Standing Resolutions

RESOLUTIONS AFFECTING THE CONFERENCE

1. A Committee on Auditing and Finance which shall be a **STANDING COMMITTEE** to advise on financial plans, shall be elected each year. The Committee shall consist of three ministerial members, the Chairman being an Elder, and two lay members. Lay members shall be nominated by the Conference Nominating Committee and begin their year of service at the Conference wherein they are elected.

2. The Conference Secretary, as Chairman, with the Conference President shall be a Standing Committee on Publications, whose duty it shall be to examine all matters pertaining to Conference printing and publications, and let all contracts for same.

3. Minister's Pocket Credentials shall be issued to Elders and annually to Conference Preachers who are eligible.

4. When an Elder is elected to the Conference Presidency or Vice Presidency expenses incurred in moving to the Conference parsonage shall be paid from the Conference treasury.

RESOLUTIONS AFFECTING CONFERENCE AND CHURCH:

1. At the beginning of the Conference session the president shall appoint a Nominating Committee of not less than three members, two Elders and one Layman to bring to the Conference a slate of Nominations for Committees, etc., for the Conference Temporary Organizations. Delegates Credentials shall be mailed to the Secretary not later than ten days before the convening of Conference. The Secretary shall be Chairman of the Credentials Committee and shall compile the Roll of Delegates from the regularly filled Credentials received.

2. Churches having business with the Conference Board of Trustees requiring a visit of that body to their church, shall be responsible for the expense attached to such calls, unless released by the Board.

3. Local church treasurer's books shall close April 30, thus making the Conference fiscal year from May 1, to April 30. All funds received after this date shall be counted in the following year. Funds will be credited on Sub-Treasurer's books if received by May 5.

To meet the requirements of Paragraph 270-4 of the Discipline regarding revision of the Roll of membership, April 30, may be considered the close of the Conference year for Statistical purposes.

RESOLUTIONS AFFECTING HOLINESS DISTRICTS

1. We recommend that all districts emphasize Sunday School activity, and that Conventions be arranged for in conjunction with the visitation of the Conference Sunday School Secretary, who shall visit one Convention of each District during the year, at Convention expense.

RESOLUTIONS AFFECTING THE LOCAL CHURCH

1. All persons received into membership in the churches of our Conference excepting those whose life of Christian fidelity has been of sufficient long standing, shall be received at first as associate members only.

2. When it becomes necessary for a church to call a pastor, it shall be the duty of the calling church to make provision for the expense incurred by the pastor in removing to a new field of labor. Money raised for this purpose shall NOT be applied on the pastor's salary.

3. The Conference Sunday shall be the closing Sunday of Conference year, and the out-going pastor shall be paid his salary for that Sunday by the charge he is leaving.

4. Each church may elect a Nominating Committee whose duty it shall be to nominate candidates for church officers for presentation to the church at the time of the annual election of officers. Such nominations shall not exclude other nominations at the time of the business meeting.

5. We recommend that each church equip its parsonage with the necessary heating and cooking equipment, because of the variation of requirements in this

equipment for the individual parsonage.

6. All churches shall have a systematic means of keeping records, as required by Discipline, Paragraph No. 131, The "Ideal Church Record" published by the Bethel Publishing Company, Elkhart, Indiana, is a suggested form.

7. The pastoral vote shall be taken on each charge on the third Sunday in April. When it is the desire of the church to vote on a week night, it will be done sometime during the week previous to the designated Sunday. Permission to vote on another Sunday may be obtained from the President and the Advisory Board.

8. The third Sunday of September shall be designated, each year, as Pioneer Sunday to present the work of the Pioneer department to our congregations and pastors be urged to exchange pulpits on this Sunday as much as possible.

RESOLUTIONS AFFECTING LOCAL CHURCH AND PASTOR:

1. The pastor of any church in the Conference shall be free to hold at least one revival meeting during the year, wherever he sees fit, and it is recommended that his salary be paid to him while he is absent.

2. Inasmuch as trial sermons are hardly fair to the church or candidate and since the practice of having trial sermons is contrary to the usual manner of locating preachers, we recommend that no preacher shall accept any such invitations, if given. Exceptions to this rule may be granted by the Conference President upon request of any church.

3. Since considerable expense of transferring automobile title and license attends the moving of a pastor from one state to another, we recommend that where possible the calling church bear this expense.

4. We recommend that in election of local church Advisory Committee each church permit the pastor to nominate the members of this committee.

5. Each church shall allow their pastor a reasonable vacation with pay to be taken at his convenience. Two weeks is suggested.

RESOLUTIONS AFFECTING THE MINISTER AND CONFERENCE:

1. No person shall be received into membership in Allegheny Conference until he shall have properly filled out an application blank, which application together with recommendations of his references must pass the approval of the President and his Advisory Board. Exceptions to this rule may be made by the President and his Advisory Board when they deem best.

2. Each pastor shall send a monthly report on the blank provided, to the Conference President showing the progress and the state of the work under his care.

3. We recommend that no one be elected to Elders Orders who does not have an abiding sense of divine call to give himself wholly to the function and ministry of an Elder in the **WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH**, and that no one shall be ordained to this office and work who is not applying himself wholly to this one thing in cares and studies, and clearly determining by God's grace to give himself wholly to this holy ministry, if possible, long before the appointed day of ordination, and manifesting such a determination of faithful Christian service to the church or congregation whom he was called to serve during his years of preparation, so that as much as lieth in him, he has and will apply himself wholly to the work of the ministry, except in all cases of absolute necessity of such diversions to a legitimate avocation for livelihood which neither jeopardizes the Lord's work nor blames the ministry.

4. Since the use of the wedding ring is not in accord with the standards of our church, we therefore, as a Conference, disapprove of our ministers performing or taking part in the ring ceremony.

5. In the judgment of the Allegheny Conference, viewing television programs of the type commonly offered in response to the public clamor for entertainment is an impediment to the development of holy character. We deplore the current television programs' evil effect upon the moral and spiritual life of the Nation. The principles of Wesleyan Methodism—being an epitome of the Christian religion—obligate Wesleyan Methodists to an unblameable life which constantly rebukes every form of evil and zealously advocates holiness of heart and life. Therefore, we most earnestly request our ministers and members, as those who must give account unto God in the Day of Judgment for anything which tends to influence toward

evil, to refrain from the purchase of television sets and from viewing such programs for Jesus' sake.

Inasmuch as ministers are examples and patterns to the flock of Christ, the Allegheny Conference expects each of its ministers to set a wholesome example and to be a godly pattern in this respect, so that those to whom he ministers will follow his example and avoid exposure to this which menaces vital godliness.

6. Any Elder or Conference Preacher desiring a transfer from the Allegheny Conference to another Annual Conference, or to receive a letter of Standing, must have all notes paid to the Minister's Aid Fund, or have made satisfactory arrangements with the Chairman of the Auditing and Finance Committee for their repayment.

