

# Journal of Daily Proceedings

The seventy-eighth annual session of the Champlain Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Connection of America convened at Hague, N. Y., April 22, 1919, at 7:30 P. M.

The meeting was called to order by the President, Rev. E. D. Carpenter. Songs, "Since Jesus Came Into My Heart" and "Saved by the Blood," were sung. Prayer was offered by Rev. C. E. Hill.

Hearty welcome was extended to the members and friends of the Conference by the pastor, Rev. A. J. Allen.

Brief remarks were made by the President. A Scripture lesson was read from St. John's Gospel, first chapter. A duet, "I Am a Pilgrim," was sung by Mrs. Lillian and Mrs. George Stevenson.

The message was given by Rev. F. H. Wright, from the words found in John 5: 36. First, he spoke of the building of the Church and the things that had gone down in history, and our business was to bear testimony to Jesus Christ, and that our ilves should not be a dry desert, but that we should receive showers of blessings; and that we, like John of old, preach the Word of God; that Jesus spoke openly, and that a true Christian's life was always open to inspection; that God's Word would stand all the doubts brought against it. The message was the key-note of victory.

## Wednesday Morning Meeting.

Morning devotional service was led by Rev. J. J. Davison. Singing, "Rescue the Perishing." Scripture lesson read from the 14th chapter of St. John. Prayer by Brother C. E. Hill. "Blest Be the Tie" was sung. This was a gracious service. God's presence was there.

The President taking the chair, meeting was called to order. Thirteen elders responded to the roll call, and three licentiates answered to their names. The names of the delegates were called, to which fifteen answered.

Motion was made and carried that the Secretary write letters of greeting to Rev. C. C. Hill, Rev. J. F. Wright, Missionary Secretary, Rev. E. Teter, and Mrs. J. L. Benton.

The Committee on Credentials reported and the same was ac-

cepted, with the understanding that the future names be added without vote.

Moved and carried that the bar of Conference should be the first five rows of seats.

Rev. C. E. Hill was called to the chair.

The President made his annual report. The same was accepted. See Report No. 1.

Chairmen of the different Committees were appointed as follows: Memorials, C. E. Hill; Delegates' Credentials, George D. Jock; Religious Services, E. D. Carpenter, A. J. Allen; Resolutions, H. S. Hill, D. W. Summers; Apportionments, F. H. Wright; Statistics, W. F. Lewis, L. M. Hayes; Publication of Conference Minutes, Conference Secretary; The New Forward Movement, E. L. Elliott; Order of the Day, Conference Officers; Courtesy, F. E. Wood.

Motion was made and carried that the pastors and the Conference President in harmony together look after the deeds to church property.

A Committee on Pastor's Credentials was elected as follows: W. N. Osgood, C. D. Perry.

It was moved and carried that all visiting members shall be welcome to honorary seats who are in harmony with our principles.

The Committee on Pastoral Relations was elected as follows: E. D. Carpenter, J. J. Davison, H. S. Hill, E. L. Elliott, Ministers; I. L. Prouty, Leroy Stafford, R. H. Keyes, Laymen.

The Committee on Orders of the Day reported as follows: Wednesday 2 P. M., Election of General Conference Delegates; Thursday 9:30 A. M., election of Conference officers; Thursday 10:30 A. M., Houghton representative; Thursday 2 P. M., Conference Sunday School Secretary; Friday 9:30 A. M., meeting of the S. M. A. Society; Friday 10:30 A. M., Connectional Representative; Friday evening, W. H. & F. M. Society meeting; Saturday 10 A. M., Memorial service; preching service daily at 3 P. M.

The above report was submitted by the Conference officers.

The Committee on Courtesy introduced Rev. J. S. Willett, Rev. M. A. Gibbs and Miss Alice Hampe. All made interesting and encouraging remarks in the advancement of God's cause.

Motion was made and carried that the time of opening and closing the session should be as follows: Open at 9 A. M., close at 11:30 A. M.; open at 1:30 P. M., close by vote.

Brother C. A. Heath asked for leave of absence of one day, which was granted.

The President at this time gave a heart-stirring talk. Motion was made and carried to adjourn. Benediction by C. L. Hill.

## Wednesday Afternoon Meeting.

The roll was called, to which fourteen elders, five licentiates and fifteen delegates answered to their names.

The minutes of the earlier session were read and approved.

The Committee to consider changing the time of holding Conference reported. The same was ordered back to the Conference.

Prof. J. S. Luckey was introduced at this time and made a few brief remarks. He said he had come to us full of inspiration; that the Forward Movement was advancing as never before.

