entirely free all during camp.

3. Each active church member shall be encouraged to become an honorary member of Wesleyan Youth with annual dues of \$1.00.

4. We recommend that the Board of Church Extension proceed to investigate the re-location of the President's Parsonage to a more accessible location, and to authorize the Conference Trustees for further action.

5. We recommend that \$.10 on the dollar from the Conference Entertainment Fund and \$.10 on the dollar from the Camp Meeting Fund be set aside for 1 year, for the purchase of Conference office equipment.

6. We recommend that the Board of Church Extension be empowered between the sessions of the Conference to make available for present use any surplus in any fund.

7. We recommend that the Kentucky Conference Ministerial Student Aid Fund at Marion College be placed under the Conference Church Extension Board.

COMMITTEE ON MORAL REFORM

We, Your committee on moral reform,

Urge the re-emphasizing of our Bible teachings of regeneration, sanctification and separation. The imminent return of our Lord is the greatest Biblical argument for a pure, unselfish, devoted, un-wordly, active life of service.

Let it therefore be resolved that we vigorously protest against liquor and similar vices by every means possible, including a refusal to patronize merchants who handle the same.

We shall likewise register our opposition to nudity and the wholesale prostitution existing in the Armed Forces and National life by exalting a virtuous life and instructing our young people and parents.

Be it resolved that all Christian parents seek to establish and maintain the family altar, and to create a spiritual home atmosphere, in an effort to guard our household against the insidious invasions of evil influences, and to save them for God and the church.

Be it further resolved that we urge the strict observance of the Sabbath by refraining from buying and selling and all other forms of merchandising, the performance of unnecessary labors, and a participation in those activities which rob the church and individual of their influence.

Since dancing has become so prevalent in our public school systems, and since our youth are faced with a problem in not participating, and since our conference disapproves of participation in such, we recommend that each pastor and parent take a firm stand against dancing, and instruction be given the parents and young people of the church accordingly.

Be it resolved that we strongly oppose the evils of the day such as television, worldly conformity in dress, make-up, nudity, mixed bathing, crime comics, lewd and obscene literature, questionable practices in our public schools, the use of tobacco, dope, such as marijuana and heroin, etc.

That, being aware of the increasing number of divorces in our land, we urge that the sanctity of the marriage be upheld by the counselling of our youth and by plain scriptural preaching and teaching on this matter.

Be it also resolved that this body positively, definitely, and consistently ally ourselves with the American ideal of separation of Church

and State both by principle and practice and that we stand opposed to foreign powers, both civil and religious, which would destroy our religious freedom and liberties.

We recommend that this report on Moral Reform be read and discussed in each local church.

SPECIAL RESOLUTION

Whereas, several American airlines now serve liquor on their flights; and whereas, the serving of liquor in flight endangers the safety of the public, and corrupts christian ideals;

Be it resolved that the Kentucky Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America in session this 10th day of August, 1961, hereby registers its protest to the Civil Aeronautics Board, Washington, D. C. through its recording secretary who is instructed to forward this special action on to our nation's Capitol.

REPORT OF THE CHURCH EXTENSION BOARD

August 8, 1960

The Church Extension Board, composed of C. L. Blanchard, H. Blaine West, Leo Welch, Foster Newman and Robert Pelton met on the Campground.

Robert Pelton was elected secretary.

Motion carried that interest and insurance be paid as it comes due.
Motion carried to pay off balance of \$2,000 on lots on corner of Allen and Legion Blvd. in Owensboro, Kentucky.

Motion carried to borrow \$13,100 from individuals for the Owensboro Calvary Church; that contracts be signed with each individual, paying interest at 5% payable semi-annually, with a contract clause giving the Church Extension Board two years to pay off in case of death of the loaner.

Motion carried that Foster Newman be authorized to withdraw necessary funds to move the John Bashams to Owensboro, Ky.

Motion carried that 5 cents per mile be allowed for Church Extension Board travel, to be taken from the President's fund.

August 10, 1960

Board met on the Campground 1:00 p.m.

Motion carried that Owensboro Calvary parsonage be purchased at 403 Legion Blvd. for \$15,000, with the local church assuming \$7,500 of the amount, the Conference paying down \$7,500. It was also agreed that we proceed with plans to construct a church immedi-

ately.