THE CONFERENCE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

REPORT NO. 1

To the Members of the Allegheny Annual Conference assembled at the Stoneboro Camp Ground in its One Hundred Twenty-third Annual Session greetings in the words of our Master who said, "And there will be signs upon the earth, distress (trouble and anguish) of nations in bewilderment and perplexity (that is, without resources, left wanting, embarrassed, in doubt, not knowing which way to turn) at (the echo) the roaring of the tossing sea; men swooning away or expiring with fear and dread and apprehension and expectation of the things that are coming on the world; for the (very) powers of the heavens will be shaken and caused to totter now when these things begin to occur, look up and lift up your heads, because your redemption (deliverance) is drawing near" (Luke 21:25, 26, 28 ANT). We need to weigh well these words of Jesus in verses 25 and 26 for no living man today could describe in the same number of words more accurately the actual physical and mental state of the world than did our Lord nearly twenty centuries ago. Three words—distress, perplexity and fear—are used in this passage by Jesus to describe the state of mind of the nations preceding His Coming for His own. No three words could be found in the dictionary that more accurately picture the mentality of the nations of earth today. Especially is this true of the military leaders, the statesmen and the atomic scientists. If ever we stood at a critical moment in world history, we do today. One crisis seems to follow another until we live in such a moment when either the Lord must soon be coming back or disaster confronts us.

It is our firm conviction that we, as a Conference never stood at a more crucial moment than we are right now. There never was a day when our decision would be more decisive, determinative, and final than it is going to be in the days before us. There never was a time when we needed to heed this Scripture as now: "The end of all is near, keep cool, hold steady then and pray. Above all, be keen to love one another" (I Peter 4:7, 8). In this day when controversies are raging and when many resort to name-calling, to jealousies, to headiness, to gossiping, to bickering, to backbiting, to quarreling and to jangling even under the banner of holiness, we must guard as never before our attitudes, our conduct, our conversation and do our best to keep peace among all men as far as possible without sacrificing principle. Further, we must rouse ourselves and keep wide awake that we do not place ourselves on the wrong side of present-day issues. We must be loyal to Jesus Christ and Him only. Let all our labors be performed and all our deliberations be taken in the realization that we must all stand before the Judgment Bar of God and give an account of our actions and deeds.

REPORT NO. 3

SECOND VICE PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To the ministers and delegates gathered in the one hundred twenty-third annual session of the Allegheny Conference, greetings in the words of the Pauline exhortation, "Therefore my beloved brethren, be ye steadfast, unmoveable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labour is not in vain in the Lord." (1 Cor. 15:58). This exhortation contains an element of promise in the words, "that your labour is not in vain in the Lord." Indeed these

are days when individuals question the worthwhileness of their labors and attempt to evaluate their usefulness in the Kingdom of God. Regardless how much you do there appears to be more, much more, yet to be done, and in all of our labors, little seems to be really accomplished. Perhaps the words of the Apostle Paul as rendered in the Living Letters (II Timothy 3:5; 4:3,4), "They will go to church, yes, but they won't really believe anything they hear . . . For there is going to come a time when people won't listen to the truth . . . they won't listen to what the Bible says but will gladly follow their own misguided ideas" describe the spirit of this age and the attitude of this age to the ministry of God's Word which is the mission of the church and consequently your labor. Whether you labor or worship in an organized church or participate in a pioneer work, this is the atmosphere which confronts your church and hinders the advance of your church. However, it is encouraging to note that the objective of the church is not particularly success in its mission but rather faithfulness. Whether men hear and heed is not the problem of the church, but rather it is the faithfulness of the church in proclaiming its message. It is, however, disturbing and disquieting business to proclaim faithfully the Truth and see so few hearing and heeding the message. In spite of these things, it is our task to faithfully proclaim the Truth. Paul expressed it thus, "Therefore my beloved brethren . . . abound in the work of the Lord . . . your labor is not in vain."

Brethren, we have a tremendous task. We have quiet countryside being converted into bustling commercial and residential areas. We have several large masonry jungles, our cities, within our bounds. All of these call for a vigorous, industrious, prayerful, burdened people to do something spiritually to help them. We have a tremendous task, brethren! It is impossible to convey to you the sense of obligation we feel as we see the possibilities for pioneering. Two things are desperately needed: we need a plan with vision and we need men with a burden. ITEM VIII. We recommend that credit for no book in the Course of Study be allowed for more than one quadrennium after that book has been officially dropped from the course.

ITEM IX. We will not recommend to the Pastoral Relations Committee any person who has not complied with Paragraph 267, Sub-paragraph 1 of the Discipline. We further insist that recommendation to Study and Travel with Transcripts of grade for which credit is desired will be in the hands of the Committee on the first day of the Annual Conference, also that with each transcript

the Committee shall be furnished a copy of the School catalogue from which the transcript came.

ITEM X. We require that students who are ready to take an examination in any book shall designate an acceptable member of the Wesleyan Methodist Church outside their immediate family, to whom Authorized Examiner shall mail the selected list of questions, and in whose presence the examination shall be taken in accordance with the rules and general instructions, for examinations. Such person shall certify that the examination was taken in his presence in an honorable manner, and shall return the examination paper to the examiner with self-addressed, stamped envelope to return to the student.

ITEM XI. We place in nomination the name of Rev. F. B. Miller for election to the office of Custodian of Conference Books. We recommend that no books be mailed from the library unless sufficient postage accompanies application for the same and that this library be reserved for the use of those who are pursuing the Course of Study as Conference Preachers and Song Evangelist. We also insist that no study book or reading book be kept by one individual longer than forty-five days. In case of necessity, upon application to the Custodian, an extension of thirty days may be granted.

ITEM XII. We urge that in writing examinations special attention be given to neatness, spelling and composition. The Committee cannot give the same credit to papers that lack neatness and are poorly composed as to those that have received proper attention in this respect. We require papers to be typewritten or written in ink.

ITEM XIII. In taking examinations, when a specified number of answers are asked for and more are answered, the grade will be based on the number asked for. As an example, if 10 answers were asked for and 12 were given, the grade will be based on the first 10. If less answers are given than the number requested, the grade will be based on the full number requested.

ITEM XIV. We wish to call to your attention that those wishing to take examinations on Wiley's Theology are to contact the member of the Committee for that particular year, sending postage, in order to receive the select list of questions for study.

ITEM XV. When anyone has completed a course of study in school and is to appear before this Committee, he shall bring a transcript from that school in which the work was taken.

ITEM XVI. We recommend that those coming from another denomination must have a letter of recommendation from their superior.

ITEM XVII. All Conference Preachers must remember that Paragraphs 176 and 177 of the Discipline require that the holder of an Annual Conference license must continue to hold an effective Quarterly Conference license and that license must be renewed each year and this requires the passing at least one book in the Course of Study.

ITEM XVIII. All Conference Preachers must remember that Paragraph 267, sub-item (2) of the Discipline states that continued authorization to marry and to administer the sacraments depends on passing at least 2 books of the Course of Study.