A Resolution was read by Rev. W. N. Osgood, from Brookdale and Norfolk, which was referred to the Committee on Pastoral Relations.

The order of the day having arrived, the election of delegates to the General Conference was taken up. I. L. Prouty and E. L. Elliott were appointed tellers to prepare ballots, and F. H. Wright and H. S. Hill were appointed tellers to distribute the ballots.

Ministerial delegates were elected as follows: Rev. E. D. Carpenter and Rev. E. L. Ellibtt. Rev. A. J. Allen was elected as reserve delegate. Lay delegates were elected as follows: I. L. Prouty and Robert Keys. Mrs. Lillian Stevenson was elected as reserve delegate.

It being time, Conference gave way to the order of the day.

The trio sang "Is Your All Upon the Altar?" Acts 7: 22-35 was read as a Scripture lesson. Rev. J. S. Willett offered prayer, after which he brought the message from the 7th chapter of Acts. 22nd verse. Subject, The Character of Moses. When God blesses us He does it that we may bless others. Moses' dealings was with two classes of people. The fiery darts of the devil are often helpful to our development. Character was formed when the child was quite young. No gift will do if God wants you. God did not create us for sunshine alone, but for storm. We will not have to change pilots when we near the eternal shore. God always deals with the individual. Fathers and mothers should teach the children to love the Bible characters. The progress of the race depends upon our grip upon the truth.

The order of service being changed, Rev. C. E. Hill was called to the chair.

The name of E. D. Carpenter was called and character passed. The names of Richard Palmer, C. A. Heath, F. E. Wood were called and their characters passed.

It was moved and carried to adjourn. Benediction by C. A. Heath.

## Wednesday Evening Meeting.

This was a song and testimony meeting. Rev. L. C. Mattoon was the leader. After singing, G. D. Jock offered prayer. A large number gave testimony to the saving and keeping power of God.

Rev. W. N. Osgood was the preacher of the evening, bringing a good message from the 8th chapter of John, 36th verse. While Christ wanted to set us free from the power of the Devil, who is the greatest slave-holder ever known; while Satan was always putting out poison, Christ had a remedy that would cure the sin-sick soul. At the close of this message Brother J. S. Willett exhorted the people to forsake their evil ways and to seek God while the door of mercy was open.

This proved to be a gracious service. The saints of God were refreshed, and the hearts of the unsaved touched.

## Thursday Morning Meeting.

Rev. F. E. Wood was the leader of the devotional service. Songs were sung and a number of prayers were offered. This was a very profitable service.

The roll was called, to which 15 elders, 3 licentiates and 16 delegates answered to the call of their names.

The minutes of the afternoon session were read and approved. The Committee on Itineracy and Orders gave their report, and the same was adopted. See Report No. 2.

Report of the Committee on the New Forward Movement made its report, and the same was approved. See Report No. 3.

Motion was made and supported that the next annual session of the Champlain Conference be held at West Chazy, N. Y., in August, 1920. Parties spoke for and against this change of time.

The order of the day now arrived, that being the election of Conference officers. They were elected as follows:

President of Conference, Rev. E. D. Carpenter.

Vice-President of Conference, Rev. C. E. Hill. Secretary of Conference, Rev. O. G. Wyman. Treasurer of Conference, Rev. A. J. Allen.

Conference Trustee, Norman W. Baxter (to succeed himself). Conference Sunday School Secretary, Rev. H. S. Hill.

Member of Committee on Itineracy and Orders, Rev. E. D. Carpenter (to succeed himself).

Committee on Presidency—Rev. D. W. Summers, Rev. E. L. Elliott, Rev. F. H. Wright, Ministers; T. L. Prouty, Leroy Stafford, Laymen.

Judiciary Committee—Rev. J. J. Davison, Rev. W. N. Osgood, Rev. E. Trowbridge, and Rev. F. E. Wood.

Tithing Secretary, Rev. W. F. Lewis.

It was voted that the President should nominate the Advisory Board.

The Committee on Missionary Board was left for the President to nominate. The following were elected: E. L. Elliott, Rev. F. H. Wright, and the President of the W. H. & F. M. Society.

Order of the day having arrived, Prof. J. S. Luckey invited those who had attended Houghton Seminary to please come forward, and sixteen took their seats on the platform. "All Hail the Power of Jesus' Name" was sung, while the Spirit was upon our hearts. Sister Alice Hampe gave a very encouraging talk on the great work that is being done, not only on education, but the spiritual help the student receives in the students' prayer meeting. She said that prayer circles and watch meetings are held, and all are helpful to the student's spiritual life.

