DAILY PROCEEDINGS

Tuesday, July 25, 2:00 p. m.

The forty-seventh session of the South Carolina Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection (or Church) of America convened in the tabernacle on the grounds of the Greer Camp Meeting Association at Greer, South Carolina at 2:00 p. m. July 25, 1939. The Sacrament of our Lord's Supper was observed in the opening service and was conducted by Rev. R. G. Cudd. Rev. R. C. Kendrick read some Scripture and the Conference joined in a season of prayer led by M. C. King, D. G. Matheny, and C. T. Bryant.

The Conference was called to order by the President, Rev. R. C. Kendrick.

The roll was called and 13 Elders and 9 Conference Preachers answered present.

Rev. S. I. Keeler was called to the Chair.

The President read his report. The report was adopted. See Report No. 1.

The President resumed the Chair.

The Secretary reported that in accordance with the authority given by the last Annual Conference he had purchased an adding machine for the Conference at a cost of \$56.00. Fifty-one dollars and seventy-five cents of this amount was raised through advertising in the Conference Minutes, leaving a balance of \$4.25 yet to be paid from the same source.

On motion the Conference gave the Secretary a rising vote of thanks for this work.

It was moved and carried that the President set the hours for business sessions. The hours were set as follows: 8:00 a. m. to 12:00.; 1:30 p. m., adjourn on motion, 7:30 p. m. for evening services.

It was voted that the Connectional Address by the Connectional Representative Wednesday 7:30 p. m. be the Special Order of the Day.

Tuesday, July 25, 7:30 p. m.

The Conference Sermon was preached by the Conference President, Rev. R. C. Kendrick, who used Numbers 13:26 as a text. His subject was "What Our Conference Ought To Be."

Wednesday, July 26, 8:00 a. m.

Devotions were conducted by Rev. J. R. George.

Conference was called to order by the President.

The roll was called.

The following named persons presented proper credentials and were enrolled as Lay Delegates: E. E. Lusk, J. J. Newton, R. W. Eubanks, J. T. Bowling, R. A. Taylor, Mrs. W. W. Warren, Mrs. R. C. Mullinax, George Fowler, Johnnie Murray, Mrs. J. H. Miller.

The minutes were read and approved.

R. C. Mullinax and C. M. Elrod were elected the Committee to Grade Church and Quarterly Conference Records.

It was moved and carried that Church and Quarterly Conference Records be graded every year.

The Educational Secretary read his report. The report was adopted. See Report No. 7.

Since J. B. Hilson is working on a History of the South Carolina Conference, the Conference voted that he be the official Historian of the Conference.

M. J. Gaines, Joe Gaines, and Oscar Bowling from Greenville Church, and James Miller from Spartanburg Church were recommended to the Conference to study or travel under its direction. On motion these recommendations were referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

The President offered to sell to the Conference his residence at Central for a President's parsonage. It was voted to elect a committee to study and investigate the proposition and make recommendations to the Conference. The Committee elected was R. C. Mullinax, J. W. Miller, J. D. Elrod, D. G. Matheny, H. M. Moody.

It was moved and carried that the Missionary Board and Committee on Pastoral Relations get together and make plans and recommendations toward some definite steps for evangelizing new fields and building new churches.

Educational Secretary elected—J. B. Hilson.

Rev. W. C. Lovin and Rev. J. A. Wood, pastors in the North Carolina Conference were introduced to the Conference and gave words of greeting. On motion they and all others who may be introduced to the Conference were seated as honorary members with the privilege of speaking on all questions.

It was moved and carried that there be elected a committee of three to make recommendations regarding the revising of the Standing Resolutions of the Conference. Committee elected: W. L. Miller, R. C. Mullinax, J. B. Hilson.

Conference adjourned on motion.

Wednesday, July 26, 1:30 p. m.

Devotions were conducted by Rev. G. E. Crenshaw.

The roll was called.

Miss Millie Lindsay, Miss Mae Belle Splawn, and Mrs. W. W. Stanford presented proper credentials and were enrolled as Lay Delegates.

In view of the fact that Prof. J. F. Childs was so heavily loaded on committee work it was voted to relieve him from duties on the Committee on Ministerial Character and elect L. F. Hartley to serve on the committee.