REPORT NO. 6**COMMITTEE ON AUDITING AND FINANCE**

Your Committee on Auditing and Finance submits the following report and recommendations:

(This item is revised to conform to the latest General Conference Budget set up after this item was presented to the annual conference.)

ITEM I. WHAT SHALL THE CHURCHES PAY?

1. The following Denominational Budget items: World Missions, \$2.00; Education, \$4.00, (20 per cent to Houghton Academy); Pension, \$7.00; Brainerd, \$.25; Church Extension and Evangelism, \$1.50; Hepzibah Home, \$.50; Administrative Budget, \$2.15; General Conference Travel and Entertainment, \$.50; Australia, \$.25; Wesleyan Seminary Foundation, \$.50; (these assessments are per church member per year).

2. Undivided Conference Budget (Conference work) shall be equal to ten per cent of the sum obtained by adding the three following items: Pastor's salary, parsonage rent, and church incidental expense (to be remitted monthly). (Included in church incidental expenses are: Parsonage tax, all kinds of insurance on church and parsonage; janitor services and supplies, church utilities and fuel, parsonage utilities, and fuel when paid by the church, pastor's car expense when provided by the church), and all other items which are similar to or comparable with the above. Not included are repairs, replacements, improvements, evangelistic help and special projects, church and parsonage furnishings, Sunday School and Church literature and similar items.

3. Conference Group Life Insurance, \$.35 per member.

4. Conference Entertainment, \$.45 per member.

5. Pioneer Self-Denial envelopes for monthly remittances (above tithe) shall be given our continued support.

6. The above financial items shall be sent to the District Sub-Treasurers. Church Treasurers are to make remittances by the 5th of each month to the credit of Conference Budget, Conference Missions, and Pioneer Fund.

7. The Pastor or persons responsible for the sale of the Conference Minutes in the local church shall remit \$1.25 per copy to the chairman of the Committee on the Sale of Conference Minutes, by March 31. The Chairman of said committee shall mail statements to all those who have not paid for their Minutes by March 31, thus enabling the report of the Committee to be prepared by April 30.

8. Church Treasurers' reports to Quarterly Conference shall be made as of the close of the month preceding the Quarterly Conference. All church treasurers' records for the Conference year shall close April 30. The Conference fiscal year is from May 1 to April 30.

ITEM II. WHAT SHALL THE SUNDAY SCHOOL PAY?

1. The first Sunday School offerings of the month to the Conference Missions Fund for the use of churches not self-supporting, etc., according to the recommendations of the Conference Mission Board.

2. Sunday School birthday offerings to the Conference Mission Fund.

3. Denominational Sunday School Budget of \$.25 per Sunday School member.

4. All three items above mentioned are to be paid to the local church treasurer for remittance to sub-treasurer.

ITEM III. WHAT SHALL THE CONFERENCE TREASURER PAY?

1. To the Conference President an annual salary of \$4,940.00.
2. To the Conference First and Second Vice Presidents an annual salary of \$4,680.00.
3. The three above named Conference officials shall also be paid or have paid for them the following items.

 - f. \$1,100.00 Travel Expense—with the provision that all traveling costs in excess of this amount be paid them up to the amount of 5c per mile for the mileage reported in their current reports to the Conference. This includes all traveling costs exclusive of car depreciation. Any unused portion of above expense account shall be returned to the Conference Treasurer.
 - g. To the Second Vice President a rental allowance of \$75.00 per month.
4. \$1.30 per hour for Secretarial aid for Conference President's Secretary.
5. All expense incurred by Conference officials, Board and Committee members in the pursuit of the duties of their respective offices upon the presentation of itemized expense accounts. Mileage will be paid at 5c per mile.
6. The following sums from the Conference Budget, in appreciation for their services; Conference Secretary, \$125.00; Conference Treasurer, \$150.00; each sub-treasurer, except West Virginia, \$60.00; West Virginia sub-treasurer, \$30.00; Superintendent of Rooms, \$25.00; Statistical Chairman, \$25.00.
7. \$25.00 to each sub-treasurer for an expense account.

That since our conference sustains tremendous losses among our youth from our Sunday Schools and Churches, we therefore urge our pastors to encourage the Youth of our Churches to attend the Annual Youth Conference, District Youth Rallies and Stoneboro Camp Meeting, and that every effort be put forth to lead them into a definite experience of salvation and when deemed advisable to unite with the Church. Be it further resolved that we refrain from any compromise of our standards or introduction of social programs into our churches, which only lead to superficial loyalties, spiritual decline, and discouragement of the spiritual laity.

4. That since divorce is one of the great curses of our land, a corruption of the morals of our youth, a destroyer of our homes, and a violation of God's law, we therefore urge our pastors to prayerfully and tenderly warn our people, young and old, of this popular evil and its consequences.

5. That we go on record as being unalterably opposed to any affiliation whatsoever with the National Council of Churches or any of its departments. That we maintain our guard against the modernistic bias reflected in the Revised Standard Version of the Bible and the "Interpreter's Bible" which has been produced under the auspices of the National Council of Churches.

6. That since we recognize the religious motion picture to be an evil and not

consistent with the divine plan for the presentation and propagation of the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and since we recognize the use of plays and other entertaining diversions as substitutes for Holy Spirit anointed presentation of truth, we therefore urge our pastors and churches to refrain from using such in the Churches of the Conference.

7. That we urge our ministers and laymen to maintain the family altar as a spiritual institution in our homes, to practice the grace of systematic fasting and give themselves to intercessory prayer.

8. Since our Conference boundaries include areas of shifting population, we recommend that our pastors keep each other informed of those, who move from area to area who attend our Sunday Schools and Churches.

9. That since we recognize Communism to be a subtle, godless influence, and that the present trends to a welfare state are opening wedges to supplant our democratic way of life—be it resolved:

a. That our ministers and church leaders warn our people through the preached Word and the printed page of the subtle approach, satanic origin, and destructive results of this political philosophy.

b. That we recognize our solemn obligation to pray for the President of our Nation and committees of Congress who are engaged in exposing and opposing Communistic infiltration into our American system, that God will grant them wisdom and courage to fight this evil.

10. That since the continued advancement of the Roman Catholic system in numerical strength and political power in our nation, school systems and local governments constitutes a menace to free government, freedom of worship, and conscience, we therefore urge that the ministry of the Conference instruct the people in our Sunday Schools and churches concerning the prevalent practices and teachings of the Roman Church, relative to civil government and marriage.

11. That we recognize crime comic books and pulp magazines, which depict violence sadism, brutality, and blood lust unparalleled in the history of children's literature of any time or nation, to be a contributing factor to the present delinquency problem. We therefore urge our people to war against this evil wherever practicable by withholding patronage from those engaged in the distribution of these tools of Satan and by reproving and rebuking them with Christian love.