Professor Luckey said the school the past year had been run on a cash basis, and that it seemed the spirit of all to keep on, and that we should increase our borders as Wesleyan Methodists, and that we must hold up the name of Jesus whereby men must be saved. If we are to bear fruit, there must be a tree in which we all can be a part.

J. S. Willett then spoke in behalf of the school. At the close of his remarks \$35.00 in money was raised to pay for five student chairs to be used in the theological room.

The Houghton Song was sung by the Houghton Alumni and students.

Conference adjourned on limitation of time.

## Thursday Afternoon Meeting.

Richard Palmer led the devotional service. The Holy Spirit was upon the people while they sang and prayed.

The roll was called, 22 elders, 3 licentiates and 16 delegates responding.

The minutes of the morning session were read and approved.

The Sunday School Secretary made his report. The same was accepted. See report No. 4.

Professor J. S. Luckey presented certificates to a class that belong to the Sunday School at Forestdale, Vt.

Rev. E. L. Elliott made some very interesting remarks in behalf of the Sunday School work and the Conventions that have been held in the Northern District.

F. H. Wright then spoke of the Sunday School; that the center of the task is the conversion of souls; that it calls for the best there is in us; there is no one method that will prove the best success in every case.

Motion was made and carried that the Conference be held about the same time as usual.

The order of the day now arrived. Song, "God Will Take Care of You," was sung. Rev. L. M. Hayes offered prayer. Song, "Out of Egypt into Canaan," was sung by the trio. Rev. J. S. Willett preached from Acts 7:22, continuing his remarks from the one given Wednesday afternoon. There is nothing greater in history than the deliverance of the children of Israel from Egyptian bondage, the crossing of the Red Sea and the River Jordan. The life of the Israelite depended upon the blood over the door. No man or woman will ever get to Heaven without the shedding of blood. We must have the blood of Jesus applied to our hearts. We are slaves and in bondage until the work is done. God has various means to bring men into the truth and lead them to Himself. When a man is converted he crosses the boundary line from Hell to Heaven.

Conference resumed business at this time.

Richard Palmer asked to be excused from the rest of the Conference session. The request was granted.

Rev. W. F. Lewis, in behalf of the Horicon Wesleyan Church, gave the Champlain Conference an invitation to hold its next annual session in the Wesleyan Methodist Church at Horicon, N. Y. The invitation was unanimously accepted. We ask that the Connectional Board give us the fourth Tuesday in April, 1920, at 7:30 P. M.

It was voted that Rev. J. J. Davison preach the opening sermon. Rev. C. L. Hill reserve.

Voted that the action of last year in regard to the President traveling the Conference be rescinded.

Voted that the matter of securing an Evangelist be left with the Missionary Advisory Board.

The names of K. F. Schaubhuth, A. E. Moses, T. A. Moses. and S. C. Fox were called and their characters passed.

Moved and supported to adjourn.

Benediction by E. L. Elliott.

## Thursday Evening Meeting.

Songs were sung, and Mrs. Anna Elliott and Rev. E. Trowbridge offered prayer. The power of God was present in this meeting. A Scripture lesson was read from 1 Kings, 19th chapter. The message of the evening was brought by Rev. L. M. Hayes, from these words, "What doest thou here, Elijah?" This great question was asked by the Almighty. God has a right to question His own The people in Elijah's time worshiped many gods, but none of them could hear or speak. God wanted to make known His power unto the people. Elijah could call upon his God and the fire would fall. God has a purpose in every life, and always reveals His plan unto them concerning what He wants them to do. People get out of God's plan unless they live close to Him. When one is at their best is when they are right with God. People that are not right with God are like a bird with a broken wing. Carnality is the greatest hindrance to efficiency.

The altar call was given, and three seekers came forward and gave testimony that they found what they sought. The Spirit of God moved mightily upon the hearts of the people. This proved to be a gracious service, where many received help.

The roll was called, and 14 elders, 3 licentiates and 13 delegates answered to the call of their names.

The minutes of the last session was read and the same approved.

Members of the Advisory Board were elected as follows:

A. J. Allen, ministerial; I. L. Prouty, lay.

The Sunday School Secretary nominated as his helpers the following: W. F. Lewis for the Southern District, and E. L. Elliott for the Northern District. The same were elected.

The name of the following were called and their characters passed: J. J. Davison, S. A. Green, A. F. Lent and V. D. Otis.

The order of the day was the meeting of the Superannuated Ministers' Relief Association. See Report No. 5 for the same.