Rev. Roy S. Nicholson, Connectional Representative, and Rev. H. Reid Sisk of the Missionary Methodist Church were introduced to the Conference and made appropriate remarks.

Special Orders of the Day were taken up.

J. B. Childs, V. A. Mitchell, C. J. Blanton, C. T. Bryant, J. F. Parton, L. F. Hartley, E. W. Cartee, and C. M. Elrod were appointed tellers.

The following officers were elected by ballot:

President—Rev. R. C. Kendrick. (Vote—60 of 64, first ballot.)

Vice-President—Rev. R. C. Mullinax. (Vote—54 of 65, first ballot.)

Secretary—Rev. J. B. Hilson. (Vote—50 of 65, first ballot.)

Treasurer—Talmage Evatt. (Vote—56 of 64, first ballot.)

By ballot the following trustees were elected: W. L. Miller, C. E. Henderson. The Board of Trustees now stands as follows: Elders—W. L. Miller, 1942; J. D. Scoggin, 1941; J. D. Elrod, 1940. Lay Members—C. E. Henderson, 1941, W. M. Harris, 1940.

By ballot R. C. Kendrick and W. D. Correll were nominated for the Local Board of Managers of Central College.

It was voted that Mrs. L. W. Barbee be associated with Miss Gertrude Farmer on the Committee on Heresy for 1939.

By vote it was made the Special Orders of the Day Thursday, July 27, 10:00 a. m. to vote on the amendments to the Discipline as handed down by the General Conference.

The Vice-President was called to the Chair.

Statistical reports were read by R. G. Cudd, C. J. Blanton, J. R. Garrett, R. W. Garner (read by Secretary.)

The Secretary read reports from D. T. Cain, W. D. Correll, J. M. Hames, T. C. Harvey. By vote their reports were adopted and their character passed. See Report No. 15.

The Secretary read a letter of greeting from Miss Ruth Kelley, missionary to Africa. By vote of the Conference the Secretary was instructed to make an appropriate reply.

A motion prevailed to recess to the call of the Chair.

Wednesday, July 26, 7:30 p. m.

Rev. Roy S. Nicholson, Connectional Sunday-school Editor and Connectional Representative to this Conference, gave a very appropriate and inspiring Connectional Address. His subject was "The Unity of the Church."

Thursday, July 27, 8:00 a. m.

Devotions were conducted by Rev. J. R. Garrett.

Conference was called to order by the President.

The roll was called.

John D. Evatt and J. L. Cantrell presented proper credentials and were enrolled as Lay Delegates.

The minutes were read and approved.

An offering of \$11.48 was given for Rev. D. T. Cain.

The Vice-President was called to the Chair.

Statistical reports were read by W. L. Miller, R. C. Mullinax, J. R. Green, Miss Gertrude Farmer, J. W. Miller, E. W. Cartee, L. Rigdon, C. W. Nalley, W. R. Padgett, W. S. Allred, J. B. Hilson, V. A. Mitchell, W. A. Garrett, and G. L. Stewart.

Conference recessed until the Orders of the Day.

At 10:00 o'clock Conference was called to order by the Vice-President for the Orders of the Day.

After some time of explanation by the Connectional Representative and discussion by the body, the following amendment to the Discipline, having been handed down by the General Conference was voted on by a roll-call vote with a vote resulting in sixty-two (62) yeas and no nays.

Omit Article XX as it now appears and insert instead:

XX. The Second Coming of Christ

The doctrine of the second coming of Christ is a very precious truth, and this good hope is a powerful inspiration to holy living and godly effort for the evangelization of the world. We believe the Scriptures teach the coming of Christ to be a bodily return to the earth and that He will cause the fulfillment of all prophecies made concerning His final and complete triumph over all evil. Faith in the imminence of Christ's return is a rational and inspiring hope to the people of God.

Omit Article XXI. The General Judgment and insert instead:

XXI. The Resurrection of the Dead

We hold the Scriptural statements concerning the resurrection of the dead to be true and worthy of universal acceptance. We believe the bodily resurrection of Jesus Christ was a fact of history and a miracle of supreme importance. We understand the manner of the resurrection of mankind to be the resurrection of the righteous dead, at Christ's second coming, and the resurrection of the wicked at a later time, as stated in Revelation 20:4-6. Res-

urrection will be the reuniting of the soul and body preparatory to final reward or punishment.

