CONFERENCE RESOLUTIONS

1. All Statistical reports shall be filed with the Statistical Committee no later than the close of the Tuesday morning meeting, and any pastor who fails to do so shall explain his reason publicly on the floor of the Conference.

2. Pastors shall equalize the amounts required for Budget before overreaching any one item, and it shall be the pastor's duty to inform his people at the beginning of the year concerning the amount to be raised and he shall at once proceed to raise the amount assessed his charge.

3. Inasmuch as the work of the Conference demands the attention and attendance of all its Elders and Licentiates, therefore we will not employ as pastor or evangelist any Elder or Licentiate or pass the character of any Elder or Licentiate except by vote, who does not attend the entire session of Conference. The Committee on Pastoral Relations shall not give employment to any preacher who does not meet the requirements of this standing rule, without bringing his excuse before the Conference for its action in the matter.

4. Any minister accepting work on a charge at the hands of this Conference who resigns or abandons it before the year is out without a good excuse or lawful reason, shall be considered by said Conference and it shall take a vote of Conference to pass his character.

5. Inasmuch as the work of the Conference demands the attendance of Delegates as well as preachers, therefore we discourage the election of any person as Delegate to Conference who does not intend to attend the entire session. Information of the Delegate's intentions shall be incorporated in their credentials.

6. We recommend that each church pay two dollars toward the board of each Delegate and pastor at Conference, said amount to be sent with the Delegate's credentials. Also that each church pay the traveling expenses to and from Conference.

7. The Secretary shall prepare blanks for Delegate's credentials, including the statement required by resolution No. 5. Said blanks are to be mailed to the pastors shortly before Conference, and when filled out by them to be sent to the Chairman of a Standing Committee on Credentials if possible, in order that they may be able to report immediately after the opening of Conference. Said committee shall be composed of two members appointed by the President.

8. The Secretary shall send a statistical blank to the clerk of each charge having no pastor, requiring that the same be filled out with all available statistics and returned to the Conference Secretary.

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9. For the future the Conference shall observe the disciplinary rule requiring each pastor to read his statistical report on the floor of the Conference, but that to expedite business he may omit all blank spaces, all of Item 2 except the first 3 numbers, all of Item 8 except W. Y. P. S. and Other Benevolences, and read only the Total for all purposes in Item 9.

10. Friday preceding Conference shall be set aside as a day of prayer for the Conference.

11. Robert's Rules of Order shall be the Parliamentary guide of this body.

12. The Special Orders of the Conference shall be: Monday evening, a communion service; Tuesday evening, Educational service; Wednesday afternoon, one hour each to Tithing Secretary and the Sunday-school Secretary; Wednesday evening, W. Y. P. S. Rally; Thursday evening, Missionary service under the W. H. & F. M. S.

13. We authorize the closing of the Conference Treasurer's and the Camp Meeting Treasurer's books one week before Conference.

14. We recommend that pastors, Sunday schools, W. H. & F. M. Societies and Y. M. W. Bands remit all funds at least quarterly.

15. Pastors shall preach on the subject of church benevolences at least once each year.

16. We understand Paragraph 51 in the Discipline to require that no one be received into membership of our local churches unless they have left off the wearing of gold including the wedding ring. Be it further Resolved, That Paragraph 52 regarding plain apparel be strictly adhered to.

17. Be it required that all pastors of the Ohio Conference attend all sessions of the Camp Meeting unless providentially hindered.

18. All charges receiving a new pastor pay the moving expenses, the amount being agreed upon by the pastor and the church.

19. We order that no money be paid from the Conference Missionary Fund except by written order of the Missionary Board.

20. Each year there shall be incorporated in the Minutes a list of those who have died in the various churches during the year, the pastors being asked to provide the Secretary with the necessary information.

21. The Conference Treasurer, with all persons introduced to the Conference shall be honorary members of the Conference, and shall be accorded a seat within the Conference Bar.

22. Each occupant of the dormitory during Conference is to furnish his own bed linen and towels.

23. The new churches shall be assessed 25 per cent the first year; 50 per cent the second year; and full Budget the third year.

24. Be it required that all our workers, preachers and singers on the platform at Conference and Camp Meeting, wear sleeves at least to the elbows, and all their apparel in accord with the Discipline.

