IN MEMORIAM



Elder Charles A. West and Elder Olive M. West have gone to be with their Lord. They "were lovely and pleasant in their lives, and in their death they are not divided." Rev. West went to his reward on January 12, 1961 and Sister West followed January 24, 1961.

For some 30 years they had labored side by side in churches assigned to them throughout the Conference. Not always did they receive the "easy" places, but there was never a complaint. They went forward with the work assigned with faith in God and their fellow laborers. The Wests came to Allegheny at the 1929 annual Conference at Dixonville. Sister West followed her husband as a Conference Preacher from East Conneaut Church in 1937. Rev. West was ordained at Akron in 1936 while serving the East Conneaut Church. Sister West "pursued the Course of Study" faithfully until 1953 when she also received Ordination at the Annual Session at Stoneboro.

Appointments served by the Wests were: Templeton, 1930-31; Evangelist, 1931-32; Wilgus, 1932-34; East Conneaut, 1934-37; Wolf Summit, 1937-42, Also Cecil 1938-40; White Memorial 1942-48; North Springfield, 1948-50; Sagamore, 1950-55; Pine Grove, 1955 till promotion to glory.

Brother and Sister West could have retired and possibly had a few years of "pleasant idleness" together. They had constructed a cottage at Sea Breeze Camp, Hobe Sound, Florida for that purpose. However, the great Commander willed otherwise, and the Wests were not ones to question or disobey. They have answered the call to "come higher."

Both bodies lie at rest in the Rowley Cemetery at Hillsdale near their last pastorate. Their spirits await the "Trumpet Sounding" just over on the other side. We shall greet each other in the morning!

Thursday 7:30, p.m.: Elder C. A. Blair, Akron McLeister Memorial Church pastor, brought a message pointing up the lack of the power of the Spirit in the present day. There was a good response to the altar call.

Sunday 9:00 a.m.: Sunday School in the Youth Tabernacle conducted by Conference Sunday School Secretary, H. E. Robertson, Jr.

Sunday 10:00 a.m.: Ordination: Singing "The Cleansing Stream," and "Amazing Grace," led by David Robertson. Elder T. A. Robertson presented the General Evangelists and Special Workers to the Conference. Each spoke briefly. Prayer led by Elder C. A. Blair. An offering was taken. Duet by Erma Blair and Eunice Comadoll. Ordination Sermon by President H. C. Van Wormer from II Timothy 2:2, 6 and 7. Subject, "The Apostle's Exhortation to Timothy." The Secretary called the Roll of Candidates: William Shank, David Phelps and James Beers. The Ordination service was read by President H. C. Van Wormer assisted by Elders Sherman Beers, T. O. McCracken, Sheridan Rainey, T. A. Robertson, C. E. Huntsman and Roscoe R. Wilson. The president gave the Charge, conferred "Authority" by presenting each candidate with a Bible and extended the Right Hand of Fellowship. Parchments were presented by the Secretary.

Sunday 2:15 p.m.: Pioneer Service directed by Conference Pioneer Supervisor, T. A. Robertson. Several District Pioneer Chairmen spoke. Sunday 6:30 p.m.: Memorial Service for Elders Charles A. and Olive M. West in charge of the Committee on Memoirs.

Sunday 7:00 p.m.: Wesleyan Youth Service in charge of the Conference Youth President, Paul D. Stonebraker.

Standing Resolutions

- 1. A Committee on Auditing and Finance, consisting of three ministerial members, the Chairman being an Elder, shall be elected each year, the duties of which shall be to examine and report on the Treasurer's books and all the financial reports, except the W.M.S. and Y.M.W.B., and to be a Standing Committee to advise on Financial plans.
- 2. All persons received into membership in the churches of our Conference excepting those whose life of Christian fidelity has been of sufficient long standing, shall be received at first as associate members only.
- 3. When it becomes necessary for a church to call a pastor, it shall be the duty of the calling church to make provision for the expense incurred by the pastor in removing to a new field of labor. Money raised for this purpose shall NOT be applied on the pastor's salary. When an Elder is elected to the Conference Presidency, expenses incurred in moving to the Conference Parsonage, shall be paid from the Conference Treasury.
- 4. The Conference Sunday shall be the closing Sunday of Conference year, and the out-going pastor shall be paid his salary for that Sunday by the charge he is leaving.
- 5. At the beginning of the Conference session the president shall appoint a Nominating Committee of not less than three members, two Elders and one Layman to bring to the Conference a slate of Nominations for Committees, etc., for the Conference Temporary Organizations. Delegates Credentials shall be mailed to the Secretary not later than ten days before the convening of Conference. The Secretary shall be Chairman of the Credentials Committee and shall compile the Roll of Delegates from the regularly filled Credentials received.
- 6. No person shall be received into membership in Allegheny Conference until he shall have properly filled out an application blank, which application together with recommendations of his references must pass the approval of the President and his Advisory Board. Exceptions to this rule may be made by the President and his Advisory Board when they deem best.
- 7. The pastor of any church in the Conference shall be free to hold at least one revival meeting during the year, wherever he sees fit, and it is recommended that his salary be paid to him while he is absent.
- 8. Each pastor shall send a monthly report on the blank provided, to the Conference President showing the progress and the state of the work under his care.
- 9. Each church may elect a Nominating Committee whose duty it shall be to nominate candidates for church officers for presentation to the church at the time of the annual election of officers. Such nominations shall not exclude other nominations at the time of the business meeting.
- 10. Churches having business with the Conference Board of Trustees requiring a visit of that body to their church, shall be responsible for the expense attached to such calls, unless released by the Board.
 - 11. Inasmuch as trial sermons are hardly fair to the church or candi-

date and since the practice of having trial sermons is contrary to the usual manner of locating preachers, we recommend that no preacher shall accept any such invitations, if given. Exceptions to this rule may be granted by the Conference President upon request of any church.

- 12. Since considerable expense of transferring automobile title and license attends the moving of a pastor from one state to another, we recommend that where possible the calling church bear this expense.
- 13. We recommend that all districts emphasize Sunday School activity, and that Conventions be arranged for in conjunction with the visitation of the Conference Sunday School Secretary, who shall visit one Convention of each District during the year, at Convention expense.
- 14. We recommend that no one be elected to Elders Orders who does not have an abiding sense of divine call to give himself wholly to the function and ministry of an Elder in the WESLEYAN METHOD-IST CHURCH, and that no one shall be ordained to this office and work who is not applying himself wholly to this one thing in cares and studies, and clearly determining by God's grace to give himself wholly to this holy ministry, if possible, long before the appointed day of ordination, and manifesting such a determination of faithful Christian service to the church or congregation whom he was called to serveduring his years of preparation, so that as much as lieth in him, he has and will apply himself wholly to the work of the ministry, except in all cases of absolute necessity of such diversions to a legitimate-avocation for livelihood which neither jeopardizes the Lord's work nor blames the ministry.
- 15. We recommend that each church equip its parsonage with the necessary heating and cooking equipment, because of the variation of requirements in this equipment for the individual parsonage.
- 16. We recommend that in election of local church Advisory Committee each church permit the pastor to nomiate the members of this committee.
- 17. The Conference Secretary, as Chairman, with the Conference-President shall be a Standing Committee on Publications, whose duty it shall be to examine all matters pertaining to Conference printing and publications, and let all contracts for same.
- 18. All churches shall have a systematic means of keeping records, as required by Discipline, Paragraph No. 74, The "Ideal Church Record" published by the Bethel Publishing Company, Elkhart, Indiana, is a suggested form.
- 19. Local church treasurer's books shall close April 30, thus making the Conference fiscal year from May 1, to April 30. All funds received after this date shall be counted in the following year. Funds will be credited on Sub-Treasurer's books if received by May 5.

To meet the requirements of Paragraph 164 of the Discipline regarding revision of the Roll of membership, April 30, may be considered the close of the Conference year for Statistical purpose.

- 20. Minister's Pocket Credentials shall be issued to Elders and annually to Conference Preachers who are eligible.
- 21. Since the use of the wedding ring is not in accord with the standards of our church, we therefore, as a Conference, disapprove of

our ministers perfoming or taking part in the ring ceremony.

- 22. The pastoral vote shall be taken on each charge on the third Sunday in April. When it is the desire of the church to vote on a week night, it will be done sometime during the week previous to the designated Sunday. Permission to vote on another Sunday may be obtained from the President and the Advisory Board.
- 23. Each church shall allow their pastor a reasonable vacation with pay to be taken at his convenience. Two weeks is suggested.
- 24. In the judgment of the Allegheny Conference, viewing television programs of the type commonly offered in response to the public clamor for entertainment is an impediment to the development of holy character. We deplore the current television programs' evil effect upon the moral and spiritual life of the Nation. The principles of Wesleyan Methodism—being an epitome of the Christian religion—obligate Wesleyan Methodists to an unblameable life which constantly rebukes every form of evil and zealously advocates holiness of heart and life. Therefore, we most earnestly request our ministers and members, as those who must give account unto God in the Day of Judgment for anything which tends to influence toward evil, to refrain from the purchase of television sets and from viewing such programs for Jesus' sake.

Inasmuch as ministers are examples and patterns to the flock of Christ, the Allegheny Conference expects each of its ministers to set a wholesome example and to be a godly pattern in this respect, so that those to whom he ministers will follow his example and avoid exposure to this which menaces vital godliness.

- 25. The third Sunday of September shall be designated, each year, as Pioneer Sunday to present the work of the Pioneer department to our congregations and pastors be urged to exchange pulpits on this Sunday as much as possible.
- 26. Any Elder or Conference Preacher desiring a transfer from the Allegheny Conference to another Annual Conference, or to receive a letter of Standing, must have all notes paid to the Minister's Aid Fund, or have made satisfactory arrangements with the Chairman of the Auditing and Finance Committee for their repayment.

REPORT NO. I

THE CONFERENCE PRESIDENT

Dear Brothers and Sisters of the Allegheny Annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of America:

Greetings in the Name of Him whose work engages our attention!