12. That we declare ourselves as supporting the reading of the Holy Scriptures in the public schools and that we urge our ministers and parents to seek by all ethical means to improve the moral character of our youth through the boards of education, offices of superintendent, principal, faculty, and Parent-Teacher Associations. And be it further resolved: that we endeavor to arouse our constituency to support, by prayer and other methods, Christian day schools which adhere to Bible principles.

13. That we continue to register our opposition to the trends toward socialism in our federal government, especially in such areas as Federal Aid to Education and Medical care for the aged under Social Security; and that we urge our people to make this opposition known to the Senators, Representatives and other officials who may have to do with the determination of such issues.

14. That we urge: a. Special prayer by our people for our nation's racial problem that God's solution may be found before it shall be further exploited by Communists and Black Muslims. b. That our churches take advantage of the opportunities for ministering to people of our races in their neighborhoods by doing their best to carry to them the message of full salvation.

15. That these resolutions together with the standing resolutions be read on each charge at the first quarterly meeting following the distribution of the Conference Minutes.

Since the trend of this age is toward laxity in morals and immodesty in conduct and apparel, we urge that our ladies who represent us in an official capacity either as workers or delegates to our public gatherings, be required to meet the Bible standard of modest apparel and long hair.

REPORT NO. 2**1965-66 REPORT OF ALLEGHENY CONFERENCE W.M.S. PRESIDENT**

To the members of the Sixtieth Annual Allegheny Conference Woman's Missionary Society, greetings in Jesus' Dear Name!

"Cast thy bread upon the waters: for thou shalt find it after many days." Eccl. 11:1. Matthew Henry interprets this to mean corn bread, the family food

supply. We must give a part of our life-sustaining food supply to share with the poor and the needy as the farmer of early days saved back part of his bread-corn from his family to plant as seed that he might have a later harvest and future bread. This does not mean the crumbs, the left overs, nor the garbage, but the good bread which sustains and supplies our bodily demands. We must share it, take of our abundance, whether it is sufficient or insufficient for our apparent needs.

Then we are to cast it upon the waters for as we sow, so we shall reap. Gal. 6:7. The waters, in Scripture, are used for multitudes (Rev. 16:5) and there are multitudes of poor, especially the spiritually poor without God. As the early farmers along the Nile cast their seed-grain over the muddy banks of the Nile, so must we cast our bread. After many days they gathered fruitful harvests and so will we in a spiritual sense reap a later harvest and a heavenly reward.

Thus we are to give of our bread-corn, our life-sustaining substance not after we have used what we want but as we receive it from a kind Heavenly Father and share it with others scattered abroad. That does not mean that we should carelessly throw it everywhere to every one who cries for help, to every independent, so-called prophet or leader, to everyone who says a few nice things over the radio, or to everyone who gives a hard-luck story of need, but to give prayerfully and wisely as the Lord directs to the fields that stand for the true message of God's holiness and to those who are faithful dispensers of His Holy Word as Scripture directs and teaches. We cannot get away from this command of the Lord of Harvest. Either we give and receive "after many days" or we refrain from giving and receive no harvest, no reward, no "well done" at the end of life's race. We will be unprofitable, doomed servants cast out from His presence. The law of spiritual life is to give out what we have received from God or we will spiritually die.

1965 CAMP SPEAKERS—Afternoon Services: Rev. and Mrs. Leroy Rattling-leaf, pastors, Wesleyan Indian Missions; Mr. and Mrs. Donald John, Wesleyan Indian Missions; Mr. and Mrs. Norman Uber, teachers at Brainerd Indian School; Rev. and Mrs. William Saunders, returned missionaries from Sierra Leone, W. Africa. Rev. and Mrs. William Plants, missionaries to the Indians in Nevada, were introduced and gave their testimonies, also, Rev. and Mrs. Robert Harvey, Evangelical Bible Missionaries to New Guinea. Mrs. Harvey is the author of "Out of the Shadows", a story of New Guinea.

Public Service: Rev. and Mrs. Arthur Calhoon, missionaries from Haiti, brought stirring messages. The service was crowned with a large number of young people coming to the altar and front of the tabernacle showing thus their willingness to dedicate their lives wholly to the service of the Lord. This is a challenge to us to continue prayer for them. An excellent offering was given at this time.

Missionaries' Tours—Rev. Neal Phipps representing Wesleyan Indian Missions and Rev. William Gale representing Brainerd Indian School visited parts of the conference during October and November, 1965, and again in March, 1966. Rev. Gale had a schedule from us both in the fall and again March 10-30, 1966. Mr. Shuttlesworth from Brainerd visited some churches with him.

Rev. James Blackburn, Haiti, traveled West Virginia and Indiana Districts and some in Pittsburgh District, November 10 to December 19, 1965, with Thanksgiving and the following week end off. He reported good results and reception from his visits.

Rev. and Mrs. William Saunders, Sierra Leone, W. Africa, traveled in Akron, New Castle, Titusville, Pittsburgh and Indiana Districts, November 14 to December 19, 1965, with Thanksgiving off. They also gave a very good report of their tour.

Rev. and Mrs. Arthur Calhoon traveled, March 20 to May 1, 1966, in Canton, New Castle and Titusville Districts with the week of the Ministerial Institute off. They reported offerings received, counting cash and pledges, \$14,098.89. This included gifts for Haiti and their equipment to Australia.

Sickness—Rev. K. M. Ridgway, New Guinea, who has been supported by Titusville and other churches was taken seriously ill and had to go back home to Australia in January, 1966. The Conference has made him a special subject of prayer and interest. His health is improved and they plan to be with us this conference, D.V.

Projects—(1) Sheets for the workers' rooms, towels and aprons for the kitchen use were furnished by the W.M.S. for Stoneboro Camp.

(2) Blouses or dresses were sent to New Guinea in response to Mrs. Jean Ridgway's appeal for them.

(3) The Missionary Cottage was painted by Rev. William Cornell at a minimum cost since he asked only for his traveling expenses. The Allegheny W.M.S. here wishes to extend heartfelt gratitude and appreciation to this loyal missionary-minded pastor. We pray the Lord will reward him a hundred-fold for this gift of love. If all of our pastors had this spirit and attitude, the work of missions would never lag.

1966 Conference Speakers—The speaker at the main public service June 10th will be Rev. William Gale, Field Representative of Brainerd Indian School.

Also, we expect Rev. Neal Phipps, leader of Wesleyan Indian Missions, to be with us some time during this week.

Rev. and Mrs. K. M. Ridgway, missionaries from New Guinea, are scheduled to speak to us during the conference week.

REPORT NO 3

COMMITTEE ON PROGRAM AND PLAN OF WORK

We recommend:

1. That the first meeting after conference each local society hold an installation service at which time the duties of each officer are read. (Note: New officers to assume duties first meeting after conference. Refer to Wesleyan Methodist Discipline, Paragraph 540, article 2).