Job 19:25-27; Psalm 17:15; Daniel 12:2; Matt. 22:30-32; Matt. 28:1-20; Luke 14:14; John 5:28, 29; Acts 23:6-8; Romans 8:11; 1 Cor. 6:14; 1 Cor. 15; 2 Cor. 4:14; 2 Cor. 5:1-11; 1 Thess. 4:14-17; Rev. 20:4-6.

Add a new Article entitled XXII. The Judgment of Mankind.

XXII. The Judgment of Mankind

The Scriptures reveal God as the Judge of all mankind and the acts of His judgment to be based on His omniscience and eternal justice. His administration of judgment will culminate in the final meeting of mankind before His throne of great majesty and power, where records will be examined and final rewards and punishments will be administered.

Ecclesiastes 12:14; Romans 14:10, 11; 2 Cor. 5:10; Acts 17:31; Rom. 2:16; Matt. 10:15; Luke 11:31, 32; Acts 10:42; 2 Tim. 4:1; Heb. 9:27; Matt. 25:31-46; Rev. 20:11-13; 2 Peter 3:7.

Footnote—It is not to be understood that a dissenting understanding on the subject of the millennium shall be held to break or hinder either church fellowship or membership.

The above amendment having now been passed on to the local churches, the Conference voted that all the churches of the Conference must vote on the question by the last day of October, 1939.

Statistical reports were read by: D. G. Matheny, J. G. Allred (Assistant Pastor), C. M. Elrod, C. T. Bryant, J. H. Miller (read by C. M. Elrod).

On motion R. G. Cudd was excused from the afternoon meeting.

J. H. Ernest from Westminster Charge was recommended to the Conference to study preparatory to travel under the direction of the Conference. The recommendation was referred to the Committee on Itineracy and Orders.

Adjourned on motion.

Thursday, July 27, 1:30 p. m.

Devotions were conducted by Miss Gertrude Farmer.

Conference was called to order by the President.

The roll was called.

George Black presented proper credentials and his name was added to the roll of Lay Delegates.

Statistical reports were read by J. C. Nunnally, J. F. Parton (read by C. T. Bryant), O. B. Stewart (read by Secretary), J. D. Elrod, J. Youngblood.

The committee to make recommendations regarding the purchasing of

Rev. R. C. Kendrick's residence at Central for a President's parsonage reported, recommending that said residence be purchased for said purpose. By vote the report was received. It was voted to elect the same committee to make recommendations regarding financing the plan of buying Rev. R. C. Kendrick's residence.

The committee to revise the Standing Resolutions of the Conference reported. Its report was adopted. See "Resolutions and Rules of South Carolina Conference."

The Superannuate Board recommended that the office of Treasurer of the Superannuate Board be abolished and that the duties of this office be turned over to the Conference Treasurer. The Conference Treasurer shall then disburse the Superannuate Fund according to written order signed by the Superannuate Board. By vote the Conference adopted the recommendation.

The Vice-President was called to the Chair.

Statistical reports were read by E. C. Hord, P. C. Lusk, H. A. McCutcheon (read by Miss Gertrude Mahaffey), F. G. Hunter, L. W. Barbee.

It was voted that the next session of the Annual Conference be held at the Greer Campground, July 16, 1940.

Adjourned to the call of the Chair.

Conference was called to order at 4:15 by the President.

The Committee on Pastoral Relations gave its first reading.

On motion it was voted to add the names of Misses Margaret Dillard and Nellie Linder to the Committee to Grade Church and Quarterly Conference Records.

Rev. S. I. Keeler reported. His report was adopted. See Report No. 15.

The Committee on Moral Reform reported. The report was adopted and requested to be sent to the WESLEYAN with the request that it be published. See Report No. 8.