August 13, 1960

The Board met on the Campground with Mr. and Mrs. Frank Gearries of Gosport, Indiana. It was agreed to make a trip to Spencer, Indiana on Tuesday, August 23.

August 24, 1960

Board met 9:00 a.m. at the Atwood Church.

Motion carried to authorize W. C. Kennedy to sign bill of contract for sale of Terre Haute property.

Motion carried that money from sale of Newburgh and Zion's Hill properties be applied on paying off notes on Glasgow property.

October 4, 1960

Board met at the Atwood Church, 7:30 p.m.

Motion carried to permit Paoli Church to purchase gas furance with the Conference Trustees signing if necessary.

Motion carried to accept \$4,825 for property on N. 3rd. St. in Terre Haute with this amount being paid to the conference treasurer and he in turn sending \$3,000 for purchase of a house for worship and when needed send \$1,000 to W. C. Kennedy for remodeling of building. Later an additional \$200 was sent for remodeling.

October 12, 1960

Board met at the Atwood Church 8:30 a.m.

Motion carried that the Owensboro Calvary Church contract no bills or debts amenable to the Church Extension Board without authorization of the Board.

Motion carried that any contractor taking a bid for the building of Owensboro Calvary Church must be bonded.

December 5, 1960

Agreed to accept the Pendley base bid of \$28,600 and grant him a contract for the building of the Owensboro Calvary Church.
Motion carried that the Church Extension Board have a signed contract with the contractor before any work is begun.

March 7, 1961

The Board made a trip to South Portsmouth, Kentucky to look over prospects there.

Motion carried to sell the Temple Church building.

April 6, 1961

Board met at the Atwood Church. No definite action taken.

May 5, 1961

Board made a trip to Paoli, Indiana.

Motion carried to pay \$250 on the finishing of floor and sidewalk at Owensboro Calvary Church with the understanding that the Church Extension Department pay the other \$250.

Motion carried to have Brother Liddick preach the Conference Sermon on the first Monday night of conference, the Educational Service to be on Tuesday night and the Pioneer Service on Wednesday night.

June 23, 1961

Board met at 6:00 p.m. on the Campground

Motion carried to authorize the Conference Trustees to sign a duplicate note with heads of families of Franklin Ave. Church to borrow \$1,150 without interest from Atwood Church, the same to be paid back at a minimum monthly payment of \$35.00 until the total amount is paid.

RECOMMENDATIONS BY THE CHURCH EXTENSION BOARD

I. Calendar System

1. A pioneer calendar shall be provided by the Church Extension Board for a Sunday in September chosen as Pioneer Sunday, at which time pledges shall be taken in each church to be paid in 10 monthly payments.

2. A pioneer secretary appointed by each local church shall announce, or have announced on the second Sunday of each month the pledge collection on the third Sunday, and shall collect and tabulate opposite each pledge the monthly contribution, then have the church treasurer remit total collected each month to Conference Treasurer.

3. Pioneer works may be granted permission by the Church Extension Board to use their money locally as may be needed.

4. Previous to Pioneer Sunday there shall be a rally of the pastors in each district presided over by the Conference President or another designated by the Church Extension Board, when goals for each church may be suggested.

5. Field and Goals

A. Money shall be saved for centers of population, to be invested in property or to employ men of pioneer ability.

B. We urge a goal of \$6,000 this year toward the reducing of indebtedness on our new church in Owensboro, Kentucky.

II. Sunday School

The first Sunday of the month Sunday School offering in full shall be remitted monthly by each Sunday School treasurer for much needed conference pioneer work.

III. Revolving Fund

This fund shall be increased by gifts and at the discretion of the Church Extension Board from regular pioneer funds not to exceed \$500 per year.

IV. Mother Church

We urge the larger churches to cooperate with the Church Extension Board in starting a prayer meeting or a Sunday School in a new section as well as in tithing their church tithes and offerings for mothering a new work under the Church Extension Board.