Within the good providence of God, it is once more our privilege to assemble on this Old Hill Top for the 118th Annual Conference Session. This Conference has probably never met in a more critical and challenging time in all of her history than right now. Earth-shaking events are taking place rapidly. Christian civilization hangs in the balance both at home and abroad. At the opening of the 87th Congress, Speaker Sam Rayburn solemnly told its members as he swore them into office that never since the time of Christ had the world faced dangers so great as now. The May 12th, 1961, Human Events in the News stated that Veterans in the press emphasize that not in their lifetime have they witnessed such gloom and frustration in Washington.

To take world chaos as a matter of course is a deadly danger. Those of us who are older remember times when there was a fair degree of stability in governments and in international relationships, but the generation now assuming control in world affairs has never known an era of real peace. After ten days in office, President Kennedy stated publicly that in that short time he had been staggered by the magnitude of the dangers we face abroad.

To take the present-day Laodicean Modernistic Church trend as a matter of course and not be alarmed is equally dangerous. Consider the following pertinent statements relative to the church.

Dr. J. Vernon McGee says:

"The harlotry of worldliness has saturated the church. Even conservative circles have not escaped. Every device is to attract the mob. The church has attempted to be up-to-date in its methods without actually letting the world in. At present, the distinction is erased, and the flood of worldly devices has filled the church.

"It is accepted in the best fundamental circles that it is proper to use Hollywood stars and methods, provided they are willing to quote a verse from the Bible. Hosea called this spiritual adultery. We call it a sincere attempt to reach the unsaved, and dismiss it as nothing. In fact, it shocks us no longer."

Dr. Vance Havner expresses the condition in his own powerful way like this:

"Religion is quite stylish these days. It is front-page news. The world tells everybody to go to church. Novelists are getting out books based on the Gospels, the early church, and the Roman persecutions. Samson and Delilah, David and Bathsheba have

made the movies. Toy manufacturers are making dolls that kneel in prayer. Auditoriums are packed with crowds eating popcorn and drinking soda pop while they listen to 'Gospel-boogie'. Millions of records feature hill-billy religious rag-time. Nothing succeeds like success. When anything is popular, everybody exploits it. Business tycoons, politicians, song-writers, novelists, movie-stars—everybody rides the religious bandwagon, and has a good word for God these days."

In a recent issue of the United Evangelical Action, in an article entitled "In Defense of Intolerance" was this statement:

"The virtue of tolerance . . . can be over-done. . . . 'tolerance' . . . has degenerated into spiritual flabbiness. It is easier to assent to opinions than to assess them by the standards of revelation and moral law.

"In the modern world, 'anything goes'. No matter how unfounded a concept may be, or how fallacious the arguments advanced for it, men are afraid to expose it, lest they be deemed 'intolerant'."

Therefore, if we are going to be true representatives of the Philadelphian Church and refuse to buckle to the modern trend in the ranks of Christendom and, even in the Holiness movement, in the midst of this Laodicean Modernistic Church Age, we must expect to be branded as divisive and intolerant. It is true what Dr. R. T. Williams said years ago in his book—Sanctification—The Experience and Ethics, Page 9—

"Offer the world religion that it can take along with its sinful pleasures, and the following will be many; but when you ask men to die to sin and surrender their wills; to give up their own plans and ambitions and their own philosophy of life and take Jesus Christ and what He has to offer, you begin a battle that determines the outcome and destiny of souls.*** The religion that demands self-denial has never been popular, and it can never be popular.*** A religion that comes into conflict with the customs, ethics and pleasures of the human heart will immediately meet opposition."

In these critically significant days and in this day of abounding perplexities and problems, increasing confusion and irregularities, multiplying of "fuzzy thinking" along spiritual lines and "fuzzy mindedness" on vital issues and increasing of "that hidden principle of rebellion" against constituted authority, let us not forget that in 2 Timothy the Lord has warned us what to expect in these last days and how to meet the situation: "You must face the fact (this be constantly knowing, that in the last days difficult—hard, strenuous, trying times—will set in): the final stage of this world is to be a time of troubles. Men will love nothing but money and self; they will be arrogant, boastful, and abusive; with no respect for parents, no gratitude, no piety, no natural affection; they will be implacable in their hatreds, scandal-mongers, intemperate and fierce, strangers to all goodness, traitors, adventurers, swollen with self-importance. They will be men who put pleasure

in the place of God, men who preserve the outward form of religion, but are a standing denial of its reality. Keep clear of men like these—(And these be constantly shunning).

"But for your part, stand by the truths you have learned and are assured of . . . before God, and before Christ Jesus who is to judge men living and dead, I adjure you by his coming appearance and his reign, proclaim the message, press it home on all occasions, convenient or inconvenient, use argument, reproof, and appeal, with all the patience that the work of teaching requires. For the time will come when they will not stand wholesome teaching, but will follow their own fancy and gather a crowd of teachers to tickle their ears. They will stop their ears to the truth and turn to mythology. But you yourself must keep calm and sane at all times; face hardship, work to spread the Gospel, and do all the duties of your calling" (2 Tim. 3: 1-5, 14; 4:1-5, NEB).

Throughout the year we have continued in the work assigned to us at the last Annual Conference. To the best of our limited knowledge and ability, through much waiting upon God in the night hours, we have sought the guidance of the Holy Spirit in every action. Following is a report of our actions:

- 5. That everyone join the Conference Brigade of Intercessory Commandos;
- 6. That each church labor for an old-fashioned revival and Holy Ghost awakening;
- 7. That each pastor and church do their best to support the Conference Pioneer Work and its supervisor;
- 8. That all work together in these troublesome days to maintain "the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace";
- 9. That each one labor for a mighty resurgence of prayer—secret prayer, midnight prayer, increasing prayer, for prayer will release God upon the church and community problems until consciences will be awakened, vows paid, sin forsaken, talents uncovered, doubts banished, loved ones saved and homes re-established;
- 10. And that each pastor do his best to maintain Holiness Evangelism by (1) Preaching Holiness; (2) Living a Holy Life and (3) Having a passion for souls.

CONCLUSION:

In closing we wish to express our heartfelt gratitude for your prayers, your good cooperation, your patience and your understanding. We have greatly appreciated the good response to the plea for the Allegheny Annual Conference Brigade of Intercessory Commandos. We now have 678 in the band. We trust that each one will do his best to maintain a steady flow of intercession throughout the year 1961-1962. For there is absolutely no substitute for this intercession. Great preaching will not take its place, nor will a Ph. D. nor a winsome personality, nor a well-planned and executed promotional program, nor anything else. Call the roll of history's spirituality great—all of them baptized their ministries in prayer. Hudson Taylor called it "transacting business with God." Jonathan Edwards spoke of "storming Heaven by prayer!" Charles G. Finney said, "Be full of prayer whenever you attempt to preach and go from your closet to your pulpit with the inward groanings of the Spirit pressing for utterance at your lips." The success of the minister, the church and the individual Christian depends upon intercession in the secret place.

REPORT NO. 1-B

THE VICE PRESIDENT

Dear Brothers and Sisters of The Allegheny Conference: Greetings in the Precious Name of Jesus!

God has again given us the blessed privilege of meeting together on Stoneboro Camp Meeting Grounds. This time we meet for the 118th Annual Session of our beloved Allegheny Conference.

What a blessed privilege this really is that we can meet together like this without fear of being placed under arrest, or of being dispersed. In many parts of the world citizens are denied the privilege of meeting in any kind of gatherings, and especially they are denied the privilege of meeting for religious purposes, unless the meeting is completely under government control.

So many things have taken place in the past couple of years that I have been made to wonder if we would ever meet for a session of Conference in the year of 1961. I do not think that I am looking on the dark side when I mention the above as it would be so much better to have the Lord come and take us home to heaven or to even slip off

by the way of death to be with Him as some of our number have done this past year.

There is always the danger of being caught in the drift if His coming is delayed much longer. It is so easy to be careless, or to become so busy, or to become so engrossed in making a name or a place for ourselves that we omit the things which are necessary to spiritual life. Selfishness is creeping in on every hand, and deceitfulness is found even among professors of religion. There is a lack of sincere love for the cause of Christ and for one another.

It may be that His coming has been delayed because of His patience and longsuffering. The Word of God says, "The Lord is not slack concerning His promise, as some men count slackness; but is longsuffering to us-ward, not willing that any should perish, but that all should come unto repentance." (2 Peter 3:9). The Amplified New Testament gives it this way, "The Lord does not delay and be tardy or slow about what He promises, according to some people's conception of slowness, but He is longsuffering (extraordinarily patient) toward you, not desiring that any should perish, but that all should turn to repentance." Not a single church or individual can go down in defeat without God having done His best to save them. There is not a single person that can honestly say that God failed them. Beloved every one of us should be farther up the road spiritually.

Thank God He has helped us this Conference Year. I believe that it can be safely said that a real spirit of revival has been evident in many places over our Conference. I have been places where folk humbled themselves before God and men. I have seen them break through with shining faces and shout God's praises up and down the aisles. We want a resurrection without either a Gethsemane or a Calvary. Our choice is for a painless Pentecost, with a please-excuse-me-from-tarrying-in-the-upperroom attitude,—but phone me when the fire falls."

Beloved, let us not be afraid to face facts. The charges our brother has made are so true. It is late, but not too late to repair damages that have been done. There is a remedy offered in 2 Chron. 7:14. Let us make haste and do all that we can to have Him hear from heaven.

ITEM III. WORK IN THE CONFERENCE AS PIONEER SUPERVISOR:

1. Preached in a two-week meeting in the Pioneer Church at Hinton, West Virginia. This meeting was in July of 1960. Visited this Church and preached again April 29, 1961.