The Committee on Apportionment recommended that the budget be apportioned as follows per member: Foreign Missions, \$2.00; Home Missions, \$.50; Education, \$1.25; Orphanage, \$.25; Conference President's Salary, \$.75; Conference Work, \$.45; Church Extension and Conference Evangelism, \$.30; Superannuate Ministers' Fund, \$.20; General Conference Travel, \$.10; Conference Entertainment, \$.10; Minutes, \$.06. On motion the recommendation was adopted, See Report No. 16.

Adjourned by vote.

Thursday, July 27, 7:30 p. m.

The Conference W. H. & F. M. S. held its public meeting. Mrs. J. B. Childs presided. Miss Gertrude Farmer spoke on the progress of the work at Glenville. Before other speakers were called some arose and stated their spiritual needs and an altar call was given at which some prayed through to victory.

Friday, July 28, 8:00 a. m.

Devotions were conducted by Rev. Roy S. Nicholson, who spoke very impressively on the subject "The Minister and His Study."

Conference was called to order by the Vice-President.

The roll was called.

The minutes were read and approved.

F. H. Pressley read his statistical report.

On motion the following resolution was adopted:

"Having observed that the present day singing conventions are detrimental to the spiritual life of the Church, be it Resolved, That we as a Conference body go on record as being unfavorable toward their being held in Wesleyan Methodist Churches, and furthermore we earnestly recommend that all pastors respect this resolution with regard to their churches."

The Committee on Memorials reported. The report was adopted. See Report No. 6.

The Committee on Pastoral Relations gave its second reading.

The President was called to the Chair.

The Committee, elected to make recommendations on a plan for financing the purchase of Rev. R. C. Kendrick's residence at Central for a President's parsonage, made the following recommendations:

"1. We recommend that the initial payment of five hundred dollars (\$500.00) be taken from the fund for Conference Work. Provided, that any other funds that come into the hands of the Conference in the near future for the purpose of building parsonages might be applied on this initial payment of \$500.00.

"2. That the balance of the price (approximately \$1850.00) be covered by a note and mortgage to Rev. R. C. Kendrick, said note to bear five per cent (5%) per annum; and that two hundred dollars (\$200.00) be paid on interest and principal each year, said two hundred dollars to be taken from fund for Conference Work each year. Provided, that in the event of the death of Rev. R. C. Kendrick the entire note becomes due and payable, and loan must be secured from some other source.

"3. That the Conference Trustees be authorized to make the legal transactions."

It was moved and carried that the Conference Trustees be authorized to sell the Central, First Church parsonage to Mr. Jack Dillard for seven hundred thirty-five dollars (\$735.00), and that after the indebtedness is paid, the balance be applied on the initial payment for the parsonage for the Conference President, and that the Conference give an equal sum from its funds on Conference Work to the building of the new church at Central.

The Conference voted to excuse Rev. R. C. Mullinax from the remainder of this session of Conference.

Adjourned on motion.

"1. This Conference shall elect a Nominating Committee for the Conference of 1940. The committee shall be composed of the President as Chairman, and three (3) elders and three (3) laymen.

"2. In case of a vacancy on this committee, the President shall have power to fill such vacancies.

"3. This committee shall meet at a suitable time just preceding Conference.

"4. The entire report shall be read to the Conference for the body to get a general idea of the distribution of the committees.

"5. Then, the nominations for each committee shall be read separately. After nominations for each committee is read, the President shall ask if there are any nominations from the floor, after which proper vote shall be taken.

"6. In order to insure that the Nominating Committee shall not be continued in future years against the desire of a strong minority, it shall be agreed that a three-fourths vote will be necessary to repeat the plan another year. This is to prevent the plan from being continued if it is not quite generally satisfactory."

RESOLUTIONS

1. That no member of the Conference shall have his character passed who fails to carry out all the rules and orders of this Conference, unless providentially hindered, except upon a three-fourths vote of the body.

2. That we affirm our faith in the soundness of the position taken by the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America in denying any of its members membership in any secret society. Hence we as a Conference require that our pastors and churches shall not elect, or suffer to be elected, superintendents or teachers of any Sunday schools that are held in our churches if they hold membership in secret societies.

3. That we earnestly urge all our Licentiates not receiving any appointments to pastoral or evangelistic work to preach at least once a month, and also to hold if possible a two weeks revival during the year.