25. We recommend that each church grant their pastor a two Sun-

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days leave of absence with pay; at which time he will work under the direction of the Conference Missionary Board in a pioneer evangelistic campaign, both time and place to be chosen by that Board.

26. We shall have a travelling Conference President who shall receive \$1500.00 annually, which shall be apportioned to the churches and paid by them to the Conference Treasurer, who shall on the first of each month beginning with September 1, each Conference year forward a check for one twelfth of the amount to him. He shall be required to travel the Conference and counsel and advise with the churches in matters of doctrine, finance and other affairs that effect the spiritual and temporal welfare of the work. After consulting with the pastors, he may confer with the stewards if necessary with the purpose in mind to increase the pastor's salary. He shall hold at least two quarterly meetings on each charge annually, the slate to be arranged by the President and published in the Wesleyan Methodist. Each charge shall have at least one Sunday service each quarterly meeting except where other satisfactory arrangements can be made by the President with the pastor.

27. Inasmuch as it is necessary for both pastor and Conference President to arrange their program for the year, be it required that the President, at the Annual Conference prepare his slate for six months in advance, and post the same on the Conference bulletin board, as a guide for the pastors in arranging their programs for the Conference year.

28. All persons having business with the Committee on Itineracy and Orders shall appear before said Committee not later than the second day of Conference; and each candidate taking the course of study shall appear before some member of the Committee or some person appointed by them to take his examinations; also all examination papers shall be in the hands of the Examiner not later than July 10.

29. We recommend that all our pastors make special effort to inform all local preachers on their charges of the disciplinary requirements needed preparatory to study and to travel under Annual Conference direction.

30. Our pastors shall urge each family in the church to set aside at least one can of fruit, vegetables, meat, and pickles to be sent to the seat of Conference and Camp Meeting, for use there.

31. We recommend that the churches in the Ohio Conference receive all members or candidates for membership, as associate or probationary except those coming in by letter of transfer, and that we strictly adhere to the disciplinary requirements in receiving them.

32. In order to assist the local church in meeting all its financial obligations, we recommend a study of the discipline relating to finance and that the duties of all officers of the church be explained. We recommend the adoption and use of the Storehouse Plan as outlined in the discipline. We recommend that a Donation Steward be elected by the church to pro-

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vide a regular donation for the pastor, at least quarterly and monthly if possible; that the church be requested to provide a donation for the Conference President at the time of his visit to the church. We recommend that the Board of Stewards ascertain the financial condition of the church from the Treasurer and communicate the same at least quarterly to all non-resident and non-attending members, urging their support. We recommend that the church elect a secretary to provide tracts and information on tithing to its constituency. An offering shall be taken at least annually which shall be used to provide a tract box and suitable tracts, especially those of our own publication, on tithing, holiness, regeneration, etc. We recommend that each pastor transfer his membership to the church he is serving. We recommend that a definite agreement regarding pastor's salary be entered into within 2 weeks after Conference, through the local Board of Stewards, which shall stand until time of the First Quarterly Conference, providing no plan was agreed upon at the time of his employment. At the First Quarterly meeting an agreement shall be made for the balance of the Conference year. We recommend that the salary of the pastor shall include the two weeks of Conference and Camp Meeting; the tenure of the pastor's labors beginning the week following Camp Meeting.

33. We shall have a Camp Meeting Committee consisting of 5 members, 3 ministerial and 2 lay, elected by the Annual Conference, to have entire supervision of the Campgrounds and its improvements and the making of complete arrangements for camp and Camp Meeting services, and also provide for the entertainment of the Annual Conference. One ministerial member of this Committee shall be designated as Chairman by the Conference, annually at its regular session. That the ministerial members shall serve for a period of 3 years and the lay members for 2 years, except when first elected the ministerial members shall be elected for 3 years, 2 years, and 1 year, respectively, and lay members for 2 years and 1 year respectively. That this Committee shall designate one of its own members as Treasurer, and another as Secretary. That the Treasurer and the Secretary shall both report to the Annual Conference and the report be incorporated in the Conference Minutes. The Treasurer's Report shall also be audited. We further recommend that this Camp Meeting Committee advise with the Conference Board of Trustees as to location, erection, and improvement of Conference buildings on the Campground.