- 2. Visited Beckley, West Virginia in July of 1960 at least two times. Made the acquaintance of Rev. and Mrs. C. H. Midkiff and some of the folk who now belong to cur Church in this city. Spoke to a group gathered in the home of Rev. and Mrs. Midkiff. Visited Beckley again on April 30, 1961, and organized a Wesleyan Methodist Church, known by request of this people as, The Beckley Wickline Memorial Church. This is in memory of a dear Saint that was instrumental in helping some of these folk and many others to take the way with God in their country.
- 3. Visited The Holiday Park Community with Brother Ralph Manners in the fall of 1960. Altogether made three visits to this Community, which finally resulted in our starting a work here, first in the Maners' home. Now we are on the edge of this Holiday Park Allotment. We are located in a church building which we have if we keep it in as good condition as it was when we moved in and pay the utilities.
- 4. Duquesne Heights, Pittsburgh, Pa. Made three trips to this Church and Community. Our first one was with Rev. Paul David Stonebraker and a couple of his men. We authorized Rev. Stonebraker to have a group take a survey of this Community. Found a goodly number favorable to our locating in their Community as a Church. We have purchased the building, opened our work Sunday afternoon, May 21st with better than one hundred present, possibly eighteen or twenty from near the Church. Our first Sunday offering amounted to a little over \$32.00. This building cost us the sum of \$4,500.00. We may have to spend around fifteen hundred or a little more to make some changes and repairs.
- 5. Aliquippa. We have been working to get a work started here in this City. Mr. Walter Weaver and his wife have a weekly prayer meeting in homes, and this good brother is a good man to visit. I have visited this place myself three times. At the present time we are trying to find a suitable place for them to have services in and at the same time we are trying to find some property to build a church on. Property is high in price, and thus far we have been unable to find a place conveniently located and a piece of property that all felt clear that God would have us to own. We would be glad for the members of this Conference to join with us in prayer for God's leadership in regards to the work in Aliquippa. Our aim is to make this the next place in which we will establish a church.

In our visitation of the Pioneer Field, we have visited each Pioneer Church except Forest View at least two times and some of them we have visited three times. Forest View is making good progress. God has been helping Brother Harry Miller, Jr. with this work here. God gave us a good service with him May 28th. We had the privilege of viewing the fine neatly-built basement Church. I understand that Brother Miller did most of the work himself besides being faithful to this new pioneer work and also working hard as a bricklayer to earn a living for his family.

ITEM VIII. We recommend that credit for no book in the Course of Study be allowed for more than one quadrennium after that book has been officially dropped from the course.

ITEM IX. We will not recommend to the Pastoral Relations Committee any person who has not complied with Paragraph 170, Sub-paragraph 1 of the Discipline. We further insist that recommendations to Study and Travel with Transcripts of grade for which credit is desired will be in the hands of the Committee on the first day of the Annual Con-

ference, also that with each transcript the Committee shall be furnished a copy of the School catalogue from which the stranscript came. ITEM X. We require that students who are ready to take an examination in any book shall designate an acceptable member of the Wesleyan Methodist Church outside their immediate family, to whom Authorized Examiner shall mail the selected list of questions, and in whose presence the examination shall be taken in accordance with the rules and general instructions, for examinations. Such person shall certify that the examination was taken in his presence in an honorable manner, and shall return the examination paper to the examiner with self-addressed stamped envelope to return to the student.

ITEM XI. We place in nomination the name of Rev. Frank B. Miller for election to the office of Custodian of Conference Books. We recommend that no books be malled from the library unless sufficient postage accompanies application for the same and that this library be reserved for the use of those who are pursuing the Course of Study as Conference Preachers and Song Evangelists. We also insist that no study book or reading book be kept by one individual longer than forty-five days. In case of necessity, upon application to the Custodian an extension of thirty days may be granted.

ITEM XII. We urge that in writing examinations special attention be given to neatness, spelling, and composition. The Committee cannot give the same credit to papers that lack neatness and are poorly composed, as to those that have received proper attention in this respect. We require papers to be typewritten or written in ink.

ITEM XIII. In taking examinations, when a specified number of answers are asked for and more are answered, the grade will be based on the number asked for. As an example, if 10 answers were asked for and 12 were given, the grade will be based on the first 10. If less answers are given than the number requested, the grade will be based on the full number requested.

ITEM XIV. We wish to call to your attention that those wishing to take examinations on Wiley's Theology are to contact the member of the Committee for that particular year, sending postage, in order to receive the select list of questions for study.

ITEM XV. When anyone has completed a course of study in school and is to appear before this Committee he shall bring a transcript from that school in which the work was taken.

ITEM XVI. We recommend that those coming to us from another denomination must have a letter of recommendation from their superior. ITEM XVII. All Conference Preachers must remember that Paragraphs 91 and 92 of the Discipline require that the holder of an Annual Conference license must continue to hold an effective Quarterly Conference license and that license must be renewed each year and this re-

ITEM XVIII. All Conference Preachers must remember that Paragraph 170, sub-item (2) of the Discipline states that continued authorization to marry and to administer the sacraments depends on passing at least two books of the Course of Study each year.

REPORT NO. 4

COMMITTEE ON AUDITING AND FINANCE

Your Committee on Auditing and Finance submits the following report and recommendations:

ITEM I. WHAT SHALL THE CHURCHES PAY?

- 1. The following Denominational Budget items: World Missions, \$2.00; Education, \$3.50, (20 percent to Houghton Academy); Pension, \$2.00; Brainerd .25; Church Extension and Evangelism, \$1.50; Hephzibah Home, \$.35; Administrative Budget, \$1.00; General Conference Travel and Entertainment, \$.50; Australia, \$.25; Board Meeting Expense, \$.25; (these assessments are per church member per year.)
- 2. Undivided Conference Budget (Conference work) shall be equal to ten percent of the sum obtained by adding the three following items: Pastor's salary, parsonage rent, and church incidental expense (to be remitted monthly). Included in church incidental expenses are: Parsonage tax, all kinds of insurance on church and parsonage; janitor services and supplies, church utilities and fuel, parsonage utilities, and fuel when paid by the church, pastor's car expense when provided by the church, all other items which are similar to or comparable with the above. Not included are repairs, replacements, improvements, evangelistic help and special projects, church and parsonage furnishings. Sunday School and Church literature and similar items.
 - 3. Conference Group Life Insurance, \$.35 per member.
 - 4. Conference Entertainment, \$.45 per member.
- 5. Pioneer Self-denial envelopes for monthly remittances (abovetithe) shall be given our continued support.
- 6. General Church Extension shall be encouraged through the use of the Card Call Plan in our churches.

- 7. The pastor or persons responsible for the sale of the Conference Minutes in the local church shall remit \$1.00 per copy to the chairman of the Committee on the Sale of Conference Minutes, by March 31st. The Chairman of said committee shall mail statements to all those who have not paid for their Minutes by March 31st, thus enabling the report of the Committee to be prepared by April 30th.
- 8. The above financial items, with the exception of those mentioned in paragraphs 6 and 7, shall be sent to the District Sub-treasurers. Church Treasurers are to make remittances by the 5th of each month . to the credit of Conference Budget, Conference Missions, and Pioneer Fund.
- 9. Church Treasurers' reports to Quarterly Conference shall be made as of the close of the month preceding the Quarterly Conference. All church treasurers' records for the Conference year shall close April 30th. The Conference fiscal year is from May 1 to April 30.

ITEM II. WHAT SHALL THE SUNDAY SCHOOL PAY?

- 1. The first Sunday School offerings of the month to the Conference Missions Fund for the use of churches not self-supporting, etc., according to the recommendations of the Conference Mission Board.
 - 2. Sunday School birthday offerings to the Conference Mission Fund.
- 3. Denominational Sunday School Budget of \$.20 per Sunday School member.
- 4. All three items above mentioned are to be paid to the local church treasurer for remittance to sub-treasurer.

The Revival Squad committee shall be a standing committee of three members, appointed by the mission board. After the initial appointment one member shall be appointed each year for a threeyear term. This committee shall be amenable to the Mission Board.

2. Recommendation:

I. Plan for churches needing partial assistance

A. Building

- 1. Help shall be granted to pioneer works only.
- 2. This aid shall be administered by the conference mission board and in no case shall it exceed \$2000.00.
- 3. No funds shall be released until the conference possesses the deed to said property.

B. Pastors.

- 1. Churches shall not receive aid except by special action taken by the Mission Board, for more than five years.
- 2. Churches shall receive aid only after written application.
- The Mission Board shall review, or cause to be reviewed, this aid each six months.
- 4. The conference shall not pay more than \$125.00 per month to any church. The special project pastor and church shall be the only exception.
- II. Plan for special project churches.
 - A. We suggest that any special project churches be designed by an architect.
 - B. We shall have a planned style or type of construction.
 - The conference shall, if possible, secure an architect in Ohio and in Pennsylvania. State approved plans shall be drawn up and used repeatedly.

- The initial wing of the building shall be designed as a multipurpose building. It shall be so constructed that if circumstances warrant, it may be easily disposed of.
- This initial wing shall be constructed with or without a basement and shall be bricked.
- We shall take into consideration the fact that we may soon need to hold our own day schools.
- C. The conference shall employ a pioneer pastor.
- D. The conference shall pay in whole for the first wing of the proposed pioneer work.
- 3. We recommend, to the stationing committee, that after thorough investigation and intensive work and study, by the former Pioneer Secretary, the Conference Vice President, and F. E. Mansell, that the Hooversville Wesleyan Methodist church of Hooversville, Pa. receive no more financial aid from the Conference, and the church be disbanded.

Don't underestimate the value of the Sunday School in your own church and community. Our prayer is for God to give revival in the Sunday Schools of Allegheny Conference.

REPORT NO. 11

SECRETARY OF EVANGELISM

A new evangelism is not only making its approach, but receiving favor in large areas of the contemporary holiness church. It promises quick progress toward the erection of a showy ecclesiastical temple. It is motivated by the spirit of the world. Its goals are temporal successes through the increase of numbers and the accumulation of wealth. This evangelism is not born of New Testament vision and passion. It does not see as John the Beloved saw that the whole world lies in the wicked one, neither does it see that without holiness no man shall see the Lord. Its promoters neither have the mastery of inward and outward holiness within themselves nor the enablement to beget hunger for a like experience in those whom they seek to convert.