4. That the Committee on Public Worship consist of the President of the Conference, the pastor of the charge where the Conference is held, and the pastor's delegate.

5. That no person be licensed to preach who does not tithe his income; that all our licentiates be required to faithfully tithe their income; and that the license of no preacher be renewed, who fails to tithe.

6. That it is the sense of this Conference that our houses of worship should not be opened to any evangelist or minister of any other Church to hold a series of meetings or to maintain a regular appointment for another congregation; provided, however, that usual denominational courtesies be extended to other ministers in occasional appointments.

7. We recommend that all charges and stations to which the pastor moves pay the moving and transportation expenses of said pastor, the same to be done in addition to his salary.

8. That the pastors be required to raise their Minute Money and send to the Conference Treasurer within sixty days after they receive their Minutes.

9. That this Conference elect a Tithing Secretary, as provided for in our Discipline, whose duty it shall be to visit each charge at least once a year, if possible. Each church visited shall raise at least the traveling expenses of the Secretary at the time of his visitation.

10. That each local church or charge elect a Tithing Secretary,

whose duty it shall be to thoroughly canvass the membership of the church or charge each quarter and labor most earnestly to induce each member to strictly tithe his income and to place the same in the church treasury for the purpose of meeting all the claims of the church, both locally and generally. This Secretary shall report at each Quarterly Conference the percentage of the membership who are tithing in keeping with this plan, the percentage who are giving in other ways, and the percentage who are not giving at all. Each pastor and church shall coöperate with these Secretaries in every possible way in order to make the entire membership of this Conference strict tithers.

11. That we as a conference put forth every possible effort through education, pulpit preaching, voting, and other means to advance the cause of temperance and to secure legislation for abolishing the sale of beer, wine, and whiskey for beverages.

12. That the Trustees of the South Carolina Annual Conference, together with the President of the said Conference, be and they hereby are empowered to execute all necessary papers, mortgage deeds, and papers of a like character, when necessary to secure loans to the South Carolina Annual Conference or to any church needing funds to liquidate Conference, church, or parsonage indebtedness, provided that the party or parties requesting such action shall set forth in writing the true nature and purpose for which the loan is requested (and this writing is to become a part of the permanent record of the Trustees), and that the Trustees and President of said Conference are satisfied that the object for which said loan or loans is sought is both necessary and desirable. And the Trustees of said South Carolina Annual Conference are also hereby empowered to sign any or all deeds and papers for the transfer of real property that is now or hereafter may be held in trust by said trustees, where the sale of Conference, church, or parsonage or other real estate has been approved or authorized by the President of the Conference with the concurrence of his entire Advisory Board.

REPORTS

Report Number 1

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To my beloved Brethren in the holy ministry and to all the faithful saints of the South Carolina Conference: Greetings in the Name of our Risen Lord! Since God has extended our lives and given us this opportunity of gathering in the forty-seventh session of our Annual Conference, we feel under renewed obligation to Him, so we bow in humble thanks and submission to His holy will.

I believe I speak the sentiment of this body when I say let the unity of the Spirit prevail in all our deliberations.

In the words of the apostle, I can say, "I thank God whom I serve with a pure conscience that without ceasing I have remembrance of thee in my prayers."

As your Conference President, I have made an honest effort to fulfill my obligations to the Conference, not altogether from a sense of duty for I consider it a privilege to serve in any capacity that affects our beloved Zion. I wish to take this privilege to thank each member of the Conference for his coöperation in the past, and I assure you that I have a deep sense of appreciation for your patience with me in my blunders. Despite it all, God has given a degree of success, and there are marks of improvement in different places.

The Ariail Mill folks have built a nice addition to their house of worship at the cost of one thousand dollars; this has meant much to their equipment for Sunday-school work.

The Fountain Inn Church has secured a deed from the Mill Company for their house of worship and has added two nice Sunday-school rooms.

The Glenville Church, under the wise supervision of their pastor and her co-laborer, has added to their building to the extent that they have about doubled their seating capacity. The special favor of God is on their church, and they are in a continual spiritual spirit of revival.