V. United Effort

We suggest and urge cooperation of the Conference W. M. S. and the Youth Executive Council with the Church Extension Board to aid our pioneer works as may be needed.

c. Those failing to comply with the above regulation shall be referred to their Quarterly Conference.

d. All conference preachers employed as pastors of organized works may vote in annual conference, not including conference evangelists or assistant pastors.

e. We recommend that those taking the examinations in the course of study shall take said examinations in the presence of an elder or a local preacher or a conference preacher and the examination be sealed and sent by him to the proper member of the committee.

REPORT OF CONFERENCE SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY

In the thirty-five Sunday School reports that are now in my hands there have been some fine improvements during the year. One of the first things to be appreciated was the splendid promptness in sending in your reports. It was wonderful. Keep it up. However, a goodly number of reports show some carelessness in various omissions regarding attendance and finances. There are fifteen schools that report Cradle Rolls. Let others go and do likewise. Only one Home Department is reported. Brethren, we do need to feed the lambs, but we need also to feed the sheep. There must surely be many shut-ins and old people

who cannot get out to church who would be richly blessed by the regular visits and literature of a Home Department worker. Let us launch out into the deep in this area. At last we are happy to have two Teacher Training classes in operation. We need more of them and they will prove to be a good investment of time and interest.

Without last year's minutes at hand for comparison I fear our numbers show a decline. With millions of new babies coming every year we do expect growth rather than losses. We must consistently work for growth in numbers to bring people in from the fields of sin. Our attendance average is 66% which means that many people only go to Sunday School eight months in a year. What would happen if they went to work that way? They would starve and they are starving spiritually. The reports on Daily Vacation schools has not reached me yet, but I look forward to splendid gains in that field. It is very gratifying to note that 129 were converted last year and thirty-six of them joined the church. This is a marked advance in converts joining our churches. Give these young Christians lots of encouragement and help. The financial receipts are still increasing except in the areas of Denominational Sunday School giving and Missions. We need to enlarge our emphasis on these needs. We have this year a display of Sunday School literature. Look it over carefully and use more of it. One of our workers reported some of the literature unacceptable to them so keep a close watch of the helps that are being used in our schools. We must have good, true Biblical truth. The National Sunday School Association reports an uptown in Sunday School work. The Sunday Schools have been and can be a mighty training arm of the church. We are to make Christ known in the highways and city throngs. To that effort let us give ourselves anew in the strength of the Lord.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Greetings in the name of Jesus to you ladies of the thirty-ninth session of the Kentucky Conference Woman's Missionary Society. "Pray ye therefore the Lord of harvest that he will send forth laborers into His harvest," Matt. 9:38, at home as in foreign lands.

This has been a year of precious experiences for me. The times of spiritual blessings and of fellowship with the Executive Committee and you folk of the local societies have been gracious. To Him we give thanks for health and safety as we traveled to every district in the conference for ten Workshops and sixteen night services. Dorothy Via and Marsena Pelton took turns driving the car to and from several conventions. Dorothy Via traveled 1853 miles, Marsena Pelton 712 miles, Martha Pierce 456 miles, Mary Harwell and Lillian Schermer drove to Columbus and Milton. Add to this the 607 miles round trip to the Area Convention in Ohio and you will see we have just cause to praise the Lord for journeying mercies.

We feel repaid for our efforts for there has been:

An increase in the number reading books and of books read of the

Reading Course. This will have two effects—an enlarged out-look to other fields and consequently a greater out-reach in prayer and giving. This in turn has brought the greatest increase in the purchasing of missionary books and literature our conference has ever had.

An increase in W. W. F. Prayer Circles and prayer partners. Don't fail at your post of duty, prayer partner, you are vital to the missionary work. Missionaries are depending on you.

An increase in funds, but our obligations were greater so we come to the close of the year with a smaller balance. We have paid Malcolm and Vergie Ellis' field support, \$2400. The salary of Malcolm and Angeline Barnes for part of the year, \$1800, the year's support of one of their younger children, \$150, and \$1750 for the transportation of the Blackburns to India. For this we praise the Lord, but please keep in mind the admonition of Paul—I Corinthians 10:12 "... take heed lest (we) fall." We must be diligent.

An increase in activity of the work directors as evidenced by the articles for the Calhoons and the Maitlans. How grateful they were for your help. The Ellis' will be home on furlough this year. May we plan to do for them as we have here-to-fore.