Few present-day Protestant ministers see clearly that where there is no passion for souls the indication holds that there is no present operation of the Holy Ghost life. They do not see that holiness does not exist where there is no daily active principal within the professed holiness follower which motivates him to work out his salvation with fear and trembling, by doing good so far as possible to all men—to their bodies, to their souls—by instructing, reproving or exhorting all with whom he has any intercourse. In such instances the Church and the ministry have miscarried in ignoring the end for which they were called. Whenever this scriptural demand has been evaded religion has been turned to a curse instead of a blessing.

The recovery of pure New Testament holiness, both inward and outward is a must. It is an absolute, without which we ourselves shall perish, and all our labors will come to nought. We need a new awakening to the heights and depths of the requirements of that holiness as taught by Jesus our Lord. He set forth neither too much nor toolittle, but exactly what it will take to reach heaven and escape hell. The conviction of our utter inability to meet His demands without the supernatural would drive us to our knees continually. It would also motivate us to the highways and byways seeking the eternal wellbeing of our fellowmen. A return to original New Testament holiness would undoubtedly set true evangelism on foot again and recover it from the faint, emaciated form that she now reflects.

Without an emphasis on the recovery of true holiness in our churches, ours shall be the error which prevailed in the mother church of over a hundred years ago. Of the situation then, the Rev. J. A. Wood: said, "I was grieved from year to year, by seeing what might astonish

hell, and fill heaven with lamentation—company after company of young converts walking into partially backslidden, unsanctified churches, first to wonder, then for awhile to be grieved, but finally to add another layer to the backslidden stratification."

The true ministry and church dare not deviate from the narrow way marked out by the New Testament, no matter how distasteful the Word is to this money-loving, pleasure-seeking generation.

The true disciple will not be deceived by suggestions for new approaches in witnessing, tainted with a questionable wisdom—a wisdom above that which is written. He will follow in the steps of his Master.

"The world", said Jesus, "cannot hate you; but me it hateth, because I testify of it, that the works thereof are evil."

If we follow in the steps of John the Baptist, Christ, and the Apostles, as a witness, then we shall bear witness against the evil of our day and bear witness to the Lamb of God that taketh away the sin of the world. To be effective and scriptural these two phases of true witnessing can never be separated.

The contemporary holiness church, seeking to enlarge her borders will do well to give diligent heed to the Word of Jesus Who directed His followers to dig deep and to lay their foundation on the Rock. Only there shall we of today find a safeguard of soul against the threatening storms of national crisis which are at hand. Already the dashing torrents of pride, worldliness, fear, anger and foolish desire have swept away the spiritual houses of thousands in the present-day holiness church

Let us hew to God's lines and commit the results to His faithful hand. We shall then have some fruit that shall endure the fire.

REPORT NO. 12

SECRETARY OF EDUCATION

In February, 1961, the Monthly Letter of the First National City Bank of New York said, "More money has been spent on schools and schooling in the past ten years than in the entire previous history of the United States." This vast spending has provided elaborate palaces, outstanding recreational centers, and spacious classroom areas, but it has not provided a better education. Our great need is not for more money, but for more morals; not for a greater curriculum, but for greater character; not for more education, but for Christian education. President Theodore Roosevelt said, "When you educate a man in mind but not in morals, you educate a menace to society".

The question which naturally arises out of such a discussion as this, "What is Christian education?" Let me say first that it is more than an education plus Bible teaching. It is a philosophy in which Christ is the center and everything else exists in relation to Him. It is a system in which every subject is presented in its relation to Christ. It is a force which teaches reverence to God as its starting point, and doing the will of God as its goal.

Since our great need today is the need of education which is truly Christian, let us consider the education of today in contrast with that of former times. First, let us note the textbooks used today in our schools. Some years ago, a committee was appointed to discuss how Christian our textbooks were. They discovered that the early books were 100% Christian. After three decades the textbooks were 75% Christian, In 1850 this number was 50% and in 1870 it was 25%. In more recent years, investigation reveals that our present textbooks are entirely void of anything that is suggestive of Christianity. Why such a change? Why did the Christian teaching of textbooks in America decline in less than 200 years from 100% to zero? The answer to this question is simple and clear. For the first fifty years of our nation's history, the education of children was in the hands of parents and churches. There were no public schools, About 1850, Horace Mann, secretary of the Massachusetts State Board of Education started the movement to secularize American education, to throw God out bodily, and to remove all spiritual content from the classroom discussions. Horace Mann first went to Europe, then to Prussia where he saw this system in operation and sought immediately to induce it in our nation.

What is the result? After some years of continual decline, we have today the National Education Association in Washington, D.C., which controls the entire public school system of America, and through this organization the system of Socialism in the school system has reached its climax. In this system God is not taught, but attacked; the Bible is not respected, but rejected; and morals are not advocated, but mocked. Recorded instances today tell of teachers who ridicule our founding fathers and make fun of the early leaders of our nation. E. Merrill Root in his book, "Brainwashing In the High Schools", says that our young people are being taught that the founders of our nation were selfish, materialistic conspirators. He says further that they taught that Washington was a tyrant, Jefferson a Communist, and the Constitution a conspiracy against the masses. Since our educators claim that nationalistic feeling creates wars, they seek to abolish all nationalism and patriotism and break down all respect for Americanism.

Finally, in view of such deplorable conditions, we naturally ask, "What can we do?" The only thing we can do is to return to the teaching of God's Word concerning education. According to the Word of God, parents are responsible for the education of their children. Today the state says, "Do not bother with your children, "We'll take them over. We'll tell them what to study, what they must do, and how to do it." The state is saying much about our rights as parents. We hear such expressions as the right to worship, the right to work, and the right to school our children. These rights are not to be delegated by the state. God gives every parent the right to school our children, and under God, we are responsible to perform it. Let us as parents stand againt this false philosophy of education. Let us fight for the souls of our children and see that they are schooled according to God's command.

REPORT NO. 15

TITHING SECRETARY'S REPORT

What do we mean by the tithe? It is one-tenth of all that with which God has prospered us. The faithful ones have always recognized this as God's method for carrying on His work. (Genesis 14:20). If all church members followed this plan there would be no lack of funds to spread the gospel of Jesus Christ. Not only would the financial needs of the church be met, but God's own peculiar blessing would rest upon His people. (Malachi 3:10). He challenges us to prove Him.

What is the foundation of the tithe-law or love? Since tithing was in practice nearly five-hundred years before the law was given at Sinai, (Genesis 14:20; 28:22), it would be a sad misrepresentation to say it is founded on law. Love is the basis of the tithe. Love for the One Who has forgiven our sins and has adopted us into His family. Love for the One Who is responsible for the prosperity we have. Love for the One Who is our all in all, the lily of the valley, the bright and morning star to our soul.

But, do I have to tithe to be a Christian? No, my dear friend, you don't have to. As a matter of fact, if you tithe because you have to, you have already lost your blessing. Wouldn't it be distressing if we supported our families because we had to? We give our loved ones

all that we possess because we love them. Herein lies the joy and happiness of family life. The New Testament Christian tithes because he is in love, and he has one controlling desire—to tell others about his Jesus. This love does not stop with one-tenth, but gives over and above that which is required. Therefore, giving may be considered a good measure of our love and devotion to God.

Why does God use this method to carry on His work? He could have used another method, but this one has special significance for the believer. The tithe is really for the spiritual benefit of the tither. It is to teach him to put God and His kingdom first. When God is first in our giving, it becomes natural to put Him first in our home, work and pleasure. Again, the tithe teaches men to recognize and admit God's ownership of all things. One is not far from the kingdom when he realizes this truth. Finally, tithing is an act of worship. The man who goes to God's house, mingles with God's people, receives blessings from God's Word, and puts into the Lord's treasury the Lord's money, is one who truly worships his God. We conclude that "the tithe" has a spiritual value that is overlooked by those who fail in this grace. (II Cor. 8:7), "As ye abound in everything, in faith, and utterance, and knowledge, and in all diligence, and in your love to us, see that ye abound in this grace also".

STONEBORO CAMP ASSOCIATION PRESIDENT

In compliance with the duty imposed upon the President by the Campmeeting Association, the following report is hereby submitted:

As you come upon the Camp Ground this year, you will notice that we have a new workers' cottage, that the Youth Tabernacle has a beautiful new ceiling well put up and has been painted inside and that the Young People have built a new 16-room boys' dorm. We appreciate our Young People who are doing what they can in some worthwhile projects in the Conference. The store building had to have a new wall put under it. New Toilet facilities have been placed in the old straw building for the ladies at Conference.

You will also notice that our Caretaker has been doing a wonderful job on the Grounds. He has been handicapped this year on account of the bad wet weather in getting things ready for the Annual Conference.

Today the question is often asked, "What is the worth of such a Camp Meeting as we are trying to hold at Stoneboro?" In his write-up on the last Camp for the "Conference Messenger", I believe Rev. F. REPORT NO. 25

RESOLUTIONS .

RESOLUTIONS: Your Committee on Resolutions submits the following report: BE IT RESOLVED:

- 1. That since the tendency of our times is towards indistinct lines as pertains to doctrine and compromise as pertains to practice, we as a Conference, by adopting this report, re-affirm our position to adhere to the general and special rules of our Discipline as interpreted by Allegheny Conference.
- 2. That we re-affirm our love and our loyalty to our beloved denomination by praying for its leaders; and that we resolve to express our appreciation for the officials of our Conference and the standards which they maintain by faithfully praying for them and earnestly following their example.
- 3. That since our conference sustains tremendous losses among our youth from our Sunday Schools and Churches, we therefore urge our pastors to encourage the Youth of our Churches to attend the Annual Youth Conference, District Youth Rallies and Stoneboro Camp Meeting, and that every effort be put forth to lead them into a definite experience of salvation and when deemed advisable to unite with the

Church. Be it further resolved that we refrain from any compromise of our standards or introduction of social programs into our churches, which only lead to superficial loyalties, spiritual decline, and discouragement of the spiritual laity.