34. The fourth Monday in July shall be the permanent date for the opening of Conference; the Camp Meeting to follow.

35. The Conference Missionary Board shall hereafter be elected by ballot.

36. To further Church Extension we recommend that the pledge plan be continued, but that the President appoint a Secretary-Treasurer

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who shall take the responsibility of administering the same. He shall secure pledges and the payment of them shall be made to him, after the new building project has been approved by Conference President and Trustees. (Not to exceed three appeals in one year.) He shall notify those who have made pledges, also the pastors who are building may write a personal letter to the pastors of the Conference, asking them to take an offering and send it to the Secretary-Treasurer of this fund, who in turn will forward it to pastor or the Building Committee. Expenses of printing cards and mailing to be paid from the Conference Incidental Fund.

37. We recommend that the Treasurer's and Sunday-school Treasurer's books of the several churches be audited annually.

38. There shall be incorporated in the Minutes annually an Honor Roll of those churches raising a full budget; those who have an equivalent of one half of its membership taking the Wesleyan Methodist, and those using the Storehouse Tithing Plan. Also the Conference Calendar and the locations of the churches shall be incorporated.

39. Hereafter the Ohio Conference shall be authorized to charge 4% on loans from the Superannuated Elders' Fund; all others to draw 2%. (Any notes for loans on the Conference Treasury shall from now on be drawn up on the form in the 1940 Minutes.)

40. We recommend a standard traveling expense of .03 a mile to the Conference Board of Trustees, Missionary Board, and Camp Meeting Committee, to be paid from the Conference Incidental Fund, the Conference Missions Fund and the Camp Meeting Treasury, respectively.

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RELIGIOUS SERVICES

Monday Evening. To doubtless the largest first night crowd ever to convene in any session of the Ohio Conference, the President, Rev. Leslie D. Wilcox, brought a message from the text, "But God," taken from Eph. 2: 4. The message was both inspirational and challenging. There followed a gracious communion service in the charge of Rev. R. J. Stratton.

Tuesday Evening. The order of the evening was the Educational service. Under capable leadership of Donald C. Fisher, the temporary Chairman. The principal speaker was President McConn of Marion College. He spoke of the work of the College under the present war setup. All were glad to hear of the encouraging outlook of the future under the direction of Almighty God. Rev. Arthur Calhoun, returned missionary to India also spoke of his appreciation of Marion College in the years of his labors on the other side of the world.

Wednesday Afternoon and Evening. These services were under the direction of the Conference W. Y. P. S. President, Rev. John Woodhouse. There were not as many young people present as last year, perhaps because of the present tire situation. The Spirit of the Lord was present and made Himself manifest. To Him be glory.

Thursday Evening. The public Missionary service was the Order of the Day. E. F. McCarty and Rev. Arthur Calhoun were the principal speakers. A good missionary offering was received.

Sunday Morning. This service although held during the Camp Meeting was nevertheless a service of the Conference. It featured the ordination of six candidates. They were: Maude White, Walter Rogers, David Morgan, Claude Scott, Albert Wagner, and Allen Baker. The Rev. E. W. Tokley brought the ordination message.

Devotions—Song service was led by John Mudoch. Prayer around the altar, and closed by a prayer by the President.

Credentials—Committee on Credentials submitted report. Report corrected and adopted.

Nominations—Committee on Nominations elected, including G. W. Calhoun, H. P. Osborn, Donald C. Fisher, Ira L. Shanafelt, and Ruth Taylor.

Roll Call—Roll was called.

Bar of Conference—Conference Bar set to include the platform and the first 6 seats in the three south sections of the auditorium.

Courtesy—Committee on Courtesy elected as John Murdoch and J. C. Zuch.

Credentials—Committee on Credentials presented name of Maude Goodwin. Name ordered added to the roll. Mrs. Alice Woodhouse seated by vote of the Conference as the Delegate from the Northridge Church.

Hours—Hours of the Conference set at 9: 15 a. m. and 1: 30 p. m.