2. That the Program and Plan of Work, as revised at conference, be read and discussed at an early meeting, and frequently referred to thereafter.

3. a. That each society endeavor to hold a public monthly meeting, praying for those requests found in the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY, especially encourage each member to follow the prayer calendar page, and that stress be placed upon personal evangelism. That each member feel a personal responsibility to bring at least one soul to Christ during the year.

b. That each district during the year observe one missionary service.

4. a. That we urge our societies to promote the Woman's World Fellowship by meeting in two's and three's as convenient each Tuesday morning to pray for women around the world.

b. That the Pastors' wives endeavor to participate in a conference wide prayer vigil at 6:00 a.m. on Tuesdays.

c. That a service early in the conference year be given to the local W.W.F. Secretary for enlisting prayer partners and encouraging prayer. Reports to be sent by May 1 to Conference W.W.F. Secretary, Mrs. Mary Huntsman, 100 McCook Avenue, Carrollton, Ohio, 44615.

d. Since we are requested by the General W.W.F. Secretary to have a minimum of ten prayer and fast services, we urge that all societies refrain from having meals at any missionary service since it does not become the interest of missions to be feasting when we should be praying.

5. a. That each society have an aggressive solicitor for the WESLEYAN MISSIONARY, whose duty it shall be to report all subscriptions to the district solicitor, send a quarterly report to the Conference Solicitor, Mrs. Erla Hoobler, R. D. 1, Greenville, Pa., 16125, strive to place the magazine in each home of the church and Sunday school, and achieve a net gain of at least two subscriptions. If possible, each society send at least one gift subscription to some interested family, library, hospital, etc.

b. When sending in subscriptions always be sure to identify your church by its number, and conference letter, AL, as published in the Conference Minutes. (Include Zip Code of subscribers.)

6. a. That all society officers and delegates to Annual Conference be members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church. We also recommend that Conference Society Members be members of the Wesleyan Methodist Church and their local Wesleyan Missionary Society.

b. That each local society have a nominating committee if possible.

c. That each society send the retiring president to conference and elect the incoming president or an officer as delegate, also make provision for the Y.M.W.B. Superintendent or other proper representative to attend the public Y.M.W.B. Rally, assuming their expenses if possible.

d. That each society instruct the delegate the amount to pledge at the public missionary service.

7. a. That each society use the WMS Handbook and other suitable helps, also encourage members to read the Reading Course Books as recommended by General Conference or the substituted Reading Course books as recommended by the Reading Course Secretary. All literature to be obtained from the Wesley Press, Box 2000, Marion, Indiana 46952.

b. That each society have a program committee of which the president is chairman.

8. That each society be urged to respond to the Card Call Plan thus assisting in the Extension Program of the Church. NOTE: All money for Card Call, send to Church Extension and Evangelism Department, Rev. C. Wesley Lovin, Box 2000, Marion, Indiana 46952. NOTE: Send all stubs with statistical report to Mrs. Elma Patterson, 17 6th Avenue, Greenville, Pa. 16125.

9. That inasmuch as the American Bible Society prints our Bible Transcripts without charge, we support it with prayer and finance. Send money direct to American Bible Society mentioning name of our denomination. This can be sent through regular treasurers.

10. a. That, where possible, each society have a Mercy and Help Committee, whose duty it shall be to visit the sick and needy and give aid where necessary, and send flowers or greeting cards to shut-ins.

b. That we encourage the giving of special memorial gifts as recommended by General Conference for the promotion of definite missionary work as living tribute to the memory of deceased loved ones, instead of the usual extravagant floral tribute.

11. That we put forth a special effort to secure every woman in the church as a member of the society and show a gain in membership.

12. That we follow the Denomination Monthly Emphasis: June—Installation of officers; September—Membership; October—Education; November—American Bible Society; December—White Christmas; January—Subscription; February—Woman's World Fellowship; March—Personal Evangelism; April—Self Denial.

13. That the delegate's credentials be sent two weeks before conference to the Conference W.M.S. Secretary, Mrs. Eunice Comadoll, 20 South 13th Street, Indiana, Pa. 15701.

14. That statistical blanks be sent to Mrs. Elma Patterson, 17 6th Avenue, Greenville, Pa. 16125, at least by May 15. Send an itemized list with vouchers for "Other Objects".

15. a. That the Local Missionary Treasurer send money for both individual and society pledges made at conference and camp through the church treasurer and sub-treasurer. Designate on pink blank who paid and for what project.

b. That local missionary treasurers keep a record of all money paid in pledges and report the amount on each pledge, at least two weeks before conference to the Conference W.M.S. Treasurer, Mrs. Dolores Boughner, R. D. 1, New Wilmington, Pa. 16142.

16. That the report of the Reading Course Secretary be sent by January 15 to Mrs. Betty Mansell, Box 481, Indiana, Pa. 16701.

FINANCIAL

17. That \$1.00 dues be paid by all members, active and honorary. That said dues be sent undivided through the local church treasurer to the sub-treasurer. All monies to be sent in at least quarterly.

18. That we endeavor to raise one-quarter of the church education budget. This is to include the L.S.U. pledges.

19. That each society contribute \$5.00 or more annually for the support of Hephzibah Home. This is not to apply on budget.

20. That each society contribute \$3.00 or more annually to the Medical Fund. This is not to apply on budget.

21. That each society contribute at least \$5.00 for General Church Extension and Evangelism. This is a budget item.

22. That \$.40 for each active member for conference entertainment be sent to the sub-treasurers before the books close, April 30. An extra donation of canned fruits and vegetables or cash will be much appreciated and needed.

23. That each society send \$.50 per active member for conference W.M.S. working fund, which includes \$.10 per active member for the conference missionary cottage upkeep. This is not a budget item. (Southern W. Va. District exempted from the missionary cottage upkeep.)

24. That each society give the delegate an appropriate amount of money for the purchasing of literature for the society and for small offerings taken during conference.

REPORT NO 4

COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

Be it resolved:

1. That, since the theme of our Annual Conference is "The Present Duty of Allegheny Conference—earnestly to contend for the faith which was once delivered to the saints." Jude 3b, our Woman's Missionary Society adopt this theme for the coming year.

2. a. That we give ourselves to intercessory prayer and fasting.

b. That we be faithful witnesses to those whom we contact, and when possible go out two by two in home visitation. "He that goeth forth and weepeth, bearing precious seed, shall doubtless come again with rejoicing, bringing his sheaves with him." Psalm 126:6.

3. a. That we be faithful in attending our missionary services and not hinder missionary work at home and abroad by being indifferent.

b. That we strive to obtain all of our men as honorary members.

c. That we encourage the men and boys to read the missionary books.

4. That we give ourselves to prayerful study of the Word of God, the Wesleyan Missionary, and other helpful missionary materials.

5. That we adhere strictly to Scriptural methods:

a. In raising funds for missions, by sacrificial giving. "Freely ye have received, freely give." Matthew 10:8b.

b. In our programs by abstaining from the use of movies, slides, skits and plays.