- 4. That since divorce is one of the great curses of our land, a corruption of the morals of our youth, a destroyer of our homes, and a violation of God's law, we therefore urge our pastors to prayerfully and tenderly warn our people, young and old, of this popular evil and its consequences.
- 5. That we go on record as being unalterably opposed to any affiliation whatsoever with the National Council of Churches or any of its departments. That we maintain our guard against the modernistic bias reflected in the Revised Standard Version of the Bible and the "Interpreter's Bible" which have been produced under the auspices of the National Council of Churches.
- 6. That since we recognize the religious motion picture to be an evil and not to be consistent with the divine plan for the presentation and propagation of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and since we recognize the use of plays and other entertaining diversions as substitutes for Holy Spirit anointed presentation of truth, we therefore urge our pastors and churches to refrain from using such in the Churches of the Conference.
- 7. That we urge our ministers and laymen to maintain the family altar as a spiritual institution in our homes, to practice the grace of systematic fasting and give themselves to intercessory prayer.
- 8. Since our Conference boundaries include areas of shifting population, we recommend that our pastors keep each other informed of those who move from area to area who attend our Sunday Schools and Churches.
- 9. That since we recognize Communism to be a subtle, godless influence, and that the present trends to a welfare state are opening wedges to supplant our democratic way of life—be it resolved:
- a. That our ministers and church leaders warn our people through the preached Word and the printed page of the subtle approach, satanicorigin, and destructive results of this political philosophy.
- b. That we recognize our solemn obligation to pray for the President of our Nation and the committees of Congress who are engaged in exposing and opposing Communistic infiltration into our American system, and further, that God will grant them wisdom and courage to fight this evil.
- c. That the Conference Secretary convey in writing this resolution to the House on Un-American Activities Committee, the Senators and Representatives of the States within our bounds; and further that he express our appreciation for their labors in exposing and opposing the Communistic infiltration into our American system.
- 10. Whereas we recognize the continued advancement of the Roman Catholic system in numerical strength and political power in our nation, school systems and local governments and that since we recognize this constitutes a menace to free government, freedom of worship, and con-

science if it should gain a majority position, be it therefore resolved:

a. That the ministry of the Conference instruct the people in our Sunday Schools and churches concerning the prevalent practices and teachings of the Roman Church, relative to civil government.

b. That we instruct our people in the teachings and practices as

advanced by the Roman Church concerning marriage.

- 11. That we recognize crime comic books and pulp magazines, which depict violence, sadism, brutality, and blood lust unparalleled in the history of children's literature of any time or nation, to be a contributing factor to the present delinquency problem. We therefore urge our people to war against this evil wherever practicable by withholding patronage from those engaged in the distribution of these tools of Satan and by reproving and rebuking them with Christian love.
- 12. That we declare ourselves as supporting the reading of the Holy Scriptures in the public schools and that we urge our ministers and parents to unite and, by all ethical means, seek to improve the moral character of our youth through the boards of education, offices of superintendent, principal, faculty, and Parent-Teacher Associations. And be it further resolved: that we endeavor to arouse our constituency to support, by prayer and other methods, Christian day schools which adhere to Bible principles and standards, and which are sane and consistent in Biblical interpretation and Christian experiences.
- 13. That we register our protest as opposing Federal aid to education as it pertains to the parochial schools on the elementary, secondary and collegiate levels as being inconsistent with the principle of separation of church and state which we have maintained in this nation from its founding, by instructing the Secretary of this body, now in Session, to write the Representatives and Senators of the Congressional Districts and States within the bounds of the Allegheny Conference. And further that our people register their individual protest by writing to the Representatives of their Districts and the Senators of their States, and that the Conference President be instructed to send to the local churches at an appropriate time a statement containing the basic reasons for our opposition to Federal aid to parochial schools to assist our people in writing their protest, and likewise include the names of the Representatives and Senators of the various States within our Conference bounds.
- 14. That we register our protest to Federal aid for public schools, since such aid would be an intrusion on community responsibility and would tend toward Federal control of the local schools; we therefore recommend that this body instruct the Secretary of the Conference to register our protest in writing to the Representatives and Senators of the Congressional Districts and further that the Conference President be instructed to send to the local churches a letter containing our basic reasons for our opposition to Federal aid to Education to assist our people in preparing their protest to be sent to the Representatives of their Districts and the Senators of their States.
- 15. That this body instruct the Secretary of the Conference to write the Board of Administration of the Denomination, with a copy of his letter to be forwarded to the Chairman of the Board of Local Trustees

of Houghton College, expressing our opposition to our denominational, educational institutions applying for and receiving from the Federal government grants or loans for their development. And if the present proposals before the Legislative Body of the Nation to grant Federal aid to Parochial schools be enacted into the law, we likewise oppose Federal grants to our schools for operating expenses. We feel that such action by our educational institutions in receiving funds from the Federal Government for development and operation is a breakdown of our position of supporting the principle of separation of Church and State and is an opening wedge to Federal control of our schools.

- 16. That we register our protest to the President of the United States for his unofficial endorsement of the "Tractors for Freedom Committee" which is attempting to negotiate with the Communist Regime of Cuba's Castro for the releasing of the invasion prisoners. Since we believe that such action by this Committee with the President's unofficial endorsement pays tribute to the Communist dictatorship entrenched in Cuba, endangers the prestige of the United States in the eyes of the peoples of the world, and tends to solidify Castro's hold over Cuba and her eight million people, we therefore resolve that:
- a. The Secretary of this Annual Conference now in Session write the President of the United Sates in the name of this body as opposing the President's endorsement of the "Tractors for Freedom Committee."
- b. That the President of this Annual Conference be instructed to obtain permission to reproduce or to obtain copies of a letter prepared by Human Events registering opposition to the President of the United States' endorsement of the "Tractors for Freedom Committee" and that such letters be sent to the churches for use by the lacal constituency in registering their individual protests.
- 17. That these resolutions together with the standing resolutions be read on each charge at the first quarterly meeting following the distribution of the Conference Minutes.

Basic Reasons for our Opposition to Federal aid to Public Schools:

- (1) That there is a loss of the educational dollar in red tape when tax dollars for education are funneled through the Federal Government.
- (2) That the Federal aid to public schools tends to lesson Community responsibility for the operation of the school.
- (3) That Federal aid for education tends to place the local schools under Federal control.
- (4) That since academic and scholastic success of a student does not depend upon elaborate plant facilities, and that "the little red schoolhouse" as yet is one of the finest educational institutions that this country has ever produced, we feel that Federal aid to education enhances merely the modern trend that money can buy anything.

REPORT NO. 28

SPECIAL RECOMMENDATION REGARDING CERTAIN CONFERENCE FINANCES

PREAMBLE

It has been recommended by Certified Public Accountants, Magner, Wilson and Associates, who have audited our Conference Treasurer's books, that all Conference funds, now being handled by individual treasurers be brought into the annual audit of the C. P. As. by channeling said funds through the Conference Treasurer. This would effect: 1. The Aid Fund, 2. The Pension Fund and 3. The Group Insurance Funds, and any other funds that might be established.

The Finance Committee, with the Conference Vice-president and Treasurer made an initial study of this proposal in August, 1960, and a month later the study was continued with the Conference President also being present. On October 4th, 1960 the Conference Treasurer and Finance Committee Chairman met and drew up the following recommendations which are submitted for your consideration:

ITEM NO. I

In accordance with the recommendation of Certified Public Accountants, Magner, Wilson and Associates, who have audited our Conference Treasurer's books, it is recommended that the records of all funds being handled by individual treasurers be brought into the annual audit by channeling said funds through the Conference Treasurer. Treasurers for these funds would be continued under the title of Financial Secretaries, whose functions would be to receive funds as they now do, but they would remit to the Conference Treasurer their entire receipts, monthly or quarterly, as may be mutually agreed upon with the Conference Treasurer, who shall issue payments by authorization in the same manner as all other funds are now paid by him. The duties of the Financial Secretaries would be on much the same basis as that on which the Camp Association Financial Secretary has been functioning for several years.

This system provides for a uniform flow of all funds as well as to include them in the annual audit of the C. P. As. which has not been done heretofore.

ITEM NO. II

Inasmuch as the Conference uses the facilities of the Camp Association for its Annual Conference Sessions, we recommend that the Camp Association be requested to stipulate a flat rate for providing entertainment for the Annual Conference. This would include dining half operation, labor costs in opening and maintaining the grounds, utilities

and miscellaneous expenses. Under the present setup our budget item of Conference Entertainment provides only for dining hall operation. All other expenses (which last year amounted to \$1,832.80) have been paid by the Conference from the Conference Budget Fund. When a flat rate is submitted by the Camp Association, we recommend that the Conference Entertainment assessment be increased to cover same.

ITEM NO. III

So that the Church Aid Fund will be no further depleted, it is recommended that the present arrangement of allocating ten per cent of Church Aid loan payments to the Ministers Aid Fund be discontinued.

It is further recommended that an interest rate of 3% be levied on loans from both Church and Ministers Aid Funds. For the sake of uniformity, notes now outstanding shall become interest bearing as of June 1, 1961. Interest will become due and payable annually thereafter.

Notes for new loans will be issued with the maturity date as of June 1st. When less than one year is involved, interest will be computed quarterly. When less than three months is involved, no interest charge will be levied. A thirty-day grace period for interest payments shall be granted, after which all unpaid interest shall become a part of the principal.

Any exemptions from the above ruling or from the payment of interest shall rest in the hands of the Conference President and the Finance Committee. Appeals for such exemptions must be in writing and bear the signatures required for note renewals as indicated in the following paragraph:

The renewal of Aid Fund notes, for both pastors and churches, shall be requested in writing, and mailed to the Finance Committee Chairman not later than May 31st. The request for renewal shall be accompanied by a statement of the plan of payment for the ensuing year. In case of Church Aid notes, the request shall bear the signature of both the pastor and delegate elected to the ensuing Conference, or the Chairman and Clerk of the last Quarterly Meeting.