Courtesy—Committee on Courtesy presented John Cole, of the Fairmount work and Herbert Brannon, pastor of the new church at Riverside, Cincinnati; Mrs. Humes, Mrs. Miliron and Mrs. Jackson, laymen from George's Run. Also Arthur Calhoun, son of G. W. Calhoun, and former member of the Conference, but more recently missionary to India. They also presented Harry Armstrong, from the Marion Church, Brother First, pastor of the Rittman Church in the Allegheny Conference and Eva Henderson from the Osage Church.

Devotions—Song service was led by Roy Vaughn, and Claude Scott led in prayer.

Roll and Minutes—Roll was called and the minutes read and corrected.

REPORTS

Report No. 1

REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE PRESIDENT

To the Thirty-Fifth Annual Session of the Ohio Conference—Greeting.

I have been employed throughout the year in the performance of those duties and tasks to which you called me at the last session of this Conference. My sole aim and desire has been to serve you and to please God to the best of my ability. My report on the work assigned to me covers several items.

First, I desire to report by way of testimony, that the help and aid of our God has been most real and most precious throughout the year. The way has not been devoid of obstacles nor of perplexities. There have been those things that seemed to hedge up the road forward and to bar the advances we felt would please God. Nevertheless the Lord stood with us. Praise His name! His help has been in evidence both in the several fields of the Conference and in the work of the Conference itself. We humbly and gratefully acknowledge the gracious assistance which He has given and ascribe every victory and every advance to the goodness of the Lord.

In pursuance of the duties of the presidency we have travelled the Conference throughout the year, holding 77 quarterly meetings and special meetings besides assisting in two revivals and accompanying the Missionary Board in their tour of the Conference. Not counting the services included in that tour, our work has consisted of 153 preaching services and 52 business meetings. Travel in this work has totalled a little more than 7400 miles at a cost of about \$200. We have received from the Conference Treasurer the sum of \$1200 salary; and from the various churches and from individuals, cash gifts, fees, etc. amounting to \$206.15; also donations to a value of sixty-one dollars. We desire to express our appreciation for all that has been done for us in these respects. May the Lord richly bless you for your kindness to us.

Membership of the Conference

On Aug. 17, in accordance with the order of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders which was adopted by the last session of this Conference, I received Ralph Haines as an elder in the Wesleyan Methodist Church.

Aug. 23, the transfer of Annual Conference Preacher, Leland Van Order was received from the Rochester Conference.

On Sept. 29, Mrs. Etta K. Nelson presented her credentials from the Colorado District of the Church of the Nazarene, and in accordance with

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the directions of the Committee on Itineracy and Orders she was received as an elder. But one month later she notified us that she had withdrawn her membership to another denomination.

July 24, on request of Kenneth Dunn, he was granted a letter of transfer to the Indiana Conference.

Pastoral Appointments

On Aug. 3, Walter Rogers was appointed as pastor of the Piqua Church.

Aug. 23, Kenneth Dunn resigned as pastor at West Dayton. The work was supplied for a short time by Dennis Matherlee. Then on Sept. 24 Lee Shultz was chosen as pastor in which capacity he has served for the balance of the year.

On Dec. 18, word was received that H. S. McConn had resigned as pastor at Southwest Sharon. A few days later Curtis Borden was appointed to fill the appointment for the balance of the year.

In January, Roy Vaughn resigned as pastor at Findlay. Arrangements were subsequently made for John Murdoch to finish the year as pastor of this church.

About the last of April, Allen Baker resigned from the pastorate at Allen's Chapel in order to take over the care of the new work at Empire. On May 20, H. S. McConn was appointed as supply at Allen's Chapel for the rest of the year.

One church has been disbanded. I refer to the Edgemont organization in Dayton. Some of the members are transferring to other Dayton churches.

Four new churches have been organized during the year as follows:

On Aug. 17, a church was organized at Bradford. Twenty members were received at that time. Ralph Haines was appointed pastor. He continued there until January when he went into the evangelistic field for full time. The work has since been supplied by Alvas Hollopeter and Robert Sander, both local preachers.

On Nov. 14, a church organization was effected at Conesville with 15 members. Eldon Martin was appointed as pastor. This work appears to be in a most thriving condition and it holds good promise for the future.