The Greenville Church is adding some nice Sunday-school rooms to their church which will add much to the efficiency of their Sunday school. During the four months' illness of their pastor, Rev. R. G. Cudd, the interest did not wane. To God be all praise!

The Bethany and Tucapau Churches have added to the convenience of their parsonage at Bethany by installing a running water system. This was made possible by the kindness of a neighbor, Mr. Ollie Boyter, in permitting them to attach on to his water line which is supplied by an electric pump.

Pelzer is making progress. They have about doubled their attendance in Sunday school, and they have installed a new heating system at the cost of five hundred dollars.

Piedmont has remodeled their parsonage, and their pastor is congratulating himself on having the best parsonage in the Conference.

The Lord has given Lyman Church a revival. They have added a number of good men and women to their membership; they also have on a project to build a house of worship in the near future.

Whitmire has bought a four-room house as a parsonage for their pastor. They have painted the inside of the house and made other repairs that were needed.

The above repairs to the different churches mentioned have been made since last Annual Conference and have been done with a small margin of indebtedness.

The First Church of Central is now in the process of constructing a nice stone veneer building on the school campus.

In the month of February, 1939, the Pelham church was wrecked by a windstorm and due to the fact that the mill there had been standing for more than three years, they did not feel financially able to reconstruct the building. Consequently they met on March 18, 1939, and agreed to disband, leaving their property in the hands of the Conference Trustees. They also recommended the property be sold and the proceeds be used in constructing a house of worship at Lyman.

The Conference Camp at Greer has added a new dormitory this year. This 24 x 50 building has twenty rooms.

I appreciate the progress that is being made, and I feel the little shortage in budget that you have noticed in the last three years is due to the curtailing in the textile plants, and the extremely short cotton crop, which is the principal money crop of our state.

The following acts of official business are in harmony with my Advisory Board.

August 3, 1938, we received the transfer of Rev. T. C. Harvey from the Tennessee Conference.

August 16, 1938, transfer was given to Rev. W. B. Clubb, to the North Carolina Conference.

August 21, 1938, we organized a church at Village Creek. This was added to the Buck Creek Charge, and Rev. J. H. Miller was appointed pastor.

September 10, 1938, Rev. F. G. Hunter was appointed pastor of Mount Calvary Church.

September 11, 1938, we organized a church near Fountain Inn, South Carolina, known as Knighton Chapel. This was the result of a revival meeting conducted in a schoolhouse by Rev. J. D. Land. This was added to the Fountain Inn Charge, and Rev. J. D. Land was appointed Assistant

Pastor. Since they were organized, they have built a house of worship valued at about one thousand dollars.

October 31, 1938, Rev. L. H. Mayfield resigned as pastor of Landrum and Eden. Landrum was added to the Carlisle Charge and Rev. W. L. Miller appointed pastor. Rev. J. C. Nunnally was appointed pastor of Eden.

July 17, 1939, Rev. L. H. Mayfield was transferred to the Michigan Conference.

MISSIONARY BOARD

Report Number 5

THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

We, the Trustees of the South Carolina Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection (or Church) of America, met July 27, 1939 at the Campgrounds at Greer, S. C. and transacted such business as came before us.

1. As a result of the revertible clause in the deed of Central First Church property and parsonage, the property became the property of the Conference February 4, 1939.

2. On March 15, 1939, the Trustees met at Pelham and consulted with the Pelham Church as to the advisability of reconstructing the church building which had been damaged by storm. After considering the cost of rebuilding the church decided to disband. We recommend that the church building be sold and the proceeds be given to the Lyman Church to be used in constructing a church building there. It is also recommended that the piano, seats, and other fixtures be loaned to the Lyman Church. In event the Pelham Church is not reorganized within two years' time, the aforesaid fixtures and equipment will become property of the Lyman Church.

3. We recommend that L. Rigdon pay \$25.00 on his note this Conference year and \$25.00 next Conference year. On receipt of last payment we recommend that all interest be cancelled and that he receive receipt in full.

4. In compliance with the will of Mrs. R. V. Davis, the amount due her by the Conference was automatically cancelled at her death.

5. We recommend that the Conference Treasurer pay interest due on all notes against the Conference, and collect interest due on all notes due the Conference.