An increase in subscriptions to the Missionary Magazine. This is commendable. Unless the general subscription level is kept to 15,000, the price will have to be raised to cover publishing costs. Solicitors, please keep in mind you are the "Key to the situation. Your task is of major importance.

Twelve of us had the privilege of attending the Area Convention in Ohio all because you gave to the Convention Fund. Thank You!

Besides the conference tour and trip to the Area Convention in Ohio, I made two trips to the Home Mission Stations and visited several other churches with my husband, traveling about 3000 miles. Visited one society at their request. Twice this year I solicited columns for the Kentucky Messenger, the other months I have used the column as a personal letter to you to give information and direction. Sent out one circular letter besides the notice of the Hanson's tour and Conference Programs, making a total of 300 pieces with letters and cards.

I have enjoyed serving Him and you. For His manifold blessings we humbly offer our thanks. Yours for the spread of the Gospel.

D. Nurturing a spirit of prayer, it was as the church at Antioch prayed that they received the missionary vision.

E. That the local Women's World Fellowship Secretary be responsible for one service during the year and emphasis be placed on prayer.

F. That we observe World Day of Prayer.

II. Organizational—To devise lawful means to interest others in missionary work.

A. Membership—sponsoring aggressive membership campaigns throughout the church and Sunday School.

B. Leadership—training members to become capable leaders.

C. Service—encourage every member to cooperate in producing a spirit of "service consciousness" for meeting Christian obligations which money and prayer cannot liquidate.

D. Youth—endeavor to keep our young people challenged and informed about our W. M. S. program.

III. Financial—To put forth a systematic effort to raise money for the support of the gospel at home and abroad.

A. That the offering for the special project be above budget, and that the offering be for the field support of Rev. and Mrs. Malcolm Ellis, salary support for Rev. and Mrs. Malcolm Beirnes, and other approved projects.

B. Since the American Bible Society translates, publishes, circulates, and cultivates the Word of God, we recommend that each society support this work by an annual offering. Channel funds through Conference Treasurer.

C. That cancelled special Commemorative postage stamps be collected and mailed to Mrs. Margaret McCarty, 409 W. Darius St., Seattle 90, Washington. That we also salvage coupons to be sent to Hephzibah Children's Home, Box 2304, Macon, Georgia.

D. That each local society pay \$1.00 per active member for the Conference Working Fund. This to be sent to the Conference Treasurer undivided.

E. That the Conference treasurer divide this fund 70% for Conference Work and 30% Area Work.

F. That all travel and desk expenses be paid from this fund, except those occurring during the annual tour of the conference, which are to be paid by the churches visited.

G. That the W. M. S. President be paid \$50.00 per year as a love offering.

H. That the W. M. S. Secretary and Treasurer be paid \$25.00 each per year as a love offering.

I. That each new society shall be responsible for dues only. The second year, the society shall pay dues and take free-will offerings for the monthly financial items. Thereafter the society shall bear full responsibility.

J. That each society give a special Christmas offering for Ken-

tucky Conference Missionaries as designated by the W. M. S. Executive Committee.

K. That we urge our people in the month of March to give one day's wages or an offering equivalent to that amount to be applied on the W. M. S. Conference Project as designated by the Executive Committee.

L. That the local treasurer's books shall close June 30, and the Conference Treasurer's Books shall close July 7. Any money received after this date shall be counted on the following year.

IV. Benevolent—to do such other work as may be for the good of the souls and bodies of perishing humanity.

A. Purpose of Community Missions

1. To enlist every W. M. S. member in some form of personal service in the home community.
2. To enlarge our Christian impact on community morals.
3. To strengthen the influence of the church on the outside world.

B. Method of Operation.

1. Visitation—a systematic campaign of visitation by a volunteer staff. Each may choose the type of call she will make.

a. Supervision—to be directed by the local vice-president and a committee of two others.

b. Areas of Visitation—the ill, aged, unchurched, Sunday School absentees, newcomers to the community, delinquent families, bereaved homes, friendless ones, needy (spiritually or financially) people or any others who might benefit by a call made in the spirit of Jesus.