On Nov. 30, the work at Osage was organized as a church. Six full members and two associate were received at that time with a few more since then. James Myers was appointed as pastor.

On May 19 a second church organization was effected in the city of Cincinnati. This grew out of work which had been conducted for some time by Herbert Brannon. The work is to be known as the Cincinnati, Riverside Church. Brother Brannon was continued as pastor.

State of the Work

We feel that this has been a good year for the work in general. In

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spite of occasional reverses and frequent battles, very definite progress has been made in every department of the work. This progress may be noted in varied degrees in the various arms of the work. It is indicated by the expansion of the Conference during the year into several new fields, some of which are as yet only operated as missions, while others have been organized as churches as reported above. Further evidence is seen in the large increase in amount of contributions for the year. Some churches are reporting a full budget for the first time, this year. A large number of the churches have increased the amount of pastor's salary and we believe the total pastors' receipts will be by far the largest they have ever been. From present indications we expect the report of the Statistical Committee to reveal a gain in church membership and also in Sunday-school enrollment and attendance. The total property value in the Conference has also been boosted by the erection of some new buildings and the improvement of others. While these are mostly matters which deal with the temporal side of the affairs of the Church, they may be looked upon as an index of spiritual progress. We are the more encouraged to believe this in view of the exceptionally good revival meetings which have been held in several of the churches.

God has been helping us! And we expect Him to continue that gracious assistance, yea, even in an enlarged measure, if we, His people, keep our hearts and minds open to His leading! The world around us is dark. But we need not lose heart for God beckons us onward, and the future lies before us, all radiant with the brightness of His promises!

Report No. 2

REPORT OF THE MISSIONARY BOARD

Your Missionary Board submits the following report for the Conference year 1941-42. First of all we wish to voice our gratitude for the guidance and leadership of the Lord which alone has made possible such progress as we have to report. God has indeed been good to us and we feel it fitting to call our brethren to join with us in praise for the blessings we have received as a Conference during the twelve months past.

Our work during the year has led us into a large number of fields on which we report as follows:

1. Conesville. Eldon Martin was employed as pastor soon after Conference. The work made substantial progress, and on Nov. 14 it was organized as a church.

2. Dayton. In June we sent the tent to a new location in Dayton

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where it seemed wise to hold a pioneer meeting. The churches in the city coöperated splendidly and a good meeting resulted. While no immediate result has been forthcoming in the community proper, we trust that this meeting will prove an entering wedge and that a foundation has been laid for future developments.

3. Empire. In April Allen Baker was sent to Empire for a pioneer meeting at a point where Brother Myers had been holding Sunday school for some time. A good meeting resulted in the organization of a mission and Brother Baker continued as pastor. Prospects are good for a permanent work.

4. Fairmount. Repair of the Fairmount building in Cincinnati continued until it was in suitable condition for the resumption of services. Since that time Sunday-school and preaching services have been carried on; at first under the direction of Brother Zuch and with the splendid coöperation of the people from Vine St.; and in recent weeks when the services have been changed from afternoon to morning, under the direction of John Cole. Progress has been slow but we trust it shall improve in the future.

5. Mt. Blanchard. Brother Calhoun was appointed to this work immediately after Conference. The work has been going through a period of establishment during this year. We feel substantial progress has been made in this regard and that a firmer foundation is being laid for future expansion.

6. Newark. A group of people in Newark who have for some time been much interested in Wesleyan work and have at various times had Wesleyan men in their services, called Ralph Haines for a revival during the month of June. This meeting culminated in the organization of a Wesleyan Mission. The tent was sent on the work for a meeting the first three weeks of July. Brother Haines and Brother Scott were the workers during this meeting. The people of Harrison Chapel coöperated in this meeting in an encouraging way. A church building on the south side of the city has now been rented and the people are looking ahead for a good work in Newark. The group is pastored by R. C. Gibson.

7. Osage. This work which has now been organized as a church is continuing under the direction of Brother Myers.

8. Piqua. The Conference, on recommendation of the Pastoral Relations Committee, placed this church under the care of the Missionary Board. Brother Rogers was appointed as pastor and given some assistance in getting established on the work. Progress during the year has been notable.