Failure to comply with the above will result in the name of the pastor concerned being submitted to the Character Committee as soon as Conference has convened.

Applications for Aid Fund loans for churches shall be made to the Conference Board of Trustees.

Applications for Aid Fund loans for pastors shall be made to the Conference Finance Committee.

Loans made from the Conference Missions and Budget funds shall be channeled through the Aid Fund.

ITEM NO. IV

Notes for all loans shall be issued in triplicate. The original, bearing the proper signatures, shall be kept in the hands of the Conference Treasurer; the second copy in the hands of the Financial Secretary from whose fund the loan is made; and the third copy in the hands

of the person or church negotiating the loan.

REPORT NO. 29

FINANCE COMMITTEE'S SPECIAL STUDY ON CONFERENCE BUDGET

The new plan of operation for payment of our Conference budget, as adopted one year ago, has given rise to considerable research and study on the part of your Finance Committee, due to uncertainties which have been called to our attention in the interim.

The financing of an organization of this size, in a manner that is sound for the Conference, and fair to the churches, must be handled advisedly.

The condition of our Conference finances for the past several years has been good, regardless of the economic slump in many areas, and it is imperative that we maintain a consistent and uniform income if we are to avoid economic embarrassment and trouble. Therefore, we have—

- Checked the activity of each church as it relates to payment of Conference budget.
- Communicated with pastors whose churches, under the new percentage plan, would be required to pay more budget, and those who would be required to pay less.
- 3. Made a special trip to Marion, Indiana to confer with the Indiana Conference President and his Committee on Ways and Means, as to the success of the system of Conference budget which they employ, which operates on an income per centage basis.

We are pleased to give you the following summary of our findings: Referring to item No. 1, above, the records in the 1960 Conferenceminutes show that 68% of our churches failed to pay full budgets. These underpayments range from \$25 to \$414 per church. Those underpaid by less than \$25 were considered paid in full. Some churches, however, paid nothing at all, while others paid a very small percentage.

With this degree of irregularity in budget payments, we may count ourselves fortunate to have maintained our present level of income. We are seeking to determine the reason for this irrgularity and correct it where possible.

We believe there are three principal reasons for failure to pay full budgets; Namely—

- 1. Inadequate funds for both local expenses and Conference budget.
- 2. Lack of concern on the part of pastors and local church officials.
- 3. Misunderstanding as to what constitutes full budget payment.

Undoubtedly there can be improvement in the latter two. A recommendation relative to the third item will be offered at the close of this report.

It is a fair question to ask, "How much of this irregularity and"

deficiency can we expect to be carried over into the operation of the new plan?"

One year ago the churches were requested to send to Conference a report of their Sunday offerings for the year preceding, for which each church had been provided a specially prepared form. Only 56% of the churches responded, and we feel that this is an inadequate per centage on which to figure a new plan of financing.

Inasmuch as 68% of our churches failed, in some measure, to pay full budgets, and 44% did not provide income figures as requested a year ago, we find that we are without adequate assurance of the success of the new plan.

It should also be called to your attention that since 68% of the churches did not pay full budgets, the remaining 32% which have paid full or more than full budgets, have borne more than their proportionate load of the total received. Some of the pastors of the churches which are among this 32% are not sure that their people will be willing to pay the amount of increase which the new plan may place upon them.

Regarding our interview with the President of the Indiana Conference and their Committee on Ways and Means, they have been operating, prior to August 1960, on the per capita basis, paying about \$7.50 per church member. Seeking a more satisfactory plan, they adopted the per centage plan which operates as follows: "Churches whose regular Sunday School and church offerings do not exceed \$150 per week shall remit 7%. Those which exceed \$150 per week shall remit 9%".

In response to our question as to possible unfavorable response from the local churches, the President said there had been little or none. Changing from the per capita plan to the percentage plan had, however, brought about only minor differences in the amounts to be paid by the churches.

In our case it would be quite different in a number of instances. There would be many substantial differences between the assessments of the old plan and the new, and the largest differences would be upward. To illustrate: The greatest decrease of which we have record would be \$146, while the greatest increase would be \$537.

While the per centage plan seems to have been well accepted by the Indiana churches, in lieu of their former plan, yet as it relates to the Conference Treasury, it does not compare at all favorably with that of our Conference. It was stated by their Treasurer that unless there is an increase in their receipts during the last quarter of their Conference year, they face the possibility of closing in the red. Their only alternative is to increase the percentage.

In 1937 our Conference switched from the per capita budget plan to the plan that has been used for the past 24 years. The year the change was made our budget showed an increase of 272%, and it was badly needed. The rate of increase since that time has averaged about \$1000 a year for 16 years until 1954. At that time a full-time vice-president was placed in the field and when the need was made known we had a financial revival which brought in an additional \$10,000 a

year and we have been holding that line quite consistently ever since, with an annual average of \$28,862. The year just ended is \$533 below that average. These figures may not correspond accurately with those of the Treasurer, but they are approximate and reveal the trends.

The Indiana Conference has been operating on such a narrow margin that they found it necessary to borrow from one fund to another. We were told that the new per centage plan appears not to be correcting that situation. They are a third larger than we are in full membership (Ind.—4561; All.—3388) and yet they closed their books last year with a balance which was less than one fourth of our closing balance.

The above facts and comparisons reveal that we have a financial plan which is operating successfully. For this we should be profoundly grateful.

Now, as relates to the local churches, there are some inequities, and those inequities are the grounds on which the new per centage plan was recommended and adopted a year ago. However, when a thoughtful comparison is made by placing the success of our old plan alongside its inequities among the churches, we believe it is wise, before we attempt to put the new plan into effect, to conduct a more comprehensive study of the local church incomes and budget payments than it has been possible to do up to this time.

Therefore, in view of these observations, we submit the following recommendations:

- That the operation of the percentage plan be deferred for further study.
- 2. That the budget for the current year be raised on the same plan we have been using, viz. 10% of the total obtained by adding the three following items: Pastor's salary parsonage rent and incidental church expenses.
- 3. That for the sake of clarifying the preceding item, the hudget be based on the figures in the statistical reports for the year just past, and that those figures, indicating the amount of the annual budget, divided by 12 to indicate the monthly budget, be written on the ront of the pastor's monthly report pads, and that the same figures be provided, on separate forms, for the local church treasurers.

- b. That we strive to have each active member of the Wesleyam Youth become a member of the Wesleyan Youth Prayer League.
- 3. a. That we refrain from reading unwholesome literature such as comics, Detective and True Story or other literature detrimental to our spiritual life.
- b. That we build Christian Character through careful and extensive reading of edifying literature.
- 4. That because of the physical, moral, and spiritual degeneration resulting from the use of tobacco, narcotics and alcoholic beverages, especially among our youth, we take a vigorous stand against these evils.
- 5. That we take a positive stand against worldliness in that we refrain from the following:
- a. Card playing, games of chance, theater attendance, public beaches, mixed bathing, dance halls (including participation in Senior Proms), skating rinks, bowling, circuses, carnivals, fairs, and viewing television.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THANKS

We, the Committee on Thanks, believing that we express the sentiments of the Youth as a whole, wish to thank God for the privilege of meeting in this convention and for the manifestation of the Holy Spirit in each of the services.

We feel the Lord has favored us with Spirit-filled leadership and we appreciate the untiring effort and the long hours which the Executive-Council has given to make our Wesleyan Youth Convention not only a time of rich fellowship, but a time of spiritual deepening.

We are impressed with the choice of speakers this year. From Bro..

- 11. That each society send the President, two delegates, chaperon and pastor, with expenses paid, to the Annual W. Y. Convention.
- 12. a. That the Conference W. Y. President arrange to hold at least one service in each zone of each district during the year.
 - b. That his traveling expenses be paid by each zone visited.
- 13. That the District and Zones evaluate their activities according to the following point system and an appropriate award be given to one achieving the highest percentage.
 - 10 points for having at least 6 Rallies a year.
 - 10 points for the organization of each new society.
 - 10 points for a Paid Conference Budget for every organized society. (50 cents per member)
 - 10 points for District or Zone Youth revival.
 - 10 points for meeting Zone pledge.
 - 5 extra points for over subscribing the zone pledge 10%.
 - 5 points for Conference dues for every unorganized society.
 - 5 points for Chairman attending Annual Conference Convention.
 - 5 points for Chairman reporting the year's activities to the Annual Conference Convention.
 - 5 points for report of Zone Rallies sent into the Conference Messenger.
 - 5 points for report of one Zone Rally sent into the Wesleyan Youth magazine.
- 14. That 1% of the General Fund be set aside as the Literature Fund, in order that pertinent literature be distributed to our Youth. Said literature to be approved by the Conference President, the Chairman of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders, and the Conference W. Y. President.