2. Evangelism—a campaign of individual witnessing and personal soul winning.

a. Supervision—to be directed by the local Executive Board.

b. General aim—to stress importance of Christian's testimony wherever opportunity presents itself.

WESLEYAN YOUTH PRESIDENT'S REPORT

As we are assembled together in this session of Youth Conference, we are aware that the year of 1960-1961 is history and we are here to make plans for another year. The past year is now a closed book but as we look back we have much to give thanks to our Heavenly Father.

As I review my activities for the youth of the Conference, I have tried to serve you to the best of my ability in the following ways:

1. September, 1960 — Presided over the conference wide Youth Leaders' Workshop in Louisville.

2. October, 1960 — represented our conference at the Area Council meeting in Marion, Indiana.

3. January, 1961 — met with the Youth Camp committee and made plans for the 1961 Youth Camp.

4. April, 1961, attended the Marion Area Youth Leader's Workshop in Marion, Indiana.

5. May and June, 1961 — conducted youth rallies in all ten districts and a special rally at West Frankfort, Illinois.

WAYS AND MEANS COMMITTEE

We, the Committee on Ways and Means, wish to make the following recommendations:

I. CONFERENCE

a. The W. Y. President shall attend one rally in each District during the year and each District shall bear the traveling expenses at the rate of seven cents per mile.

b. We recommend that the pioneer project for this year be the Brazil Pioneer Work in cooperation with the Conference Board of Church Extension and Evangelism.

c. We recommend that the W. Y. Executive Committee make plans to raise funds for a new Dormitory Building.

d. We recommend that the W. Y. Executive Committee continue a quarterly Youth Bulletin, to be sent to the young people of the Conference.

e. We recommend that a Conference-wide YOUTH RALLY be held Friday night following the Annual Conference and Saturday be known as Youth Day at which time the Youth Conference will convene.

f. We recommend that the Conference shall elect a Nominating Committee for the conference year which is to be a standing committee of five members with the Youth Conference President and secretary as members ex-officio. This committee shall appoint the chairman and members of the (1) Ways and Means Committee, (2) Resolutions Committee, (3) Statistical Committee and (4) Auditing Committee.

g. We recommend that a Conference-wide "YOUTH LEADER'S WORKSHOP" be held the second Saturday of September each year for the purpose of promoting the conference youth work. We urge the pastors, district chairmen, and all Local Youth Officers to attend.

II. DISTRICT

a. We recommend that the Districts be set up the same as the Conference Board of Church Extension and Evangelism.

b. We recommend that each District have at least three rallies during the year and that we use our Young People in a variety of programs for these rallies rather than always securing an outside speaker..

III. LOCAL

a. We recommend that the local treasurer's books shall close June 30.

IV. FINANCES

a. We recommend that each Local raise the amount of one dollar and a half (\$1.50) per active member for the General W. Y. Program and that those churches not having an organized Local take an offering for the General Youth Program.

b. We recommend that each Local raise the amount of one dollar (\$1.00) per active member for the Conference Expense Fund.

c. We recommend that each Local raise the amount of fifty cents (\$.50) per active member for the Youth Camp Fund.

d. We recommend that each Local raise the amount of ten cents

(\$10) per active member to subsidize the expense of the YOUTH BULLETIN.

e. We recommend that the Executive Committee shall have the power to appropriate the youth money for the promotion of the General and Conference work.

f. We recommend that each District in their District Rallies raise the following amount for the support of David Ellis in Africa:

h. We recommend that the \$15.00 voted by the Conference as Young People's assessment to help subsidize the Conference Messenger be paid from the Conference Fund.

i. We recommend that the Area Assessment and all desk funds be paid from the Conference Fund.

j. We recommend that all money be forwarded quarterly to the Conference W. Y. Treasurer, Phyllis Morgan. The Conference W. Y. Treasurer's Books shall close July 7.

13. That the district chairman send a quarterly report to the conference W.Y. President summarizing their district conventions.

14. That the Efficiency Standard of the W.Y. be printed in the Annual Journal and each Local plan its program according to the standard.

15. That each Local send in a quarterly report by the designated time and that they strive to be on the honor roll.

16. That all monies received after July 7, 1962 be applied on the Local's next year's report.

17. That the newly elected local president be a member of the Conference body.