Report Number 8

COMMITTEE ON MORAL REFORM

Your committee on this subject begs leave to submit the following report:

As a denomination, our voice is raised in no uncertain sound against the teachings of modernism in all its phases. Especially do we cry out against Evolution, the denial of the Virgin Birth, and the elimination of any part of the Bible as the Word of God. Also, the teaching of "eternal security," or what is generally termed "once-in-grace, always-in-grace," we, as a Church, regard as a most dangerous doctrine.

With regard to Sabbath observance, we wish to be placed on record as being opposed to the operation of secular business of any kind on the Lord's day, and also to all worldly entertainments, amusements, athletics and all types of games.

We register our disapproval of civil and national war except where utterly unavoidable. Our government is keeping twenty million people alive by employing them in the manufacture of arms by which they will later kill themselves and the rest of the community.

It is desired that we reaffirm our position regarding secrecy, believing it to be opposed to all Bible principles. We affectionately admonish our people to avoid all compromise with such organizations and to abstain from the appearance of all connections therewith.

We deplore the immodesty of dress in women and girls as practiced around us. We protest against it, knowing that this undoubtedly leads to immorality in our fair land.

The evil of the use and sale of tobacco in this age is alarming and its deadly practice is injuring body, mind, and soul. Nicotine in the systems of the girls and youth of today means a future generation (if the Lord tarries) of weaklings in body, soul, and spirit.

But the most vicious of all curses that is blighting our nation is the traffic and use of whiskey. To quote a noted Southerner—"It is the ruin of man, the terror of women, the cloud that shadows the faces of little children, the demon that has dug more graves than all the pestilences since the plagues of Egypt and all the wars that have been fought since Joshua stood beyond Jericho."

It is almost unthinkable that not only men and boys, but women and

girls are drinking daringly both in public and in private. The awful curse is growing to most alarming proportions.

We heartily disapprove of the patronage of all places of refreshment where intoxicants, including beer are sold.

By prayer, preaching, and through the press we desire our position on the different issues of moral Reform to be known to a sin-burdened world.

Report Number 9

COMMITTEE ON HERESY

The fact that there is truth establishes the fact that there is error; the fact that there is a genuine is evidence that there is a counterfeit. Through the flight of ages truth and error have warred against each other, but there has never been a time in the history of man when false doctrine was so widespread. We are living in an age of deception, hypocrisy, and shallow substitutes for the genuine.

Heresy appears in many different cloaks such as Russelism, Universalism, Spiritualism, Unitarianism, Mormonism, Modernism, etc. These are definitely heretical, but the type of deception which we as a Holiness movement need to fortify ourselves against is more subtle. Jude writes of this heresy, exhorting us to "earnestly contend for the faith which was once delivered unto the saints. For there are certain men crept in unawares, . . . ungodly men, turning the grace of our God into lasciviousness, and denying the only Lord God, and our Lord Jesus Christ . . . But these speak evil of those things which they know not . . . These are spots in your feasts of charity . . . clouds they are without water, carried about of winds; trees whose fruit withereth; . . . Raging waves of the sea . . . and their mouth speaketh great swelling words, having men's persons in admiration because of advantage."

These poison-peddlers sailing under the banner of righteousness are subtle deceivers and along with a cloak of truth are perpetuating heresy.

Among the dangers are a superficial religion based on human opinion, the substitution of modern psychological terms for the Scriptural meaning, the increase of the doctrine of Calvinism—eternal security, also the deceptive theory that full salvation is wrought in only one work of Grace, and the doctrine that is rampant which teaches a third work of Grace.

These errors are given rise to by a departure from the Word, lowering of the standard, compromise in any degree, and neglect of truth. They may be encountered with a fearless proclamation of Bible Holiness in theory and in practice. Heresy and truth are mutually destructive. As surely as heresy is a foe to the truth, so surely is truth a formidable foe to error. The only way to keep heresy from entering our ranks and to defeat its onslaughts is to insist upon the old-fashioned Bible standards and

keep the blessed presence of the third Person of the adorable Trinity within our Connection, our Conferences, our churches and abiding in our individual hearts, for as one has said, "The Holy Ghost is the great Conserver of orthodoxy."