The time having arrived, the Connectional Agent spoke in behalf of the Connectional interests. He said he was glad to meet with the Conference again; that the Connection had advanced in many ways in the year 1918, and for greater success there must come a deepening in all our lives. The Lord would then make an advancement. He believed we are living in the last days; that Jesus may come at any time; we should be watching and ready.

Brother Willett spoke of the Lord taking Mother Hartson, but that He had some one all ready for the mantle to fall upon in the person of Mrs. Clarke. The address was inspiring, encouraging and very helpful.

The names of the following were called and their characters passed: A. J. Allen, E. L. Elliott and C. E. Hill.

The President made some remarks, saying he had seen many things to encourage him since he came into this Conference, and many changes had taken place.

Order of the day having arrived, J. S. Willett offered prayer and continued the subject of the life of Moses, speaking from the words of Scripture found in Exodus 33:11, how the Lord spoke unto Moses face to face. In this he reached one of the greatest events of his life. It was a great honor to Moses to be permitted to give the laws of God. It was voted that the Conference pay \$200.00 toward a new church at Norfolk, the conditions to be the same as those applying to Corinth parsonage.

The name of F. H. Wright was called and character passed. It was moved and supported to adjourn. Benediction by W. F. Lewis.

## Friday Evening Meeting.

This was a missionary meeting. See the Secretary's and Treasurer's report (Report No. 12.)

## Saturday Morning Meeting.

Rev. M. A. Gibbs was in charge of the devotional service. Song, "Higher Ground," was sung. D. W. Summers led in prayer; a number of prayers were offered in behalf of the great work of God that we are engaged in.

The roll was called, to which 15 elders, 3 licentiates and 16 delegates responded to the call of their names.

The minutes of the last session were read and the same were approved.

A partial report by the Committee on Resolutions was read. The same was approved. See Resolution No. 2.

Conference gave way to the order of the day, it being the Memorial Service. Rev. C. E. Hill was in charge. This service was held in honor of the late Rev. F. L. Wright and Rev. J. L. Benton. Brother Carpenter offered a fervent and heart-touching prayer in behalf of the bereaved families of these godly men that had been taken from us and gone to their reward. The Scripture lesson read was from 2 Corinthians 5th chapter. Song, "Abide With Me," was sung.

Rev. C. E. Hill spoke of Brother Wright, their acquaintance and work and fellowship together, and of the way Brother Wright always stood by the Discipline and the Word of God.

Rev. F. E. Wood spoke of the life and good work of Brother Wright, their labors together in a seven weeks' meeting, and of staying in his home and how their hearts were knit together in holy fellowship.

### Saturday Afternoon Meeting.

C. A Heath had charge of the devotional service. Song, "Jesus is All the World to Me," was sung. Prayer by C. A. Heath.

Roll was called and 15 elders, 3 licentiates and 14 delegates answered to the call of their names.

Minutes of the forenoon session were read and accepted, after a slight correction.

The names of W. N. Osgood, G. N. Wyher, O. G. Wyman, L. M. Hayes, C. L. Hill, and D. W. Summers were called and their characters passed.

The Conference Treasurer made his annual report. The same was adopted. See report No. 9.

The Conference Tithing Secretary made his annual report, and the same was approved. See Report No. 10.

The Committee on Statistics made their report, and the same was adopted. See Report No. 11.

The order of the day having arrived, song, "He Rolled the Sea Away," was sung. Prayer by J. S. Willett. The trio sang "Amen to Jesus." Mrs. Lillian Stevenson gave a burning exhortation from a full heart. The subject, "Moses Talking Face to Face With God," was continued by J. S. Willett. No man will lose out if he continues to pray. Moses was willing to work out God's plan. It don't take the devil long to finish his work when fear possesses the soul. We should always be ready to stay or go. There are times when we cannot be still; we must let the truth be known. We ought to seek the truth of God, as bread on which our hearts should be fed. Prayer brings down blessings. There is nothing that will sweeten the life like God's presence. At the close of this message seventeen young people came forward to make their consecration to go or stay wherever the Lord wants them. Prayers were offered. Song, "I'll Go Where You Want Me to Go," was sung. This proved a very gracious service.

The order of service being changed, Professor J. S. Luckey made some interesting remarks, speaking of the advancement being made in the Champlain Conference and others.

Moved and supported that it be left with the President to engage a speaker for the afternoons of next year's session.

It was voted that the President appoint the Chairman of the different Committees.

A letter was read from Sister C. C. Hill. At the close of reading, Brother A. J. Allen offered prayer in behalf of Brother and Sister Hill.