Goals for 1961-62

- That we seek to have a spiritual program that is God-honoring, Christ-centered, and spiritual-directed.
- 2. That all Youth Societies report to the Annual Youth Convention.
- 3. That at least 5 new W. Y. Societies be organized.
- 4. That we heartily support the Conference W. Y. program and projects.
- 5. That these goals and methods be read in each local society within the first month after receiving the conference minutes. Also that they be read at the first youth rally.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS We, the Committee on Resolutions of the Wesleyan Youth of the

Allegheny Conference submit the following:

- 1. That we, as Wesleyan Youth, govern our lives by adhering to the Standards of the Bible and the principles set forth in the Discipline, as interpreted by the Allegheny Conference.
- 2. a. That we, as Christian youth, have a definite plan of daily Bible reading, Bible memorization, and prayer, and accept privileges of carrying a soul burden.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON GOALS AND METHODS

The Committee on Goals and Methods submits the following report:

- 1. That every church organize a Wesleyan Youth Society.
- 2. That each society send the name and address of the local W. Y. President and Secretary to the Conference W.Y. President not later than one week after election.
- 3. That each society pay annually: \$1.50 per full member for General Conference dues and \$.50 per full member for Conference dues, and \$.50 per full member for Annual Convention Entertainment and request that each unorganized society pay Conference dues for each regular attender to Weekly Youth meetings, and that this and all other monies to be dispersed be sent through the regular channel of local church treasurer and District sub-treasurer, books to close April 30th.
- 4. a. That our pastors and local W. Y. Presidents carefully read and do their best to carry out the program of our Efficiency Standard.
- b. That a committee composed of the Pastor, W. Y. President and Secretary or the Efficiency Standard Chairman, shall grade the local society quarterly, according to the Efficiency Standard. This rating shall be submitted to the Conference Efficiency Standard Chairman quarterly and the annual report two weeks before the Annual Young People's Conference.
- c. That the secretary keep such records as are necessary for this committee to make this rating.
 - 5. That each W.Y. support the Pioneer Program of the conference.
- 6. That each W.Y. heartily support our missionary endeavor according to the requirements of the Discipline with one service a month for missions and we suggest that the offering of said meeting be given for missions.
- 7. That each local society strive to engage in as many of the following as possible:
 - a. Street and institutional meetings.
 - b. Cottage prayer meetings.
 - c. Tract distribution.
 - d. Door-knob evagelism.
 - e. Visitation of sick and shut-ins.
 - f. Cooperation with child evangelism, Daily Vacation Bible School, and Religious Education in public schools.
 - g. Become a member of Conference Brigade of Intercessory Commandos.
- 8. That each local W. Y. cooperate 100 percent to make Wesleyan Youth Week all God wants it to be, and strive to interest other young people outside the church in these services.
- 9. a. That a Local Prayer League Leader be elected to cooperate with the Conference Prayer League Leader to recruit volunteers for the W. Y. League.
- b. That the name and address of this leader be sent at once to the Conference Prayer League Leader.
- 10. That the W. Y. augment the church and Sunday School library, or where there is none, sponsor one with good church literature approved by the pastor and adult counselor.

18. All statistics and information furnished the conference secretary at the time designated by the conference

Record of Improvement

Every society improved over the course of the year, except one. The largest percentage of progress was from 72% to 91%.

Item IV Recommendations

Considering the lack of co-operation and the criticisms, (not advantageous, un-organized societies, too detailed, and fear of poor percentage)

we, as a committee, therefore recommend either a re-evaluation and re-emphasis, or a respite of the present Efficiency Program.

mos, challenging days of human history. Without a doubt we are in the "last days" of which the Bible speaks, but they still can be "challenging days". Many of our national leaders have tried to eliminate God from their thinking and their disconcerted reasoning has plunged us into one of the darkest cutlooks our nation has ever known. Perplexing problems of every kind are facing our generation and the muddled confusion is ever increasing. In the midst of this bewilderment, it should therefore become our "challenge" to be Spirit-led in a plain path. In this "end time" day our national foundations are crumbling. Pleasure madness is deteriorating our moral fiber and our national freedoms, purchased by blood,—are disintegrating before our very eyes. "Where, then," you ask, "is the 'challenge'?"—The days may be dark, young people, but like Noah,-build an ark and make it one of righteous, holy living which one day will be caught away in the rapture and thus escape the furor of the Tribulation. The masses may be running to the excesses of sin. but like the three Hebrew children, it is a "challenge" not to bend to the world though everyone else is submitting. Heed the words of the Apostle Paul when he said: "Wherefore take unto you the whole armour of God, that ye may be able to withstand in the evil day, and having done all, to stand."

First, let me express my deep appreciation to you all for the prayers, patience and cooperation you have extended to me this year. My inexperience and natural limitations must have been a trial to you on many occasions. No one, however, has felt these limitations more keenly than I, but I have endeavored to know God's will and follow it.

The past year has witnessed several accomplishments in the field of Conference Youth work. A new local was organized in the Templeton Church. The youth organization of the Canton Second church has been revived and is now actively working as a youth group. The new boys' dorm is completed, furnished, nearly paid for and occupied this Youth Convention. Much credit is due Rev. Paul Betz for his fast, efficient work in the erection of this new dorm. We anticipate a new girls' dorm next year.

Your zone chairmen have done an excellent job this past year. I feel no other sector of Conference work demands so much patience, love and understanding as that of youth supervision. We thank God for the consecrated chairmen who so ably shepherded the youth of their respective zones.

It has been a joy to work with the men of your Executive Council. Together, we have tried to ascertain the will of the Spirit before making any plans or decisions. I feel your Executive Committee has worked in complete harmony with Rev. H. C. Van Wormer, Rev. T. A. Robertson and other officials of our Conference. We have no desire to be "a law unto ourselves" but with a close proximity of purpose, we want to do our part in elevating the standard and promoting a revival.

CONVENTION MINUTES

First Day - July 14, 1961

The 30th annual Youth Convention of the Allegheny Conference convened on Stoneboro Camp Ground with the first service on July 13, 1961. At this service the appointments for temporary organization were read. The first business meeting was held on July 14, 1961, and was called to order by Rev. P. D. Stonebraker. Rev. Leonard Sankey led in singing "More About Jesus". Roll was called with 85 delegates present, 28 Pastors, and 21 Youth Presidents.

The Bar of Conference was set as the center and right hand tier of seats and the platform. The President's report was given and accepted as read. Report of Nominations for Temporary Organization was read. The Treasurer's report was read and adopted. The Auditor's report was read and adopted. The motion was made and supported that the Youth Statistical blanks were in the future to be handed out at the close of the Conference year by the Conference Secretary.

The meeting was adjourned by vote.

Second Day - July 15, 1961

The second business meeting was called to order by President Stonebraker. Rev. James Beers led in singing "He Brought Me Out". Roll was called and 92 delegates were present. The nominating committee read a partial report. Balloting for president ensued. Tellers were: Team 1, Wm. Shank, Dennis Landi, Allen McCraken, Bud Hannold; Team 2, Roscoe Wilson, Richard Agnew, Jerry Blair, John Hoien. The Efficiency Standard Committee report was read and adopted. A motion was made and seconded that there be a re-evaluation and re-emphasis on the Efficiency Standard and have a committee to look into it. The motion was carried, and Rev. Stonebraker appointed a committee of Donald Boyd, P. Duncan, and J. Hogg to look into this. The ballot for president resulted in the election of P. D. Stonebraker with 152 votes out of 153 cast. Balloting for Vice-President ensued. Report of the Committee on Resolutions was read and adopted. Report of the Committee on Goals and Methods read and adopted. The ballot for Vice-President resulted in the election of H. E. Robertson, Jr. with 145 votes out of 149. Balloting for Secretary ensued. Report of Committee for re-evaluation of Efficiency Standard read. It is recommended that items 10-18 be dropped. Keep items 1-9 with item 3 receiving 20%. This report was accepted. Report of Prayer League Secretary read and accepted. The ballot for Secretary resulted in the election of David Phelps with 138 votes out of 149. Balloting for Treasurer ensued. Report of Statistical Committee read and adopted. Report of Executive Committee of the nominations of District and Zone Chairmen given. The ballot for Treasurer resulted in the election of E. O. Hannold with 125 out of 134 votes. C. L. Boston was elected as Prayer League Secretary. Donald Boyd was nominated as Chairman of Efficiency Standard. The motion was passed that all unfinished business be left in the hands of the executive committee. Adjourned by vote.

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things accompany purity and deep spirituality. I Tim. 2:9, 10. Also, that we adhere to Deut. 22:5, "The woman shall not wear that which pertaineth unto a man—for all that do so are an abomination unto the Lord thy God."

b. That we refrain from wearing of jewelry, which includes brooches and all other ornaments. Isa. 3; I Pet. 3:3, 4. Also, that we do not wear nude shades of hose, shoes with open toes and heels or spike heels, or hats with display flowers, veiling, and other superfluous adornments. Furthermore, we urge our women to wear hose and dress modestly in the home, that we may be examples of modesty to those who approach our doors.

- c. That we do not adhere to the worldly style of cutting (front or back) or curling the hair and the long bob. I Cor. 11:15. We believe with John Wesley on the Scripture, I Tim. 2:9, that "Broidered hair" means curled hair.
- d. That we also dress our boys and girls modestly, thus teaching them early the importance of modesty in dress. Not permitting our boys to go without shirts, to wear shorts or sheer shirts, and that our girls wear long hose and not be allowed to wear sheer clothing, shorts or slacks.
- 10. That we urge the avoidance of unnecessary debts, and the neglecting of long standing bills. "Owe no man anything." Rom. 13:8
- 11. a. That as far as possible, we refrain from patronizing establishments selling intoxicating beverages, and also that we discourage the use of tobacco in all its forms since we greatly detest the use and effect of both. II Cor. 7:1
- b. We urge that our children be given scientific instruction on the evils of tobacco, alcohol, and narcotic drugs.
- c. That we be patriotic by displaying the American Flag in observing national holidays, thereby honoring God who gives us freedom and liberty.
 - 12. That resolutions be read in each society semi-annually.

These resolutions were heartily endorsed by the Conference body by a rising vote.