6. a. That we diligently strive to maintain firm, loving discipline in our homes because we believe what Catherine Booth said, "The secret of lawlessness both toward God and man is that children were never taught to submit to the authority of their parents." Proverbs 22:6; Ephesians 6:4.

b. That we faithfully hold to the Biblical standards of our Discipline in creating a wholesome atmosphere in our homes.

c. That we stress the maintenance of a family altar in every home, with the children having a part. That we, as parents, faithfully instruct our children concerning the plan of salvation, urging them to obtain a definite personal experience. This will create in them the desire to follow Bible standards. Deuteronomy 6:5-9.

d. That we encourage our children to use their own Bible and have a regular system of reading and of memorizing Scripture in the home. Psalm 119:11.

e. That we as parents encourage our children to seek God's will in their life's vocation, rather than being influenced by the materialistic trends of our age. Proverbs 3:6.

f. That we pray faithfully for our children in school, that they may reject all erroneous teaching presented, and be careful in choosing their friends and associates. That we urge parents to take a firm stand against the immodest dress and other evil practices of the modern athletic and music program.

7. a. That we abstain from all worldly amusements, including the theater, the dance, cards, unwholesome radio programs, etc. That we abstain from reading or allowing our children to read comic books and other undesirable magazines and books, and that we provide wholesome literature for our children.

b. That since modern mixed bathing is conducive to loose morals, we urge parents not to permit their children to visit such places of sinful amusement.

c. That we abstain from all Sabbath desecration such as buying Sunday newspapers, pleasure riding, social visiting, reunions, buying, etc. Isaiah 58:13, 14. Let us refrain, as far as possible, from patronizing establishments open on the Sabbath Day.

d. That we urge our people to refrain from having television sets in their home where it is in their power. That we refrain from viewing it in the home and elsewhere, realizing that television has a degrading influence, a tendency to make the soul lean, and the potential danger of sending souls, both young and old, to hell. Psalm 101:3.

8. a. That we as parents tell our children the true story of life as soon as they begin to ask questions. Also that they be instructed as to the sacredness of their bodies before they start to school in order that they may be prepared to withstand the low moral standards of this day. I Corinthians 6:19, 20.

b. That we parents be companions to our children, and provide for them wholesome recreation frequently. That mothers carefully select their "baby-sitters" since there is so much immorality prevalent today.

c. That as far as possible we know where our children are and what they are doing at all times. That we restrain our children from attending slumber parties and be very cautious in allowing them to spend the night with friends.

9. a. That we uphold by precept and example modesty of dress, as becometh holiness, by which we mean wearing skirts at a modest length between the knee and ankle, (being well below the knees both sitting and standing). That dresses and blouses have long sleeves and modest neckline, which things accompany purity and deep spirituality. I Timothy 2:9, 10. That we adhere to Deuteronomy 22:5, "The woman shall not wear that which pertaineth unto a man, for all that do so are an abomination unto the Lord thy God".

b. That we refrain from wearing all jewelry, which includes brooches, showy watch bands, and all other ornaments such as sparkling buttons and sequins. Isaiah 3:16-24; I Peter 3:3, 4. That ladies' hosiery have enough color or weight that they do not give the appearance of nudity. Also that we do not wear shoes with open toes and heels, or spike heels (including all heights of pencil heels), or hats which display flowers, veiling and other superfluous adornments. Furthermore, we urge our women to wear hose and dress modestly that we may be examples of modesty at all times, both in public and in the home.

c. That we also refrain from the worldly style of the "long bob", and cutting, trimming and curling the hair. I Corinthians 11:15. We believe with John Wesley on the Scripture, I Timothy 2:9, that "brodered hair" means curled hair.

d. That we also dress our boys and girls modestly, thus teaching them early the necessity of modesty in dress. We should not permit our boys to go without shirts, to wear shorts or sheer shirts, and that our girls wear long hose and not be allowed to wear sheer clothing or shorts, slacks, or pedal pushers.

e. That we strive to be neat in appearance.

10. That we urge avoidance of unnecessary debts, and the neglecting of long standing bills. "Owe no man anything." Romans 13:8.

11. a. That as far as possible, we refrain from patronizing establishments selling intoxicating beverages, and also that we oppose the use of tobacco in all its forms since we greatly detest the use and effect of both. II Corinthians 7:1.

b. We urge that our children be given scientific instruction on the evils of tobacco, alcohol, and all narcotic drugs.

c. That we be patriotic by displaying the American Flag in observing national holidays, thereby honoring God Who gives us freedom and liberty.

12. That these resolutions be read in each society semi-annually.

CONVENTION MINUTES**First Day July 15, 1966**

The 35th Annual Youth Convention of the Allegheny Conference convened on Stoneboro Camp Ground with the first service on July 14, 1966. At this service the appointments for temporary organization were read. The first business meeting was held on July 15, 1966 and was called to order by Rev. P. D. Stonebraker. Rev. John Dye led in singing, "He Abides." Rev. Stonebraker read I Thess. 5:1-11. Rev. H. E. Robertson, Jr., and Rev. Clarence Mayhle led in prayer. Roll was called with 58 delegates, 23 pastors, 15 youth presidents, and 5 zone chairmen. The bar of conference was set as the 1st 12 rows of the center and right hand tier of seats and the platform. The president's report was read and adopted. A letter of appreciation for the Canton McKinley Church from Nedra Lautzenhuser was read. The treasurer's report was read and referred to the Auditing Committee. Reports were given by these zone chairmen: Canton, H. E. Robertson, Jr., Indiana, James Beers, Templeton, Charles Martin; Titusville, Sheridan Rainey, Pittsburgh, Jack Crouse, Northern W. Va., Burton Adiska. The Prayer League Secretary's report was given and accepted. Adjourned by vote.

Second Day July 16, 1966

The second business meeting was called to order by Rev. P. D. Stonebraker. Rev. John Dye led in singing "Since Jesus Came Into My Heart." Rev. Robert Boughner led in prayer. Roll was called, 67 delegates present, 29 pastors, 23 youth presidents. Tellers were appointed: First team: Russell Dunn, Ken Carver, Roger Stearns, Johannes Maas. Second team: Robert Boughner, John Dye, Don Heasley, Donnel Gaul. Partial report of Nominating Committee given. Prewitt Duncan and James Beers were nominated for president. Balloting for president ensued. Finance Committee report given and adopted. The ballot for president resulted in the election of Prewitt Duncan with 81 ballots out of 129. James Beers and David Phelps were nominated for vice-president. Balloting for vice president ensued. The Efficiency Standard report was read and adopted. The ballot for vice president resulted in no election. Balloting for vice president ensued. The Statistical Report was given and adopted with the resolution. A motion was made and passed that the Executive Council be authorized to issue a certificate of organization for a Local Youth Society recognized by the Conference. The ballot for vice president resulted in the election of David Phelps with 71 ballots out of 121.