Minutes of the afternoon session were read and approved. Moved and supported to adjourn. Benediction by G. N. Wyher.

### Saturday Night Meeting.

The devotional service was in charge of O. G. Wyman. Songs were sung and prayers offered. God was present. Scripture lesson, Isaiah 53rd chapter. Special song by the trio. Rev. G. D. Jock brought the message found in Romans 7:16. He was ready to go to Rome; he was not ashamed of the Gospel of the Son of God. The brother said that it was the Gospel that brought him to God. The Gospel was and is the glad news to this world. The Saviour brought it for the purpose of destroying the works of the Devil. God plans to bring every man to salvation. Salvation meets the need of every soul. God has made every plan to meet every need of man. Salvation involves safety; a man is unsafe without it. Rev. J. S. Willett gave the altar call. A number of prayers were offered in behalf of the great work we are engaged in. Singing, "He Fills Me Now." Benediction by Rev. E. D. Carpenter.

## Sunday Evening Service.

This was a communion service. Rev. E. D. Carpenter was in charge. After singing, prayers were offered by G. N. Wyher and F. E. Wood. About one hundred partook of the Sacrament. At the preaching service O. G. Wyman offered prayer. Song, "On Calvary's Hill," was sung by Lawrence, Ruth and Pearl Hill.

Rev. J. S. Willett brought the message from John 9:25. When Christ was on earth many thought He would establish an earthly kingdom, but the Word declares the kingdom of God is within us. Christ is to rule over our minds and hearts. People should read their own Bibles. Unless we search the Scriptures we shall miss the mark. This lesson tells us of the blind man who found Christ. His eyes were opened. Jesus was always relieving those that were

lame, or in trouble in any way. This was a wonderful miracle of grace, and left the man with a Christian experience. God has a way to work in our hearts. The certainty this blind man had was, "Whereas I was blind, now I see."

At the close of the sermon a number of persons were at the altar to be saved. The parting song, "Blest Be the Tie That Binds," was sung. Benediction by Rev. E. D. Carpenter.

This proved to be a very profitable Conference session. From the first to the last a spirit of unity was upon the hearts of the people.

# REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE SUNDAY SCHOOL SECRETARY.

This office was very unexpected by me, and I felt at the time of my election that a severe mistake had been made in your choice. It has been a very busy time for me this past year, but with the help of God and the co-operation of my two worthy assistants, Rev. W. F. Lewis for the Southern District, and Rev. E. L. Elliott for the Northern District, I have been able to do some things worth while, in my judgment, and to our Christ, the greatest Teacher the world has ever known, be the eternal praise.

Our Sunday School Convention in the Southern District was held with Brother Lewis and his people at Horicon, N. Y. There were not many present, but the season was one of benefit and pleasure to those attending. Brother Elliott has done better than we, and I shall ask him to speak briefly about the same.

I had planned to attend the State Convention in Vermont, but because of the "Flu" it was not held. Most of my work has been done with my typewriter and pen.

I am pleased to say that we have a fine class to graduate this year from the Teacher's Training Department. Brother Hayes has done fine work with his class and their grades are excellent. The graduates are Rev. L. M. Hayes, Mrs. Allie Lovett, Mrs. Lucy Naylor, Mrs. Nettie Rowe Corey, Lillian Frazier and Myrtle Rowe.

I am more than pleased to give you my report of finances for this year. My total receipts for the year were \$50.50. My total disbursements were \$44.02. Leaving in my hand at this time \$6.48. Twenty dollars of this has been sent to our Connectional Sunday School Secretary and the rest spent in the interest of our Conference work. The balance would have been somewhat larger and the work some less if the pastors had answered my first letters.

The only charges that have teachers that are graduates from our Teacher's Training Department are Forestdale, Vermont, and Chittenden, Vermont. Every charge responded in full or in part to the appeal for the offering except Chichester, Hadley, Long Lake, and Macomb; and this was due to their lack of a regular pastor, except Macomb, which has no Sunday School. The following charges did not send me a report: Acorn Hill, Cadyville, Chazy, Chichester, Cook's Corners, Lisbon, Lisbon Center, Macomb, Mooers, and West Plattsburg. The following charges reported converts from the Sunday School: Brookdale, Chester and Horicon, Chittenden, Forestdale and Goshen, and Hague and Valley View.

The contest for the Banner offered according to the given standard has been won by Chester and Horicon with an average per cent of 85. I feel as if we had done some things this year worth while, and yet there is much land to possess.

# Report No. 7.

### CAMP MEETING REPORT.