- b. In our programs by abstaining from the use of movies, slides, skits and plays.
- 6. a. That we diligently strive to maintain firm, loving discipline in our homes; because we believe with Catherine Booth that "the secret of lawlessness both toward God and man is that children were never taught to submit to the authority of their parents" Prov. 22:6; Eph. 6:4.
- b. That we faithfully hold to the Biblical standards of our Discipline in creating a wholesome atmosphere in our homes,
- c. That we stress the maintenance of a family altar in every home, with the children having a part. That we, as parents, faithfully instruct our children concerning the plan of salvation, urging them to obtain a definite personal experience, knowing that this will create in them the desire to follow Bible standards. Deut. 6:5-9
- d. That we encourage our children to use their own Bible, and have a regular system of memorizing Scripture in the home. Psalm 119:11
- e. That we pray faithfully for our children in school, that they may reject any erroneous teachings presented, and be careful in choosing their friends and associates. That we urge parents to take a firm stand against the immodest dress and other evil practices of the modern athletic and music program.
- 7. a. That we abstain from all worldly amusements, including the theater, both private and public, the dance, cards, unwholesome radio programs, etc. That we abstain from reading or allowing our children to read comic books and other unwholesome magazines and books, and that we provide wholesome literature for our children.
- b. That since modern mixed bathing is conducive to loose morals, we urge parents to refrain from visiting or permitting their children to visit such places of questionable amusement.
- c. That we abstain from all Sabbath desecration such as buying Sunday newspapers, pleasure riding, visiting, reunions, buying, etc. Isaiah 58:13, 14. Also that we refrain from patronizing establishments open on the Sabbath Day.
- d. That we urge our people to refrain, where it is in their power, from having television sets in the home realizing that television is an evil influence, and will mean the loss of the soul if one indulges in looking at it.
- 8. a. That we who are mothers tell our children the true story of life as soon as they begin to ask questions. Also be sure to instruct them in the care of their bodies before they start school in order that they may hold these truths sacred, and be prepared to withstand the low moral standards of this day.
- b. That we parents be companions to our children, and provide for them wholesome recreation frequently, and as far as possible know where they are and what they are doing at all times. Also, that mothers carefully select their "baby-sitters" since there is so much immorality prevalent today.
- 9. a. That we uphold by precept and example modesty of dress, as becometh holiness, by which we mean wearing dresses half-way between the knee and ankle, with long sleeves and modest neckline, which

COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

Be it Resolved:

- 2. a. That we give ourselves to systematic Bible Study, fasting and intercessory prayer.
- b. That we be faithful witnesses to those whom we contact, and when possible go out two by two in home visitation. "All things are possible to him that believeth."—Mark 9:23
- 3. a. That we be faithful in attending our missionary services, and not by indifference hinder our missionary work at home and abroad.
 - b. That we strive to obtain all of our men as honorary members.
- 4. That we give ourselves to prayerful study of the "Wesleyan Missionary" and other helpful material, and that we do our best to interest our people in getting the "Wesleyan Missionary" into other homes and institutions.
 - 5. That we adhere strictly to Scriptural methods:
- a. In raising funds for missions, by sacrificial giving. "Freely ye have received, freely give." Matt. 10:8

- 14. That Statistical Blanks be sent to Mrs. Elma Patterson, 17 6th Avenue, Greenville, Pa, at least by May 15th. Send an itemized list with vouchers for "Local Church Work", also, send an itemized list with vouchers for "Other Objects".
- 15. a. That the Local Missionary Treasurer send money for both individual and society pledges made at Conference and Camp through the church and sub-treasurers. Designate on pink report blank who paid and for what project.
- b. That local missionary treasurers keep a record of all money paid in pledges and report the amount on each pledge, as least two weeks before Conference to the Conference WMS Treasurer, Mrs. Edith Christy, 225 Brook Street, Titusville, Pa.
- 16. That the report of the Mission Study Secretary be sent by January 15th, to Mrs. Murial Terpe, R. D. 4, Mercer, Pa., Conference Secretary of the Mission Study Course.

FINANCIAL

- 17. That \$1.00 dues be paid by all members, active and honorary. That said dues be sent undivided through the local church treasurer to the sub-treasurer. All monies to be sent in at least quarterly.
- 18. That we endeavor to raise one-quarter of the church education budget. This is to include the L. S. U. Pledges.
- 19. That each society contribute \$5.00 or more annually for the support of Hephzibah Home, the same to be applied on budget.
- 20. That each society contribute \$3.00 or more annually to the Medical Fund. This not to apply on budget.

Fellowship by meeting in two's and three's as convenient each Tuesday morning to pray for women around the world.

- b. That a service early in the conference year be given to the local WWF Secretary for enlisting prayer partners and encouraging prayer. Reports to be sent by September 1, to Conference WWF Secretary, Mrs. Mary Huntsman, 1220 Second Street, Brownsville, Pa.
- c. Since we are requested by the General WWF Secretary to have a monthly prayer and fast service, we urge that all societies refrain from having meals at any missionary service since it does not become the interest of missions to be feasting when we should be praying.
- 5. a. That each society have an aggressive solicitor for the WES-LEYAN MISSIONARY, whose duty it shall be to report all subscriptions to the district solicitor, send a quarterly report to the conference solicitor, Mrs. Evangeline Hannold, Boyers, Pa., and strive to place the magazine in each home of the church and Sunday School. If possible, each society send at least one gift subscription to some interested family.
- b. When sending in subscriptions always be sure to identify your church by its number and conference letter, AL, as published in the Conference Minutes.
- 6. a. That all society officers and delegates to Annual Conference be members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. We also recommend that Conference Society Members be members of the Wesleyan Church and their local Wesleyan Missionary Society.
- b. That each local society have a nominating committee if possible.
- c. That each society send the retiring president to conference and elect the incoming president or an officer as delegate, assuming the expense for transportation.
- d. That each society instruct the delegate the amount to pledge at the public missionary service.
- 7. a. That each society use the designated study book, the WMS Handbook, and other helps, and encourage members to follow the Mission Study Course as recommended by General Conference. All literature to be obtained from the Wesley Press, Box 2000, Marion, Indiana.
- b. That each society have a program committee of which the president is chairman.
- 8. That each society be urged to respond to the Card Call Plan and thus assist in the Extension Program of the Church. NOTE: All money for Card Call, send to Church Extension and Evangelism Department, Rev. V. A. Mitchell, Secretary, Box 2000, Marion, Indiana. NOTE: All stubs send to Mrs. Elma Patterson, 17 6th Avenue, Greenville, Pa..
- 9. That in as much as the American Bible Society prints our Bible Transcripts without charge, we support it with prayer and finance. This can be sent through regular treasurers.
- 10. a. That, where possible, each society have a Mercy and Help Committee, whose duty it shall be to visit the sick and needy and give aid where necessary, and send flowers or greeting cards to shut-ins.
 - b. That we encourage the giving of special memorial gifts as

abideth in me, and I in him, the same bringeth forth much fruit; for without me ye can do nothing."

According to this what we need is not more workshops, nor more pep talks and more entertaining or informative programs but more secret prevailing prayer and more waiting upon God for the infilling of the Spirit. After such an experience we cannot fail to have the "burning heart" that goes after others and by the aid of the Spirit, not by someone else's program, we can win souls to Christ. Training, promotion, equipment, programs, dramatization nor pictures will bring God on the scene nor save souls, but one live coal from off the altar like the one that touched Isaiah will send us out to seek the lost. Let us emulate the Scriptural examples in both the Old and New Testament and, especially, the example of our Blessed Master, Who used the simplest means of winning souls by the foolishness of preaching and witnessing in the power of the Spirit.

We are not trying to reflect upon anyone in any position by this admonition but we are alarmed and fearful of the trend our church is taking generally. Most of all, we are alarmed for Allegheny Conference for we fear that we simply do not have the spiritual depth and godliness that we are reported to have. We say that with heartache and shame! May God help us all to go deeper during this Conference Session!

Oh, beloved sisters, we beg of you in Jesus' Name, for the sake of your own soul and the souls of your loved ones and those of other lands that you examine yourselves and be sure you are right with God first that you may not be as the professed workers of Christ mentioned in the above Scripture whom Jesus had to bar from the entrance of Heaven.

Let us rather live where we can finally hear Him say, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant; . . . enter thou into the joy of thy Lord." Matt. 25:21.

ACTIVITIES OF THE YEAR

By prayer and by earnestly seeking the help and guidance of the Lord we have endeavored to carry out the responsibilities of our office this year for His glory.

In order to carry on the required work we have sent a little over 750 pieces of mail which included six circular letters.

- 22—"Many will say to me in that day, Lord, Lord, have we not prophesied in thy name? and in thy name have cast out devils? and in thy name done many wonderful works?
- 23—"And then will I profess unto them I never knew you: depart from me, ye that work iniquity."

In short, there are two alarming facts stated in this Scripture: First, there are some professed followers of Christ who are apparently working for Him and doing mighty works in His name even to the casting out of demons, but whom tragically the Lord will turn down in spite of their profession and works because in His own words, "I never knew you: depart from me, ye that work iniquity."

According to Jesus' own declaration one can profess to love and work for Him and still be doing evil and be lost because of a wrong heart relationship or a wrong motive. How serious a situation is this! How careful we should be lest we fall into this condition while we go on professing to work for Him.

We wonder, does "that day" mean our time, the time approaching the coming of the Lord? It must at least mean the day when these poor souls come to the end of life's race and expect to go to Heaven. At any rate, there is this similarity to our day that this is an age of churches, church work, doing good, so-called, making disciples, programming, planning, entertaining, training for leadership, baiting for increase of numbers, finances and enlargement generally, using almost any device conceivable to "sell the church or Christ" as they say.

No longer do they wait for a new birth and Pentecost upon their own souls but leaders are trained as school teachers or workers in any other vocation in life. They have system, plans, promotional devices and a general setup of forces that require no Spirit's anointing, no vigils of prayer, no demand of death to self. Human wisdom and human effort can work this program and accomplish what they want done without God's help. The tragedy is that the holiness churches are fast taking over these methods and copying after popular churches and movements in their stress of leadership, the use of workshops, programs, films, skits, dramas, social activities and all kinds of means to win and entertain folk in order to bring them into their ranks.

Of course, we need system, methods, education and leadership but we need them only secondarily to the Spirit's infilling and in their proper place and emphasis. There is a grave danger, too, that in giving so many exacting demands those in authority may become like the Pharisees who laid upon the people heavier burdens and requirements than they themselves could or would carry.

Surely, we must work for Jesus said, John 9:4—"The night cometh when no man can work." Again, "Woe to them that are at ease in Zion."—Amos 6:1. Many other Scriptures could be used but over against our admonition to work are the warning words of John 15:5—"He that