Report of Committee on Goals and Methods was given and adopted. The ballot for secretary resulted in the election of John Dye with 82 ballots out of 120. Wm. Rosengreen and Troy Muir were nominated for treasurer. Balloting for treasurer ensued. Resolutions Committee report was given and adopted. The report of the Efficiency Standard Chairman was given. Robert Boughner was elected as Prayer League Secretary. The Report of the Zone Chairman of New Castle Zone, Roy Wade, was given. The ballot for treasurer resulted in the election of Wm. Rosengreen with 105 ballots out of 118. Troy Muir was elected for the Efficiency Standard Chairman. The report of nominations for Zone Chairman was read and adopted except for Akron district. The minutes of both days were read and approved. A motion that all unfinished business be left in the hands of the Executive Committee was passed. We adjourned by motion.

THE W.Y. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

To all conference, zone or local officers, pastors and youth delegates:

We greet you in the Name of Him who loved youth and called "young men" into discipleship.

In the merciful good Providence of God we are again permitted to meet on this "Mount of blessing" for this the Thirty-fifth Annual Youth Convention. We are a privileged group. Some are here this year who were not here last year. Likewise, some who were with us last year are now absent from this gathering. Some of our fine young men are absent because they are on far-off battlefields. For these, we should bear special prayerful concern.

While young men afar are fighting a military battle, our young people here at home are fighting a moral battle in which many are being defeated. Personally, I, nor any other pastor here present, ever expected to see the day of apostasy we are now in. Consequently, this apostate condition has become the spawning-bed for just about every conceivable form of evil. Never has wickedness been so wicked. Never has vileness been so vile. Never has corruption been so corrupt nor perversions so perverted. Most tragic of all, there now seems to be no stop-gap or stop-gap for this multiplied tide of evil. The home, the school and the church used to be at least a three-fold minimum restraint against evil, but now from the home, thru the school to the church sins of every imaginable type are being both condoned and promoted. The satanic weapons arrayed against our youth are fierce and vicious and he is unrelenting in his purpose to defeat. Mere smoking and drinking are almost passe to the average worldly youth today. The devil's up-to-date catalogue of vice includes brain-damaging hallucinating drugs, sexual orgies of the basest sort. Gangland gangsterism and a general attitude of lawlessness defiant of all law and order is leading our nation down to chaos.

This then is the battlefield confronting our young people. The casualties on this battlefield are many and you, too, will be a casualty on this battlefield of sin unless you're saved, sanctified and keeping stride with the personal directives of the Holy Spirit. There are grave dangers, anti-Christ pressures, severe testings and unusual temptations out there before you. Young People, it is a dark day, but not all is hopeless. There is a place of safety beneath the covering of the blood. In Jesus, there is a sure foundation, an unshakable rock of defense, a fortress firm, a covert beneath His omnipotent hand, encompassed by His protective eye. My sincere prayer and desire for Allegheny Conference youth is that they mind God, be a strong voice for holiness in the tomorrows if Jesus tarries and be saved from the wrath to come.

During the past year it has been a privilege to be a part of Allegheny Conference Youth and work with you as I could. We deeply appreciate the support you have given to the work which presently engages our efforts, namely "International Student Evangelism." Only eternity will reveal the out-reach a witness to one or many of these foreign nationals can and will have.

Again this year I can sincerely say it has been a joy to work with the other members of your Executive Council. In our planning, we have cooperatively sought to know and do God's will. In all matters of importance we have sought and appreciated the wise council of our Conference leaders. These men love you, pray for you and have a keen interest in you young people. The stand

they have taken and are presently being oppressed for is because they want to maintain a spiritual conference and heritage for your tomorrows.

Much credit for the progress of the Conference Youth work is due our respective zone chairmen. They are out there where you are, working and ministering directly to you. The monthly reports I receive from some indicate there is careful, prayerful planning for your zone rallies. We do appreciate the diligence of these men. There were also several outstanding Youth Revivals across the Conference.

As best I could I've endeavored to be faithful in the work you've committed to me. The following, therefore, is an itemized summary of my limited labors (limited due to ill health), with some recommendations.

- I. Rallies:
 - Jan. 28, 1966: Akron Zone, at the Akron Grace Church
 - Feb. 3, 1966: Canton Zone, at the Robertsville Church
 - April 22, 1966: Indiana Zone, at the Penn Run Church
- II. Youth Week Revivals:
 - Feb. 21-25, 1966: Brownsville
 - Mar. 13-20, 1966: Rochester
- III. Executive Council Meetings
 - Jan. 21, 1966: At the "International Student Home" to arrange plans for this Convention.
 - July 13, 1966: At Stoneboro Youth Office to complete and verify final preparations for this Convention.
- IV. Personal Labors:
 - Mailed 112 pieces of mail. In addition, Mrs. Helen Peterson made other mailings for me.
 - Traveled approximately 1,467 miles in the interests of youth work.
 - Editorially prepared the program booklets for this Convention.
- V. Recommendations: May I recommend the following:
 1. That much emphasis be given to prayer, both in our local and zone services and that each local group be an active, organized Prayer League Society. I would urge our young people to join in prayer for guidance to our Conference and Conference leadership during this year of probable pressure in which they will need the clear directives of the Holy Spirit.
 2. That in some way somehow new impetus or incentive can be created, whereby, there will be more "Efficiency Standard" participation among our local societies.
 3. That each local society either cooperate in a Zone Youth Week Revival or prayerfully strive for a Spirit-directed revival in their own church.
 4. That since the quiz questions on the book of Romans are already in your possession, and a year's extension for study has been granted; you will now earnestly pursue this study and that many more will participate. The quizzing next spring, will then be on a local-to-zone, zone-to-Conference basis.
 5. That we strive for a gain in youth membership this year. (For several years now we've had to recognize a loss in membership.)
 6. Most of all, at any cost, let us strive to be spiritual.

I do sincerely thank you for all your prayers, your patience and your cooperation, both this year as well as over the past six years.

The following, in brief, is a summary of the achievements you made possible over the past six years:

- 1960-61 Boys' Dormitory built and furnished.
- 1961-62 Girls' Dormitory built and furnished.
Cottage built, partially furnished and presented to Rev. and Mrs. H. C. VanWormer.
- 1962-63 Two new rooms—with furnishings added to the Camp Workers' Cottage.

- 1963-64 All deficits on former youth projects were totally liquidated.
- 1964-65 \$2,351.20 was given by the Conference Youth for a future church at Aliquippa. (The total now exceeds \$2,800.00 and is presently in a savings account for the same.)
- 1965-66 Though I do not have the amount, this year, the young people gave very generously toward the support of "International Student Evangelism".

CERTIFICATE of Merit (to be awarded yearly to the Societies on the basis of total scores: 70-80; 80-90; 90-100.