9. Stroud's Run. Brother Kenney opened up this work in an abandoned church building some miles from Athens. It has been carried on under his direction and with the assistance of Brother Edwards and of Brother Spencer.

10. Zanesville. Brother Haines and Brother and Sister Martin held

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a pioneer tent meeting in North Zanesville soon after Conference of last year. Considerable success greeted our initial efforts. The work is now being carried on in a rented building. Its greatest need is a full time worker.

During the fall months the Board toured the Conference in the interest of the work of Conference Missions, and a good response was apparent on the part of most churches. At the same time we made rather extensive surveys of possible openings in a large number of cities. These surveys have been included in the permanent records of the Missionary Board.

Total traveling for the year has exceeded 5200 miles, which has cost the Conference \$131.07.

Report No. 4

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

On August 11, 1941, we ordered that \$75.00 be given from the Church Extension Fund to Piqua to help with remodeling of the rear rooms for a pastor's residence.

On December 4, 1941 we granted a loan of \$250.00 to a new church in Conesville, Ohio. During the early weeks of this Conference year the board considered several different houses as a possible Conference Parsonage, finally rejecting all of them, some on grounds of unsuitability, others because the financial considerations involved were greater than the present resources of the Conference would warrant.

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Report No. 5

REPORT ON MORAL REFORM

We, the Ohio Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church, recognizing the deplorable condition of our land, do pledge ourselves to wholeheartedly support every properly constituted effort toward moral reform, and do especially urge our ministers and departmental leaders to give definite attention to the following:

1. We recommend careful teaching concerning modesty of dress and proper respect for the sacredness of the body. 1 Peter 3:3, 4, "Whose adorning let it not be that outward adorning of plaiting the hair, and of wearing of gold, or of putting on of apparel, but let it be the hidden man of the heart, in that which is not corruptible, even the ornament of a meek and quiet spirit, which is in the sight of God of great price." 1 Timothy 2:9, 10, "In like manner also that women adorn themselves in modest apparel, with shamefacedness and sobriety; not with broidered hair, or gold, or pearls, or costly array; but (which becometh women professing godliness) with good works."

In this we urge that all of our women set a godly example.

2. We do urge careful teaching of the Bible standards regarding divorce, the sanctity of marriage, and the sacredness of the home.

3. We do urge that our people have a greater regard for the Sabbath Day, heeding the divine admonition found in Isa. 58:13, 14 and that we teach our constituency concerning the evil of drinking, smoking and warn them against the marijuana cigaret drug.

4. We register our protest against the anti-Christian and modern school program which undermines the faith of our children and young people and tends to deify the natural appetite and remove restraint of the same.

5. We recommend that letters be sent by our Conference Secretary to our Senators urging the passage of the Sheppard bill and to the Secretary of War urging the enforcement of the May Act.

We recommend the holding of four special public meetings during the year with an offering taken at each. The following order is suggested: First, South America; second, Africa; third, Home Missions; and fourth, India.

We recommend that the several societies send boxes of clean and mended clothing and provisions as follows: Hephzibah Orphanage, Sunbury, Dayton Northridge, Dayton Belmont, Fargo, and Coshocton. (It is necessary to send new or used clothing in good condition here. If older clothing comes in send it to one of the other mission stations where it can be used.)

Zion's Hill—Piqua, Kenton, West View, Westerville, Cincinnati, Marion.

Blue Ridge, Glenville—Athens, Zanesville, West Dayton, Jelloway, and Senecaville.

Blue Ridge, Tuckaseegee—Findlay, Dunkirk, Greer, and Africa.

Hope Mission—George's Run, Harrison, Chippewa Lake, Osage, and Fairview.

We also recommend that Dayton Belmont, Kenton, Findlay, George's Run each furnish ticking for 2 pillows. (Get size from Mother Wilcox.) We recommend that Jelloway and Westerville each furnish a combinet for the Campgrounds, and all the remaining societies furnish one pair of pillow cases. Anyone having old sheets and bedspreads bring them to be used as mattress covers.

We recommend that each society send a small Christmas offering to the Conference Society Treasurer early in December. The same to be sent to the Mexican Mission work. This will be receipted by the Treasurer by card only and will not apply on Budget.