It is suggested: that the points be graded on a graduation or percentage scale, e.g. if there is a real effort or accomplishment in 'outreach' you would grade full points, if little was done by way either of evangelism or of witnessing it would be 0, 5, 8, or accordingly; that the Efficiency Standard be recorded on a Quarterly basis.

We recommend the following:

1. That the Pastor, Local Youth President, and Efficiency Standard Chairman keep the Efficiency Standard before their young people, and explain its content.
2. That our Young People be reminded that the Efficiency Standard is designed to be a means of bringing them face to face with the reality of Christian principle and practice.
3. That our Youth be reminded that the Efficiency Standard is not a contest where spiritual values become the objects of competition.
4. That the Conference Efficiency Standard Chairman be given sufficient financial aid to adequately promote the Efficiency Standard.
5. That each respective Zone Chairman set up a schedule for individual Church visitation to explain and promote the Efficiency Standard to each local society, as soon after Youth Convention as possible. A report of the participating churches, and schedule of church visitation is to be sent to the Conference Efficiency Standard Chairman by August 31st. (Expenses are to be met by the local Youth Society when possible.)

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEES ON GOALS AND METHODS

The Committee on Goals and Methods submits the following report:

1. That every church organize a Wesleyan Youth Society.
2. That each society send the name and address of the local W.Y. President

and Secretary to the Conference W.Y. President not later than one week after election.

3. a. That each society pay annually:

- (1) \$.50 per full member for Conference Dues
- (2) .50 per full member Annual Convention Entertainment

b. That each unorganized society pay:

- (1) \$.50 per each attender for Conference Dues
- (Local W.Y. treasurer's books close April 30)

4. a. That our pastors and local W.Y. Presidents carefully read and do their best to carry out the program of our Efficiency Standard.

b. That a committee composed of the Pastor, W. Y. President, and Secretary or the Efficiency Standard Chairman, shall grade the local society quarterly, according to the Efficiency Standard. This rating shall be submitted to the Conference Efficiency Standard Chairman quarterly and the annual report two weeks before the Annual Young People's Conference.

c. That the secretary keep such records as are necessary for this committee to make this rating.

5. That we heartily support the Conference W. Y. Program and projects, inclusive of Pioneer.

6. That each W. Y. heartily support our missionary endeavor according to the requirements of the Discipline with one service a month for missions and we suggest that the offering of said meeting be given for missions.

7. That each local society strive to engage in as many of the following as possible:

- a. Street and institutional meetings
- b. Cottage prayer meetings
- c. Tract distribution
- d. Door-knob evangelism
- e. Visitation of sick and shut-ins
- f. Cooperation with child evangelism, Daily Vacation Bible School and Religious Education in public schools.
- g. Become a member of Conference Brigade of Intercessory Commandos.

8. That each local W. Y. cooperate 100 percent to make Wesleyan Youth Week a time of real revival and strive to interest other unsaved young people in their own salvation.

9. a. That a Local Prayer League Secretary, to cooperate with the Conference Prayer League Secretary, be elected to recruit volunteers for the W. Y. League and administer other duties of the Prayer League within the local society.

b. That the name and address of this Secretary be sent at once to the Conference Prayer League Secretary.

10. That each society send the President, two delegates, chaperon, and pastor, with expenses paid, to the Annual W. Y. Convention.

11. a. That the Conference W. Y. President arrange to hold at least one service in each zone of each district during the year.

b. That his traveling expenses be paid by each zone visited.

12. That these goals and methods be read in each local society within the first month after receiving the conference minutes.

13. That each W. Y. send by mail all statistical reports to the Conference Youth Secretary, not later than July 1.

14. That the District and Zones evaluate their activities according to the following point system and an appropriate award be given to one achieving the highest percentage.

- 15 points for having at least 8 Rallies per year (West Virginia excepted)
- 10 points for the organization of each new society.
- 10 points for a Paid Conference Budget for every organized society. (50 cents per member)
- 10 points for District or Zone Youth revival
- 15 points for meeting Zone pledge.
- 5 extra points for over-subscribing the Zone pledge 10%.

- 5 points for Conference dues for every unorganized society.
- 10 points for Chairman attending Annual Conference Convention.
- 5 points for Chairman reporting the year's activities to the Annual Conference Convention.
- 10 points for report of Zone Rallies sent to the Conference Messenger
- 5 points for report of one Zone Rally sent to the Wesleyan Youth magazine.
- 15. That each local W. Y. Treasurer submit, to their District or Zone Chairman, a report of the total members of their local society and the amount of dues paid. (Due two weeks prior to Youth Convention)

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON RESOLUTIONS

We, the Committee on Resolutions of the Wesleyan Youth of the Allegheny Conference submit the following:

1. That we seek to have a spiritual program which is God-honoring, Christ-centered, Spirit-directed, and where personal convictions are stressed, rather than a social program.

a. That each society have two adult counselors, one of which shall be the pastor.

b. That there be a period of time for instruction on the articles of our doctrinal truth, emphasizing the Work of Creation and Redemption, and Holiness.

c. That we instruct our young people on their behavior toward those of the opposite sex, and marrying in the Will of God, as stated in II Cor. 6:14-18.

2. That each society shall appoint a proper chaperon for its group attending the annual Convention.

b. Each individual shall be responsible for his conduct and attendance at all services.

c. The presence of all pastors is requested.

d. Only those who conform to these resolutions be elected to the Convention as delegate.

3. That we prayerfully strive for a Youth Week Revival.

4. That we, as Wesleyan Youth, govern our lives by adhering to the Standards of the Bible and the principles set forth in the Discipline, as interpreted by the Allegheny Conference.

5. That we, as Christian youth, have a definite plan of Bible reading, Bible memorization, and prayer, and accept the privileges of carrying a soul burden.

6. a. That we refrain from reading unwholesome literature such as comics, Detective and True Story or other literature detrimental to our spiritual life.

b. That we strongly urge our youth to develop Christian character through careful and extensive reading of edifying literature.

c. That we read the books of the "Wesleyan Youth Reading Course" which will be selected and commended by our Allegheny Conference Youth Executive Council.

d. That the W. Y. augment the church and Sunday School library, or where there is none, sponsor one with good church literature which is approved by the pastor and adult counselor.

7. That because of the physical, moral, and spiritual degeneration resulting from the use of tobacco, narcotics, and alcoholic beverages, especially among our youth, we take a vigorous stand against these evils.

8. That in view of the fact that he who is a friend of the world is an enemy of God, we urge all our youth to take a positive stand against worldliness, in that we refrain from the following:

a. Card playing, games of chance, theatre attendance, public and mixed bathing, dance halls (including participation in Senior Proms), skating rinks, bowling, circuses, carnivals, fairs, and viewing television.

b. Wearing of jewelry.

c. Wearing of immodest and worldly style of dress, both boys and girls.

d. Sabbath desecration, such as buying and selling, pleasure riding, etc.

9. That due to the problems of modern education, we will support our own Christian day schools with our prayers and finances.

10. That these resolutions be read in each society semi-annually.
